### **REPORT BACK ON MOVING FORWARD ON THE EQUITABLE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN AND THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT EXPEDITED CONTRACTING (ITEM NO. 25, AGENDA OF SEPTEMBER 15, 2021, AND ITEM NO. 12, AGENDA OF NOVEMBER 30, 2021)**

On September 15, 2021, the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted a motion directing the Chief Executive Officer, in collaboration with County Counsel, to provide bi-monthly reports on the implementation of the equity formula and principles in the American Rescue Plan (ARP) contracting process and to include updates on the public dashboard and website that ensure implementation information is available to the public. A follow-up motion adopted by the Board on November 30, 2021, directed the Chief Executive Office (CEO) to submit quarterly reports on the status of contracts executed for programs approved in the ARP Spending Plan, as well as any subsequent new or amended ARP Spending Plans.

Attachment I provides an update on the above-noted directives since the previously submitted Board memo dated March 20, 2024. This report covers:

- Efforts to increase access of ARP funded programs among communities who speak Languages Other Than English (LOTE) and were highly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic; and
- ARP project status, budget, and contracting updates, including updates on launch dates, encumbrances and expenditures for approved programs, and contracting activities. A list of external partner agreements, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders, is in the Attachment II.



### Language Access for ARP-Funded Programs

As previously reported on December 26, 2023, the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Immigrant Affairs (DCBA-OIA) is launching two innovative strategies to improve the County's ability to serve LOTE speakers by increasing access to and centralizing language access services for ARP-funded programs, grants, and contract opportunities. The two strategies include launching Language.LACounty.gov, a centralized online language services hub, and securing subcontracted language interpretation services to increase access to ARP-funded resources. DCBA-OIA is collaborating with U.S. Digital Response (USDR) to develop the language hub. The team is on track to complete the public-facing site by the end of June 2024. The hub will feature:

- A language identifier tool that connects users with translated materials on ARP-funded and other County benefits, services, and resources;
- The Language Mapping tool;
- An overview of the Countywide Language Access Initiative; and
- A language access form to track complaints, expedite a response, and improve language services.

DCBA-OIA is also collaborating with DCBA's Grants to CBOs Financial Wellbeing and Wealth Building program to increase access to financial planning services through language service providers responsible for translating program materials, hosting in-language information sessions, and providing support to LOTE clients interested in receiving free estate planning legal services.

Additional strategies to improve outreach and engagement to increase awareness of and access to ARP-funded programs are underway including cultural awareness trainings focused on indigenous language-speaking and hearing-impaired communities.

### ARP Project Status and ARP Contracting Updates

As of April 10, 2024, nearly all projects have been approved for launch and their funding amounts encumbered and/or expended vary depending on their level of implementation. Nearly 61 percent of funds for all projects were encumbered with more than 32 percent of the funds expended.

As of May 6, 2024, 12 departments reported having or are in the process of awarding a total of 282 agreements with 207 external agencies, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders. Awarded agreements totaled a reported \$745,290,818.23. A list of ARP-funded agreements is provided in Attachment II.

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Moving forward, reporting on the two motions, "Moving Forward on the Equitable Implementation of the American Rescue Plan" and "The American Rescue Plan Act Expedited Contracting" will take place on a quarterly basis as updates on the ARP Project Dashboard are located online at: <https://arptracking.ceo.lacounty.gov/public>. The online reports will continue to feature ARP project status, budget, and contracting updates, including updates on encumbrances and expenditures for approved programs and contracting activities and will continue until March 2027, at which time all ARP funds are expected to be expended.

**Report on the Equitable Implementation of the American Rescue Plan and Expedited Contracting**

On September 15, 2021, the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted a motion directing the Chief Executive Officer, in collaboration with County Counsel, to provide bi-monthly reports on the implementation of the equity formula and principles in the American Rescue Plan (ARP) contracting process and to include updates on the public dashboard and website that ensure implementation information is available to the public. A follow-up motion adopted by the Board on November 30, 2021, directed the Chief Executive Office (CEO) to submit quarterly reports on the status of contracts executed for programs approved in the ARP Spending Plan, as well as any subsequent new or amended ARP Spending Plans.

This report provides an update on the above-noted directives since the previously submitted Board memo dated March 20, 2024, including:

- An update on language access for ARP-funded programs; and
- ARP project status updates on launch dates, encumbrances and expenditures for approved programs, and contracting activities. A list of external partner agreements, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders, is in Attachment II.

Language Access for ARP-Funded Programs

The following provides detail on ARP-specific language access efforts underway:

*Centralized Online Language Services Hub*

DCBA-OIA is collaborating with U.S. Digital Response (USDR) to develop the centralized Language.LACounty.gov online language services hub. The team is on track to complete the public-facing site by the end of June 2024. The site will feature:

- A language identifier tool that connects users with translated materials on ARP-funded and other County benefits, services, and resources;
- The Language Mapping tool;
- An overview of the Countywide Language Access Initiative; and
- A language access complaint form to track complaints, expeditiously respond, and improve language services.

The language identifier tool will enable users to select their preferred language for written communication on the site, which then links to an in-language page with vital translated County documents. The page will also contain contact information for County programs and community-based organizations that provide services in the selected language. The tool is currently in development using Spanish for the prototype to ensure functionality before adding additional languages.

The Language Mapping tool is a data-driven geographic information system (GIS) tool allowing users to visualize areas in the County with high concentration of Languages Other Than English (LOTE) speakers. Initially focusing on 15 languages, including Arabic, Armenian, Chinese (Cantonese or Mandarin), Korean, Vietnamese, and others, the map enables users to assess the language diversity at a specific site location or by region (e.g., SPA). The map also has additional data overlays, including County department locations to identify physical proximity to relevant language populations and other Census-based community indicators (e.g., concentrated disadvantage, tenant vulnerability, and poverty) to pinpoint high-need service areas. Work continues to explore adding additional features and functionality requested by departments to the map, the possibility of adding additional data sets, and assessing long-term maintenance needs. DCBA-OIA is exploring a partnership with CIELO to capture data from their indigenous languages map, and DPH has proposed the purchase of two additional Census data sets from the US Census Bureau's American Community Survey for Los Angeles County that detail languages spoken in homes based on the five-year estimates for years 2018 to 2022.

While DCBA-OIA originally envisioned adding a cross-departmental County resource-sharing section to the centralized online language services hub, USDR recommended maintaining a separate County-facing SharePoint site to ensure the confidentiality of internal communications. DCBA-OIA has since built the SharePoint site to feature:

- The Departmental Language Access Plan (DLAP) template and supporting worksheets for each template section;
- All the language access motions adopted by the Board;
- The Countywide Language Access Policy, and
- Status reports submitted to the Board.

The feasibility of a language resource center and community forum will be examined by December 2024.

#### *Language Interpretation Services for ARP-funded Resources*

DCBA-OIA is collaborating with DCBA's Grants to CBOs Financial Wellbeing and Wealth Building program to increase access to financial planning services. This ARP-funded program provides grants to community-based organizations and community development financial institutions to support low-income communities with intergenerational wealth-building, financial coaching, and homeownership. DCBA-OIA subcontracted with four language service providers (LSP) to support vendors offering estate planning services by translating general information regarding estate planning products and power of attorney and materials used for public presentations. Each LSP is contracted to host information sessions for community members and to support LOTE clients in completing their applications to receive free estate planning legal services. LSPs are also recording "Estate Planning 101" videos in language, which will be available online.

Additionally, DCBA-OIA is developing strategies to improve outreach and engagement among indigenous language-speaking and hearing-impaired communities to increase awareness of and access to ARP-funded programs. These include:

- A cultural awareness training on “Serving Indigenous Mexican and Central American Language Speakers” in partnership with CIELO. The training will be recorded and uploaded into the DHR TalentWorks employee learning platform;
- A “Language Access for Deaf People” session planned for early June 2024. The session will feature panelists from the Deaf Services Units within the Department of Children and Family Services and District Attorney’s Office. The Greater Los Angeles Agency for the Deaf (GLAD) was also invited to ensure community perspective is represented; and
- A cultural awareness training on “Serving Black Immigrants.” DCBA-OIA has reached out to the African Communities Public Health Coalition to discuss the possibility of hosting the session.

#### ARP Project Status and ARP Contracting Updates

As of April 10, 2024, nearly all projects have been approved for launch and their funding amounts encumbered and/or expended vary depending on their level of implementation. Nearly 61 percent of funds for all projects were encumbered with more than 32 percent of the funds expended.

As of May 6, 2024, 12 departments reported having awarded, or are in the process of awarding, a total of 282 agreements with 207 external agencies, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders. Awarded agreements totaled a reported \$745,290,818.23. A list of ARP-funded agreements is provided in Attachment II.
