S-2. Public Health Order

Discussion and consideration of necessary actions on the Public Health Order related to COVID-19, as requested by the Chair of the Board and status on the COVID-19 vaccine. (20-4861)

Dr. Genevieve Clavreul addressed the Board. Interested person(s) also submitted written testimony.

Dr. Barbara Ferrer, Director of Public Health, and Dr. Christina Ghaly, Director of Health Services, made a presentation and responded to questions posed by the Board. Fesia Davenport, Chief Executive Officer, also responded to questions posed by the Board.

Supervisor Solis instructed the Director of Health Services to provide data on COVID-19 home test kits that have been distributed to the public, but have not been returned for processing.

Supervisor Barger directed the Chief Executive Officer to provide information on whether private insurance companies will pay for up to eight COVID-19 tests per month.

Supervisor Mitchell made a motion to authorize the Chief Executive Officer to reallocate \$7,000,000 in the Tranche 1 Spending Plan for American Rescue Plan Act (ARP) Coronavirus State and Local Government Fiscal Recovery Funds Spending Plan (Spending Plan) approved by the Board on July 27, 2021, to increase the Safer at Work line item from \$500,000 to \$7,500,000, where reallocated funds should be subtracted from the public health emergency line item in the ARP Spending Plan; approve an appropriation adjustment that reflects an increase of \$7,000,000 in appropriations in the Workforce Development, Aging and Community Services Final Adopted budget offset, by a corresponding increase of \$7,000,000 in Federal revenue from the ARP Act to fund a COVID-19 Testing Kit Distribution Program as part of the Safer at Work line item to provide free testing kits to small businesses and community/faith-based organizations in high vulnerability communities; and authorize the Acting Director of Workforce Development, Aging and Community Services, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, to enter into, execute, amend and if necessary, terminate, subrecipient agreements, including sole source agreements, or any related agreements, for the Safer at Work Program, up to \$7,000,000 for the COVID-19 Testing Kit Distribution Program to immediately support small businesses while prioritizing vulnerable front-line workers.

was received and filed; the Director of Health Services was instructed to provide data on COVID-19 home test kits that have been distributed to the public, but have not been returned for processing; and the Chief Executive Officer was directed to provide information on whether private insurance companies will pay for up to eight COVID-19 tests per month.

5. Updating the County's COVID-19 Tenant Protections Resolution to Extend, Clarify and Gradually Phase Out Temporary Emergency Protections

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Kuehl and Solis: Adopt and instruct the Chair to sign a resolution further amending and restating the resolution to implement Phase I and Phase II as detailed below:

Phase I (February 1 - May 31, 2022): Beginning February 1, 2022, current residential tenant and mobilehome space renter protections set forth in the COVID-19 Tenant Protections Resolution shall be extended through May 31, 2022, where not preempted under State law; effective April 1, 2022, eviction protections shall be reinstated for all residential tenants and mobilehome space renters, including creating an affirmative defense, related to nonpayment of rent due to COVID-19 financial hardship for rent incurred on or after April 1, 2022; in addition, such eligible households shall be able to

self-certify financial hardship in order to establish an affirmative defense in unlawful detainer actions; the County shall preserve protections relating to anti-harassment and retaliation for all residential and commercial tenants, prohibiting enforcement of personal guarantees for rent incurred by commercial tenants with nine employees or fewer, and requiring landlords to provide notices of rights to commercial tenants with nine employees or fewer, as stated in the resolution; commercial eviction protections for nonpayment of rent shall expire on January 31, 2022, due to a reinstated State law preemption concerning commercial tenancies;

Phase II (June 1 - December 31, 2022): Specific protections for residential tenants and mobilehome space renters shall be phased out beginning on June 1, 2022; the purchase date requirement for owner move-ins will be removed; the requirement that the residential tenant can only be displaced if the tenant has not been impacted by COVID-19 to allow for owner move-ins will be lifted; evictions for denying entry to a landlord shall resume, except when such attempted entries constitute harassment; eviction protections for nuisance, unauthorized occupants or pets shall remain; the rent increase freeze currently in place for residential properties in the unincorporated areas shall be extended; eviction protections shall continue for residential tenants and mobilehome space renters, including creating an affirmative defense, related to nonpayment of rent due to COVID-19 financial hardship for rent incurred on or after April 1, 2022, amended to apply to households who self-certify their income levels to be at 80 percent Area Median Income or below; the County shall preserve protections relating to anti-harassment and retaliation for all residential and commercial tenants, prohibiting enforcement of personal guarantees for rent incurred by commercial tenants with nine employees or fewer, and requiring landlords to provide notices of rights to commercial tenants with nine employees or fewer, as stated in the resolution: and

Instruct the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs, in coordination with the Chief Executive Officer, the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority, and in consultation with County Counsel, to report back to the Board in 120 days with lessons learned during the pandemic, related to tenant protections, recommendations on opportunities to change or strengthen the County's permanent tenant protections, and recommendations for providing guidance and/or technical assistance to incorporated cities interested in creating and adopting their own permanent tenant protections. (22-0439)

6. Creating Financing Programs, Incentives and Technical Assistance to Increase Production of Accessory Dwelling Units

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Kuehl and Solis: Direct the Chief Executive Officer to work with the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority, the Directors of Regional Planning and Public Works, the Treasurer and Tax Collector, the Assessor, the Chief Executive Office's Legislative Affairs and Intergovernmental Relations Division, County Counsel, and in consultation with Inclusive Action for the City and other community organizations and stakeholders as appropriate, to report back to the Board in 120 days on the feasibility of establishing and/or expanding incentives and financing mechanisms to support all opportunities for the development of Accessory Dwellings Units (ADUs) in the unincorporated County, with the analysis to include, but not be limited to:

An internal assessment of existing governmental and nongovernmental programs and initiatives across the County facilitating the financing of ADUs, identifying which programs can be expanded and provided to property owners who commit to renting their units at an affordable rate;

A County-guaranteed loan program for property owners who do not qualify for traditional refinancing or home equity lines of credit (HELOC) options due to credit requirements and other rigid underwriting standards, with the assessment to include a plan for identifying experienced lending institutions that could work with non-traditional applicants; a draft of character-based and equity-driven credit and underwriting standards to guide prospective lending partners in working with non-traditional borrowers; equity-driven underwriting standards to avoid setting minimum credit scores for eligibility; the consideration of future rental income as part of a borrower's debt service coverage ratio; and opportunities to connect the Los Angeles County Development Authority's Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher holders with such units;

A County-administered ADU construction loan program catering to smaller projects, such as garage conversions, with low-to-no interest, subject to holistic eligibility requirements assessed through an equity lens;

Leveraging County and State funds to partner with traditional lenders to include property owners who do not qualify for conventional refinancing tools, with the analysis to include a plan for identifying potential lending institutions willing to partner with the County, draft loan products with attractive terms, such as deferred payments during construction, etc., and which are conditioned on an affordable rent requirement for the unit for a

set number of years;

Exploring advocacy for a property tax abatement program at the State level to incentivize affordable ADU rental units, building on existing systems, such as the property owners' exemption for a principal residence, including:

The projected amount of affordable housing that would be built through private monies (individual property owners) and the offset costs that will accrue to the County due to these private developments; and

Scenarios for feasible amounts of property tax abatements that will both incentivize property owners to build ADUs, while not imposing a significant cost burden to the County; and

An assessment of the resources needed including, but not limited to, potential consultants, to explore, establish and/or expand on the proposed programs and the identification of potential funding streams;

Direct the Chief Executive Officer to work with the Directors of Regional Planning, Public Works, Consumer and Business Affairs and Arts and Culture, the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority, the Fire Chief, and in consultation with Inclusive Action for the City and other community organizations and stakeholders as appropriate, to report back to the Board in 120 days on opportunities to streamline ADU development processes in the unincorporated County including, but not limited to:

"ADU Concierge" team made up of representatives from each relevant County Department to work collaboratively in supporting ADU development by providing technical assistance, helping overcome language barriers, technical divide challenges and decreasing the wait time for obtaining building permits;

Identification of opportunities to create a list of preferred contractors, designers, etc., to serve as consultants for property owners developing an ADU, with any such "consultant bench" to be selected through an open solicitation and approved by the County;

Determining the next steps for implementing the Standard ADU Plans Program as proposed by the Director of Regional Planning in the November 19, 2021 report, and how this work would interact with the abovementioned proposals; and

An assessment of the resources needed including, but not limited to, potential consultants to explore, establish and/or expand the proposed programs and materials, such as a step-by-step guide and the identification of potential funding streams. (22-0417)

Directors of Internal Services and Personnel, and in consultation with relevant stakeholders, to report back to the Board in writing in 90 days with a plan for ensuring Fair Chance Act provisions are included in all County contracts and ensuring compliance with those provisions through education initiatives, audits, reporting mechanisms, enforcement mechanisms and other strategies, including a mechanism for tracking data on the performance of nexus assessments to help ensure that County contractors are not inappropriately rescinding job offers when there is no direct nexus between a criminal conviction and the job for which an individual has applied;

Instruct the Executive Director of the Economic and Workforce Development Agency to report back to the Board in writing in 45 days with a plan to conduct an education campaign to raise awareness among local business stakeholders of their obligations to comply with the Fair Chance Act and any resources that can be shared to aid and support their efforts to comply; and report back to the Board in writing in 180 days with the results of this campaign, including any data on how this campaign may improve the ability and willingness of businesses to recruit and hire individuals impacted by the criminal justice system and other Fair Chance populations; and report back to the Board in writing in 45 days with a plan to work with educational and training institutions which provide post-conviction certification and apprenticeship programs in developing a Countywide recognized and verifiable work history for individuals re-entering society;

Direct the Chief Executive Officer, through the Legislative Affairs and Intergovernmental Relations Division, and County Counsel, in consultation with the Acting Director of the Office of Diversion and Re-Entry, the Los Angeles Regional Re-Entry Partnership Employment Committee, Executive Director of the Worker Education and Resource Center and the Acting Director of Workforce Development, Aging and Community Services, and other relevant stakeholders, to report back to the Board in writing in 90 days with an evaluation of options for strengthening the enforcement of the State's Fair Chance Act, as well as options for increased local enforcement and any local code changes that would be needed:

Instruct County Counsel, in consultation with relevant stakeholders, to report back to the Board in writing in 90 days with an analysis on the creation of classifications that are focused on individuals impacted by the justice system, an analysis on current County employment requirements that may result in artificial barriers for individuals impacted by the justice system, and whether the County can require a percentage of County and County-contracted jobs to be filled by individuals impacted by the criminal justice system; and

Instruct the Director of Personnel, in collaboration with the Acting Director of the Office of Diversion and Re-Entry, Chief Probation Officer, Public Defender,

Alternate Public Defender, Executive Director of the Economic and Workforce Development Agency, Chief Executive Officer, Executive Director of the Worker Education and Resource Center and other relevant stakeholders, to report back to the Board in writing in 90 days with a set of goals for the number of individuals impacted by the criminal justice system to hire by 2025.
