4. Affirmative Efforts to Foster the Educational Futures of Current and Former Los Angeles County Foster Youth

Revised recommendation as submitted by Supervisor Solis: Instruct the Director of Children and Family services, in collaboration with the Superintendent of Schools of the Los Angeles County Office of Education, to develop an outreach campaign to widely disseminate information about The Fostering Futures Program (Program), including clear eligibility requirements and additional resources geared at assisting with the application process, to encourage current and former foster youth to apply; through the use of staff and/or in collaboration with other relevant stakeholders, such as educational counselors, advocates, foster youth district liaisons, mentors, peer counselors, or others with experience navigating education applications processes, to assist current foster youth with completion of the requisite steps and applications needed to qualify and apply for the Program including, but not limited to, the Program application, a free application for Federal Student Aid, a California Dream Act application, any other applications necessary to determine a student's financial eligibility, and applications for all other Federal, State, or institutionally administered grants or fee waivers for which the student is eligible; and instruct the Superintendent of Schools for the Los Angeles County Office of Education, through the use of staff and/or in collaboration with other relevant stakeholders, such as educational counselors, advocates, foster youth district liaisons, mentors, peer counselors, or others with experience navigating educational application processes, to assist qualifying former foster youth enrolled in high school in the County with completion of the requisite steps and applications needed to apply for the Program, including, but not limited to, The Fostering Futures Program application; a free application for Federal Student Aid; a California Dream Act application; any other applications necessary to determine a student's financial eligibility; and applications for all other Federal, State, or institutionally administered grants or fee waivers for which the student is eligible. 9. Hotel Worker Protections

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Horvath and Solis: Instruct County Counsel to draft a hotel worker protection ordinance for the unincorporated areas of the County that is substantially similar to the hotel worker protection ordinances in the cities of West Hollywood, Santa Monica, and Los Angeles, and return to the Board with the ordinance, including the following protections:

Mandate hotels to provide personal security devices (sometimes known as panic buttons) to employees that are required to work in guest rooms or restrooms by themselves;

Mandate hotel employers to provide training to hotel workers on the use of personal security devices;

Prohibit hotel employers from taking any adverse action against hotel employees who report threats or incidents of violence to law enforcement;

Mandate that for hotels with fewer than 40 guest rooms, a hotel employer shall not require a room attendant to clean rooms amounting to a total of more than 4,500 sq ft of floor space in any eight-hour workday, unless the hotel employer pays the room attendant twice the room attendant's regular rate of pay for each and every hour worked during the workday; for hotels with 40 or more guest rooms, a hotel employer shall not require a room attendant to clean rooms amounting to a total of more than 3,500 sq ft of floor space in any eight-hour workday, unless the hotel employer pays the room attendant twice the room attendant's regular rate of pay for each and every hour worked during the workday; if a room attendant is assigned to clean seven or more checkout rooms or additional bedrooms during any eight-hour workday, each such checkout room or additional bedroom shall, for purposes of this subsection, count as 500 sq ft, regardless of the actual square footage of each room, with the limitations contained herein to apply to any combination of spaces, including guest rooms, meeting rooms, and other rooms within the hotel, and apply regardless of the furniture, equipment, or amenities in such rooms, and the workload amounts set forth above shall be reduced on a prorated basis if a room attendant works less than eight hours in a workday, shall be increased on a prorated basis for each hour of overtime that a room attendant works in excess of eight hours in a workday, and shall be calculated on a prorated basis by room attendant if a room attendant is assigned to clean rooms jointly with one or more other room attendants:

Prohibit hotel employers from mandating hotel workers work over 10 hours a day unless the hotel worker consents in writing; and

Mandate that hotels contract with a certified Public Housekeeping Training Organization, as defined in the ordinance, at least once a year to provide Public Housekeeping Training to new employees, or employees that have not received the training within the last five years, including hotel worker rights included in the Hotel Worker Protection Ordinance; best practices for identifying and responding to suspected instances of human trafficking, domestic violence, or violent or threatening conduct; best practices for effective cleaning techniques to prevent the spread of disease; best practices for identifying and avoiding insect or vermin infestations; and best practices for identifying and responding to the presence of other potential criminal activity; and

Instruct County Counsel to compare the County's current "right-to-recall" and "worker retention" provisions, that were adopted by the Board in May 2020, with the "right-to-recall" and "worker retention" provisions that are in place in West Hollywood, Santa Monica, and Los Angeles, and make any revisions to the County's provisions that would strengthen them, if they provide less protections then those in West Hollywood, Santa Monica, and Los Angeles, specifically focusing on whether the provisions in the other cities are permanent, not just related to COVID-19, and if the other cities provide permanent protections, those provisions should be incorporated into the County's ordinance. 11. Implementation of Vision Zero on Mulholland Highway

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisor Horvath: Instruct the Director of Public Works to evaluate and report back to the Board in 180 days upon the reopening of "The Snake," a section of the Mulholland Highway that is well-known among motorcyclists and sports car enthusiasts for its tight twists and turns, on the efficacy of the safety enhancements installed in Spring 2023 on Mulholland Highway from Kanan Road to Sierra Creek Road, including recommendations on implementing the same traffic safety enhancements along the surrounding Collision Concentration Corridors on Mulholland Highway, from one mile east of April Road to Zuma Ridge Fire Road; and report back to the Board in 120 days on the following:

Evaluate existing traffic conditions and consider other potential traffic engineering interventions, including but not limited to, implementation of quick build safety improvements and long-term capital improvements, to enhance safety and reduce speeds on Mulholland Highway between one mile east of April Road to Zuma Ridge Fire Road, with a focus on increasing safety and visibility for ingress and egress for residents living along this corridor;

Identify potential funding sources to implement the above changes;

Conduct outreach to local community organizations, residents, and relevant stakeholders, in addition to collaborating with the California Highway Patrol (CHP) in the development of the interventions;

Collaborate with the Third Supervisorial District, the CHP, and the Director of Public Health, to explore and identify funding for a traffic safety educational campaign for Mulholland Highway between one mile east of April Road to Zuma Ridge Fire Road, to deter unsafe driving behavior; and

Collaborate with the CHP and the Director of Public Health to explore and identify funding for appropriate traffic safety enforcement actions, including similar measures taken by the CHP and the Sheriff's Department's "Street Racing Task Force" in the Sante Fe Springs area, on Mulholland Highway between one mile east of April Road to Zuma Ridge Fire Road, to deter unsafe driving behavior. 12. Waiver of Permit Fee for the West Los Angeles Community Coalition's Farmers' Market Use of Parking Lots at the Former West Los Angeles Courthouse

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisor Horvath: Find that the portion of the West Los Angeles Courthouse parking lots, located at 1633 Purdue Avenue, which are proposed to support the weekly West Los Angeles Farmers' Market are not currently needed for exclusive County purposes during the specific hours of operation of the farmers' market; find that the services to be provided by the West Los Angeles Community Coalition are necessary to meet the social needs of the County and serve public purposes which benefit the County; find that the proposed granting of a non-exclusive, gratis permit to the West LA Community Coalition is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act; and take the following actions:

Authorize the Chief Executive Officer to negotiate and execute a gratis permit through the end of June 2024 with West LA Community Coalition, which will allow weekly use of the West Los Angeles Courthouse parking lots every Sunday from 6:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. for the period starting on August 12, 2023 and ending on June 30, 2024;

Waive the \$200 per day permit fee for the West LA Community Coalition during the term of the permit, with the West LA Community Coalition to be required to provide the cleaning deposit and meet all County insurance requirements; and

Authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute other ancillary documentation necessary to effectuate the Permit Agreement, and to take any other actions necessary and appropriate to implement and effectuate the Permit. (23-2849) Interested person(s) submitted written testimony.

14. Moving Forward with Improving Access to Gun Violence Restraining Orders

Revised recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Hahn and Solis: Instruct the Director of Public Health, through the Office of Violence Prevention (OVP), to take the following actions:

Implement an initial public awareness campaign that is culturally and linguistically relevant about Gun Violence Restraining Orders (GVROs), including the following:

Creating a dedicated webpage on the OVP website to share information, answer questions, and provide resources related to GVROs, including elements of the California GVRO law; who is eligible to request a GVRO under the law; how to request a GVRO and what the process looks like; average time between submission of a request and implementation of an order; other kinds of restraining orders and gun relinquishment options; warning signs of suicide or mass shooting risk; and mental health action steps and resources;

Creating flyers with information about GVROs; and

Working with community and County partners to design and implement targeted outreach strategies;

Collect and compile existing GVRO data from the California Department of Justice (DOJ), Los Angeles Superior Courts, and the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department (LASD) and make the data publicly available on the OVP website in an accessible, understandable format;

Support efforts to expand access to GVRO data by seeking permission from the DOJ to access de-identified data from the California Restraining and Protective Orders; collaborating with LASD to ensure that LASD staff are being provided with regular information about the correct use of the statistical code used to identify GVROs; and requesting that LASD ask the DOJ to add a code to the Armed and Prohibited Persons System to identify a person prohibited from owning a gun because of a GVRO;

Collaborate with County Counsel and the Sheriff to coordinate and provide training (i.e., San Diego City Attorney training) and assistance related to GVROs, to address the needs of both law enforcement and the public, including collaborating with the Sheriff to designate a trained representative/liaison at each patrol station to serve as a station resource for deputies regarding GVROs; and

Report back to the Board in writing in 90 days with progress made on the above directives and any additional recommendations to improve awareness and access to GVROs; and

Direct the Chief Executive Officer, in collaboration with the Director of Public Health, through the Office of Violence Prevention, the Sheriff, and County Counsel, to report back to the Board during the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Supplemental Budget phase on potential funding options to support efforts to expand GVRO awareness and assistance as described in the proposal included in the Office of Violence Prevention's July 7, 2023 report entitled, "Responding to the Board's Motion: Increasing Access to Gun Violence Restraining Orders," with the report back to specifically consider funding for the following:

A robust public awareness campaign on California's GVRO law that includes creating a variety of materials on different platforms, implementing a marketing strategy, and engaging with various diverse partners;

Two system navigator positions with OVP, at appropriate levels recommended by the Chief Executive Officer's Classification and Compensation Division, to provide support to members of the public requesting GVROs, work with County and community partners to develop and provide trainings on GVROs, and develop outreach plans to meet specific and most impacted populations; and

Appropriate dedicated attorney staffing within County Counsel to support GVRO filings by LASD and serve as counsel in GVRO hearings/proceedings. (23-2857)
