Overview of Parks Data by Supervisorial District



1. CALL TO ORDER AND FLAG SALUTE

- ✓ Commissioner Melissa Centeno called the meeting to order at 9:38 a.m.
- ✓ Commissioner Melissa Centeno led the Flag Salute. The Commissioners and staff stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

2. ROLL CALL

Commissioners Ed Reyes, Melissa Centeno, Sylia Obagi and Deanne Boublis were present and established a quorum. Commissioner Mayisha Akbar was not present.

3. APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES

Commissioner Chair Melissa Centeno moved to make motion to approve the January 28, 2019 Commission Minutes. Seconded it by Commissioner Sylia Obagi. All Commissioners were in favor and agreed.

4. DIRECTOR'S UPDATES

Director John Wicker stated that to improve Commission Communications, we will be sending the draft Commission Minutes two weeks after each meeting. Also, significant awards and a report of all the special events will be provided monthly. Commissioner Melissa Centeno would like to see only information related to the Fourth District. Commissioner Ed P. Reyes, Sylia Obagi and Deane Boublis would like to see information related to all five districts. The monthly updates will include significant things happening within the Department and programs, such as groundbreakings, etc.,

- Quarterly P&R Magazine (emailed)
- Director's Monthly Video (emailed)

Commission Sylia would like to learn more about the Third District. Director John Wicker will provide an org chart and an overview of each District at the next meeting. Also, Deputy Director Jon Gargan will meet and follow up with her about El Cariso Park.

5. DEPARTMENT UPDATES:

Budget Update

Finance Manager Robert Maycumber provided a Budget Update. FY 2018-2019, since the last meeting in January 2019, we had a 15 million problem that we were dealing with, the progress has been good. Due to the implemented solutions, now we are dealing with a three million deficit overall. With a combination of reduction in costs and unanticipated revenues, we believe that we will bring our budget to zero. We cannot be over budget. Major contributors to reducing the 15 million deficit are decreased estimated water costs and continuing with the internal hiring freeze. Also, the four million legal settlements that will be deferred to next fiscal year.

Possible solutions to the three million deficit are:

- Further cost savings from the Initiative to Reduce Water Use for the period of January 1, 2019 through April 15, 2019 and this is in hopes that we achieve a 25% reduction in water use.
- Services and Supplies Savings from the sweep in May, where money allocated for purchases to each agency is taken away if it does not get spent by the agencies.
- Unanticipated revenues and further Services and Supplies savings from unanticipated cancellations of existing purchase orders, not related to the sweep.
- We have worked with our Internal Services Department (ISD) regarding the possible effects of the proposed rate change in peak time, from Southern California Edison and the affects to solar users. There may be an effect to those that do not use solar, also, but per ISD, the overall effect to electricity costs is expected to be minimal.

Robert Maycumber moved to discuss FY 2019-2020, and stated we have several cost of living adjustments that were approved by the Board and other funding that will be provided by Chief Executive Office (CEO). The original Budget submission request to CEO was 15.7 million.

Parks After Dark (PAD) Update:

Katie Dingman provided a PAD video presentation (power point attached) and a summary of the following:

Growing Success of PAD

- In 2009 The concept of PAD was developed as a prevention component of the County's Gang Violence Reduction Initiative.
- In 2010 DPR launched PAD at three County parks.
- In 2012, PAD expanded to three additional parks through DPH's Community Transformation Grant.
- In 2015, Supervisor Solis funded three additional parks in the First District. In 2016, PAD expanded to 12 additional parks through DPH's Trauma Prevention Initiative and Probation Title IV-E Waiver Funs.
- In 2017, PAD expanded to two additional parks through Probation Department's Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act and Adult Growth funds and,
- 2018, PAD expanded to 10 additional parks and two additional seasons through the DMH's Prevention and Early Intervention Funds.

Now we have 33 Parks After Dark programs in all districts. PAD is a proven model that provides a community-based framework for prevention and intervention. It targets populations – communities with high rates of poverty, crime and Obesity\Systems Involved Youth. Pad will extend park operation hours when schools are closed such as: Summer – Eight weeks, Winter – Three weeks and Spring – One week.

PAD addresses various gaps such as: safe spaces for physical activity and social recreation; inequities in physical and mental health; lack of summer programs; limited trust of law enforcement, and lack of social cohesion.

Parks After Dark (PAD) Offerings:

• Variety of recreational programming, such as sports clinics and tournaments, walking clubs, dance classes, and in the summer, we include aquatics programming.

The communities love our entertainment programming like concerts and movie nights and especially our cultural programming

Parks After Dark (PAD) Funding

PAD received the County's Gold Eagle Award and; also received the Innovation and Health Award from the National Recreation and Park Association. We could not have won these awards without the support from our funding partners:

- Department of Mental Health
- Probation Department
- Department of Children and Family Services
- Department of Public Health
- Workforce Development, Aging and Community Services

Thanks to our funding partners, Department of Mental Health, Probation Department, Department of Children and Family Services, Public Health, and Workforce Development, Aging and Community Services, we have sustained funding through 2020 and are piloting the winter and spring seasons. We are continuing to look for ongoing funding to sustain this program, but I want to show you what the funding we received last year afforded us.

Winter PAD

We just completed our first-ever winter season of Parks After Dark. A big hit of our winter season was 40 tons of snow trucked into each of the 33 PAD parks.

Spring PAD

We are now half-way through our first-ever Spring season of PAD. In order to offer Spring PAD while all schools are on spring break, we had to split our 33 PAD parks between four separate weeks to match up with all the school district breaks.

Solicitation Updates

Sandra Salazar provided a power point presentation (attached) and a summary of the following:

Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park – Recreational Vehicle Campground

- Developed and operated by the Private Sector since 1978.
- RV includes over 500 RV spaces, swimming pools, general store, multi-purpose room and camp sites.
- Contract expired on December 31, 2018 and is operating on a month-to-month basis.
- County Mandated Solicitation began on August 18, 2018; Department received three proposals on September 20, 2018

 – one proposal was from incumbent.
- Urban Park Concessionaires was identified as the highest ranked proposal and will be recommended for award of a 20-year contract on April 30, 2019, to the Board of Supervisors.
- Urban Park Concessionaires is anticipated to commence operations on June 1, 2019.
- Parks hosted a Community Meeting on Saturday, March 23, 2019 over 200 RV guests attended.

Whittier Narrows Recreation Area – Trap and Skeet Facility

- Current contract approved by Board of Supervisors in May 1988.
- Facility includes 25 sporting clay stations, Pro-Shop, Coffee Shop, Archery Range and Olympic Bunker Shooting Range.
- Contract expired on May 31, 2018 and is operating on a month-to-month.
- County Mandated Solicitation began on November 29, 2018; Department received two proposals on February 4, 2019

 – one proposal was from incumbent.

 - CIP Process (includes approval by ACOE).
 - Department is in the process of revising RFP based on feedback received for resolicitation.

Michael Chang, Co-Founder of PlayShare from the public was present and provided information to the Commission on how PlayShare can help the parks of the future. He provides PlayShare Lockers that can provide a variety of lawn games and sports equipment. Unique activities that complement all parks and could change, depending on the community needs. They can be conveniently located at parks. Users can borrow items from the locker through a mobile app for a limited amount of time. Users then return the item after they are done playing. The app will track if items are not returned and take appropriate action. The PlayShare Locker has various product features: app, protection, use with wi-fi, solar, change up items and pricing as needed; and automatic shut-off and on based on park schedule.

Due to the time limit, he was invited to present the PlayShare to the Executive Team at their internal Deputy Director's/Regional Operations Managers Meeting on April 18, 2019.


