WE WELCOME YOU TO OUR REGULARLY SCHEDULED MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF 6 SUPERVISORS. TODAY IS TUESDAY, JULY 9TH, 2024. WE TAKE NOTE 7 THAT A FULL COMPLIMENT OF THE BOARD IS PRESENT, AS WELL AS OUR 8 9 CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER, COUNTY COUNCIL, EXECUTIVE OFFICER, 10 AND OUR SERGEANT AT ARMS ARE ALL HERE TO ASSIST. WE'LL BEGIN TODAY'S BOARD MEETING WITH OUR COUNTY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT. 11 12 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR (VIDEO RECORDING): THE COUNTY OF 13 14 LOS ANGELES RECOGNIZES THAT WE OCCUPY LAND ORIGINALLY AND STILL INHABITED AND CARED FOR BY THE TONGVA, TATAVIAM, 15 SERRANO, KIZH, AND CHUMASH PEOPLES. WE HONOR AND PAY RESPECT 16 TO THEIR ELDERS AND DESCENDANTS, PAST, PRESENT, AND EMERGING, 17 AS THEY CONTINUE THEIR STEWARDSHIP OF THESE LANDS AND WATERS. 18 WE ACKNOWLEDGE THAT SETTLER COLONIZATION RESULTED IN LAND 19 20 SEIZURE, DISEASE, SUBJUGATION, SLAVERY, RELOCATION, BROKEN 21 PROMISES, GENOCIDE, AND MULTI-GENERATIONAL TRAUMA. THIS 22 ACKNOWLEDGEMENT DEMONSTRATES OUR RESPONSIBILITY AND COMMITMENT TO TRUTH, HEALING, AND RECONCILIATION, AND TO ELEVATING THE 23 STORIES, CULTURE, AND COMMUNITY OF THE ORIGINAL INHABITANTS OF 24 LOS ANGELES COUNTY. WE ARE GRATEFUL TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO 25

LIVE AND WORK ON THESE ANCESTRAL LANDS. WE ARE DEDICATED TO

- 4 FOR THIS DAY. WE THANK YOU FOR ALL THE PEOPLE THAT PRAYED
- 5 THROUGH THE NIGHT BACK HOME WHERE I COME FROM, IN ISLETA, IN
- 6 THE SAN CRISTOBAL MOUNTAINS, WHO LIT FIRES FOR YOU AND PRAYED

- 15 AMERICAN VETERANS' ASSOCIATION FOR OVER 19 YEARS ON SPECIAL
- 16 COMMITTEES AS WELL AS ACTING VICE PRESIDENT IN 2001. IN HIS
- 17 ROLE, HE HAS FURTHERED SUPPORT FOR THE VETERAN COMMUNITY AND
- 18 FAITH-BASED COMMUNITY, AND HE'S ADVOCATED FOR SERVICES TO THE
- 19 NATIVE AMERICAN COMMUNITY AND ASSISTANCE, ESPECIALLY TO OUR
- 20 VETERANS AND THEIR FAMILIES. ROY IS A U.S. MARINE CORPS
- 21 VETERAN WHOSE LAST DUTY STATION WAS AT CAMP PENDLETON. AS A
- 22 VETERAN, ROY ALSO SERVES AS THE KEEPER OF THE EAGLE STAFF OF
- 23 THE NATIVE AMERICAN VETERANS ASSOCIATION. IN ADDITION, ROY
- 24 FOUNDED INDIAN TALK, A GROUP OF NATIVE PUBLIC SPEAKERS WHO
- 25 LECTURE ON NATIVE CULTURE, FAITH, AND LIFE AT HIGH SCHOOLS AND

- 2 ARE SO GRATEFUL FOR YOUR DEDICATED SERVICE. I'M SO HONORED

- 2 LIEUTENANT COLONEL JACKSON KELLY IS AN ACTIVE MEMBER OF HER
- 3 COMMUNITY SERVING ON THE FOUNDATION FOR WOMEN WARRIORS BOARD
- 4 OF DIRECTORS AND THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF BLACK MILITARY
- 5 WOMEN. SHE RECEIVED MANY AWARDS FOR HER DISTINGUISHED SERVICE,
- 6 INCLUDING THE 2010 SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA WOMEN VETERAN OF THE
- 7 YEAR AWARD, THE FORD FREEMAN FOUNDATION UNSUNG MILITARY
- 8 HONOREE, THE AIR FORCE COMMENDATION MEDAL AIR FORCE LONGEVITY

- 4 COULD PLEASE SILENCE YOUR CELL PHONES IF YOU HAVE THEM WITH
- 5 YOU THAT WOULD BE GREAT. WITH THAT WE'LL BEGIN WITH ITEM 7
- 6 EFFECTIVENESS, RESPONSIVENESS, AND ACCOUNTABILITY OF COUNTY
- 7 GOVERNMENT THROUGH CHARTER REFORM, WHICH I HELD. FOR MEMBERS
- 8 OF THE PUBLIC ON THE TELEPHONE, PLEASE PRESS 1 THEN 0 NOW TO
- 9 COMMENT ON THIS ITEM. WITH US TODAY, WE HAVE FERNANDO GUERRA,

- 12 FROM POMONA COLLEGE. I KNOW THAT THESE ARE MEMBERS OF OUR

- 14 EXTENSIVELY AND SO I WANTED TO MAKE SURE THEY WERE INCLUDED IN

- 16 BEGIN, I WOULD LIKE TO FIRST HEAR FROM SUPERVISOR HAHN.

- 18 KENNETH HAHN (VIDEO RECORDING): NOW THERE'S NOTHING NEW IN
- 19 THESE STUDIES WHATSOEVER. YOU DO NOT NEED TO STUDY, STUDY,
- 20 STUDY. THEY'VE BEEN STUDYING COUNTY GOVERNMENT SINCE 1851 AND
- 21 THERE'S TIME FOR CHANGE AND THE CHANGE AND THE TIME IS NOW.
- 22 1913 SINCE THE COUNTY CHARTER WAS ADOPTED BY THE PEOPLE
- 23 ACTUALLY WAS SUBMITTED TO THE PEOPLE IN 1912 IT WAS RATIFIED
- 24 TO BE EFFECTIVE FOR 1913. THERE IS A BASIC NEED FOR OVERHAUL
- 25 IN 1972. AND THERE'S NOT TOO MUCH TO ASK THAT THE PEOPLE OF



- 1 THIS COUNTY SHOULD BE ENTITLED TO MORE SUPERVISORS THAN AN
- 2 ALPINE COUNTY WHERE THEY ONLY HAVE 5 SUPERVISORS FOR A
- 3 THOUSAND PEOPLE OR MODOC COUNTY 5 SUPERVISORS FOR 1200 PEOPLE
- 4 CERTAINLY THE PEOPLE OF THIS COUNTY ARE ENTITLED TO HAVE AT
- 5 LEAST ONE FOR A MILLION PEOPLE.

- 7 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR HAHN YOU SOUNDED A
- 8 LITTLE DIFFERENT THERE.

- 10 SUP. JANICE HAHN: YEAH, THANK YOU. THE VIDEO OF MY FATHER
- 11 SPEAKING ABOUT EXPANDING THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND COUNTY
- 12 GOVERNMENT REFORM FROM 1972, I THINK IT GIVES SOME CONTEXT TO
- 13 THE PROPOSAL THAT WE HAVE IN FRONT OF US TODAY. BACK THEN, THE
- 14 COUNTY'S POPULATION WAS BETWEEN 6 AND 7,000,000 PEOPLE. AND
- 15 EVEN THEN, THERE WAS WIDESPREAD CONSENSUS THAT THE BOARD WAS
- 16 FAR TOO SMALL AND THE DISTRICTS WERE FAR TOO BIG. AND IT'S
- 17 AMAZING THAT 52 YEARS LATER, SOME PEOPLE THOUGHT WE WOULD
- 18 NEVER GET TO THIS CHANGE AND THIS REFORM OF COUNTY GOVERNMENT.
- 19 BUT I THINK, AS HE SAID IN 1972, THE TIME FOR CHANGE IS NOW
- 20 AND WE SHOULD SEIZE THIS OPPORTUNITY. AND THE REFORMS THAT
- 21 SUPERVISOR HORVATH AND I ARE PROPOSING ARE BIG, BUT THEY'RE
- 22 NOT RADICAL. AND AS YOU HEARD FROM MY DAD, THEY'RE NOT NEW AND
- 23 THEY'VE BEEN STUDIED OVER AND OVER AND OVER AGAIN. LA COUNTY
- 24 IS THE LARGEST COUNTY IN THE NATION, MORE POPULOUS THAN 40
- 25 STATES, HOME TO ONE OUT OF EVERY 34 AMERICANS. AND YET LA



- 1 COUNTY HAS A SMALLER GOVERNING BODY THAN COUNTIES HALF OUR
- 2 SIZE. EACH OF US SUPERVISORS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR REPRESENTING
- 3 THE DIVERSE INTERESTS AND OPINIONS OF 2 MILLION PEOPLE. PEOPLE
- 4 WHO WANT TO SEE US, THEY WANT TO HEAR FROM US, THEY WANT TO
- 5 SPEAK TO US. I ALONE REPRESENT 32 MAYORS AND OVER 150 COUNCIL
- 6 MEMBERS. AND I KNOW THAT EVERYONE ON THIS BOARD WORKS AS HARD
- 7 AS THEY CAN TO REPRESENT OUR MASSIVE DISTRICTS. BUT I THINK WE
- 8 WOULD ALL ADMIT IT'S NOT EASY. AND ESPECIALLY, I DON'T THINK
- 9 IT'S FAIR TO OUR CONSTITUENTS. THEY DESERVE MORE PEOPLE
- 10 REPRESENTING THEM AND I THINK IT'S TIME TO ADD MORE SEATS TO
- 11 THIS DAIS. AND IT'S TRUE THAT THIS PROPOSAL HAS BEEN TRIED AND
- 12 FAILED MANY TIMES BEFORE, BUT THIS TIME IS DIFFERENT. PEOPLE
- 13 ARE READY FOR THE CHANGE. THEY KNOW THAT A BIGGER BOARD IS NOT
- 14 BIGGER GOVERNMENT, IT'S BETTER GOVERNMENT. AND JUST IN THE
- 15 PAST FEW DAYS SINCE WE MADE THIS PROPOSAL PUBLIC, I'VE HEARD
- 16 AN OUTPOURING OF SUPPORT FROM PEOPLE ACROSS POLITICAL
- 17 SPECTRUMS WHO ARE EAGER TO SEE THIS HAPPEN. BUT THIS IS NOT
- 18 JUST ABOUT EXPANDING THE BOARD. IT'S A REFORM PACKAGE THAT WE
- 19 BELIEVE WILL MAKE COUNTY GOVERNMENT MORE TRANSPARENT, MORE
- 20 RESPONSIVE, MORE EFFECTIVE, AND MORE REPRESENTATIVE. ONE OF
- 21 THE BIGGEST REFORMS THAT WILL MAKE THE MOST FUNDAMENTAL
- 22 DIFFERENCE TO THE FUNCTIONING OF OUR COUNTY IS TRANSITIONING
- 23 FROM AN APPOINTED CEO TO AN ELECTED ONE. AND FOR TOO LONG,
- 24 THIS BOARD HAS SERVED BOTH THE LEGISLATIVE AND EXECUTIVE POWER
- 25 FOR THE COUNTY. THAT MAY BE THE FORM OF GOVERNMENT WE'RE ALL



- 1 MOST COMFORTABLE WITH, BUT IT'S NOT WHAT MOST EXPERTS AGREE IS
- 2 THE BEST FORM OF GOVERNMENT. IN FACT, 5 STUDIES HAVE ALREADY
- 3 RECOMMENDED TRANSITIONING TO AN ELECTED CEO. BY ELECTING A
- 4 COUNTY EXECUTIVE, WE CAN MAKE LA COUNTY MORE DEMOCRATIC AND
- 5 ACCOUNTABLE TO THE VOTERS. AND WE CAN ESTABLISH LONG OVERDUE
- 6 CHECKS AND BALANCES IN OUR COUNTY. WE'RE ALSO PROPOSING THAT
- 7 WE PUT IN PLACE AN INDEPENDENT ETHICS COMMISSION. THE PUBLIC
- 8 IS LOSING TRUST IN THEIR GOVERNMENT AND THEIR ELECTED
- 9 OFFICIALS, AND THEY HAVE PLENTY OF REASON TO. AN INDEPENDENT
- 10 ETHICS COMMISSION WOULD INCREASE TRANSPARENCY, ENSURE

- 18 RAISED IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY, IT'S AN HONOR TO GO TO WORK
- 19 EVERY DAY WITH PEOPLE WHO ARE SO COMMITTED TO HELPING OUR
- 20 RESIDENTS AND STRENGTHENING OUR COMMUNITIES, BUT I THINK WE
- 21 CAN MAKE LOS ANGELES COUNTY EVEN BETTER. THANK YOU, MADAM
- 22 CHAIR.

- 24 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU. I WOULD AGREE TODAY IS
- 25 AN IMPORTANT DAY FOR THE FUTURE OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. THE



- 1 LAST TIME THE COUNTY MEANINGFULLY CHANGED ITS FORM OF
- 2 GOVERNANCE WAS IN 1912, BEFORE WOMEN HAD THE RIGHT TO VOTE,
- 3 FAR BEFORE THE END OF SEGREGATION, AND WELL BEFORE ROBUST
- 4 LABOR RIGHTS TOOK HOLD. TODAY, SUPERVISOR HAHN AND I ARE
- 5 INTRODUCING THE MOST COMPREHENSIVE REFORM PACKAGE FOR LOS
- 6 ANGELES COUNTY GOVERNMENT IN OVER 100 YEARS, INCLUSIVE OF
- 7 CHANGES PROPOSED AND SUPPORTED BY ALL 5 OF US LAST YEAR.
- 8 THROUGH OUR MOTION, WE'RE PROPOSING REFORMS TO LOS ANGELES
- 9 COUNTY'S CHARTER. REFORMS THAT WILL CREATE A MORE
- 10 REPRESENTATIVE, EFFECTIVE, ACCOUNTABLE, AND TRANSPARENT LOS
- 11 ANGELES COUNTY. REFORMS THAT, IF APPROVED BY THE BOARD, WILL
- 12 GO BEFORE THE PEOPLE FOR A VOTE THIS NOVEMBER. THESE CHANGES
- 13 ARE NOT RADICAL. THEY ARE LONG OVERDUE AND DESPERATELY NEEDED.
- 14 AS SOMEONE WHO'S NEW TO THE BOARD, I HAD EXPECTATIONS COMING
- 15 IN ABOUT HOW THE COUNTY WORKS. AND A YEAR AND A HALF LATER, I
- 16 KNOW THERE IS A BETTER WAY TO GOVERN OUR COUNTY. WE NEED A
- 17 STRUCTURE THAT HELPS US MEET THE CHALLENGES OF TODAY. AND I
- 18 WANT TO BE CLEAR, THIS IS A STRUCTURAL PROBLEM. THE COUNTY
- 19 WORKFORCE WORKS INCREDIBLY HARD DAY IN AND DAY OUT TO SERVE
- 20 ANGELINO'S AND THEY DESERVE BETTER THAN WHAT THEY HAVE TO WORK
- 21 WITH TODAY. WE NEED A STRUCTURE THAT GIVES OUR COUNTY WORKERS
- 22 THE CLARITY AND ALIGNMENT THEY NEED TO CONTINUE THE IMPORTANT
- 23 WORK THAT THEY DO. WE NEED MORE DIVERSE VOICES TO HAVE A SEAT
- 24 AT THE TABLE. WE NEED A GOVERNMENT THAT TRULY MEETS OUR
- 25 COMMUNITIES WHERE THEY ARE. SO TODAY WE SHARE WITH YOU OUR



- 1 PLAN FOR GOVERNANCE AND ETHICS REFORM FOR LOS ANGELES COUNTY,
- 2 THE MOST TRANSFORMATIVE PACKAGE ANGELINO'S HAVE SEEN IN OVER A
- 3 CENTURY. THERE ARE 3 KEY COMPONENTS TO OUR PLAN. FIRST, IT
- 4 CREATES AN ELECTED COUNTY EXECUTIVE. AN ELECTED COUNTY
- 5 EXECUTIVE LEADS TO A MORE EFFICIENT AND TRANSPARENT GOVERNMENT
- 6 THAT IS TRULY ACCOUNTABLE TO THE PUBLIC. THIS IS HOW WE MOVE
- 7 FASTER. IT'S NOT NOVEL. IN FACT, THIS IS THE NORM. THE COUNTY
- 8 EXECUTIVE AND THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS WOULD FUNCTION SIMILAR
- 9 TO THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL IN LOS ANGELES, OR A GOVERNOR
- 10 AND THE LEGISLATURE FOR THE STATE, OR THE PRESIDENT AND THE
- 11 CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES. AN APPOINTED DIRECTOR OF BUDGET
- 12 AND MANAGEMENT WOULD OVERSEE THE ADMINISTRATIVE OPERATIONS OF
- 13 THE COUNTY. SECOND, IT EXPANDS THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS FROM 5
- 14 TO 9. INCREASING THE BOARD TO 9 SUPERVISORS WOULD ALLOW MORE
- 15 VOICES THAT REFLECT THE DIVERSITY OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY TO BE
- 16 AT THIS TABLE TO SHAPE COUNTY POLICY. BY ESSENTIALLY CUTTING
- 17 THESE DISTRICTS IN HALF, WE ARE ENSURING OUR COMMUNITIES HAVE
- 18 BETTER ACCESS TO THE ELECTED SUPERVISORS WHO REPRESENT THEM.
- 19 GOOD GOVERNMENT IS ONE WITH CHECKS AND BALANCES, WHICH IS WHY
- 20 THE THIRD KEY COMPONENT IS ETHICS REFORM. THIS INCLUDES
- 21 CREATING AN INDEPENDENT ETHICS COMMISSION TO INCREASE
- 22 TRANSPARENCY AND BUILD PUBLIC TRUST. THE INDEPENDENT ETHICS
- 23 COMMISSION WOULD ENHANCE ACCOUNTABILITY AND INTEGRITY WITHIN
- 24 THE COUNTY'S GOVERNANCE, HOLDING OUR ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES
- 25 TO THE HIGHEST LEVELS OF ETHICAL CONDUCT WITH PROTOCOLS TO



- 1 ROOT OUT CORRUPTION. THE PROPOSAL ALSO CREATES A PUBLICLY
- 2 SEARCHABLE LOBBYIST DATABASE AND EXTENDS THE REVOLVING DOOR
- 3 POLICY TO PREVENT COUNTY OFFICIALS FROM LOBBYING THE COUNTY
- 4 UNTIL 2 YEARS AFTER LEAVING THEIR SERVICE. THIS REFORM PACKAGE
- 5 ALSO REQUIRES OPEN BUDGET HEARINGS BY DEPARTMENTS EACH YEAR,
- 6 BECAUSE OUR COMMUNITIES DESERVE TO KNOW EXACTLY HOW THEIR TAX
- 7 DOLLARS ARE BEING SPENT AND HOW OUR \$46 BILLION BUDGET
- 8 DIRECTLY IMPACTS THEM. IT ALSO DESIGNATES THAT A TASK FORCE
- 9 LED BY MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC WILL OVERSEE REFORM
- 10 IMPLEMENTATION BECAUSE THE PROCESS REQUIRES COMMUNITY INPUT
- 11 AND STAKEHOLDER OUTREACH FROM OUR LABOR PARTNERS TO COMMUNITY-
- 12 BASED ORGANIZATIONS. THE PROPOSAL OPENS THE DOOR TO FUTURE
- 13 GOVERNANCE REFORMS BY CALLING FOR A PERMANENT COMMISSION TO
- 14 REVIEW THE CHARTER AT LEAST EVERY 10 YEARS. AND WE'RE GOING TO
- 15 DO THIS AT NO ADDITIONAL COST TO THE TAXPAYER TO IMPLEMENT. WE
- 16 WILL TAKE OUR EXISTING BUDGET AND REALLOCATE THE FUNDS TO
- 17 IMPLEMENT THE MEASURE. COLLEAGUES, WE CANNOT ALLOW ANOTHER 100
- 18 YEARS TO GO BY. IT'S TIME TO EXPAND THE BOARD SO IT IS MORE
- 19 REPRESENTATIVE OF THE BEAUTIFUL DIVERSITY OF LOS ANGELES
- 20 COUNTY. THIS IS A ONCE IN A GENERATION OPPORTUNITY FOR CHANGE
- 21 AND OUR TIME TO ACT IS NOW. PRIOR ATTEMPTS TO DO THIS WERE
- 22 UNSUCCESSFUL BECAUSE THEY WERE DONE PIECEMEAL. EXPANSION
- 23 WITHOUT AN EXECUTIVE, AN EXECUTIVE WITHOUT EXPANSION, NONE
- 24 WITH ETHICS FRONT AND CENTER. WHAT WE'RE BRINGING FORWARD IS A
- 25 ROBUST, WELL-ROUNDED REFORM PACKAGE THAT SHOWS VOTERS THAT WE



- 1 AGREE WITH THEM. IT'S TIME FOR TRANSFORMATIVE CHANGE. AS THE
- 2 VIDEO MAKES CLEAR, LA COUNTY GOVERNANCE REFORM HAS BEEN
- 3 STUDIED AND PROPOSED FOR DECADES, IN FACT, MORE THAN 50 YEARS.
- 4 EVEN ALL 5 OF US ON THIS BOARD HAVE VOTED TO EXPLORE THESE
- 5 CHANGES JUST LAST YEAR. AND THAT'S WHY WE'RE BRINGING THIS
- 6 FORWARD NOW. PEOPLE ARE FED UP WITH THE STATUS QUO. THIS IS
- 7 NOT UNIQUE TO LOS ANGELES, IT IS FELT ACROSS THE COUNTRY.
- 8 SCANDALS, CORRUPTION, THE PUBLIC EXPECTS MORE FROM THEIR
- 9 ELECTED OFFICIALS. THERE'S NOT JUST AN APPETITE FOR ETHICS AND
- 10 GOVERNANCE REFORM, THERE'S A HUNGER FOR IT. SIMPLY PUT, THIS
- 11 IS THE RIGHT TIME TO DO THE RIGHT THING. AS THE NEWEST
- 12 SUPERVISOR, I'M NOT JUST HERE TO START THE CONVERSATION. I'M
- 13 HERE TO SEE THIS CHANGE THROUGH, AND I WANT TO THANK
- 14 SUPERVISOR HAHN FOR CO AUTHORING THIS MOTION, AS WELL AS ALL
- 15 OF MY COLLEAGUES FOR THEIR COMMITMENT TO THIS CHANGE. LOS
- 16 ANGELES COUNTY IS IN SUPERVISOR HAHN'S BLOOD, HOWEVER, AND WE
- 17 KNOW THAT. WE OWE A GREAT DEBT TO THE SUPERVISORS WHO CAME
- 18 BEFORE AND WHO HELPED SHAPE OUR PROCESS AND POLICY TO GET US
- 19 TO THIS POINT. AND IF YOU'RE READY FOR CHANGE, I ASK FOR AN
- 20 AYE VOTE. WITH THAT, I HAVE A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS FOR OUR
- 21 GUESTS WHO JOIN US TODAY AND THANK YOU FOR BEING HERE JUST TO
- 22 PROVIDE A LITTLE BIT MORE CONTEXT. QUESTIONS HAVE BEEN ASKED
- 23 ABOUT CHOOSING 9 SUPERVISORS. IS THERE ANYTHING IN YOUR
- 24 RESEARCH THAT DEMONSTRATES AN IDEAL NUMBER?



- 1 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: WE HAVE STUDIED THIS NOT ONLY FOR THE
- 2 COUNTY, BUT FOR THE CITY, AND THERE IS NO RESEARCH THAT
- 3 INDICATES ONE NUMBER IS BETTER THAN THE OTHER. IT'S ALL
- 4 SITUATIONAL, MEANING THAT THE NUMBER SHOULD BE APPROPRIATE TO
- 5 THAT TIME AND THAT PLACE. AND SO, IF YOU WERE TO ASK ME WHAT
- 6 IS THE IDEAL NUMBER, I HAVE AN OPINION, BUT I DON'T HAVE THE
- 7 RESEARCH TO BACK THAT UP. SARAH?

- 9 DR. SARA SADHWANI: YEAH, I'LL ONLY ADD THAT, AND I COMPLETELY
- 10 AGREE WITH FERNANDO ON THIS, THE COUNTY ALREADY HAS AN
- 11 INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING COMMISSION, A PROCESS THAT IS FAIR
- 12 AND OPEN THAT COMMUNITY PARTNERS CAN ENGAGE IN. I KNOW ABOUT
- 13 THAT PROCESS VERY WELL. I SERVED ON THE STATE'S INDEPENDENT
- 14 REDISTRICTING COMMISSION. SO, WHEN IT COMES TO QUESTIONS OF
- 15 REPRESENTATION, I HAVE NO DOUBT THAT COMMUNITIES, HAVING SEEN
- 16 THE PROCESS UNFOLD AT THE STATE LEVEL, I HAVE NO DOUBT THE
- 17 COMMUNITIES WILL BE INCREDIBLY ENGAGED TO ENSURE THAT THOSE
- 18 DISTRICTS ARE DRAWN IN A FAIR WAY THAT LEADS TO
- 19 REPRESENTATIONAL OUTCOMES. LOS ANGELES COUNTY, OF COURSE, HAS
- 20 NEARLY 10,000,000 PEOPLE AND IS INCREDIBLY DIVERSE. AT THE
- 21 STATE LEVEL, IT WAS ONE OF THE MOST DIFFICULT PLACES TO REDRAW
- 22 THE LINES FOR OUR STATE LEGISLATURE AND FOR CONGRESS, AND NO
- 23 DOUBT, WHETHER IT'S 9 SEATS, 11 SEATS, OR 25 SEATS FOR A BOARD
- 24 OF SUPERVISORS, THERE WILL BE DIFFICULTIES THERE TOO. BUT IT
- 25 WILL BE A FAIR AND OPEN PROCESS THAT COMMUNITIES CAN ENGAGE IN



1 IN ORDER TO SEEK THE REPRESENTATION THAT THEY DESIRE.

- 3 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND IS THERE ANYTHING IN YOUR
- 4 RESEARCH THAT SHOWS THE MOST EFFECTIVE WAY TO ENSURE CHECKS
- 5 AND BALANCES IN LA COUNTY GOVERNMENT?

6

- 7 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: ALMOST EVERY SINGLE MAJOR POLITICAL
- 8 JURISDICTION HAS AN EXECUTIVE. I'LL EVEN GO THIS FAR. I KNOW
- 9 OF NO JURISDICTION WITH 10,000,000 PEOPLE OR MORE IN THE
- 10 ENTIRE WORLD THAT DOESN'T HAVE AN EXECUTIVE. THE COUNTY, AN
- 11 ELECTED EXECUTIVE, CORRECT, AN ELECTED EXECUTIVE, THE COUNTY
- 12 OF LA IS UNIOUE IN THAT REGARD.

13

- 14 DR. SARA SADHWANI: AND I'LL ONLY ADD THAT HAVING BOTH AN
- 15 EXECUTIVE AND LEGISLATIVE BRANCH IS FUNDAMENTAL TO AMERICAN
- 16 STYLE DEMOCRACY. IT CREATES SOME LEVEL OF TENSION BETWEEN THE
- 17 BRANCHES OF GOVERNMENT. THAT'S ACTUALLY A GOOD THING. THAT'S
- 18 NOT NECESSARILY A POLARIZED PIECE, BUT INSTEAD SOME LEVEL OF
- 19 TENSION OVER BUDGETARY DECISIONS, FOR EXAMPLE. WE SEE THAT AT
- 20 THE CITY LEVEL WHEN THE MAYOR PUTS OUT A PROPOSED BUDGET, THE
- 21 COUNCIL THEN REVIEWS IT WITH A FINE TOOTH COMB AND MAKES
- 22 RECOMMENDATIONS AND CHANGES. HAVING SOME LEVEL OF TENSION
- 23 BETWEEN AN EXECUTIVE BRANCH AND A LEGISLATIVE BRANCH IS A VERY
- 24 HEALTHY THING FOR DEMOCRACY.



- 1 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND THIS PROCESS IS INTENDED TO
- 2 ALIGN WITH THE CENSUS REDISTRICTING TIMELINE THAT YOU HAD
- 3 REFERENCED. HOW DO YOU SEE AN EXPANDED BOARD IMPACTING
- 4 COMMUNITY-BASED REPRESENTATION?

- 6 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: I MEAN, IT'S SIMPLE MATH. THE MORE SEATS
- 7 YOU HAVE, THE MORE REPRESENTATIVE. AND NOT ONLY DESCRIPTIVE
- 8 REPRESENTATION, BUT ALSO GEOGRAPHIC REPRESENTATION. AND SO
- 9 THAT THERE WILL BE MORE INTEREST AND MORE VOICES AT THE TABLE
- 10 JUST BY DEFINITION. AND SO YOU'RE GOING TO SEE GREATER
- 11 REPRESENTATION NO MATTER HOW YOU MEASURE THAT.

- 13 DR. SARA SADHWANI: AND LOS ANGELES IS A UNIQUE PLACE WHERE WE
- 14 HAVE A VERY ROBUST ARRAY OF ADVOCATES WHO GET INVOLVED IN
- 15 OUESTIONS OF REPRESENTATION AND I THINK THE SKILL LEVEL OF
- 16 UNDERSTANDING REDISTRICTING PROCESSES HAS INCREASED
- 17 EXPONENTIALLY SINCE THE CREATION OF AN INDEPENDENT
- 18 REDISTRICTING COMMISSION. REMEMBER, BACK IN 2008, WHEN THE
- 19 STATE ENGAGED IN THE PROCESS TO CREATE AN INDEPENDENT
- 20 REDISTRICTING COMMISSION, MANY COMMUNITIES OF COLOR, I KNOW
- 21 BECAUSE I WAS WORKING IN SOME OF THOSE ORGANIZATIONS AT THE
- 22 TIME, OPPOSED THE CREATION OF THIS FORM OF INDEPENDENT
- 23 REDISTRICTING. BUT OVER TIME WHAT WE FOUND IS ACTUALLY MANY
- 24 COMMUNITIES OF COLOR, COMMUNITIES WHOSE VOICES ARE OFTEN
- 25 UNHEARD, ACTUALLY BENEFIT FROM INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING. THEY



- 1 CAN IDENTIFY THEMSELVES AS COMMUNITIES OF INTEREST THAT CAN BE
- 2 KEPT TOGETHER SO THAT THEY HAVE GREATER ELECTORAL POWER WITHIN
- 3 A DISTRICT. SO ON BALANCE, THIS CAN BE A VERY POSITIVE THING
- 4 WITH THE UNDERSTANDING THAT COMMUNITIES WOULD BE INVOLVED.

- 6 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: YEAH, INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING AS A
- 7 REFORM AT THE STATE LEGISLATIVE AND CONGRESSIONAL LEVEL
- 8 ACTUALLY INCREASED DESCRIPTIVE REPRESENTATION, INCREASED
- 9 REPRESENTATION IN TERMS OF GENDER IN EVERY MEASURE. MANY
- 10 FEARED THAT IT WOULD ACTUALLY DECREASE IT IN CERTAIN AREAS. IT
- 11 ACTUALLY DID NOT. AND SO, YOU SAW THAT REPRESENTATION
- 12 INCREASE.

13

- 14 DR. SARA SADHWANI: YES. THE STATE'S COMMISSION WAS VERY PROUD
- 15 TO VOTE UNANIMOUSLY ON A BOARD OF 14, BOTH DEMOCRATS,
- 16 REPUBLICANS, AND INDEPENDENTS, ON MAPS THAT EXPONENTIALLY
- 17 INCREASED REPRESENTATION FOR LATINOS, MAINTAINED
- 18 REPRESENTATION FOR BLACK AND ASIAN AMERICAN COMMUNITIES AND
- 19 KEPT TOGETHER LGBTQ COMMUNITIES OF INTEREST. AND WE HAD NOT A
- 20 SINGLE LAWSUIT AGAINST US. TELL ME HOW MANY STATES CAN SAY
- 21 THAT.

- 23 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND MY LAST QUESTION, EFFORTS
- 24 HAVE BEEN MADE OVER THE LAST 50 YEARS TO DO THIS. WE SAW
- 25 EVIDENCE OF THAT TO START THE CONVERSATION TODAY. AND I KNOW



- 1 MANY OF US FEEL THE SENSE OF URGENCY RIGHT NOW, BUT IS THERE
- 2 ANY ADVANTAGE TO US WAITING ANOTHER 2 YEARS, SOME OTHER PERIOD
- 3 OF TIME? IS THERE AN ADVANTAGE TO WAITING?

- 5 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: WELL, I MEAN, THE ONLY THING I WOULD
- 6 DISAGREE WITH SUPERVISOR KENNETH HAHN IS THAT ONE SHOULD
- 7 STUDY, STUDY, STUDY. THAT'S WHAT I ALWAYS TELL MY STUDENTS,
- 8 NUMBER ONE. BUT THERE IS A TIME WHEN YOU COME UP TO TAKE THE
- 9 TEST WHERE YOU HAVE TO STOP STUDYING AND IMPLEMENT IT AND THIS
- 10 I THINK IS THE TEST AND THIS IS THE TIME. IF THIS MEASURE WERE
- 11 TO PASS NOTHING WOULD PREVENT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OR ANY
- 12 COMMUNITY TO CONTINUE TO EXAMINE REFORM GIVEN WHAT YOU ARE
- 13 PROPOSING TO THEN IN ADDITION IF THERE WAS A NEED TO CONTINUE
- 14 AND PUT SOMETHING ELSE ON THE BALLOT IN 26 OR 28 TO FURTHER
- 15 TWEAK OR ADD TO THIS REFORM. SO I DON'T THINK OF THIS AS THE
- 16 END OF THAT LONG GROUP OF STUDIES THAT FORMER SUPERVISOR HAHN
- 17 MENTIONED, BUT THE BEGINNING OF A NEW ERA OF REFORM.

- 19 DR. SARA SADHWANI: SOUNDS LIKE FERNANDO IS GOING TO BE DOING
- 20 THOSE STUDIES. I'LL ONLY ADD 2024, THIS BALLOT, PARTICULARLY
- 21 WITHIN THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, IS ALREADY THE GOVERNANCE
- 22 REFORM BALLOT THAT VOTERS WILL HAVE. AND HOW INCREDIBLE TO BE
- 23 ABLE TO EXTEND THAT OPPORTUNITY TO THE REST OF LOS ANGELES
- 24 VOTERS COUNTYWIDE. WE HAVE SEEN, AND BOTH FERNANDO AND I
- 25 WORKED ON MANY OF THE STUDIES FOR THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES AND



- 1 THE REFORMS THAT ARE MOVING FORWARD THERE. AND WE HAVE SEEN IN
- 2 POLLING DATA THAT THERE IS A HUNGER FOR REFORM. TRUST IN
- 3 GOVERNMENT, BOTH HERE IN LOS ANGELES AS WELL AS NATIONWIDE IS
- 4 LOW AND THESE ARE OPPORTUNITIES FOR US TO INCREASE
- 5 PARTICIPATION AND INCREASE TRUST IN OUR GOVERNING STRUCTURES
- 6 FOR THE LONG TERM.

- 8 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: LET ME JUST ADD TO THAT IN TERMS OF
- 9 POLLING. WHEN WE POLL AND AT LOYOLA MARYMOUNT UNIVERSITY WE
- 10 CONDUCT THE LARGEST ANNUAL SURVEY OF LA COUNTY, IT'S ACTUALLY
- 11 THE LARGEST ANNUAL SURVEY IN URBAN AMERICA, AND THE TRUST IN
- 12 GOVERNMENT HAS DECLINED, BUT THE TRUST IN GOVERNMENT
- 13 EMPLOYEES, WHETHER IT'S POLICE OFFICERS OR TEACHERS OR WHAT
- 14 HAVE YOU, HAS NOT DECLINED. THE TRUST IN ACTUAL INDIVIDUAL
- 15 ELECTED OFFICIALS HAS NOT DECLINED. SO, IF YOU THINK ABOUT THE
- 16 FACT THAT THE TYPICAL RESIDENT OR VOTER STILL TRUSTS ELECTED
- 17 OFFICIALS, STILL TRUSTS PUBLIC EMPLOYEES, BUT THEY DON'T TRUST
- 18 THE SYSTEM, IT'S REALLY THE STRUCTURE THAT THEY'RE SAYING THEY
- 19 DON'T TRUST IN TERMS OF OUTCOMES. AND IN FACT, THIS IS AN
- 20 EXTRAPOLATION, BUT CAN FEEL THAT IT IS THE STRUCTURE THAT'S
- 21 HOLDING BACK THE EMPLOYEES OF LA COUNTY AND THE ELECTED
- 22 OFFICIALS OF LA COUNTY FROM DOING WHAT THEY THINK SHOULD BE
- 23 THE RIGHT THING TO DO.

- 3 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU SO MUCH MADAM CHAIR AND TO YOU AND
- 4 SUPERVISOR HAHN. I WANT TO CONGRATULATE YOU FOR TAKING ON THIS
- 5 VERY BOLD PROPOSITION THAT WE HAVE BEFORE US AND I WANT TO
- 6 THANK OUR PANELISTS. I KNOW THAT YOU COME WELL QUALIFIED WITH
- 7 GOOD INFORMATION AND I KNOW THAT YOU'RE GOING TO BE VERY, VERY
- 8 HELPFUL AS WE MOVE FORWARD TODAY, I HOPE. I TOO AM VERY
- 9 CONCERNED ABOUT EXPANSION OF THE BOARD IN TERMS OF WANTING TO
- 10 SEE IT HAPPEN. AND IN FACT, NOT TOO LONG AGO, SUPERVISOR HAHN
- 11 AND I CARRIED A MOTION TO DO EXACTLY THAT. IT DIDN'T GO
- 12 ANYWHERE. SO, I DO THINK THAT THIS APPROACH THAT'S PRESENTED
- 13 TODAY IS A PACKAGE OF DIFFERENT REFORMS AND IDEAS THAT HAVE
- 14 BEEN ARTICULATED AS LONG AS I HAVE BEEN ON THE BOARD. AND EVEN
- 15 BEFORE THAT, AND MY PREDECESSOR, GLORIA MOLINA, FOUGHT VERY
- 16 HARD FOR HER OWN REPRESENTATION AND THEN TO TRY UNSUCCESSFULLY
- 17 TO EXPAND THE BOARD. DIDN'T HAPPEN. I'VE ALWAYS BEEN OF THE
- 18 OPINION THAT WE DO NEED TO HAVE MORE REPRESENTATION. IN FACT,
- 19 WORKED VERY HARD ALONGSIDE SOME OF MY COLLEAGUES WHEN I WAS
- 20 SERVING ON THE RIO HONDO COLLEGE BOARD TO BREAK UP THE
- 21 DISTRICT-WIDE ELECTION SO THAT WE COULD HAVE INDIVIDUAL WARD
- 22 SYSTEMS. AND THAT WAS VOLCANIC BECAUSE IT WAS AN ERUPTION
- 23 BECAUSE PEOPLE JUST DID NOT WANT TO UNDERSTAND THAT IT WASN'T
- 24 SO MUCH TAKING AWAY POWER IT WAS DISTRIBUTING IT MORE
- 25 EQUITABLY AND APPROPRIATELY TO THOSE INDIVIDUALS THAT WERE



- 1 IMPACTED WHETHER THEY WERE IN AT THAT TIME WHITTIER, SOUTH EL
- 2 MONTE, EL MONTE, PICO RIVERA AND OTHER PARTS OF THAT THAT
- 3 DISTRICT BUT WHEN I LOOK AT WHAT'S HAPPENING HERE, AND WHEN I
- 4 JOINED THE BOARD, 10,000,000 PEOPLE IS A HARD NUMBER TO REALLY
- 5 PUT YOUR HANDS AROUND FOR ANY ONE OF US, INCLUDING OUR CEO AND
- 6 I KNOW OUR DEPARTMENT HEADS. AND IT HAS BEEN A CHALLENGE HERE.
- 7 AND I STRONGLY BELIEVE THAT IN THE TIME THAT I'VE BEEN HERE
- 8 NOW, I BELIEVE I'M THE OLDEST MEMBER SERVING, NOT IN TERMS OF
- 9 AGE, BUT IN TERMS OF BEING HERE ON THE BOARD 9 1/2 YEARS JUST
- 10 KNOWING THAT WE HAVE TRIED TO GRAPPLE WITH SO MANY ISSUES AND
- 11 IT'S HARD IT CAN BE CUMBERSOME AND WE ALWAYS GET CRITICIZED
- 12 FOR WORKING TOO SLOWLY, NOT BEING ABLE TO REACT FAST AND
- 13 FURIOUS IN SOME TIMES TO ADDRESS THOSE DISASTERS THAT HAPPEN.
- 14 WE LEARNED A GREAT DEAL DURING COVID THAT WE NEED AND SAW THAT
- 15 THERE WERE MANY GAPS IN OUR SERVICES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY.
- 16 AND IT WASN'T SO MUCH THAT, AS YOU SAY, EMPLOYEES, YOU KNOW,
- 17 THAT WERE NOT UP TO SPEED OR WANTING TO DO THEIR JOB. IT WAS
- 18 OUR STRUCTURE. AND MANY TIMES, I KNOW I HAVE BEEN ONE OF THOSE
- 19 PEOPLE THAT WILL ASK OUR DEPARTMENT HEADS OR OUR CEO, WHY ARE
- 20 WE NOT DOING X, Y, AND Z? THIS ISSUE IS COMING UP AND IT TAKES
- 21 TIME TO GET THAT INTO A MOTION AND THEY COULD GET THE SUPPORT
- 22 OF THE BOARD AND THEN KIND OF GO THROUGH ALL THAT MASSAGING
- 23 THAT HAPPENS IT'S MUCH BETTER IN MY OPINION TO BE ABLE TO HAVE
- 24 MORE VOICES AT THE TABLE THAT ACTUALLY CAN SEE AND UNDERSTAND
- 25 BECAUSE THEY ARE GROUNDED IN THEIR COMMUNITY AND CAN SPEAK TO



- 1 THOSE THINGS THAT ARE HAPPENING ASIDE FROM JUST 5 MEMBERS OF
- 2 THE BOARD. AND I DO BELIEVE THAT IT IS TIME AND PERHAPS THIS
- 3 IS WHERE WE HAVE TO BITE THE BULLET AND REALLY SAY THAT THIS
- 4 IS WHAT WE NEED. WE NEED TRANSPARENCY, WE NEED ACCOUNTABILITY,
- 5 WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT WE HAVE APPROPRIATE OVERSIGHT, AND
- 6 WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT AS WE MOVE THROUGH THIS PROCESS,
- 7 IT'S FLUID, AS YOU SAID. IT CAN CHANGE IN 2 YEARS, AND OUR
- 8 BOARD IN 2 YEARS CAN SAY, YOU KNOW WHAT, WE'VE GOTTA TWEAK IT,
- 9 OR IT NEEDS TO LOOK LIKE THIS NOW. AND I'M OPEN TO THAT AS
- 10 WELL BECAUSE NOTHING IS SET IN CEMENT. AND I REALLY ALSO WANT
- 11 TO SAY THAT IT'S VERY IMPORTANT THAT WE PAY DIGNITY AND
- 12 RESPECT TO THE PEOPLE WHO WORK FOR THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES.
- 13 AND I THINK THAT WAS PROVEN TO ME TIME AND TIME AGAIN, EVEN
- 14 BEFORE THE PANDEMIC, DURING THE PANDEMIC AND NOW AFTER THE
- 15 PANDEMIC. AND I THINK THAT THEY ALSO DESERVE TO HAVE A SEAT IN
- 16 THESE DISCUSSIONS AND AT THE TABLE. AND I KNOW THAT IT MAY NOT
- 17 BE CALLED OUT DIRECTLY IN THIS MOTION THAT'S BEFORE US, BUT I
- 18 DO HAVE AN AMENDMENT THAT I WOULD LIKE TO, I WOULD ASK THAT
- 19 OUR CHAIR AND HER CO-AUTHOR COULD ACCEPT. AND I BELIEVE IT IS
- 20 A FRIENDLY AMENDMENT BECAUSE AS YOU SAID, MADAM CHAIR, IT IS
- 21 OUR WORKFORCE. IT IS OUR PEOPLE THAT WE EMPLOY. SO, I WOULD
- 22 LIKE TO OFFER THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENT AND I WOULD ASK THAT YOU
- 23 CONSIDER IT. FOR DIRECTIVE 10, I WOULD LIKE TO READ THE FIRST
- 24 SENTENCE AND IT WOULD READ AS FOLLOWS. TO ESTABLISH A
- 25 GOVERNMENT REFORM TASK FORCE INCLUDING REPRESENTATION FROM THE



- 1 COUNTY WORKFORCE AND REPORTING TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
- 2 RESPONSIBLE FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF THIS CHARTER AMENDMENT UPON
- 3 ADOPTION BY THE VOTERS, INCLUDING ROBUST COMMUNITY AND
- 4 STAKEHOLDER OUTREACH. I HOPE THAT THIS WILL CONFORM WITH THE

- 8 THINK I'M...

- 10 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: I'M HAPPY TO ACCEPT IT, AND MY
- 11 CO-AUTHOR WILL AS WELL.

- 13 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND I WOULD JUST CONCLUDE BY SAYING THAT LET
- 14 OUR FUTURE BE ONE THAT TAKES US TO A HIGHER PLACE FOR ALL THE
- 15 10,000,000 PEOPLE AND THE DIVERSITY THAT IS THIRSTY FOR THAT
- 16 LEADERSHIP TO BE REFLECTED ON THIS BOARD AND TO ALSO SEE THAT
- 17 THERE IS MORE TRANSPARENCY IN TERMS OF DELIBERATIONS BUDGET
- 18 AND ALSO HOW WE PRIORITIZE AND ALSO MAKE TRANSPARENT ALL THE

- 3 TICKLED TO HAVE SEEN THE VIDEO, THE ARCHIVAL FOOTAGE, OF THE
- 4 GRANDFATHER OF THE SECOND SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT. AND AS I
- 5 LISTENED TO HIM, I THOUGHT, GEE, THAT SUPERVISOR OF THE SECOND
- 6 DISTRICT MIGHT HAVE INDEED SUPPORTED THE CURRENT DAY SECOND
- 7 DISTRICT SUPERVISOR'S INITIAL MOTION, FRANKLY, ON REFORM THAT
- 8 DIDN'T GET PASSED OUT OF THIS BODY. AND THE SECOND ONE THAT
- 9 DID BROUGHT INTO, AT THE REQUEST OF SITTING BOARD MEMBERS, THE

- 15 OUESTION. AS WE HEARD FROM THE DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR, HE HAS
- 16 AN OPINION ABOUT A NUMBER BUT WE DIDN'T HEAR IT, BUT AS WE
- 17 HEARD SUPERVISOR HAHN, IF 9 WAS THE APPROPRIATE NUMBER THEY
- 18 THOUGHT IN 1972 WITH HALF OUR CURRENT POPULATION, I'M NOT SURE
- 19 IF IT MAKES SENSE THAT 9 IS STILL OUR APPROPRIATE NUMBER IN
- 20 2024. AND THEREIN FOR ME LIES THE QUESTIONS THAT I WILL REALLY
- 21 BE ELEVATING TODAY. YOU KNOW, THE DICHOTOMY OF THE RALPH M.
- 22 BROWN ACT IS NOT LOST ON ME IN TODAY'S CONVERSATION. YOU KNOW,
- 23 THERE'S AN ELEMENT OF THE ACT THAT I THINK THE PUBLIC AND WE
- 24 ALL FOCUS ON THAT REALLY FOCUSES ON KIND OF SERIAL
- 25 COMMUNICATIONS. A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS OF A LEGISLATIVE



- 1 BODY SHALL NOT, OUTSIDE A MEETING AUTHORIZED BY THIS CHAPTER,
- 2 CHAPTER OF THE ACT, USE A SERIES OF COMMUNICATIONS OF ANY
- 3 KIND, DIRECTLY OR THROUGH INTERMEDIARIES TO COMMUNICATE,
- 4 UNLESS THE MEETING IS AGENDIZED. AND THE CHALLENGE WITH THAT
- 5 IS, THE MAJORITY OF THE BOARD IS NOT ABLE TO BE INFORMED ABOUT

- 2 WERE ADVISED TO NOT GO THROUGH THE TYPICAL RFP PROCESS BUT GO
- 3 THROUGH A SHORTER TIMEFRAME CALLED A REQUEST FOR STATEMENT OF
- 4 INTEREST. THAT'S WHAT WE DID. THERE WERE A SERIES OF
- 5 UNFORTUNATE, I THINK, MISHAPS. ATTEMPTED TO WORK THROUGH THE
- 6 EXECUTIVE OFFICE. I WANNA THANK THE STAFF FROM ALL OF THE
- 7 SUPERVISORIAL OFFICES FOR THE TIME THEY SPENT IN GOING THROUGH
- 8 THE PROCESS OF THE REQUEST FOR STATEMENT OF INTEREST. WE ARE
- 9 ACKNOWLEDGING THE WORK OF COUNTY EMPLOYEES. I WANT TO
- 10 ACKNOWLEDGE THE WORK OF OUR CHIEFS OF STAFF AND ADDITIONAL
- 11 STAFF WHO WENT THROUGH THIS PROCESS GOING BACK TO MARCH OF
- 12 2023 WHEN THE ORIGINAL STATEMENT OF WORK WAS CREATED AND
- 13 PUBLICLY POSTED FOR BID. WE WENT THROUGH IT. THERE WERE
- 14 QUESTIONS AS TO HOW THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE NOTIFIED THE PERSON
- 15 THAT RECEIVED THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF POINTS. THERE WERE
- 16 QUESTIONS ABOUT HOW THE POINTS WERE CALCULATED, THERE WERE
- 17 OUESTIONS THROUGH THIS COUNTY PROCESS. IHR AND A I BELIEVE HAD
- 18 LMU PROFESSORS A PART OF THERE. WERE YOU A PART OF THE OF THE
- 19 BID TO --

- 21 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: YES, WE WERE A SUBCONTRACTOR WE WERE
- 22 GOING TO DO A SURVEY

- 24 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: YES, EXACTLY. SO I JUST WANT TO
- 25 CLARIFY AS PEOPLE SAID IT'S TAKING TOO LONG I COULDN'T AGREE



- 1 MORE IT WAS THE CONTRACTING PROCESS THAT WAS RECOMMENDED TO US
- 2 THAT AS WE TALK ABOUT COUNTY PROCESSES THAT CAN BE VERY
- 3 BUREAUCRATIC I LEARNED A GREAT DEAL THERE WERE SOME MISSTEPS
- 4 AND I WE'VE BEEN IN COMMUNICATION WITH THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE
- 5 ABOUT HOW WE HOPE IN FUTURE CONTRACTING PROCESSES THAT THEY
- 6 COULD BE CORRECTED. IN THEORY EXPANDING THE BOARD ALLOWS
- 7 SUPERVISORS TO BE MORE RESPONSIVE TO OUR DIVERSE COMMUNITIES
- 8 NEEDS WITH DISTRICTS OF 2,000,000 PEOPLE WITH A WIDE RANGE OF
- 9 GEOGRAPHIES INFRASTRUCTURES AND DEMOGRAPHICS SERVICE DELIVERY
- 10 CAN BE CHALLENGING ESPECIALLY FOR THOSE OF US WHO REPRESENT
- 11 LARGE UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES. HOWEVER, IN THE PREAMBLE TO
- 12 THE MOTION BEFORE US, WE SEE A WIDE RANGE OF EXAMPLES
- 13 PRESENTED OF THE NUMBER OF REPRESENTATIVES RELATIVE TO
- 14 POPULATION SIZES FOR COUNTIES ACROSS THE COUNTY, BUT AGAIN I'M

- 17 RECOMMENDATION ON THE NUMBER OF REPRESENTATIVES FOR OUR 10
- 18 PLUS MILLION POPULATION. AGAIN, THE PROCESS WE WERE ENGAGING
- 19 IN WAS FOR THE BOARD TO TAKE THE DATA-DRIVEN RECOMMENDATIONS
- 20 AND MAKE A DECISION ABOUT WHAT WE THOUGHT WE SHOULD BRING TO
- 21 THE TABLE. AND AGAIN, WHILE I BELIEVE THAT EXPANDING THE BOARD
- 22 IS PART OF THE SOLUTION I DON'T BELIEVE THAT EXPANSION ALONE
- 23 WILL SOLVE SOME OF THE GREATEST CHALLENGES WITH LA COUNTY'S
- 24 GOVERNANCE. IN FACT CHANGING OUR STRUCTURE WITHOUT EVOLVING
- 25 HOW WE DO BUSINESS COULD LEAD TO GREATER FRAGMENTATION



- 1 INTERNALLY AND GREATER CONFUSION EXTERNALLY ABOUT HOW
- 2 CONSTITUENTS CAN ENGAGE IN THE COUNTY'S POLICY AND BUDGET
- 3 DEVELOPMENT PROCESSES. EXPANSION MUST BE CONSIDERED ALONGSIDE
- 4 OTHER REFORMS THAT COULD CREATE MORE INCLUSIVE AND TRULY
- 5 TRANSPARENT COUNTY PROCESSES. THAT'S WHY IN THE PAST WE'VE
- 6 WORKED TO ADVANCE A BROAD HOLISTIC REVIEW OF THE BOARD'S
- 7 GOVERNANCE MODEL, ANALYZE BEST PRACTICES AND IDENTIFY
- 8 POTENTIAL IMPROVEMENTS INCLUDING HOW OUR BOARD VETS POLICY
- 9 PROPOSALS AND ITS IMPACT ON THE COUNTY BUDGET. ORGANIZATIONS
- 10 WE WORK WITH HAVE COMMENTED ON THE LACK OF TRANSPARENCY AROUND
- 11 THE COUNTY'S POLICY DEVELOPMENT PROCESS AND THE LACK OF
- 12 OPPORTUNITY FOR THEM TO SEE IT AND ENGAGE IN IT. OTHER GROUPS
- 13 HAVE SHARED THAT IT'S VERY DIFFICULT TO THOUGHTFULLY WEIGH IN
- 14 ON A MOTION WHEN SOME MOTIONS ARE PUBLISHED ON A FRIDAY
- 15 THROUGH OUR FRIDAY GREEN SHEETS, LEAVING THEM ONLY THE WEEKEND
- 16 AND MONDAY TO REVIEW THEM. THE POTENTIAL REFORMS PRESENTED
- 17 TODAY WILL NOT ACHIEVE THE GOAL OF ADVANCING FULL TRANSPARENCY
- 18 AND MORE EOUITABLE OUTCOMES FOR OUR CONSTITUENTS WITHOUT
- 19 REFORMS TO HOW THE BOARD AND PUBLIC REVIEWS AND ANALYZES
- 20 POLICY. SO AGAIN THE MOTION BEFORE US HAS LOTS OF REALLY
- 21 IMPORTANT ELEMENTS BUT IT'S A SUBSET OF ACTIONS I THINK TO
- 22 TAKE THAT WOULD BRING US TO A POINT OF TRUE FULL GOVERNANCE
- 23 POSSIBILITIES. AND THERE ARE THINGS THAT THIS BOARD COULD DO
- 24 THAT REALLY DON'T REQUIRE CHARTER CHANGE. I'LL GIVE YOU A
- 25 COUPLE OF EXAMPLES. WHEN I JOINED THE BOARD IN 2020, IT WAS



- 1 DURING COVID, CHALLENGING TIME TO ONBOARD TO A NEW JOB WHEN
- 2 YOU'RE MEETING REMOTELY. AND SO, I ASK A COUPLE OF REALLY
- 3 BASIC QUESTIONS. HAVING COME FROM AN ELECTED BODY THAT HAS A
- 4 FULL TRAINING AND ONBOARDING PROCESS, THAT'S WHAT I EXPECTED
- 5 HERE. I GOT THE BIG BINDER THAT EVERY COUNTY EMPLOYEE GETS. SO
- 6 I WAS ONBOARDED INTO HOW TO BE A COUNTY EMPLOYEE, BUT THERE
- 7 WAS NO ONBOARDING PROCESS ABOUT OUR GOVERNANCE, WHICH LED ME
- 8 TO ASK MORE QUESTIONS. I ASKED FOR THE RULES OF THE HOUSE.
- 9 CONGRESS ADOPTS THEIR RULES OF THE HOUSE AT THE BEGINNING OF
- 10 EVERY CONGRESSIONAL SESSION, AS DOES THE LEGISLATURE. IT TOOK
- 11 A SURPRISINGLY LONG AMOUNT OF TIME FOR SOMEONE TO FIND THE
- 12 RULES OF THE HOUSE TO SHARE WITH ME. I REALIZED AS I WAS
- 13 HANDED A SHEET OF PAPER, I WAS TOLD, WELL, WE DON'T DO THAT
- 14 ANYMORE. THIS HAS CHANGED, THAT HAS CHANGED, BLAH, BLAH, BLAH,
- 15 BLAH. SO, OKAY, WELL, MAYBE IT'S BECAUSE OF COVID. I ALSO WAS
- 16 SURPRISED TO SEE IT'S NOT A DOCUMENT THAT THIS BODY REVIEWS
- 17 AND UPDATES ON AN ANNUAL BASIS. SECONDLY, BY MY SECOND YEAR I
- 18 WAS ELECTED CHAIR BECAUSE OF OUR ROTATING SCHEDULE. I WAS
- 19 ASKED, WELL, WHAT ARE THE DUTIES OF THE CHAIR? THERE WAS NO
- 20 LIST. I TRIED TO CREATE ONE AS I WAS CHAIR. THE FINAL QUESTION
- 21 I ASKED THAT DEALS I THINK WITH IF WE'RE GOING TO TALK ABOUT
- 22 TRANSPARENCY AUTHENTICALLY WAS THIS NOTION OF DELEGATED
- 23 AUTHORITY. THIS MOTION TALKS ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF AN
- 24 ELECTED CEO. OF COURSE DURING COVID AND FOR WHATEVER REASONS
- 25 THE SUBSET OF THE CURRENT COMPOSITION OF THE BOARD AND PAST



- 1 BOARDS OFFERED DELEGATED AUTHORITY TO THE CEO. WHEN I WAS IN
- 2 THE LEGISLATURE DURING COVID, WE DID THE SAME THING TO THE
- 3 GOVERNOR. HOWEVER, WE MAINTAINED A LIST, AND ONCE WE CAME OUT
- 4 OF COVID, WE REVERSED THOSE DECISIONS. I COULD NEVER GET A
- 5 LIST OF ALL OF THE DELEGATED AUTHORITY DECISIONS THE BOARD HAD
- 6 GIVEN TO THE CEO SO AS A NEW BOARD MEMBER TO GET A SENSE OF
- 7 WHAT WAS IN MY PURVIEW WAS A BOARD MEMBER WHAT WAS IN
- 8 APPROPRIATE TO EXPECT OF THE CEO HOW WE WERE APPROPRIATELY
- 9 OVERSEEING THAT ARE MANAGING THAT? DIDN'T EXIST AND WHEN I
- 10 THINK ABOUT IT AS A VOTING MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC AND WHEN I
- 11 THINK ABOUT A \$47,000,000,000 BUDGET AND ACTUALLY WHO'S IN
- 12 CHARGE, 5 MEMBERS, 9 MEMBERS, MY SUPERVISOR, A CEO ELECTED OR
- 13 APPOINTED. SOME OF THESE CORE ELEMENTS ARE CRITICALLY MISSING
- 14 FROM THE WAY WE DO BUSINESS TODAY AND ARE NOT REFLECTED IN THE
- 15 DRAFT LANGUAGE AS WE GO FORWARD. SO AGAIN, I THINK IF WE'RE
- 16 GOING TO TALK ABOUT TRUE TRANSPARENCY, WHICH IS WHAT THE
- 17 PUBLIC DEMANDS AND EXPECTS OF US, I THINK THERE ARE A NUMBER
- 18 OF ACTIONS WE COULD TAKE THAT WE DON'T HAVE TO WAIT UNTIL 2032
- 19 TO MANIFEST THAT WE AS A BOARD COULD LEAN IN IN TERMS OF OUR
- 20 INTERNAL BUDGETING PROCESS AND RECLAIM FRANKLY OUR POWER AS A
- 21 BOARD. EFFECTIVE LOCAL GOVERNMENT DEPENDS ON A BALANCE OF THE
- 22 POWERS OF POLICY MAKING AND POLICY IMPLEMENTATION AND WITH AN
- 23 ELECTED CEO AGAIN I HAVE OUESTIONS I'M NOT SURE HOW THE
- 24 SPECIFIC NEEDS OF OUR UNIQUE CONSTITUENTS CONSTITUENCIES WILL
- 25 BE APPROPRIATELY ELEVATED IT'S UNCLEAR THAT THE BOARD WOULD BE



- 1 ABLE TO DIRECT THE CEO TO ALLOCATE RESOURCES, IMPLEMENT
- 2 PROGRAMS, OR RETURN TO THE BOARD WITH OPTIONS FOR FUNDING
- 3 BOARD PRIORITY PROGRAMS. I DO FIRMLY BELIEVE THAT TRANSPARENCY
- 4 WITH RESPECT TO HOW THE COUNTY'S BUDGET IS DEVELOPED IN
- 5 COORDINATION WITH OUR CONSTITUENTS MUST BE A PRIORITY AS
- 6 REFLECTIVE OF MOTIONS I'VE BROUGHT FORWARD THAT SOME HAVE BEEN
- 7 SUCCESSFUL, SOME NOT, IN TERMS OF WHAT ROLE WE MUST PLAY IN
- 8 THE BUDGET DEVELOPMENT AND PRIORITIZATION PROCESS. ALTHOUGH
- 9 THE AUTHORS OF THE MOTION CONTEND THAT THIS ISSUE HAS ALREADY
- 10 BEEN STUDIED, NO SUCH INDEPENDENT DATA-INFORMED ANALYSIS HAS

- 15 CHANGES NEEDED TO TRULY CREATE A COUNTY GOVERNMENT THAT BEST
- 16 SERVES ALL OF OUR CONSTITUENTS BUT THE REFORM IS PRESENTED
- 17 BEFORE US TODAY FOR ME REPRESENT A SUBSET OF ACTIONS WE SHOULD
- 18 TAKE MANY OF WHOM DON'T REOUIRE CHARTER CHANGE. IT REOUIRES
- 19 THIS BOARD TO TAKE ACTION AND PUT INTO PRACTICE OUR STATED
- 20 BELIEFS AROUND TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY. SO, IF I MAY,
- 21 MADAM CHAIR, I'VE GOT A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS. LIKE I SAID, I'VE
- 22 GOT LOTS OF QUESTIONS ABOUT HOW THIS WOULD WORK. ONE GOES BACK
- 23 TO PROCESS, AND MAYBE COUNTY COUNCIL CAN CLARIFY. THE VOTE

- 19 PRESSURES ON NCC, WHEN I THINK ABOUT THE MYRIAD OF BOARD
- 20 MOTIONS THAT ARE PASSED BY THIS BODY, SOME OF WHICH ARE FUNDED
- 21 IN THE BUDGET, SOME OF WHICH AREN'T. WHAT WOULD WE HAVE TO
- 22 GIVE UP OR NO LONGER DO BASED ON A GUESSTIMATE OF STANDING UP
- 23 THESE NEW ENTITIES, ENTITIES THAT DON'T CURRENTLY EXIST, THE
- 24 ANALYST, THE BUDGET AND POLICY ANALYST, AND SOME OF THE
- 25 OTHERS. HOW WOULD WE DO THAT?



- 2 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, A COUPLE OF THINGS, SUPERVISORS. ONE OF
- 3 THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE MOTION IS TO ESTABLISH A CHARTER
- 4 REVIEW COMMISSION, FOR EXAMPLE, AND THEN THERE'S A GOVERNANCE
- 5 IMPLEMENTATION COMMITTEE. I WOULD ASSUME THAT THE GOVERNANCE
- 6 IMPLEMENTATION COMMITTEE WOULD BE A ONE-TIME, MIGHT BE A
- 7 MULTI-YEAR, EXISTS FOR A NUMBER OF YEARS, BUT IT WOULD BE ONE-
- 8 TIME IN NATURE BECAUSE I BELIEVE UNDER THE TERMS OF THE MOTION
- 9 THAT GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE TERMINATES ONCE THIS NEW STRUCTURE
- 10 IS IN PLACE. AND SO THAT WOULD BE A ONE-TIME COST. AND OFTEN
- 11 IN OUR BUDGET, WE ARE NOT NECESSARILY HARD PRESSED TO FIND
- 12 ONE-TIME FUNDS. MOST OF THE PRESSURE ON THE BUDGET EXISTS FOR
- 13 ONGOING FUNDING. AND SO ON THE OTHER BODIES, THE OFFICE OF
- 14 ETHICS COMPLIANCE, THE ETHICS COMMISSION, THE, YOU KNOW,
- 15 WHATEVER THE NEW COUNTY EXECUTIVE OFFICE WOULD LOOK LIKE, THE
- 16 ELECTED EXECUTIVE, AND THEN THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYSTS, THOSE
- 17 WOULD ALL REQUIRE ONGOING COSTS. AND SO, WE, AS YOU CORRECTLY
- 18 POINTED OUT, THERE ARE A LOT OF PRESSURES ON THE BUDGET. IT
- 19 DOESN'T NECESSARILY MEAN THAT WE WOULDN'T BE ABLE TO DO THESE.
- 20 IT WOULD MEAN, HOWEVER, THAT THERE WOULD HAVE TO BE TRADE-
- 21 OFFS. AND SO, THERE WOULD BE SOMETHING ELSE ON THE TABLE. I
- 22 DON'T KNOW WHAT THEY WOULD BE IN, YOU KNOW, 2026, 28 WHEN WE
- 23 WERE STANDING THESE UP, BUT THERE WOULD BE A TRADE-OFF. WE
- 24 WOULD BE IN LABOR NEGOTIATIONS, OR OUR LABOR NEGOTIATIONS THAT
- 25 WE GO TO THE TABLE STARTING NEXT YEAR, THERE WOULD BE



- 1 NEGOTIATIONS FOR, COLA, COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENT INCREASES.
- 2 AND SO, WHAT WE WOULD DO TODAY IS WE WOULD START PUTTING THIS
- 3 ON WHAT WE CALL A FIVE-YEAR FORECAST. IT'S A DOCUMENT THAT WE
- 4 USE INTERNALLY IN A CEO'S OFFICE WHERE WE MAY NOT HAVE
- 5 EXCESSIVE PRECISION ABOUT WHAT THE CIRCUMSTANCES WILL BE
- 6 TOMORROW, BUT WE KNOW THAT THERE IS AN OBLIGATION ON THE
- 7 HORIZON THAT WE WOULD TRY TO PREPARE FOR.

- 9 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND AS I HEAR FROM CONSTITUENTS
- 10 REGULARLY, PARTICULARLY THOSE IN UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES
- 11 WHO FEEL LIKE, AM I GETTING MY FAIR SHARE OF LIVING
- 12 UNINCORPORATED? YOU KNOW, THOSE PRESSURES ARE REAL. AND AS A
- 13 STATE-LEDGED ANALYST, IT'S NOT ONE PERSON. IT'S A TEAM OF
- 14 PEOPLE, PARTICULARLY WHEN YOU CONSIDER THE SHEER VOLUME OF
- 15 MOTIONS THAT PASS THROUGH THIS BODY. THERE WAS A POINT IN TIME
- 16 I WAS KEEPING COUNTING AT MY, I THINK, 3 1/4 YEAR POINT I HAD
- 17 VOTED ON 6,500. SO GIVEN THE SHEER VOLUME OF MOTIONS, IF WE'RE
- 18 TRULY GOING TO STAND UP AN ENTITY THAT'S GOING TO REVIEW
- 19 POLICY AND BUDGET, IT'S NOT JUST ONE PERSON. IT'S GOING TO
- 20 HAVE TO BE MULTIPLE PEOPLE TO AUTHENTICALLY DO THAT WORK. I'M
- 21 NOT SURE HOW WE PAY FOR THAT. AND WE CERTAINLY WANT TO
- 22 MAINTAIN OUR AAA PLUS BOND RATING THAT MANY OF OUR FELLOW
- 23 GOVERNANCE BODIES ACROSS THIS COUNTY DON'T SHARE. AND WE ALL
- 24 KNOW THE IMPORTANCE OF MAINTAINING THAT. SO HAVING AN HONEST
- 25 CONVERSATION ABOUT BUDGET IMPACT I THINK IS IMPORTANT TO THE



- 1 VOTERS. AND I'M NOT SURE HOW WE COULD STAND UP THE
- 2 INFRASTRUCTURE AS PROPOSED WITH NO ADDITIONAL FUNDS WITH A
- 3 PERCEPTION OF SIMPLY REALLOCATING FUNDS. SECOND QUESTION, IN
- 4 THE CONCEPT OF AN ELECTED CEO, AND YOU SAID THAT THERE WERE
- 5 MULTIPLE EXAMPLES, SO PERHAPS YOU COULD HELP EDUCATE ME. YOU
- 6 KNOW, THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, OUR SALARY IS TIED TO JUDICIAL
- 7 SALARIES. I'M NOT SURE HOW OTHER COUNTYWIDE ELECTIVE OFFICERS'
- 8 SALARIES ARE SET. THE SHERIFF. SO, IN THOSE EXAMPLES, IF YOU
- 9 KNOW, HOW ARE THOSE SALARIES FOR AN ELECTED CEO BENCHMARKED?

- 11 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: TYPICALLY, JUST ABOUT EVERY JURISDICTION
- 12 HAS A DIFFERENT PROCESS BUT IT'S NOT UNUSUAL FOR THE SALARY OF
- 13 THE CEO TO BE EQUAL TO OR 5 TO 10% MORE THAN A SUPERVISOR OR
- 14 THEN THE LEGISLATIVE. SO, YOU TAKE A LOOK AT THE GOVERNOR
- 15 VERSUS THE STATE LEGISLATURE OR THE PRESIDENT VERSUS THE
- 16 CONGRESS. AND YOU'LL SEE THAT IN ALMOST MOST CASES, THE
- 17 EXECUTIVE DOES GET PAID A LITTLE BIT MORE. MANY CASES, THEY
- 18 GET PAID THE SAME. AND THERE IS NO CONSENSUS AS TO WHICH IS
- 19 BETTER. AND THAT WOULD REALLY BE UP TO THE BOARD IN TERMS OF
- 20 DECIDING WHAT SHOULD BE THE PAY FOR THE EXECUTIVE.

22 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THE BOARD WOULD DECIDE THAT?

- 24 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: IT'S NOT IN THE CHARTER. AND IT'S NOT IN
- 25 THE PROPOSAL. SO, SOMEBODY WOULD HAVE TO COME UP WITH THAT.



- 2 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: OK. AND I'M CURIOUS ABOUT THE POWER
- 3 DYNAMIC THEN BETWEEN A COUNTYWIDE ELECTED CEO AND 9, 11, 5,
- 4 15, AS YOU SAID, SUPERVISORS. THAT'S A COUNTYWIDE ELECTED.
- 5 WHAT'S THE POWER DYNAMIC? THEN I HAVE A SECOND QUESTION ABOUT
- 6 KIND OF THEIR GOVERNANCE.

7

- 8 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: WELL, THERE'S BOTH A FORMAL AND INFORMAL
- 9 ANSWER, AND THE FORMAL ANSWER IS THAT AS THE EXECUTIVE, THEY
- 10 ARE EQUAL TO THE LEGISLATURE AS A WHOLE. THE INFORMAL, IT
- 11 WOULD BE THE SAME AS WHEN YOU WERE IN THE STATE LEGISLATURE
- 12 AND THE ROLE OF THE GOVERNOR, MEANING THAT THE GOVERNOR WOULD
- 13 HAVE THIS VETO POWER, BUT COULD BE OVERTURNED, JUST LIKE IN
- 14 THE STATE LEGISLATURE. BUT THERE ARE, IT'S ALWAYS UNIQUE TO
- 15 THE SITUATION AND THE PERSONALITIES IN TERMS OF THE BALANCE OF
- 16 POWER. A MUCH MORE POPULAR GOVERNOR WOULD HAVE GREATER
- 17 STANDING INFORMALLY AND WOULD HAVE TO, THE LEGISLATURE WOULD
- 18 HAVE TO WORK WITH THAT, KNOWING THAT SITUATION. A VERY
- 19 WEAKENED EXECUTIVE WOULD HAVE LESS POWER. WE CAN'T MEASURE
- 20 THAT IN TERMS OF METRICS, BUT I THINK INTUITIVELY, ESPECIALLY
- 21 YOURSELF AND SUPERVISOR SOLIS AND SUPERVISOR HAHN HAVING
- 22 SERVED IN OTHER LEGISLATURES, I THINK UNDERSTAND THAT MUCH
- 23 BETTER THAN I.

25 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND I DON'T KNOW THAT IT'S POPULARITY



- 1 IN THE STATE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS. IT'S PARTY AFFILIATION, AND
- 2 IT'S WHO THE MAJORITY PARTY IS IN THE LEGISLATIVE BODY AND THE
- 3 PARTY AFFILIATION OF THE EXECUTIVE MORE SO THAN I THINK
- 4 PERSONALITY. YOU KNOW WE'VE BEEN CHALLENGED AS MANY LOCAL
- 5 GOVERNMENTS IN TERMS OF ADMINISTERING, HOW WE ARE
- 6 OPERATIONALIZING A NEW LEGISLATIVE BILL BROUGHT FORWARD BY
- 7 SENATOR GLAZER, THAT IS REQUIRING, YOU HEARD AT THE BEGINNING,
- 8 SEVERAL RECUSALS WHERE WE AREN'T VOTING ON ACTIONS BECAUSE OF
- 9 DONATIONS. AND SO, WHAT OCCURRED TO ME FOR THIS COUNTYWIDE
- 10 ELECTED, GIVEN THEIR ROLE AS THE EXECUTIVE, HOW WOULD THAT
- 11 WORK? IF THEY'VE GOT TO RUN COUNTYWIDE, THEY'RE GOING TO HAVE
- 12 TO RAISE A WHOLE BUNCH OF MONEY. THAT IS THE REALITY OF
- 13 POLITICS TODAY. AND SO, WOULD THEY HAVE TO RECUSE THEMSELVES
- 14 FROM LABOR NEGOTIATIONS IF BY CHANCE TO GET ELECTED, THEY'VE
- 15 ACCEPTED LABOR DONATIONS? HOW ARE OTHER ELECTED EXECUTIVES
- 16 MANAGING THAT TODAY BECAUSE THEY TOO, PERHAPS IF THERE ARE
- 17 OTHERS IN CALIFORNIA, ARE BOUND BY KIND OF THE GLAZER BILL,
- 18 BECAUSE IT'S LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

- 20 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: I'M NOT AWARE OF RESEARCH, BUT IT IS A
- 21 QUESTION THAT CAN BE RESEARCHED, BECAUSE WE DO HAVE SO MANY
- 22 SITUATIONS, AS YOU JUST MENTIONED, WHETHER IT'S THE MAYOR OF
- 23 LOS ANGELES OR ANY OF THE MAJOR CITIES OR EVEN THE GOVERNOR,
- 24 AND HOW DOES THE PROPOSED GLAZER BILL, HOW WOULD IT IMPACT
- 25 THEM? AND SO, I WOULD LOOK TO THE, YOU KNOW, THE STATE



1 LEGISLATURE AND THE LAO REPORT ON THAT. SARAH?

- 3 DR. SARA SADHWANI: YEAH, I WOULD ALSO JUST ADD THAT THE WAY
- 4 THAT THIS PROPOSAL HAS BEEN PUT TOGETHER, THERE IS ALSO THE
- 5 ETHICS COMMISSION AS WELL AS A CHARTER REFORM COMMISSION THAT
- 6 WILL CONTINUE TO HAVE THESE KINDS OF CONVERSATIONS. SO, TO ME,

- 13 EMPLOYEES ON IT, BUT WHO ACTUALLY APPOINTS THOSE MEMBERS?

- 15 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: I MEAN, I WOULD DEFER TO COUNTY COUNCIL,
- 16 BUT THE WAY, I WOULD READ IT AND INTERPRET IT, YOU THE
- 17 SUPERVISORS WOULD APPOINT THEM.

- 19 DR. SARA SADHWANI: OR AT LEAST YOU THE SUPERVISORS WOULD
- 20 DEVELOP THE PROCESS BY WHICH THEY ARE APPOINTED.

- 22 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THE QUESTION WAS WHO SELECTS THE
- 23 MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNANCE REFORM TASK FORCE?

25 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: WHICH IS DIRECTIVE 10.

- 6 DAWYN HARRISON: WHO WOULD APPOINT THEM. IT MOST LIKELY WOULD
- 7 BE THE BOARD, BUT IT DOESN'T SET FORTH WHO WOULD BE THE
- 8 APPOINTING, THE TASK FORCE.

- 10 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND JUST TO REMIND ME, THOSE ARE
- 11 ELEMENTS THAT WOULD COME ON BOARD, AS WE SAID, IN SOONER YEARS
- 12 VERSUS THE 2032 WHEN WE EXPAND THE BOARD. SO THAT WOULD BE
- 13 HAPPENING NOW, AND THIS BODY, WE'RE ASSUMING, WOULD MAKE THE

- 20 INTENTLY, MADAM CHAIR, YOU REFERENCE SCANDALS AND CORRUPTION
- 21 IN TERMS OF THE NATIONAL SENTIMENT ABOUT GOVERNMENT
- 22 ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY AND IT MADE ME THINK AGAIN
- 23 ABOUT OUR INTERNAL PROCESSES AND WHAT WE HAVE CONTROL OVER.
- 24 AND SO I WANTED TO ASK COUNTY COUNCIL, WE HAVEN'T HAD AN
- 25 UPDATE IN A WHILE ON OUR INTERNAL ANALYSIS AND REVIEW OF THE



- 1 COUNTY'S CONTRACTING PROCESS. SO COULD YOU GIVE US A QUICK
- 2 UPDATE ON WHERE WE ARE IN THAT?

- 4 DAWYN HARRISON: YES SUPERVISOR, THE CONSULTANTS THAT HAVE BEEN
- 5 RETAINED ARE ACTUALLY NEARING CONCLUSION OF THAT PROCESS AND
- 6 WE WERE EXPECTING TO HAVE A REPORT SHORTLY, SOON. I CAN'T,
- 7 PROBABLY WITHIN THE NEXT 2 MONTHS WE WOULD HAVE A REPORT BACK
- 8 ON THAT.

- 10 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I APPRECIATE THAT. I THINK THAT'S
- 11 ANOTHER EXAMPLE IS IF WE'RE GONNA TALK ABOUT TRANSPARENCY AND
- 12 ACCOUNTABILITY AND NOT GIVING OUR CURRENT COLLECTIVE AND
- 13 INDIVIDUAL POWER AWAY, AS I KNOW SOME PEOPLE ARE CONCERNED
- 14 ABOUT ANY KIND OF CONVERSATION ABOUT GOVERNANCE, ABOUT GIVING
- 15 OUR POWER AWAY, THAT DOESN'T HAPPEN TO BE THE WAY I SEE IT.
- 16 CONTINUING TO PUSH THE ENVELOPE ON THESE INTERNAL PROCESSES
- 17 THAT ALLOW FOR GREATER TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY IS I
- 18 THINK THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THIS BOARD AND ACTIONS WE SHOULD
- 19 BE TAKING IF INDEED WE ARE SINCERE ABOUT OUR COMMITMENT TO
- 20 CREATING A COUNTY GOVERNANCE INFRASTRUCTURE THAT MEETS THE
- 21 NEEDS THE UNIQUE AND INDIVIDUAL AND COLLECTIVE NEEDS OF
- 22 10,000,000 RESIDENTS IN A COUNTY AS DIVERSE AND EXPANSIVE AS
- 23 L.A. AGAIN, I'VE GOT OUESTIONS, AND I APPRECIATE YOU AND
- 24 SHARING YOUR EXPERTISE. APPRECIATE YOU FOR GOING THROUGH THE
- 25 BIDDING PROCESS TO ALLOW US TO HAVE A STUDY, HOPE THAT WE CAN



- 1 CONTINUE TO REALLY WORK THROUGH. I THINK, AS IT HAS BEEN
- 2 STATED, THERE HAVE BEEN PAST EFFORTS TO BRING FORWARD A MOTION
- 3 TO EXPAND. AND THOSE EFFORTS HAVE ALL HAD DIFFERENT ADDITIONAL
- 4 GOVERNANCE ELEMENTS ADDED TO THEM. AND THEY HAVE FAILED. I
- 5 HAPPEN TO THINK WE HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY TO GET THIS RIGHT. IT
- 6 IS TOO HARD AND IT COSTS TOO MUCH MONEY FOR A BALLOT
- 7 INITIATIVE TO BE SUCCESSFUL IN A COUNTY THIS LARGE AND SO THE
- 8 NUMBER OF QUESTIONS AND LACK OF CLARITY AND MAYBE IT'S JUST A
- 9 MATTER OF TIME AND HAVING TIME TO FLUSH IT OUT MORE CLEARLY. I
- 10 JUST THINK THAT THERE'S TOO MUCH AT RISK FOR US TO TAKE A BITE
- 11 AT THE APPLE THAT'S NOT ABSOLUTELY IDEAL AND MEETS THE OVERALL
- 12 COMPREHENSIVE, EXPANSIVE GOVERNANCE REFORM NEEDS OF A COUNTY
- 13 OF 10,000,000. I ALSO THINK IT'S GOING TO BE INCUMBENT UPON US
- 14 AS A BOARD TO DO THE INTERNAL CORRECTIONS THAT WE AS A BOARD
- 15 CAN VOTE ON AND PUT INTO PLACE THAT BRING FORWARD TRANSPARENCY
- 16 AND ACCOUNTABILITY FOR PEOPLE TO BE ABLE TO MEANINGFULLY
- 17 ENGAGE WITH LA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AROUND POLICY
- 18 SETTING AND FROM MY PERSPECTIVE EVEN MORE IMPORTANT BUDGET
- 19 DEVELOPMENT AND BUDGET ALLOCATION. THANK YOU VERY MUCH MADAM
- 20 CHAIR.

- 22 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: YES, BEFORE WE MOVE ON TO OUR
- 23 NEXT SPEAKER I JUST WANTED TO CLARIFY SOME OF THE THINGS THAT
- 24 I THINK WERE DIFFICULT FOR SOME OTHERS TO ANSWER. FIRST, STATE
- 25 LAW ALREADY PROVIDES FOR HOW METRO IS COMPOSED. SO, STATE LAW



- 1 DIRECTS THAT METRO, SHOULD THE NUMBER OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
- 2 CHANGE, THAT METRO IS DIRECTED TO COME UP WITH A PROCESS ON
- 3 HOW TO CHANGE THAT. SO, IT'S ALREADY, SO METRO WOULD HAVE TO
- 4 WORK ON THAT. THERE ARE MANY OPTIONS, I COULD SUGGEST SOME,
- 5 BUT MY OPINION DOESN'T MATTER WHAT IS PROVIDED FOR IN STATE
- 6 LAW IS WHAT SHOULD GUIDE THAT PROCESS. SIMILARLY, WE HEARD THE
- 7 CEO'S OPINION ON WHERE WE COULD BE MOVING FUNDING FROM AND SHE
- 8 INDICATED THAT COLA'S WERE A PLACE THAT SHE MIGHT LOOK. I
- 9 WOULD LOOK SOMEWHERE DIFFERENT. I THINK WE COULD CONSOLIDATE
- 10 OR ELIMINATE SOME OF OUR EXISTING COMMISSIONS. WE COULD REDUCE
- 11 OFFICE POSITIONS GIVEN THAT THE SIZE AND SCOPE OF OUR
- 12 DISTRICTS WOULD CHANGE. WE COULD REALLOCATE DUTIES THAT
- 13 CURRENTLY EXIST WITHIN THE CEO'S OFFICE. SO, THERE ARE A LOT
- 14 OF PLACES WITHIN THE CURRENT COUNTY GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE THAT
- 15 WE COULD GET SOME OF THE RESOURCES TO FUND IT, WHICH IS WHY
- 16 WE'RE CONFIDENT WE CAN WORK WITHIN OUR \$46,000,000,000 BUDGET.
- 17 AND IT WAS INTENTIONAL. I AGREE WITH WHAT YOU OUTLINED, THAT
- 18 THERE ARE ABSOLUTELY MORE OPTIONS THAT EXIST FOR US TO ENSURE
- 19 THAT WE ARE DOING THE BEST THAT WE CAN WITH GOVERNANCE REFORM.
- 20 AND AS YOU KNOW, AS YOUR CO-AUTHOR ON BOTH MOTIONS, I SUPPORT
- 21 MUCH MORE THAN WHAT IS OUTLINED IN THIS CURRENT PROPOSAL. BUT
- 22 WE ALSO BELIEVE THAT MANY MORE VOICES NEED TO BE PART OF
- 23 FINALIZING THAT, WHICH IS WHY THE GOVERNANCE REFORM TASK FORCE
- 24 IS EMPOWERED TO DO MUCH OF THAT WORK WITH STAKEHOLDER
- 25 ENGAGEMENT ON A YEARS GOING FORWARD PROCESS. BECAUSE WE KNOW



- 1 THAT THERE ARE UNANSWERED QUESTIONS THAT DESERVE PUBLIC INPUT
- 2 BEFORE THEY ARE SOLIDIFIED. IT SHOULDN'T BE MY OPINION OR
- 3 SUPERVISOR HAHN'S PERSONAL OPINION. WE WEREN'T PRESCRIPTIVE
- 4 ABOUT OUR IDEAS. WE CREATED BODIES TO BE ABLE TO HAVE THOSE
- 5 CONVERSATIONS BOTH FOR THIS IMPLEMENTATION THROUGH THE TASK
- 6 FORCE AND LONG TERM THROUGH THE CHARTER COMMISSION TO BE ABLE
- 7 TO REVIEW THAT ON AN ONGOING BASIS. SO MANY MORE OF THE THINGS
- 8 THAT YOU MENTIONED CAN BE CONSIDERED AND SHOULD BE IN MY
- 9 OPINION. SO, I JUST WANTED TO CLARIFY THAT FOR THE RECORD.
- 10 SUPERVISOR BARGER.

- 12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THANK YOU. AND I WANT TO THANK YOU,
- 13 FERNANDO AND SARA. AND FERNANDA, THANK YOU FOR THE POLLS THAT
- 14 YOU DO. I KNOW THAT WE'VE TALKED ABOUT THE OUTCOMES OF THEM,
- 15 AND THERE'S NO QUESTION IN MY MIND THAT YOU HAVE YOUR FINGER
- 16 ON THE PULSE AND WANT TO DO WHAT'S RIGHT. AND WHAT I WOULD SAY
- 17 TO PEOPLE, AND ACTUALLY IN THE LA TIMES ARTICLE, I THINK ZEV
- 18 YAROSLAVSKY SUMS IT UP THAT THE DAY-TO-DAY ISSUES THAT THEY
- 19 TACKLE ARE NOT GLAMOROUS. IT IS, AS FORMER SUPERVISOR ZEV
- 20 YAROSLAVSKY PUTS IT, POOR PEOPLE'S GOVERNMENT MEANT TO CATCH
- 21 PEOPLE WITH NO INSURANCE, NO HOME, NO PARENTS, AND NO MONEY.
- 22 THIS JOB, AS SOMEONE WHO HAS SERVED FOR 35 YEARS AS A COUNTY
- 23 EMPLOYEE, WHILE I HAVE NOT BEEN ELECTED AS THE LONGEST ON THIS
- 24 BOARD, I WOULD ARGUE THAT I'VE BEEN HERE 35 YEARS AND SEEN
- 25 SOME CHANGE. WE CHANGED THE CAO TO THE CEO, AND I ALWAYS SAID



- 1 IT WAS DRIVEN MORE BY PERSONALITY THAN BY THE POSITION. THEN
- 2 THE BOARD WAS TOLD THAT DEPARTMENT HEADS WERE NO LONGER, THE
- 3 CEO WAS EQUAL TO DEPARTMENT HEADS. SO, YOU HAVE DEPARTMENT
- 4 HEADS THAT COUNT BY 3. AND I KNOW, SUPERVISOR OR CHAIR HORVATH
- 5 HAS ASKED WHY IT TAKES SO LONG TO GET THINGS DONE. IT'S
- 6 BECAUSE WE ARE STUCK IN A BUREAUCRACY AND I WOULD ARGUE THAT
- 7 IS PERSONALITY DRIVEN AND NOT DRIVEN BY THE STRUCTURE. THAT IS
- 8 WHY, AND I'M GOING TO THANK PUBLIC LABOR SUPERVISOR MITCHELL
- 9 BECAUSE YOU BROUGHT THIS FORWARD IN THE BEGINNING AND DIDN'T
- 10 GET A SECOND AND THEN YOU BROUGHT A MOTION IN WITH SUPERVISOR
- 11 HORVATH TO LOOK AT A STUDY. AND IT WAS A UNANIMOUS VOTE,
- 12 BECAUSE AT THE END OF THE DAY, I BELIEVE IT IS UP TO THE
- 13 VOTERS TO MAKE THAT DECISION. IT HAS FAILED WITH A CEO, OR AN
- 14 EXECUTIVE BEING ELECTED. I DON'T KNOW THAT BIGGER GOVERNMENT
- 15 NECESSARILY TRANSLATES TO BETTER. AND I DO BELIEVE THAT THERE
- 16 ARE REFORMS THAT NEED TO BE MADE AND NEED TO BE MADE
- 17 IMMEDIATELY. AND SO, I AM OPEN-MINDED, AND I THINK THAT IS
- 18 WHAT IS FRUSTRATING. I MEAN YOU TALK TRANSPARENCY THIS PROCESS
- 19 WAS ANYTHING BUT TRANSPARENT AS IT RELATES TO HOW THIS WAS
- 20 ROLLED OUT AND YOU KNOW FOR ME THERE WAS A PROCESS IN PLACE
- 21 THAT I FEEL WAS COMPLETELY UNDERCUT. AND TO ME, THAT GOES TO
- 22 THE CREDIBILITY OF WHAT THE INTENTION REALLY IS ON THIS. I
- 23 APPRECIATE AN OPPORTUNITY TO CONSIDER HOW WE CAN IMPROVE THE
- 24 COUNTY AND ENSURE WE ARE MORE ACCOUNTABLE TO OUR CONSTITUENTS
- 25 AND PARTNERS AND CONTINUE EFFORTS TO BREAK DOWN SILOS AND



- 1 INCREASE RESPONSIVENESS, SOMETHING THAT I FEEL IS MISSING
- 2 RIGHT NOW. THERE ARE MANY WAYS THAT WE CAN ENHANCE COUNTY
- 3 GOVERNMENT TO MEET THE EVOLVING NEEDS OF OUR MOST VULNERABLE
- 4 COMMUNITIES, WHILE COLLABORATING WITH PARTNERS IN LOCAL,
- 5 STATE, AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. A LOT HAS BEEN SAID OVER THE
- 6 PAST WEEK ABOUT THE COUNTY'S INABILITY TO MOVE THE NEEDLE AND
- 7 GET THINGS DONE. AND WHILE THERE IS CERTAINLY A LOT OF BLAME
- 8 TO GO AROUND, WE SHOULD ACKNOWLEDGE THAT IT'S NOT USUALLY THE
- 9 STRUCTURE THAT PREVENTS US FROM MOVING FORWARD. IT IS OFTEN
- 10 THE INABILITY TO MAKE DECISIONS. FOR EXAMPLE, OVER THE LAST 12
- 11 YEARS, WE'VE RECEIVED 3 INDEPENDENT CONSULTANT REPORTS TELLING
- 12 THE COUNTY THAT WE NEED TO TEAR DOWN MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL AND
- 13 REPLACE IT WITH A HUMANE CORRECTIONAL TREATMENT FACILITY. THE
- 14 BOARD IN 2014 MADE THAT TOUGH DECISION WHICH WAS DEVISED LATER
- 15 AND ULTIMATELY SCRAPPED. TODAY WE ARE BACK WHERE WE WERE MORE
- 16 THAN 12 YEARS AGO BECAUSE THERE IS NO WILL TO MAKE THE TOUGH
- 17 DECISION ON THE REPLACEMENT PLAN. WE HAVE THE ABILITY EVERY
- 18 TUESDAY, AND YOU SAID IT, SUPERVISOR HAHN, IN THIS REPORT THAT
- 19 YOU JUST NEED 3, I THINK THE QUOTE WAS, WE NEED 3 VOTES TO
- 20 MAKE THINGS HAPPEN. WE CAN DO THAT, AND WE CAN MAKE THOSE
- 21 DECISIONS TO MOVE. DO YOU REMEMBER SAYING THAT IN THE ARTICLE
- 22 WHERE YOU TALK ABOUT WE WANT YOU TO FIND THE MONEY, WHICH I
- 23 GUESS IS WHAT WE'RE GONNA TAKE THE STANCE ON WITH THIS, WE
- 24 WANT YOU TO FIND THE MONEY ON HOW WE'RE GOING TO DO THIS.
- 25 WE'LL MAKE A DECISION, YOU FIGURE IT OUT. BUT IT WAS A QUOTE



- 1 BY YOU THAT SAYS THAT ALL YOU NEED IS 3 VOTES TO MAKE THINGS
- 2 HAPPEN. SO, WHEN WE MAKE THOSE DECISIONS, MOVE MONEY WHERE IT
- 3 NEEDS TO GO AND HOLD DEPARTMENTS RESPONSIBLE, IT'S UP TO US TO
- 4 HAVE THESE CONVERSATIONS TO MAKE TOUGH CHOICES AND TO DO SO IN
- 5 OUR PUBLIC BOARD MEETING WHERE ALL THE DECISION MAKERS ARE
- 6 PRESENT AND EQUALLY ACCOUNTABLE. IT IS UNCLEAR HOW ADDITIONAL
- 7 MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, WHAT THAT WILL MEAN AND WHAT THE NUMBER
- 8 IS. AND I APPRECIATE WHAT YOU SAID, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, IN
- 9 TERMS OF IS IT 9, IS IT 15? WE DON'T KNOW. AND YOU SAID THAT
- 10 THERE REALLY ISN'T A STUDY TO SUPPORT ANY PARTICULAR NUMBER
- 11 RIGHT NOW. THAT DOESN'T MEAN IT CAN'T BE DONE, CORRECT,
- 12 FERNANDO?

- 14 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: IF THE QUESTION IS, CAN WE COME UP WITH
- 15 WHAT THE NUMBER SHOULD BE, I DON'T THINK SO. YOU, AT THE END
- 16 OF THE DAY, IT'S GOING TO BE A QUALIFIED DECISION BY THE BOARD
- 17 OR WHOEVER PUTS AN INITIATIVE ON THERE THAT THIS IS THE BEST.
- 18 I CANNOT THINK OF A CRITERIA THAT WOULD USE TO SAY 9 IS BETTER
- 19 THAN 11, 9 IS BETTER THAN 5. IT'S JUST, YOU KNOW, FROM WHAT
- 20 WE'VE TAKEN A LOOK AT BOTH FOR CITY COUNCILS AND BOARD OF
- 21 SUPERVISORS AND STATE LEGISLATURES, THEY'RE ALL OVER THE MAP
- 22 IN TERMS OF THE NUMBER AND WHAT WORKS BEST.

- 24 DR. SARA SADHWANI: I WOULD DISAGREE WITH THAT. WE LOOKED AT
- 25 THIS QUESTION ALSO FOR THE CITY COUNCIL. OUR SCHOLARS GROUP



- 1 DEVELOPED A RECOMMENDATION THAT WAS A MIXED SYSTEM, 21 SEATS
- 2 WITH ADDITIONAL SEATS NESTED ON TOP OF IT, SOMEWHAT SIMILAR TO
- 3 A STATE LEGISLATURE BETWEEN AN ASSEMBLY AND A SENATE.
- 4 COMMUNITY GROUPS COULD NOT COME TO AN ANSWER, AND THEY DID NOT
- 5 PROPOSE ANY SPECIFIC RECOMMENDATION TO THE CITY COUNCIL. AND
- 6 ULTIMATELY, THE CITY COUNCIL, THE URGE FOR MAINTAINING THE
- 7 STATUS QUO WAS VERY STRONG, AND WE SEE NO COUNCIL EXPANSION
- 8 OCCURRING. I WOULD JUST- IT'S ALSO ABOUT- OH, PLEASE, I WOULD
- 9 JUST ADD ALSO, I MEAN, I THINK THIS 9 COULD ALSO BE A STARTING
- 10 POINT. IF THERE IS A CHARTER REVIEW COMMITTEE THAT IS MEETING
- 11 ON A DECENNIAL BASIS, THEN IT COULD BE 11 IN THE FUTURE. IT
- 12 COULD BE 15. MAYBE IT PULLS BACK TO 5. MAYBE THEY REALIZE 9
- 13 ACTUALLY ISN'T WORKING. SO, I THINK THAT THE WAY THAT IT'S
- 14 WRITTEN WITH THE CHARTER REFORM COMMISSION CREATES THE
- 15 OPPORTUNITY TO CONTINUE TO REVISIT THIS IF LA COUNTY
- 16 POPULATION EXPANDS OR EVEN IF IT DECLINES OVER TIME.

18 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: YEAH, I'M SORRY, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.

- 20 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: IF I COULD JUST ASK A QUICK FOLLOW-UP
- 21 ON THAT. THANK YOU. SO, WOULD THE REFORM COMMISSION THAT WOULD
- 22 DO THEIR WORK EVERY 10 YEARS, I THINK IT'S STIPULATED, WOULD
- 23 THAT THEN REQUIRE A NEW ORDINANCE TO MAKE THE CHANGE, OR WOULD
- 24 THEY BE EMPOWERED BASED ON THIS LANGUAGE TO MAKE CHANGES THAT
- 25 WOULD NOT HAVE TO GO BACK TO THE VOTERS.



- 2 DR. SARA SADHWANI: MY READ OF IT AND I WOULD I SUPPOSE ONE
- 3 COUNTY COUNCIL'S PERSPECTIVE IS THAT NO, IT WOULD NEED TO GO
- 4 BACK TO THE VOTERS.

- 8 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THAT'S CORRECT THEY'D MAKE A
- 9 RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD. THANK YOU.

11 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: GO BACK TO THE VOTERS EVERY 10 YEARS.

- 13 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THAT'S CORRECT. THANK YOU. I REALLY AM
- 14 UNCLEAR ON HOW WHAT'S BEING BROUGHT TODAY WILL PROVIDE BETTER
- 15 REPRESENTATION BECAUSE I BELIEVE WHEN YOU LOOK AT THE CHARGE
- 16 OF THIS BOARD, EVERYONE IS SILENT ON THE UNINCORPORATED
- 17 COMMUNITIES. I KNOW IN MY DISTRICTS, I'VE INCORPORATED TOWN
- 18 COUNCILS WHICH ARE ELECTED BY THE COMMUNITY LEADERS. SO, WHEN
- 19 DECISIONS ARE MADE IN MY UNINCORPORATED AREAS, I MAKE SURE
- 20 THAT THEY FEEL THAT THEY HAVE A VOICE BECAUSE THE
- 21 UNINCORPORATED FEELS THAT THEY ARE ALWAYS SLIGHTED AT THE
- 22 EXPENSE OF DECISIONS MADE BY THIS BOARD, NOT TAKING INTO
- 23 CONSIDERATION THAT WE ARE BASICALLY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY
- 24 COUNCIL. WHEN I LOOK AT THE BREAKDOWN OF OUR UNINCORPORATED
- 25 AND I THINK I'M GOING TO BE ASKING YOU A QUESTION ON THIS.



- 1 FIRST DISTRICT HAS THE LARGEST. SECOND DISTRICT HAS A SECOND
- 2 AND THEN THE FIFTH HAS THE THIRD AND THE THIRD HAS VERY LITTLE
- 3 2.17 AND FOURTH 11.76. HOW DO YOU SEE THIS DIVISION IMPACTING
- 4 THE UNINCORPORATED WHICH REALLY IS WHAT WE ARE CHARGED TO
- 5 PROVIDE ALL SERVICES BEYOND JUST THE HEALTH AND WELFARE.

- 7 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: IN HAVING THESE DISCUSSIONS WITH OTHER
- 8 ACADEMICS AND MY STUDENTS AND LAYING OUT THAT EXACT QUESTION
- 9 THAT THERE IS AN UNINCORPORATED SEGMENT OF THE COUNTY, IT
- 10 CONSISTS ROUGHLY OF A 1,000,000 PEOPLE, 1/10, BUT THAT THEY
- 11 ARE NOT CONCENTRATED, IT'S FRAGMENTED ALL OVER. THE ALMOST,
- 12 ALMOST UNANIMOUSLY, THE CONCLUSION IS, THAT'S WHERE THE
- 13 EXECUTIVE COMES IN. THE EXECUTIVE, AS THE 10TH ELECTED PERSON,
- 14 WOULD THEN TAKE ON THE OVERVIEW OF THE ENTIRE COUNTY AND WOULD
- 15 MORE LIKELY THAN NOT, IT WOULDN'T BE REQUIRED BY THE RULES,
- 16 BUT IT WOULD SEEM THAT THEY'RE THE NUMBER ONE CHAMPIONS OF THE
- 17 UNINCORPORATED. THEY ARE NOT ONLY THE MAYOR OF THE COUNTY AS A
- 18 WHOLE, BUT VERY MUCH THE MAYOR OF THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS
- 19 THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY. AND THAT THE FEELING AMONGST THE
- 20 DISCUSSIONS THAT I'VE HAD IS THAT WOULD BE THE BEST THINGS FOR
- 21 THE UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES TO HAVE AN EXECUTIVE FOR THEM
- 22 COLLECTIVELY.

- 24 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: BECAUSE I KNOW THAT I'VE, I'LL GO AHEAD,
- 25 SARA.



2 DR. SARA SADHWANI: I WAS JUST GOING TO ADD, THIS IS ALSO A

- 3 REDISTRICTING QUESTION, IT COULD BE A REDISTRICTING QUESTION
- 4 AS WELL TO ENSURE THAT UNINCORPORATED AREAS STAY TOGETHER WHEN
- 5 PLACED IN DISTRICTS. AND THAT'S CERTAINLY SOMETHING THIS BOARD
- 6 COULD ADVOCATE TO AN INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING COMMISSION IN
- 7 THE FUTURE.

- 9 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: I KNOW THAT I HAVE CITIES NOW THAT I
- 10 TALKED TO YESTERDAY THAT ARE ACTUALLY CONSIDERING
- 11 INCORPORATING THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS BECAUSE OF FEAR THAT
- 12 THEY ARE GOING TO BE DISENFRANCHISED. AND I KNOW THAT SOLIS'
- 13 ISSUE IN EAST LA, IT IS ABOUT REPRESENTATION AND IT IS ABOUT
- 14 FEELING THAT THEY DON'T HAVE A VOICE. AND MY CONCERN IS
- 15 THERE'S VERY LITTLE DISCUSSION ABOUT THE ROLE THAT THIS BOARD
- 16 PLAYS WHEN IT COMES TO THE UNINCORPORATED IN TERMS OF THE
- 17 OUALITY OF THE STREETS AND THE MUNICIPAL SERVICES THAT WE ARE
- 18 REOUIRED TO PROVIDE. AND SO THAT IS AN ISSUE AND IT UP IN THE
- 19 ANTELOPE VALLEY AND SANTA CLARITA VALLEY THEY HAVE UNIOUE
- 20 CHALLENGES THAT DON'T MEET WHAT HAPPENS IN NORTH COUNTY. IT
- 21 SNOWS UP IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY. IT DOESN'T HAPPEN DOWN BELOW
- 22 AND THEIR CONCERN IS ARE THEY GOING TO BE EVEN MORE TO THEIR

- 4 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: YEAH, I THINK I WOULD PHRASE IT THAT IT
- 5 HAS THE POTENTIAL TO DO THAT. IT IS NOT REQUIRED TO DO THAT.
- 6 IT DEPENDS ON WHO GETS ELECTED.

- 8 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: SO, YOU KNOW AND THERE HAVE BEEN SOME
- 9 COMPARISONS OF THE PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT AND HOW THE CITY
- 10 OF LA OPERATES. THE CITY HAS AN ELECTED EXECUTIVE, A LARGER
- 11 COUNCIL, A LEGISLATIVE ANALYST AND A CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE
- 12 OFFICER TO HANDLE BUDGET MANAGEMENT. HOWEVER, THE CITY IS
- 13 SIMILARLY STRUGGLING TO ADDRESS KEY ISSUES AND SEEM EVEN MORE
- 14 DELAYED IN ACCESSING CRITICAL RESOURCES AND RESPONDING TO THE
- 15 NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY, ESPECIALLY CONSIDERING THE
- 16 HOMELESSNESS CRISIS. AND SO, THIS IS NOT GONNA BE A PANACEA.
- 17 AGAIN, I BELIEVE THAT A LOT OF IT IS DRIVEN BY INDIVIDUALS
- 18 THAT ARE ELECTED AND HAVE TO MAKE DECISIONS EACH AND EVERY
- 19 DAY. AND I DO BELIEVE THAT COUNTIES, NOT JUST LA COUNTY, BUT
- 20 ACROSS THE STATE, THIS IS A JOB. THIS IS NOT ABOUT RIBBON
- 21 CUTTING. IT COMES WITH IT, BUT I WILL TELL YOU EACH AND EVERY
- 22 DAY, I COME INTO WORK AND I WORK A FULL DAY'S WORK GOING OUT
- 23 INTO MY DISTRICT. IT'S NOT ABOUT JUST RIBBON CUTTING. SO IT'S
- 24 NOT LIKE A CITY COUNCIL. WELL, THAT HAS A CITY MANAGER THAT

- 1 WE'RE GOING OUT INTO THE DISTRICTS AND REPRESENTING OUR
- 2 CONSTITUENTS. I BELIEVE, YOU KNOW, MY CONCERN IS FOR THE
- 3 UNINCORPORATED. AND THEN THERE WAS A RECENT SURVEY BY THRIVE
- 4 LA, MORE THAN 2/3 OF THE PUBLIC OPINED THAT THE CITY OF LA IS
- 5 HEADED IN THE WRONG DIRECTION AND THEY HAVE A STRUCTURE THAT'S
- 6 IN PLACE. AND SO AGAIN, I'M ONLY POINTING THAT OUT TO SHOW
- 7 THAT IT'S NOT GOING TO NECESSARILY BE A PANACEA TO WHAT IS
- 8 GOING ON. I'M LOOKING AT, YEAH.

- 10 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: YEAH, NO, THE FIRST, VERY FIRST THING IS
- 11 THIS WILL NOT SOLVE A LOT OF ISSUES. IT HOPEFULLY PREPARES THE
- 12 GOVERNANCE TO BE ABLE TO ADDRESS THESE ISSUES TO A MUCH BETTER
- 13 RESPECT. I WOULD SAY THAT THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES HAS A
- 14 CHALLENGE IN ISSUE AREAS WHERE THEY DON'T HAVE COMPLETE
- 15 CONTROL. HOMELESSNESS, WHERE THEY HAVE TO SHARE THAT
- 16 RESPONSIBILITY WITH THE COUNTY IS ONE OF THOSE. BUT WHERE THE
- 17 CITY HAS COMPLETE AND TOTAL CONTROL, I WOULD SAY THINGS ARE
- 18 HEADED IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION, WHETHER IT'S AIR OUALITY THAT'S
- 19 BEEN GREATLY IMPROVED, WHETHER IT'S WATER AVAILABILITY. I CAN
- 20 GO ON AND ON ABOUT, YOU KNOW, WE TEND TO SAY GOVERNMENT IS NOT
- 21 SUCCESSFUL. THERE ARE MANY, MANY SUCCESS STORIES IN THE CITY
- 22 OF LOS ANGELES, AND THERE ARE MANY, MANY SUCCESS STORIES IN
- 23 THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. AND THERE ARE MANY MORE SUCCESS
- 24 STORIES THAN HORROR STORIES. WE JUST TEND TO FOCUS ON THE
- 25 HORROR STORIES. LOCAL GOVERNMENT WORKS. AND IF YOU HAVE THE



1 STRUCTURE, IT WORKS EVEN BETTER.

- 3 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THANK YOU FOR THAT. I HAVE CONCERNS THAT
- 4 AN ELECTED EXECUTIVE WILL POLITICIZE AN OFFICE THAT SHOULD BE
- 5 NONPARTISAN. YOU BROUGHT UP THE PARTISAN COMPONENT, BUT I
- 6 BELIEVE THAT IT SHOULD BE NONPARTISAN AND UNBIASED IN RUNNING
- 7 THE DAILY OPERATIONS OF THE COUNTY, ESPECIALLY IF IT INCLUDES
- 8 DIRECT OVERSIGHT OF NON-ELECTED POSITIONS AND THE EFFECTIVE
- 9 ALLOCATION OF COUNTY RESOURCES. THE PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT
- 10 GIVES A SIGNIFICANT MAJORITY OF POWER AND DISCRETION OVER
- 11 COUNTY FUNDING TO AN ELECTED COUNTY EXECUTIVE. AND MY CONCERN,
- 12 AND TELL ME IF I'M WRONG, IS THAT IT MAY JEOPARDIZE THE
- 13 BALANCED WAY IN WHICH THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IS SUPPOSED TO
- 14 WORK TO BENEFIT ALL THE RESIDENTS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY?

- 16 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: I MEAN, MY RESPONSE WOULD GO BACK TO A
- 17 STATEMENT I MADE EARLIER. THIS IS THE LARGEST JURISDICTION IN
- 18 THE WORLD, NOT IN CALIFORNIA, NOT IN THE UNITED STATES, IN THE
- 19 WORLD THAT DOESN'T HAVE AN EXECUTIVE FOR BALANCE IN TERMS OF
- 20 CHECKS AND BALANCES. I WOULD ACTUALLY MAKE THE ARGUMENT,
- 21 HYPOTHETICALLY, THAT IT'S THE OPPOSITE, THAT AN ELECTED
- 22 EXECUTIVE WOULD MAKE THE LEGISLATURE, THE MEANING OF THE
- 23 SUPERVISORS, THEIR WORK EASIER AND MORE PRODUCTIVE. A
- 24 HYPOTHESIS, OKAY, THAT WE COULD TEST OUT IN DIFFERENT AREAS.
- 25 AND WE SEE THIS THROUGHOUT DEMOCRACIES IN THE WORLD THAT ARE



- 1 DEPENDENT ON THE EXECUTIVE AND THE LEGISLATURE BALANCING AND
- 2 CHECKING EACH OTHER OUT AND ACTUALLY PUSHING EACH OTHER TO GET
- 3 TO SOLUTIONS. THE LITERATURE IN POLITICAL SCIENCE IS PRETTY
- 4 CLEAR THAT DEMOCRACIES NEED AN EXECUTIVE, AND THE PUBLIC
- 5 POLICY LITERATURE IS PRETTY CLEAR THAT AN EXECUTIVE AND
- 6 LEGISLATURE TEND TO LEAD TO MORE TRANSPARENT AND BETTER
- 7 OUTCOMES.

- 9 DR. SARA SADHWANI: I WOULD ONLY ADD THAT AT PRESENT, CORRECT
- 10 ME IF I'M WRONG, THAT YOU HAVE A ONE-YEAR ROTATING CHAIR FOR
- 11 THIS BODY. AND SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, YOU TALKED ABOUT WANTING
- 12 TO MAKE SOME OF THESE CHANGES WHEN YOU WERE THAT CHAIR. BUT NO
- 13 DOUBT, THEN YOUR YEAR WAS UP. HAVING AN EXECUTIVE CAN ALSO
- 14 ALLOW FOR SOME LEVEL OF SUSTAINED MOMENTUM ON VARIOUS
- 15 INITIATIVES. WE SEE THAT WITH MAYOR BASS AND HER INSIDE SAFE
- 16 PROGRAM. IT DOESN'T END AFTER ONE YEAR. IT CONTINUES ON AND
- 17 THEY REFINE AND THEY MOVE FORWARD. SO, I THINK HAVING AN
- 18 EXECUTIVE, I COMPLETELY AGREE WITH FERNANDO, IS PART AND

- 25 WOULDN'T THE PROPOSAL BE THEN AN ELECTED MAYOR OF THE COUNTY



- 1 OF LOS ANGELES AND KEEP THE CEO POSITION SO THAT YOU HAVE A
- 2 STRUCTURE SIMILAR TO THE CITY OF LA?

- 4 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: I WOULD INTERPRET THIS PROPOSAL TO DO
- 5 EXACTLY THAT. IT CALLS FOR A CAO JUST LIKE THE CITY OF LA.

- 7 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: BUT WHY WOULDN'T THE INDIVIDUAL BE 1 OF 9
- 8 BUT IN A COUNTY WIDE ELECTED POSITION ON THIS BOARD?

- 11 BIT DIFFERENT THAN THIS, BUT AS I SEE IT, THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE
- 12 ELECTED WOULD THEN HAVE STANDING AS AN ELECTED OFFICIAL NUMBER
- 13 1 BUT WOULD BE GIVEN THE DUTIES MOSTLY LIKE WHAT THE MAYOR HAS
- 14 OR WHAT THE GOVERNOR HAS. AND THEN JUST LIKE THE MAYOR HAS A
- 15 CAO OR THE CITY OF LA HAS A CAO, THE COUNTY WOULD HAVE A CAO.

- 17 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: RIGHT. AND I KNOW, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL,
- 18 WHEN YOU WERE CHAIR, YOU BROUGHT FORWARD REQUESTS, FURTHEST
- 19 FORWARD, TO, FOR EXAMPLE, NOT PUT THINGS ON THE GREEN SHEET,
- 20 WHICH IS ON A FRIDAY PUBLISHED FOR TUESDAY, THAT HAD POLICY
- 21 IMPLICATIONS AND THAT NEEDED TO BE CLEARLY VETTED WITH THE
- 22 PUBLIC. AND SO, I KNOW THAT YOU TRIED TO MAKE THE PROCESS
- 23 TRANSPARENT WELL, I'M JUST POINTING OUT THAT THAT WAS
- 24 SOMETHING AGAIN DRIVEN BY PERSONALITY, NOT BY PROCESS.
- 25 PREVIOUS ITERATIONS OF THE PROPOSED BOARD EXPANSION ELECTED



- 1 EXECUTIVE EITHER VIA STATE LEGISLATION OR BALLOT MEASURES HAVE
- 2 ADDRESSED INCREASED LOCAL COST AND FINANCIAL PRESSURES TO MAKE
- 3 NECESSARY OFFICE CHANGES AND REALIGN FUNCTIONS OF COUNTY
- 4 GOVERNMENT. THEY'VE ALSO SUGGESTED INCLUDING AN EXPENDITURE
- 5 CAP FOR THE GOVERNING BOARD AND ITS STAFF AT THE AMOUNT
- 6 BUDGETED FOR THE EXISTING FISCAL YEAR, WHICH COULD BE ADJUSTED
- 7 BASED ON ANNUAL BUDGET INCREASES OR CHANGES IN THE CPI. AND
- 8 IRONICALLY, THE CHARTER REFORM AMENDMENT, WHICH PLEDGES TO

- 17 BUT TO INCREASE THE FINANCIAL STABILITY FOR OUR FIRE
- 18 DEPARTMENT, WHICH IS IN A STRUCTURAL DEFICIT AND FACING A
- 19 CLIFF, AND THAT WE ARE ASKING OUR VOTERS TO ALLOCATE A HALF-
- 20 CENT SALES TAX FOR HOUSING AND FOR HOMELESSNESS. I JUST I'M
- 21 CONCERNED ABOUT THE TIMING ON IT, QUITE FRANKLY, AND THAT'S
- 22 NOT A QUESTION, THAT'S MORE OF A STATEMENT. HAVING SAID THAT,
- 23 THERE ARE CONCERNS THAT SHOULD BE FULLY ADDRESSED AND DOES
- 24 NEED TO BE PRESENTED TO THE VOTERS. I'D LIKE TO TURN MY
- 25 ATTENTION NOW TO THE DISCUSSION AROUND THE ETHICS REFORM. AND



- 1 I AGREE WITH MY COLLEAGUES THAT YOU HAVE RAISED A VERY
- 2 IMPORTANT POINT ABOUT ETHICS REFORM. THIS IS A MOMENT WHERE WE
- 3 NEED TO ADOPT CHANGES AND ETHICS REFORM MAY ENABLE US TO
- 4 MAINTAIN OUR STANDARDS NOT ONLY TO ADDRESS CURRENT ISSUES BUT
- 5 TO MANAGE NEW CHALLENGES AS THEY EMERGE. CLEARLY ETHICS REFORM
- 6 IS CRUCIAL IN PREVENTING CORRUPTION AND MISDEEDS AND EQUALLY

- 19 IDENTIFIED COULD ALL BE ESTABLISHED BY BOARD AS A POLICY
- 20 MATTER RATHER THAN CHARTER AMENDMENT. THE ONE THING I WILL SAY
- 21 IS WITH REGARDS TO THE REVOLVING DOOR, YOU WOULD NEED TO
- 22 DIRECT OUR OFFICE TO AMEND THE CURRENT ORDINANCE. SO, THERE
- 23 WOULD NEED TO BE AN ORDINANCE AMENDMENT FOR THAT ONE.

- 10 SENSE THE URGENCY IN THESE NEEDED REFORMS AND I THINK THAT
- 11 THIS BOARD SHOULD RESPECT THE LEVEL OF IMMEDIATE RESOLVE BY
- 12 MOVING FORWARD ON THIS IMPORTANT INITIATIVE NOW. I WOULD LIKE
- 13 TO ASK COUNTY COUNCIL TO REPORT BACK TO THIS BOARD IN 7 DAYS
- 14 ON THE CREATION OF A PROPOSED ETHICS COMMISSION AND
- 15 ESTABLISHMENT OF AN OFFICE OF ETHICS COMPLIANCE. AND AS PART
- 16 OF A COMPREHENSIVE FORM, I'D LIKE OUR COUNTY COUNCIL TO ALSO
- 17 REPORT BACK WITH THE DRAFT REVISED ORDINANCE THAT INCREASES
- 18 FROM 1 TO 2 YEARS THE COOLING OFF PERIOD FOR COUNTY EMPLOYEES
- 19 TO LOBBY THE COUNTY AFTER LEAVING COUNTY SERVICE. AGAIN, THESE
- 20 ARE THINGS THAT WE CAN AND SHOULD DO RIGHT NOW IF THAT IS
- 21 TRULY WHAT THIS IS ABOUT. WE KNOW THAT THIS IS THE RIGHT THING
- 22 TO DO. WE DON'T NEED TO WAIT UNTIL NOVEMBER OR UNTIL 2026 TO
- 23 DO THIS AND ACT ON THIS URGENCY. WE OWE IT TO OUR RESIDENTS
- 24 AND THOSE WHO VOTED FOR US TO BE IN OFFICE TO TAKE IMMEDIATE

- 15 DIDN'T KNOW EXACTLY HOW MUCH THAT WOULD COST, MAYBE
- 16 \$12,000,000, MAYBE DOUBLE THAT, IT DIDN'T MATTER. THAT IS,
- 17 AGAIN, AN INDICTMENT ON THIS BOARD. THIS WAS NOT WRITTEN IN A
- 18 FLATTERING WAY BY THE LA TIMES TO SHOW HOW POWERFUL WE ARE. IT
- 19 WAS WRITTEN IN A WAY TO SHOW THAT THIS BOARD ON ANY GIVEN
- 20 TUESDAY, AND YOU ARE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT, SUPERVISOR HAHN, IF YOU
- 21 HAVE A GOOD IDEA, YOU ONLY NEED 2 OTHER PEOPLE WHO AGREE WITH
- 22 YOU, AND IT BECOMES A LAW. WHETHER IT'S 9, 15, 5, 7. AS
- 23 ELECTIVES, WE HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY TO LEAD. AND I AM OPEN TO
- 24 EXPANSION OF THIS BOARD BECAUSE I DO BELIEVE THAT IT SHOULD BE
- 25 LOOKED AT. WHERE I'M CONCERNED IS THAT THIS WAS DONE IN A WAY



- 1 THAT WE HAD BUY-IN FROM ALL 5 SUPERVISORS TO BRING FORWARD A
- 2 COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF WHICH YOU ARE FAMILIAR WITH THE RFP
- 3 THAT WAS RELEASED. SO THAT WHEN WE MAKE DECISIONS, THEY'RE
- 4 MADE TRANSPARENTLY AND WITH THE INPUT FROM EXPERTS THAT KNOW
- 5 WHAT WE NEED TO DO TO GET IT RIGHT. THIS WAS NOT DONE IN THIS
- 6 CASE. AND FOR THAT I AM SORRY. BECAUSE I FEEL THAT THERE ARE
- 7 MEMBERS ON THIS BOARD WHO LED THIS ISSUE AND WERE CUT OUT OF
- 8 THE PROCESS. BUT THAT'S NOT YOUR PROBLEM. AGAIN, LEADERS LEAD.
- 9 AND I, FOR ONE, BELIEVE THAT IF THIS BOARD IS SERIOUS ABOUT
- 10 ALL THESE CHANGES THEY WANT TO MAKE IN CORRUPTION, SOMETHING
- 11 THAT I SAY, I TAKE PRIDE IN MY REPUTATION AS A REPRESENTATIVE
- 12 OF THE FIFTH DISTRICT, BUT I ALSO TAKE PRIDE IN THE FACT THAT
- 13 YOU WILL NEVER HEAR ME SAY, I'LL DO IT FOR MONEY, I DO THIS
- 14 FOR THE LOVE OF THE COUNTY. YOU'LL NEVER HEAR ME SAY I'M GONNA
- 15 TRY TO COUNT TO 3. I WILL DO WHAT'S RIGHT. AND IF I'M ON THE
- 16 LOSING END OF A VOTE, I SLEEP WELL THAT NIGHT BECAUSE I DO
- 17 WHAT I BELIEVE IS RIGHT. AND IN THE END, IF YOU DO WHAT'S
- 18 RIGHT, THE POLITICS WORK OUT. SO, IF THIS BOARD IS SERIOUS
- 19 ABOUT MAKING CHANGES, I HOPE THAT YOU WILL SUPPORT THE
- 20 CREATION OF THIS ETHICS COMMISSION AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. ALL I
- 21 NEED ARE 2 MORE VOTES AND I CAN MAKE IT A LAW. SO, I HOPE WHEN
- 22 IT'S BROUGHT FORWARD THAT YOU WILL SUPPORT BEGINNING THIS
- 23 CHANGE THAT WE ALL FEEL IS SO DESPERATELY NEEDED TO ENSURE
- 24 THAT CORRUPTION DOES NOT TAKE PLACE IN THE COUNTY OF LOS
- 25 ANGELES. THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.



- 2 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU. IF IT'S OKAY BEFORE I
- 3 GO TO YOU SUPERVISOR HAHN, I JUST WANTED TO RESPOND TO A
- 4 COUPLE OF THINGS. FIRST, YOU BOTH ARE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT THAT
- 5 THESE ARE, SOME OF WHAT'S PROPOSED HERE CAN BE DONE BY THE
- 6 BOARD WITHOUT CHARTER REFORM. I THINK SOME OF THESE THINGS,
- 7 HOWEVER, ARE VERY IMPORTANT TO MAKE SURE THAT IT'S WRITTEN
- 8 INTO THE CHARTER. FOR EXAMPLE, ELIMINATING THE GREEN SHEET
- 9 ISN'T UP TO WHOMEVER IS ON THE BOARD. ACCORDING TO THIS
- 10 PROPOSAL, IT'S GONE FOREVER.

- 12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: CAN I, MADAM CHAIR, SINCE YOU'RE
- 13 RESPONDING, I JUST WANT TO SAY THAT I KNOW THAT WAS PUT IN
- 14 THERE BECAUSE POLLING MATTERS? IT'S NOT A SCIENTIFIC POLL,
- 15 IT'S A POLL OF WHAT ARE VOTERS GOING TO VOTE FOR IN ORDER TO
- 16 GET SOMETHING PASSED. ETHICS AND TRANSPARENCY. SO, I KNOW WHY
- 17 IT IS IN YOUR, I KNOW WHY YOU PUT IT IN THERE. YOU PUT IT IN
- 18 THERE BECAUSE YOU WANT TO GET THIS PASSED. AND POLLING SHOWS
- 19 THAT BIGGER GOVERNMENT IS NOT GOING TO SELL. AND NEITHER IS AN
- 20 ELECTED EXECUTIVE, BUT ETHICS WILL. BUT I'M HERE TO SAY THAT
- 21 IF YOU ARE SERIOUS ABOUT THE ETHICAL SIDE OF IT, THEN LET'S
- 22 BRING THAT FORWARD NOW.

- 24 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: CAN I FINISH NOW? THANKS. SO, I
- 25 JUST WANTED TO ADDRESS THAT BECAUSE IT ACTUALLY CAME FORWARD



- 1 FROM CONVERSATIONS I HAD WITH COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS
- 2 WHO EXPRESSED FRUSTRATION THAT THEY DIDN'T HAVE ENOUGH TIME TO
- 3 PARTICIPATE IN CONVERSATIONS WHEN SOMETHING SUBSTANTIVE WAS
- 4 SUBMITTED ON THE GREEN SHEET. SO, IT WASN'T BASED ON POLLING.
- 5 I DON'T THINK WE EVEN POLLED THAT. WHAT WE DO IS ACTUALLY
- 6 ENGAGE MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC AND ORGANIZATIONS WHO WANNA HAVE
- 7 A VOICE IN OUR GOVERNMENT. AND THAT'S A PIECE OF THIS REFORM
- 8 THAT WE THINK SHOULD BE CODIFIED IN A CHARTER AMENDMENT. WE
- 9 ALSO THINK A TRANSPARENT BUDGETING PROCESS. YES, WE COULD
- 10 CHANGE THAT TOMORROW. WE THINK THAT CODIFYING IT IN A CHARTER
- 11 AMENDMENT SO IT CONTINUES PAST THIS BOARD IS VERY IMPORTANT. I
- 12 ABSOLUTELY AGREE WITH THE DESCRIPTION THAT WAS GIVEN. WE
- 13 DIDN'T WANNA GET CAUGHT UP IN THE SEMANTICS OF MAYOR OF
- 14 COUNTY, MAYOR OF CITY, SO IT'S CALLED AN ELECTED EXECUTIVE.
- 15 BUT IT IS AN ELECTED EXECUTIVE. THERE WILL BE A DEPARTMENT OF
- 16 BUDGET AND MANAGEMENT THAT IS UNDER THAT ELECTED EXECUTIVE.
- 17 THERE WILL BE A DIRECTOR OF THAT DEPARTMENT, WHICH YOU COULD
- 18 CALL A CEO. I'M CALLING IT IN THIS PROPOSAL, WHICH WITH
- 19 SUPERVISOR HAHN, A DIRECTOR OF BUDGET AND MANAGEMENT. BUT
- 20 THAT'S ESSENTIALLY THE FUNCTION THAT WOULD BE HELD IN THAT
- 21 ROLE. SO, THEY ARE 2 SEPARATE THINGS. THEY WOULD CONTINUE TO
- 22 EXIST. I APPRECIATE THAT THERE'S QUESTION AROUND THE NUMBER,
- 23 AND AS YOU HEARD, EVEN FROM PEOPLE WHO HAVE STUDIED IT FOR
- 24 MANY, MANY YEARS, THERE IS NO PERFECT NUMBER. 9 IS MEASURED,
- 25 IT'S BEEN DISCUSSED FOR DECADES, IT IS SOMETHING PEOPLE HAVE



- 1 THOUGHT ABOUT, HAVE GRAPPLED WITH, HAVE DISCUSSED, AND YES, IN
- 2 THAT CASE, IT DOES HAVE STRONG PUBLIC SUPPORT. WE DID POLL
- 3 THAT. AND PEOPLE ARE, IN FACT, VERY MUCH INTERESTED IN SEEING
- 4 MORE THAN 5 PEOPLE REPRESENT THE 10,000,000 PEOPLE OF LOS
- 5 ANGELES COUNTY. RIGHT NOW, 5 PEOPLE GATEKEEP THEIR ABILITY TO
- 6 WEIGH IN ON THINGS LIKE THIS. AND I THINK IT IS IMPORTANT THAT
- 7 INSTEAD OF PROTECTING THAT POWER IN THESE 5 SEATS, WE OPEN UP
- 8 THAT POWER AND REMEMBER THAT IT ACTUALLY RESIDES WITH THE
- 9 PEOPLE AND GIVE MORE OPPORTUNITY FOR THAT PUBLIC PROCESS,
- 10 WHICH IS WHY WE DIDN'T CODIFY IN THIS PROPOSAL MANY OF THE
- 11 SPECIFICS YOU'RE ASKING QUESTIONS ABOUT. AND WE WANT THERE TO
- 12 BE AN ONGOING PUBLIC PROCESS THAT HAS STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT.
- 13 I APPRECIATE THAT IT COULD HAVE BEEN DONE IN A DIFFERENT WAY,
- 14 AND I ADMIT THAT THIS PROPOSAL IS NOT PERFECT. I AM NOT
- 15 INTERESTED IN LETTING PERFECT BE THE ENEMY OF THE GOOD IN THIS
- 16 MOMENT BECAUSE I BELIEVE THERE IS AN INTEREST AND AN
- 17 UNDERSTANDING OF THE VALUE OF THIS KIND OF CHARTER CHANGE
- 18 GIVEN THE CONVERSATION THAT'S HAPPENING NEXT DOOR IN THE CITY
- 19 OF LOS ANGELES AND GIVEN THE CONVERSATIONS THAT I'M HAVING
- 20 WHILE I AM ALSO TOO OUT IN THE DISTRICT MEETING WITH MY
- 21 CONSTITUENTS AND HEARING FROM THEM DIRECTLY. AND I DON'T THINK
- 22 IT'S IMPORTANT THAT ANY ONE PERSON'S PRESCRIPTIVE IDEA SHOULD
- 23 BE WHAT TURNS INTO A PUBLIC PROCESS. I THINK WHAT WE ARE
- 24 PROPOSING HERE IS ARCHITECTURAL CHANGE THAT ALLOWS FOR A VERY
- 25 ROBUST PUBLIC PROCESS GOING FORWARD, NOT JUST ON THIS CHANGE,



- 1 BUT ON PROPOSALS GOING FORWARD, AND I HOPE REMINDS THE PUBLIC
- 2 THAT THIS IS YOUR GOVERNMENT TO DECIDE, NOT THE 5 OF US TO
- 3 DECIDE. AND I ALSO WANT TO ADDRESS THAT I APPRECIATE, AND I
- 4 ACTUALLY READ BACK THE FIRST OP-ED FROM THE LA TIMES EDITORIAL
- 5 BOARD WHEN YOU, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, FIRST BROUGHT FORWARD
- 6 YOUR MOTION AND IT REFERENCED YOUR QUOTE IN THERE THAT THE
- 7 WORD ANGER WAS REFERENCED. AND I THINK A LOT OF THAT CAN BE
- 8 ATTRIBUTED TO HOW THE BROWN ACT PREVENTS US AS A BODY FROM
- 9 HAVING THIS KIND OF A CONVERSATION UNTIL WE GET INTO A SPACE
- 10 LIKE THIS. I CONCEDE THAT THERE IS A LOT OF FRUSTRATION WHEN
- 11 WE CANNOT HAVE THE KIND OF DELIBERATIVE PROCESS THAT PERHAPS
- 12 HAPPENS AT THE STATE OR FEDERAL LEVEL WHERE PEOPLE CAN ENGAGE
- 13 FOR AN EXTENDED PERIOD OF TIME. AND COULD THERE HAVE BEEN A
- 14 DIFFERENT PROCESS LEADING TO THIS POINT? YES. IN FACT, I THINK
- 15 ALL OF US TRIED TO DO THAT. AND I THINK WHAT WE HAVE IN THIS
- 16 PROPOSAL IS THE BASIC ARCHITECTURE OF SOME CHANGE, NOT
- 17 EVERYTHING THAT WAS PROPOSED, NOT EVERYTHING THAT WAS
- 18 ULTIMATELY CONSIDERED, BUT HOPEFULLY A PATHWAY FOR MORE
- 19 CONSIDERATION GOING FORWARD IN THE FUTURE. AND I HOPE THAT,
- 20 NOT TO SOUND TOO, I DON'T KNOW WHAT, BUT WE ALWAYS TALK ABOUT
- 21 PURSUING A MORE PERFECT UNION. AND I THINK THAT'S REALLY WHAT
- 22 THIS EFFORT IS. IT'S NOT GOING TO BE PERFECT TODAY, WHETHER IT
- 23 PASSES OR NOT, BUT WHAT WE CAN DO IS CONTINUE TO WORK ON IT TO
- 24 MAKE IT A MORE PERFECT PROCESS THAT IS REFLECTIVE OF THE
- 25 DESIRES OF OUR PUBLIC. SUPERVISOR HAHN.



- 2 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. AND YEAH, JUST TO,
- 3 TAKE UP THAT NUMBER 9 AGAIN, AND I THINK SUPERVISOR MITCHELL,
- 4 WHEN MY DAD WAS TALKING, HE SAID HE THOUGHT THERE SHOULD BE NO
- 5 LESS THAN 1 PER 1,000,000 RESIDENTS. AND AT THAT TIME THERE
- 6 WERE 7,000,000. SO, I THINK HE WAS SPEAKING ABOUT 7, BUT LATER
- 7 I HEARD HIM MANY TIMES IN HIS LIFE SAY 9, 11, JUST THE IDEA OF
- 8 EXPANDING THE BOARD. BUT ALSO, I DON'T THINK ANYBODY MENTIONED
- 9 YET THAT OUR INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING COMMISSION HERE IN THE
- 10 COUNTY AFTER THAT PROCESS PUT FORTH SOME RECOMMENDATIONS. AND
- 11 ONE OF THEIR RECOMMENDATIONS WAS EXPANDING THE NUMBER OF
- 12 SUPERVISORS TO 9. AND I THINK IT WAS THAT REDISTRICTING
- 13 PROCESS THAT I THINK, I'VE BEEN THROUGH SEVERAL REDISTRICTING
- 14 PROCESSES IN MY LIFE, I THINK THIS ONE PARTICULARLY WAS
- 15 GARNERED THE MORE THAN USUAL INTEREST OF THE COMMUNITY. NOW
- 16 THE SUPERVISORS UNDER THE RULES OF THE GAME WERE BARRED FROM
- 17 WEIGHING IN ON IT. WE WERE BARRED FROM EVEN TALKING TO A
- 18 COMMISSIONER. AND IT WAS A LITTLE BIT FRUSTRATING. WE WERE,
- 19 YOU KNOW, LISTENING OVER THE PHONE TO WHAT WAS HAPPENING. WE
- 20 LEARNED ABOUT NEW MAPS AS THEY WERE BEING DRAWN PRACTICALLY IN
- 21 THE ROOM. BUT I THINK A LOT OF PEOPLE AFTER THAT PROCESS
- 22 REALIZED HOW DIFFICULT IT REALLY WAS FOR THIS INDEPENDENT
- 23 COMMISSION OR ANY COMMISSION TO CARVE UP 10,000,000 PEOPLE
- 24 TRYING TO KEEP TOGETHER COMMUNITIES OF INTEREST IN A PIE THAT
- 25 ONLY HAD 5 SLICES. AND I THINK THE COMMUNITIES WERE IN A



- 1 LITTLE BIT OF SHOCK ON THAT FINAL MORNING WHEN I THINK THE MAP
- 2 THAT ENDED UP BEING ADOPTED WAS PUT OUT THAT LAST EVENING. IN
- 3 FACT, I DON'T EVEN THINK IT WAS CIRCULATED MUCH AMONG THE
- 4 COMMUNITIES. I REMEMBER MY STAFF SAYING, ARE YOU SITTING DOWN?
- 5 LET ME TELL YOU WHAT YOUR NEW DISTRICT IS. AND TO THINK THAT A
- 6 DISTRICT WOULD HAVE COMMUNITIES OF INTEREST BETWEEN THE PALOS
- 7 VERDES PENINSULA AND PICO RIVERA, YOU KNOW, IT WAS REALLY, YOU
- 8 KNOW, THAT'S A STRETCH. THAT'S A STRETCH. AND YET THESE
- 9 INDEPENDENT COMMISSIONERS ONLY HAD 5 SEATS TO CARVE UP THE
- 10 ENTIRE COUNTY WITH. AND I THINK MORE PEOPLE ALSO IN SOME, YOU
- 11 REMEMBER SOME OF OUR COMMUNITIES WERE VERY UPSET WHEN THEY
- 12 WOKE UP AND FOUND OUT THEY'D LOST THEIR SUPERVISOR AND NOW
- 13 SOMEBODY NEW WAS REPRESENTING THEM. AND THEY REALIZED, I
- 14 THINK, AT THAT POINT, THIS WOULD WORK A LOT BETTER IF WE COULD
- 15 DIVIDE THIS UP IN LARGER PIECES THAN JUST 5. AND, YOU KNOW,
- 16 I'M REALLY, IT HURTS ME REALLY, PARTICULARLY FOR YOU,
- 17 SUPERVISOR BARGER, BECAUSE I THINK WE THINK ALIKE A LOT ON
- 18 THIS BOARD. SO, IT HURTS ME TO FEEL YOU'RE REALLY UPSET ABOUT
- 19 THIS. I CAN FEEL IT. AND SUPERVISOR MITCHELL ALSO IS FEELING,
- 20 YOU KNOW, JUST A LITTLE CONCERNED ABOUT HOW THIS ALL CAME TO
- 21 BE. BECAUSE TO BE HONEST WITH YOU, ALL 5 OF US HAVE AT ONE
- 22 TIME OR ANOTHER SUPPORTED THE IDEA OF EXPANDED BOARD. WE'VE
- 23 SUPPORTED THE IDEA OF REFORMS. WE'VE SUPPORTED THE IDEA OF
- 24 MAKING THIS GOVERNMENT BETTER. SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, WHEN YOU
- 25 CAME FROM SACRAMENTO, YOU SAID THERE ARE A LOT OF THINGS WE



- 1 DID IN SACRAMENTO THAT MADE SENSE. I NEVER SERVED IN
- 2 SACRAMENTO, I KNOW YOU DID, SO I DIDN'T THINK A LOT OF WHAT
- 3 YOU DID MADE SENSE, BUT NO. BUT YOU SAID LET'S INSTITUTE SOME
- 4 OF THOSE CHANGES HERE. AND I THINK WE CAN MAKE IT BETTER. SO,
- 5 I THINK ALL 5 OF US, AND SUPERVISOR HORVATH, WHEN YOU CAME IN
- 6 AS THE YOUNGEST MEMBER, YOUR INAUGURAL SPEECH WAS ON FIRE
- 7 ABOUT MAKING THIS COUNTY GOVERNMENT BETTER AND NOT WANTING TO
- 8 WAIT. YOU HAD SOME LINE ABOUT IF YOU THINK I'M GOING TO WAIT
- 9 FOR CHANGES TO COME TO THIS COUNTY, YOU'VE GOT ANOTHER THING
- 10 COMING BECAUSE ME AND ALL THE YOUNG PEOPLE THAT FOLLOW ME WANT
- 11 TO SEE CHANGES IN COUNTY GOVERNMENT. SO, I THINK ALL 5 OF US
- 12 HAS WANTED TO GET TO THIS POINT. I THINK FOR ME, AND I HOPE
- 13 YOU DON'T QUESTION OUR MOTIVES OF WHY WE BROUGHT THIS FORWARD
- 14 NOW. FOR ME, IT WAS JUST, AND MAYBE I'LL HAVE ONE OF YOU,
- 15 FERNANDO, SPEAK TO WHY IT IS DIFFERENT NOW. WHAT MADE IT
- 16 DIFFERENT? YOU KNOW, I'VE ADVOCATED FOR MORE SUPERVISORS FOR A
- 17 VERY LONG TIME. I WAS ON THE CHARTER REFORM COMMISSION IN THE
- 18 CITY OF LOS ANGELES. I LEARNED A LOT ON THAT CHARTER REFORM
- 19 COMMISSION. ONE OF THE THINGS I LEARNED AT THAT TIME, VOTERS
- 20 WERE NOT READY TO ADD WHAT THEY CONSIDERED TO BE MORE
- 21 POLITICIANS. WE HAD A CHARTER THAT WE ACTUALLY PROPOSED TO THE
- 22 VOTERS AND WE ADDED 2 AMENDMENTS ON THE BALLOT. ONE WAS TO
- 23 CREASE THE CITY COUNCIL, I'M TRYING TO REMEMBER MAYBE BY 21
- 24 AND 1 BY 25. SO SEPARATE AMENDMENTS. BOTH OF THOSE AMENDMENTS
- 25 FAILED. THE CITY CHARTER WAS OVERWHELMINGLY PASSED BY THE



- 1 VOTERS. WHAT MAKES THIS TIME DIFFERENT? AND YES, I BELIEVE IT
- 2 IS THE PACKAGE, RIGHT? AND I DO BELIEVE THAT WE'RE ENSURING
- 3 THE VOTERS THAT IT'S NOT JUST ADDING MORE SEATS UP HERE.
- 4 THERE'S A LOT MORE TO THIS THAT WILL MAKE GOVERNMENT BETTER
- 5 FOR THEM. AND IN TERMS OF IN ANY WAY, SUPERVISOR BARGER, I WAS
- 6 THINKING ABOUT WHAT YOU SAID ABOUT YOU'RE CONCERNED ABOUT
- 7 PUTTING THIS SIDE BY SIDE WITH A PROPOSAL WHICH WE ALL CARE
- 8 VERY MUCH ABOUT MEASURE A. MY FEELING IS WHEN WE'RE ASKING
- 9 VOTERS TO RAISE THEIR TAXES, I ACTUALLY THINK HAVING THIS
- 10 REFORM PACKAGE ON THE SAME BALLOT GIVES THEM A MEASURE OF IT
- 11 IS GOING TO BE DIFFERENT, THE STATUS QUO IS GOING TO CHANGE,
- 12 IS IT GOING TO SOLVE HOMELESSNESS THAT WE HAVE 9 SUPERVISORS
- 13 AND A NEW COUNTY EXECUTIVE, ELECTED EXECUTIVE, BUT I THINK
- 14 IT'S THE IDEA THAT WE'RE PUTTING IN A LOT OF OTHER THINGS THAT
- 15 SHOULD MAKE COUNTY GOVERNMENT WORK BETTER. AND WHEN THE VOTERS
- 16 AGREE TO GIVE US THEIR TAXES TO SOLVE A NUMBER OF PROBLEMS, I
- 17 THINK THEY'LL FEEL MORE CONFIDENT THAT THIS STRUCTURE OF
- 18 GOVERNMENT WILL SUPPORT USING THEIR DOLLARS TO THE BEST
- 19 POSSIBLE WAY TO ADDRESS THOSE PROBLEMS. SO JUST BACK TO, I
- 20 WANT TO, YOU KNOW, I DO WANT TO SEE THESE REFORMS EMBEDDED IN
- 21 OUR CITY CHARTER SO THAT ANY FUTURE BOARD CAN'T CHANGE IT
- 22 WITHOUT GOING BACK TO THE VOTERS.

24 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: COUNTY CHARTER.

- 1 SUP. JANICE HAHN: DID I SAY CITY CHARTER? YEAH. COUNTY
- 2 CHARTER. I THINK THAT'S IMPORTANT. AND THAT'S WHY I LIKE THAT
- 3 THEY'RE IN THIS MEASURE. WHY IS THIS DIFFERENT? WHAT ARE THE
- 4 VOTERS FEELING?

- 6 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: A LOT OF IDEAS OF WHY IT'S DIFFERENT, BUT
- 7 I THINK, NO, SARAH, YOU ALLUDED TO IT EARLIER ABOUT WHAT'S
- 8 HAPPENING WITH THE CITY AND WHAT'S GOING TO BE ON THE BALLOT
- 9 FOR THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, WHICH MAKES UP 40% OF THE COUNTY.
- 10 AND SO THOSE VOTERS WILL BE FACED WITH REFORM ON THE BALLOT.

- 12 DR. SARA SADHWANI: YEAH, I MEAN, ABSOLUTELY. AS I SAID BEFORE,
- 13 2024 WILL BE THE YEAR OF REFORM IN LOS ANGELES CITY FOR SURE,
- 14 AND HOPEFULLY WITHIN THE COUNTY ALSO. LET'S BE HONEST, THE
- 15 CITY AND COUNTY HAVE FACED SOME DARK DAYS BETWEEN COVID, THE
- 16 HOMELESSNESS CRISIS, SKYROCKETING HOUSING RATES. IT HASN'T
- 17 ALWAYS BEEN EASY TO LIVE IN LA COUNTY OR THE CITY. AND THIS IS
- 18 AN OPPORTUNITY THAT PEOPLE I THINK ARE VERY EXCITED ABOUT
- 19 THESE KINDS OF REFORMS. I WOULD ALSO ADD SPECIFICALLY TO THE
- 20 ETHICS PIECE. THE ETHICS COMMISSION AT THE CITY IS EMBEDDED IN
- 21 THE CHARTER BECAUSE JUST AS THIS BODY COULD CREATE AN ETHICS
- 22 COMMISSION, A BODY 2 YEARS FROM NOW, 5 YEARS FROM NOW, COULD
- 23 GET RID OF IT. SIMILARLY, ONE OF THE ETHICS REFORMS AT THE
- 24 CITY LEVEL THAT WE'RE PUSHING FOR IS TO ENSURE A MANDATED
- 25 BUDGET FOR THE ETHICS COMMISSION, BECAUSE EVEN ONCE IT'S



- 1 WRITTEN INTO THE CHARTER, IT'S ENTIRELY POSSIBLE, I'M NOT
- 2 SUGGESTING YOU ALL, BUT IT'S ENTIRELY POSSIBLE THAT A FUTURE
- 3 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS COULD UNDERCUT THE FUNDING SO THAT THAT
- 4 ETHICS COMMISSION BECOMES NOTHING MORE THAN A PIECE OF PAPER.
- 5 SO, I WOULD VERY MUCH ENCOURAGE YOU TO MAINTAIN THE ETHICS
- 6 COMMISSION COMPONENT OF THIS BECAUSE IT IS AN IMPORTANT
- 7 COMPONENT TO HAVE IN THE CHARTER.

- 9 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: AND JUST THINK ABOUT THE LAST 5 YEARS OR
- 10 SO IN TERMS OF REFORM IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT, CITIES AND
- 11 COUNTIES. WE HAVE A TREMENDOUS AMOUNT OF NEW INDEPENDENT
- 12 REDISTRICTING COMMISSIONS TO BEGIN WITH. NUMBER 2, I SERVED AS
- 13 THE PRESIDENT OF THE ELECTORAL REFORM COMMISSION FOR THE CITY
- 14 OF LOS ANGELES IN 2016, WHICH PUT ON THE BALLOT TO MOVE THE
- 15 ELECTIONS FROM THE ODD YEAR TO THE EVEN YEAR, AND THAT
- 16 ACTUALLY PASSED WITH OVER 70%. SINCE THAT TIME, ANOTHER 50 OR
- 17 MORE CITIES IN CALIFORNIA HAVE DONE THE SAME. WE TALK ABOUT
- 18 REDISTRICTING. THERE'S NO NEED TO REDISTRICT IF YOU HAVE AT
- 19 LARGE ELECTIONS, BUT JUST IN THE LAST 5 OR SO YEARS, OVER 75
- 20 CITIES IN CALIFORNIA HAVE HAD THE REFORM OF MOVING FROM AT
- 21 LARGE TO DISTRICT ELECTIONS. SO, THERE IS A TREMENDOUS AMOUNT
- 22 OF REFORM OCCURRING AT THE MUNICIPAL LEVEL, AND WHEN WE LOOK
- 23 BACK AT THIS ERA, THIS WILL BE KNOWN AS THE ERA OF MUNICIPAL
- 24 STRUCTURAL REFORM IN CALIFORNIA, AND THIS IS PART OF IT.

- 3 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I JUST WANT TO BE
- 4 BRIEF ON THIS ITEM, AND IT WAS RAISED REGARDING UNINCORPORATED
- 5 AREAS. THE FIRST SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT REPRESENTS THE LARGEST
- 6 NUMBER OF PEOPLE IN UNINCORPORATED AREAS AND THEY'RE VERY
- 7 DISTINCT. EAST LA HAS ABOUT 119, 000. COMMUNITY HAS EXISTED
- 8 LONG BEFORE MANY OF US WERE AROUND, AND IT CONTINUES TO BE
- 9 THERE AND RESILIENT. WE ALSO IN MY DISTRICT NOW HAVE HACIENDA
- 10 HEIGHTS, WHICH IS, I BELIEVE, APPROXIMATELY 55, 000 PEOPLE,
- 11 AND ROWLAND HEIGHTS, WHICH IS CLOSE TO ALMOST 50,000, THEY ARE
- 12 VERY DIFFERENT PLACES GEOGRAPHICALLY, POLITICALLY, AND ALL THE
- 13 OTHER THINGS THAT YOU CAN THINK OF INCOME-WISE, EDUCATION-
- 14 WISE. SOME NEEDS ARE VERY DIFFERENT IN EAST LOS ANGELES, AND
- 15 THAT'S WHERE THE COUNTY HAS WEIGHED IN TO, AS I AND THE
- 16 PREVIOUS BOARDS TRY TO PROVIDE MORE ASSISTANCE. BUT I KIND OF
- 17 DISAGREE WITH THE NOTION THAT THE CEO OR ELECTED PERSON WOULD
- 18 OVERSEE ALL THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS. I MEAN, WHY THEN ARE WE
- 19 GOING TO ELECT AND CREATE SEATS THAT ARE EVENTUALLY GOING TO
- 20 COVER THE FIRST DISTRICT? AND THAT WILL INCLUDE THESE 3
- 21 PARTICULAR AREAS. MAY IT BE 2 DIFFERENT SEATS THERE. AND PART
- 22 OF IT IS BECAUSE WE WANT COMMUNITIES OF INTEREST TO STAY
- 23 TOGETHER AND PART OF IT HAS TO DO WITH DEMOGRAPHICS AND MAKEUP
- 24 AND ALL OF THAT AND WE HEARD A LOT OF THAT DURING THE
- 25 REDISTRICTING COMMISSION DISCUSSIONS WHEN OUR DISTRICTS WERE



- 1 BEING RECONFIGURED. SO, CAN YOU PLEASE TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT
- 2 THAT?

- 4 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: SURE, I DIDN'T MEAN IT AS A STATEMENT OF
- 5 FACT AND MORE OF A HYPOTHESIS THAT COLLECTIVELY WITH THE
- 6 INDIVIDUAL SUPERVISOR WHO REPRESENT THAT AREA AND ITS UNIQUE
- 7 ISSUES BECAUSE AS YOU STATED, YOU'RE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT, EAST LA
- 8 IS DIFFERENT THAN ROLLING HEIGHTS. HOWEVER, ALL UNINCORPORATED
- 9 AREAS DO HAVE SOME SIMILAR ISSUES THAT THE COUNTY TAKES CARE
- 10 OF PUBLIC SAFETY LAND USE ETC AND THERE YOU CAN HAVE THE
- 11 ELECTED EXECUTIVE LOOK AT THOSE ISSUES COUNTYWIDE AND SO MORE
- 12 OF A HYPOTHESIS --

14 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND WITH THE SUPERVISOR

16 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: CORRECT ABSOLUTELY

- 18 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: WHO REPRESENTS THE AREA WEIGHING IN AND
- 19 HOPEFULLY LEADING THAT DISCUSSION.

20

21 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: ABSOLUTELY.

- 23 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: EVEN MORE IMPORTANTLY, WE REALLY DIDN'T EVEN
- 24 TALK ABOUT THE DEPARTMENTS COMING IN TO JUSTIFY THEIR BUDGETS
- 25 BECAUSE THAT THEREIN ALSO LIES WHERE THE STRUCTURAL PROBLEMS I



- 1 THINK INHIBIT US FROM ACTUALLY PROVIDING BETTER SERVICES TO
- 2 RESIDENTS IN AN INCORPORATED AREA.

- 4 DR. FERNANDO GUERRA: THIS IS A VERY IMPORTANT POINT THAT
- 5 YOU'RE MAKING AND JUST TO EMPHASIZE IT. IN THESE PROPOSALS
- 6 FROM MY OPINION, THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IS NOT GIVING UP
- 7 POWER, IT'S SHARING POWER. THAT'S A BIG DIFFERENCE. IS YOU'RE
- 8 NOT BEING ABSOLVED FROM TAKING CARE OF THE ISSUES THAT YOU'RE
- 9 CURRENTLY TAKING CARE OF. YOU'RE GONNA SHARE IN THAT POWER
- 10 FROM POLICY TO POLICY. THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IS NOT GIVING
- 11 UP ANY POWER. IT IS SHARING THAT POWER IN MANY AREAS.

- 13 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND I AGREE WITH THAT AND I ALSO THINK THAT
- 14 IT'S IMPORTANT THAT THERE WILL BE A HIGHER LEVEL OF
- 15 TRANSPARENCY BECAUSE THEREIN LIES THE QUESTION OF WHETHER OR
- 16 NOT THERE IS EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS TO DIFFERENT
- 17 UNINCORPORATED AREAS. AND IN MY OPINION, SOMEWHAT WHAT ZEV
- 18 SAID OR WAS OUOTED ABOUT REGARDING THAT ALL WE DO IS TAKE CARE
- 19 OF THE POOR AND THE NEEDY AND THE UNCHARTERED. WELL, TO A
- 20 CERTAIN EXTENT, THAT'S CORRECT, BUT NOT COMPLETELY, BECAUSE WE
- 21 DO HAVE AREAS IN UNINCORPORATED EAST LA AND EVEN IN THE SAN
- 22 GABRIEL VALLEY THAT ARE VERY, VERY HARD PRESSED FOR SERVICES.
- 23 IN FACT, THERE ARE ISLANDS OF LACK OF SERVICE. THEY ARE ON
- 24 THEIR OWN ISLAND AND THAT IS NOT FAIR. SO, I'M HOPING THAT
- 25 THIS WILL HELP US REGENERATE AND RECONFIGURE AND ACTUALLY HAVE



- 1 GOOD REPRESENTATION THERE THAT IS COMING FROM THOSE PARTICULAR
- 2 NEIGHBORHOODS AND COMMUNITIES. SO THOSE ARE JUST MY THOUGHTS,
- 3 BUT I UNDERSTAND, I JUST DON'T WANT PEOPLE TO BE CONFUSED.

- 5 DR. SARA SADHWANI: IF I MAY JUST ADD, I THINK TO SUPERVISOR
- 6 HAHN'S POINT, WITH A LARGER NUMBER OF SEATS, THESE VARIOUS
- 7 UNINCORPORATED AREAS, YOU ARE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT, DO CONSTITUTE
- 8 COMMUNITIES OF INTEREST FROM A REDISTRICTING STANDPOINT.
- 9 CERTAINLY WE SAW THIS AND LOOKED VERY CLOSELY AT THESE
- 10 NEIGHBORHOODS AT THE STATE'S COMMISSION AS WELL. ROLAND
- 11 HEIGHTS AND HACIENDA HEIGHTS HAVE VERY LARGE ASIAN AMERICAN
- 12 POPULATIONS. THEY HAD SOME STRONG THOUGHTS ABOUT WHAT KIND OF
- 13 DISTRICTING THEY WANTED TO SEE. SIMILARLY WITH EAST LA, RIGHT,
- 14 A HISTORIC LATINO COMMUNITY. THERE CAN ALSO BE VOTING RIGHTS
- 15 ACT IMPLICATIONS, BUT WHEN WE'RE TALKING ABOUT A DISTRICT OF
- 16 2,000,000 PEOPLE, YOU LOSE MUCH OF THE VRA OPPORTUNITIES. IT'S
- 17 NOT THE SAME TIME PERIOD AS WHEN THE VRA LAWSUIT IN THE 1980S
- 18 OPERATED TO SUPPORT THE CREATION OF THE EAST LA DISTRICT THAT
- 19 GLORIA MOLINA ULTIMATELY WON. THESE DISTRICTS ARE SO LARGE
- 20 THAT WE HAVE INCREDIBLE DILUTION OF VARIOUS COMMUNITIES OF
- 21 COLOR.

- 23 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU, THAT'S ALL. THANK YOU, MADAM
- 24 CHAIR.

- 3 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU. TO THAT LAST POINT IN TERMS
- 4 OF DELUSION AND HOW THE LAWSUITS, MALL DEATH, NAACP LEGAL
- 5 DEFENSE FUND, ALL OF THOSE WHO HAVE FOUGHT IN TERMS OF EOUITY
- 6 AND DIVERSITY. IF WE'RE NOW TALKING ABOUT A COUNTYWIDE ELECTED
- 7 WHO ULTIMATELY HAS THE TRUE POWER OF THE PURSE STRINGS,
- 8 THEREIN LIES THE ONGOING CHALLENGE IN TERMS OF HOW TRUE EQUITY
- 9 IS EXPERIENCED AND MANIFESTED IN TERMS OF THE ALLOCATION OF
- 10 RESOURCES. I JUST WANNA PUT THAT BACK OUT THERE. SUPERVISOR
- 11 BARGER, THANK YOU FOR YOUR COMMENTS. AS WE SAID IN THE STATE
- 12 LEGISLATURE, CLEARLY I HAD AN AUTHOR PROBLEM, BECAUSE THE
- 13 AUTHOR WAS ME, SO IT WAS PROBLEMATIC IN TERMS OF MOVING SOME
- 14 OF THOSE ISSUES FORWARD. YOU KNOW, AND I JUST WANTED TO
- 15 CLARIFY WHEN YOU SAID THAT WE COULD ADVOCATE BEFORE THE
- 16 REDISTRICTING COMMISSION, NO WE CANNOT. HANDS OFF. I WOULDN'T
- 17 EVEN ON THE PHONE LOOKING AT MAPS WHEN I HEAR HANDS OFF. I
- 18 BELIEVE IT'S HANDS OFF AND I WAS WILLING TO REPRESENT WHOEVER
- 19 THE COMMISSION THOUGHT APPROPRIATE TO PUT IN THE SECOND
- 20 DISTRICT AND I'VE WORKED HARD TO DO THAT EVER SINCE THE MAPS
- 21 CAME OUT. YES

- 23 DR. SARA SADHWANI: I WOULD JUST ADD THAT IT THERE ISN'T
- 24 ANYTHING PREVENTING THIS BOARD FROM SUBMITTING A LETTER, SOME
- 25 SORT OF TESTIMONY. MOST CERTAINLY WE RECEIVED ALL SORTS OF



- 1 TESTIMONY FROM CITIES, COUNTIES, ET CETERA. AND CERTAINLY,
- 2 YOU'RE RIGHT, HANDS OFF FOR SURE, BUT A LETTER THAT'S SIGNED
- 3 BY THE ENTIRE BOARD ASKING FOR UNINCORPORATED AREAS TO BE
- 4 CONSIDERED AS WHOLE, I DON'T THINK WOULD BE SEEN AS A
- 5 VIOLATION OF THOSE.

- 7 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I APPRECIATE THAT. AND I THINK THAT
- 8 THERE IS FOLLOWING THE LETTER OF THE LAW AND PERCEPTION. AND
- 9 SO BASED ON THAT, I WILL REMAIN HANDS OFF ON ANY REDISTRICTING
- 10 COMMISSION DECISIONS. YOU KNOW, I GO BACK TO THE QUESTIONS I
- 11 HAVE AND MY CONCERN, AND YOU STATED, YOU KNOW, IT DEPENDS ON
- 12 WHO GETS ELECTED CEO. AND THEREIN LIES THE DANGER FROM MY
- 13 PERSPECTIVE. AND I THINK YOU TALKED ABOUT PERSONALITIES VERSUS
- 14 A CLEAR STRUCTURE, A CLEAR UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT THE JOB IS
- 15 BEFORE PEOPLE MAKE THE FOREVER LIFE-CHANGING DECISION TO RUN
- 16 FOR OFFICE IN THE FIRST PLACE. AND SO, IT'S NOT ABOUT WHO
- 17 SELF-SELECTS. I THINK I CAN DO THAT BASED ON THEIR PERCEPTION
- 18 OF WHAT THE JOB IS. IT REALLY NEEDS TO BE CLEARLY ARTICULATED
- 19 WHAT THE JOB IS FROM MY PERSPECTIVE TO EVEN FIGURE OUT FOR A
- 20 VOTER TO FIGURE OUT IF THIS PERSON WITH THIS SKILL SET IS THE
- 21 BEST PERSON FOR THE JOB. SO, THIS NOTION ABOUT IT DEPENDS ON
- 22 WHO THE ELECTED CEO IS MAKES ME INCREDIBLY NERVOUS. AS A
- 23 VOTER, THAT NEEDS TO BE CLEARLY ARTICULATED AND DOCUMENTED SO
- 24 ALL OF US UNDERSTAND THE SKILL SETS AND THE CAPACITY WE ARE
- 25 LOOKING FOR TO MEET THE NEEDS OF LA COUNTY. AND SO, MAKING



- 1 SURE THAT'S DONE INITIALLY AS OPPOSED TO PERSONALITY POLITICS
- 2 I THINK IS REALLY IMPORTANT. WITH REGARD TO ETHICS AND THE
- 3 LENGTHY CONVERSATION AROUND ETHICS, FOR ME, ETHICS IS THE
- 4 FLOOR. THERE HAVE BEEN ANY NUMBER OF ELECTED BODIES THAT HAD
- 5 ETHICS COMMISSIONS AND ETHICS OVERSIGHTS, AND ETHICS IS ALMOST
- 6 LIKE AN AUDIT. ETHICS CATCHES IT ON THE BACK END. NOW THEY MAY
- 7 PUT SOME CRITERIA INTO PLACE. SO THAT IS WHY FOR ME PROCESS IS
- 8 SO CRITICALLY IMPORTANT. THAT PROCESS IS TRANSPARENT AND
- 9 AVAILABLE TO ALL TO PREVENT ETHICS VIOLATIONS ON THE BACK END.
- 10 SO, I APPRECIATE WHETHER WE DO ETHICS NOW, WHETHER IT'S IN THE
- 11 CHARTER, IT CAN CHANGE. ETHICS COMMISSIONS IN ISOLATION IS NOT
- 12 ENOUGH TO PREVENT NOT ONLY INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOR, BUT JUST A
- 13 LACK OF TRANSPARENCY THAT ISN'T WELCOMING AND TRULY REFLECTIVE
- 14 OF A DEMOCRATIC FORM OF GOVERNMENT. SO, ETHICS I'M ABSOLUTELY
- 15 SUPPORTIVE OF WHETHER IT'S WE DO IT NOW, IT'S LATER. I JUST
- 16 WANTED TO YOU KNOW SAY OUT LOUD THAT WE SHOULDN'T ACCEPT
- 17 ASSUME THAT THAT'S THE CATCH-ALL. PUTTING PROCESS IN PLACE FOR
- 18 BETTER UPFRONT CLEARER GOVERNANCE, UPFRONT BUDGETING PROCESS
- 19 THAT ALLOWS AND ENCOURAGES PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT, I THINK SHOULD
- 20 BE OUR NORTH STAR. AND SPEAKING OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, MADAM
- 21 CHAIR, YOU TALKED ABOUT COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TOOK PLACE, AND
- 22 WAS IT COUNTYWIDE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT THAT HELPED INFORM IT?
- 23 WAS IT IN THE AUTHORS DISTRICTS ALONE? IF YOU COULD JUST
- 24 PROVIDE THAT CLARITY.



- 1 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: WHEN I TALKED ABOUT COMMUNITY
- 2 ENGAGEMENT, I TALKED ABOUT THE GOVERNANCE REFORM TASK FORCE
- 3 WILL ENGAGE THE COMMUNITY GOING FORWARD IN THAT PROCESS.

- 5 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I MEANT YOU ALSO REFERENCED COMMUNITY
- 6 ENGAGEMENT HAPPENED TO HELP INFORM THE PROPOSAL BEFORE US AND
- 7 SO I'M WONDERING IF THAT WAS COUNTYWIDE OR DISTRICT SPECIFIC.

- 9 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: I KNOW THAT I'VE ENGAGED MY
- 10 DISTRICT AND ENGAGED FOLKS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY PERSONALLY
- 11 AND I KNOW THAT SOME OF OUR PANELISTS HERE TODAY HAVE ALSO
- 12 WORKED THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS AND MY
- 13 EXPECTATION IS THAT THIS OPENS THE DOOR FOR MUCH MORE
- 14 ENGAGEMENT.

- 16 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I GET THE GO-FORWARD. I'M TRYING TO
- 17 GET CLEAR ABOUT WHO THE COMMUNITY WAS THAT WAS ENGAGED TO HELP
- 18 INFORM WHAT'S IN FRONT OF US. SO THANK YOU FOR THAT. SEVERAL
- 19 REFERENCES HAVE BEEN MADE TO POLLING. ARE THE POLLING RESULTS
- 20 SOMETHING THAT WE ALL CAN SEEK AND THE POLLING RESULT, LIKE
- 21 WHO WAS POLLED, WHAT WAS, WHAT THE QUESTIONS WERE, CAN THAT BE
- 22 MADE PUBLICLY AVAILABLE?

- 24 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: WE PUT OUT A POLLING MEMO THAT IS
- 25 PUBLICLY AVAILABLE. HAPPY TO MAKE SURE YOUR OFFICE GETS IT.



- 2 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I APPRECIATE THAT, THANK YOU VERY
- 3 MUCH. THE REFERENCE TO THE FACT THAT WE ROTATE CHAIRS ON AN
- 4 ANNUAL BASIS, THAT'S A POLICY DECISION OF THIS BODY. AND SO,
- 5 IF THAT WAS PRECEDED, BECAUSE THERE'S BEEN LOTS OF REFERENCES

- 2 COMMITTEES. THAT THE COMMITTEES DID EVERYTHING CONTRARY TO
- 3 WHAT THE COMMITTEE DESCRIPTION SAID AND THEY WERE DOING ALL
- 4 KINDS OF THE COMMITTEES YOU ARE DOING ALL KINDS OF THINGS
- 5 THEY'RE NOT SUPPOSED TO BE DOING. YOU GUYS SHOULDN'T BE TRYING
- 6 TO EMPOWER OTHER PEOPLE FOR THINGS THEY HAVE NO POWERS FOR OR

- 20 PROBATION FACILITIES, WHICH WAS HELD BY SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.
- 21 FOR MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC ON THE TELEPHONE, PLEASE PRESS 1 AND
- 22 0 NOW TO COMMENT ON THIS ITEM.

- 24 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I KNOW
- 25 THAT THERE WERE A NUMBER OF ADVOCATES WHO WERE HERE TODAY.



- 1 COME ON UP, MR. DYD DIRECTOR, IN CASE ANYBODY HAS QUESTIONS. I
- 2 KNOW THAT THERE WERE A NUMBER OF ADVOCATES WHO'VE BEEN HERE
- 3 ALL MORNING WHO HAD TO LEAVE, SO I JUST WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE
- 4 THAT THEY WERE HERE AND APPRECIATE THEIR COMMITMENT. THE
- 5 MOTION WOULD GRANT THE DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT TIME-
- 6 LIMITED DELEGATED AUTHORITY TO EXPEDITE CONTRACTS FOR YOUTH
- 7 PROGRAMMING. THE PURPOSE IS TO MEET THE URGENT NEEDS OF YOUTH
- 8 IN PROBATION'S CARE AS WELL AS DURING THEIR REENTRY. OUR
- 9 OFFICE HAS RECEIVED HUNDREDS OF COMMENTS FROM YOUTH, PARENTS,
- 10 ADVOCATES, AND OTHER CONSTITUENTS PERTAINING TO THE LACK OF
- 11 CONSISTENCY OF PROGRAMMING AT LOS PADRINOS JUVENILE HALL.
- 12 WHILE RECENT DEVELOPMENTS HAVE RAISED THE LEVEL OF URGENCY,
- 13 THIS MOTION HAS BEEN IN THE WORKS FOR A COUPLE OF MONTHS. IT
- 14 TOOK A HERCULEAN EFFORT TO COME INTO COMPLIANCE WITH THE
- 15 BSCC'S REGULATIONS, AND THIS INCLUDED MEETING THE REQUIREMENT
- 16 OF PROVIDING A MINIMUM AMOUNT OF CONSISTENT PROGRAMMING IN OUR
- 17 JUVENILE HALLS. AS WE ALL KNOW, MAINTAINING COMPLIANCE IN THIS
- 18 AREA IN THE EYES OF THE BSEC CONTINUES TO BE A CHALLENGE. SO
- 19 IT'S CRITICAL TO NOT ONLY MAINTAIN COMPLIANCE, BUT TO
- 20 GENERALLY PROVIDE THE SERVICES OUR YOUTH, FRANKLY, NEED AND
- 21 DESERVE. COMPLIANCE IS THE FLOOR. OUR GOAL IS TO TRULY PROVIDE
- 22 THEM THE SERVICES THEY DESERVE. AND DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH
- 23 DEVELOPMENT IS WELL POSITIONED TO DELIVER OUALITY PROGRAMMING
- 24 THAT ENGAGES YOUTH AND SUPPORTS THEIR DEVELOPMENT. THESE KINDS
- 25 OF PROGRAMS ARE FUNDAMENTAL TO THEIR WELL-BEING AND THE



- 1 OVERALL SAFETY OF PROBATION FACILITIES. DYD HAS TAKEN STEPS
- 2 WITHIN ITS CURRENT AUTHORITY TO RESPOND TO URGENT PROGRAMMING
- 3 NEEDS, AND WE APPRECIATE YOU FOR THAT. THIS INCLUDES INVESTING
- 4 IN EXISTING CONTRACTS AND PARTNERSHIPS WITH OTHER DEPARTMENTS
- 5 TO EXPAND SUPPORTIVE SERVICES. DYD HAS ALSO BEEN ABLE TO,
- 6 USING DELEGATED AUTHORITY, BRING CREDIBLE MESSENGERS TO
- 7 MULTIPLE FACILITIES. DYD ALSO USED DELEGATED AUTHORITY TO
- 8 QUICKLY BRING THE DRUM CORPS PROGRAM TO BARRY J. NIDORF
- 9 JUVENILE HALL. THE INNER CITY YOUTH ORCHESTRA OF L.A. WAS THE
- 10 ONLY ORGANIZATION THAT WAS WILLING AND ABLE TO PROVIDE THIS
- 11 TYPE OF CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE PROGRAMMING, AND THAT WAS IN
- 12 RESPONSE TO THE YOUNG PEOPLE SAYING WHAT THEY WANTED IN THEIR
- 13 PROGRAMMING. IT WASN'T JUST WHAT WE THOUGHT WOULD BE A BROAD
- 14 IDEA FOR THEM, BUT IN OUR EFFORT TO RESPOND TO WHAT THEY'VE
- 15 ASKED FOR, WE'RE HAVING TO FIND ORGANIZATIONS WHO HAVE THE
- 16 CAPACITY AND ARE WILLING TO DO THAT. HOWEVER, THERE REMAINS A
- 17 NEED TO ADDRESS PROGRAMMING GAPS WITH A SENSE OF URGENCY.
- 18 WHILE OUR BOARD TYPICALLY RELIES ON THE COMPETITIVE BID
- 19 PROCESS TO PROCURE SERVICES, THE COUNTY CANNOT WAIT A FULL
- 20 YEAR TO FILL THESE CRITICAL SERVICE GAPS. SO AGAIN, THIS IS A
- 21 TIME LIMITED, EMPHASIZING TIME LIMITED, DELEGATED AUTHORITY
- 22 THAT WOULD ENABLE DYD TO CONTRACT WITH COMMUNITY-BASED
- 23 ORGANIZATIONS THROUGH AN EXPEDITED PROCESS. TO ENHANCE
- 24 TRANSPARENCY AND OVERSIGHT, DYD WOULD NOTIFY THE BOARD A MONTH
- 25 IN ADVANCE ABOUT INTENDED CONTRACT AWARDS. DYD HAS IDENTIFIED



- 1 SEVERAL ORGANIZATIONS WHO CAN RAMP UP SERVICES OUICKLY UPON
- 2 CONTRACT EXECUTION, ALLOWING US TO SAVE CRITICAL TIME AND
- 3 STEPS. SO, IT'S CRITICAL THAT THE BOARD GIVE DYD THE
- 4 FLEXIBILITY IT NEEDS TO MEET THESE URGENT NEEDS OUICKLY, NOT
- 5 ONLY FOR BSCC'S EXPECTATION, BUT MORE IMPORTANTLY FROM MY
- 6 PERSPECTIVE, TO MEET THE NEEDS OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE IN OUR
- 7 CARE. AND I RESPECTFULLY ASK FOR AN AYE VOTE.

9 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR BARGER.

- 11 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THANK YOU. AND THANK YOU FOR BRINGING
- 12 THIS MOTION FORWARD, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL. THERE IS NO OUESTION
- 13 THAT THERE'S A NEED FOR ADDITIONAL PROGRAMMING AND SERVICES
- 14 INSIDE THE HALLS AND CAMPS. AS YOU SAID, THE VSEC, THEY'VE
- 15 BEEN VERY CRITICAL OF THE INCONSISTENCY OR LACK OF PROGRAMMING
- 16 ALTOGETHER. WE'VE SEEN THAT NOT ONLY AT LOS PADRINOS, BUT ALSO
- 17 AT BARRY NIDORF. AND I'VE EXPERIENCED IT MYSELF WHEN I VISITED
- 18 BARRY J. AND OTHER FACILITIES. I'VE SAID IT MANY TIMES BEFORE,
- 19 YOUTH SHOULD LEAVE OUR FACILITIES BETTER OFF THAN WHEN THEY
- 20 ENTERED. AND BY FORCING THEM TO SIT IN A ROOM WITH NOTHING TO
- 21 DO OTHER THAN WATCH EITHER IF THEY'RE LUCKY A MOVIE OR PLAY
- 22 VIDEO GAMES IS NOT A GOOD INVESTMENT IN THEIR FUTURE.
- 23 PROGRAMMING IS AN ESSENTIAL PIECE OF IT. WE'VE HEARD BEFORE
- 24 HOW SOME PROVIDERS ARE NOT ALWAYS IN THE FACILITIES WHEN THE
- 25 CALENDAR OF ACTIVITIES SAYS THEY ARE SUPPOSED TO BE, WHICH WAS



- 1 FRUSTRATING TO ME WHEN I TOURED BARRY NIDORF AND ASKED ONE OF
- 2 THE PEOPLE THAT DOES PROGRAMMING WHY THERE WAS NOT MORE
- 3 PROGRAMMING, THEY SAID THAT THEY COULDN'T BE THERE THE HOURS
- 4 THEY NEEDED THEM. AND I SAID, ARE THEY VOLUNTEERS? AND THEY
- 5 SAID, NO, WE PAY THEM. AND I SAID, SO YOU'RE TELLING ME THAT
- 6 PEOPLE WE HIRE TO DO A JOB ARE TELLING US WHEN THEY'RE GONNA
- 7 SHOW UP. AND I FOUND THAT NOT ONLY UNACCEPTABLE, BUT ACTUALLY
- 8 AN INSULT. AN INSULT NOT ONLY TO THE KIDS THAT ARE IN THESE
- 9 FACILITIES, BUT ALSO TO THE STAFF THAT ARE WORKING THERE THAT
- 10 THINK IT'S OKAY FOR THAT TO HAPPEN. AND THAT WAS ON A VISIT,
- 11 CHAIR HORVATH, WITH YOU WHEN WE TOURED BARRY J. NIDORF. SO, I
- 12 SUPPORT THIS MOTION AND I WANT TO URGE DYD, WHO I AM SO
- 13 GRATEFUL, WHEN WE REACH OUT TO YOU TO PUT PROGRAMS IN PLACE,
- 14 YOU DO IT, I MEAN, THE NEXT DAY. I'M AMAZED AT HOW QUICKLY YOU
- 15 CAN GET THINGS DONE AND YOU DO IT WITH OUALITY IN MIND. AND I
- 16 APPRECIATE THAT. BUT I WOULD ASK, COULD WE INCORPORATE A DATA
- 17 PIECE THAT TRACKS SERVICE PROVIDERS FREQUENCY OF ATTENDANCE
- 18 SERVICE DELIVERY IN DYDS 180 DAY PROGRESS REPORT TO THE BOARD.
- 19 WOULD THAT BE POSSIBLE.

- 21 DAVID CARROLL: CERTAINLY, THEN THANK YOU ALL FOR HAVING WOW
- 22 SORRY I'M LOUD. THANK YOU ALL FOR HAVING ME HERE TODAY. THAT
- 23 IS ABSOLUTELY A PIECE THAT WE'RE CONCERNED ABOUT. WE'RE TRYING
- 24 TO KEEP TRACK OF CERTAINLY NOT JUST THE OUTPUT DATA, WHICH IS
- 25 THE NUMBER OF KIDS THAT PARTICIPATE IN A NUMBER OF HOURS, BUT



- 1 ALSO THE OUTCOMES, RIGHT, TO SEE EXACTLY WHAT IMPACT THAT
- 2 WE'RE HAVING ON THE YOUNG PEOPLE THAT WE SERVE. SO THAT IS
- 3 ABSOLUTELY SOMETHING THAT WE CAN TRACK AND CERTAINLY WORKING
- 4 WITH THE DATA TEAM TO FIGURE OUT EXACTLY WHAT THE DETAILS ARE.

- 6 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: IS THAT OKAY WITH YOU, THE AUTHOR,
- 7 SUPERVISOR MITCHELL?

- 11 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: OKAY, THANK YOU. BECAUSE AGAIN, I DO
- 12 BELIEVE THAT ON PAPER, IT MAY LOOK GOOD, BUT IF IT'S NOT BEING
- 13 PLAYED OUT, THEN IT'S NO BETTER THAN THE PAPER IT'S WRITTEN
- 14 ON. THANK YOU.

- 18 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU, CHAIR HORVATH. THANK YOU,
- 19 SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, FOR THIS MOTION. SINCE THIS BOARD TASKED
- 20 THE DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT WITH TAKING THE LEAD ON
- 21 ESTABLISHING PROGRAMS FOR OUR YOUTH IN PROBATION FACILITIES,
- 22 IT IS IMPORTANT THAT YOU HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO QUICKLY BUT
- 23 TRANSPARENTLY EXECUTE AGREEMENTS WITH ORGANIZATIONS THAT
- 24 PROVIDE THESE PROGRAMS. AND I LIKE IT THAT THIS MOTION WILL
- 25 ALLOW OUR DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT TO CUT THROUGH SOME



- 1 OF THE RED TAPE THAT SLOWS DOWN GOOD AND NECESSARY PROGRAMS
- 2 FROM ENTERING OUR FACILITIES. I THINK WE'VE ALL HAD THESE
- 3 EXPERIENCES, BUT I KNOW FIRSTHAND HOW DIFFICULT IT CAN BE TO
- 4 GET ORGANIZATIONS INTO OUR PROBATION FACILITIES BECAUSE OF THE
- 5 RED TAPE. IN FACT, COLLEAGUES YOU SUPPORTED ME AND WE PASSED A
- 6 BOARD MOTION TO ALLOW THE DOG TRAINING PROGRAM, PAWS FOR LIFE,
- 7 INTO BARRY J. NIDORF QUICKLY AND EFFICIENTLY. IT WAS JUST
- 8 BOGGED DOWN, BOGGED DOWN, BOGGED DOWN BY RED TAPE. AND THIS
- 9 MOTION, I BELIEVE, WILL ALLOW PROGRAMS LIKE PAWS FOR LIFE TO
- 10 EXPAND TO OTHER FACILITIES SO THAT MORE YOUTH CAN HAVE ACCESS
- 11 TO SOME OF THESE EFFECTIVE PROGRAMS. AND WHILE THE DEPARTMENT
- 12 OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT HAS BEEN WORKING WITH PROBATION TO RAMP
- 13 UP MORE ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAMS FOR YOUTH, THE BOARD OF STATE
- 14 AND COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS CONTINUES TO FIND THERE'S AN URGENT
- 15 NEED FOR WHAT? MORE STRUCTURED PROGRAMS AND DOCUMENTATION. IN
- 16 FACT, LAST WEEK, UNFORTUNATELY, WE FOUND OUT THAT BSCC SAID
- 17 THAT LOS PADRINOS IS OUT OF COMPLIANCE, AGAIN WITH PROGRAMMING
- 18 AND DOCUMENTATION. AND PART OF THEIR AUDIT FOUND THAT MANY
- 19 YOUTHS ARE UNHAPPY, VERY MUCH LIKE WHAT YOU SAID, SUPERVISOR
- 20 MITCHELL, WITH THE PROGRAMS THAT ARE AVAILABLE, AND SOME OF
- 21 THEM ARE NOT ATTENDING BECAUSE THEY DON'T LIKE THE PROGRAM.
- 22 SO, IT'S MORE ABOUT WHAT DO THEY WANT THAN WHAT WE WANT. I
- 23 KNOW THEY HAVEN'T SAID THAT ABOUT THE PAWS FOR LIFE. THE
- 24 DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT HAS WORKED HARD TO IDENTIFY
- 25 WHAT TYPES OF PROGRAMMING GAPS NEED TO BE FILLED. THANK YOU,



- 1 DAVID. AND YOU HAVE PLANS TO BRING ONBOARD PROGRAMS THAT WILL
- 2 BETTER SERVE OUR YOUTH, LIKE FINANCIAL LITERACY, EDUCATION,
- 3 AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING. I THINK EVERYBODY REALLY WANTS TO SEE
- 4 THOSE PROGRAMS GET IN OUR FACILITIES. SO, I'M GLAD WE'RE
- 5 GIVING YOU THE AUTHORITY TO QUICKLY BRING IN THESE PROGRAMS
- 6 INTO OUR FACILITIES SO THAT WE CAN PROVIDE THAT MUCH NEEDED
- 7 STRUCTURE AND GOOD ENHANCING PROGRAMMING FOR OUR YOUNG PEOPLE
- 8 IN OUR CARE. THANK YOU.

- 12 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: YES, THANK YOU. THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR
- 13 MITCHELL FOR BRINGING THIS MOTION TO OUR ATTENTION. AND TO OUR
- 14 DIRECTOR, I KNOW THAT IT'S BEEN A CHALLENGE GETTING
- 15 PROGRAMMING SERVICES IN THE HALLS. SO, CAN YOU TALK A LITTLE
- 16 BIT ABOUT WHAT THE CHALLENGES ARE THERE?

- 18 DAVID CARROLL: WE HAD THE AUTHORITY FOR THE DELEGATED
- 19 AUTHORITY FOR CREDIBLE MESSENGER. SO, WHAT WE HAD BEEN TRYING
- 20 TO DO WAS TO SUBCONTRACT WITH SOME OF OUR CREDIBLE MESSENGER
- 21 PROVIDERS, WHICH PUTS A LITTLE BIT OF A BURDEN ON THEM TO
- 22 INVITE IN AN ORGANIZATION THAT THEY DON'T REALLY KNOW ANYTHING
- 23 ABOUT, BUT THAT WE HAVE RECOMMENDED. WE WERE SUCCESSFUL IN
- 24 GETTING A COUPLE OF THOSE ORGANIZATIONS INTO THE CAMPS AND
- 25 HALLS, BUT WE DO WANT TO GO DIRECTLY TO THE ORGANIZATION.



- 1 WE'VE ALSO IN FAIRNESS WORKED WITH PROBATION AND IDENTIFIED A
- 2 COUPLE OF ORGANIZATIONS THAT THEY CONTRACTED DIRECTLY WITH
- 3 BASED ON KIND OF A MUTUAL RECOMMENDATION FOR SOME PHYSICAL
- 4 FITNESS RECREATION PROGRAMMING AND SOME OTHER THINGS. SO, THE
- 5 CHALLENGE HAS REALLY BEEN THE AUTHORITY TO BRING IN THESE NON-
- 6 CREDIBLE MESSENGER ORGANIZATIONS. AND WE REALLY KIND OF TOILED
- 7 ABOUT WHETHER WE COULD DO SOME KIND OF MENTAL MANIPULATION AND
- 8 CALL THESE ORGANIZATIONS CREDIBLE MESSENGERS. AND WE CHOSE NOT
- 9 TO DO THAT BECAUSE WE DON'T WANT TO WATER DOWN WHAT A CREDIBLE
- 10 MESSENGER REALLY IS. SO, WE BELIEVE THAT WITH THIS AUTHORITY,
- 11 WE CANVASSED OVER 60 ORGANIZATIONS THAT WE ASKED IF THEY COULD
- 12 OPERATE IN THE CAMPS AND HALLS. THIS HAS BEEN OVER A YEAR IN
- 13 THE MAKING. WE'VE NARROWED IT DOWN TO 5 OR 6 THAT ARE READY TO
- 14 GO LIKE RIGHT NOW IN THOSE AREAS THAT WERE MENTIONED EARLIER,
- 15 FINANCIAL LITERACY, WELLNESS, VOCATIONAL ARE THE PRIMARY KIND
- 16 OF 3 AREAS THAT WE BELIEVE WITHIN THE NEXT 60 DAYS WE COULD
- 17 GET UP AND RUNNING SO --

- 19 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: ABOUT YOUR PARTNERSHIP WITH THE LA COUNTY
- 20 OFFICE OF EDUCATION AND SOME OF THE OTHER DEPARTMENTS THERE,
- 21 HOW'S THAT WORKING?

- 23 DAVID CARROLL: THOSE ARE STILL DEVELOPING. I'M HAVING ONGOING
- 24 MEETINGS WITH DR. DUARTEAU WITH LACO TO TALK ABOUT HOW WE CAN
- 25 FURTHER PARTNER. I KNOW THAT SOME OF THE CREDIBLE MESSENGERS



- 1 VERY RECENTLY HAVE BEEN INVITED TO BE IN THE CLASSROOMS WITH

- 5 BUT THAT IS AN ONGOING RELATIONSHIP. AGAIN, WE MENTIONED ARTS
- 6 AND CULTURE EARLIER WITH REGARDS TO INNER CITY YOUTH ORCHESTRA
- 7 THAT WE'VE PARTNERED WITH AND SEVERAL OTHER DEPARTMENTS THAT
- 8 WE'RE HAVING ONGOING CONVERSATIONS. I MEAN, WE'VE BEEN TALKING
- 9 ABOUT TRYING TO INCORPORATE DELETE THE DIVIDE INTO THE CAMPS
- 10 AND HALLS, YOU KNOW, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH ISD. THERE ARE QUITE
- 11 A FEW DIFFERENT INNOVATIVE IDEAS THAT WE'RE WORKING ON
- 12 CONSISTENTLY WHILE WE TRY TO MEET THE EMERGENT CRISIS THAT WE
- 13 FACE.

- 15 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND JUST LASTLY, I KNOW THAT AT THE
- 16 BEGINNING IT WAS A LITTLE ROUGH TO EVEN ESTABLISH THOSE
- 17 MEETINGS WITH THE DIRECTOR, OUR CHIEF PROBATION OFFICER. HOW'S
- 18 THAT GOING?

- 20 DAVID CARROLL: I WOULD SAY OUR RELATIONSHIP IS DEFINITELY
- 21 STRENGTHENED. WE BOTH RECOGNIZE THAT WE COME FROM DIFFERENT

- 5 HAD ANY PUSHBACK IN TERMS OF INTRODUCING NEW PROGRAMMING. AND
- 6 IN FACT, IF THIS MOTION WAS NOT TO PASS, WHICH WE HOPE IT
- 7 DOES, HE'S EVEN OFFERED TO USE HIS EMERGENCY AUTHORITY TO GET
- 8 SOME OF THE ORGANIZATIONS IN THAT WE ARE RECOMMENDING,
- 9 ALTHOUGH I WOULD RATHER IT COME THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT OF
- 10 YOUTH DEVELOPMENT.

- 20 SPEAKER: GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS DOLORES CANALES. I AM A

- 22 OVERSIGHT COMMISSION APPOINTED BY SUPERVISOR JANICE HAHN BUT I

- 25 SUPERVISOR MITCHELL FOR BRINGING IT FORWARD. I ASK FOR YOUR



- 1 AYE VOTE. BEING IN DIRECT CONTACT WITH THE YOUTH, I AM ABLE TO
- 2 HEAR FROM THEM WHEN THEY'RE SAYING, WE'RE BORED. ONE WEEKEND I
- 3 WAS THERE WITH THE YOUTH AND I SAID, WELL, WHAT IS IT THAT
- 4 YOU'RE DOING? HE SAID, YOU'RE LOOKING AT IT. AND THEY WERE

- 20 I'M SUPPORTIVE OF THE YOUTH CENTER PROGRAMMING THAT WE'RE
- 21 DOING HERE TODAY, AND I HEARD A LOT OF EACH ONE OF YOU GUYS
- 22 SAY THAT THIS IS VERY ESSENTIAL FOR THE YOUTH. AS MY COLLEAGUE
- 23 WAS MENTIONING, I'VE ALSO BEEN WAITING 5 MONTHS TO GO IN TO
- 24 HELP THESE YOUTH, TO HELP THESE PEOPLE, TO RUN THESE GROUPS.
- 25 AT THIS TIME, I AM RUNNING GROUPS AT OUR OFFICE, BUT MY JOB



- 1 WAS TO GO BACK INSIDE SO WE COULD HELP THESE YOUTH TO DEAL
- 2 WITH THEIR OWN RESOLVE ISSUES, TO HELP THEM OUT, TO CARE FOR
- 3 THEM, TO SHOW THEM THAT THERE IS A BETTER LIFE, WHY FOR THE
- 4 SIMPLE FACT THAT I WAS THEM. AND I URGE AND BEG YOU GUYS, IF

- 16 SPEAKER: SO THAT'S THE THING THAT WE'RE WAITING ON. WE'RE
- 17 WAITING FOR CLEARANCE. AND PROBATION IS TAKING A LONG TIME TO
- 18 GET US CLEARED.

- 21 NEXT SPEAKER.

- 24 ABOUT AND WHAT DO THEY MEAN AND WHOSE PROBLEM?

- 11 THURSDAY IN THE PLC MEETING THAT WHERE WE ENDED UP WILL BE
- 12 REVEALED. IT'S NOT 100% TO MY LIKING AND I DON'T THINK IT'S
- 13 100% TO PROBATION'S LIKING EITHER. I TOLD THEM THAT I WOULDN'T
- 14 AGREE TO IT UNTIL IT WAS SHOPPED AND THEY HAD A CHANCE TO
- 15 RESPOND IN A PUBLIC FORUM TO SOME OF THE ITEMS. BUT I DO

- 3 HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO WORK WITH THE YOUTH COMING OUT OF

- 2 FOR CONSISTENT PROGRAMMING INSIDE THESE FACILITIES AND THAT IN
- 3 ADDITION THAT THE PROGRAMMING CONTINUES WHILE YOU ARE
- 4 INCARCERATED AND BEING CONNECTED TO SUPPORTS AND OPPORTUNITIES

- 24 INCARCERATION FIRST HAND, SPENDING A COUPLE OF YEARS IN

- 1 CAN ATTEST TO THE TRANSFORMATIVE POWER OF THESE PROGRAMS

- 3 THE NEED FOR A MORE EFFICIENT CLEARING PROCESS FOR CREDIBLE
- 4 MESSENGERS. CURRENTLY, THE LENGTHY PROCESS OF GRANTING
- 5 CONTRACTS AND CLEARANCES HINDERS THE TIMELY INTRODUCTION OF
- 6 THESE VALUABLE INDIVIDUALS INTO THE SYSTEM. THIS PROCESS OFTEN
- 7 TAKES MONTHS, DELAYING THE MUCH NEEDED SUPPORT FOR THE YOUTH.

- 25 OR 5 MONTHS TO GET CLEARED THROUGH THE PROBATION DEPARTMENT.

- 2 BARRY J. NIDORF AND CAMPUS Q. PATRICK FOR A YEAR. MY CLEARANCE
- 3 HAS BEEN REVOKED BECAUSE OF MY IMMIGRATION STATUS. MY
- 4 IMMIGRATION STATUS, I'M HERE LEGALLY. I HAVE A VALID SOCIAL

- 6 JUST TO UPLIFT THE STORIES OF THE CREDIBLE MESSENGERS AND THE
- 7 YOUTH THAT SPOKE A FEW MINUTES AGO. I THINK THAT I REALLY

- 10 SOLIS, I WILL TURN IT TO YOU.

- 12 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MADAM CHAIR. I ALSO
- 13 WANNA THANK SUPERVISOR HAHN FOR BEING MY CO-AUTHOR AND HER
- 14 TEAM FOR WORKING WITH MY OFFICE ON THIS MOTION. IN THE LAST 3
- 15 YEARS THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WAS INVOLVED IN 162 TRAFFIC
- 16 COLLISIONS THAT RESULTED IN A LITTLE OVER \$22,000,000 IN
- 17 PAYOUTS. BEHIND THE NUMBER OF COLLISIONS AND THE DOLLARS IN
- 18 SETTLEMENTS ARE RESIDENTS OF LA COUNTY WHO WERE HARMED, LEFT
- 19 WITH SERIOUS INJURIES, AND EVEN KILLED DUE TO THESE ACCIDENTS.
- 20 JUST THIS LAST YEAR ALONE, THE NUMBERS HAVE BEEN STAGGERING.
- 21 THERE HAVE BEEN 10 SETTLEMENTS TOTALING OVER \$10,000,000. THAT
- 22 DOESN'T EVEN INCLUDE THE \$17,200,000 SETTLEMENT THAT I AM
- 23 JOINTLY HOLDING WITH THIS MOTION CONCERNING PLAINTIFF ROMELIA
- 24 CHALDES AND ALLEGATIONS OF A TRAFFIC COLLISION INVOLVING A
- 25 SHERIFF DEPUTY. THESE ARE ASTONISHING NUMBERS GIVEN THAT WE'RE



- 1 HALFWAY THROUGH THE YEAR AND THE DEPARTMENT HAS EXCEEDED THE
- 2 SETTLEMENT AMOUNT FOR THE LAST 3 YEARS COMBINED. IN REVIEW OF
- 3 THESE SETTLEMENTS, THERE ARE A MYRIAD OF FACTORS AS TO WHY A
- 4 DEPUTY IN RESPONDING TO A CALL FOR SERVICE MAY HAVE HIT A
- 5 PEDESTRIAN OR DRIVERS AND PASSENGERS IN VEHICLES SUCH AS
- 6 DISTRACTED DRIVING, UNSAFE AND RECKLESS DRIVING AND LACK OF
- 7 DRIVING EXPERIENCE. IMAGINE A CALL FOR SERVICE BEING DELAYED
- 8 DUE TO THE RESPONDING DEPUTY CAUSING AN ACCIDENT ON THE WAY.
- 9 MY OFFICE RAISED NUMEROUS CONCERNS WHEN BRIEFED ON THESE
- 10 TRAFFIC COLLISION SETTLEMENTS ABOUT WHAT STEPS LASD WAS TAKING
- 11 TO ADDRESS THESE ACCIDENTS AND WHAT WE HEARD WAS TRAINING AND
- 12 RETRAINING, AN AGREEMENT WITH THE INTERNAL DRIVING TRACK
- 13 RECORD POINT SYSTEM NEEDED TO BE REVIEWED AND EVEN UPDATED.
- 14 THERE ARE, HOWEVER, MORE THAT CAN BE DONE TO ENSURE THAT WE'RE
- 15 KEEPING OUR RESIDENTS SAFE AND AVOIDING UNNECESSARY ACCIDENTS
- 16 AS WELL AS PROVIDING SAFETY FOR DEPUTIES DURING THESE CALLS
- 17 FOR SERVICE. EFFORTS TO PROTECT THE COMMUNITY FROM TRAFFIC
- 18 ACCIDENTS ARE NOT NEW. RATHER IN 2019 UNDER THE DIRECTION OF

- 1 TRAININGS AND ACCESSING EFFICACY, PROVIDING EXTENDED AND
- 2 ADDITIONAL TRAINING AND MENTORSHIP FOR NEW DRIVERS OR DRIVERS
- 3 WITH LIMITED DRIVING EXPERIENCE, AND RESEARCHING NEW
- 4 TECHNOLOGIES THAT CAN HELP REDUCE ACCIDENTS. THE BOARD ALSO
- 5 NEEDS TO BE INFORMED ON A MORE COMPREHENSIVE AND CONSISTENT
- 6 BASIS THROUGH REGULAR REPORTING ON THESE COLLISIONS TO ASSESS
- 7 FOR TRENDS AND ASSIGNING RESOLUTIONS TO ENSURE SAFETY FOR ALL.
- 8 MADAM CHAIR, THANK YOU AND I WILL TURN IT OVER TO MY CO-
- 9 AUTHOR.

- 11 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU. THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR SOLIS, FOR
- 12 THIS MOTION. I'M GLAD TO BE YOUR CO-AUTHOR ON IT. I'M TOO VERY
- 13 CONCERNED THAT OUR DEPUTY CAUSED TRAFFIC COLLISIONS. AND AS
- 14 YOU SAID, NOT JUST BECAUSE OF THE SETTLEMENTS THEY LEAD TO,
- 15 BUT MORE IMPORTANTLY BECAUSE OF THE NEGATIVE IMPACT THEY'RE
- 16 HAVING ON PUBLIC SAFETY BY CAUSING INJURIES AND DELAYING
- 17 EMERGENCY RESPONSES. I THINK THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT NEEDS TO
- 18 REEXAMINE THE WORK THAT IS BEING DONE TO TRAIN DEPUTIES AND
- 19 PERSONNEL TO HELP MITIGATE PREVENTABLE TRAFFIC COLLISIONS AND
- 20 ALSO TAKE A LOOK AT THE DISCIPLINE AND CORRECTIVE ACTION
- 21 PROCESSES THAT OCCUR AFTER AN ACCIDENT TO REVIEW WHETHER OR

- 3 OTHER ONE IS A \$17,200,000 SETTLEMENT ON THIS AGENDA,
- 4 HIGHLIGHTS HOW IMPORTANT WHAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT IS. IT'S
- 5 DEVASTATING NOT ONLY BECAUSE OF THE HIGH DOLLAR AMOUNT, BUT
- 6 ALSO BECAUSE OF THE INJURIES TO THE VICTIMS OF THE COLLISION

- 19 IDENTIFYING TRENDS IN BEHAVIOR AND IDENTIFYING WAYS TO
- 20 MITIGATE THROUGH ADDITIONAL TRAINING AND OUR MORE IN-DEPTH
- 21 TRAINING DURING AN EVALUATION PERIOD SO I APPRECIATE THAT THE
- 22 MOTION IS A STEP TOWARD LOOKING AT HOW WE FACILITATE TRUE RISK
- 23 MANAGEMENT AND HOW THIS BEHAVIOR MAY BE CURBED TO AVOID
- 24 FURTHER HARM TO COMMUNITIES. AND I ALSO HOPE THAT THE LESSONS
- 25 LEARNED FROM TODAY WILL HELP INFORM A COUNTY-WIDE RISK



- 1 MANAGEMENT APPROACH TO HELP MITIGATE ACCIDENTS FOR COUNTY
- 2 EMPLOYEES DRIVING OFFICIAL COUNTY VEHICLES ON OFFICIAL
- 3 BUSINESS. I ASSUME THAT ONCE THE ITEM WAS HELD THAT SOMEONE
- 4 FROM THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WOULD BE HERE TO ANSWER
- 5 OUESTIONS. I SEE THEY ARE NOT. SO, I WOULD JUST STATE FOR THE
- 6 RECORD QUESTIONS I WOULD HAVE OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. I
- 7 UNDERSTAND THAT THERE IS A POINT SYSTEM BY WHICH THE SHERIFF'S
- 8 DEPARTMENT HOLDS DEPUTIES ACCOUNTABLE FOR THEIR DRIVING
- 9 ACTIONS. BUT I'M NOT SURE HOW I UNDERSTAND HOW MANY POINTS A

- 4 TRAFFIC COLLISION POINT SYSTEM AS SUPERVISOR MITCHELL
- 5 MENTIONED, AND CHANGES TO THE SHERIFF DEPARTMENT'S CORRECTIVE
- 6 ACTION PLANS AND PROCESSES TO MAKE SURE THAT THEY'RE ACTUALLY
- 7 MEANINGFUL AND LIKELY TO CHANGE BEHAVIOR. OUR REPORT BACK
- 8 SHOULD ALSO FOCUS ON HOW THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT CAN IMPROVE
- 9 ITS PROCESSES TO REDUCE THESE ACCIDENTS, REDUCE THEIR
