## THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS 2 TUESDAY, JULY 30TH, 2024 3 4 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: GOOD MORNING, EVERYONE. GOOD 5 MORNING. WELCOME TO MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC TO OUR POLICY PRESENTATIONS MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF 6 SUPERVISORS. TODAY IS TUESDAY, JULY 30, 2024. OUR CHIEF 7 EXECUTIVE OFFICER, COUNTY COUNSEL, EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND 8 9 SERGEANT AT ARMS ARE ALL HERE TO ASSIST. WE'LL BEGIN TODAY'S 10 BOARD MEETING WITH THE COUNTY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT. 11 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR [VIDEO RECORDING]: THE COUNTY OF 12 LOS ANGELES RECOGNIZES THAT WE OCCUPY LAND ORIGINALLY AND 13 14 STILL INHABITED AND CARED FOR BY THE TONGVA, TATAVIAM, SERRANO, KIZH, AND CHUMASH PEOPLES. WE HONOR AND PAY RESPECT 15 16 TO THEIR ELDERS AND DESCENDANTS, PAST, PRESENT, AND EMERGING, 17 AS THEY CONTINUE THEIR STEWARDSHIP OF THESE LANDS AND WATERS. WE ACKNOWLEDGE THAT SETTLER COLONIZATION RESULTED IN LAND 18 19 SEIZURE, DISEASE, SUBJUGATION, SLAVERY, RELOCATION, BROKEN 20 PROMISES, GENOCIDE, AND MULTI-GENERATIONAL TRAUMA. THIS 21 ACKNOWLEDGEMENT DEMONSTRATES OUR RESPONSIBILITY AND COMMITMENT 22 TO TRUTH, HEALING, AND RECONCILIATION, AND TO ELEVATING THE STORIES, CULTURE, AND COMMUNITY OF THE ORIGINAL INHABITANTS OF 23 LOS ANGELES COUNTY. WE ARE GRATEFUL TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO 24 LIVE AND WORK ON THESE ANCESTRAL LANDS. WE ARE DEDICATED TO 25 26 GROWING AND SUSTAINING RELATIONSHIPS WITH NATIVE PEOPLES AND

- 11 PRESENTATIONS AND SUPERVISOR MITCHELL IS UP FIRST.

- 13 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: GOOD MORNING, COLLEAGUES, AND GOOD
- 14 MORNING, LOS ANGELES COUNTY. IT'S GREAT TO SEE EVERYBODY
- 15 TODAY. IT GIVES ME IMMENSE HONOR TO PRESENT TO YOU ALL THE
- 16 2028 CLASS FROM CHARLES DREW UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF MEDICINE.
- 17 CHARLES DREW, OF COURSE, IS A UNIVERSITY, IS A NAME THAT YOU
- 18 ALL WILL RECOGNIZE. IT'S A 58-YEAR-OLD INSTITUTION IN THE
- 19 HEART OF SOUTH L.A. BUT GOT ITS OFFICIAL MEDICAL SCHOOL
- 20 DESIGNATION JUST LAST YEAR. WE INVITED THE FIRST CLASS OF MED
- 21 STUDENTS HERE AND NOW WE HAVE THE SECOND CLASS. LET YOU ALL,
- 22 YOU ALL KNOW THIS, BUT LET ME TELL THE REST OF THE WORLD.
- 23 WE'RE SELECTED FROM OVER 4,000 APPLICANTS. YOU RANGE IN AGE
- 24 FROM 21 TO 35. MORE THAN HALF OF THE CLASS ARE FEMALE. 44 ARE
- 25 FROM CALIFORNIA AND 25 HAIL FROM L.A. COUNTY. FROM ALL 5



- 1 SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT COLLEAGUES, YOU'RE WELCOME. WE TALK
- 2 OFTEN ABOUT THE NEED FOR DIVERSITY IN OUR HEALTH CARE
- 3 PROFESSIONAL SYSTEM, AND WE'VE GOT A MEDICAL SCHOOL RIGHT HERE
- 4 IN L.A. COUNTY THAT IS DOING IT. WHAT'S SO IMPORTANT ABOUT
- 5 THAT, BASED ON ALL THE RESEARCH THAT WE'VE SEEN, IS THE
- 6 COMMITMENT YOU ALL HAVE MADE PRIOR TO YOUR ENTRANCE IN MEDICAL
- 7 SCHOOL, BUT THE COMMITMENT YOU'RE GONNA MAKE TO ALL OF US UPON
- 8 YOUR SUCCESSFUL GRADUATION. ALL HAVE WORKED TO IMPROVE HEALTH
- 9 AND WELLNESS IN COMMUNITIES SIMILAR TO THE COMMUNITY I
- 10 REPRESENT IN SOUTH L.A., AND ALL ARE COMMITTED TO SERVING
- 11 UNDER-RESOURCED AND UNDER-SERVED COMMUNITIES AFTER YOU'RE DONE
- 12 WITH YOUR TRAINING. I SKIPPED AN IMPORTANT DATA POINT. 34 ARE
- 13 FLUENT SPANISH SPEAKERS AND 2 AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE. SOME OF
- 14 THE SITES WHERE THE STUDENTS WILL TRAIN ARE RANCHO LOS AMIGOS
- 15 NATIONAL REHAB CENTER, DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES, MLK
- 16 OUTPATIENT CENTER. THEY'LL ALSO TRAIN AT MLK COMMUNITY
- 17 HOSPITAL, LONG BEACH VA, CALIFORNIA HOSPITAL, ST. MARY'S
- 18 HOSPITAL, HARBOR HOSPITAL, CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL OF L.A., AND
- 19 WATTS HEALTH CENTER. THE STUDENTS ARE ACCOMPANIED TODAY BY
- 20 SENIOR LEADERS AND FACULTY FROM THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE AT
- 21 CDU. COLLEAGUES, PLEASE MEET OUR FUTURE DOCTORS AND MEDICAL
- 22 EXPERTS AND GIVE THEM ANOTHER ROUND OF APPLAUSE. I DIDN'T MAKE
- 23 THIS YEAR'S WHITE COAT CEREMONY, BUT THE WHITE COAT CEREMONY
- 24 IS A BEAUTIFUL CEREMONY TO SEE YOUR FAMILY MEMBERS AND THE
- 25 PEOPLE WHO YOU HOLD MOST DEAR PUT THOSE WHITE COATS ON YOU.

- 8 CONSTITUENTS, ALL 10,000,000 PEOPLE WHO CALL L.A. COUNTY HOME.
- 9 SO, AS WE CELEBRATE YOUR INDIVIDUAL ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS, WE
- 10 WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE THE SACRIFICES MADE BY YOUR FAMILIES AND
- 11 YOUR SUPPORT NETWORKS. DR. GOMEZ, WOULD YOU PLEASE COME JOIN
- 12 ME, SENIOR ASSOCIATE DEAN OF MEDICAL EDUCATION. ONCE WE GET
- 13 THE DOOR UNLOCKED AND WAS THERE WAS A STUDENT GOING TO JOIN
- 14 YOU OR JUST YOU DR. GOMEZ. COME ON DR. GOMEZ. COME ON DR.
- 15 GOMEZ. YEAH, NO, THEY'RE NOT SHY.

- 18 INTRODUCE YOU TO THE CLASS OF 2028 IF THEY CAN ALL STAND,

- 22 STUDENTS ARE DONNING THEIR WHITE COATS REPRESENTATIVE OF
- 23 EMPATHY AND SERVICE TO COMMUNITIES, ALL COMMUNITIES,
- 24 ESPECIALLY THOSE VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES, COMMUNITIES OF THOSE
- 25 WHO ARE ILL, THOSE WHO HAVE BEEN UNDERSERVED IN THE PAST. NO



- 1 MORE IS THE WHITE COAT GOING TO BE A SYMBOL OF DISPARAGING
- 2 CARE, RESOURCE CARE ONLY FOR THE WEALTHY. WE COMMIT THAT THIS
- 3 WHITE COAT WILL REPRESENT TRUE EMPATHY AND TRUE CARE FOR ALL
- 4 COMMUNITIES, COMMUNITIES OF COLOR, LGBTQ, COMMUNITIES OF
- 5 DISABILITY, ALL COMMUNITIES THAT ARE DESERVING OF CARE. AND I
- 6 KNOW THE PASSION OF THESE STUDENTS. WE'VE MET THEM NOW FOR THE
- 7 LAST 4 WEEKS, AND WE LOVE THEM, AND WE'RE GONNA NURTURE THEM,
- 8 AND WE'RE GONNA PREPARE THEM TO TAKE CARE OF OUR COMMUNITY IN
- 9 LOS ANGELES AND BEYOND. THANK YOU.

- 23 GAMES, ART HAS THE POWER TO PROVIDE MEANINGFUL CONTEXT THAT
- 24 REFLECTS LOCAL IDENTITIES AND GIVES A VOICE TO THE HOST CITY
- 25 AND THE COUNTRY AS WELL AS OPEN THE DOOR FOR INTERNATIONAL



- 1 CULTURAL EXCHANGE. THE POSTER COMPETITION WE'RE CELEBRATING
- 2 TODAY IS PART OF A HISTORIC COLLABORATION BETWEEN THE CITY OF
- 3 PARIS, THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, LOS ANGELES COUNTY, AND THE
- 4 ST. SAINTE-DENIS REGION. THE COLLABORATION INCLUDES OLYMPIC
- 5 LEADERSHIP EXCHANGE ON THE ROLE OF ARTS AND CULTURE IN THE
- 6 GAMES AND A HISTORIC MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING FOR CULTURAL
- 7 COOPERATION FOR THE 2024 AND 2028 GAMES. IT'S A SERIES OF
- 8 L.A.-PARIS ARTISTIC COLLABORATION PROJECTS AS PART OF THE 2024
- 9 PARIS CULTURAL OLYMPIAD. STUDENTS FROM OTIS COLLEGE OF ART AND
- 10 DESIGN, ART CENTER COLLEGE OF DESIGN, CAL ARTS, AND EPSA IN
- 11 PARIS CREATED BEAUTIFULLY ILLUSTRATED POSTER DESIGNS
- 12 HIGHLIGHTING THEIR TALENT, CREATIVITY, AND OLYMPIC THEMES. AS
- 13 WE CAN SEE, THE 24 WINNING POSTERS ILLUSTRATE AND CELEBRATE
- 14 THE STRONG BOND BETWEEN PARIS AND LOS ANGELES, OUR SHARED
- 15 CULTURAL RICHNESS, AND THE VALUES THAT BIND US ACROSS THE
- 16 ATLANTIC. THE POSTERS ARE ON EXHIBIT NOW IN PARIS THROUGH
- 17 SEPTEMBER 9TH, WHICH I'LL GET TO SEE NEXT WEEK. I'M VERY
- 18 EXCITED. AND DIGITALLY AT THE CITY OF PARIS' WEBSITE. HERE IN
- 19 LOS ANGELES, THE L.A. COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF ARTS AND CULTURE
- 20 HAS PARTNERED WITH THE MUSIC CENTER TO EXHIBIT THE POSTERS ON
- 21 DIGITAL SCREENS IN THE JERRY MOSS PLAZA, ADJACENT TO THE
- 22 GLORIA MOLINA GRAND PARK, AND WITH THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES TO
- 23 EXHIBIT THE POSTERS IN CITY HALL'S BRIDGE GALLERY. SO, LOTS OF
- 24 OPPORTUNITIES TO CHECK OUT THE BEAUTIFUL CREATIVITY

- 2 CULTIVATE LEARNINGS FOR THE 2028 GAMES IN LOS ANGELES. AND ON
- 3 A PERSONAL NOTE, PRIOR TO MY SERVICE AS A SUPERVISOR, I WORKED
- 4 IN CREATIVE ADVERTISING IN THE ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY. SO, IT
- 5 WAS PERSONALLY GRATIFYING TO SEE THE INCREDIBLE TALENT

- 5 HONOR THESE 2 CULTURES AND HOSTING CITIES AND THE BEST
- 6 ATHLETES OF THE WORLD. SO, IT WAS JUST A VERY EXCITING
- 7 OPPORTUNITY TO DO WHAT I LOVE AND TO CELEBRATE THOSE AROUND
- 8 ME. MY POSTER WAS INSPIRED BY FRENCH ARTISTS LIKE A.M.

- 12 PEOPLE INTRODUCE THEMSELVES AS WE GO THROUGH OUR PRESENTATION
- 13 TODAY. WE CAN START WITH THE SLIDE DECK, IT'S VERY BRIEF, BUT
- 14 IT'LL BE HELPFUL TO HAVE A LITTLE VISUAL TO GO ALONG WITH OUR
- 15 SPOKEN WORDS. SO, ON JULY 9TH, YOUR BOARD APPROVED A MOTION
- 16 DIRECTING THE HOMELESS INITIATIVE, COUNTY COUNSEL, THE
- 17 SHERIFF, AND THE CEO OF LAHSA TO PROVIDE A VERBAL REPORT BACK
- 18 TO THE BOARD AT TODAY'S MEETING WITH A REVIEW OF THE GRANT'S
- 19 PAST DECISION, ITS POTENTIAL IMPLICATIONS IN LOS ANGELES
- 20 COUNTY, AND ANY RECOMMENDATIONS. WE CAN GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE,
- 21 PLEASE. THE MOTION WAS AMENDED TO DIRECT THAT THE PRESENTATION
- 22 INCLUDE INPUT FROM THE JULY 26TH MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE
- 23 COMMITTEE ON REGIONAL HOMELESSNESS ALIGNMENT. AND TO ORGANIZE
- 24 OUR PRESENTATION, ANA LAI FROM COUNTY COUNSEL WILL PROVIDE
- 25 BACKGROUND ON THE CASE HISTORY OF THE GRANTS PASS VERSUS



- 1 JOHNSON CASE. SHE'LL ALSO PRESENT A REVIEW OF THE LEGAL
- 2 DECISION, WHAT THE DECISION DOES AND WHAT IT DOES NOT DO. FROM
- 3 THERE, DR. ADAMS KELLUM WILL HIGHLIGHT THE EXPECTED
- 4 IMPLICATIONS OF THE DECISION ON OUR COLLECTIVE RESPONSE TO END
- 5 HOMELESSNESS IN EVERY COMMUNITY IN L.A. COUNTY. AND THEN DR.
- 6 ADAMS KELLUM, SHERIFF LUNA, AND I WILL PRESENT OUR COLLECTIVE
- 7 RECOMMENDATIONS ON HOW WE MOVE FORWARD. WE WILL START WITH
- 8 COUNTY COUNSEL AND ANNA LAI.

12 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: PLEASE SPEAK RIGHT INTO THE MIC.

- 14 ANA LAI: GOOD MORNING. ANNA LAI FROM COUNTY COUNSEL. TODAY
- 15 I'LL BE TALKING ABOUT THE GRANTS PASS DECISION, BUT BEFORE I
- 16 DO THAT, I WANT TO QUICKLY GO OVER THE BACKGROUND OF HOW WE
- 17 GOT HERE TODAY. IN 2018, THE NINTH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS
- 18 ISSUED A DECISION THAT HAD SIGNIFICANT IMPACT FOR HOW CITIES
- 19 APPROACH HOMELESSNESS. IN THE CASE MARTIN VERSUS BOISE, THE
- 20 NINTH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS HELD THAT IMPOSING CRIMINAL
- 21 PENALTIES AGAINST HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS FOR SITTING, SLEEPING,
- 22 OR LYING OUTSIDE ON PUBLIC PROPERTY WHEN THERE ARE NO SHELTER
- 23 BEDS AVAILABLE CONSTITUTES CRUEL AND UNUSUAL PUNISHMENT UNDER
- 24 THE EIGHTH AMENDMENT. IN 2022, THE NINTH CIRCUIT COURT OF
- 25 APPEALS BUILDING ON THE PRINCIPLES OF THE MARTIN CASE, RULED



- 1 IN JOHNSON VERSUS CITY OF GRANDS PASS THAT CIVIL ORDINANCES
- 2 THAT PROHIBITED SLEEPING AND CAMPING IN PUBLIC AND PROVIDED
- 3 FOR CIVIL FINES WHICH LATER BECOME CRIMINAL OFFENSES WERE ALSO
- 4 INCONSISTENT WITH THE CRUEL AND UNUSUAL PUNISHMENT OF THE
- 5 EIGHTH AMENDMENT. IN 2023, THE CITY OF GRANTS PASS APPEALED TO
- 6 THE NINTH CIRCUIT DECISION TO THE UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT
- 7 ARGUING THAT BOTH THE MARTIN CASE AND THE GRANTS PASS CASE
- 8 WERE WRONGLY DECIDED. EARLIER THIS YEAR IN JANUARY, THE
- 9 SUPREME COURT AGREED TO HEAR THE CASE IN MARCH LOS ANGELES
- 10 COUNTY ALONG WITH MANY OTHER COUNTY CITIES AND ORGANIZATIONS
- 11 FILED AN AMICUS BRIEF. IN APRIL ORAL ARGUMENTS WERE HELD AND
- 12 IN JUNE 28 THE SUPREME COURT ISSUED A RULING IN FAVOR OF
- 13 GRANT'S PASS. THE QUESTION THAT WAS PRESENTED TO THE COURT WAS
- 14 WHETHER THE ENFORCEMENT OF GENERALLY APPLICABLE LAWS
- 15 REGULATING CAMPING ON PUBLIC PROPERTY CONSTITUTES CRUEL AND
- 16 UNUSUAL PUNISHMENT PROHIBITED BY THE EIGHTH AMENDMENT. THE
- 17 COURT BY A 6 TO 3 VOTE RULED IN FAVOR OF GRANTS PASSED AND
- 18 HELD THAT ENFORCING GENERALLY APPLICABLE LAWS REGULATING
- 19 CAMPING ON PUBLIC PROPERTY, MEANING LAWS THAT DO NOT TARGET A
- 20 PERSON'S STATUS, LIKE BEING HOMELESS, DO NOT VIOLATE THE
- 21 EIGHTH AMENDMENT'S PROTECTION AGAINST CRUEL AND UNUSUAL
- 22 PUNISHMENT. SO, WHAT DOES THE GRANT PASS DECISION DO? THE
- 23 POTENTIAL IMPLICATION OF THIS OPINION IS THAT CITIES CAN NOW
- 24 ENFORCE LOCAL LAWS THAT CRIMINALIZE SLEEPING OR CAMPING IN
- 25 PUBLIC AREAS EVEN FOR HOMELESS PEOPLE. WHAT THE GRANTS PASSED



- 1 OPINION DOES NOT DO IS THAT THE OPINION DOES NOT MANDATE ANY
- 2 SPECIFIC ACTIONS BY THE COUNTY OR CITIES TO ENACT OR ENFORCE
- 3 THE ANTI-CAMPING LAWS. IN FACT, THE COURT EXPRESSLY STATED
- 4 THAT CITIES ARE NOT BOUND TO ADOPT PUBLIC CAMPING LAWS.
- 5 INSTEAD, THEY ARE FREE TO ADD ADDITIONAL SUBSTANTIVE
- 6 PROTECTIONS FOR THEIR IN-HOUSE. THE GRAND PASS' OPINION ALSO
- 7 DOES NOT ADDRESS WHETHER ENFORCEMENT COULD VIOLATE THE RIGHTS
- 8 OF HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS BEYOND THE ISSUE OF CRUEL AND UNUSUAL
- 9 PUNISHMENT UNDER THE EIGHTH AMENDMENT. AND THE REASON IS
- 10 BECAUSE THERE ARE OTHER CONSTITUTIONAL PROTECTIONS THAT REMAIN
- 11 IN PLACE. THE FOURTH AMENDMENT STILL LIMITS PROPERTY SEIZURE
- 12 BY THE GOVERNMENT. THIS INCLUDES HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS'
- 13 PERSONAL BELONGINGS. AUTHORITIES ARE REQUIRED TO PROVIDE
- 14 ADEQUATE NOTICE AND OPPORTUNITY TO RECLAIM BELONGINGS BEFORE
- 15 DISPOSAL. THE COURT DID NOT DECIDE WHETHER GRANTS PASS
- 16 ORDINANCE VIOLATE THE X THE EIGHTH AMENDMENTS, EXCESSIVE FINES
- 17 CLAUSE, WHICH PROHIBITS THE GOVERNMENT FROM IMPOSING FINES
- 18 THAT ARE SEEN AS UNREASONABLY HARSH OR DISPROPORTIONATE TO THE
- 19 OFFENSE COMMITTED. SO EVEN FOR OFFENSES LIKE CAMPING, FINES
- 20 CANNOT BE SO EXCESSIVE THAT THEY BECOME A FORM OF PUNISHMENT
- 21 BEYOND THE SCOPE OF THE OFFENSE. IN SUM, BOTH THE MAJORITY AND
- 22 THE DISSENT ACKNOWLEDGED THE NARROW SCOPE OF THE OPINION. I
- 23 WILL NOW PASS THE PRESENTATION TO DR. ADAMS KELLUM TO TALK
- 24 ABOUT THE IMPLICATION OF THE GRANT'S PAST DECISION.



- 1 DR. VA LECIA ADAMS KELLUM: GOOD MORNING SUPERVISORS. DR. VA
- 2 LECIA ADAMS KELLEM, CEO OF LAHSA. I APPRECIATE THE OPPORTUNITY
- 3 TO SPEAK WITH YOU TODAY. AS WE ALL DIGEST THE SCOPE AND
- 4 IMPLICATIONS OF THIS RULING, LAHSA AND OUR PARTNERS MUST
- 5 CONSIDER THE POTENTIAL IMPACTS OF LOCAL SHIFTS TOWARDS
- 6 CRIMINALIZATION OF CAMPING AND HOW THOSE SHIFTS MIGHT AFFECT
- 7 THE FRAMEWORK TO END HOMELESSNESS IN L.A. COUNTY ADOPTED BY
- 8 THE BOARD IN 2022. THE FRAMEWORK REQUIRES CITIES TO COORDINATE
- 9 WITH LAHSA AND ALL IMPACTED PARTNERS TO PREVENT HOMELESSNESS,
- 10 CONNECT UNSHELTERED PEOPLE TO OUTREACH SERVICES, PROVIDE THEM
- 11 WITH HOUSING, AND TO DELIVER STABILIZING CARE. CRIMINALIZATION
- 12 IS INTENTIONALLY NOT PART OF THE COUNTY'S FRAMEWORK BECAUSE IT
- 13 MAKES THE PROBLEM WORSE BY CREATING MORE BARRIERS ALONG
- 14 PEOPLE'S PATH TO HOUSING, AND IT RUNS COUNTER TO OUR GOALS TO
- 15 CREATE A MORE EQUITABLE SYSTEM. LAHSA'S CURRENT INTERNAL
- 16 GUIDANCE IS FOR OUTREACH WORKERS TO NOT BE A PART OF
- 17 ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES. LAHSA INSTEAD FOCUSES ON PROVIDING
- 18 RESOURCES AND SERVICES BEFORE ENFORCEMENT TAKES PLACE. THIS
- 19 GUIDANCE IS COMMUNICATED TO ALL LAHSA OUTREACH STAFF DURING
- 20 ONBOARDING THAT THEY SHOULD NOT BE PRESENT IF ENFORCEMENT
- 21 TAKES PLACE, BUT INSTEAD FOCUS ON PROVIDING RESOURCES AND
- 22 REFERRALS WHEN POSSIBLE BEFORE THE POLICE COME IN. LAHSA
- 23 DETERMINED THAT ITS ROLE WAS TO PROVIDE SERVICES AND OUTREACH
- 24 RATHER THAN ENFORCEMENT AND THAT BEING PRESENT WHEN
- 25 ENFORCEMENT OCCURRED WOULD HARM THE TRUST AND RAPPORT LAHSA



- 1 OUTREACH WORKERS BUILD WITH PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS.
- 2 THERE ARE MULTIPLE POTENTIAL IMPACTS OF INCREASED
- 3 CRIMINALIZATION. ONE, EXACERBATION OF RACIAL INEQUITIES IS A
- 4 KEY CONCERN. BLACK, AFRICAN AMERICAN, INDIGENOUS, LATINO, AND
- 5 OTHER PEOPLE OF COLOR ARE ALREADY OVER-REPRESENTED IN THE
- 6 HOMELESS AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE POPULATIONS. THROUGH THE WORK OF
- 7 LAHSA'S AD HOC COMMITTEE ON BLACK PEOPLE EXPERIENCING
- 8 HOMELESSNESS AND THE CURRENT LATINX TASK FORCE, WE HAVE HEARD
- 9 DIRECTLY FROM THESE COMMUNITIES THAT ARE THE MOST IMPACTED BY
- 10 THEIR INTERACTIONS WITH THE HOMELESS SERVICE SYSTEM. SHIFTS
- 11 TOWARDS THE CRIMINALIZATION OF CAMPING ON PUBLIC PROPERTY
- 12 WOULD EXACERBATE THE INEOUITIES THESE COMMUNITIES ALREADY
- 13 EXPERIENCE AT DISPROPORTIONATE RATES. TICKETING, VINING, AND
- 14 IN OTHER WAYS, ADDITIONALLY POLICING HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS OF
- 15 COLOR WILL FURTHER THE DEEP RACIAL INEQUITIES THEY ALREADY
- 16 FACE IN THE HOUSING SYSTEM. EXACERBATING HOMELESSNESS AND
- 17 POPULATIONS ALREADY DIRELY IMPACTED BY THE SYSTEMIC RACISM
- 18 THAT WE SEE IN OUR SYSTEM. WE ALSO KNOW THAT ENFORCEMENT IS AN
- 19 INEFFECTIVE APPROACH WITH THIS POPULATION. THE EVIDENCE IS
- 20 CLEAR THAT CRIMINALIZATION IS AN INEFFECTIVE HOMELESS
- 21 INTERVENTION. SINCE THE EMERGENCY DECLARATIONS IN THE COUNTY
- 22 AND THE CITY OF L.A., AS WELL AS IN OTHER CITIES, WE HAVE
- 23 ENDED THE UNSHELTERED HOMELESSNESS FOR OVER 3, 000 PEOPLE
- 24 THROUGH 56 INSIGHT SAFE OPERATIONS AND 17 PATHWAY HOME
- 25 OPERATIONS. THESE ARE OPERATIONS THAT WORK BECAUSE WE OFFER



- 1 CREDIBLE PATHWAYS TO HOUSING, NOT THREATS OF FINES OR ARRESTS.
- 2 AN ADDITIONAL CONCERN IS DISPLACEMENT. INCREASED ENFORCEMENT
- 3 OF CAMPING RESTRICTIONS COULD PUSH PEOPLE EXPERIENCING
- 4 HOMELESSNESS INTO SURROUNDING COMMUNITIES AND UNINCORPORATED
- 5 AREAS. THIS WOULD MAKE IT MORE DIFFICULT TO PROVIDE SERVICES
- 6 IN THEIR HOME COMMUNITIES AND EXACERBATE CAPACITY CONSTRAINTS
- 7 IN COMMUNITIES THAT DO NOT CRIMINALIZE CAMPING. AS PEOPLE ARE
- 8 FORCED TO MOVE DUE TO THE THREAT OF CITATIONS AND FINES, IT
- 9 MAKES IT HARDER FOR OUTREACH TEAMS TO LOCATE, CONNECT, AND
- 10 BUILD TRUST WITH PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS. PEOPLE WHO
- 11 HAVE BEEN DISPLACED ARE ALSO MORE LIKELY TO SEEK SECLUDED
- 12 LOCATIONS WHERE THEY ARE AT GREATER RISK OF BECOMING VICTIMS
- 13 OF CRIMES AND THOSE CRIMES ARE LESS LIKELY TO BE REPORTED TO
- 14 LAW ENFORCEMENT. FINALLY, THE MISALIGNMENT OF STRATEGIES IS
- 15 COUNTERPRODUCTIVE. LEANING ON INCREASED CRIMINALIZATION OF
- 16 CAMPING WITHOUT INVESTING IN AN ADEQUATE SUPPLY OF INTERIM AND
- 17 PERMANENT HOUSING WOULD BE MISALIGNED WITH THE COUNTY'S
- 18 FRAMEWORK TO END HOMELESSNESS. IT WOULD ALSO STRAIN THE
- 19 EXISTING SYSTEM BECAUSE THERE WOULD BE AN INCREASED NEED FOR
- 20 OUTREACH COORDINATION AND INTERIM HOUSING TO ENSURE PEOPLE ARE
- 21 NOT CRIMINALIZED.

23 CHERI TODOROFF: THANK YOU. AND NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. WE WOULD

- 24 NOW LIKE TO TALK ABOUT OUR RECOMMENDATIONS AND WHERE WE GO

- 1 IMPLEMENTATION OF THESE 5 RECOMMENDATIONS WILL HELP US
- 2 MITIGATE ANY NEGATIVE IMPACTS FROM THE GRANT'S PAST DECISION.
- 3 WE WILL START WITH RECOMMENDATION NUMBER 1 AND DR. ADAMS-
- 4 KELLUM.

- 6 DR. VA LECIA ADAMS KELLUM: THANK YOU, CHERI. I AM ADDRESSING
- 7 RECOMMENDATION 1, AS YOU NOTED. THE COUNTY, LAHSA, AND OUR
- 8 PROVIDERS KNOW HOW TO END HOMELESSNESS WITHOUT CRIMINALIZING
- 9 PEOPLE'S SURVIVAL STRATEGIES. WE KNOW HOW TO END HOMELESSNESS
- 10 AND OUR SUCCESS IS NOT THEORETICAL. IT IS MEASURABLE. SINCE
- 11 THE LAUNCH OF INSIGHT SAFE AND PATHWAY HOME, UNSHELTERED
- 12 HOMELESSNESS HAS DROPPED BY OVER 5% WHILE THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE
- 13 IN SHELTERS ROSE BY ALMOST 13%. IN THE MOST RECENT PIT COUNT,
- 14 WE SAW SIGNIFICANT DECLINES IN VEHICULAR HOMELESSNESS AND A
- 15 31% DECLINE IN THE NUMBER OF MAKESHIFT SHELTERS. THIS PROGRESS
- 16 IS NO ACCIDENT, AND CRIMINALIZATION PLAYED NO ROLE. INSTEAD,
- 17 THIS PROGRESS IS THE RESULT OF L.A. COUNTY AND OUR MUNICIPAL
- 18 PARTNERS USING EVIDENCE-BASED, TRAUMA-INFORMED TECHNIQUES,
- 19 SUCH AS ESTABLISHING STRONG ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION COORDINATION
- 20 BY LEVERAGING OUR EMERGENCY UNIFIED COMMAND STRUCTURES,
- 21 PROVIDING AMPLE TIME TO ENGAGE PEOPLE LIVING IN ENCAMPMENTS
- 22 AND DOCUMENTING THEIR ACCESS AND FUNCTIONAL NEEDS.
- 23 PRIORITIZING TRUSTED RELATIONSHIPS, TRANSPARENCY, AND RAPPORT
- 24 WITH ENCAMPMENT RESIDENTS TO ENSURE THEIR AGENCY IN THE
- 25 VOLUNTARY REHOUSING PROCESS USING A TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE



- 1 APPROACH AND OFFERING LOW BARRIER HOUSING OPTIONS TO ENSURE
- 2 PEOPLE WANT TO COME INSIDE. PREPARING ENOUGH INTERIM AND
- 3 PERMANENT HOUSING ALTERNATIVES SO UNHOUSED PEOPLE HAVE
- 4 SOMEWHERE APPROPRIATE TO GO. AND PARTNERING WITH CREDIBLE AND
- 5 EXPERIENCED PROVIDERS WITH DEEP TIES TO THE COMMUNITY AND
- 6 LETTING THEM LEAD AND ALSO LEANING IN TO PEOPLE WITH LIVED
- 7 EXPERIENCE IN THIS WORK. I'LL TURN YOU BACK OVER TO CHERI.

- 9 CHERI TODOROFF: THANK YOU. RECOMMENDATION NUMBER 2 IS TO
- 10 PARTNER WITH MUNICIPALITIES ON EVIDENCE-BASED SOLUTIONS. SO
- 11 THE COLLECTIVE EFFORTS OF CITIES, COUNCILS OF GOVERNMENT, AND
- 12 THE COUNTY TO PREVENT HOMELESSNESS, CONNECT UNSHELTERED PEOPLE
- 13 TO OUTREACH AND SERVICES IN THEIR COMMUNITY, PROVIDE OUR
- 14 RESIDENTS WITH AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AND DELIVER STABILIZING
- 15 CARE ARE FAR MORE IMPACTFUL FOR REDUCING AND PREVENTING
- 16 HOMELESSNESS THAN STRATEGIES THAT FURTHER DISPLACE AND WE HAVE
- 17 ESTABLISHED ROBUST PARTNERSHIPS WITH CITIES AND COUNCILS OF
- 18 GOVERNMENT AND ARE GROWING THOSE PARTNERSHIPS BY CREATING
- 19 LOCAL SOLUTION FUNDING AGREEMENTS, INNOVATION FUNDS, REGIONAL
- 20 COORDINATION FUNDS, CITY AND COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENT INTERIM
- 21 HOUSING FUND, AND SUBSTANTIAL NEW PARTNERSHIPS ON LOCAL
- 22 ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTIONS THROUGH THE INSIGHT SAFE AND PATHWAY
- 23 HOME PROGRAM. WE HAVE ALSO WITHIN THIS COUNTY WITH DIFFERENT
- 24 JURISDICTIONS INCLUDING THE COUNTY AND SOME CITIES HAVE
- 25 SECURED SEVERAL ROUNDS OF THE STATE'S ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION



- 1 FUNDING THAT WE ARE INVESTING IN LOCAL COMMUNITIES. THE COUNTY
- 2 WILL CONTINUE TO WORK WITH CITIES TO EXPAND PARTNERSHIPS THAT
- 3 ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS THROUGH INTERIM PERMANENT HOUSING,
- 4 ALIGNING RESOURCES AND REGIONAL COORDINATION. THIS INCLUDES
- 5 PARTNERING WITH CITIES TO BRING IN NEW RESOURCES SUCH AS
- 6 THROUGH PATHWAY HOME AND THROUGH FUNDING THAT WE'RE ABLE TO
- 7 SECURE SUCH AS THE STATE ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION GRANTS.
- 8 RECOMMENDATION NUMBER 3 IS TO PUBLICLY ACKNOWLEDGE
- 9 HOMELESSNESS AS A REGIONAL CRISIS. WE ARE NOT ABLE TO DICTATE
- 10 HOW OUR MUNICIPAL PARTNERS RESPOND TO THE GRANTS PASS RULING,
- 11 BUT WE CAN INVITE THEM TO PUBLICLY ALIGN THEIR STRATEGIES WITH
- 12 OUR FRAMEWORK TO END HOMELESSNESS, WHICH FOCUSES ON
- 13 PREVENTION, COORDINATION, CONNECTING PEOPLE TO RESOURCES
- 14 THROUGH OUTREACH AND ENGAGEMENT, HOUSING, BOTH INTERIM AND
- 15 PERMANENT, AND STABILIZATION THROUGH SUPPORTIVE SERVICES. WE
- 16 CAN ALL PUBLICLY DECLARE OUR INTENT TO BE GOOD NEIGHBORS BY
- 17 COMMITTING TO AVOID DISPLACEMENT POLICIES THAT SHUFFLE
- 18 HOMELESSNESS FROM ONE JURISDICTION TO ANOTHER. WE NEED
- 19 REGIONAL ALIGNMENT TO ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS BY INVESTING IN
- 20 INTERIM PERMANENT HOUSING, WRAPPING SERVICES AROUND OUR
- 21 VULNERABLE NEIGHBORS, AND PREVENTING HOMELESSNESS FROM
- 22 HAPPENING. AT THE JULY 26TH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FOR REGIONAL
- 23 HOMELESSNESS ALIGNMENT, THE COMMITTEE MEMBERS DID DISCUSS THE
- 24 CONCEPT OF A GOOD NEIGHBOR PLEDGE TO AFFIRM THEIR DEDICATION
- 25 TO PRACTICES THAT PRIORITIZE COORDINATION, OFFER SERVICES, AND



- 1 ACHIEVE SUSTAINABLE LONG-TERM SOLUTIONS. AT LEAST ONE COG HAS
- 2 DRAFTED AND IS CONSIDERING SUCH A PLEDGE. MORE ARE ALSO
- 3 LOOKING AT IT. THERE WAS A DISCUSSION AMONG THE COMMITTEE
- 4 MEMBERS TO TAKE BACK THE CONCEPT OF A GOOD NEIGHBOR PLEDGE TO
- 5 THEIR JURISDICTIONS TO GARNER SUPPORT. I WILL HAND IT TO
- 6 SHERIFF LUNA.

- 8 ROBERT LUNA: GOOD MORNING AND THANK YOU FOR HAVING ME AS PART
- 9 OF THIS TEAM. IT'S AMAZING. I'VE NEVER BEEN SO HAPPY TO BE
- 10 CROWDED AMONGST THIS TABLE. AND THE REASON FOR THAT IS THE
- 11 FACT THAT WE COLLABORATE SO WELL IN OUR COUNTY TO TAKE ON SUCH
- 12 A CHALLENGING PROBLEM OR CHALLENGE. SO, I JUST WANNA MAKE SURE
- 13 THAT EVERYONE UNDERSTANDS FROM THE L.A. COUNTY SHERIFF'S
- 14 DEPARTMENT, WE TAKE A SERVICE LED APPROACH. WE HAVE FOR YEARS
- 15 AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO DO THAT WITH THESE TOUGH CHALLENGES.
- 16 OUR HOMELESS OUTREACH SERVICES CO-RESPONSE TEAM HAS BEEN
- 17 ACTIVELY ENGAGING WITH INDIVIDUALS IN ENCAMPMENTS ACROSS OUR
- 18 COUNTY FOR MANY YEARS, EFFECTIVELY CONNECTING THEM WITH
- 19 ESSENTIAL SERVICES AND TEMPORARY HOUSING. AND I SAY THAT NOT
- 20 JUST FROM OUR HOST TEAM, BUT WHAT MAKES US SO EFFECTIVE IS THE
- 21 COLLABORATIVE EFFORT THAT WE HAVE WITH ALL OF OUR PARTNERS
- 22 YOU'RE HEARING FROM UP HERE. OUR APPROACH EMPHASIZES SUSTAINED
- 23 OUTREACH AND COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENTS BEFORE ANY RESOLUTION
- 24 OR DISPLACEMENT MAY OCCUR. WE ABSOLUTELY FOCUS ON A
- 25 CONSTITUTIONAL APPROACH. BEING HOMELESS IS NOT A CRIME AND WE



- 1 WILL MAINTAIN OUR FOCUS ON CRIMINAL BEHAVIOR RATHER THAN AN
- 2 INDIVIDUAL STATUS, WHICH IS KEY. AS ALWAYS, ANY CRIMINAL
- 3 ACTIVITY WILL BE DRESSED ACCORDINGLY. THE GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE
- 4 ORDER, FOR EXAMPLE, WILL NOT ALTER THE WAY OUR DEPARTMENT
- 5 APPROACHES OR MANAGES THE UNHOUSED POPULATION. BUT THOUGH IT
- 6 WILL INCREASE THE FACT THAT WE HAVE TO COMMUNICATE WITH THE
- 7 CHP MORE OFTEN, BECAUSE IF THEY ARE DOING CLEANUPS, WE WANT TO
- 8 MAKE SURE THEY'RE COORDINATING WITH US AS LOCAL OFFICIALS. AND
- 9 JUST SO YOU'RE AWARE, I'VE BEEN DIRECTLY COMMUNICATING WITH
- 10 THE COMMISSIONER OF THE CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY PATROL, SEAN DERUE,
- 11 BOTH LAST WEEK AND EVEN UP TO THIS MORNING TO MAKE SURE THAT
- 12 WE ARE MOVING FORWARD TOGETHER AS WE DO THIS. ADDITIONALLY,
- 13 THE DEPARTMENT HAS VERY STRICT ACCEPTANCE CRITERIA FOR
- 14 BOOKINGS INTO OUR CUSTODY FACILITIES AND OUR PROTOCOLS WILL
- 15 REMAIN THE SAME FOR MISDEMEANOR OFFENSES. IT'S IMPORTANT TO
- 16 NOTE THAT THE IDEA OF CRIMINALIZING HOMELESSNESS IS NOT THE
- 17 ANSWER, AS MY PARTNERS UP HERE HAVE SAID, SO WE WILL NOT
- 18 CHANGE OUR ESTABLISHED CUSTODY STANDARDS BECAUSE OF WHAT WE'RE
- 19 HEARING ABOUT TODAY. BUT IN ALL MY CONVERSATIONS, AND I'LL
- 20 TALK ABOUT THAT WITH OUR PARTNERS IN CONTRACT CITY AND
- 21 INDEPENDENT CITIES, THEY'RE VERY CONCERNED BECAUSE THERE ARE
- 22 INDIVIDUALS, NOT GROUPS OF PEOPLE THAT ARE COMMITTING CRIMES,
- 23 THEY WANNA MAKE SURE THEY'RE GONNA BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE. WE
- 24 WILL STILL RESPOND AND HELP AND ASSIST AND DO WHATEVER WE CAN,
- 25 SERVICE FIRST, OR "CARE FIRST", SERVICE FIRST, AND THEN



- 1 ENFORCEMENT. WE REMAIN COMMITTED TO COLLABORATIVELY WORKING
- 2 WITH OUR COUNTY PARTNERS TO COMPASSIONATELY ADDRESS
- 3 HOMELESSNESS ENCAMPMENTS AND PROVIDE CONSTITUTIONAL CARE AND
- 4 SERVICE-ORIENTED ASSISTANCE. THIS TAKES A COUNTYWIDE
- 5 DEPARTMENT-COORDINATED EFFORT, AND IT IS DONE THROUGH THE LOS
- 6 ANGELES COUNTY CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICE, LOS ANGELES HOMELESS
- 7 SERVICES AUTHORITY, THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH, THE
- 8 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH, PUBLIC WORKS, AND ANIMAL CARE,
- 9 JUST TO NAME A FEW. AND AS I WRAP UP MY COMMENTS AND I
- 10 MENTIONED IT EARLIER, I WANT ALL OF OUR SUPERVISORS TO KNOW
- 11 THAT THIS IS AN ISSUE THAT IS ON THE FOREFRONT OF CONCERN FOR
- 12 MANY OF OUR ELECTED OFFICIALS AND LEADERS. SO BACK ON JULY
- 13 22ND, WITH THE HELP OF THE L.A. COUNTY INDEPENDENT CHIEFS, WE
- 14 HELD A MEETING THAT INCLUDED EVERY CHIEF IN LOS ANGELES
- 15 COUNTY. AND FOR THE STRICT PURPOSES OF COMMUNICATING AND
- 16 MAKING SURE THAT WE WERE GONNA BE GOOD NEIGHBORS IN A
- 17 STRATEGIC MANNER. WE WOULDN'T BE PUSHING PROBLEMS OFF ON EACH
- 18 OTHER AS WE'RE DEALING WITH THIS AND LET'S BE FRANK FOR US 42
- 19 CONTRACT CITIES 42 MAYORS 42 COUNCILS AND A LOT OF THEM ARE
- 20 VERY DIVERSE IN THE WAY THEY THINK I THINK WE WENT A LONG WAYS
- 21 OF GETTING ON THE SAME PAGE I MET ON THE 24TH WITH MY PARTNER
- 22 FROM LAHSA, THE GOOD DOCTOR, WE HAD A REALLY GOOD
- 23 CONVERSATION. ON THE 25TH, I MET WITH CONTRACT CITY, CITY
- 24 MANAGERS TO AGAIN, TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE COMMUNICATING AND
- 25 COORDINATING. I'VE BEEN COMMUNICATING WITH THE CHP



- 1 COMMISSIONER, MYSELF, AND THEN YESTERDAY I HAD A MEETING THAT
- 2 INCLUDED OVER 200 MEMBERS OF CONTRACT AND INDEPENDENT CITIES
- 3 TO PROVIDE OUR APPROACH AND ENCOURAGE THAT WE BE STRATEGIC AND
- 4 GOOD NEIGHBORS. AND I'D REALLY LIKE TO PUBLICLY THANK MARCEL
- 5 RODARTE FOR HELPING ME AND GETTING THAT MEETING TOGETHER. SO,
- 6 WITH THAT, THAT CONCLUDES MY COMMENTS.

- 8 CHERI TODOROFF: AND WE HAVE CONCLUDED OUR PRESENTATION, THANK
- 9 YOU.

- 11 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR HAHN, I'LL
- 12 TURN IT TO YOU.

- 14 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR, AND I APPRECIATE THE
- 15 PANEL HERE TODAY. AGAIN, THIS WAS A RESPONSE TO A MOTION THAT
- 16 I BROUGHT FORTH BECAUSE IT JUST SEEMED LIKE THERE WAS A LOT OF
- 17 CONFUSION, A LOT OF ASSUMPTIONS ABOUT THE SUPREME COURT
- 18 DECISION, SO I THOUGHT IT WOULD BE APPROPRIATE THAT WE HAVE
- 19 ALL THE RIGHT PEOPLE HERE TALKING TO US AND GIVING US A BETTER
- 20 PERSPECTIVE ABOUT WHAT THAT DECISION MEANS TO US HERE. AS I
- 21 SAID, IT'S ALSO RAISED CONCERN AMONG OUR HOMELESS PROVIDERS
- 22 AND OUR ADVOCATES ABOUT THE POTENTIAL CRIMINALIZATION OF
- 23 HOMELESSNESS. AND I THINK A LOT OF OUR CITIES ARE LOOKING
- 24 TOWARDS US HERE IN THE COUNTY HOW WE CAN WORK TOGETHER TO
- 25 ADDRESS THIS CRISIS. I KNOW CONTRACT CITIES, YOU'VE ALREADY



- 1 MENTIONED THAT. I SEE JENNIFER PEREZ, THE NEW PRESIDENT OF
- 2 CONTRACT CITIES, IS HERE TODAY. MARCEL RODARTE, EXECUTIVE
- 3 DIRECTOR, HAS ALSO MADE SOME COMMENTS THAT I LISTENED TO
- 4 YESTERDAY THAT I WAS GLAD TO HEAR. BUT YOU KNOW, I THINK WHAT
- 5 WE'RE FEELING TOO IS THAT I THINK A LOT OF PEOPLE ARE A LITTLE
- 6 BIT NERVOUS ABOUT THIS DECISION BECAUSE WE'RE FEELING FROM A
- 7 LOT OF OUR CITIES KIND OF A LITTLE BIT OF FATIGUE,
- 8 PARTICULARLY ENCAMPMENT FATIGUE. AND BEFORE MANY OF OUR LOCAL
- 9 JURISDICTIONS FELT LIKE THEIR HANDS WERE TIED IN TERMS OF WHAT
- 10 THEY COULD DO, BUT THIS FEELS A LITTLE BIT ABOUT LIKE THEIR

- 17 KNOW THE CONDITION OF OUR JAILS. WE KNOW THEY'RE ALREADY
- 18 OVERCROWDED, AND THIS IS JUST NOT A GOOD SOLUTION. BUT I THINK
- 19 WE'RE ALL CONCERNED ABOUT, YOU KNOW, WHAT'S GOING TO HAPPEN.
- 20 AND ALSO, I HAD SOME OF OUR CITIES REACH OUT TO US TO SEE WHAT
- 21 AUTHORITY THE COUNTY HAS TO PREVENT CITIES FROM PUSHING
- 22 HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS INTO OTHER CITIES. AND I'M GOING TO ASK
- 23 THAT OUESTION. AND I WORRY ABOUT OUR UNINCORPORATED AREA WHERE
- 24 SOMETIMES THEY CAN BE NEGATIVELY AFFECTED BY POLICIES FROM
- 25 NEIGHBORING CITIES. SO, I THINK THIS IS A REALLY GOOD



- 1 DISCUSSION TODAY. I KNOW MY COLLEAGUES HAVE A LOT OF GOOD
- 2 OUESTIONS AS WELL. LET ME JUST START AND ANA YOU'RE
- 3 REPRESENTING THE COUNTY COUNSEL, RIGHT? SO LET ME JUST START
- 4 BY SAYING AGAIN FOR CLARIFICATION IF A CITY OR COUNTY WERE TO
- 5 REGULATE THE TIME AND PLACE LIKE WHERE YOU CAN HAVE AN
- 6 ENCAMPMENT OR WHERE NOT. WOULD THAT VIOLATE BEING CRUEL AND
- 7 UNUSUAL AS YOU SEE THIS DECISION? OR IS THAT SOMETHING THAT WE
- 8 CAN NOW DO, IS REGULATE WHERE AN ENCAMPMENT, BECAUSE I THINK
- 9 THERE'S A LOT OF PEOPLE THAT LIKE, YOU KNOW, I'M OKAY WITH

- 13 ENCAMPMENTS ARE WITHOUT VIOLATING THE CRUEL AND UNUSUAL PIECE
- 14 OF THAT AMENDMENT.

- 8 VIOLATE, IS THAT, AND I THOUGHT THAT WAS PART OF WHAT WE WERE
- 9 ASKING TO CLARIFY WITH THIS DECISION, WAS DOES THAT CONSTITUTE
- 10 CRUEL AND UNUSUAL PUNISHMENT TO REGULATE TIME, PLACE, AND
- 11 MANNER OF WHERE PEOPLE ARE SLEEPING?

- 13 DAWYN R. HARRISON: WELL, THE OPINION DOESN'T ADDRESS THAT
- 14 SPECIFICALLY, BUT WHAT THE OPINION DOES SAY IS THAT
- 15 ENFORCEMENT OF WHATEVER ORDINANCES ARE ON THE BOOKS AS LONG AS
- 16 THEY ARE NEUTRAL, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER THEY'RE, THEREFORE, AS
- 17 LONG AS THEY ARE NEUTRAL, SO LONG AS THEY ARE NOT HOMELESS
- 18 PERSONS SPECIFIC, THEY ARE JUST NEUTRAL ENCAMPMENT LAWS, TIME,
- 19 PLACE, AND MANNER, THAT WOULD NOT VIOLATE CRUEL AND UNUSUAL,
- 20 BUT IF THEY'RE TARGETING A HOMELESS POPULATION AND STATUS,
- 21 THAT WOULD BE A VIOLATION.

- 23 SUP. JANICE HAHN: AND IS THERE, DOES THE COUNTY HAVE ANY LEGAL
- 24 REMEDY OR AVENUES SHOULD CITIES BEGIN TO PUSH HOMELESS
- 25 ENCAMPMENTS TO OTHER CITIES OR INTO OUR UNINCORPORATED? IS



1 THERE SOME LEGAL AVENUE WE HAVE?

- 3 ANA LAI: SO, I KNOW SOME CITIES ARE ALREADY EXPLORING
- 4 INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENTS AS A POTENTIAL SOLUTION. HOWEVER,
- 5 THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THESE AGREEMENTS IS UNCERTAIN.
- 6 ALTERNATIVELY, CITIES COULD PURSUE LEGAL ACTION AGAINST
- 7 ANOTHER CITY FOR PUBLIC NUISANCE, BUT THIS WOULD REQUIRE A
- 8 THOROUGH INVESTIGATION OF THE RELEVANT FACTS AND THE
- 9 CIRCUMSTANCES.

- 11 SUP. JANICE HAHN: OKAY, THANK YOU. AND I WAS GLAD TO SEE TARI
- 12 IN THE PRESENTATION KIND OF WHAT WORKS AND KIND OF SORT OF
- 13 DOUBLING DOWN ON WHAT WORKS AND CERTAINLY PATHWAY HOME IS A
- 14 STRATEGY THAT WE HAVE SEEN VERY POSITIVE RESULTS. AND JUST
- 15 BASED A LITTLE BIT ON THIS DECISION AND SOME OF THE ANXIETY
- 16 OUT THERE, CHERI, WHERE ARE WE IN TERMS OF RAMPING UP THE
- 17 PATHWAY HOME? I KNOW SINCE MARCH WE'VE BEEN HOPING YOU WOULD
- 18 SAY AT LEAST ONE A WEEK. HOW ARE WE DOING?

- 20 CHERI TODOROFF: YES AND THANK YOU. AND I THINK THAT SOLUTIONS
- 21 SUCH AS REALLY COMPREHENSIVE ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION PROGRAMS
- 22 SUCH AS PATHWAY HOME, SUCH AS INSIDE SAFE, ARE THE WAY THAT WE
- 23 SHOULD BE RESPONDING TO ENCAMPMENTS AND ARE THE BEST PRACTICE.
- 24 IT DOES NEED TO COME WITH ENGAGEMENT, IT DOES NEED TO COME
- 25 WITH ENGAGEMENT. IT DOES NEED TO COME WITH OUTREACH, WITH



- 1 TRUST BUILDING. IT NEEDS TO COME WITH HOUSING. WE NEED TO HAVE
- 2 PLACES TO BRING PEOPLE INSIDE, AND WE NEED TO CREATE PATHWAYS
- 3 TO PERMANENT HOUSING. SOLUTIONS SUCH AS PATHWAY HOME ARE THAT
- 4 FULL CONTINUUM, FULL CIRCLE OF SOLUTION BECAUSE WE ARE
- 5 INTENTIONALLY ADDING ALL OF THOSE COMPONENTS SO THE OUTREACH
- 6 THE INTERIM HOUSING WITH ON-SITE SERVICES AND THE PERMANENT
- 7 HOUSING WITH SERVICES AS WELL AS SUPPORT FOR OUR COMMUNITIES
- 8 PUBLIC WORKS IS INVOLVED SHERIFFS INVOLVED ISD PUBLIC HEALTH,
- 9 EVERYBODY. VERY COMPREHENSIVE. AND THOSE ARE THE SOLUTIONS. SO
- 10 YES, WE ARE, WE LAUNCHED LAST FISCAL YEAR, WE ARE SCALING UP

- 12 HOTEL ROOMS THAT WE'RE SEEKING. WE HAVE SHARED PREVIOUSLY THAT
- 13 OUR CHALLENGES THERE HAVE BEEN CAPACITY CHALLENGES IN OUR
- 14 SYSTEM BECAUSE WE HAVE BEEN ASKING OUR PROVIDERS AND OUR
- 15 COMMUNITIES TO CONTINUE TO INCREASE, TO SUPPORT THIS LEVEL OF
- 16 WORK AS IT EXPANDS, RIGHT? AND SO, WE HAVE 3 REALLY KEY
- 17 PARTNERS HERE. WE HAVE OUR PROVIDERS WHO NEED TO BE ABLE TO
- 18 ADD AND RETAIN STAFF TO SUPPORT THIS WORK. WE HAVE MOTELS THAT
- 19 WE NEED TO PARTNER WITH US. AND WE HAVE THE LOCAL
- 20 JURISDICTIONS. AND QUITE HONESTLY, OUR CITIES ARE ESSENTIAL.
- 21 WE CANNOT DO THIS WITHOUT THE PARTNERSHIP OF CITIES. WE NEED
- 22 THEIR SUPPORT TO SITE IN THOSE JURISDICTIONS IN ORDER TO BE
- 23 ABLE TO HAVE OUR INTERIM HOUSING AND TO MOVE PEOPLE TO
- 24 PERMANENT HOUSING. AND WE JUST NEED THEIR SUPPORT IN ORDER TO
- 25 EVEN PARTNER IN THOSE CITIES TO DO ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION. BUT

- 4 SUP. JANICE HAHN: RIGHT. SO, AND ARE YOU AT ALL, HOW DO YOU
- 5 THINK GOVERNOR NEWSOM'S RECENT EXECUTIVE ORDER RELATES TO, YOU
- 6 KNOW, WE GOT A GRANT OF \$50,000,000 TO ADDRESS THE ENCAMPMENTS
- 7 ALONG THE 105 FREEWAY. HIS EXECUTIVE ORDER IS LIKE REALLY KIND
- 8 OF PUSHING EVERYBODY TO ACT FASTER. DO WE FEEL LIKE THERE IS
- 9 PROGRESS THAT NEEDS TO HAPPEN? IS THAT GRANT IN JEOPARDY IF WE
- 10 DON'T MOVE QUICKLY ENOUGH? HOW ARE YOU TAKING HIS EXECUTIVE
- 11 ORDER?

- 13 CHERI TODOROFF: YEAH, SO AS IT RELATES TO THE ENCAMPMENT
- 14 RESOLUTION GRANTS THAT HAVE BEEN RECEIVED BY THE COUNTY, OF
- 15 WHICH THERE HAVE BEEN SEVERAL, AS WELL AS DIFFERENT CITIES,
- 16 AND LAHSA, WE ARE NOT CONCERNED ABOUT THE ROLLOUT AND THE
- 17 EXECUTION OF OUR DELIVERABLES UNDER THOSE GRANTS. THEY WERE
- 18 ALL PLANNED VERY WELL. AND FOR EXAMPLE, THE ONE THAT YOU'RE
- 19 REFERRING TO, THAT WAS JUST AWARDED IN THE LAST ROUND, THAT
- 20 ALONG THE 105 CORRIDOR WITH MULTIPLE CITIES AND UNINCORPORATED
- 21 AREAS AND CALTRANS IS ONE THAT IS THAT FULL CIRCLE SOLUTION
- 22 THAT DOES THE OUTREACH INTERIM HOUSING AND PERMANENT HOUSING
- 23 AND MOVES PEOPLE ALL THE WAY OUT OF HOMELESSNESS. AS IT
- 24 RELATES TO THE GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE ORDER, THAT IS ONE IN
- 25 WHICH THERE HAS BEEN LIKE A FAIR AMOUNT OF MISUNDERSTANDING



- 1 AND ALSO A LOT OF LANGUAGE USED IN DIFFERENT SPACES AND IN THE
- 2 MEDIA THAT HAS CREATED SOME CONFUSION. AND SO, IT'S REALLY
- 3 IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND THAT THAT ORDER DOES NOT INSTRUCT
- 4 CITIES AND COUNTIES TO CLEAR ENCAMPMENTS. INSTEAD, THE ORDER

- 13 YOU FOR THAT, CHERI. I WAS GOING TO ASK THE I DON'T THINK WE
- 14 CALL THEM THAT ANYMORE. THAT'S OLD SCHOOL. SOME TEAMS ZOOMED
- 15 YESTERDAY WITH CONTRACT CITIES. I LISTENED IN FOR PART OF IT,
- 16 I COULDN'T LISTEN TO ALL OF IT. WHAT WAS THE FEEDBACK YOU
- 17 HEARD FROM SOME OF OUR CITIES.

- 19 ROBERT LUNA: OBVIOUSLY A LOT OF CONCERN. I WAS HAPPY THAT,
- 20 LIKE I SAID EARLIER, WELL OVER 200 PEOPLE WERE ABLE TO GET ON
- 21 THE CALL, SO YOU CAN SEE THAT THERE'S A LOT OF NEED FOR
- 22 INFORMATION AND STRESSING COMMUNICATION. AND ALTHOUGH NOT
- 23 EVERYBODY SPOKE UP, SOME OF THE FOLKS THAT SPOKE UP WERE

- 4 UNTIL YOU SAID THAT. TELL THEM ALL TO COME DOWN.

- 6 ROBERT LUNA: WELL, JUST TO SHARE THEIR PERSPECTIVES, WHICH ARE
- 7 VERY IMPORTANT AS PARTNERS FOR US, SPECIFICALLY FOR OUR
- 8 CONTRACT CITY PARTNERS. BUT THEY'RE VERY CONCERNED ABOUT THE
- 9 FACT THAT THE PROBLEMS THAT PERSIST THAT THEIR CONSTITUENTS

- 6 FOR THEM TO HEAR BECAUSE I THINK THAT WAS ALSO OF THE CONCERN
- 7 PARTICULARLY AS WE'RE MAKING A POLICY DECISION HERE TO BE
- 8 CLEAR THAT WE DON'T WANT OUR JAILS TO BE USED FOR, YOU KNOW,
- 9 AS PART OF THE CABINET RESOLUTION PIECE. AND I THINK WE'RE
- 10 GONNA, I THINK, STAND CLEAR ON THAT, BUT I THINK THEY WERE
- 11 CONCERNED, WELL, WHAT IF THERE WAS, YOU DON'T MEAN PEOPLE THAT
- 12 ARE COMMITTING CRIMES, DO YOU? I MEAN,

- 14 ROBERT LUNA: EXACTLY, AND CLARIFYING OUR ACCEPTANCE CRITERIA
- 15 INTO THE COUNTY JAIL WAS ALSO VERY IMPORTANT FOR EVERYONE TO
- 16 HEAR NOT ONLY WHAT IT IS, BUT WHY IT IS WHAT IT IS. THE FACT
- 17 THAT WE DON'T DETAIN, AS MANY THINK, A LOT OF LOWER LEVEL
- 18 OFFENDERS IN OUR COUNTY JAIL. AND WE HAVE THE STATISTICS TO
- 19 PROVE THAT, AND WE'RE NOT GOING TO START TODAY OR TOMORROW. SO
- 20 THAT WAS A BIG REASON FOR CLARIFICATION IN THIS MEETING.

- 22 SUP. JANICE HAHN: RIGHT. AND I THINK IF PEOPLE AREN'T AWARE OF
- 23 YOUR HOST TEAM, THEY REALLY SHOULD BE BECAUSE I'VE GOTTEN TO
- 24 KNOW CAPTAIN DIEDRICH FOR A LONG TIME. ACTUALLY, THE FIRST
- 25 TIME WAS WHEN I SERVED ON THE ALAMEDA CORRIDOR TRANSPORTATION



- 1 AUTHORITY. AND THAT WAS A LONG TIME AGO WHEN THERE WAS A SENSE
- 2 OF CLEARING ENCAMPMENTS OF FOLKS WHO WERE SLEEPING ON THE
- 3 TRAIN TRACKS OR NEAR THE TRAIN TRACKS, AND IT BECAME A POINT
- 4 OF PUBLIC SAFETY. AND I DON'T KNOW, CAPTAIN DIEDRICH, IF YOU
- 5 WANTED TO TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE PROTOCOL THAT HOST USES
- 6 WHEN THEY ARE PART OF THE ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION TO CLEAR AN
- 7 ENCAMPMENT.

- 9 SPEAKER: GOOD MORNING SUPERVISORS, IT'S NICE BEING BACK. IT'S
- 10 BEEN A WHILE. AND I'M VERY HONORED TO BE HERE TODAY TO
- 11 REPRESENT THE HOST TEAM BECAUSE ITS HISTORY IS TREASURED AND I
- 12 DON'T THINK ANY OF US THOUGHT THAT IT WOULD BE THIS
- 13 SUCCESSFUL. THE HOST TEAM IS SET OUT AS A HUMANITARIAN EFFORT.
- 14 IT WAS THE FIRST CO-RESPONSE HOMELESS OUTREACH TEAM OF ITS
- 15 KIND IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY. PAIRING A SPECIALLY TRAINED DEPUTY
- 16 SHERIFF IN CRISIS STABILIZATION TECHNIQUES, EVEN INCLUDING
- 17 TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE AND MOTIVATIONAL INTERVIEWING, THINGS
- 18 THAT TRADITIONALLY HAD NOT BEEN TAUGHT TO LAW ENFORCEMENT.
- 19 THAT SPECIALLY TRAINED DEPUTY PAIRED WITH A HOMELESS OUTREACH
- 20 SPECIALIST FROM THE LOS ANGELES HOMELESS SERVICES AUTHORITY
- 21 WHO HAVE BEEN OUR PARTNERS EVER SINCE. OUR PROTOCOL, WHICH WAS
- 22 CREATED BY THE BOARD BACK IN 2011, AND I SAY IT'S ONE OF THE
- 23 MOST FORWARD-THINKING DOCUMENTS BECAUSE IT WAS A COLLABORATION
- 24 BETWEEN THE BOARD, THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE, AND I BELIEVE THE
- 25 DISTRICT ATTORNEY AT THE TIME ALONG WITH LAHSA. BUT IT



- 1 BASICALLY IS A FIVE-POINT PROTOCOL AND IT SURVIVED JUDICIAL
- 2 REVIEW. IT'S BEEN VIEWED AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL, STATE LEVEL,
- 3 LOCAL LEVEL, AND IT'S AN AMAZING PROCESS THAT'S NOW BECOME A
- 4 NATIONAL MODEL. AND I'LL SIMPLY TOUCH ON EACH OF THE 5 STEPS.
- 5 IDENTIFICATION, SOMEONE SEES AN ENCAMPMENT AND OUR CRITERIA IS
- 6 5 OR MORE. BACK THEN THE BOARD SET A NUMBER TO TRY TO ASSESS
- 7 HOW DO WE DO THIS WITH FINDING THAT MEDIUM. SO, IT'S 5 OR MORE
- 8 FOLKS WHO LIVE THERE, WHO HAVE THEIR PROPERTY AND THEY'VE
- 9 BUILT EITHER SOME KIND OF STRUCTURE OR THEY HAVE THEIR TENT.
- 10 IF IT'S 5 OR MORE WITH THAT CRITERIA, THAT ENACTS THIS
- 11 PROTOCOL. STEP TWO'S ASSESSMENT, THAT'S WHERE OURS IS
- 12 DIFFERENT FROM MOST IN THE WHOLE COUNTRY. OUR ASSESSMENT IS AN
- 13 IN-DEPTH TRIAGE BECAUSE WHAT WE FOUND THROUGH LESSONS LEARNED
- 14 AND CHALLENGES THAT I'LL TOUCH ON WITH THAT EXAMPLE IS THAT
- 15 OUITE OFTEN RESOURCES WERE BEING GIVEN TO ONE THAT DIDN'T NEED
- 16 THOSE RESOURCES, THEY NEEDED OTHERS. AND SO, IN THAT TRIAGE,
- 17 WE IDENTIFY THE PERSON, IDENTIFY HOW THEY GOT THERE BECAUSE WE
- 18 FELT IF WE FIGURED OUT HOW THEY GOT THERE, WE COULD FIND THEIR
- 19 WAY BACK OUT. AND SO THAT'S PROVEN TO BE VERY VALUABLE. SO, IN
- 20 THAT ASSESSMENT, IT'S GETTING TO KNOW THE PERSON. AND WE FIND
- 21 OUT WHO THEIR TEACHERS ARE, WHO THEIR FAMILY ARE. AND THAT
- 22 ACTUALLY OPENED A DOOR, WHICH WE BELIEVE SAVES THE COUNTY A
- 23 LOT OF MONEY WITH FAMILY REUNIFICATION. BECAUSE THERE'S
- 24 NOTHING MORE POWERFUL THAN HAVING A DEPUTY SHERIFF CALL A
- 25 FAMILY MEMBER SAYING, WE FOUND YOUR LOVED ONE, AND THEY WANT



- 1 TO COME HOME. AND IT'S PRETTY HEARTWARMING. AND WE'VE HAD
- 2 SPECIALISTS FROM LAHSA AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS REALLY TEACH US
- 3 HOW TO DO THAT. AND SO, WE'RE VERY GRATEFUL FOR THAT. BUT THAT
- 4 ASSESSMENT TAKES AWAY THE ANONYMITY OF ONE IN AN ENCAMPMENT.
- 5 IT ALSO SHOWS THEM THAT SOMEONE CARES. AND WE ALSO FIND OUT
- 6 WHAT THEIR INDIVIDUAL NEEDS ARE. AND THEN IT'S DOCUMENTED. AND
- 7 THEN THE NEXT STEP IS OUTREACH. IT'S USUALLY A 30 DAY TIME
- 8 PERIOD BASED ON IF THERE'S NO EXIGENCY, A 30 DAY PERIOD WHERE
- 9 NOW THE SPECIALISTS CAN ADDRESS THOSE FACTORS THAT WE FOUND
- 10 DURING THAT ASSESSMENT, EXCUSE ME, DURING THAT ASSESSMENT, AND
- 11 THEN THE OUTREACH EXPERTS GO TO WORK. OUR JOB THEN IS TO
- 12 PROVIDE A SAFE AND SECURE ENVIRONMENT. AND HERE'S WHERE YOUR
- 13 EXAMPLE CAME IN. THERE WAS AN AREA IN THE ALAMEDA CORRIDOR
- 14 WHERE A LOT OF MONEY HAD BEEN SPENT ON AMAZING PEOPLE DOING
- 15 OUTREACH, AND IT WASN'T HELPING. IT GOT WORSE. THERE HAD BEEN
- 16 A COUPLE ACTS OF VIOLENCE. THERE HAD BEEN A FEW SITUATIONS
- 17 THAT WERE TROUBLESOME, AND SUPERVISOR HAHN ASKED THE HOST TEAM
- 18 TO COME IN, AND IT HAD BEEN AFTER A YEAR AND A HALF OF
- 19 OUTREACH IN THAT AREA. THE HOST TEAM CAME IN AND BASICALLY DID
- 20 AN ASSESSMENT WITH THE SAME FOLKS WHO WERE DOING OUTREACH
- 21 ALONG WITH OUR HOST TEAM. 68 DAYS LATER, THE ENCAMPMENT WAS
- 22 CLEARED. ZERO USES OF FORCE, ZERO ARRESTS, AND NO LITIGATION.
- 23 AND SO, THE OUESTION THAT WE ASKED WAS WHY. IT WAS THE SAME
- 24 OUTREACH FOLKS. AND THERE WAS AN ARGUMENT THAT SAID LAW
- 25 ENFORCEMENT HAD NO BUSINESS BEING IN THIS, AND I WAS ONE OF



- 1 THEM IN THE BEGINNING. IT'S LIKE, WHAT ARE WE DOING HERE? THIS
- 2 ISN'T OUR LANE. WHAT THIS TAUGHT US WAS WHEN WE TOOK DEPUTY
- 3 SHERIFFS AND WE HAD TO REMEMBER THAT ALTHOUGH WE ARE LAW
- 4 ENFORCEMENT AND THERE'S A WARRIOR SIDE, THAT'S THE POLICE
- 5 CHASE AND ALL THE THINGS YOU SEE ON TV AND IN THE MOVIES,
- 6 DEPUTIES FROM DAY ONE ARE ALSO TAUGHT THE GUARDIAN SIDE TO
- 7 CARE FOR THAT VICTIM, TO CARE FOR THAT VICTIM OF DOMESTIC
- 8 VIOLENCE, TO CARE FOR THAT PERSON. AND OFTENTIMES WE FALL
- 9 SHORT IN A SENSE BECAUSE OF TIME AND BEING IN A HURRY, BUT
- 10 DEPUTIES HAVE THAT, WE COME TO SERVE. AND SO, WHAT WE FOUND IS
- 11 WHEN WE TRAIN THESE DEPUTY SHERIFFS WITH THE GUARDIAN
- 12 MENTALITY, WITH THE RURAL CRISIS STABILIZATION MODEL THAT HAD
- 13 MOTIVATIONAL INTERVIEWING, CULTURAL HUMILITY, AND THEN
- 14 EMPOWERING THEM TO BE KIND. AND SO, TAKING A DEPUTY AND
- 15 TEACHING THEM THAT YOU CAN BE STRONG AND KIND AT THE SAME
- 16 TIME, THAT'S WHEN THE FOLKS IN THE ENCAMPMENTS SAID WE FELT
- 17 SAFE. AND SO, WHEN THEY FELT SAFE, NOW THEY COULD HEAR THE
- 18 OUTREACH THAT WAS OCCURRING. AND SO, I THANK YOU FOR THAT. AND
- 19 I'LL JUST QUICKLY FINISH. STEP 4 IS POSTING AND STEP 5 IS
- 20 CLEANUP.

- 22 SUP. JANICE HAHN: YEAH, SO THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR THAT. AGAIN,
- 23 I WANT TO KNOW HOW WE CAN GET MORE HOST TEAMS. AND I KNOW IT'S
- 24 A FUNDING ISSUE, BUT I THINK IT'S ABOUT, IS IT, MAYBE YOU CAN
- 25 ANSWER THIS, CAPTAIN DIETRICH. WOULD YOU SAY, IN ALL THE YEARS



- 1 YOU'VE BEEN DOING THIS, WHAT WOULD YOU SAY YOUR RECORD IS FOR
- 2 USE OF FORCE AND ARRESTS?

- 4 ROBERT LUNA: SO, I WANTED TO CONFIRM THIS WITH CAPTAIN
- 5 DIETRICH, BUT THEY WERE ESTABLISHED AND HE WAS PART OF PUTTING
- 6 THIS TEAM TOGETHER BACK IN 2015. SINCE 2015, NO CITATIONS, NO
- 7 ARREST, NO USES OF FORCE.

- 9 SUP. JANICE HAHN: YEAH, YEAH, I REALLY WANTED TO HIGHLIGHT
- 10 THAT, AND AGAIN, I THINK IT'S A FUNDING ISSUE, BUT I THINK AS
- 11 WE GO FORWARD, PARTICULARLY WITH THE ANXIETY THAT MANY OF OUR
- 12 CITIES ARE HAVING AS IT RELATES TO THE NEW RULING AND WHAT
- 13 THEY CAN AND CAN'T DO. I THINK THAT THE HOST TEAM IS SUCH A
- 14 MODEL FOR BOTH LAW ENFORCEMENT AS WELL AS BEING KIND AND
- 15 COMPASSIONATE. SO, THANK YOU FOR THAT. MY LAST QUESTION, DR.
- 16 ADAMS KELLUM. WITH ALL THE ANXIETY WE'RE HEARING OUT THERE
- 17 WITH OUR CITIES MORE THAN EVER, WHAT AGAIN, I MEAN, THEY'RE
- 18 GONNA WANNA HEAR FROM YOU. WHAT, YOU KNOW, WHAT WORK ARE YOU
- 19 GOING TO ACCELERATE OR DOUBLE DOWN ON FOR CITIES OUTSIDE OF

- 24 THINGS I STARTED I THINK YOU AND I'VE DISCUSSED LAST YEAR WERE
- 25 COMMUNITY LISTENING SESSIONS SO I'M GOING OUT TO COMMUNITY AND



- 1 I'M LISTENING TO MAYORS OF THOSE CITIES AND THE STAFF AND
- 2 SERVICE PROVIDERS AND COMMUNITY IN GENERAL TO DETERMINE WHAT
- 3 LAHSA CAN DO TO IMPROVE OUR COMMUNICATION WITH THE VARIOUS
- 4 MUNICIPALITIES. AND ONE IS RESPONSIVENESS. WE'VE GOT A

- 7 OVER THAT GROUP, AND HE USED TO BE A CITY MANAGER, SO HE
- 8 UNDERSTANDS THE NEEDS OF SMALLER CITIES, AND WE ARE STEPPING
- 9 UP OUR RESPONSE AND MAKING SURE THAT WE'RE NOT JUST LOOKING AT
- 10 THE LARGER CITIES, BUT WE ARE ALSO MAKING SURE WE ARE OF
- 11 SERVICE ON THE GROUND WHERE WE'RE NEEDED. OUR WORK WITH HOSTS
- 12 REALLY GETS US TO VARIOUS COMMUNITIES, AND AS YOU'VE HEARD,
- 13 THERE'S TREMENDOUS SUCCESS. THERE IS NO HOST WITHOUT LAHSA AND
- 14 THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WORKING TOGETHER TO BRING SOLUTIONS
- 15 THAT PEOPLE RESPOND TO WITHOUT CRIMINALIZATION.

- 17 SUP. JANICE HAHN: YEAH. THANK YOU, THANK YOU FOR THAT. THANK
- 18 YOU, MADAM CHAIR. THANK YOU TO THE PANELISTS FOR BEING HERE.
- 19 AND I KNOW THAT WE HAVE A MOTION TODAY THAT'S BEEN WRITTEN BY
- 20 MY COLLEAGUES TO THE FIRMS OUR "CARE FIRST" APPROACH AND THAT
- 21 OUR JAILS WILL NOT BE USED TO HOLD PEOPLE ARRESTED DUE TO
- 22 ANTI-CAMPING ORDINANCES FOR THEIR STATUS AS BEING UNHOUSED
- 23 AMONG OTHER THINGS AND I WANTED TO BE CLEAR TODAY TOO, I DO
- 24 NOT SUPPORT CRIMINALIZING INDIVIDUALS FOR BEING UNHOUSED. AND
- 25 THIS BOARD HAS TAKEN MANY STEPS TO MAKE SURE WE'RE PROVIDING



- 1 ROBUST AND HUMANE SERVICES TO THOSE WHO NEED US. BUT IN SOME
- 2 SITUATIONS, I THINK WE CAN USE THE TOOLS WE HAVE TO ADDRESS
- 3 ENCAMPMENTS AND INDIVIDUALS THAT AREN'T IN APPROPRIATE AREAS,
- 4 LIKE COMMUNITY CENTER OR SCHOOL. I LOOK FORWARD TO CONTINUING
- 5 THIS CONVERSATION. AGAIN, THANK YOU TO ALL OF YOU FOR WHAT YOU
- 6 DO, AND PARTICULARLY THANK YOU TO THE HOST TEAM FOR THE
- 7 INVALUABLE WORK YOU HAVE DONE FOR SO MANY YEARS. I'VE SEEN YOU
- 8 UP CLOSE AND PERSONAL AND APPRECIATE IT. THANK YOU, MADAM
- 9 CHAIR.

- 11 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU. AS AUTHOR OF ITEM 2,
- 12 I'M GOING TO TURN TO SUPERVISOR SOLIS.

- 14 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I WANT TO COMMEND
- 15 YOU, SUPERVISOR HAHN, FOR SETTING THIS ITEM FOR US, AND REALLY
- 16 FOR SETTING THE TONE FOR THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES AND ALL OF
- 17 THE BOARD OFFICES HERE. BUT I'M VERY IMPRESSED WITH THE PANEL
- 18 AND VERY HAPPY WITH THE PRESENTATION. I THINK A LOT OF PEOPLE
- 19 OVER THE WEEKEND WERE VERY JITTERY, INCLUDING MANY OF US WHO
- 20 GOT FRANTIC PRESS CALLS ABOUT WHAT IS THIS MEAN, ARE YOU
- 21 CHANGING YOUR DIRECTION? AND NOTHING COULD BE FURTHER FROM THE
- 22 TRUTH. UNFORTUNATELY, SOME THINGS ARE BETTER DELIBERATED AT
- 23 THE LOCAL LEVEL, AND OFTENTIMES WE'RE NOT CONSULTED,
- 24 UNFORTUNATELY, WHILE WE'RE WELL INTENDED AND SO ARE FOLKS IN
- 25 SACRAMENTO. I THINK THERE'S OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO WORK,



- 1 HOPEFULLY WITH FOLKS IN SACRAMENTO SO THAT WE CAN BETTER
- 2 UNDERSTAND WHAT THEIR MOTIVATION IS AND WHAT THEIR
- 3 EXPECTATIONS ARE. SO, I THINK FOR ME, I KNOW WHERE MY VALUES
- 4 ARE. "CARE FIRST", JAIL LAST, IT'S BEEN THAT WAY FOR A LONG
- 5 TIME. AND WE CAN'T DO ENOUGH GETTING BEDS OUT THERE, GETTING
- 6 SHELTERS AND COLLABORATION WITH OUR CITIES. I'M GLAD TO SEE
- 7 THAT SOME OF OUR CONTRACT CITIES AND OTHERS ARE HERE, BUT I'M
- 8 REALLY PLEASED WITH OUR PROVIDERS AND WITH ALL THE TOOLS THAT
- 9 WE HAVE NOW THAT WE DIDN'T HAVE ALMOST 10 YEARS AGO, I HAVEN'T
- 10 EVEN BEEN HERE 10 YEARS, BUT I CAN TELL YOU THERE'S BEEN A
- 11 DRAMATIC CHANGE IN SERVICE. SO, I LIKE WHAT SHERIFF HAS SAID,
- 12 SERVICE FIRST, BECAUSE THAT ACTUALLY SAYS SOMETHING VERY
- 13 DIFFERENT FROM WHERE WE WERE EVEN 4 YEARS AGO. AND I THINK
- 14 THAT'S REALLY CRITICAL BECAUSE I THINK THERE'S A WHOLE LOT OF
- 15 PEOPLE WHO CAN LEARN FROM L.A. COUNTY AND FROM LAHSA AND OUR
- 16 PARTNERS THAT ARE WORKING ON THIS ISSUE AND HAVE BEEN. BUT I
- 17 AM CONCERNED ABOUT WHAT THE GOVERNOR'S ORDER ASKED US TO DO
- 18 AND WHILE LOOKING FURTHER INTO WHAT HIS FOCUS IS, IT'S ABOUT
- 19 STATE PROPERTY, PARKS, CALTRAN PROPERTY. BUT I WANT TO HEAR
- 20 FROM THE PANEL WHAT THAT MEANS. WHEN THEY GO IN, I UNDERSTAND
- 21 THEIR REQUIREMENTS FOR NOTICE IS A LITTLE DIFFERENT FROM OURS.
- 22 CAN ANY ONE OF YOU PLEASE SPEAK ABOUT THAT? AND WHAT WE DO ON
- 23 OCCASIONS, ARE WE GOING TO BE CALLED TO ASSIST IN THOSE
- 24 CLEANUPS? ARE WE GOING TO BE INVOLVED WHEN, SAY, THERE'S AN
- 25 AREA THAT IS ADJACENT, CALTRANS PROPERTY, WHICH IN MANY CASES



- 1 IN UNINCORPORATED EAST L.A. IS EVERYWHERE? WHERE ARE YOU GOING
- 2 TO PUSH THOSE PEOPLE TO? WHERE WILL THEY GO? WHERE THEY'LL BE
- 3 SHELTER MADE AVAILABLE? AND ARE WE RESPONSIBLE FOR THAT? AND
- 4 WHERE DOES THE STATE COME IN WITH HELPING US WITH THAT?
- 5 BECAUSE THE GOVERNOR HAS ALREADY SAID, I GAVE YOU THE MONEY,
- 6 AND YOU'RE NOT USING IT APPROPRIATELY, IS WHAT I'M GATHERING.
- 7 BUT I DON'T THINK THAT'S TRUE. I WANT TO HEAR FROM YOU, IF I
- 8 CAN, YOU KNOW WHOEVER WANTS TO ANSWER THAT.

- 10 CHERI TODOROFF: THANK YOU FOR THAT QUESTION. I WILL ATTEMPT TO
- 11 ANSWER THAT, ALTHOUGH I THINK A NUMBER OF US CAN CONTRIBUTE TO
- 12 ANSWERING THAT OUESTION. JUST, YOU KNOW, WANT TO GO BACK TO
- 13 WHAT THE GOVERNOR'S ORDER SAYS, WHICH FOCUSES ON ENCAMPMENTS
- 14 ON STATE PROPERTY WHERE THE GOVERNOR HAS JURISDICTIONAL
- 15 AUTHORITY. SO BASICALLY, THE ORDER INSTRUCTS STATE DEPARTMENTS
- 16 TO ADOPT ENCAMPMENT POLICIES THAT ARE CONSISTENT WITH THOSE
- 17 THAT ARE BEING USED BY CALTRANS. THIS REQUIRES FOCUSING ON
- 18 ENCAMPMENTS THAT POSE AN IMMEDIATE THREAT TO LIFE, HEALTH, AND
- 19 SAFETY, PROVIDING NOTICE POSTED AT LEAST 48 HOURS IN ADVANCE,
- 20 FOLLOWING PROCEDURES THAT ADHERE TO FOURTH AMENDMENT
- 21 PROTECTIONS AGAINST UNREASONABLE SEARCH AND SEIZURE OF
- 22 PERSONAL PROPERTY. IT ALSO DOES ADD A FEW THINGS TO THE
- 23 CALTRANS POLICY IN 3 NOTABLE WAYS, WHICH INCLUDES REOUIRING
- 24 STATE AGENCIES TO CONTACT SERVICE PROVIDERS, TO REQUEST
- 25 OUTREACH SERVICES TO PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS AT THE



- 1 ENCAMPMENT BEFORE THE ENCAMPMENT REMOVAL. IT SHORTENS THE
- 2 CALTRANS NOTICE PERIOD FROM 72 TO 48 HOURS, WHICH WE DO FEEL
- 3 MAKES IT VERY CHALLENGING TO HAVE SUFFICIENT NOTICES. WE
- 4 TYPICALLY, WHEN WE'RE DOING THIS WORK, ARE LOOKING AT MORE
- 5 LIKE 2 WEEK NOTICES UNLESS THERE'S AN IMMEDIATE HEALTH AND
- 6 SAFETY CONCERN. AND WE NEED THAT TIME TO WORK WITH THE
- 7 RESIDENTS AND SECURE OPTIONS FOR THEM. AND ALSO, THE POLICY
- 8 REOUIRES COLLECTING LABELING AND STORING PERSONAL PROPERTY FOR
- 9 AT LEAST 60 DAYS INSTEAD OF THE CURRENT 90 DAY STANDARD. WE
- 10 ARE ENCOURAGED THAT THE GOVERNOR'S ORDER ACKNOWLEDGES THAT
- 11 PRIORITIZATION OF SHELTER AND SERVICES ARE BOTH A PRECURSOR TO
- 12 SUCCESSFULLY RESOLVING AN ENCAMPMENT. WE DO REMAIN CONCERNED,
- 13 VERY CONCERNED ABOUT THE STATE'S POLICIES SUGGESTING BUT NOT
- 14 REQUIRING SHELTER PLACEMENT FOR ENCAMPMENT ACTIONS ON THE
- 15 STATE RIGHT OF WAY. IT IS NOTABLE TO SAY THAT THE GOVERNOR'S
- 16 ORDER DOES NOT IN FACT ALIGN HOUSING AND SERVICES WITH THE
- 17 ENCAMPMENT EFFORTS THAT WOULD HAPPEN ON STATE PROPERTIES. IT
- 18 IS TRUE THAT LOCAL JURISDICTIONS ARE RECEIVING STATE FUNDING
- 19 TO ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS AND I CAN ASSURE YOU THAT WE ARE USING
- 20 THOSE DOLLARS VERY EFFECTIVELY. WE HAVE HOUSED THOUSANDS OF
- 21 PEOPLE WITH THOSE HAP RESOURCES. WE HAVE CREATED MANY INTERIM
- 22 HOUSING BEDS, PERMANENTLY HOUSED MANY PEOPLE. OUR ENCAMPMENT
- 23 RESOLUTION FUNDS, WHICH WE HAVE RECEIVED AND WE'RE USING AS A
- 24 BEST PRACTICE, ARE DOING THE SAME THING. THOSE DOLLARS ARE
- 25 PROGRAMMED. THEY WERE GIVEN TO US FOR SPECIFIC EFFORTS, SOME



- 1 OF THEM OF WHICH INVOLVE PARTNERSHIP WITH THE STATE, LIKE THE
- 2 MOST RECENT ONE THAT WE GOT, THAT DOES INVOLVE PARTNERSHIP
- 3 WITH THE STATE AS IT DOES GO ALONG THE 105 CORRIDOR AND
- 4 INVOLVES THE CATTLE TRANS. BUT FOR THE STATE TO EMBARK ON AN
- 5 INCREASED ROUND OF ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION WITH SUCH SHORT
- 6 NOTICE WILL STRAIN ALL OF OUR EXISTING RESOURCES BECAUSE IT
- 7 DOES NOT COME WITH NEW RESOURCES.

- 9 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: SO THAT BEGS THE QUESTION THEN, WHAT ACTION
- 10 WILL THIS BOARD TAKE TO NOTIFY THE GOVERNOR THAT, YOU KNOW, WE
- 11 NEED TO MEET AND CONFER HERE? BECAUSE OBVIOUSLY WE HAVE SOME
- 12 MAJOR DIFFERENCES. AND I WOULD THINK THAT THAT'S, I MEAN WE'RE
- 13 DOING SOME OF THAT TODAY I BELIEVE WITH THE MOTION THAT I HAVE
- 14 THAT THE CHAIRWOMAN AND I ARE PUTTING FORWARD TODAY BUT I DO
- 15 THINK, I THINK WE HAVE TO BE VERY CLEAR THAT THERE ARE SOME
- 16 PROBLEMS THAT ARE GOING TO ARISE, AND IT'S GOING TO REQUIRE US
- 17 TO PUSH PRIORITIZATION FOR MAYBE STATE EFFORTS OVER WHAT WE
- 18 ARE CURRENTLY DOING NOW. SO, I MEAN, JUST BY YOUR OUTLINE OF
- 19 THE 48 HOURS NOTICE AND OURS IS 2 WEEKS. THE FACT THAT WE KNOW
- 20 WE CAN'T GET TEAMS OUT THERE APPROPRIATELY EVEN WITH, IN 24
- 21 HOURS IN SOME CASES, HOW IN THE WORLD ARE WE GOING TO BE ABLE
- 22 TO ADDRESS THIS? SO I THINK THERE HAS TO BE MORE MEET AND
- 23 CONFER WITH THIS BOARD AND FOLKS UP THERE, MAYBE IN THE
- 24 LEGISLATURE, MAYBE OUR DELEGATION, MADAM CHAIR, WHERE THEY
- 25 HAVE TO BETTER UNDERSTAND WHAT OUR PROTOCOLS ARE HERE. BECAUSE



- 1 I THINK THERE'S A MISUNDERSTANDING, QUITE FRANKLY, AND I'M
- 2 EVEN MORE CONCERNED WITH WHAT SOME OF OUR CITIES, AND MAYBE
- 3 NOT ALL IN MY DISTRICT, BUT I KNOW SOME OF OUR CITIES HAVE
- 4 SAID THAT, WELL, THIS GIVES US TEETH NOW. WE CAN GET RID OF
- 5 THOSE ENCAMPMENTS IN OUR NEIGHBORHOODS. AND EVEN SOME PEOPLE
- 6 HAVE SAID THAT EVEN FROM EAST LOS ANGELES. AND IT'S REALLY,
- 7 YOU KNOW, IT'S VERY HARMFUL I THINK AND I REALLY WANT TO
- 8 COMMEND YOU, SHERIFF, FOR THE WORK THAT YOU'RE DOING AND ALSO
- 9 FOR OUR TEAMS, LAHSA, CHERI, AND ALL OF YOU AND OUR MENTAL
- 10 HEALTH AND PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICIALS AND ALSO OUR HOST TEAM
- 11 BECAUSE IT MEANS A LOT. YOU HAVE CREDIBILITY. AND SO, WHILE WE
- 12 CAN SAY WHAT WE WANNA SAY, I THINK ACTIONS WILL SPEAK LOUDER
- 13 THAN WORDS. AND SO IT'S GOING TO BE UP TO US, YOU, TO ALSO
- 14 HOLD US TO THAT, TO THE STANDARD THAT WE'RE PUTTING FORWARD
- 15 HERE. SO I WANT TO BE AVAILABLE IN ANY WAY I CAN TO HELP WITH
- 16 THAT. I KNOW IT'S GOING TO TAKE A LOT OF TIME. I WANT TO SAY
- 17 THOUGH THAT OUR TEAM, HI AND LAHSA HAVE DONE TREMENDOUS WORK
- 18 IN EVEN UNINCORPORATED, ESPECIALLY OUR INDEPENDENT CITIES FOR
- 19 ME IN THE FIRST DISTRICT WHERE PEOPLE DID NOT WANT TO HEAR
- 20 ABOUT HOUSING PEOPLE, INTERIM HOUSING OR CREATING HOME KEY
- 21 SITES. WE HAVE ALREADY 500 UNITS OF HOUSING BEDS IN MY
- 22 DISTRICT ALONE IN THE LAST 3 YEARS. UNHEARD OF. PEOPLE FOUGHT
- 23 US ON THAT AND NOW THERE'S A SENSE OF A WILLINGNESS TO
- 24 UNDERSTAND THAT THERE'S RESOURCES AND THERE'S TOOLS. SO, THE
- 25 MORE THAT WE CAN AMPLIFY THAT, THE TOOLS, I THINK WE CAN HELP



- 1 TO REMEDY THOSE FOLKS THAT ARE REALLY ANXIOUS OUT THERE. BUT I
- 2 JUST WANT TO TURN TO LASTLY SAYING THAT THIS PANEL IS GREAT,
- 3 BUT WE NEED CALTRANS HERE AND WE NEED THE STATE. AND I'M
- 4 SURPRISED THAT THEY WERE NOT INVITED OR IF THEY WERE MAYBE
- 5 THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WE DIDN'T, WAS AN OVERSIGHT. BUT I THINK
- 6 CALTRANS HAS TO BE HERE. WE SERVE WITH ANOTHER DIRECTOR ON THE
- 7 METRO BOARD THAT REPRESENTS CALTRANS, MRS. ROBERT, GLORIA
- 8 ROBERTS, WHO I ASKED THE OTHER DAY, WHAT ARE THE IMPLICATIONS
- 9 OF THIS NEW DIRECTIVE, EXECUTIVE ORDER, AND SHE SAID, WELL,
- 10 WE'RE TRYING TO FIGURE THIS OUT TOO. SO, I THINK THERE IS A
- 11 WILLINGNESS TO WORK WITH THEM. SO, I HOPE THAT WE CAN GET
- 12 TOGETHER SOONER THAN LATER SO THAT WE DON'T HAVE HICCUPS AND
- 13 WE DON'T HAVE FINGER POINTING. AND WE DON'T NEED THAT RIGHT
- 14 NOW. SO, I HOPE WE CAN DO THAT. I JUST WANT TO TURN TO THE
- 15 MOTION THAT I HAVE INTRODUCED TODAY. AND I WANT TO THANK
- 16 SUPERVISOR HORVATH FOR CO-AUTHORING THAT. AND IT'S ON
- 17 ENCAMPMENTS. AND I KNOW THAT WE'RE GOING TO CONTINUE TO WORK
- 18 ON THIS, AND I'M VERY PROUD OF THE DOCUMENT YOU PRESENTED
- 19 EARLIER, CHERI, AND YOUR TEAM, BECAUSE I DO BELIEVE THAT IT
- 20 JUST REAFFIRMS EVERYTHING THAT WE KNOW THAT WE HAVE LEARNED
- 21 MOVING FORWARD. SO I WANT TO ENSURE THAT WE CONTINUE THAT WORK
- 22 AND I WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT WE BRING ALONG OUR CITIES AS BEST
- 23 WE CAN. AND I DON'T THINK I HAVE TO REPEAT MYSELF, BUT WE HAVE
- 24 LEARNED SO MANY LESSONS OVER THE LAST 10 YEARS, INCLUDING WHAT
- 25 OUR HOST TEAMS ARE DOING, BUT ALSO WHAT OUR DEPARTMENTS,



- 1 MENTAL HEALTH, PUBLIC HEALTH, ALL OF US, LAHSA, ARE ALL
- 2 LOCKING ARMS, AS THE MAYOR LIKES TO SAY. BUT WE'RE REALLY, WE
- 3 KIND OF DO IT IN OUR OWN WAY, WHICH I THINK IS OKAY, WHICH IS
- 4 GOOD, BECAUSE IT EMPOWERS US, AND WE HAVE OWNERSHIP THERE.
- 5 WE'RE NOT GONNA GO TO A RACE TO THE BOTTOM. WE'RE NOT GONNA
- 6 TURN OUR BACKS. WE'RE NOT GONNA USE OUR JAILS TO SOMEHOW
- 7 INCARCERATE, CRIMINALIZE PEOPLE WHO ARE JUST ON THE STREET
- 8 BECAUSE THEY'RE SICK, BECAUSE THEY HAVE MENTAL ILLNESS OR
- 9 SUBSTANCE ABUSE ISSUES, OR BECAUSE MAYBE IT WAS A WIDOW OR A
- 10 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE VICTIM WHO KNOWS SHE MAY BE THREATENED WITH
- 11 HER LIFE IF SHE RETURNS TO HER HOME OR SO-CALLED HOME. THOSE
- 12 ARE THINGS THAT I THINK WE HAVE TO BREAK DOWN FOR OUR PUBLIC
- 13 BECAUSE WE HAVE TO DO BETTER. IN MY DISTRICT ALONE, I AM VERY
- 14 CONCERNED THAT IF CITIES SURROUNDING, FOR EXAMPLE, IN
- 15 INCORPORATED AREAS LIKE EAST L.A., THAT THEY WILL SOMEHOW FIND
- 16 SUITABLE TO DUMP PEOPLE IN EAST L.A., KNOWING THAT OUR ACTION
- 17 BY THE COUNTY IS VERY DIFFERENT FOR PERHAPS SOME CITIES. SO,
- 18 HERE'S OUR CHANCE, SHERIFF, TO HELP EDUCATE OUR CITIES, AGAIN,
- 19 OUR PDS, AND ALSO WORK WITH OUR CITY MANAGERS AND OUR CITY
- 20 COUNCIL PEOPLE SO THEY BETTER UNDERSTAND THAT THERE ARE TOOLS
- 21 AVAILABLE. AND NO ONE IS SAYING THAT WE'RE GOING TO TURN A
- 22 BLIND EYE IF THERE'S CRIMINAL ACTIVITY. WE KNOW THAT. WE'RE
- 23 NOT HERE TO, I THINK, REFUTE THAT. BUT I THINK THE STANDARDS
- 24 THAT WE HAVE SET HERE IS TO REALLY LOOK AT HOW WE CAN HELP.
- 25 THESE INDIVIDUALS THAT WE KNOW CAN BENEFIT FROM THE KIND OF



- 1 SERVICES THAT WE'VE BEEN PROVIDING NOW FOR THE LAST FEW YEARS.
- 2 SO I HOPE WE CAN DO THAT. THE MOTION BEFORE US FOCUSES ON
- 3 DEVELOPING A COUNTY-WIDE STRATEGY FOR ADDRESSING ENCAMPMENTS.
- 4 AND THE MOTION DIRECTS THE COUNTY'S HOMELESS INITIATIVE, HI,
- 5 IN PARTNERSHIP WITH LAHSA AND THE SHERIFF'S HOMELESS OUTREACH
- 6 TEAM HOST TO ENGAGE ALL OF OUR 88 CITIES AROUND A UNIFIED
- 7 APPROACH FOR ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTIONS. AND IT ASKS HI TO CONVENE
- 8 ALL 88 CITIES IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF
- 9 THE REGIONAL HOMELESSNESS ALIGNMENT WITH THE GOAL OF
- 10 MINIMIZING DISPARATE IMPACTS OF THE GRANTS PASSED RULING
- 11 ACROSS JURISDICTIONS. AND IT ALSO ASKS HI TO IDENTIFY THOSE
- 12 OPPORTUNITIES TO EXPAND PARTNERSHIPS WITH CITIES TO ADDRESS
- 13 THOSE ENCAMPMENTS THROUGH SHELTERS, THROUGH RESOURCES AND
- 14 REGIONAL COORDINATION. SOMETHING WE'RE DOING, BUT NOW WE HAVE
- 15 TO DO IT ON A GRANDER SCALE. THE MOTION ALSO AFFIRMS THAT THE
- 16 COUNTY JAILS WILL NOT BE USED TO HOLD PEOPLE WHO ARE ARRESTED
- 17 DUE TO ENFORCEMENT OF ANTI-ENCANTMENT PROTOCOLS. AND I WANT TO
- 18 BE CLEAR THAT THIS DIRECTIVE IS IN ALIGNMENT WITH THE L.A.
- 19 COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, WHICH WE JUST HEARD, AND EXISTING
- 20 POLICIES THAT SURROUND THE PROCESSES THAT ARE CURRENTLY
- 21 HAPPENING IN THE JAILS. I'M HAPPY THAT YOU REAFFIRMED THAT,
- 22 SHERIFF LUNA. AND I KNOW THAT MANY CITIES HAVE EXPRESSED
- 23 CONCERNS THAT THE MOTION SOMEHOW OVERSTEPS EXISTING L.A.
- 24 SHERIFF DEPARTMENT PROTOCOLS, BUT NOTHING COULD BE FURTHER
- 25 FROM THE TRUTH. AND IF CRIME IS COMMITTED, AS I SAID, THEN OF



- 1 COURSE WE MUST FOLLOW LEGAL PRECEDENT. THE MOTION IS SIMPLY
- 2 ABOUT AFFIRMING OUR JAILS SHOULD NEVER BE USED AS AN
- 3 ALTERNATIVE FOR HOUSING. WE'VE SAID THAT FOR MANY, MANY YEARS
- 4 ON THIS BOARD, AND WE HAVE TO CONTINUE TO SAY IT, I GUESS. I
- 5 DON'T GUESS, I KNOW. THE TRUTH REMAINS THAT L.A. COUNTY
- 6 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT CANNOT MASS INCARCERATE PEOPLE
- 7 EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS AROUND DUE OR DUE TO ANTI-ENCAMPMENT
- 8 POLICIES. AND WE ALL KNOW THAT THE SHERIFF IS LEGALLY
- 9 OBLIGATED TO ADDRESS THE OVERCROWDING, WHICH YOU'VE TALKED
- 10 ABOUT ALREADY IN OUR JAILS, AND WE KNOW IS SOMETHING THAT WE
- 11 HAVE TO DEAL WITH RIGHT NOW. WE'RE DEALING WITH IT IN THE
- 12 COURTS. AND IT ISN'T GONNA GET ANY BETTER IF PEOPLE ASSUME
- 13 THAT SOMEHOW WE'RE GONNA NOW ALLOW FOR THESE INDIVIDUALS TO BE
- 14 HOUSED IN OUR JAILS, WHICH IS IMPROPER. THEY NEED TO HAVE
- 15 HEALTHCARE ADDRESSED, THEY NEED TO HAVE MENTAL HEALTH, AND
- 16 THEY NEED TO HAVE STABILIZED LIVES AND, IN SOME CASES, THEY'RE
- 17 NOT FIT TO BE IN PLACES LIKE MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL. SO, I WOULD
- 18 HOPE THAT WE CAN MOVE THIS ITEM ALONG I KNOW THAT MY CO-AUTHOR
- 19 HAS A FRIENDLY AMENDMENT THAT I BELIEVE SHE'LL TALK ABOUT BUT
- 20 WE KNOW THAT A LOT OF CHANGES ALREADY HAPPEN HERE IN L.A.
- 21 COUNTY, PARTICULARLY WITH OUR COURT SYSTEM. AND I KNOW THE
- 22 SHERIFF IS FULLY AWARE OF THAT. AND THAT IS DEALING WITH THE
- 23 PREARRANGEMENT RELEASE PROTOCOLS THAT HE IS FULLY AWARE OF.
- 24 AND I BELIEVE SOME OF OUR CITIES ARE BECOMING MORE AWARE OF
- 25 AND HOW THAT WORKS. SO AGAIN, IT'S OUR DUTY TO HELP INFORM. I



- 1 BELIEVE OUR CITIES, OUR PDS AND CITY MANAGERS AND FOLKS, SO
- 2 THEY UNDERSTAND THE TRANSFORMATION THAT IS TAKING PLACE IN
- 3 L.A. COUNTY, NOT JUST WITH THE BOARD, BUT ALSO EVEN WITH THE
- 4 COURTS. WHETHER PEOPLE WANT TO BELIEVE IT OR NOT, IT'S
- 5 HAPPENING AND IT'S REAL, AND WE HAVE TO MAKE ROOM FOR IT. SO I
- 6 HOPE WITH ALL OF THAT, THAT WE UNDERSTAND THERE'S A BETTER WAY
- 7 TO DO THINGS, AND L.A. COUNTY, I HOPE, IS PREPARED TO DO THE
- 8 RIGHT THING. THANK YOU TO ALL OF YOU. YOU DO TREMENDOUS WORK
- 9 AND YOU'RE TO BE COMMENDED AS WELL AS OUR PROVIDERS AND THE
- 10 PEOPLE WHO ARE STANDING WITH US. SO, THANK YOU VERY MUCH. AND
- 11 MADAM CHAIR, I WILL TURN IT OVER TO YOU AS YOU HAVE A PARTNER
- 12 ON THIS MOTION. THANK YOU.

- 14 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU. I APPRECIATE THAT.
- 15 THANK YOU TO SUPERVISOR HAHN WHO BROUGHT THE DISCUSSION TO US
- 16 ON OUR AGENDA AND THANK YOU TO SUPERVISOR SOLIS FOR LEADING
- 17 THE WAY AND TAKING ACTION FOR OUR BOARD. SO, WE ARE ON RECORD
- 18 TODAY. I WANT TO THANK ALL OF OUR PRESENTERS WHO JOINED US
- 19 THIS MORNING AS WELL, NOT JUST TO SHARE YOUR EXPERIENCE, BUT
- 20 FOR THE CONTINUED WORK THAT YOU'RE ALL DOING, INDIVIDUALLY AND
- 21 TOGETHER, TO ADDRESS WHAT WE KNOW IS A CRISIS ON OUR STREETS.
- 22 I KNOW OUR MOTION TODAY ALSO MAKES CLEAR THE COUNTY'S
- 23 POSITION, WHICH WE HAVE HEARD REFLECTED FROM ALL OF YOU TODAY.
- 24 A CARE-FIRST, RESOURCES-LED APPROACH IS WHAT WORKS AT NOT ONLY
- 25 RESOLVING ENCAMPMENTS, BUT ENDING HOMELESSNESS FOR THE



- 1 INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE SUFFERING ON OUR STREETS AND IN OUR
- 2 NEIGHBORHOODS. AND I WANT TO BE CLEAR, WE ARE ALL FRUSTRATED
- 3 WITH ENCAMPMENTS THAT BLOCK SIDEWALKS AND THE RVS THAT LINE
- 4 OUR ROADS. NO ONE THINKS THAT ANY OF THIS IS ACCEPTABLE.
- 5 THAT'S WHY WE UNANIMOUSLY DECLARED A STATE OF EMERGENCY IN
- 6 JANUARY OF 2023, WHY WE HAVE PRIORITIZED AND FUNDED ENCAMPMENT
- 7 RESOLUTION THROUGH THE COUNTY'S PATHWAY HOME PROGRAM, AND WHY
- 8 WE'VE PARTNERED WITH THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES AND OTHER CITIES
- 9 ON INSIDE SAFE. WE ALL AGREE THAT WE DON'T WANT ENCAMPMENTS ON
- 10 OUR SIDEWALKS, BUT WE CANNOT, NOR ARE WE LEGALLY ALLOWED TO
- 11 MAKE JAILS OR DE FACTO HOUSING AND SHELTER. CITIES CREATE
- 12 HOUSING, AND THE COUNTY ALSO CREATES HOUSING IN OUR
- 13 UNINCORPORATED AREAS. THE COUNTY IS RESPONSIBLE FOR PROVIDING
- 14 CARE AND SERVICES FOR THE TENS OF THOUSANDS OF ANGELENOS
- 15 CURRENTLY SURVIVING UNSHELTERED ON OUR STREETS. AND ALL OF
- 16 THESE SERVICES ARE MADE POSSIBLE THROUGH MEASURE H, WHICH IS
- 17 AN ESSENTIAL FUNDING SOURCE FOR SOLUTIONS THAT WORK. I
- 18 APPRECIATE THAT EVERYONE IS OUT OF PATIENCE. WE ARE TOO. BUT
- 19 PEOPLE DON'T JUST DISAPPEAR. REGARDLESS OF WHETHER AN
- 20 UNSHELTERED PERSON IS IN TARZANA OR TOPANGA, BELL OR BELL
- 21 GARDENS, WEST COVINA OR WALNUT, COMPTON OR CARSON, LA
- 22 CRESCENTA OR LA CANADA, THEY ARE STILL IN THE COUNTY AND WE
- 23 HAVE TO PROVIDE THEM SERVICES. THIS IS TRUE WHEN THEY'RE ON
- 24 THE STREET AND TEMPORARY SHELTER AND WHEN THEY'RE MATCHED WITH
- 25 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING. AND THAT'S WHY I'M GLAD WE'RE



- 1 HAVING THIS CONVERSATION HERE TODAY. THE BEST WAY TO IMPLEMENT
- 2 SOLUTIONS IS TO HAVE ALL LEVELS OF GOVERNMENT WORKING TOGETHER
- 3 AND TO WORK FOR THE PEOPLE. AS MAYOR BASS SAYS, LOCKING ARMS
- 4 TO SOLVE ISSUES IS THE BEST WAY FORWARD. THIS IS AN ALL HANDS
- 5 ON DECK MOMENT AND WE APPRECIATE THE GOVERNOR'S SENSE OF
- 6 URGENCY. WE ALL FEEL THIS SENSE OF URGENCY, WHICH IS WHY WE
- 7 DECLARED THAT STATE OF EMERGENCY A YEAR AND A HALF AGO. AND WE
- 8 KNOW THAT ACROSS OUR 88 CITIES, THEY TOO SHARE THAT SAME SENSE
- 9 OF URGENCY. AND I LOOK FORWARD TO GOVERNOR NEWSOM'S CONTINUED
- 10 PARTNERSHIP, AND I'M GRATEFUL FOR THE VALIDATION OF L.A.
- 11 COUNTY'S APPROACH, WHICH WAS REFERENCED, THAT THE STATE HAS
- 12 CONTINUED TO RECOGNIZE L.A. COUNTY'S SUCCESSFUL SERVICES-LED
- 13 CARE-FIRST APPROACH TO ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION BY AWARDING MORE
- 14 THAN \$100,000,000 THROUGH ITS ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION FUNDS
- 15 GRANTS, FUNDING OUR SKID ROW ACTION PLAN, AND OUR PATHWAY HOME
- 16 INITIATIVE ALONG THE 105 CORRIDOR. WE NEED CONTINUED
- 17 PARTNERSHIPS LIKE THESE, AND INVESTMENT FROM STATE AND CITIES
- 18 IN ORDER TO SOLVE THIS CRISIS. WE KNOW WE'RE MAKING PROGRESS,
- 19 AFFIRMED BY THIS YEAR'S HOMELESS COUNT RESULTS. AND THROUGH
- 20 THE CONVERSATION WE'RE HAVING TODAY, AS WELL AS THE INCREDIBLE
- 21 NETWORK OF COUNTY STAFF AND OUR DEDICATED REGIONAL PARTNERS
- 22 AND PROVIDERS. THROUGH TRANSPARENCY, ACCOUNTABILITY, AND
- 23 ACTION, I KNOW WE'LL CONTINUE TO TURN THE TIDE ON THIS
- 24 HUMANITARIAN CRISIS AND I ALSO WANT TO PERSONALLY THANK THE
- 25 PRESIDENT OF THE L.A. COUNTY DIVISION OF THE LEAGUE BEA



- 1 DIERINGER FOR PERSONALLY REACHING OUT TO ME. I KNOW SHE'S ALSO
- 2 A LEADER IN CONTRACT CITIES AND I KNOW MANY OF THE CONTRACT
- 3 CITIES REPRESENTATIVES ARE HERE TODAY TOO, PERSONALLY TO
- 4 REOUEST AMENDMENTS TO CLARIFY OUR INTENTION IN THIS MOTION,
- 5 WHICH WE'VE ALREADY HEARD REFLECTED FROM OUR STAFF AND I THINK
- 6 HAS BEEN STATED IN PERSONAL CONVERSATIONS AS WELL, THAT WE
- 7 WANT TO BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH DIRECTIVES ON OUR JAILS AND WITH
- 8 THE STATE DIRECTIVES ON MOVING EXPEDITIOUSLY ON THIS CRISIS.
- 9 AND SO, SOME CLARIFYING LANGUAGE IN DIRECTIVE 2, I WANTED TO
- 10 MAKE SURE THAT WE ADD IN DIRECTIVE 2 TO CLARIFY THAT LOS
- 11 ANGELES COUNTY JAILS WILL NOT BE USED TO HOLD PEOPLE ARRESTED
- 12 SOLELY DUE TO ENFORCEMENT OF ANTI-CAMPING ORDINANCES
- 13 CONSISTENT WITH CURRENT PRACTICE REGARDING MISDEMEANORS,
- 14 CITABLE OFFENSES, AND SETTLEMENT AGREEMENTS. AND THAT TAKES ME
- 15 TO MY FIRST QUESTION FOR SHERIFF LUNA, IF YOU WOULD,
- 16 ARTICULATE WHAT OUR CURRENT POLICY AND PRACTICE FOR HOLDING
- 17 PEOPLE IN OUR JAILS FOR VIOLATING ANTI-CAMPING ORDINANCES IS,
- 18 AND HOW WE ARE BEING MINDFUL OF ANY FEDERAL CONSENT DECREES WE
- 19 HAVE REGARDING CROWDING OUR JAILS AND WHAT THE IMPLICATIONS
- 20 ARE.

- 22 ROBERT LUNA: GOOD MORNING SUPERVISOR. SO, AS I STATED EARLIER,
- 23 WE HAVE A VERY STRICT MISDEMEANOR ACCEPTANCE INTO THE INMATE
- 24 RECEPTION CENTER, SPECIFICALLY AS IT DEALS WITH MISDEMEANORS.
- 25 WE DO NOT ACCEPT MISDEMEANORS UNLESS THERE IS VERY SPECIFIC



- 1 CRITERIA INVOLVED. SO, WHAT YOU HAVE LAID OUT IN THIS PROPOSED
- 2 LANGUAGE, WE'VE BEEN DOING ALREADY. SO IT'S A CHECK THE BOX IN
- 3 REGARDS TO THAT AND AS IMPORTANTLY WE'VE BEEN COMMUNICATING
- 4 THAT NOT ONLY TO OUR CONTRACT CITY PARTNERS BUT OUR
- 5 INDEPENDENT CITY PARTNERS AND OTHER L.A. COUNTY CHIEF AGENCIES
- 6 WHICH DO INCLUDE THE CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY PATROL. SO, IT IS
- 7 THERE, IT'S GONNA REMAIN THAT WAY, AND OBVIOUSLY BECAUSE OF
- 8 OTHER DISCUSSIONS WE'VE HAD HERE REGARDING WHETHER IT'S
- 9 FEDERAL CONSENT DECREES OR SETTLEMENT AGREEMENTS REGARDING
- 10 OVERCROWDING AND CONDITIONS OF OUR JAIL, IT HAS TO REMAIN THIS
- 11 WAY.

- 13 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: I APPRECIATE THAT CLARIFICATION.
- 14 I THINK THERE WAS CONCERN THAT, YOU KNOW, THAT L.A., WE DON'T
- 15 WANT L.A. COUNTY TO BE SEEN AS ROLLING OUT THE WELCOME MAT FOR
- 16 THE NATION'S UNHOUSED POPULATION TO COME TO LOS ANGELES. AND
- 17 THERE'S ALSO CONCERN THAT WE DON'T WANT TO DIVERGE FROM THE
- 18 PATH THAT WE HAVE SEEN WHICH WORKS, WHICH WE KNOW IS EXACTLY
- 19 WHAT YOU HAVE DESCRIBED, THE HUMANE, CARE-FIRST APPROACH THAT
- 20 L.A. COUNTY EMBODIES. AND SO, MAKING SURE THAT WE'RE FOLLOWING
- 21 THAT PATH IS CRITICAL.

- 23 ROBERT LUNA: AND IT IS A BALANCE LIKE YOU'RE SUGGESTING. AND
- 24 FOR ALL THOSE WHO ARE LISTENING, SPECIFICALLY OUR CITY
- 25 LEADERS, IS JUST TO RE-EMPHASIZE THE FACT THAT WHEN YOU HAVE



- 1 CONSTITUENTS COMPLAINING, NEIGHBORS, COMMUNITY MEMBERS, CALL
- 2 US OUT THERE. LET US LOOK INTO WHAT THE CHALLENGE IS, WHETHER
- 3 IT'S OUR HOST TEAM OR OUR PATROL RESOURCES, WE WILL WORK HAND-
- 4 IN-HAND WITH OUR LOCAL OFFICIALS TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE DOING
- 5 THE RIGHT THING, GETTING INDIVIDUALS THE RIGHT SERVICES WITH
- 6 OUR PARTNERS AT LAHSA AND EVERYBODY ELSE. BUT AT THE SAME
- 7 TIME, THEY HAVE TO BE ASSURED THAT IF THERE IS CRIMINAL
- 8 ACTIVITY OCCURRING, PEOPLE WILL STILL BE ARRESTED FOR CRIMINAL
- 9 ACTIVITY. AND THAT WAS THE BIG CONCERN ON ALL THE PHONE CALLS
- 10 I HAD. SO, IT'S THAT BALANCE OF MAKING SURE WE'RE ONLY
- 11 ALLOWING THE RIGHT PEOPLE INTO OUR CUSTODY FACILITIES, BUT IF
- 12 THOSE RIGHT PEOPLE ARE NEGATIVELY IMPACTING PUBLIC SAFETY OR
- 13 CREATING AN UNSAFE CONDITION, THEN THEY MAY NEED TO BE
- 14 INCARCERATED.

- 16 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND THIS SURFACED AT OUR
- 17 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING LAST FRIDAY ON REGIONAL HOMELESS
- 18 ALIGNMENT. COUNCILMEMBER RAMAN MENTIONED, YOU KNOW, WE AREN'T
- 19 SAYING THAT IF THERE'S VIOLENT CRIME HAPPENING AT A HOMELESS
- 20 ENCAMPMENT, THAT THAT IS NOT AN ARRESTABLE OFFENSE. WE AREN'T
- 21 SAYING ANYTHING LIKE THAT AT ALL, IN FACT. WHAT WE'RE BEING
- 22 VERY CLEAR ABOUT IS THAT WE ARE NOT CRIMINALIZING POVERTY OR
- 23 HOMELESSNESS. WHAT WE ARE MAKING SURE IS THAT WE'RE TAKING
- 24 SWIFT ACTION WITH URGENCY ON THE CRISIS THAT WE'RE SEEING ON
- 25 OUR STREETS. SO I THANK YOU FOR THAT CLARIFICATION. MY NEXT



- 1 OUESTION IS FOR CHERI. RECOGNIZING THAT WE KNOW WE HAVE BEEN
- 2 LEADING ON THIS EFFORT, WE'RE STILL HEARING FROM OUR STATE
- 3 PARTNERS THAT THEY WANT TO SEE US MOVE EVEN FASTER. SO, WHAT
- 4 IS POSSIBLE FOR US TO SEE RESULTS MOVING FASTER, GETTING
- 5 PEOPLE OFF THE STREETS FASTER? IS IT SCALING MASTER LEASE
- 6 PROPERTIES? IS IT, YOU KNOW, WHAT IS GOING TO HELP US MOVE
- 7 MORE QUICKLY TO SEE THE RESULTS THAT WE'RE ALL STRIVING FOR.

- 9 CHERI TODOROFF: YES, THANK YOU FOR THAT OUESTION. I WANT TO GO
- 10 BACK AND QUICKLY, SOMETHING THAT WAS SAID A LITTLE BIT
- 11 EARLIER, THAT OUR ABILITY TO SCALE RIGHT NOW IS NOT SO LARGELY
- 12 DRIVEN BY A DOLLAR AMOUNT, WHICH IS VERY IMPORTANT, BUT YOUR
- 13 BOARD HAS APPROVED A BUDGET FOR PATHWAY HOME. WE HAVEN'T
- 14 RECEIVED ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION FUNDS. WE ARE EXPANDING AND
- 15 EXPEDITING PROTOCOL CLEANUPS WITH THE BOARD SUPPORT. WE,
- 16 THERE'S 3 REALLY, THERE'S 3 OTHER PARTNERS THAT ARE ALSO
- 17 ESSENTIAL, WHICH ARE OUR PROVIDERS AND THEIR CAPACITY TO HIRE
- 18 AND RETAIN STAFF AND SCALE WITH US AS WE OPEN NEW SITES. IT IS
- 19 OUR INTERIM HOUSING SITES, AND ESPECIALLY WHEN WE'RE OPENING
- 20 NEW ONES AS WE ARE WITH THESE ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION EFFORTS.
- 21 AND I WANNA COMMENT ON THAT FOR JUST A MOMENT. WE ARE
- 22 CONTINUING TO INCREASE INTERIM HOUSING BEDS AT A SIGNIFICANT
- 23 SCALE. WE ARE CONTINUING TO INVEST IN THOSE. WHILE WE OFTEN
- 24 TALK ABOUT HOW IMPORTANT AND HOW MUCH WE NEED TO PRIORITIZE
- 25 PERMANENT HOUSING AND CREATING PERMANENT HOUSING, WE ARE



- 1 CONTINUING TO INVEST IN INTERIM HOUSING. SO, BOTH THE CITY AND
- 2 THE COUNTY WITH THE EFFORTS THAT WE ARE FUNDING LOCALLY
- 3 THROUGH INSIDE SAFE AND PATHWAY HOME ARE CREATING THOUSANDS OF
- 4 NEW INTERIM HOUSING BEDS. AND THEN ON TOP OF THAT, WE'RE
- 5 ADDING MORE WITH THE ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION FUNDING THAT WE'RE
- 6 RECEIVING FROM THE STATE. THIS PUTS, WE NEED TO HAVE LOCATIONS
- 7 WHERE WE'RE SETTING UP THIS INTERIM HOUSING AND A LOT OF IT
- 8 HAS BEEN DONE WITH SEEKING MOTELS IN LOCAL JURISDICTIONS TO
- 9 SCALE THAT UP. AND SO, WE NEED TO HAVE THOSE WILLING PARTNERS
- 10 AND THEN WE NEED TO HAVE THOSE CITIES AND MUNICIPALITIES THAT
- 11 WE ARE SEEKING TO PARTNER IN, NOT ONLY IN PARTNERING WITH US
- 12 ON THE ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION, BUT PARTNER WITH US ON THE
- 13 SITING OF INTERIM HOUSING AND THOSE PATHWAYS TO PERMANENT
- 14 HOUSING. SO THOSE ARE REALLY IMPACTING OUR SCALE AT THIS
- 15 POINT. AND ONE OF THE, AND NOW I'LL GET BACK TO THE ISSUE OF
- 16 PERMANENT HOUSING AND HOUSING THAT'S AFFORDABLE. THE BIGGEST
- 17 IMPACT IS BEING ABLE TO EXIT PEOPLE TO PERMANENT HOUSING. IF
- 18 WE ARE CREATING ALL OF THESE NEW BEDS AND WE DO NOT HAVE
- 19 HOUSING EXITS FOR PEOPLE, THEN WE WILL GET STUCK, WE'LL REACH
- 20 OUR CAPACITY, AND WE WILL NOT BE ABLE TO MOVE ANOTHER PERSON
- 21 INTO SHELTER UNTIL WE PLACE ANOTHER PERSON INTO PERMANENT
- 22 HOUSING. AND SO THOSE EFFORTS, THE SCALING UP THE MASTER
- 23 LEASING, WHICH LAHSA HAS BEEN LEADING AND WHICH THE DEPARTMENT
- 24 OF HEALTH SERVICES HAS ALSO BEEN INVOLVED IN, HAS BEEN
- 25 IMPORTANT FOR US TO TAP INTO THAT PRIVATE SECTOR RENTAL



- 1 MARKET. AND THAT IS KEY TO BE ABLE TO USE THAT PRIVATE SECTOR
- 2 RENTAL MARKET TO BRING PEOPLE INSIDE. WE ARE BRINGING THEM
- 3 INSIDE WITH FUNDS, WITH RENTAL SUBSIDIES TO PAY FOR THEIR
- 4 RENT, WITH SERVICES FOR LANDLORDS TO SUPPORT CLIENTS AS THEY
- 5 MOVE INTO THESE UNITS, AND WITH SERVICES DIRECTLY FOR THE
- 6 CLIENTS AS WELL. IT'S A VERY ROBUST PACKAGE TO SUPPORT THAT
- 7 HOUSING STABILITY. WE NEED TO CONTINUE TO WORK WITH THE
- 8 PRIVATE SECTOR RENTAL MARKET TO MAKE THOSE UNITS AVAILABLE
- 9 THROUGH MASTER LEASING PROGRAMS, THROUGH OTHER TYPES OF UNIT
- 10 ACQUISITION PROGRAMS, WITH LANDLORD INCENTIVE PROGRAMS, BUT WE
- 11 JUST NEED TO CONTINUE TO AMPLIFY THAT NEED AND INCREASE THAT
- 12 PARTICIPATION. AND OF COURSE, OUR CONTINUED INVESTMENT IN
- 13 CREATING AND DEVELOPING NEW AFFORDABLE HOUSING, WHICH THIS
- 14 BOARD HAS BEEN VERY INVESTED IN, AND WHICH CERTAINLY THROUGH
- 15 THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, WITH THE INCREASING NUMBER OF UNITS
- 16 THAT ARE COMING ONLINE THROUGH PROPOSITION HHH, WE HAVE BEEN
- 17 SEEING AN INCREASE IN PERMANENT HOUSING PLACEMENTS THAT WE
- 18 HOPE TO CONTINUE TO SEE FOR A WHILE.

- 20 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND THE LAST QUESTION THAT I HAVE
- 21 PERTAINS TO BOTH DR. WONG AND DR. TSAI, I WOULD SAY. ONE OF
- 22 THE AREAS OF FRUSTRATION I CONSISTENTLY HEAR FROM CITIES HAS
- 23 TO DO WITH THE ISSUES AROUND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE PROVISION
- 24 AND ADDICTION RECOVERY SERVICE PROVISION AND SUBSTANCE USE
- 25 ISSUES. AND MANY CITIES DON'T HAVE THE ABILITY TO PROVIDE



- 1 THOSE SERVICES THEMSELVES. THEY RELY ON OUR COUNTY'S
- 2 DEPARTMENTS TO PROVIDE THOSE SERVICES. SO, WHEN THEY SEE
- 3 PEOPLE STRUGGLING WITH THESE ISSUES ON THE STREETS IN THEIR
- 4 COMMUNITIES, YOU KNOW, THEY'RE FRUSTRATED, AND THEIR
- 5 EXPECTATION IS THAT WE ARE GOING TO STEP IN AND BE ENGAGED IN
- 6 ADDRESSING THE CRISIS THAT IS ON THE STREETS. WE HEARD
- 7 RECENTLY TOO FROM THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE AS IT RELATES TO
- 8 PROPOSITION 1 AND SB43 IMPLEMENTATION, YOU KNOW, A FRUSTRATION
- 9 THAT THINGS AREN'T MOVING QUICKER. AND SO, AND I KNOW THAT
- 10 THAT RELATES TO THE EXPERIENCE OF GRANTS PASS ON OUR STREETS
- 11 AND IN OUR COMMUNITIES. SO, IF YOU CAN TALK ABOUT WHAT WE'RE
- 12 DOING TO MOVE MORE OUICKLY IN THAT REGARD, AND POTENTIALLY IF
- 13 WE ANTICIPATE ANY TRADE-OFFS BY PRIORITIZING THOSE EFFORTS
- 14 OVER WHAT WE HAVE BEEN DOING ALREADY IN OUR DEPARTMENTS TO
- 15 PROVIDE SERVICES IN BOTH MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE USE
- 16 ISSUES. LET'S MAKE SURE DR. WONG'S MIC IS ON. OKAY.

- 18 DR. LISA WONG: THERE WE GO. HELLO, SUPERVISORS. IT'S STILL
- 19 GOOD MORNING. WE'RE HAPPY TO ADDRESS THIS OUESTION. WE KNOW
- 20 THAT THERE HAVE BEEN A LOT OF CONCERNS COMING UP FROM OUR
- 21 CITIES, AND RIGHTFULLY SO, ABOUT HOW THEY ACCESS SERVICES THAT
- 22 THEY DON'T HAVE THE CAPACITY FOR WITHIN THEIR CITY. SO WE HAVE
- 23 BEEN BUILDING ROBUST RELATIONSHIPS WITH OUR CITY COUNTERPARTS
- 24 SO THEY KNOW WHO TO CALL, WHEN TO CALL, WHERE WE HAVE TO FORM
- 25 THE MOST KEY RELATIONSHIPS SO THAT THEY HAVE ACCESS. WE ALSO



- 1 HAVE HAD A VERY BIG INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF TEAMS THAT WE'VE
- 2 PUT OUT IN THE FIELD AS PART OF OUR HOME TEAM AS WELL AS OUR
- 3 FSP PROGRAMS. WE'VE REALLY INCREASED THE NUMBER OF TEAMS AND
- 4 RIGHT NOW WE ARE REALLY PLEASED TO SAY THAT WITH OUR HOME
- 5 TEAMS WE ARE AT 95% HIRING FOR ALL OF OUR TEAMS AND I KNOW
- 6 THAT THE BOARD HAS BEEN VERY SUPPORTIVE OF PUTTING IN PLACE
- 7 THE INCENTIVES AND OTHER PROTOCOLS WE NEEDED TO QUICKLY HIRE
- 8 PEOPLE AND GET THEM ON BOARD BUT HONESTLY WHEN YOU'RE TALKING
- 9 ABOUT A COUNTY WITH 88 CITIES AND 4, 752 SQUARE MILES AND
- 10 10,000,000 RESIDENTS, I DON'T THINK WE WILL EVER HIRE ENOUGH
- 11 PEOPLE OR HAVE THE FUNDING TO PUT ENOUGH TEAMS TO MEET
- 12 EVERYBODY AT THAT POINT IN TIME WHEN THEY NEED IT. SO WHAT WE
- 13 NEED TO DO IS BUILD THOSE RELATIONSHIPS WITH OUR CITY PARTNERS
- 14 AND OTHER AGENCIES SO THAT WE FORM A NETWORK, A NET AROUND
- 15 PEOPLE AND MEET THEIR NEEDS WHERE THEY ARE. I THINK ONE OF OUR
- 16 BARRIERS HAS BEEN, EVEN IF WE GET SOMEBODY INTO SERVICE AND WE
- 17 PROVIDE THOSE SERVICES, IF WE DON'T HAVE CITIES WILLING TO PUT
- 18 HOUSING RESOURCES IN THOSE CITIES, OUR FOLKS THAT WE'VE SPENT
- 19 SO MUCH TIME WORKING WITH WILL LEAVE THE SHELTER THAT WE GET
- 20 THEM IN, WILL LEAVE THE INTERIM HOUSING, BECAUSE IT'S NOT
- 21 THEIR COMMUNITY. SO, THIS IS WHY I SAY WE NEED ALL
- 22 PARTNERSHIPS TO GATHER TOGETHER TO OWN THE FOLKS WHO ARE PARTS
- 23 OF OUR COMMUNITIES. A LOT OF TIMES FOR SOMEBODY EXPERIENCING
- 24 HOMELESSNESS AND ESPECIALLY FOR SOMEBODY WHO IS EXPERIENCING
- 25 HOMELESSNESS AND HAVING A SERIOUS MENTAL ILLNESS, IT'S A VERY



- 1 ISOLATING EXPERIENCE AND NO MATTER HOW TENUOUS THOSE COMMUNITY
- 2 CONNECTIONS ARE FOR THEM, THAT'S ALL THEY HAVE. SO, WE HAVE TO
- 3 BE ABLE TO WORK WITH PEOPLE WHERE THEY'RE AT AND HELP THEM TO,
- 4 YOU KNOW, BUILD NEW CONNECTIONS, GET INTO TREATMENT, AND HAVE
- 5 THAT KIND OF STABILIZATION. I REALLY APPRECIATE ALL THE NEW
- 6 HOUSING RESOURCES THAT WE HAVE ONLINE, COMING ONLINE, SOON TO
- 7 COME ONLINE. LIKE, YOU KNOW, CHERI MENTIONED ALL THE INTERIM
- 8 HOUSING THAT'S BEING BUILT. I MEAN, IT'S A TREMENDOUS NUMBER.
- 9 BUT IF WE DON'T HAVE THE CAPACITY TO PROVIDE MENTAL HEALTH
- 10 SERVICES FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE SERIOUSLY MENTALLY ILL THEN THAT
- 11 WILL NOT BE A SUCCESSFUL INTERVENTION OR A LONG-LASTING OR
- 12 SUSTAINABLE INTERVENTION AND I THINK THAT AS SOMEBODY HAD
- 13 MENTIONED EARLIER THERE, I THINK SUPERVISOR SOLIS, THERE IS A
- 14 LOT OF GOOD INTENTION AT EVERY LEVEL, INCLUDING THE STATE, BUT
- 15 SOMETIMES THE DIRECTIVES ARE A BIT MISGUIDED. SO, YOU KNOW, AS
- 16 FOR SB43, THIS IS THE EXPANSION OF LPS CRITERIA SO THAT, YOU
- 17 KNOW, GRAVE DISABILITY WOULD INCLUDE OTHER POPULATIONS. AND WE
- 18 HAVE HEARD SOME CONCERNS ABOUT WHY IT'S NOT BEING IMPLEMENTED
- 19 IMMEDIATELY, BUT THE STATUTE ITSELF ALLOWS FOR IMPLEMENTATION
- 20 IN 2026 BECAUSE THERE WAS THE RECOGNITION THAT THERE IS A LOT
- 21 THAT HAS TO GO INTO PLACE BEFORE WE CAN START WORKING WITH
- 22 FOLKS THAT MEET THAT EXPANDED CRITERIA. ONLY 2 OUT OF THE 58
- 23 COUNTIES HAD IMPLEMENTED SB43 RIGHT AWAY AND THAT WAS FOR A
- 24 GOOD REASON. AND WE'VE REALLY LOOKED TO THOSE 2 COUNTIES TO
- 25 SEE WHAT THEIR EXPERIENCES WERE AND WHAT WE CAN LEARN FROM



- 1 THAT. AND WHAT WE FOUND OUT IS THE RESPONSE HAS NOT BEEN
- 2 ADEQUATE. THEY ARE IN NAME ONLY IMPLEMENTED. FOR INSTANCE, SAN
- 3 LUIS OBISPO COUNTY HAS ONLY SEEN 8 PEOPLE COME THROUGH WITH
- 4 SUD ONLY AND THOSE FOLKS HAVE ONLY BEEN TAKEN TO AN URGENT
- 5 CARE JUST TO BE RELEASED WITHIN 72 HOURS. THAT REALLY DOESN'T
- 6 DO ANYTHING IN TERMS OF HELPING THAT INDIVIDUAL. SAME THING
- 7 FOR SAN FRANCISCO, PEOPLE ONLY HAVE THE OPTION OF BEING TAKEN
- 8 TO A PSYCHIATRIC URGENT CARE OR TO A HOSPITAL. AND THOSE
- 9 PLACES DON'T HAVE ADEOUATE SUD ONLY TREATMENT OPTIONS AT THIS
- 10 TIME. SO, WE HAVE BEEN VERY PURPOSEFUL IN WHAT WE'RE BUILDING
- 11 OUT. WE ARE IN NO WAY WAITING UNTIL 2026 TO IMPLEMENT. WE ARE
- 12 BUILDING THIS AS WE GO. AND SO FAR WE HAVE DMH AND DPH-SAPC.
- 13 EXECUTIVE MANAGEMENT HAVE CREATED THE SB43 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE
- 14 TO GUIDE THE IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS. DMH AND DPH-SAPC ARE
- 15 PARTICIPATING IN THE CBHDA, THAT'S THE CALIFORNIA BEHAVIORAL
- 16 HEALTH DIRECTORS ASSOCIATION WORK GROUP THAT IS WORKING ON
- 17 STANDARDIZED GUIDELINES AND DEFINITIONS ACROSS COUNTIES AS AN
- 18 OPTION FOR COUNTIES TO CONSIDER. AND THIS GROUP ACTUALLY IS
- 19 CO-LED BY DR. GARY TSAI FROM SAPC. AND THE DEFINITIONS OF
- 20 SEVERE SUBSTANCE USE, PERSONAL SAFETY, NECESSARY MEDICAL CARE.
- 21 WE'VE BEEN WORKING ON THAT AND CONFIRMING THAT. WE HAVE THE
- 22 DEFINITIONS OPERATIONALIZED WITH CRITERIA AND EXAMPLES SO THAT
- 23 DMH WILL BE ABLE TO PRESENT THESE CRITERION EXAMPLES TO WORK
- 24 GROUP PARTICIPANTS FOR FEEDBACK AND CHANGES AND THEN
- 25 IMPLEMENTATION. WE HAVE STAKEHOLDER EVENTS THAT WERE HELD IN



- 1 JUNE 2024, WHICH I THINK WERE VERY IMPORTANT BECAUSE THERE ARE
- 2 SO MANY PEOPLE WHO HAVE AN INVESTMENT IN THIS ISSUE. WE HAVE
- 3 OPERATIONAL WORK GROUPS THAT WE ARE STARTING IN JULY 2024 WITH
- 4 EXTERNAL PARTNERS THAT REALLY FOCUS ON CLIENT FLOW, SYSTEM
- 5 MAPPING, SETTING OUT GUIDELINES, DESIGNATION, TRAINING, AND
- 6 TRAINING IS GOING TO BE AN ENORMOUS PART OF THIS FOR BOTH
- 7 MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONALS, LAYPEOPLE, LAW ENFORCEMENT
- 8 PARTNERS, AND WE HAVE TREATMENT AND CARE PLANNING, MANAGEMENT
- 9 OF INDIVIDUALS INELIGIBLE FOR THE NEW CRITERIA, SO WHAT
- 10 HAPPENS WHEN SOMEBODY NEEDS HELP, BUT THEY DON'T MEET THE
- 11 CRITERIA. AND COURT PROCESS, ADHERENCE TO COURT ORDERS,
- 12 COMMUNITY EDUCATION AND COLLABORATION, STAFFING BUDGETS, AND
- 13 MANAGED CARE PLAN COORDINATION. BECAUSE WE CERTAINLY KNOW THAT
- 14 SOME OF THE FOLKS WHO WILL FALL INTO SB43 CRITERIA ARE GOING
- 15 TO BE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF MANAGED CARE PLANS WHO WILL NEED
- 16 TO HELP US PROVIDE SOME FUNDING. WE'VE ALSO BEEN COORDINATING
- 17 WITH CCJC TO MEET WITH THE POLICE CHIEF ASSOCIATION TO DISCUSS
- 18 TRAINING OF ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS IN L.A. COUNTY ON THE
- 19 NEW DEFINITION OF GRAVE DISABILITY AND THE USE OF ALTERNATIVE
- 20 CRISIS SITES. AND THEN BHCIP ROUND ONE, THERE'S A WEBINAR IN
- 21 AUGUST, WE'LL BE GOING OVER THE BHCIP PROCESS FOR BOND MONEY
- 22 AND THE COUNTY LETTER OF SUPPORT PROCESS WILL FOCUS AND
- 23 PRIORITIZE THE NEEDS AS IDENTIFIED BY THE ROADMAP WE HAD
- 24 THROUGH THE HMA STUDY. SO, THESE ARE JUST SOME OF THE THINGS
- 25 THAT WE'VE BEEN WORKING ON SINCE THE PASSING OF THIS BILL. AND



1 WE HAVE A LOT MORE AHEAD OF US. WE WILL BE BUILDING THIS OUT.

- 3 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: SO, IT SOUNDS LIKE IT'S NOT JUST
- 4 AS EASY AS FLIPPING A SWITCH TO START ENFORCING WHAT HAS BEEN
- 5 PASSED. ABSOLUTELY NOT. THERE'S A LOT THAT'S ENTAILED. AND IT
- 6 ALSO SOUNDS LIKE IF WE DON'T BUILD OUT OUR SYSTEMS IN THE
- 7 APPROPRIATE MANNER, WE ARE GOING TO THEN IMPACT POTENTIALLY
- 8 OUR URGENT CARES, OUR EMERGENCY ROOMS AT OUR HOSPITALS, AND
- 9 WE'RE GOING TO HAVE SOME OF THESE OTHER PERHAPS UNINTENDED
- 10 CONSEQUENCES WHERE WE'RE IMPACTING OTHER HEALTH SERVICES OR
- 11 OTHER SERVICE PROVISION IN OUR COMMUNITY. SO, I'M GLAD THAT
- 12 WE'RE THINKING ABOUT THAT AND WE'RE BEING DELIBERATIVE. WE'RE
- 13 STILL, AS WE SEE, I'M GLAD TO HEAR THAT YOU'RE DOING YOUR
- 14 HOMEWORK ON WHAT IMPLEMENTATION HAS LOOKED LIKE IN THE OTHER 2
- 15 COUNTIES, WHICH IT SOUNDS LIKE IS IN NAME ONLY AND IS NOWHERE
- 16 NEAR THE LETTER OR THE SPIRIT OF WHAT THE LAW INTENDED. SO, I
- 17 WANT TO MAKE SURE WE DO THIS IN THE RIGHT WAY, BUT WE'RE STILL
- 18 GOING TO GET PUSHED TO MOVE FASTER. SO I'M RELAYING A MESSAGE
- 19 THAT I KNOW WE'RE ALL HEARING LOUDLY AND CLEARLY, AND I THINK
- 20 WE SHARE. THAT'S WHY YOU'RE DOING ALL OF THE WORK THAT YOU'VE
- 21 OUTLINED. DR. FERRER, YOU WANTED TO ADD?

- 23 DR. BARBARA FERRER: OH, YEAH. YEAH, THANK YOU. THANK YOU SO
- 24 MUCH, SUPERVISORS. AND I APPRECIATE THE CONCERN AND THE LINK,
- 25 ESPECIALLY TO THE SERVICE SIDE OF IT, BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT



- 1 MOST PEOPLE WHO ARE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS ARE GOING TO
- 2 NEED SOME RANGE OF SERVICES, SOME OF WHICH ARE BEHAVIORAL
- 3 HEALTH, MENTAL HEALTH, AND OR SUBSTANCE USE SERVICES. I WANT
- 4 TO JUST START WITH IMPLEMENTATION OF SB43, AND I WANT TO POINT
- 5 OUT THAT FOR SUBSTANCE USE SERVICES, WE DO NOT HAVE ANY LOCKED
- 6 WARDS. ALL SERVICES ARE VOLUNTARY. THERE'S NO WAY FOR US TO
- 7 ACTUALLY BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE EXISTING PROVIDER NETWORK,
- 8 WHICH HAVE DONE EVERYTHING THEY'VE BEEN ASKED TO DO, INCLUDING
- 9 MASSIVELY INCREASE AT ALL LEVELS OF SERVICE, FROM OUTPATIENT
- 10 TO RESIDENTIAL OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS FOR US TO ACTUALLY JUST
- 11 MOVE VERY QUICKLY AND USE THAT NETWORK TO ANCHOR SORT OF
- 12 INVOLUNTARY STAYS IN A FACILITY THAT WOULD BE ABLE TO APPLY
- 13 THE APPROPRIATE CARE. NOW, WE MAY HAVE PROVIDERS WHO ARE
- 14 INTERESTED AND ABLE TO MOVE INTO PROVIDING THOSE SERVICES, BUT
- 15 AT THE MOMENT, THAT IS NOT A COMPONENT OF THE CONTINUUM OF
- 16 CARE FOR PEOPLE STRUGGLING WITH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS. AND
- 17 FRANKLY, THAT'S INTENTIONAL BECAUSE OF THE FACT THAT WE REALLY
- 18 HAVE ALWAYS RELIED ON PEOPLE BEING WILLING PARTICIPANTS IN
- 19 THEIR SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT WHILE WE RESPECT THE FACT THAT
- 20 WE NEED TO MAKE SURE PEOPLE ARE SAFE IF THEY'RE NOT ENGAGED IN
- 21 A TREATMENT AND RECOVERY PROGRAM AT THE MOMENT, WHICH IS WHY
- 22 WE'VE PRESENTED TO YOU ON NUMEROUS OCCASIONS ON SORT OF HOW WE
- 23 NEED TO CHANGE THE LANDSCAPE OF WHAT'S AVAILABLE FOR PEOPLE
- 24 WHO ARE STRUGGLING WITH SUBSTANCE ABUSE. I WOULD SAY THE
- 25 CONCENTRATION REALLY NEEDS TO BE ON DOING HARM REDUCTION WORK



- 1 SO THAT WE'RE ABLE TO GET PEOPLE ENGAGED AND APPRECIATE THAT
- 2 THERE ARE OTHER OPTIONS FOR THEM SO THAT THEY MAY BE MORE
- 3 WILLING TO COME IN AND DO THE HARD WORK THAT THEY'LL NEED TO
- 4 DO FOR THERE TO BE A RECOVERY. I ALSO WANT TO NOTE THAT
- 5 SUBSTANCE ABUSE IS CONSIDERED A CHRONIC DISORDER WHERE PEOPLE
- 6 ARE LIKELY TO RELAPSE. AND AGAIN, AS WE BUILD OUT THIS
- 7 NETWORK, WE NEED TO UNDERSTAND THE TREATMENTS THAT, OPTIONS
- 8 THAT PEOPLE ARE GOING TO NEED TO HAVE WHEN THEY HAVE A CHRONIC
- 9 DISORDER THAT HAS PERIODS OF RELAPSING. IT'S SIMILAR TO PEOPLE
- 10 WHO MAY HAVE DIABETES, SOMETIMES IT'S CONTROLLED, SOMETIMES
- 11 IT'S NOT. WE HAVE TO THINK ABOUT HOW WE'RE BUILDING OUT THE
- 12 TREATMENT OPTIONS FOR SUBSTANCE USE. I DO WANT TO ADDRESS THE
- 13 CONCERNS THAT I THINK MANY CITIES HAVE, AND I THINK MANY OF
- 14 THE LEADERSHIP IN OUR UNINCORPORATED AREAS, COMMUNITY
- 15 RESIDENTS AND OTHER GROUPS THAT ARE ORGANIZED THERE AROUND
- 16 ACCESSING SERVICES, WE HAVE TRIED TO REALLY LISTEN CAREFULLY
- 17 TO WHAT IT IS THAT COMMUNITIES ARE ASKING FOR. AND I AGREE
- 18 WITH DR. WONG THAT ONE OF THE CRITICAL CONNECTIONS IS, HOW DO
- 19 PEOPLE CONTACT US? LIKE WHEN THEY HAVE A CLIENT WHO NEEDS
- 20 SERVICES, HOW EASY IS IT TO GET IN TOUCH WITH US? YOU KNOW, WE
- 21 HAVE A 24-7 LINE THAT REALLY IS ANSWERED BY A PERSON SO THAT
- 22 IN FACT WE'RE ACTUALLY ABLE TO RESPOND. AND WE'VE IMPROVED OUR
- 23 ABILITY TO ACTUALLY ASSIGN MORE STAFF TO HELP WITH CLIENT
- 24 NAVIGATION BY ATTACHING THEM TO THE INSIGHT SAFE AND THE
- 25 PATHWAY HOME PROGRAMS. I THINK, AGAIN, WE HAVE THESE WONDERFUL



- 1 PROGRAMS. I THINK I WANNA THANK SO MUCH OUR GOOD DOCTOR HERE
- 2 BECAUSE SHE'S LED THIS AMAZING EFFORT TO CREATE THIS CONTINUUM

- 4 WE'VE EXPANDED OUR ABILITY TO DO SO. WE'VE ALSO EXPANDED OUR
- 5 ABILITY TO HELP ON DIVERSION-RELATED PROJECTS WITH THE JUSTICE
- 6 SYSTEM SO THAT, AGAIN, I WANT TO THANK SHERIFF LUNA AND HIS
- 7 TEAM FOR ALLOWING US THIS OPPORTUNITY TO ACTUALLY RECOGNIZE
- 8 THAT FOR SOME PEOPLE WE NEED TO DO A BETTER JOB ON DIVERSION.
- 9 I HOPE THAT WE ARE, YOU KNOW, QUICKLY, NOT SLOWLY, MAKING
- 10 INROADS ON FOLKS KNOWING HOW TO CONTACT US AND HOW TO GET US
- 11 TO BE HELPFUL IN THE MOMENT. WE DO HAVE A BED AVAILABILITY
- 12 TOOL THAT WORKS FAIRLY WELL, BUT AGAIN, WE HAVE SOME, YOU
- 13 KNOW, I THINK CHALLENGES THAT CONSTANTLY NEED TO BE ADDRESSED
- 14 BECAUSE WE HAVE A VERY DIVERSIFIED PROVIDER NETWORK.

- 16 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU FOR THAT. SUPERVISOR
- 17 BARGER.

- 19 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THANK YOU AND THANK YOU FOR THE OUESTIONS
- 20 TO DR. WONG. I THINK THE FRUSTRATION WHEN I SAW THE GOVERNOR'S
- 21 LETTER CHALLENGING US WAS THAT IT'S NOT JUST MONEY, IT'S
- 22 CAPACITY. AND I WOULD JUST ASK LISA THAT MAYBE THIS BOARD BE
- 23 MORE ENGAGED SO THAT WE CAN PUBLICLY TALK ABOUT WHAT WE ARE

- 16 COUNTY IS WE'LL WANT TO DO IT RIGHT VERSUS DOING IT IN A WAY
- 17 THAT SETS NOT ONLY THE SYSTEM UP FOR FAILURE, BUT ALSO THE
- 18 INDIVIDUALS THAT ARE RELYING UPON US FOR CARE. SO, I WOULD

- 20 THAT MESSAGING WITH OUR CITIES WHEN WE REACH OUT TO TALK TO
- 21 THEM, TO PARTNER ALSO IN ALL OF OUR COMMUNICATIONS MATERIALS
- 22 AND IN ALL OF OUR AFTER ACTION REPORTING. WE DO THINK IT'S
- 23 VERY IMPORTANT FOR ALL OF OUR JURISDICTIONS TO KNOW HOW THESE
- 24 RESOURCES ARE BEING USED AND HOW THEY'RE COMING RIGHT BACK

- 1 ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION EFFORTS, THE COST ASSOCIATED WITH IT IN
- 2 PATHWAY HOME WOULD INCLUDE THAT CREATING INTERIM HOUSING, SO
- 3 BECAUSE WE'RE BUILDING ON TOP, WE'RE ADDING NEW INTERIM
- 4 HOUSING AND NOT TAKING CURRENT INTERIM HOUSING OFFLINE. SO,
- 5 WE'RE NOT SEEKING TO DISPLACE PEOPLE THAT ARE ALREADY BEING
- 6 SERVED IN INTERIM HOUSING. WE'RE CREATING NEW INTERIM HOUSING,
- 7 LARGELY THROUGH MOTELS. SO, WE'RE PAYING THOSE MOTEL COSTS.
- 8 WE'RE THEN PAYING SERVICE PROVIDERS, OUR NON-PROFIT HOMELESS
- 9 SERVICE PROVIDERS, TO COME ON SITE AND TO OPERATE THOSE HOTELS
- 10 WITH 24-7 STAFFING AND ON-SITE SUPPORT. AND THEN WE ARE ALSO
- 11 FUNDING THE HOUSING NAVIGATION AND THE RENTAL SUBSIDY SUPPORT
- 12 AND CASE MANAGEMENT TO HELP THOSE CLIENTS MOVE TO PERMANENT
- 13 HOUSING. THE MOST EXPENSIVE PIECE ASSOCIATED WITH THIS IS THE
- 14 INTERIM HOUSING. WE'VE TALKED ABOUT THAT BEFORE, HOW ONE OF
- 15 THE MOST COSTLY INTERVENTIONS IS INTERIM HOUSING ITSELF
- 16 BECAUSE OF THE 24-7 NATURE OF IT AND THE SERVICES THAT GO
- 17 ALONG WITH 24-7 WHICH HAS A HEAVY STAFF COST ASSOCIATED WITH
- 18 IT, WHICH IS VERY DIFFERENT THAN HELPING TO SUPPORT SOMEBODY
- 19 IN PERMANENT HOUSING. SO, IF WE'RE LOOKING AT COST PER PERSON,

- 3 THE COMING YEAR, AND ALSO THE ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION FUNDING.
- 4 AND UNDER BOTH OF THOSE PROGRAMS, SOME OF THOSE ALREADY
- 5 INCLUDE PARTNERSHIPS WITH CALTRANS. WE HAVE HAD A HISTORY OF
- 6 PARTNERING, WE WANT TO CONTINUE THAT PARTNERSHIP. WE WOULD
- 7 LIKE THEM TO MEET THEM WHERE WE'RE AT IN TERMS OF THE PROCESS

- 6 CHERI TODOROFF: YOU KNOW, UNDER THE NEW EXECUTIVE ORDER, IT
- 7 ALLOWS TO 48-HOUR POSTING.

- 10 SEEN ANY POST? MY POINT BEING THAT THE EXECUTIVE ORDER CAME
- 11 OUT, BUT TO MY RECOLLECTION, I HAVE NOT, AT LEAST ON THE NEWS
- 12 ANYWAY, SEEN ANYTHING GOING ON STATE PROPERTY RIGHT NOW. SO, I
- 13 GUESS THAT'S MY QUESTION. HAS THE STATE REACHED OUT TO LET US

- 20 COMMUNICATIONS WITH THE STATE. WE HAVE BEEN PARTNERING IN THIS
- 21 BODY OF WORK FOR A WHILE. WE ARE STILL ASSESSING THE SHIFT
- 22 HERE BECAUSE NOW WE'RE NOT JUST TALKING ABOUT CALTRANS, WE'RE

- 7 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: OKAY, I MEAN, I GUESS IT SHOULD NOT COME
- 8 AS A SURPRISE TO ANYBODY ON THIS BOARD THAT CALTRANS IS GONNA
- 9 BE INVOLVED IN ENCAMPMENT CLEANUP BECAUSE OF THE FIRE THAT
- 10 OCCURRED DURING THE HOLIDAYS. SO, WE KNEW THAT THE STATE HAD
- 11 BEEN IMPACTED AND IT IMPACTED OUR TRANSIT SYSTEM. SO, I THINK
- 12 THAT THE EXECUTIVE ORDER IS GOING TO GO BEYOND JUST UNDER THE

- 19 THE COMMISSIONER WHO I FIND TO BE AN EXCELLENT PARTNER WE'RE
- 20 STILL TRYING TO WORK THROUGH A LOT OF THESE DETAILS OF WHEN
- 21 HOW THIS WILL OCCUR AND HE ASSURED ME THAT WE WOULD ENHANCE
- 22 OUR COMMUNICATION AT LEAST FROM LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY TO LAW
- 23 ENFORCEMENT AGENCY SO I'M HOPING THAT MAYBE AS WE SET MEETINGS
- 24 FORWARD WE INCLUDE OTHER PARTNERS THERE WHICH INCLUDES THE
- 25 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND CALTRANS.

- 3 CLOSING, I JUST WANT TO SAY THANK YOU TO SHERIFF LUNA, CHERIE
- 4 TODOROFF, DR. ADAMS KELLUM, AND DR. FERRER, DR. WONG, AND
- 5 CAPTAIN DIEDRICH FOR GIVING THE PRESENTATION TODAY. MY
- 6 POSITION HAS AND CONTINUES TO BE THAT I DO NOT BELIEVE THE
- 7 CRIMINALIZATION OF HOMELESSNESS IS THE RIGHT PATH. QUITE
- 8 FRANKLY, I FIND IT ALMOST LUDICROUS TO THINK THAT WE'RE GOING
- 9 TO ISSUE \$250 TICKETS TO INDIVIDUALS THAT ARE UNHOUSED WHO ARE
- 10 THEN GOING TO GET ANOTHER TICKET AND THEN ANOTHER TICKET AND
- 11 THEN HAVE A WARRANT AFTER THEIR ARREST. AND FOR WHAT? FOR
- 12 WHAT? IT IS COUNTERINTUITIVE AND OUITE FRANKLY, IS NOT THE WAY
- 13 WE ARE GOING TO ADDRESS WHAT IS GOING ON IN OUR STREETS. I
- 14 SUPPORT THE COUNTY APPROACH THAT IS FOCUSED SO HEAVILY ON
- 15 COMPASSIONATE OUTREACH PAIRED WITH EFFECTIVE SOLUTIONS. THANKS
- 16 TO THIS BOARD, OUR NUMEROUS STAFF AND STAKEHOLDERS ACROSS THE
- 17 L.A. REGION, LOS ANGELES COUNTY HAS DEVELOPED, AS YOU'VE HEARD
- 18 CAPTAIN DIEDRICH MENTION, SOME OF THE BEST PRACTICES WHEN
- 19 ADDRESSING ENCAMPMENTS, ESPECIALLY OUR PATHWAY HOME ENCAMPMENT
- 20 RESOLUTION PARTNERSHIP WITH CITIES TO BRING UNSHELTERED PEOPLE
- 21 EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS INDOORS. I REALLY WANT TO ELEVATE
- 22 AND EMPHASIZE THE WORK THAT PATHWAY HOME HAS DONE SINCE IT'S
- 23 ALREADY HAD A MAJOR IMPACT IN MY DISTRICT. TO DATE, THERE HAVE
- 24 BEEN SEVERAL PATHWAY HOME ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTIONS IN MY
- 25 DISTRICT. IN EARLY JUNE, THERE WAS A JOINT OPERATION BETWEEN



- 1 THE COUNTY AND THE CITIES OF MONROVIA AND DUARTE. THANKS TO
- 2 THAT OPERATION, 30 PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS WERE
- 3 HOUSED AND SEVERAL ENCAMPMENTS WERE CLEARED COMPLETELY. JUST A
- 4 WEEK AGO, CEO HI HELPED LEAD A SUCCESSFUL PATHWAY HOME
- 5 OPERATION IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY BY PARTNERING WITH THE CITY
- 6 OF PALMDALE WHERE IT WAS A SWELTERING 110 DEGREES. THE
- 7 PALMDALE OPERATION HAS BEEN THE LARGEST PATHWAY HOME TO DATE
- 8 AND SUCCESSFULLY BROUGHT OVER 60 INDIVIDUALS INDOORS WHILE
- 9 REMOVING DOZENS OF RVS OFF PRIVATE PARCELS IN THE DESERT.
- 10 THESE OPERATIONS HAVE TRULY MADE A BELIEVER IN THE POWER OF
- 11 COLLABORATION. NEITHER WOULD HAVE BEEN POSSIBLE WITHOUT THE
- 12 STRONG PARTNERSHIP OF OUR CEO, HI TEAM, WHICH HAS REALLY
- 13 DEVELOPED AND STRENGTHENED A RELATIONSHIP WITH LOCAL
- 14 MUNICIPALITIES. THIS PARTNERSHIP ONLY WORKS BECAUSE OF THE WAY
- 15 WE APPROACH AND WORK WITH OUR CITIES. AS MY FRIEND MAYOR BASS
- 16 WOULD SAY, WE TRULY ARE LOCKING ARMS TOGETHER. WHERE THE
- 17 COUNTY SHOULD NOT BE THE ONE DICTATING LOCAL PRIORITIES OR
- 18 TELLING CITIES HOW TO ADDRESS THEIR HOMELESS POPULATIONS.
- 19 INSTEAD, WE CAN BE A GOOD PARTNER AND SUPPORT LOCALIZED
- 20 EFFORTS WITH THE NECESSARY RESOURCES AND COUNTY SERVICES.
- 21 SHERIFF LUNA, I TRULY APPRECIATE YOU BEING PART OF THE
- 22 DISCUSSION TODAY. LASD HAS A WONDERFUL PROGRAM OF KEEP TALKING
- 23 ABOUT HOST. WE'RE HIGHLY SPECIALIZED AND TRAINED DEPUTIES WORK
- 24 ALONGSIDE LOSS OF OUTREACH TEAMS WHO BY THE WAY ARE EQUALLY AS
- 25 AMAZING. AND I THINK CAPTAIN DIEDERICH WOULD SAY THAT THEIR



- 1 HEART AND THEIR PASSION FOR WHAT THEY'RE DOING REFLECTS IN THE
- 2 SUCCESS STORIES AND THE EMPATHY THAT'S SHOWN BY BOTH THE LAW
- 3 ENFORCEMENT AS WELL AS THE LOSS OF TEAMS, REALLY IS WHY THIS
- 4 PROGRAM IS A SUCCESS. IT IS IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT THE
- 5 OUTREACH CONDUCTED BY THESE TEAMS IS DONE OVER A PERIOD OF
- 6 WEEKS, TO YOUR POINT, CHERI, IN TERMS OF THE TURNAROUND THAT
- 7 THE STATE'S TALKING ABOUT, AND SOMETIMES EVEN MONTHS. STAFF
- 8 ARE ESTABLISHING RELATIONSHIPS TO BUILD TRUST, SOMETHING THAT
- 9 MANY OF THESE INDIVIDUALS HAVE LOST BECAUSE THEY'VE BEEN
- 10 CYCLED IN AND OUT, IN AND OUT, OFF THE STREET. AND WHEN THEY
- 11 HAVE TO GO BACK OUT ONTO THE STREET, IT'S LIKE STARTING OVER.
- 12 AND SO, TRUST IS A PRIORITY. ENFORCEMENT IS A LAST RESORT THAT
- 13 IS USED WHEN NECESSARY TO MAINTAIN PUBLIC SAFETY AND COMMUNITY
- 14 HEALTH. IT IS ALSO DONE WITH PLENTY OF LEAD TIME SO THAT
- 15 INDIVIDUALS KNOW IN ADVANCE. I'D ALSO LIKE TO BRING UP THE
- 16 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON HOMELESSNESS, AND CHERI, THANK YOU FOR
- 17 BRINGING THAT UP, A BODY CREATED OUT OF THE BLUE RIBBON
- 18 COMMISSION ON HOMELESSNESS, WHICH I HELPED LAUNCH. AS THE
- 19 CHAIR OF THE COMMITTEE, I FELT IT WAS APPROPRIATE TO TAKE UP
- 20 GRANTS PASS ITEM ON FRIDAY, THE JULY 26TH MEETING. WE HEARD
- 21 FEEDBACK FROM OUR SMALL CITY REPRESENTATIVES AND VICE CHAIR
- 22 NITHYA RAMAN'S OFFICE, THE CONSENSUS WAS CLEAR. ADDRESSING
- 23 HOMELESSNESS REGIONALLY WOULD BE FAR MORE EFFECTIVE THAN
- 24 ADDRESSING EACH JURISDICTION INDIVIDUALLY. IT WAS OUT OF THIS
- 25 DISCUSSION SURROUNDING REGIONAL COLLABORATION THAT THE



- 1 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AGREED TO REFER BACK A GOOD NEIGHBOR
- 2 PLEDGE TO THE COUNCILS OF GOVERNMENT. THIS PLEDGE EMPHASIZES A
- 3 COLLABORATIVE APPROACH AND ASKS EACH CITY TO COMMIT TO NOT
- 4 PUSHING THEIR HOMELESS POPULATIONS INTO NEIGHBORING
- 5 JURISDICTIONS. ADDITIONALLY, OUR PARTNERS AT THE CITY OF L.A.
- 6 BROUGHT FORWARD AN IDEA WHICH CALLED FOR IMMEDIATE REGIONAL
- 7 COLLABORATION TO ADDRESS EMERGENCY SHELTER, WHICH IS
- 8 ESPECIALLY IN NEED DURING THE SEVERE WEATHER WE ARE
- 9 EXPERIENCING. IT'S NO LONGER JUST COLD WEATHER EMERGENCY
- 10 SHELTERS. WE NEED YEAR-ROUND BECAUSE WHEN I TALK ABOUT THE
- 11 ANTELOPE VALLEY BEING 110 DEGREES, PEOPLE ARE DYING AS A
- 12 RESULT OF THAT. AS A BOARD, WE APPROVE THESE ITEMS AND AS A
- 13 BOARD AT THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, WE APPROVE THESE ITEMS. I'M
- 14 LOOKING FORWARD TO ADVANCING THESE IN AN EFFORT TO INCREASE
- 15 THE REGIONAL PARTNERSHIPS INCREASE THE REGIONAL PARTNERSHIPS
- 16 BETWEEN CITIES AND THE COUNTY. FINALLY, GOVERNOR NEWSOM'S
- 17 EXECUTIVE ORDER, WHICH EMPHASIZES URGENCY AND SHOWS A
- 18 COMMITMENT FROM THE STATE TO MOBILIZE ITS RESOURCES AND
- 19 FUNDING TO SUPPORT LOCAL JURISDICTION IN ADDRESSING THE
- 20 ENCAMPMENTS, IS SOMETHING THAT WE ARE ALREADY DOING. I BELIEVE
- 21 THAT WE ALL SUPPORT THE ISSUES NOW. THE QUESTION IS EXECUTION.
- 22 SO, TO ME, THE EXECUTIVE ORDER WAS SOMETHING THAT IS KIND OF
- 23 LIKE A WE'RE ALREADY DOING THIS AND MAYBE WE NEED TO BE BETTER
- 24 ARTICULATING THINGS LIKE WHAT WE DO IN PALMDALE OR WHAT WE DID
- 25 WHAT MAYOR BASS DID ALONG FOREST LAWN WHERE WE ACTUALLY HOUSED



- 1 INDIVIDUALS AND THEN LOOK AT THE NUMBERS. I HAVE TO SAY THAT I
- 2 GOT AN EMAIL FROM OUR VETERANS AFFAIRS OFFICE. DIRECTOR ZENER
- 3 SAID THAT IN L.A. COUNTY, 23% DECREASE OF VA'S THAT ARE
- 4 HOMELESS. CITY OF L.A., 32% DECREASE IN THE NUMBER OF VETERANS
- 5 ON THE STREET. THE GREATER L.A. VETERAN CATCHMENT AREA, 21%
- 6 DECREASE IN THE NUMBER OF VETERANS ON THE STREET. SO, AND THAT
- 7 CAME FROM COLLABORATION, THAT CAME FROM WORKING WITH CALVET,
- 8 WITH LAHSA, WITH THE COUNTY, PUTTING ALL TOGETHER TO FIGURE
- 9 OUT HOW WE ARE GONNA DO THE OUTREACH. OTHER COUNTIES, WHICH I
- 10 WON'T MENTION, HAVE SEEN INCREASES IN THE NUMBER OF VETERANS
- 11 ON THE STREET. AND I WILL GUARANTEE YOU THOSE NUMBERS THAT ARE
- 12 INCREASES ARE NOT BECAUSE WE PUSHED THEM INTO ANOTHER COUNTY.
- 13 IT'S BECAUSE WE ACTUALLY WORKED, COLLABORATED, AND FOUND
- 14 HOUSING FOR VETERANS SO THAT THEY WOULD ACTUALLY BE ABLE TO
- 15 GET BACK ON THEIR FEET. THESE ARE THE TYPE OF STORIES WE NEED
- 16 TO HIGHLIGHT, NOT TO BRAG, BUT TO LET PEOPLE KNOW THAT WE ARE,
- 17 IN FACT, MOVING THE NEEDLE. LIKE WHAT YOU SAID, DR. WONG,
- 18 ABOUT WHAT WE'RE DOING FOR THE GRAVELY DISABLED. WE ARE MOVING
- 19 THE NEEDLE. AND IT MAY NOT APPEAR THAT WAY, BUT WE ARE. AND I,
- 20 FOR ONE AM PROUD OF THAT. THERE ARE THOSE THAT FEEL IT'S NOT
- 21 HAPPENING FAST ENOUGH, AND I HAVE A CITY THAT'S MADE SOME
- 22 COMMENTS THAT I PROMISE YOU I'M WORKING CLOSELY BECAUSE FAST
- 23 DOES NOT ALWAYS MEAN SUCCESS. WE NEED TO MAKE SURE IT STICKS.
- 24 WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT WE PUT IN THE INVESTMENT FOR LONG-
- 25 TERM SUCCESS VERSUS IMMEDIATE GRATIFICATION. IN CLOSING, I



- 1 BELIEVE THE PURPOSE OF THESE DISCOURSES AROUND GRANTS PASSED
- 2 AND HOMELESS ENCAMPMENTS SHOULD BE CONDUCTED TO FIND A COMMON
- 3 GOOD AND BUILD A BEST PRACTICES CONSENSUS BETWEEN THE COUNTY
- 4 AND OUR 88 CITIES SO WE CAN BE IN ALIGNMENT ON HOW WE ADDRESS
- 5 ENCAMPMENTS. THIS WAS THE INTENT BEHIND THE MOTION I BROUGHT
- 6 IN WHEN WE TALKED ABOUT DOING THE BLUE RIBBON COMMISSION ON
- 7 HOMELESSNESS, THAT COMMISSION BROUGHT IN REPRESENTATIVES FROM
- 8 OUR CITIES SO THAT THEY COULD HAVE A VOICE IN DETERMINING HOW
- 9 COUNTY RESOURCES ARE INVESTED TO HELP LOCAL JURISDICTIONS.
- 10 SOMETHING THEY DID NOT FEEL WAS HAPPENING. THEY DIDN'T FEEL
- 11 THEIR VOICE WAS BEING HEARD. AND THROUGH THIS COLLABORATION, I
- 12 BELIEVE THE OUTCOME WILL BENEFIT THE ENTIRE COUNTY REGIONALLY.
- 13 SO, THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

- 17 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU, AND THANKS TO ALL MY
- 18 COLLEAGUES AND TO THE PANEL FOR ALL THE POINTS YOU'VE RAISED.
- 19 I AGREE AND I AM NOT GOING TO BE REDUNDANT. IT JUST STRIKES ME
- 20 AS I HEAR THE COMMENTS MY COLLEAGUES HAVE RAISED. I REFERENCED
- 21 THIS AFRICAN PROVERB I THINK LAST TUESDAY. YOU WANT TO GO
- 22 FAST, YOU GO ALONE. YOU WANNA GO FAR, WE GO TOGETHER. AND SO,
- 23 COMMUNICATION FROM ONE LEVEL OF GOVERNMENT SETTING A POLICY
- 24 THAT ANOTHER LEVEL OF GOVERNMENT IS EXPECTED TO OPERATIONALIZE
- 25 THROUGH EXECUTIVE ORDER OR PRESS RELEASE THIS IS NOT HELPFUL.



- 1 THAT'S JUST NOT HELPFUL. AND AS YOU SAID YOU WONDER SINCE
- 2 EVERYONE IS GIVEN EXAMPLES OF WHAT WE'RE DOING THAT'S WORKING
- 3 IT'S LIKE WHAT WAS THE EXECUTIVE ORDER LIKE DIDN'T WERE WE
- 4 SUPPOSED TO BE CARVED OUT? WERE YOU TALKING ABOUT US OR TO US?
- 5 BECAUSE WE FEEL WE'RE DOING IT. AND SO COMMUNICATION, WE HEAR
- 6 THAT IT'S HAPPENING AT YOUR LEVEL AND SO WE HAVE TO FIGURE OUT
- 7 WHAT'S MISSING IN TERMS OF OUR ABILITY TO COMMUNICATE WITH THE
- 8 GOVERNOR, THE LEGISLATURE'S ON SUMMER RECESS, IT WAS EXECUTIVE
- 9 ORDER SO IT WAS JUST THE GOVERNOR. WE HAVE TO FIGURE OUT HOW
- 10 TO COMMUNICATE BETTER AND MORE ACCURATELY OR MORE TIMELY IN
- 11 TERMS OF THE WORK WE'RE DOING AND THE SUCCESS WE'RE SEEING.
- 12 BECAUSE AGAIN, POLICY SETTING THROUGH EXECUTIVE ORDER AND
- 13 PRESS RELEASES ISN'T OFTEN HELPFUL WHEN IT'S ANOTHER LEVEL OF
- 14 GOVERNMENT THAT'S GOT TO OPERATIONALIZE IT. LET ME THANK THE
- 15 PANEL AND ALL OF THE MEN AND WOMEN THAT ARE BEHIND YOU THAT
- 16 GET THE WORK DONE. I WANT TO INCLUDE THE FIRE DEPARTMENT
- 17 BECAUSE THERE ARE SOME INVESTIGATIONS UNIT HAS BEEN ADDED TO
- 18 THE HOST TEAM WHICH WAS IMPORTANT FOR ME IN THE RV ENCAMPMENT
- 19 REMOVAL PROCESS. LET ME JUST START BY SAYING, LET ME MAKE AN
- 20 AFFIRMATIVE STATEMENT. IT'S HOUSING THAT ENDS HOMELESSNESS,
- 21 INTERIM, FIRST AND THEN PERMANENT. AND SO, DISPLACEMENT
- 22 WITHOUT HOUSING OPTIONS IS NOT THE SOLUTION, NOR DOES IT HELP
- 23 US ACTUALLY SOLVE FOR HOMELESSNESS. YOU KNOW, I BELIEVE THIS
- 24 BOARD'S GOAL IS TO HOUSE AND TO HOUSE IN SETTINGS THAT
- 25 ACTUALLY INCREASE THE LIKELIHOOD THAT PEOPLE STAY HOUSED.



- 1 EVERYBODY IS SICK OF THIS HAMSTER WHEEL IN AND OUT, IT COSTS
- 2 TAXPAYERS MORE MONEY, IT IS NOT HELPFUL. DR. ADAMS KELLUM,
- 3 THANK YOU FOR RAISING THIS CHART, BECAUSE WHILE WE'VE ALL SAID
- 4 ELOQUENTLY, YOU ALL HAVE SAID ELOQUENTLY THAT YOU DON'T
- 5 BELIEVE IN INCARCERATING PEOPLE WHO ARE UNHOUSED, LET'S BE
- 6 CLEAR ABOUT THE HISTORY OF GOVERNMENT CRIMINALIZING CERTAIN
- 7 GROUPS OF PEOPLE AND WHERE THAT'S GOT US. I SAW A WRITER AT
- 8 NACO MAYBE LAST SUMMER, HEATHER MCGEE IN HER BOOK, THE SUM OF
- 9 US, WHERE SHE TALKS ABOUT THE ZERO-SUM GAME AND GIVES AN
- 10 EXAMPLE OF A MUNICIPALITY THAT TO PREVENT BLACK AND BROWN
- 11 PEOPLE FROM SWIMMING IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOL POOL, THEY JUST
- 12 EMPTY THE POOL. SO, EVERYBODY SUFFERED. AND SO, IF OUR THEORY
- 13 IS TO CRIMINALIZE HOMELESSNESS, WE HAVE TO ACKNOWLEDGE WHAT
- 14 SUBPOPULATIONS ARE GOING TO SUFFER. AND ARE WE WILLING TO
- 15 THROW THE ENTIRE BABY OUT WITH THE BATHWATER? AS OF NOW, IT IS
- 16 NOT ILLEGAL TO BE BLACK, OR LATINA, OR POOR, OR TRANSITION AGE
- 17 YOUTH, OR LGBTQ+, OR TO GO TO WORK EVERY DAY AND STILL NOT BE
- 18 ABLE TO AFFORD THE RENT THAT STATUS IS NOT ILLEGAL AND SO TO
- 19 THINK THAT WE ARE GOING TO SWEEP PEOPLE UP AND INCARCERATE
- 20 THEM BECAUSE OF THEIR STATUS, I LOVE THE WAY YOU PUT IT,
- 21 CHAIR. IT'S NOT ABOUT YOUR STATUS. IT'S ABOUT CRIMINAL
- 22 ACTIVITY. AND THOSE STATUSES DOES NOT MAKE ONE A CRIMINAL. SO,
- 23 WE WILL CONTINUE TO STAND BY OUR POSITION AND ACKNOWLEDGE THAT
- 24 WHAT WE ARE DOING IS WORKING. I HAVE TO SAY THAT I AM MORE
- 25 HOPEFUL NOW THAN I HAVE BEEN IN MANY YEARS AS AN ELECTED



- 1 OFFICIAL BECAUSE EVERY LEVEL OF GOVERNMENT IS WORKING IN
- 2 UNISON. WE ALL UNDERSTAND THE PROBLEM. THE PROBLEM HAS REACHED
- 3 SUCH A CRESCENDO THAT NO LONGER COULD ONE PERSON SAY, OH,
- 4 THAT'S SKID ROW, THAT'S NOT MY DISTRICT. SORRY, NOW SORRY. IT
- 5 HAS REACHED SUCH A CRESCENDO THAT EVERYBODY IS LEANING IN. AND
- 6 THAT IS A GOOD THING, BECAUSE WE'RE ALL LEANING IN, AND WE'RE
- 7 ALL WORKING TO SOLVE FOR IT. SOMEBODY ASKED FOR SOME NUMBERS.
- 8 I CAN'T REMEMBER WHICH OF MY COLLEAGUES. I'LL GIVE YOU THE RV
- 9 ENCAMPMENT EXAMPLE. WE HEARD VERY LOUDLY WHEN WE BROUGHT THAT
- 10 MOTION FORWARD THAT, YOU KNOW, HAD BEEN TRIED BEFORE AND
- 11 PEOPLE JUST FOR WHATEVER REASON DIDN'T BELIEVE THAT PEOPLE WHO
- 12 LIVED IN RVS WOULD SAY YES TO HOUSING. WELL, WE'RE JUST A FEW
- 13 WEEKS AWAY FROM OUR FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF LAUNCHING PATHWAY
- 14 HOME AND WE'VE CONNECTED OVER 600 RESIDENTS TO INTERIM
- 15 HOUSING, 100 TO PERMANENT HOUSING, AND HAVE REMOVED 400 RVS
- 16 FROM THE STREETS OF L.A. COUNTY. THOSE ARE NOT NUMBERS TO NOT
- 17 CELEBRATE. THAT'S REAL LIVES IMPACTED IN A YEAR AS HE'S
- 18 TALKING ABOUT, WE'RE NOT GOING FAST ENOUGH. THAT WAS PRETTY
- 19 FAST CONSIDERING ALL OF THE BRANCHES OF GOVERNMENT THAT HAD TO
- 20 COME TOGETHER TO MAKE THAT HAPPEN. SO, I BELIEVE WE HAVE TO
- 21 CONTINUE THE MOMENTUM WE'VE CREATED WITH SUCCESSFUL PROGRAMS
- 22 LIKE PATHWAY HOME BECAUSE OUR SOLUTION IS WORKING. AND WE
- 23 CONTINUE TO HEAR FROM OUR CONSTITUENTS ABOUT THEIR CONCERNS
- 24 ABOUT ENCAMPMENTS THAT BLOCK THE PUBLIC RIGHT OF WAY, EGRESS,
- 25 AND BRING HEALTH AND SAFETY CONCERNS TO SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS,



- 1 PARENTS, BUSINESSES, AND OUR HOUSE RESIDENTS ACROSS THE
- 2 COUNTY. AND SO, I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE MAKE IT CLEAR
- 3 THAT WE DO HAVE TO ADDRESS THOSE CONCERNS WITHOUT PUNISHING OR
- 4 CRIMINALIZE OUR UNHOUSED FAMILY, FRIENDS, AND NEIGHBORS. YOU
- 5 KNOW, WHEN I WAS IN THE STATE LEGISLATURE AND REPRESENTED
- 6 PORTIONS OF SKID ROW AND WHEN I REPRESENTED PORTIONS OF SKID
- 7 ROW HERE, AND I WOULD WALK THAT COMMUNITY, AND WHEN I WALK
- 8 UNHOUSED COMMUNITIES TODAY, I HAVE NEVER, AND I TOLD YOUR
- 9 PREDECESSOR, MET SOMEONE FROM SOMEPLACE ELSE. THIS NOTION THAT
- 10 PEOPLE COME HERE BECAUSE OF THE LARGESSE OF OUR SERVICES, I'VE
- 11 JUST NEVER EXPERIENCED THAT. UNFORTUNATELY, FAR TOO OFTEN THEY
- 12 ARE PEOPLE WHO GREW UP AND HAVE FAMILY MEMBERS A STONE'S THROW
- 13 AWAY FROM WHERE THEY ARE IN-HOUSE. BECAUSE IF I'M GONNA BE IN-
- 14 HOUSE, I'M GONNA STAY IN A COMMUNITY THAT I KNOW, THAT WHAT
- 15 I'M FAMILIAR WITH. AND SO, THEY ARE OUR FAMILY FRIENDS AND
- 16 RESIDENTS, AND FAMILY FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS, THAT WE HAVE A
- 17 RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPORTING. AGAIN, THE SOLUTION IS HOUSING.
- 18 I TOO WANT TO THANK THE SOUTH BAY COG FOR THEIR LEADERSHIP IN
- 19 DRAFTING THE GOOD NEIGHBORS PLEDGE. I THINK THAT'S IMPORTANT
- 20 CONVERSATION THAT CITY GOVERNMENTS ARE GOING TO HAVE TO HAVE
- 21 WITH EACH OTHER. I DID GET A CALL SEVERAL MONTHS AGO FROM A
- 22 CITY COUNCIL MEMBER WHO WAS CONCERNED ABOUT A HOME KEY SITE IN
- 23 SAID CITY AND SAID, THERE'S SOME HOTELS ACROSS THE WAY. I
- 24 SAID, WHERE? IN UNINCORPORATED L.A. OR ANOTHER CITY IN ANOTHER
- 25 CITY? IT MIGHT BE BETTER SUITED FOR THERE. I SAID, THAT'S



- 1 REALLY INTERESTING BECAUSE THE LAST CALL YOU MADE TO ME WAS TO
- 2 GET RID OF THE RV ENCAMPMENT ALONG SAID STREET. AND IN FACT,
- 3 THAT'S WHERE THE RESIDENTS OF THAT RV ENCAMPMENT ARE GONNA GO,
- 4 INTO THE HOME KEY SITE. SO, WHAT IS IT? YOU WANT ME TO REMOVE
- 5 THE RVS AND JUST SEND THEM SOMEPLACE ELSE, NOT YOUR CITY? HOW
- 6 DOES THAT EVEN SOUND TO YOU? I HAVE TO SAY THAT I FELT REALLY
- 7 GOOD WHEN I STRONGLY ENCOURAGED THAT COUNCIL MEMBER TO GO LOOK
- 8 AT THAT SITE, THAT I WOULD ARGUE THAT THE NONPROFIT AGENCY
- 9 THAT WAS GOING TO RUN THAT HOME KEY SITE WAS GOING TO RUN A
- 10 BETTER OPERATION THAN THE MOTEL OWNER HAD FOR DECADES. AND
- 11 WHEN THE COUNCIL MEMBER WENT AND SAW IT, HAD AN AHA MOMENT AND
- 12 UNDERSTOOD THAT IT REALLY WAS AN ADDED VALUE TO THAT
- 13 MUNICIPALITY. I APPRECIATE PEOPLE ARE CONCERNED. I APPRECIATE
- 14 WE ALL HEAR FROM CONSTITUENTS, AND I'M GONNA ENCOURAGE US ALL
- 15 TO CONTINUE TO LOCK ARMS TO DO WHAT IS RIGHT AND WHAT IS
- 16 WORKING. WE'RE NOT ASKING PEOPLE TO HAVE FAITH IN SOMETHING
- 17 THAT'S UNTESTED. IT'S BEEN TESTED, AND IT'S WORKING. COUPLE OF
- 18 OUICK OUESTIONS FOR ME, MADAM CHAIR. FIRST TO MS. TODOROFF, AS
- 19 YOU ACKNOWLEDGE THE BOARD INCREASED RESOURCES FOR ENHANCED
- 20 CLEANUPS IN THE CURRENT BUDGET. SO, WHAT DOES THAT MEAN FOR
- 21 OUR HOUSE CONSTITUENTS? WE TALK ABOUT PEOPLE HAVING
- 22 EXPECTATIONS ABOUT HOW QUICKLY AN ISSUE WILL BE RESOLVED. AND
- 23 SO WHEN WILL THEY START SEEING THE IMPACT OF THESE INCREASED
- 24 RESOURCES IN THEIR OWN COMMUNITIES?



- 1 CHERI TODOROFF: YES, I WANNA THANK THE BOARD FOR SUPPORTING
- 2 THE EXPANDED AND EXPEDITED CLEANUPS, SOMETIMES REFERRED TO AS
- 3 PROTOCOL CLEANUPS, SOMETIMES NON-DISPLACEMENT CLEANUPS. AND
- 4 WITH THE START OF THE FISCAL YEAR, THAT EFFORT IS UNDERWAY.
- 5 SO, THE WORK HERE, BASICALLY WHAT WE WILL HAVE IS THE ADDITION
- 6 OF NEW TEAMS THAT WILL BE ABLE TO EXPEDITE AND INCREASE THE
- 7 NUMBER OF CLEANUPS THAT ARE HAPPENING AT AND AROUND
- 8 ENCAMPMENTS. IT WILL INCLUDE BOTH LASD HOST AND LAHSA HOPES
- 9 TEAMS WHO WILL DO THAT WORK AND THE SUPPORT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO
- 10 SUPPORT WITH THE CLEANUP EFFORTS. WE WILL ALSO HAVE ADDITIONAL
- 11 PUBLIC WORKS TEAMS WHO WILL DO SUPPORTING ACTIVITIES SUCH AS
- 12 FENCE REPAIRS AND GATE MAINTENANCE AT FLOOD CHANNELS. AND
- 13 ALSO, THERE WILL BE COMPONENTS THAT WILL EXPAND THE WASTE
- 14 COLLECTION OF ILLEGAL AND DUMPING HAZARDOUS WASTE, SO THAT
- 15 WILL BE PART OF THE EFFORT, AS WELL AS DOING RV PUMPING
- 16 SERVICES AT THE NON-DISPLACEMENT RV CLEANUPS. SO, WHAT THIS
- 17 WILL MEAN FOR OUR COMMUNITIES AND FOR THE PEOPLE WHO ARE
- 18 LIVING IN THESE ENCAMPMENTS, INCLUDING RV ENCAMPMENTS, IS THAT
- 19 THEY WILL BE RECEIVING MORE SUPPORTIVE SERVICES. THEY'LL BE
- 20 RECEIVING MORE LINKAGES TO HOUSING AND TO RESOURCES, BUT ALSO
- 21 WITHIN THOSE COMMUNITIES THERE WILL BE MUCH MORE THERE'LL BE
- 22 MORE FREQUENT AND MORE CLEANUP OF THESE SITES TO HELP MAINTAIN
- 23 THEM UNTIL WE'RE ABLE TO COME AND WORK WITH THOSE LOCATIONS TO
- 24 DO LIKE A FULL ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION WITH THAT CONNECTION TO
- 25 PERMANENT HOUSING. WE ARE SCALING UP NOW. THE SCALE UP AND THE



- 1 FIRST NEW TEAM IS SCHEDULED TO ROLL OUT IN THE COMING WEEKS IN
- 2 AUGUST WITH ALL OF THE TEAMS COMING ON BOARD SHORTLY
- 3 THEREAFTER AND BEING COMPLETED WITH THE SCALE UP THROUGH THE
- 4 FALL OF THIS YEAR.

- 6 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: SO, I WANT TO MAKE SURE PEOPLE
- 7 UNDERSTAND WHEN WE TALK ABOUT RESOLUTIONS, IT CAN BE 2
- 8 ACTIONS. IT COULD BE CLEANUP, WHERE WE PROVIDE PUBLIC WORK
- 9 SERVICES WHILE THE ENCAMPMENT IS STILL THERE, WHICH IS A LOT
- 10 OF THE HEALTH AND SAFETY ISSUES THAT PEOPLE ELEVATE AND RAISE.
- 11 AND THEN IT'S THE RESOLUTION, WHICH IS BASICALLY HOUSING. SO,
- 12 I'M NOT ASKING YOU TO GO FAST, THAT'S NOT MY ASK, BUT I DO
- 13 THINK IT'S FAIR, BECAUSE WE DO HEAR FROM CONSTITUENTS ABOUT
- 14 LIKE WHEN. AND SO, YOU KNOW, WHAT WOULD ALLOW YOU TO PROVIDE
- 15 GREATER CERTAINTY FOR THE SCHEDULE OF PATHWAY HOMES
- 16 RESOLUTIONS? IF WE COULD SAY TO PEOPLE, THIS AREA IS GOING TO
- 17 HAVE A RESOLUTION OR A CLEANUP THIS TIMEFRAME. PEOPLE, YOU
- 18 KNOW, WE COULD SET AN EXPECTATION AS OPPOSED TO SAYING IT'S
- 19 COMING, IT'S COMING, IT'S COMING. SO, WHAT WILL IT TAKE FOR
- 20 YOU TO BE ABLE TO HAVE GREATER RELIABILITY ON THE SCHEDULING?
- 21 WE HAVE SET UP THE PATHWAY HOME MODEL WITH THE IDEA THAT WE
- 22 WILL, ONCE WE SECURE THE INTERIM HOUSING SITE, SO THE MOTEL
- 23 AND THE NONPROFIT HOMELESS SERVICE PROVIDER, THAT THEY WILL BE
- 24 ABLE TO OPERATE THAT SITE FOR POTENTIALLY, IT VARIES BY
- 25 AGREEMENT, BUT IT COULD BE UP TO A COUPLE OF YEARS, AND THAT



- 1 WE WOULD USE THAT SITE OVER A PERIOD OF TIME FOR MULTIPLE
- 2 ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTIONS, WITH ALWAYS A COMMITMENT TO THAT LOCAL
- 3 CITY THAT WE WILL BE SUPPORTING THEM, NOT ONLY WITH
- 4 ENCAMPMENTS IN THEIR CITY, BUT AS NEW PEOPLE BECOME HOMELESS
- 5 IN THAT CITY TO HELP MAKE SURE THAT THAT CITY IS BEING SERVED
- 6 BY THE PATHWAY HOME INTERIM HOUSING SITE IN THAT CITY. BUT AS
- 7 WE'VE HAD SUCCESS WITHIN THAT CITY, THEN TO SUPPORT THE
- 8 SURROUNDING COMMUNITIES AS WELL. WHAT THIS REQUIRES IS THE
- 9 ABILITY TO BE ABLE TO MOVE PEOPLE, HAVE THROUGHPUT AND MOVE
- 10 PEOPLE INTO PERMANENT HOUSING. SO, OUR ABILITY TO INCREASE THE
- 11 NUMBER OF ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTIONS IS TIED TO OUR ABILITY TO
- 12 MOVE PEOPLE INTO PERMANENT HOUSING. IF WE MOVE PEOPLE INTO
- 13 INTERIM HOUSING AND THEY STAY THERE, WE WILL USE ALL OF OUR
- 14 CAPACITY AND WE WILL NOT BE ABLE TO BRING MORE PEOPLE INSIDE.
- 15 SO, WE ARE DOING A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT INNOVATIVE THINGS AS
- 16 WELL AS THINGS THAT WE KNOW ALREADY WORK TO MOVE PEOPLE INTO
- 17 PERMANENT HOUSING BUT WHAT WE REALLY NEED TO DO IS ALSO
- 18 CONCURRENTLY AND AT A VERY HIGH SCALE BRING NEW LANDLORDS INTO
- 19 THE PROGRAM. WE NEED TO DO AND WE'RE DOING LOTS OF MESSAGING.
- 20 I DON'T WANT TO IMPLY THAT WE'RE NOT. LOTS OF OUTREACH, LOTS
- 21 OF MESSAGING. WE KNOW THAT THERE ARE UNITS OUT THERE THAT
- 22 COULD STILL BE AVAILABLE TO BRING PEOPLE INSIDE AND WE JUST
- 23 NEED TO BRING MORE LANDLORDS IN THE PROGRAM AND WE NEED TO
- 24 CONTINUE TO ELEVATE THAT IN EVERY POSSIBLE FORUM. AND WORK
- 25 WITH OUR CITY PARTNERS AS WELL TO GET THAT MESSAGE TO THEIR



- 1 PROPERTY OWNER COMMUNITIES AS WELL, THAT THAT IS ESSENTIAL TO
- 2 BEING ABLE TO HAVE A SCALE, A VERY HIGH SCALE IMPACT ON
- 3 ENCAMPMENT RESOLUTION. SO I THINK THAT, AND OF COURSE, THE
- 4 CONTINUED DEVELOPMENT OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING. WE KNOW THE RATE
- 5 AT WHICH PEOPLE ARE FALLING INTO HOMELESSNESS AND OUR ABILITY
- 6 TO BRING THEM OUT OF HOMELESSNESS IS TIED TO THE AVAILABILITY
- 7 OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING, WHICH IS NOT ONLY TAPPING THE CURRENT
- 8 RENTAL MARKET, BUT WE NEED TO SCALE AND DEVELOP NEW HOUSING AS
- 9 WELL.

- 11 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I APPRECIATE THAT. I THINK THE TIMING
- 12 ISSUE IS REALLY IMPORTANT. OUR CONSTITUENTS NEED TO
- 13 UNDERSTAND, A MOTION PASSES ON TUESDAY DOESN'T MEAN THAT WE'RE
- 14 GONNA SOLVE FOR THE PROBLEM BY FRIDAY. I THINK VOTERS NEED TO
- 15 UNDERSTAND IF THEY, YOU KNOW, THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF
- 16 MEASURE H AND HHH AND I HOPE OF MEASURE A. AND THERE'S GONNA
- 17 BE ONGOING RESOURCES AND SUPPORT TO SOLVE FOR A SYSTEMIC
- 18 CRISIS THAT DIDN'T HAPPEN OVERNIGHT. THIS WAS DECADES IN THE
- 19 MAKING, COMPLICATED BY A NUMBER OF FACTORS. EVERYTHING FROM
- 20 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER TO HOUSING COSTS, SHEER HOUSING COSTS,
- 21 AND IT'S GOING TO TAKE US A MINUTE TO BUILD OUR WAY OUT OF IT.
- 22 LAST QUESTION, TO COUNTY COUNSEL WE'VE TALKED A LOT ABOUT THE
- 23 DUMPING OR PUSHING AND WE SAW EVIDENCE OF THAT YOU KNOW ON
- 24 VIDEO WHERE ONE MUNICIPALITY YOU KNOW LITERALLY DROPPED OFF AN
- 25 UNHOUSED PERSON IN ANOTHER MUNICIPALITY. I'M SURE IT'S



- 1 HAPPENING IN ALL OF OUR DISTRICTS. AND MY CONCERN IS
- 2 UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES. AND SO, WE'RE TALKING ABOUT CITIES
- 3 HAVING CONCERN. WELL, WE HAVE TO STEP UP WHEN IT'S
- 4 UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES AND MAKING SURE THAT BECAUSE OF THE
- 5 STANCE AND THE POSITION THE COUNTY HAS TAKEN, CITIES WHO ARE
- 6 AFRAID DON'T HAVE BEDS, DON'T HAVE RESOURCES, DUMP INTO
- 7 UNINCORPORATED. SO, IF YOU COULD TALK TO US A LITTLE BIT ABOUT
- 8 WHAT TOOLS DO ANY OF OUR JURISDICTIONS HAVE IF WE HAVE THE

- 12 DAWYN R. HARRISON: I'LL TAKE THAT REAL OUICK BECAUSE I'LL JUST
- 13 REITERATE OR EXPAND A LITTLE BIT UPON WHAT ANA LAI INDICATED
- 14 EARLIER WITH REGARDS TO TOOLS THAT JURISDICTIONS HAVE. THE
- 15 BEST TOOL WOULD BE FOR JURISDICTIONS TO EXPLORE AS IT SOUNDS
- 16 LIKE FROM WHAT I'VE HEARD THEY ARE DOING INTERGOVERNMENTAL
- 17 AGREEMENTS AS POTENTIAL SOLUTIONS. I'VE HEARD FOLKS MENTION
- 18 THE GOOD NEIGHBOR PLEDGE. THAT WOULD CLEARLY BE--

- 20 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: HOW DOES THAT HELP US OR RESIDENTS IN
- 21 UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES? THAT'S GREAT, AND I APPLAUD THEM,
- 22 BUT HOW.. SO HOW DO WE THEN GET THE SAME PLEDGE IN SUPPORT OF
- 23 OUR UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES?

- 1 AS IT SOUNDS LIKE I'M HEARING WHAT THE SHERIFF INDICATED IN

- 3 THOSE CALLS WITH THE VARIOUS CITIES. I MEAN, WE NEED TO DO

- 14 ROBERT LUNA: YES, JUST TO ADD TO THAT, IN THE MEETINGS THAT
- 15 WE'VE HAD IN THE LAST WEEK WHICH DO INCLUDE THE INDEPENDENT
- 16 L.A. COUNTY CHIEFS BECAUSE WE'VE ALL SEEN THOSE VIDEOS AND
- 17 MORE TIMES THAN NOT IT INVOLVES THE POLICE. WE HAVE A
- 18 GENTLEMAN AND LADIES AGREEMENT WITHIN ALL THE CHIEFS THAT WE
- 19 WILL NOT DO THAT TO EACH OTHER. WE'LL CONTINUE THOSE
- 20 CONVERSATIONS. A LOT OF THAT IS TYPICALLY THE PRESSURE FROM

- 1 I FEEL GOOD ABOUT WHERE WE'RE AT, BUT THE WORK DEFINITELY
- 2 NEEDS TO CONTINUE.

- 4 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I APPRECIATE THAT. AND I ASK THE
- 5 QUESTION BECAUSE IN THE SECOND DISTRICT, WE, YOU KNOW, OF THE
- 6 7,000 RV'S THAT ARE UNHOUSED, FAMILY, FRIENDS, AND NEIGHBORS
- 7 ARE USING TO LIVE IN, 2,000 OF THEM ARE IN THE SECOND
- 8 DISTRICT. AND IN AREAS THAT NEIGHBOR MUNICIPALITIES WHOSE
- 9 PARKING POLICIES CREATED THE ZERO SUM GAME THAT LED PEOPLE TO
- 10 MOVING INTO UNINCORPORATED. SO, THEY DIDN'T HELP US SOLVE FOR
- 11 THE PROBLEM, THEY PUSHED THE PROBLEM INTO UNINCORPORATED. SO
- 12 THAT'S WHY I'M CONTINUING TO RAISE IT. AND GLAD, SHERIFF, THAT
- 13 YOU CONVENED THAT TABLE AND THAT YOU ARE THE ARBITER AND
- 14 PROTECTOR OF UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES. SO, THE CITIES DON'T
- 15 THINK IT'S JUST CITY TO CITY, BUT IT'S UNINCORPORATED L.A.
- 16 COUNTY. THAT'S A PART OF THAT CONVERSATION TOO. AND SO, THANK
- 17 YOU TO SUPERVISOR HAHN FOR AGENDIZING THIS TODAY, BECAUSE IT'S
- 18 NOT ONLY IMPORTANT FOR US TO HEAR, BUT FOR THE PUBLIC TO HEAR
- 19 IT. I THINK EVERYONE HEARS THE TERM EXECUTIVE ORDER, AND THEY
- 20 MAKE ASSUMPTIONS. AND WE'VE HEARD LOUD AND CLEAR THE EXECUTIVE
- 21 ORDER RELATED TO STATE PROPERTIES. NOW IT DOES HAVE PERHAPS
- 22 INTENDED OR UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES ON MUNICIPALITIES AND THE

- 2 SO, I THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR CONTINUED COLLABORATIVE
- 3 WORK, FOR THE PUBLIC TO BE ABLE TO HEAR FIRSTHAND WHAT IS
- 4 HAPPENING RIGHT NOW EVERY DAY, WHAT HAS HAPPENED SINCE 2011, I
- 5 THINK YOU SAID, SINCE THE HOST COMMITTEE WAS CREATED, AND THAT
- 6 WE WILL CONTINUE TO DO THIS HARD WORK EVERY DAY. THANK YOU,
- 7 MADAM CHAIR.

- 6 EXPRESSES HER DEEP APPRECIATION FOR THE STRONG PARTNERSHIP AND
- 7 SHE KEENLY REMEMBERS ATTENDING THE BOARD MEETING SHORTLY AFTER
- 8 SHE WAS SWORN IN IN 2022 AND ALSO OF COURSE PARTICIPATING IN A
- 9 JOINT PRESS CONFERENCE THAT BEGAN OUR COLLABORATIVE
- 10 RELATIONSHIP TO ADDRESS THIS HUMANITARIAN CRISIS THAT WE FACE

- 4 POPULATIONS TO SEEK RELIEF FROM THE HEAT WHICH CAN, AS WE ALL
- 5 KNOW, HAVE A SERIOUS AND DANGEROUS IMPACT ON THEIR HEALTH. AND
- 6 SECONDLY, THE GRANTS PASSED SUPREME COURT DECISION, WHICH WAS

- 9 WHO ARE AT INCREASED RISK OF HOMELESSNESS AFTER EXPOSURE TO
- 10 THE JUVENILE DETENTION CENTERS THAT BOTH THE COUNTY AND LUSD
- 11 PERPETUATE, SO THIS IS ON TOPIC. THE CORE BELIEFS OF LASD
- 12 STATE, WE BELIEVE WE MUST UNAPOLOGETICALLY CALL OUT AND CLOSE
- 13 PERSISTENT OPPORTUNITY GAPS THAT DISPROPORTIONATELY IMPACT
- 14 BLACK, LATINX, FOSTER AND UNHOUSED COMMUNITIES. YET IT'S
- 15 STUDENTS IN THESE EXACT GROUPS THAT ARE PRIMED BY THE SCHOOL

- 14 RESPONSE TRAINING AS SOON AS THEY GET OUT OF THE ACADEMY. AND
- 15 THEN WE HAVE ADDITIONAL CRISIS RESPONSE TRAINING THAT IS
- 16 COVERED THROUGHOUT THE YEARS. THEY DO HAVE REFRESHER TRAINING
- 17 THAT THEY NEED TO ACCOMPLISH. WE ALSO WORK VERY CLOSELY WITH
- 18 OUR PARTNERS AT CHS, AND WE CONDUCT DRILLS TOGETHER, AND WE
- 19 HAVE A BIANNUAL SUICIDE PREVENTION TRAINING THAT WE, ALL OF
- 20 OUR EXECUTIVES, ATTEND TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL TRAINING TO STAFF

- 23 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: I THINK IT WAS BROUGHT TO OUR
- 24 ATTENTION IN THIS REPORT THAT THERE WAS SOME ERRATIC BEHAVIOR
- 25 THAT WAS NOT ADDRESSED IN TERMS OF A MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS. SO,



- 1 I JUST WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE CONTINUING TO PROVIDE THAT
- 2 TRAINING AND THAT PEOPLE UNDERSTAND WHAT THEIR
- 3 RESPONSIBILITIES ARE. AND TO THAT END, WHAT HAPPENS IF A
- 4 DEPUTY FAILS TO RESPOND APPROPRIATELY TO AN INMATE IN NEED?

- 6 PAULA TOKAR: IF THE ALLEGATIONS PROVE TO BE TRUE, WE
- 7 INVESTIGATE EVERY ALLEGATION THAT A DEPUTY DOES NOT RESPOND
- 8 APPROPRIATELY TO THOSE ACTIONS. AND IN THIS PARTICULAR CASE,
- 9 WE'VE OPENED AN INTERNAL AFFAIRS INVESTIGATION INTO ALL OF THE
- 10 ALLEGATIONS OF MISCONDUCT BY THE STAFF. SO, WE HOLD THEM
- 11 ACCOUNTABLE IF THE ALLEGATIONS ARE TRUE, BUT WE ARE ALWAYS
- 12 PROACTIVE WHEN WE HEAR OF SOMETHING LIKE THIS, WE ALSO PROVIDE
- 13 ON THE SPOT TRAINING, THINKING THAT IT MIGHT BE A SYSTEMATIC
- 14 ISSUE TO MAKE SURE EVERYONE'S ON BOARD. WE DO THAT IN A NUMBER
- 15 OF WAYS. SHIFT BRIEFINGS, WE PUSH OUT EMAILS, AND WE CONDUCT

- 21 PAULA TOKAR: IT DEPENDS ON WHAT IS FOUNDED IN THE
- 22 INVESTIGATION. EACH CASE IS VERY DIFFERENT, AND IT JUST
- 23 DEPENDS ON THE SEVERITY OF THE INFRACTION AND THE PAST HISTORY
- 24 OF THE EMPLOYEE.



- 1 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: SO, SHOULD THIS CASE BE FOUNDED,
- 2 WHAT WOULD AN EXAMPLE OF ACCOUNTABILITY LOOK LIKE?
- 3 PAULA TOKAR: THE ALLEGED MISCONDUCT FALLS UNDER A MANUAL
- 4 POLICY AND PROCEDURES SECTION, WHICH IS PERFORMANCE TO
- 5 STANDARD. THE DISCIPLINE RANGE FOR THAT VIOLATION IS ANYWHERE
- 6 FROM WRITTEN REPRIMAND TO DISCHARGE. AND WHERE THE DISCIPLINE
- 7 WILL FALL AT THE END OF THIS CASE DEPENDS ON WHAT THE
- 8 INVESTIGATION SHOWS.

- 10 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: OKAY. HAS THE DEPARTMENT MADE ANY
- 11 SYSTEM-WIDE CHANGES TO PREVENT DEPUTIES FROM WATCHING NON-
- 12 WORK-RELATED VIDEOS DURING SHIFTS? AND AGAIN, IF THE
- 13 ALLEGATIONS REPORTED ARE TRUE, WHAT RANGE OF DISCIPLINE COULD
- 14 A DEPUTY RECEIVE?

- 16 PAULA TOKAR: SO IMMEDIATELY UPON, FOR THIS SPECIFIC INCIDENT,
- 17 IMMEDIATELY UPON HEARING THE ALLEGATION, THE VIDEO MONITOR
- 18 THAT WAS USED WAS TAKEN DOWN AND REMOVED. WE'VE ALSO PUSHED
- 19 OUT TRAINING AND CONDUCTED BRIEFINGS FOR ALL STAFF AT ALL
- 20 FACILITIES DISCUSSING THE FACT THAT NON-WORK RELATED VIDEOS
- 21 ARE NOT APPROPRIATE AND WILL NOT BE TOLERATED TO BE WATCHED
- 22 DURING SHIFT TO HOURS. AND THEN AGAIN, THE CONDUCT FALLS
- 23 WITHIN PERFORMANCE TO STANDARDS, SO DEPENDING ON WHAT THE
- 24 INVESTIGATION SHOWS, IT CAN BE ANYWHERE FROM WRITTEN REPRIMAND
- 25 TO DISCHARGE.



- 2 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND HOW LONG TYPICALLY DOES ONE
- 3 OF THOSE INVESTIGATIONS TAKE?

- 5 PAULA TOKAR: STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS ON THOSE CASES UNDER POBAR
- 6 IS ONE YEAR, SO IT'LL BE LESS THAN ONE YEAR.

- 8 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND DO YOU HAVE AN IDEA OF ON
- 9 AVERAGE HOW LONG THEY TAKE?

10

- 11 PAULA TOKAR: OUR INTERNAL AFFAIRS BUREAU IS FACING THE SAME
- 12 STAFFING SHORTAGES AS THE REST OF THE DEPARTMENT.

13

- 14 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: SO LIKELY ARE CLOSE TO A YEAR
- 15 NOW?

16

- 17 PAULA TOKAR: IT COULD BE. THIS CASE HAS RECEIVED A LOT OF
- 18 ATTENTION AND WE ARE ASKING FOR REGULAR UPDATES, BUT IT'S
- 19 STILL, THEY HAVE A LOT OF WORK TO DO AND WE WANT THE
- 20 INVESTIGATION TO BE COMPLETE.

- 22 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: OKAY. AND ONE OF THE ADDITIONAL
- 23 ALLEGATIONS AND INCLUDED INDICATIONS OF POLITICAL STICKERS OR
- 24 SYMBOLS. WHAT IS THE POLICY REGARDING PROMOTING OR DISPLAYING
- 25 THOSE KINDS OF SYMBOLS AT THE WORK SITE AND HOW ARE YOU



1 COMMUNICATING THOSE POLICIES?

- 3 PAULA TOKAR: THE POLICY RELATED TO POLITICAL SPEECH AND
- 4 STANCES WAS DISSEMINATED TO ALL PERSONNEL. WE ALSO
- 5 PERIODICALLY CONDUCT INSPECTIONS OF ALL WORK AREAS TO MAKE
- 6 SURE THAT THERE ISN'T ANYTHING APPROPRIATE IN THOSE AREAS.
- 7 FOLLOWING THIS INCIDENT, WE DID NOT FIND THE SPECIFIC
- 8 POLITICAL RHETORIC THAT WAS ALLEGED. THERE WERE SOME
- 9 OUESTIONABLE PATRIOTIC TYPE FLAGS THAT WERE REMOVED AND THAT
- 10 WORK AREA HAS BEEN CLEANED AND PARED DOWN AND WE HAVE
- 11 REITERATED TO STAFF AND SUPERVISORS THAT IT IS NOT
- 12 APPROPRIATE.

- 14 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND HOW DO YOU COMMUNICATE WITH A
- 15 BODY LIKE THE CIVIL BRAND COMMISSION WHO RAISE THESE CONCERNS,
- 16 HOW DO YOU COMMUNICATE WITH THAT OVERSIGHT BODY? BECAUSE IT'S
- 17 SORT OF A ROUNDABOUT WAY FOR US TO HAVE THIS CONVERSATION IN
- 18 ORDER FOR THERE TO BE ANSWERS TO SOME OF THEIR INQUIRY. SO HOW
- 19 ARE YOU ENGAGING WITH THEM, OR ARE YOU?

- 21 PAULA TOKAR: WE ARE, AND WE'VE ASKED THEM SPECIFICALLY
- 22 ANYTHING THAT THEY SEE WHEN THEY'RE DOING THEIR WALKS, THEY
- 23 SHOULD RAISE IMMEDIATELY TO THE WATCH COMMANDER WHO'S AT THE
- 24 FACILITY BECAUSE WE DON'T WANT TO WAIT EVEN 24 HOURS TO
- 25 ADDRESS THOSE ISSUES. AND IN THIS INSTANCE, AFTER THEIR MAY



- 1 10TH INSPECTION, THEY DID CONTACT THE WATCH COMMANDER AND HE
- 2 DID TAKE CERTAIN STEPS INCLUDING THE REMOVAL OF THAT VIDEO
- 3 MONITOR. AND THEN WE'VE ASKED THE CIVIL BRAND COMMISSIONER TO
- 4 FOLLOW UP WITH THE FACILITY CAPTAINS TO ADDITIONALLY FOLLOW
- 5 UP, SEE WHAT THE WATCH COMMANDER DID AND TO EXPRESS ANY
- 6 ADDITIONAL CONCERNS TO THE CAPTAINS OF EACH FACILITY. AND IT'S
- 7 MY UNDERSTANDING THAT THOSE ARE TAKING PLACE. I PERSONALLY HAD
- 8 ONE CONVERSATION SINCE THIS REPORT HAS BEEN ISSUED WITH THE
- 9 CIVIL BRAND COMMISSION AND I'M OPEN TO FURTHER DISCUSSIONS
- 10 WITH THEM.

- 12 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: OKAY. AND GIVEN WHAT YOU'VE
- 13 DESCRIBED AS SORT OF THE RESPONSE TO WHAT HAS BEEN ALLEGED IN
- 14 THESE REPORTS DO YOU THINK THAT THE RESPONSE IS ACTUALLY
- 15 DISCOURAGING THIS BEHAVIOR GOING FORWARD? BECAUSE WHAT IT
- 16 SOUNDS LIKE TO ME IS THERE'S AN ONGOING INVESTIGATION THAT
- 17 WILL LIKELY TAKE A YEAR BASED ON YOUR STAFFING AVAILABILITY.
- 18 AND IN THE MEANTIME, I'M JUST TRYING TO UNDERSTAND WHETHER YOU
- 19 FEEL THAT THAT'S AN EFFECTIVE CONSEQUENCE TO BEHAVIOR THAT'S
- 20 ALLEGED.

- 22 PAULA TOKAR: WELL, IT'S A NECESSARY STEP. THE INVESTIGATION
- 23 ABSOLUTELY IS. AS FAR AS THE CONSEQUENCE, I DON'T KNOW WHAT
- 24 THAT WILL BE BECAUSE WE DON'T KNOW WHAT THE INVESTIGATION WILL
- 25 SHOW. I MEAN, OBVIOUSLY, IF TRUE, I MEAN, I'M VERY CONCERNED



- 1 ABOUT THE ALLEGATIONS AND IF TRUE, WE WILL TAKE IT TO THE
- 2 APPROPRIATE LEVEL OF DISCIPLINE. HOWEVER, I HAVE EXPRESSED MY
- 3 CONCERNS TO THE SUPERVISORS. I JUST SPOKE TO A NEW GROUP OF
- 4 SERGEANTS YESTERDAY TO REITERATE OUR EXPECTATIONS AND TO
- 5 REITERATE THE NEED FOR INSPECTIONS BECAUSE WE ALL AS
- 6 SUPERVISORS GO INTO THESE WORK AREAS AND WE NEED TO ADDRESS
- 7 THEM APPROPRIATE AND RIGHT AWAY. EXPECTATIONS HAVE BEEN
- 8 EXPRESSED ACROSS THE BOARD TO ALL LEVELS WITHIN THE
- 9 DEPARTMENT.

- 11 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU. AND I KNOW THAT THERE
- 12 ARE CHALLENGES BEYOND THE STAFFING PIECE. I KNOW THE FACILITY
- 13 ITSELF IS A CHALLENGE. AND SO, I WANTED TO DIRECT A COUPLE OF
- 14 QUESTIONS TO OUR CEO BEFORE I TURN TO MY COLLEAGUES. CAN YOU
- 15 GIVE US A STATUS UPDATE ON THE JAIL CLOSURE IMPLEMENTATION
- 16 TEAM SINCE IT'S BEEN TRANSFERRED TO YOUR OFFICE?

- 18 FESIA DAVENPORT: YES, THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR. SO, PER THE
- 19 MOTION DIRECTIVE, JSIT WAS TRANSFERRED TO THE CEO'S OFFICE
- 20 WITH THE BOARD'S ADOPTION OF THE BUDGET IN JUNE. THAT TRANSFER
- 21 IS PRETTY MUCH A BUDGETARY TRANSFER, SO WE'VE TRANSFERRED
- 22 POSITIONS AND FUNDING. NO STAFF WERE TRANSFERRED WITH THAT
- 23 TRANSITION BECAUSE THERE WAS NO SINGLE EMPLOYEE WORKING IN
- 24 JCOD AT THAT TIME WORKING FULL-TIME ON THE JAIL CLOSURE
- 25 ISSUES. SO, WHERE WE ARE NOW IS WE ARE STAFFING UP. WE HAVE



- 1 IDENTIFIED SOME FOLKS THAT WE HAVE INTERVIEWED AND WE ARE
- 2 INTERESTED IN BRINGING OVER. WE EXPECT TO HAVE 3 OF OUR
- 3 POSITIONS FILLED PROBABLY WITHIN THE NEXT 3 WEEKS OR SO, AND
- 4 THE LEADERSHIP POSITION. WE ARE UNDERGOING A SOFT SEARCH FOR
- 5 WHO THAT PERSON MIGHT BE TO FILL THE LEADERSHIP ROLE. THE IDEA
- 6 HERE IS WE HAVE THE STAFF ANALYST POSITIONS AND WE CAN FILL
- 7 THOSE AND THOSE FOLKS WOULD BE THE ONES THAT WOULD DO A LOT OF
- 8 THE HANDS-ON WORK IN TERMS OF REVIEWING WHAT HAS ALREADY BEEN
- 9 DONE, PUTTING TOGETHER, YOU KNOW, AN ARCHITECTURE OF A PLAN SO
- 10 THAT WE DON'T HAVE TO START FROM SCRATCH. AND WE HAVE A REPORT
- 11 BACK DUE TO THIS BOARD, I THINK ON OCTOBER 1ST.

- 13 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: OKAY, THANK YOU FOR THAT. I
- 14 APPRECIATE YOU TAKING THIS OVER. IT'S CONCERNING, TO SAY THE
- 15 LEAST, TO HEAR THAT THERE WERE NO ACTUAL STAFF WHO WERE
- 16 TRANSFERRED. YOU KNOW, IT LEADS US ALL TO BELIEVE, I THINK,
- 17 SAFELY THAT THERE WASN'T ANYONE WHO WAS DEDICATED TO THE
- 18 ACTUAL PROJECT OF JAIL CLOSURE IMPLEMENTATION. AND I THINK
- 19 THAT'S THE CONCERN THAT LED TO US TRANSFERRING IT BACK TO YOUR
- 20 OFFICE. SO, I'M GLAD TO HEAR THAT YOU ARE STAFFING UP, THAT
- 21 YOU'RE USING THAT BUDGET TO ACTUALLY HIRE PEOPLE INTO THAT
- 22 WORK BECAUSE THAT IS THE EXPECTATION OF THIS BOARD. AND TO
- 23 YOUR KNOWLEDGE, HAS THE COUNTY COMPILED ANY REPORTS THAT
- 24 SPECIFICALLY DESCRIBE FUNDING PRIORITIES ACCORDING TO WHICH
- 25 WILL HAVE THE MOST IMPACT ON JAIL POPULATION?



- 2 FESIA DAVENPORT: SUPERVISOR, I WOULD ANSWER THAT QUESTION THIS
- 3 WAY. WE ACTUALLY USED, THERE ARE A PLETHORA OF REPORTS AND
- 4 REPORT BACKS RELATED TO JAIL CLOSURE. WHAT WE DIDN'T WANT TO
- 5 DO IS HAVE STAFF SPEND MONTHS REVIEWING ALL OF THEM, SO WE HAD
- 6 AI SUMMARIZE OVER ABOUT 60 REPORTS. ONE OF THE FIRST THINGS
- 7 THAT WE PLAN TO DO IS HAVE THE ANALYSTS WHO WILL COME ON BOARD
- 8 FIRST IS TO GO THROUGH THOSE REPORTS. WE WILL ALSO WORK WITH
- 9 JCOD AND OTHERS WHO HAVE BEEN INVOLVED IN THIS WORK TO FIGURE
- 10 OUT WHICH REPORTS MIGHT BE MOST IMPACTFUL. THE PLAN GOING
- 11 FORWARD IS NOT TO RECREATE THE WILL. WE KNOW THERE'S BEEN A
- 12 LOT OF WORK DONE IN THIS SPACE ALREADY. SO, I CAN'T IDENTIFY
- 13 THAT SPECIFIC REPORT TODAY, BUT I BELIEVE THAT IT EXISTS.

- 15 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND I CAN APPRECIATE THAT YOU'RE
- 16 GETTING A LOT OF REPORT BACK REQUESTS. I THINK OFTENTIMES WHEN
- 17 THIS BOARD IS TRYING TO RE-UP A PRIORITY ISSUE THAT HASN'T
- 18 BEEN DISCUSSED IN A WHILE THAT WE'RE WAITING ON IMPLEMENTATION
- 19 OR EVIDENCE OF PROGRESS, A REPORT BACK REQUEST WILL HAPPEN AND
- 20 THEN YOU'LL GET ANOTHER ONE AND ANOTHER ONE. AND THAT IS
- 21 OFTENTIMES NOT HELPFUL TO ACTUALLY GETTING THE WORK DONE. AND
- 22 YET WE ARE EXPECTED TO CONTINUE TO PUSH YOU ALL IN TERMS OF
- 23 IMPLEMENTATION. AND THAT'S SORT OF THE DYNAMIC OF HOW THIS
- 24 STRUCTURE WORKS. SO, I'M NOT ASKING NECESSARILY FOR MILLIONS
- 25 OF REPORT BACKS. I THINK WHAT WE'RE LOOKING FOR IS PROGRESS ON

- 3 FESIA DAVENPORT: AND I APPRECIATE THAT. I THINK ONE OF THE
- 4 THINGS THAT'S GONNA BE REALLY IMPORTANT, WE DO NOT WANNA SPEND
- 5 ALL OF OUR PRECIOUS TIME WRITING VERY LENGTHY REPORTS. SO
- 6 WHAT'S GONNA BE KEY IS AS THESE FOLKS COME ON, WE WANT TO
- 7 DEVELOP A REPORT BACK TEMPLATE WHERE WE ARE REPORTING TO THE
- 8 BOARD ON THE SAME, I DON'T KNOW WHAT THE NUMBER IS, 10, 15, ON
- 9 THE SAME ITEMS SO THAT WHEN YOU DO SEE THE REPORT BACK, WE'RE
- 10 ACTUALLY HIGHLIGHTING WHAT'S BETTER, DIFFERENT, OR WHERE THERE
- 11 HASN'T BEEN ANY CHANGES. THAT'S DIFFERENT THAN WRITING LIKE A
- 12 20-PAGE SUMMARY THAT VERY FEW PEOPLE HAVE TIME TO READ. SO, WE
- 13 WANT TO BE MINDFUL WHEN WE DO DO OUR REPORT BACKS THAT THEY
- 14 ARE EASILY ACCESSIBLE ON WHAT'S DIFFERENT AND WHAT'S BETTER
- 15 AND WHAT IS CHANGING.

- 17 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. SUPERVISOR
- 18 BARGER, I'LL TURN IT TO YOU.

- 20 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THANK YOU. AND I APPRECIATE THOSE
- 21 QUESTIONS, CHAIR HORVATH, BECAUSE AT THE END OF THE DAY, I
- 22 THINK, YOU KNOW, I TALKED TO SOMEONE WHO WAS RECRUITED TO COME
- 23 OVER AND THEY DON'T WANT TO GO OVER BECAUSE THE ATTITUDE IS
- 24 FOR WHY. BECAUSE EVERY TIME A REPORT IS PROVIDED TO THIS
- 25 BOARD, THEY EITHER GET BEAT UP AND OR IT GETS BURIED. AND SO I

- 6 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: AND HOW MUCH HAVE WE SPENT ANALYZING?
- 7 GUESSING IT.

9 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, WE USED AI TO DO THE SUMMARY FOR US.

- 11 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: NO, BUT I MEAN IN TERMS OF CONSULTANTS
- 12 THAT WE BROUGHT ON.

13

- 14 FESIA DAVENPORT: WE'VE SPENT HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS ON
- 15 CONSULTANTS.

16

- 17 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: SO, I CAN'T WAIT FOR THE NEXT REPORT,
- 18 WHICH LEADS ME TO A QUESTION THAT I JUST WANT TO UNDERSTAND
- 19 BECAUSE I'M PRETTY MUCH ABOUT JUST BASIC COMMON SENSE. AND SO,
- 20 MY QUESTION IS TO YOU, ASSISTANT SHERIFF, IS IT TOKAR? MOST OF
- 21 THE MOH INMATES ARE HOUSED AT PDC NORTH, AND WE HAVE SOME MOH
- 22 REMAINING AT MCJ. BUT WHO ARE THE REST OF THE INMATES WHO ARE
- 23 HOUSED AT MCJ? AND THEN CAN YOU DEFINE WHAT AN MOH IS FOR
- 24 PEOPLE THAT MAY NOT KNOW?



- 1 PAULA TOKAR: SO MOH IS THE CODE THAT THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT
- 2 USES FOR A LEVEL OF CARE. WE BASE IT ON HOUSING. AND IT'S
- 3 MODERATE OBSERVATION HOUSING IS WHAT MOH STANDS FOR. AND YES,
- 4 WE STILL HAVE ABOUT 650 MOH INDIVIDUALS AT MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL.
- 5 IN ADDITION TO THAT, MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL HOUSES ARE PRO-
- 6 POPULATION, OUR ADMINISTRATIVE SEGREGATION POPULATION THAT ARE
- 7 HIGHLY DANGEROUS OR DANGER TO OTHERS OR THEMSELVES THAT DON'T
- 8 NECESSARILY HAVE A MENTAL HEALTH COMPONENT TO THEM. WE HOUSE
- 9 SEXUALLY VIOLENT PREDATORS THERE. OUR SEX CRIMES AGAINST
- 10 CHILDREN ARE HOUSED THERE AND SEGREGATED. OUR LGBTQ PLUS MALE
- 11 COMMUNITY IN THE JAIL IS HOUSED AT MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL. AND
- 12 THEN IN TRIAL FOLKS, SO PEOPLE THAT ARE FACING LONG TRIALS AT
- 13 CCB OR ONE OF THE DOWNTOWN FACILITIES ARE HOUSED THERE,
- 14 AMONGST MANY OTHERS.

- 16 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: SO, KNOWING THAT, WHAT PERCENTAGE OF
- 17 THOSE HOUSED AT MCJ WOULD YOU ESTIMATE CAN BE DIVERTED?

- 19 PAULA TOKAR: THAT'S NOT A OUESTION THAT IS EASY FOR ME TO
- 20 ANSWER BECAUSE WE LOOK AT THE STATS AND THE ARREST CHARGE THAT
- 21 IS IN THE CUSTODY AND IT'S BASED UPON OUR ANTIQUATED JAIL
- 22 MANAGEMENT SYSTEM. FROM WHAT I CAN COBBLE TOGETHER, AND PLEASE
- 23 TAKE THIS AS A, JUST A GENERALIZATION WITHOUT GOING INTO
- 24 INDIVIDUAL RECORDS SO I KNOW, WE HAVE ABOUT 17% OF THE
- 25 POPULATION OF MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL IS IN FOR WHAT I CLASSIFY AS



- 1 A NON-VIOLENT FELONY. THOSE FOLKS, I MEAN, IT COULD BE AUTO
- 2 THEFT, IT COULD BE EMBEZZLEMENT, IT COULD BE SOMETHING ELSE.
- 3 WHAT I DON'T KNOW, THAT'S THE CHARGE THAT ORIGINALLY PULLS UP
- 4 WHEN WE JUST RUN A FULL RUN OF THE POPULATION, BUT THERE MAY
- 5 BE MORE SERIOUS CHARGES ALONG WITH THAT NON-VIOLENT FELONY OR
- 6 THERE MAY BE LESS, YOU KNOW, THAT --

- 8 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: I GUESS I'M GETTING AT THE POINT THAT I
- 9 THOUGHT THAT WE WERE AND I KNOW THE SHERIFF'S BEHIND YOU THAT
- 10 WE WERE LOOKING AT DIVERSION FOR THOSE THAT DIDN'T NEED TO BE
- 11 HELD IN CUSTODY HERE AND NOW. AND SO, I WOULD THINK THAT IF
- 12 THERE'S 17% THAT CAN BE DIVERTED, MY QUESTION WOULD BE WHY ARE
- 13 THEY NOT BEING DIVERTED?

14

15 PAULA TOKAR: AND I'M NOT SAYING THAT THEY CAN BE DIVERTED.

- 17 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: AND I'M NOT QUOTING YOU AT 17%, BUT I
- 18 GUESS WHAT I'M GETTING AT IS THE PUSH OUT ON THE DIVERSION
- 19 COMPONENT WILL BETTER GIVE US AN IDEA IN TERMS OF WHAT NO
- 20 REPLACEMENT FACILITY WOULD LOOK LIKE. AND I'M TOLD BY
- 21 PREDECESSORS PRIOR TO YOU THAT IF YOU LOOK AT THE POPULATIONS
- 22 IN THERE AND YOU LOOK AT THE FACT THAT WE ARE APPLYING
- 23 DIVERSION AS WE SPEAK, EVEN THOUGH MY NEXT QUESTION WAS GOING
- 24 TO BE TO SONGHAI ABOUT DO WE HAVE THE BEDS TO FILL RIGHT NOW?
- 25 AND IT GOES HAND IN HAND.



- 2 PAULA TOKAR: I GUESS MY BEST ANSWER TO THAT IS 75% OF THE
- 3 PEOPLE THAT ARE IN THE JAIL NOW, I BELIEVE, ARE IN FOR CRIMES
- 4 THAT ARE NOT EASILY DIVERTED. JUST LOOKING AT THE CRIMES,
- 5 THEY'RE SERIOUS, THEY'RE VIOLENT, THEY AREN'T, IN MY HEAD,
- 6 LIKE EASILY DIVERTIBLE. AND THE 17% OR WHATEVER THAT WE'RE
- 7 LOOKING AT OR THE FEW VERY FEW MISDEMEANORS WE HAVE THOSE
- 8 FOLKS CHURN SO THEY MAY BE IN THE PROCESS OF BEING DIVERTED
- 9 THEY NEED SOMEWHERE TO LAND WHILE THAT THEY'RE DIVERTED BY THE
- 10 COURT SO WHILE THAT PROCESS TAKES PLACE THEY'RE IN OUR CUSTODY
- 11 BUT YOU KNOW ABOUT 75% OF THEM ARE IN FOR MORE SERIOUS CRIMES.
- 12 SO, I'D SAY THAT'S WHY THE DIVERSION ISSUE ISN'T WORKING.

13

- 14 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: YEAH. AND THAT'S WHAT I'M GETTING AT. I
- 15 THINK THAT NUMBERS DON'T LIE. AND IF YOU LOOK AT, AND THE
- 16 COURTS DO PLAY AN IMPORTANT ROLE, WE HAVE TO TAKE THAT INTO
- 17 CONSIDERATION. IT'S NOT REALLY UP TO THIS BOARD AS IT RELATES
- 18 TO THE JUSTICE SYSTEM. IT'S UP TO THE COURTS DETERMINING THE
- 19 PLACEMENT, IS MY UNDERSTANDING CORRECT? I MEAN, THEY HAVE TO
- 20 SIGN UP ON DIVERSION. SONGHAI, IS THAT?

- 22 JUDGE SONGHAI ARMSTEAD (RET.): YES. SO, DIVERSIONS WOULD HAVE
- 23 TO BE APPROVED BY THE COURT. EACH COURT, EACH JUDGE IS AN
- 24 INDEPENDENT OFFICER, SO THERE'S NO ONE ELSE THAT REGULATES
- 25 THEM BUT THE COURT. THE OTHER COMPONENT OF THE 17% THAT THE



- 1 SHERIFF IS SPEAKING TO THAT THEY BELIEVE, THEY'RE LOOKING AT
- 2 JUST THE CHARGE. THERE MAY BE SOMETHING ELSE THAT'S HOLDING
- 3 THAT INDIVIDUAL, RIGHT? SO, THEY MAY HAVE A CHARGE IN ANOTHER
- 4 COUNTY, BUT THOSE PURPOSES, THEY CAN'T BE RELEASED. THEY MAY
- 5 HAVE A PROBATION VIOLATION AND THERE MAY BE A NO BAIL HOLD.
- 6 THAT MAY BE ANOTHER REASON WHY A PERSON CANNOT BE RELEASED.
- 7 THEY ALSO MAY NEED A SPECIAL PLACEMENT, RIGHT? AND SO, ONE OF
- 8 THE THINGS THAT WE TALKED ABOUT PREVIOUSLY IS THAT A PERSON,
- 9 PARTICULARLY IF THEY HAVE A SEVERE, WHO ARE FOLKS WITH A
- 10 HIGHER NEEDS, THEY'RE WHAT IS SORT OF SUITABLE FOR THEM

- 13 THEM ON BECAUSE OF THEIR CLINICAL NEEDS, THE COURT WON'T
- 14 RELEASE THEM TO THAT TYPE OF BED BECAUSE OF THE CHARGES THAT
- 15 ARE ASSOCIATED WITH THAT INDIVIDUAL. SO THAT'S ALSO A HUGE
- 16 PROBLEM THAT THERE IS NO ALIGNMENT AND THERE'S NO.. SO THAT
- 17 FUNDING WOULD HAVE TO BE BASICALLY GENERAL FUNDS TO PAY FOR A
- 18 BED IF THEY CAN'T BE PAID FOR THROUGH BASED ON WHAT THEIR
- 19 CLINICAL NEEDS ARE AND THAT'S ANOTHER HINDRANCE.

- 21 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: CAN I ASK ONE QUESTION ON THAT, JUST OUT
- 22 OF CURIOSITY AND THEN I WANT TO SHARE? IF WE DIDN'T HAVE, WE
- 23 TORE DOWN THE MEN'S CENTRAL AND WE DIDN'T REPLACE IT AND THE
- 24 COURTS DETERMINED THAT THE PERSON COULD NOT BE DIVERTED, WHAT
- 25 WOULD OUR CHOICE BE IF WE DON'T HAVE ANY SPACE TO PLACE THE



- I INMATES? I DON'T KNOW, WELL, YOU WERE A JUDGE, THAT'S WHY I
- 2 WAS LOOKING AT YOU. I MEAN, CAN THEY MANDATE THAT WE SEND TO
- 3 ANOTHER COUNTY? I MEAN, WHAT IS THE PROTOCOL? I MEAN, I DON'T
- 4 KNOW THAT IT'S EVER HAPPENED. SO, THERE HAVE BEEN JUDGES WHO

13 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: OK, I MEAN, IT'S A HYPOTHETICAL.

- 15 JUDGE SONGHAI ARMSTEAD (RET.): YEAH. SO, I KNOW THAT THERE
- 16 HAVE BEEN COURTS THAT HAVE MADE MANDATED ORDERS TO THE STATE
- 17 TO PUT THEM IN THE HOSPITAL, AND THE STATE HASN'T ACCEPTED
- 18 THEM. BUT MOST OF THOSE FOLKS HAVE BEEN PUSHED BACK TO US. TO

- 25 DEALING WITH ANOTHER ISSUE IN THE BACK. SO, I WANT TO EXPAND.



- 1 YOU ASKED A VERY GOOD QUESTION AND A QUESTION THAT KEEPS ON
- 2 COMING UP FOR US AS WE WORK WITH ALL OF OUR JUSTICE PARTNERS.
- 3 AND FIRST OF ALL, WHEN I LOOK AT PEOPLE IN OUR CUSTODY, I
- 4 REALLY CHALLENGE OUR STAFF TO LOOK AT SOMEBODY AS IF IT WAS
- 5 ONE OF THEIR FAMILY MEMBERS. AND I'VE HAD FAMILY MEMBERS IN
- 6 THE COUNTY JAIL. MAYBE THAT'S FROM PERSONAL EXPERIENCE OR JUST
- 7 THE HUMANISTIC SIDE OF ME. SO WHEN I LOOK AT THAT, WHEN I
- 8 FIRST TOOK OFFICE, I LOOKED AT THE EXISTING POPULATION, WHICH
- 9 WAS AT ABOUT 14.5. I'M HAPPY TO SAY THAT AS WE SIT HERE TODAY,
- 10 WE'VE REDUCED THE POPULATION BY ABOUT 13.7% DOWN TO WHAT IS
- 11 AVERAGING ABOUT 12.5 ON A DAILY BASIS. THAT NUMBER FLUCTUATES
- 12 BETWEEN 100 AND BELOW AND 100 ABOVE. WITH THE COURT CHALLENGES
- 13 WE HAD LAST WEEK, IT WENT UP BECAUSE OF THE ARRAIGNMENTS. SO,
- 14 AS WE'RE LOOKING AT THAT POPULATION, I'M CONSTANTLY
- 15 CHALLENGING THE STAFF, WHAT DO WE DO TO CONTINUOUSLY LOWER THE

- 22 THROUGH THERE, AND I DO CHALLENGE A STAFF, LET'S FIND OTHERS
- 23 THAT IF WE RELEASE THEM, WOULD NOT BE A THREAT TO PUBLIC

- 23 LOOKS AT REHABILITATION, SOMETHING THAT LOOKS AT MENTAL HEALTH
- 24 CARE, REGULAR HEALTH CARE, THAT AT THE END OF THE DAY, FOR ALL
- 25 OF US, ISN'T OUR JOBS THAT IF SOMEBODY GETS INCARCERATED, WHEN

- 16 ROBERT LUNA: THAT'S WHAT THE OFFICIAL NAME IS OF IT AND IT'S
- 17 ALL OF OUR DEPARTMENTS. IT'S NOT RUN BY THE SHERIFF'S
- 18 DEPARTMENT, IT'S RUN BY THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES AND IT'S
- 19 LOOKING AT A WHOLE PERSON CARE.

- 21 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: SO THAT WAS MY NEXT QUESTION BECAUSE I
- 22 WAS WONDERING IF IT HAS TO BE RUN BY THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT
- 23 OR COULD BE RUN BY AN ENTITY OUTSIDE OF LAW ENFORCEMENT BUT
- 24 HAVE A LOCK FACILITY. I DON'T KNOW WHAT THE POST OR THE LAWS
- 25 ARE.



- 2 ROBERT LUNA: IN ORDER FOR IT TO BE SUCCESSFUL. THE SHERIFF'S
- 3 DEPARTMENT CANNOT, SHOULD NOT, WILL NOT DO THIS ON OUR OWN,
- 4 OKAY? IT HAS TO BE WITHIN COLLABORATION WITH MENTAL HEALTH,

- 12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: OKAY, BECAUSE I MEAN, I THINK WHETHER IT
- 13 BE AT MJ MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL OR TWIN TOWERS OR AT PITCHES, THAT
- 14 KIND OF CONDUCT IS UNACCEPTABLE. I THINK WE ALL, I KNOW WE ALL
- 15 AGREE. I HEARD THAT LOUD AND CLEAR. SO, I LOOK FORWARD TO THE
- 16 INVESTIGATION BECAUSE AGAIN, I DON'T WANNA CONFUSE THE 2. I
- 17 THINK MCJ NEEDS TO BE TORN DOWN NO MATTER WHAT. AND TODAY I
- 18 HAD MY AHA MOMENT, SHERIFF, AND I HOPE WE DON'T DO A MOTION
- 19 ASKING FOR A REPORT BACK ON THIS TOO. BUT I HOPE, FESIA, THAT
- 20 YOU WILL CONSIDER THE FACT THAT IT DOESN'T HAVE TO BE A

- 16 EFFECTIVE WAY FOR US TO CONTINUE TO COMMUNICATE OUR PRIORITY
- 17 OF AN ISSUE. WE HAVE TO FIGURE THAT OUT. SPEAKING OF WHICH,
- 18 THE YOUNG PEOPLE, I'M SORRY, THEY'RE GONE, WERE ASKING ABOUT A
- 19 STATUS UPDATE. AND SO, IT'S MY UNDERSTANDING THAT DYD IS
- 20 GETTING READY TO PUT OUT AN RFP TO IMPLEMENT THE SAFE HEALING
- 21 CENTERS THAT WERE REQUESTED IN A HORVATH MITCHELL MOTION OF
- 22 MARCH OF 2023, AND WE EXPECT IT TO TAKE ABOUT ANOTHER 6 TO 8
- 23 MONTHS TO STAND UP THE FIRST DEMONSTRATION SITE, AND THE NEXT
- 24 2 SHOULD COME UP SHORTLY THEREAFTER, WHICH WOULD ADEQUATELY
- 25 HOUSE ALL PRE-DISPO GIRLS IN GENDER EXPANSIVE YOUTH. SO THAT'S

- 3 UPDATES AND ANSWERS ON TIMEFRAMES AS OPPOSED TO ASKING FOR A
- 4 REPORT BACK IS PROBABLY, FROM MY PERSPECTIVE, MORE HELPFUL AND
- 5 MAYBE MORE HELPFUL TO THE PUBLIC WHO HEAR A MOTION, HEAR A
- 6 REPORT BACK. I HAVE TO SAY, WHEN I FIRST JOINED THE BOARD, WE
- 7 HAD A REPORT BACK AND THE PUBLIC WERE TESTIFYING. IT WAS ABOUT
- 8 JAIL CLOSURE. AND THEY CLEARLY THOUGHT THAT WHAT HAD BEEN
- 9 AGENDIZED WAS LIKE THE ACTION. AND IT'S A REPORT BACK. SO, WE
- 10 HAVE TO FIGURE OUT THE REPORT BACK STUFF. IT'S NOT WORKING, I
- 11 THINK, FOR THE PUBLIC, IT'S NOT WORKING FOR ME, I THINK IT'S
- 12 NOT WORKING PROBABLY FOR A BUNCH OF PEOPLE. THAT'S THE PIECE.
- 13 AND SO, FOR ME, HERE LIES A GOVERNANCE ISSUE. HERE LIES A
- 14 GOVERNANCE ISSUE. THIS BOARD AND PREVIOUS BOARDS HAVE MADE A
- 15 POLICY DECISION TO CLOSE MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL. AND WE HAVE BEEN
- 16 ON THIS HAMSTER WHEEL. WE NOW, WE ARE HEARING FROM THE CURRENT
- 17 SHERIFF ABOUT THE POPULATION REALLY DEEMED APPROPRIATE FOR
- 18 RELEASE FROM ANY KIND OF CARCERAL SETTING. YOU KNOW, I BELIEVE
- 19 AS AN OUTSIDE OBSERVER AT THE TIME THAT THE ENERGY AROUND
- 20 CLOSURE WAS THAT, YOU KNOW, NO JAIL EVER, WE SHOULDN'T HAVE A
- 21 JAIL, AND THAT COMMUNITY SETTINGS WERE APPROPRIATE. WE ARE
- 22 HEARING THAT THERE IS A PERCENTAGE OF PEOPLE WHO CANNOT BE
- 23 SAFELY MAINTAINED IN THE COMMUNITY. WE ALSO NOW ARE AT A TIME
- 24 WHEN THE PENDULUM HAS SWUNG, AS IT OFTEN DOES, AND WE ARE
- 25 SEEING MORE AND MORE LAWS COMING FROM THE STATE THAT ARE



- 1 DIFFERENT THAN THE LAWS THAT WERE COMING FROM THE STATE AT THE
- 2 TIME THIS BOARD TOOK THAT ACTION. AND SO, WE ARE HEARING THAT
- 3 THERE WILL BE MORE LAWS IN THE BOOKS TO CRIMINALIZE ACTIONS
- 4 THAT HAD NOT BEEN IN RECENT TIMES. SO HOW DO WE RESPOND TO
- 5 THAT IN REAL TIME? AN ABSENT EMOTION IN A REPORT BACK. HOW DO
- 6 WE AS A BOARD HAVE THE CONVERSATION ABOUT WHAT WE BUILD? THE
- 7 SHERIFF SHARED HIS IDEA WITH ME ABOUT THE "CARE FIRST" SPACE
- 8 WHEN HE WAS FIRST ELECTED. AND MY QUESTION THEN WAS, WHO'S
- 9 GONNA LEAVE THAT WORK? AND HE WAS VERY CLEAR, IT SHOULDN'T BE
- 10 ME, IT'S GOT TO BE, HOW DO WE DO THAT OUTSIDE OF A MOTION THAT
- 11 SAYS REPORT BACK? HOW DO WE IN OUR CURRENT STRUCTURE HAVE
- 12 CONVERSATIONS AND GET TO A PLACE WHERE WE ARE GETTING PUBLIC
- 13 INPUT, HEARING FROM CRIMINAL JUSTICE ADVOCATES, THAT WE ARE
- 14 HEARING IT. THAT'S THE QUESTION I THINK WE HAVE TO ANSWER. AS
- 15 OPPOSED TO MOVING IT FROM ONE ENTITY TO THE OTHER. WHEN I
- 16 VOTED ON THE CHAIR'S MOTION ABOUT MOVING IT, I HAD NO IDEA
- 17 THAT THERE WEREN'T STAFF GOING. I DON'T KNOW THAT THE MOTION,
- 18 AND WE KNOW ENOUGH TO BE SPECIFIC ENOUGH TO GET THAT LEVEL OF
- 19 DETAIL IN THE MOTION PROCESS. SO HOW DO WE HAVE ENOUGH
- 20 INFORMATION WE NEED TO MAKE THESE KINDS OF DECISIONS IN REAL
- 21 TIME AND AS THE CLIMATE AROUND US IS CHANGING? THAT REALLY IS
- 22 AN OPEN-ENDED QUESTION. I MEAN, I DON'T KNOW HOW WE DO THAT.
- 23 HOW DO WE MOVE FROM HEARING IT TODAY IN THE BOARD MEETING,
- 24 SOMETHING YOU HAVE BEEN, I'M ASSUMING, WALKING IT WITH YOUR
- 25 MEETINGS WITH OTHER SUPERVISORS, HOW DO WE MOVE FROM HEARING



- 1 IT SAYING, THAT'S A GREAT IDEA, TO ACTION? HOW DO WE DO THAT?
- 2 THAT'S NOT RHETORICAL, I'M SERIOUS. WHY AM I ASKING DR.
- 3 ARMSTEAD? I THINK THE POLICY.

- 5 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: SHE BEGAN THE PROCESS, SHE BEGAN THE
- 6 PROCESS, AND THEN WHEN THE PROCESS WAS NOT THE PROCESS THAT I
- 7 THINK EVERYONE WANTED, IT WENT OVER TO FESIA NOW. FESIA IS IN
- 8 CHARGE OF IT, BUT SHE'S ALREADY, I MEAN, I HATE TO PUT YOU ON
- 9 THE SPOT, JUDGE.

- 11 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: BUT FESIA IS IN CHARGE OF CLOSURE OF
- 12 MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL.

14 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: I KNOW, BUT IN ORDER TO--

- 16 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I AM ASKING, BASED ON THE INFORMATION
- 17 WE ARE HEARING FROM OUR EXPERTS THAT WE'VE AGENDIZED AND HAD
- 18 THEM COME TODAY, HOW DO WE MOVE FORWARD?

- 20 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AS WE ARE CURRENTLY STRUCTURED,
- 21 WE ARE BOTH THE EXECUTIVE AND LEGISLATIVE BODY. SO NOT ONLY DO
- 22 WE SET THE VISION, BUT IT IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY COLLECTIVELY
- 23 AND OUR EXECUTIVE AUTHORITY TO WORK AND DIRECT EACH OF THESE
- 24 MEMBERS OF OUR PANEL ON HOW THEY'RE SUPPOSED TO WORK TOGETHER
- 25 AND BRING IT FORWARD. AND WE HAVE HAD CONVERSATIONS WITH THEM



- 1 PRIOR TO HERE AND IN OTHER SPACES WHERE WE'VE HAD THIS
- 2 CONVERSATION WHICH HAS ILLUMINATED FOR ME THE STRUGGLE THAT
- 3 THEY FACE WHEN THEY NEED TO COME TO A FIVE-HEADED EXECUTIVE
- 4 THAT IS IN CHARGE OF IMPLEMENTATION OF THE DIRECTIVE. SO, I
- 5 THINK WE HAVE A PROPOSAL, BUT I KNOW WE DISAGREE.

- 7 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND THAT WON'T BE UP TO VOTERS UNTIL
- 8 NOVEMBER, SO I DON'T KNOW THAT WE CAN AFFORD TO WAIT ON THIS
- 9 DECISION. SO, I THINK THIS FIVE-HEADED BODY HAS GOT TO FIGURE
- 10 OUT HOW WE WORK TOGETHER AND COME TOGETHER WITH A POLICY
- 11 SOLUTION. I DON'T KNOW THAT WE CAN WAIT. I APPRECIATE THAT
- 12 THAT'S YOUR VISION ABOUT THE PLAN. I AM ASKING, HOW DO WE DO
- 13 THIS NOW BECAUSE THE STATE IS MOVING ON BILLS. WE HAVE A SYBIL
- 14 BRAND COMMISSION AND THANK YOU TO THOSE COMMISSIONERS WHO DO
- 15 THAT HARD WORK, WHO HAVE COME BACK WITH ANOTHER REPORT THAT
- 16 REPORTS GRUESOME CONDITIONS TODAY. GRUESOME CONDITIONS TODAY.
- 17 MY QUESTION TO THE CEO WOULD BE, WHAT'S THE ESTIMATED COST
- 18 RELATED TO REMEDYING SOME OF THE ITEMS MENTIONED IN THIS
- 19 REPORT, AND HOW DOES THAT TRACK WITH SOME OF THE COSTS RELATED
- 20 TO MOTIONS AROUND THE BIGGER EFFORT TO CLOSE MEN'S CENTRAL
- 21 JAIL?

- 23 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, SUPERVISORS, I DON'T HAVE A SPECIFIC
- 24 DOLLAR AMOUNT FOR YOU TODAY. WHAT I WILL SAY IS THAT WE ARE
- 25 INVESTING TENS OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS INTO OUR JAILS TO COMPLY



- 1 WITH DOJ AND OTHER DOJ-RELATED INITIATIVES, TENS OF MILLIONS.
- 2 AND I DON'T SEE AN END IN SIGHT, ALTHOUGH I THINK MAGGIE WOULD
- 3 HAVE, HAD SHE DONE HER PRESENTATION TODAY, SHE WOULD HAVE
- 4 SHARED WITH THE BOARD THAT THERE ARE SOME AREAS THAT WE ARE
- 5 MAKING PROGRESS, BUT THERE ARE SOME AREAS THAT WE CAN'T MAKE
- 6 PROGRESS, WE ARE NOT MAKING PROGRESS. AND PART OF IT IS
- 7 BECAUSE THE DESIGN AND THE STRUCTURE OF THE FACILITY ITSELF.
- 8 AND SO, BECAUSE THE FACILITY IS LESS THAN IDEAL, WE'RE TRYING
- 9 TO ENGAGE IN WORKAROUNDS TO FIGURE OUT WHAT WE CAN DO TO
- 10 UPHOLD OUR OBLIGATION TO PROVIDE CONSTITUTIONAL, YOU KNOW,
- 11 CONDITIONS, HUMANE CONDITIONS INSIDE THE JAIL.

- 13 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: SO ABSENT REPORT BACKS, HOW CAN THE 5
- 14 OF US ENGAGE IN HEARING, LEARNING, AND PROVIDING POLICY
- 15 GUIDANCE NOW TO WHAT COMES NEXT, TO FIGURING OUT IF IT'S A NEW
- 16 BUILD, IF IT IS THIS VISION, HOW IS IT PAID FOR, HOW DO WE
- 17 PRIORITIZE THE FUNDING, HOW DO WE DO THAT IN OUR CURRENT
- 18 INFRASTRUCTURE?

- 20 FESIA DAVENPORT: SUPERVISOR, WHAT I WOULD DO, AND I ALLUDED TO
- 21 THIS EARLIER, THE REPORT BACKS ARE HELPFUL BECAUSE THEY
- 22 PROVIDE A LOT OF BACKGROUND INFORMATION AND DETAIL. BUT I FEEL
- 23 LIKE FOR THE SUPERVISORS AT THE EXECUTIVE LEVEL, OUR REPORT
- 24 BACKS NEED TO BE IN THE FORM OF A TEMPLATE THAT BASICALLY
- 25 SAYS, HERE'S WHAT WE TALKED ABOUT AND REPORTED ON LAST TIME,



- 1 AND HERE'S WHAT IS DIFFERENT. AND HERE ARE THE CHALLENGES ON
- 2 THE HORIZON, PROP 36. WE HAVE AN ELECTION OF THE DISTRICT
- 3 ATTORNEY COMING UP LATER THIS YEAR. THERE MIGHT BE A SHIFT IN
- 4 POLICY CHANGES IN TERMS OF WHAT CRIMES ARE PROSECUTED AND
- 5 WHICH ONES ARE. WE JUST HAD A CONVERSATION ABOUT GRANTS PASS.
- 6 AND SO, AS WE SHARE THAT INFORMATION, THEY ARE NOT ANECDOTES.
- 7 THEY ARE KIND OF THE SHOT OVER THE BOW, SO TO SPEAK, SAYING
- 8 THIS MAY IMPACT OUR EFFORTS IN AN INTENTIONAL AND MEANINGFUL
- 9 WAY AND IS IT TIME TO PIVOT OR TO DO SOMETHING DIFFERENT? THE
- 10 REPORT BACKS ARE HELPFUL FOR THE STAFF, BUT WHAT WE INTEND TO
- 11 DO IN JSIT GOING FORWARD IS TO FIGURE OUT A TEMPLATE SO THAT
- 12 YOU COULD SEE BASICALLY LIKE A LINE ITEM THE RELEVANT PIECES
- 13 OF DATA THAT WOULD HELP INFORM A POLICY DISCUSSION RATHER THAN
- 14 HAVING TO COMB THROUGH A 20 PAGE REPORT.

- 16 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: SO, THE REPORT BACKS WILL HAVE
- 17 RECOMMENDATIONS THAT THE BOARD CAN THEN CONSIDER FOR NEXT
- 18 ACTIONS.

- 20 FESIA DAVENPORT: YES, WHEN IT IS APPROPRIATE. AND SO WE NEED
- 21 THE DATA. AND LIKE I SAID PREVIOUSLY, WE HAVE HAD A NUMBER OF
- 22 STUDIES AND AT THE END OF THE DAY SUPERVISORS I REALIZED THAT
- 23 WE HAVE BEEN STRUGGLING WITH THIS ISSUE IN THE COUNTY FOR A
- 24 VERY LONG TIME. WE NEED TO COME INTO ALIGNMENT IN TERMS OF YOU
- 25 KNOW I THINK WE ARE IN ALIGNMENT IN TERMS OF WHAT THE VISION



- 1 IS. THE QUESTION IS, ARE OUR REAL WORLD CIRCUMSTANCES, ARE
- 2 THEY CONSISTENT? CAN WE ACTUALLY GET THERE BASED ON OUR REAL
- 3 WORLD CIRCUMSTANCES? AND PART OF THE ANSWER TO THAT QUESTION
- 4 IS GETTING DATA. AND SOMETIMES THE DATA TELLS US THINGS THAT
- 5 WE DON'T WANT TO KNOW. BUT I THINK WHEN WE GO FORWARD, THAT
- 6 NOT EVERYONE WILL BE HAPPY, NOT EVERYONE WILL AGREE, BUT WE
- 7 HAVE TO DO THE BEST THAT WE POSSIBLY CAN TO DO RIGHT BY THE
- 8 FOLKS WHO ARE IN OUR JAIL AND ALSO TO MOVE TO A CARE-FIRST
- 9 MODEL WHICH PROBABLY MEANS THAT THERE'S GOING TO BE SOME SORT
- 10 OF COMPROMISE.

- 12 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND YOU KNOW, THE OTHER THING I THINK
- 13 THE PUBLIC STRUGGLES WITH, APPROPRIATELY SO, IS THIS DELICATE
- 14 BALANCE. SO YOU HAVE TO DO AN INVESTIGATION, AND THE PEOPLE
- 15 WHO HAVE THE ALLEGED OFFENSES, YOU DON'T HAVE TO HAVE KIND OF
- 16 THEIR DUE PROCESS. BUT THEN IT'S REALLY HARD WHEN YOU HEAR AND
- 17 READ ABOUT WHAT'S THERE, A NOOSE HANGING. AND SO, IT'S THIS
- 18 CHALLENGING BALANCE. AND AGAIN, HOW WE MOVE FORWARD IN AN
- 19 INVESTIGATION IN A TIMELY MANNER, RECOGNIZING THAT POLL BAR
- 20 CREATES PROTECTIONS FOR YOUR EMPLOYEES, BUT THAT THOSE
- 21 PROTECTIONS CANNOT AND SHOULD NOT TRUMP THE LIVED EXPERIENCE
- 22 OF PEOPLE WHO ARE INCARCERATED. AND SO, I'M JUST, I DON'T HAVE
- 23 AN ANSWER, IT'S JUST KIND OF PUTTING IT OUT THERE, THAT IT
- 24 REALLY IS A CHALLENGING BALANCE. AND I THINK WHAT I'M HEARING
- 25 FROM MY COLLEAGUES IS, PARTICULARLY FROM THE LINE OF



- 1 OUESTIONING FROM THE CHAIR, IS HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE, WHAT DID
- 2 YOU SEE, AND WHAT ARE THE CONSEQUENCES? SO, MAKING SURE THAT
- 3 WE HAVE A HIGH LEVEL OF CONFIDENCE THAT THOSE INVESTIGATIONS
- 4 AREN'T BEING DELAYED, AREN'T BEING STRETCHED OUT, AND THERE
- 5 ARE REAL CONSEQUENCES THAT PEOPLE CAN SEE AND FEEL AND
- 6 UNDERSTAND THAT THERE ARE BEHAVIORS THAT ARE JUST NOT
- 7 ACCEPTABLE. AND PEOPLE WHO ARE INCARCERATED HAVE RIGHTS,
- 8 INCARCERATED OR NOT, TO BE IN AN ENVIRONMENT WHERE THEY ARE
- 9 NOT ABUSED OR TAKEN ADVANTAGE OF OR FEEL EXPRESSIONS OF RACISM
- 10 OR WHATEVER THE CASE IS. AND SO, IT'S JUST A DIFFICULT
- 11 BALANCE. I HEARD YOU LOUD AND CLEAR AROUND THE CHALLENGES
- 12 AROUND DIVERSION, BUT I WILL RAISE THE ISSUES I'VE
- 13 CONSISTENTLY RAISED, AND THAT'S WITH REGARD TO PRETRIAL, AS WE
- 14 REALLY LOOK AT THE POPULATION THAT'S THERE AND REALLY TRY TO,
- 15 AGAIN, TAKE THAT CREAM OFF THE TOP IN TERMS OF WHO CAN BE
- 16 SOMEPLACE OTHER THAN MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL AS WE FIGURE OUT HOW
- 17 WE CLOSE IT, WHEN WE CLOSE IT, AND WHAT WE DO. SO WHAT EFFORTS
- 18 ARE BEING EXPLORED TO IDENTIFY AND DEVELOP COMMUNITY
- 19 SUPPORTIVE SERVICES FOR THOSE WHO ARE IN THE PRETRIAL KIND OF
- 20 CATEGORY. MM-HMM, PLEASE.

- 22 JUDGE SONGHAI ARMSTEAD (RET): OKAY, THANK YOU FOR THAT
- 23 QUESTION, SUPERVISOR. SO AS THE BOARD AND THE PUBLIC MAY OR
- 24 MAY NOT BE AWARE, WE LAUNCHED OUR FIRST PRETRIAL PILOT AT THE
- 25 AIRPORT COURTHOUSE. THAT WAS THE FIRST LOCATION THAT THE



- 1 COURTS HAVE APPROVED. IT LAUNCHED ON JUNE, IN THE MIDDLE OF
- 2 JUNE, LET ME TELL YOU THE EXACT DATE, JUNE 25TH. AND BETWEEN
- 3 JUNE 25TH AND JULY 16TH, WE HAVE STAFF THAT'S THERE. WE ARE,
- 4 THEY'RE ALL CONTRACT WORKERS, BUT THEY'RE TRAINED AND MANY OF
- 5 THEM HAVE LIVED EXPERIENCE AND THEY HAVE ENGAGED 116
- 6 INDIVIDUALS SINCE THAT JUNE 25TH DATE. 79 OF THOSE 116 ARE
- 7 ACTUALLY PEOPLE WHO HAD PRETRIAL CASES. AND OF THOSE 79, 61
- 8 HAVE VOLUNTARILY GONE INTO SERVICES. SO THE WAY IT'S CURRENTLY
- 9 STRUCTURED, IT'S ONLY FOR PEOPLE WHO VOLUNTARILY ARE WILLING
- 10 TO GO INTO SERVICES. WE ARE WORKING ON AN MOU WITH OUR JUSTICE
- 11 PARTNERS SO THAT WE CAN DO CONDITIONAL RELEASES. THE COURTS
- 12 HAVE ASKED FOR CONDITIONAL RELEASES. THERE WAS, IF YOU MAY OR
- 13 MAY NOT KNOW, THERE'S BEEN A LOT OF RESISTANCE TO CONDITIONAL
- 14 RELEASES BECAUSE IF THEY VIOLATE A CONDITION, THEN DOES THAT
- 15 MEAN THAT THEY GO BACK INTO CUSTODY? AND SO WE'RE WORKING ON
- 16 AN MOU ABOUT SORT OF WHAT INFORMATION CAN BE SHARED. AND THEN
- 17 HOPEFULLY ONCE THAT MOU IS AGREED UPON BY ALL THE PARTIES
- 18 INVOLVED, WE'RE ALSO MEETING WITH THE COURTS ABOUT WHAT THE
- 19 NEXT LOCATION IS THAT THEY'RE COMFORTABLE WITH US LAUNCHING
- 20 FOR PRETRIAL SERVICES. THAT'S HAPPENING RIGHT NOW. WE ALSO
- 21 HAVE FOLKS THAT ARE CALLING THROUGH OUR CALL CENTER AS WELL AS
- 22 WE LAUNCHED ON OCTOBER 1ST AND WE HAVE HAD OVER 4, 000 PEOPLE
- 23 WHO HAVE CONNECTED TO RECEIVE SERVICES THROUGH THERE. MOSTLY
- 24 FOR PRE-TRIAL. THE PERCENTAGE AT PRE-TRIAL IS PRE-TRIAL ALONE
- 25 IS PROBABLY ABOUT 20%. MANY OF THEM ARE PRE-TRIAL, BUT THEY



- 1 ALSO HAVE PAROLE OR PROBATION OR SOMETHING ELSE, SO WE CAPTURE
- 2 THOSE NUMBERS AS WELL. OF THOSE FOLKS, MOST PEOPLE HAVE NEEDED
- 3 TRANSPORTATION. SOME PEOPLE HAVE BEEN CONNECTED TO HOUSING.
- 4 WE'RE CONNECTING WITH ALL OF OUR PROVIDERS THAT WE CAN GET
- 5 THEM CONNECTED TO. WE ALSO HAVE FOLKS THAT ARE BEING CONNECTED
- 6 TO SERVICES THROUGH OUR RAPID DIVERSION PROGRAM, WHICH IS
- 7 ANOTHER DIVERSION PROGRAM FOR MISDEMEANORS AND FELONIES. IT'S
- 8 NOT, IT'S KIND OF LIKE COLLEGE. THEY DON'T GO 1 YEAR THROUGH,
- 9 SOMETIMES THEY COME OUT, THEY COME BACK FOR MISDEMEANORS IN 2
- 10 YEARS FOR FELONIES. AND IN THAT PROGRAM, WE'VE HAD 664
- 11 INDIVIDUALS GRADUATE SINCE MARCH OF LAST YEAR. WE CURRENTLY
- 12 HAVE 2,344 WHO ARE IN DIVERSION GOING THROUGH THAT 1 YEAR OR 2
- 13 YEAR PROCESS. AND SINCE ITS LAUNCH, WE'VE HAD, WELL ACTUALLY
- 14 SINCE MARCH OF LAST YEAR, WE'VE HAD 7,100 PEOPLE EVALUATED,
- 15 BUT THEY DIDN'T ALL QUALIFY FOR ONE REASON OR ANOTHER, EITHER
- 16 BECAUSE THEIR ACUITY WAS TOO HIGH AND THEY WERE BETTER SUITED
- 17 FOR ODR, OR THE COURTS AND THE PROSECUTION DIDN'T AGREE THAT
- 18 THEY WERE SUITABLE FOR DIVERSION, BUT WE HAVE EVALUATED, AND
- 19 THAT'S AT 8 DIFFERENT COURTHOUSES WHERE THAT PROGRAM CURRENTLY
- 20 SITS. WE ALSO WANT TO SHARE THAT WE HAVE FOLKS THAT WHEN THEY
- 21 ARE RELEASED, WE DID LAUNCH WARM LANDING PLACE, THE FIRST
- 22 VERSION OF WARM LANDING PLACE, AND SO WE HAVE A PROVIDER
- 23 THAT'S ACTUALLY AT THE EXIT OF THE JAIL TO HELP CONNECT PEOPLE
- 24 TO SERVICES RIGHT AWAY. AND WE GIVE THEM TRANSPORTATION, WE
- 25 GET THEM ON EMERGENCY BEDS, WE GET THEM IN HOUSING. WE ALSO



- 1 ARE WORKING ON AN MOU RIGHT NOW WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT
- 2 FOR OUR STOP PROGRAM. AND IT'S A PROGRAM THAT'S MODELED AFTER
- 3 THE PROGRAM THAT'S FROM THE PRISON, WHERE PEOPLE CAN SPEND UP
- 4 TO 33 MONTHS IN PROGRAMMING, AND THEY GET ACTUAL PRISON CREDIT
- 5 FOR IT. AND SO WE'RE WORKING ON AN MOU RIGHT NOW. I HAVE 400
- 6 BEDS AVAILABLE IN THAT SPACE. WE'VE HAD, TRYING TO LOOK FOR
- 7 THE NUMBER. WE'VE HAD ABOUT, I THINK 25 FOLKS DIVERTED, BUT
- 8 THEY HAVEN'T COME FROM THE SHERIFF. THAT'S BEEN FROM THE PD,
- 9 APD, AND THE COURTS THAT HAVE BEEN CONNECTING THEM TO THOSE
- 10 SERVICES. 23 IS ACTUALLY THE NUMBER, 23 PEOPLE. BUT WE HAVE
- 11 400 BEDS, BUT WE'RE WORKING WITH THE SHERIFF TO GET AN MOU SO
- 12 THAT THEY CAN RELEASE FOLKS THAT THEY'RE COMFORTABLE RELEASING
- 13 INTO THOSE PROGRAMS AS WELL. AND THAT'S A STRUCTURED PROGRAM.
- 14 IT'S FOR THE MILD TO MODERATE, IT'S NOT FOR THE HIGHLY ACUTE,
- 15 BUT IT'S FOR THE EVERYBODY ELSE THAT WE SOMETIMES FORGET TO BE
- 16 CONNECTED TO SERVICES AS WELL. WE HAVE A NUMBER OF OTHER BEDS
- 17 IF YOU WANT, I CAN RUN.

- 19 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: NO. OKAY. I APPRECIATE THAT. THAT WAS
- 20 A LOT. OKAY. AND THAT FELT LIKE THAT WAS A BROADER NET. WE
- 21 TALKED A LOT. I HEARD A LOT ABOUT DIVERSION. I GET IT. MY
- 22 SPECIFIC QUESTION WAS ON PRETRIAL. AND SO, YOU SHARED A NUMBER
- 23 79. HELP ME PUT THAT IN CONTEXT. WHAT'S THE DENOMINATOR OUT OF
- 24 HOW MANY?



- JUDGE SONGHAI ARMSTEAD (RET): SO, ALL OF THE RDP CASES ARE
- 2 PRE-TRIAL. ALL OF THE FOLKS, THE PERCENTAGE OF PEOPLE WHO ARE
- 3 PRE-TRIAL ONLY IS ABOUT 25% FOR THE CALL CENTER, BUT MANY OF
- 4 THEM ARE PRE-TRIAL, ALSO HAVE PAROLE OR PROBATION. SO, IT'S A
- 5 COMBINATION. SO PRE-TRIAL ALONE, THAT DATA IS ON THE LOWER
- 6 END, 25.

- 8 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND SO MAYBE THE QUESTION IS FOR THE
- 9 SHERIFF IN TERMS OF UNDERSTANDING HOW MANY IN MEN'S CENTRAL

- 11 TRYING TO UNDERSTAND. I WANT TO BE IMPRESSED BY THESE NUMBERS,
- 12 BUT I NEED TO KNOW WHAT THE TOTAL POPULATION IS OF PRETRIAL.

13

- 14 PAULA TOKAR: TODAY, WE HAVE 6,841 PEOPLE WHO ARE PRETRIAL.
- 15 THAT'S ABOUT 54% OF OUR TOTAL POPULATION.

16

17 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: GOT IT.

18

- 19 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: ARE THEY UNIQUELY PRETRIAL, LIKE
- 20 PRETRIAL ONLY, OR ARE THEY ALSO THERE FOR SOMETHING ELSE TOO?

21

- 22 PAULA TOKAR: SO THOSE ARE PRETRIAL, NOT SENTENCED ON ANYTHING.
- 23 WE HAVE ANOTHER 2,932 THAT ARE PARTIALLY SENTENCED.

24

25 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: OKAY. IF WE COULD GET OUR PRETRIAL



- 1 WORK GOING, WE COULD IMPACT YOUR NUMBERS PRETTY SIGNIFICANTLY.
- 2 AND I'LL JUST SAY IN CLOSING, AS WE FIGURE OUT HOW WE FIGURE
- 3 OUT THE NEXT STEP, CLEARLY THE COURTS HAVE TO BE A PART OF OUR
- 4 CONVERSATION. I THINK, YOU KNOW, OUR MOTION KIND OF PROCESS,
- 5 WE WRITE THE MOTION, TELL PEOPLE WHAT TO DO. IN THIS CASE,
- 6 WON'T WORK. AS YOU SAID, YOU CAN'T LEAD IT. IT'S GOT TO BE
- 7 COLLABORATIVE. YOU HAVE ONE ELEMENT OF IT, BUT MENTAL HEALTH,
- 8 AND THE COURTS, I THINK, HAVE TO WEIGH IN IF THEY ARE GOING TO
- 9 SEND PEOPLE TO THIS NEW CONCEPT OF AN IDEA. BECAUSE IF THEY'RE
- 10 NOT, THEN THAT WOULD BE A COMPLETE WASTED EFFORT AND WASTED
- 11 MONEY. SO I REALLY HOPE THAT WE FIGURE OUT HOW TO HAVE THAT
- 12 CONVERSATION AND DEVELOP KIND OF A ROUGH PLAN, INCLUDING ALL
- 13 OF THE VESTED INTERESTS, INCLUDING THE COURTS, WE CAN MANDATE
- 14 THEM, I GUESS WE INVITE THEM, TO REALLY TALK ABOUT HOW WE
- 15 BUILD AND WHAT WE BUILD THAT MAKES SENSE BASED ON OUR CURRENT
- 16 REALITY. THANK YOU, THANK YOU.

- 18 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: ABSOLUTELY. AND TO DIRECTLY
- 19 ANSWER, I THINK THAT WAS MY INTENTION IN CREATING THIS TUESDAY
- 20 PLACE FOR DISCUSSION. YOU KNOW, WHEN WE HAD THE 6 MONTHS AGO,
- 21 THE VERSION WE HAD OF THIS CONVERSATION, I THINK INCLUDED
- 22 REPRESENTATION FROM THE COURTS. AND THE IDEA WAS TO SORT OF
- 23 TALK AT THAT POINT, WHERE ARE WE? AND WE SURFACED THAT WE
- 24 HADN'T REALLY GOTTEN FAR ON THE JAIL CLOSURE IMPLEMENTATION
- 25 PROGRESS. SO, WE TRANSFERRED IT TO, I AUTHORED THE MOTION TO



- 1 BRING IT TO CEO, WHICH SURFACED THAT THERE WAS NOBODY FULL-
- 2 TIME DEDICATED TO THAT, SO THAT CONTRIBUTES TO THE PROBLEM.
- 3 BUT ALSO, BECAUSE SHE'S THE ONE WHO DRAFTS THE BUDGET AND
- 4 CURRENTLY HAS AS MUCH INSIGHT AS POSSIBLE INTO WHERE ALL OF
- 5 THE RESOURCES ARE IN THE COUNTY FOR US TO KNOW WHAT RESOURCES
- 6 ARE AVAILABLE. BUT AT THAT TIME, WE HEARD THE DIRECTOR WHO,
- 7 DESPITE RECEIVING A MOTION THAT INDICATED DELEGATED AUTHORITY
- 8 FOR HER TO DO THE THING, SAID THAT STRUCTURALLY, IT DOESN'T
- 9 REALLY WORK THAT WAY. AND SO IN ORDER FOR US TO MAKE PROGRESS,

- 15 REPORT ON WHAT PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE. AND I HEAR THAT'S WHAT
- 16 FESIA IS REALLY ENVISIONING IS HERE ARE THE 10 THINGS AND
- 17 HERE'S THE PROGRESS THAT WE'VE MADE. BUT UNTIL WE HAVE THAT
- 18 ELEMENT, I THINK WE'VE GIVEN ALL THE DIRECTION THAT WE CAN,
- 19 AND THAT'S WHERE IMPLEMENTATION, I THINK, GETS STUCK.

- 21 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I AGREE, AND I APPRECIATE YOU CREATING
- 22 THIS TUESDAY, BECAUSE IT HAS SURFACED, IT HAS CREATED THIS
- 23 SPACE. SO, MY QUESTION IS, AND THE NEXT STEP, THEY SAID
- 24 EARLIER, PUT ONE FOOT IN FRONT OF THE OTHER.

- 8 WAS A BOARD WHO SAID CLOSE MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL AND DON'T BUILD
- 9 A BIG MENTAL HEALTH FACILITY. THOSE WERE POLICY DIRECTIVES.
- 10 SO, MY POINT IS HOW DOES THE BOARD THEN SET THE NEXT POLICY
- 11 DIRECTIVE? WE KEEP SAYING WHEN ARE YOU CLOSING MEN'S CENTRAL
- 12 JAIL? I THINK THERE NEEDS TO BE A AND WHAT ARE WE BUILDING,
- 13 CREATING FOR THIS POPULATION THAT PERHAPS PRETRIAL DIVERSION
- 14 COMMUNITY SETTINGS WON'T MATCH AND RECOGNIZING THAT THE WORLD
- 15 HAS CHANGED AROUND US.

- 17 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: AND I THINK THAT THERE HAVE BEEN
- 18 MOTIONS ON P3, P4 BEDS. THERE HAVE BEEN POLICY DIRECTIONS
- 19 AROUND WHAT SHOULD BE BUILT AS WELL, AND THOSE DON'T YET EXIST
- 20 AS FAR AS I KNOW.

22 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: NOT A PROBLEM.

- 24 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: SO YEAH. RIGHT. SO, SUPERVISOR
- 25 SOLIS.



- 2 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: I WANT TO APPRECIATE THE PANEL AND
- 3 EVERYTHING THAT HAS BEEN SAID. A LOT OF THIS JUST TAKES ME
- 4 BACK TO THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS THAT WE'VE BEEN WORKING ON THIS
- 5 ISSUE. AND THERE HAS BEEN PROGRESS MADE, GIVEN WHAT WE ARE
- 6 CURRENTLY UNDERGOING AND UNDER THE MICROSCOPE, I MIGHT SAY. I
- 7 THINK WE'VE TRIED TO WORK FAST AND FURIOUS TO FIX THE THINGS

- 12 ELSE, HONESTLY, BECAUSE JUST THE POPULATION IN TWIN TOWERS IS
- 13 WHAT, SHERIFF? WHAT'S THE POPULATION AT TWIN TOWERS IN THOSE 2
- 14 FACILITIES?

16 **PAULA TOKAR:** ABOUT 3,400, MA'AM. 3,400.

17

18 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND THEN IN MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL, IT'S?

- 20 PAULA TOKAR: MORE THAN THAT. SO, I DON'T GET IT, BUT AGAIN,
- 21 IT'S FACILITY, RIGHT? IT'S THE STRUCTURE OF THE FACILITIES,
- 22 TWIN TOWERS AS OPPOSED TO MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL, WHICH IS A LOT,
- 23 A HELL OF A LOT OLDER, BUT YET, I MEAN, I'M LOOKING AT THIS
- 24 LIKE IT'S UPSIDE DOWN. I WOULD HOPE THAT WE COULD LOOK AT A
- 25 COUPLE OF THINGS. ONE IS, YEAH, LET'S PROVIDE CARE FOR PEOPLE



- 1 THAT DON'T-THAT CAN BE LET OUT IF THAT'S POSSIBLE. BUT THE
- 2 MAIN DRIVER FOR ME IS, WHERE ARE THE COURTS? WHERE ARE THE
- 3 COURTS? WHERE ARE THE ONES? WE CAN SAY AND TALK TO, WE'RE BLUE
- 4 IN THE FACE, BUT IF THAT JUDGE IS GOING TO SAY, NOPE, WE'RE
- 5 STUCK. SO, WHAT DO WE DO? MEANWHILE, THEN LET'S PROVIDE THE
- 6 BEST TREATMENT POSSIBLE SO WE DON'T END UP HAVING THE FEDERAL
- 7 GOVERNMENT CONTINUE TO HAVE THEIR CLAW ON OUR NECK, SO TO
- 8 SPEAK, BECAUSE IT'S COSTING US A LOT OF MONEY. AND I WANT TO
- 9 SEE THAT CONTINUED. I WANT TO SEE THAT WE HAVE APPROPRIATE
- 10 HEALTHCARE AND THAT WE HAVE MORE LAX FLEXIBILITY WITH OUR

- 12 THAT ARE HAPPENING IN THERE THAT REALLY COULD BE TAKING OFF
- 13 AND THEY REALLY HAVEN'T. AND THAT IS BY WAY OF PROVIDING
- 14 BETTER TREATMENT TO THOSE THAT WE HAVE IN CUSTODY THAT REALLY
- 15 ARE HARMFUL TO THEMSELVES, HAVE MENTAL ILLNESS, AND THEY NEED
- 16 A DIFFERENT KIND OF TREATMENT AND SETTING. AND I KNOW WE'RE
- 17 BUILDING OUT THE PODS RIGHT NOW, WE'RE DOING ALL THAT, WHICH
- 18 IS GREAT. AND IT'S COSTING US A LOT OF MONEY. I JUST DON'T
- 19 THINK THE PUBLIC KNOWS THAT. I DON'T THINK THEY UNDERSTAND ALL
- 20 THE THINGS THAT WE HAVE DONE. AND, YOU KNOW, I NEVER THOUGHT I
- 21 WOULD END UP SAYING ALL THIS ON THIS SIDE OF THE DAIS, BUT
- 22 IT'S TRUE, YOU ALL HAVE WORKED VERY HARD. AND SO HAVE OUR
- 23 EMPLOYEES, OUR UNION EMPLOYEES AND OUR MEDICAL STAFF THAT ARE
- 24 THERE. AND I DON'T THINK THEY GET ENOUGH CREDIT EITHER BECAUSE
- 25 THEY'RE BURNT OUT. THEY ARE BURNT OUT AND I THINK THEY ARE



- 1 TRYING TO PUT THEIR FINGER IN THAT DIKE BUT IT JUST KEEPS
- 2 EXPLODING AND IT'S NOT IMPROVING. BUT WE HAVE TO WORK BETTER
- 3 AND I THINK FOR ME THE COURTS HAS TO BE HERE AND WE JUST HAVE
- 4 TO RAMP UP MORE SUPPORT. I LIKE WHAT JUDGE JCOD IS DOING
- 5 OUTSIDE, SAFE LANDINGS AND ALL THAT. WE'RE GONNA HAVE
- 6 SOMETHING COMING UP ALREADY. I UNDERSTAND WE'RE WORKING WITH
- 7 CEO, PROPERTY REAL ESTATE, AND WE HAVE SOMETHING THAT WE'RE
- 8 LOOKING AT SO THAT WHEN PEOPLE DO COME OUT OF JAIL, THEY CAN
- 9 LAND THERE RIGHT AWAY THE MINUTE THEY WALK OUT OF THE JAIL AND
- 10 BE ABLE TO GET THE KIND OF SERVICES THEY NEED. THE MAIN THING
- 11 IS IF WE CAN DO, WE CAN THROW 3 OR 4 BALLS UP IN THE AIR. AND
- 12 ONE OF THEM IS PREVENTION. SO, THE ONES THAT DO COME OUT AND
- 13 THEY HAVE A PLACE TO GO, THAT THEY DON'T RETURN. AND THAT I
- 14 THINK IS A BIG PART OF WHAT WE HAVE TO LOOK AT. THAT'S ANOTHER
- 15 PIECE OF THE PUZZLE FOR ME. BUT THE OTHER THING IS, AGAIN,
- 16 JUST THE ENORMOUS AMOUNT OF MONEY THAT WE'RE SPENDING RIGHT
- 17 NOW TO GET JUST TO FIX OURSELVES STRUCTURALLY. WE'RE NOT GOING

- 19 SO, WE HAVE TO COME TO TERMS WITH THAT. BUT I DO WANT TO SEE
- 20 THAT THAT WE HAVE BETTER OVERSIGHT AND I'D LIKE TO HEAR FROM
- 21 THE CHAIR OF SYBIL BRAND. YOU KNOW, I WANT TO ASK YOU, YOU'RE
- 22 SITTING THERE QUIETLY, BUT YOU'VE BEEN AT THIS FOR A LONG
- 23 TIME. AND YOU KNOW, WHAT ARE SOME OF YOUR OPINIONS ABOUT THIS?
- 24 WHAT DO WE NEED TO DO? WHAT ARE WE MISSING HERE?



- 1 RAYMOND REGALADO: WELL, FIRST OF ALL, I'D LIKE TO THANK YOU
- 2 ALL FOR BRINGING THIS SUBJECT IN THIS PUBLIC ARENA SO THAT WE
- 3 CAN TALK ABOUT IT. SO THAT SOMETIMES, I'LL BE HONEST WITH YOU,
- 4 WE HAVE A WHOLE GROUP OF PEOPLE, COMMISSIONERS, WHO GO OUT AND
- 5 DO THIS, YOU KNOW, THEY HAVE FULL-TIME JOBS. AND THEY DO THIS
- 6 BECAUSE THEY HAVE A DESIRE TO CREATE AN ENVIRONMENT IN A TOUGH
- 7 ARENA TO BRING SOME HUMANITY INTO OUR JAILS. AND THAT'S SO
- 8 IMPORTANT. RIGHT. BECAUSE I'LL BE HONEST WITH YOU, THE FIRST
- 9 TIME I STEPPED INTO THE JAIL IN MY CAPACITY AS A COMMISSIONER,
- 10 IT SCARED THE HECK OUT OF ME. IT REALLY DID. AND I JUST DIDN'T
- 11 KNOW HOW TO REACT. BUT AS I SAW MY COLLEAGUES OUT THERE DOING
- 12 THIS MONTH IN AND MONTH OUT, THE AMOUNT OF VISITS THAT WE'RE
- 13 ABLE TO DO, 2 VISITS A MONTH, THAT'S WHAT WE TRY TO DO. AND
- 14 THE THING IS THAT WE TRY TO DO IT IN PAIRS BECAUSE, I MEAN, WE
- 15 CAN TALK AND BOUNCE IDEAS OFF OF EACH OTHER. IT'S REALLY
- 16 IMPORTANT TO BE ABLE TO COME UP WITH SOME OF THESE, SOME OF
- 17 THESE MAYBE IDEAS AS TO HOW WE MIGHT MAKE THE AREA, THE JAILS,
- 18 A LITTLE BIT MORE HUMANE. AND THAT'S THE WORD THAT I HAVE

- 23 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: DO YOU FEEL THAT YOU'RE BEING RESPONDED TO?
- 24 YOU KNOW, THE CONCEPTS THAT YOU THROW OUT THERE AND IDEAS, AND
- 25 DO YOU FEEL THAT YOU ARE BEING TAKEN SERIOUS?



- 2 RAYMOND REGALADO: THE CHALLENGE WHEN WE GO OUT AND MAKE AN
- 3 INSPECTION AND WE WRITE UP OUR REPORTS, AND I WILL, I WANT TO
- 4 MAKE SURE THAT I EMPHASIZE THE FACT THAT WHEN WE'RE OUT IN AN
- 5 INSPECTION AND WE SEE SOMETHING THAT CAN BE CORRECTED, WE JUST
- 6 DON'T WAIT UNTIL WE GET, YOU KNOW, BACK TO OUR WORK
- 7 ENVIRONMENTS AND WRITE OUT OUR REPORTS. WE WILL TALK TO
- 8 WHOEVER MIGHT BE THE LEADERSHIP THERE AT THE TIME AND SAY,
- 9 THIS IS WHAT WE SAW. DO YOU THINK WE CAN MAYBE CORRECT IT
- 10 RIGHT AWAY? BUT HERE'S THE CHALLENGE. WE GO, WE LEAVE, AND WE
- 11 HOPE THAT IT GETS TAKEN CARE OF. SO, NOBODY GETS BACK TO YOU
- 12 ON THAT? WHEN WE HAVE THE MORE BASIC THINGS, ONE OF THE THINGS
- 13 THAT I'LL GIVE AS AN EXAMPLE, IN JUNE, LET'S GO BACK TO MARCH
- 14 OF 2023, THERE WAS NO HOT WATER IN UNIT 4300C, NO HOT WATER.
- 15 WE WENT BACK THERE IN JUNE AND GUESS WHAT? STILL NO HOT WATER
- 16 IN THAT UNIT. SO, WE WOULD HOPE THAT OUR REPORT WOULD HELP
- 17 CREATE THE CHANGE THAT WE'RE HOPING TO CREATE. AND MAYBE IN
- 18 THE WHOLE SCHEME OF THINGS, MAYBE HOT WATER ISN'T THAT
- 19 IMPORTANT IN SOME OF THE THINGS THAT WE REPORT, BUT WE WANNA
- 20 MAKE SURE THAT WE, IN PARTNERSHIP, CAN COME AND SAY, THIS IS
- 21 WHAT WE SAW, THIS IS WHAT WE CAN, WE HOPE WE'LL SEE A CHANGE.
- 22 AND WE HOPE THAT OVER TIME THAT CREATION OF A PARTNERSHIP WE
- 23 DON'T SEE OURSELVES AS WORKING, YOU KNOW OUTSIDE, YOU KNOW THE
- 24 CONFINES OF THE OF THE YOU KNOW OPPOSITE OF THE SHERIFF'S
- 25 DEPARTMENT AND OTHERS, IT IS MY BELIEF THAT WE WORK IN



- 1 PARTNERSHIP, IN CONCERT SO THAT WE CAN CREATE THAT HUMANE
- 2 ENVIRONMENT FOR OUR INCARCERATED POPULATION. AND I WILL SAY
- 3 THAT IN SUPPORT OF THE WORK THAT OUR SHERIFFS PARTNERS AT
- 4 THOSE LOCATIONS, THEY DO LISTEN TO US. AND WE HOPE WHEN WE
- 5 WALK AWAY FOR THE DAY THAT THEY ARE CORRECTED. SO MAYBE THAT'S
- 6 A SUGGESTION THAT I COULD PUT FORWARD, IS THAT WHEN WE MAKE
- 7 OUR REPORT, THAT WE GET TIMELY FEEDBACK ON WHAT WE REPORT.

- 11 RAYMOND REGALADO: I MEAN, IF I CAN JUST SAY THIS ONE THAT
- 12 BROUGHT US TO THIS AREA HERE TODAY, YOU KNOW, WHAT WE SAW THE
- 13 NEWS HANGING AND THE, WHEN WE WERE MAKING THAT REPORT, IT
- 14 BROUGHT US HERE. AND I WOULD LIKE TO SAY THAT MAYBE THAT'S
- 15 MORE THE EXCEPTION THAN THE RULE, BUT DEFINITELY WHEN WE ARE
- 16 OUT THERE, WE DO GET THAT INFORMATION BACK AND WE GET IT QUICK
- 17 SO THAT WHEN WE GO OUT THERE AGAIN WE DON'T HAVE TO SEE OKAY
- 18 LET'S GO UP TO 4300 C AND SEE IF WE STILL DON'T HAVE HOT WATER
- 19 BECAUSE I'LL TELL YOU YOUR MOTION HAS SOME VERY COMPREHENSIVE
- 20 IDEAS AREAS THAT WE HAVE REPORTED ON. AND SOMETIMES WE SEE THE
- 21 REPEAT OF. BUT I AM THANKFUL THAT THIS CONVERSATION IS
- 22 HAPPENING BECAUSE WE TRULY HAVE THE BEST INTEREST OF THE
- 23 INCARCERATED.

- 3 WHO WORK THERE TO CREATE AN ENVIRONMENT WHERE THERE'S NO
- 4 CONFLICT, TO MINIMIZE WHATEVER CONFLICT SO THAT IT MAKES, YOU
- 5 KNOW, OUR LASD PARTNERS IN THIS WHOLE ENVIRONMENT, YOU KNOW,
- 6 KNOWING THAT WE WANT TO WORK WITH YOU. BUT WE HOPE THAT, YOU

17 RAYMOND REGALADO: JUST OVER 2 YEARS.

- 19 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: BECAUSE I KNOW ONE OF MY FORMER
- 20 COMMISSIONERS, PERCY DURAN, WAS ON THERE FOR SEVERAL DECADES,
- 21 AND HE WAS VERY, VERY ENTHUSIASTIC ABOUT SERVING BECAUSE HE
- 22 FELT IT WAS A DUTY.

- 24 RAYMOND REGALADO: YEAH, I'LL TELL YOU, I GO AFTER AN
- 25 INSPECTION AND I FEEL THAT WE'RE REALLY WORKING TO MAKE



- 1 CHANGE, POSITIVE CHANGE, IN A COMMUNITY THAT COULD VERY WELL,
- 2 WHO VERY WELL DESERVES THE CHANGE. YOU KNOW, THEY'RE THERE FOR
- 3 A REASON. LET'S NOT MAKE IT WORSE BY, YOU KNOW, HAVING
- 4 CONDITIONS THAT WE HAVE TO REPEAT AND GO OVER.

- 6 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU. THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE AND
- 7 IT'S VERY ENLIGHTENING TO HEAR THAT, YOUR COMMENT. SHERIFF,
- 8 YOU WANTED TO RESPOND?

- 10 ROBERT LUNA: YES MA'AM. FIRST, I'D LIKE TO THANK MR. REGALADO
- 11 FOR YOUR SERVICE AND WHAT YOU'RE DOING. I THINK YOU DO MAKE US
- 12 BETTER AND YOU DO MAKE A DIFFERENCE. BUT I ALSO, IN HEARING
- 13 WHAT I'M HEARING NOW, I ALWAYS START OFF WITH HOW CAN WE GET
- 14 BETTER? AND OBVIOUSLY COMMUNICATION CAN DEFINITELY BE BETTER
- 15 IN FOLLOWING UP, BUT JUST REAL QUICK REGARDING PLUMBING
- 16 BECAUSE IT'S COME UP A LOT. SO FOR FY 23 AND 24, OUR
- 17 FACILITIES SERVICES BUREAU RECEIVED 8,038 TOTAL REPAIR ORDERS
- 18 FOR MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL, AND 3,770 WERE PLUMBING RELATED, AND
- 19 THEY AVERAGED 2.74 HOURS TO REPAIR OR RESOLVE FOR PLUMBING.
- 20 AND I GOTTA TELL YOU, WHEN I FIRST GOT HERE AND I'M DOING MY
- 21 TOURS AND I SIT DOWN WITH INMATES AND LISTEN, NUMBER ONE
- 22 ISSUE, PLUMBING. SO, I WENT BACK TO MY STAFF BEING BRAND NEW
- 23 TO THE DEPARTMENT IN THE COUNTY, WHY ARE WE HAVING SO MANY
- 24 PLUMBING PROBLEMS? WELL, THE FIRST THING IS, WELL, IT'S MCJ,
- 25 OKAY, HOW DO WE FIX IT? AND NOT HAVING ALL THE BACKGROUND,



- 1 GOING BACK THROUGH CUTS OVER THE YEARS, ONE OF THE FIRST
- 2 THINGS THAT WAS CUT WAS MAINTENANCE FOR OUR CUSTODIAL
- 3 FACILITIES. SO, IN THIS YEAR'S BUDGET, WE HAVE 10 PLUMBERS FOR
- 4 CUSTODY. SO, YOUR WORK DIDN'T GO UNHEARD. IF THE REQUEST IS
- 5 FULFILLED, WE'LL HAVE 10 NEW PLUMBERS WHICH WILL ENHANCE THAT
- 6 TIME TO FIX THE PLUMBING CHALLENGES THAT WE DO FACE IN THIS
- 7 VERY OLD FACILITY. SO, THANK YOU FOR YOUR WORK.

- 9 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU. I WON'T ASK ANY MORE. I JUST
- 10 WANT TO AGAIN THANK YOU. I KNOW THERE'S A LOT OF HARD WORK TO
- 11 BE DONE AND MORE. AND THERE'S A LOT OF SACRIFICES THAT ARE
- 12 BEING MADE BY SOME OF OUR COUNTY STAFF OUT THERE HAVING BEEN
- 13 OUT ON THE GROUND IN MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL VISITING WITH SOME
- 14 INMATES, BUT ALSO VISITING WITH THE STAFF, NURSING AND DOCTORS
- 15 AND PSYCHIATRIC PHYSICIANS, AND REALLY SEEING HOW WHERE THEIR
- 16 HEART IS. SO, YOU WOULD BE COMPELLED TO HEAR SOME OF THE
- 17 STORIES THAT THEY HAVE TO SAY. BUT AGAIN, THE CONDITIONS THERE
- 18 ARE DEPLORABLE. I DON'T THINK THERE IS A CHOICE FOR US TO KEEP
- 19 IT OPERATING FOREVER AND EVER. I WON'T BE HERE FOREVER AND
- 20 EVER AND EVER. BUT I'VE ALREADY BEEN HERE 9 ½ AND WE SAID WE
- 21 WERE GOING TO GET RID OF IT, LIKE 7 YEARS AGO, AND IT'S STILL
- 22 STANDING. SO, I HOPE THAT WE CAN GET THERE WITH THIS, WITH THE
- 23 ENERGY ON THE BOARD AND WITH THE, WITH ALL OF YOU AS WELL AS

- 4 YOU AGAIN.

6 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR HAHN.

- 8 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. AND YEAH, YOU KNOW,
- 9 IT IS NICE THAT WE HAVE A SPACE THAT WE CAN TALK ABOUT THIS.
- 10 IT'S UNFORTUNATE IN A WAY THAT WE DIDN'T REALLY FOCUS ON WHAT
- 11 THIS AGENDA ITEM WAS, WAS SPECIFICALLY TALKING ABOUT THE
- 12 CONDITIONS IN THE JAIL. BECAUSE IT'S VERY HARD FOR US TO TALK
- 13 ABOUT THE JAIL WITHOUT GOING OFF ON TALKING ABOUT REDUCING THE
- 14 JAIL POPULATION, DIVERSION, YOU KNOW, CLOSING MEN'S CENTRAL
- 15 JAIL, YOU KNOW, WHAT TO DO IN ITS STEAD. BUT I WAS GOING TO
- 16 ALSO CALL ON RAY BECAUSE YOU WERE KIND OF SITTING HERE THE
- 17 WHOLE TIME AND I REALIZED THAT THE MOTION ASKED FOR THIS WHOLE
- 18 PANEL TO REPORT ON THE CONDITIONS, BUT IT FELT LIKE WE GOT A
- 19 LITTLE OFF TOPIC FROM THE WORK THAT THE CIVIL BRAND COMMISSION
- 20 HAS DONE. SO, THANK YOU. BY THE WAY, RAY WAS A COMMISSIONER ON
- 21 THE HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION FOR MANY YEARS FIRST, THE
- 22 COUNTY HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION, AND THEN HE'S NOW ON THE
- 23 SYBIL BRAND. BUT I THINK YOUR SKILLS IN HUMAN RELATIONS AND
- 24 DIPLOMACY CERTAINLY PLAY INTO YOUR WORK AS A SYBIL BRAND
- 25 COMMISSION. REMEMBER, THERE REALLY ACTUALLY WAS A SYBIL BRAND,



- 1 RIGHT? AND SHE, WHEN MY DAD WAS A SUPERVISOR, RIGHT? AND SHE
- 2 ON HER OWN WALKED THROUGH THE WOMEN'S JAIL AT THE TIME AND
- 3 REPORTED BACK TO HIM THE DEPLORABLE CONDITIONS OF WOMEN HAVING
- 4 TO SLEEP ON THE FLOORS OF THE WOMEN'S JAIL. AND THAT'S REALLY
- 5 HOW IT GOT STARTED WAS WHY DON'T WE HAVE A CITIZEN'S
- 6 COMMISSION THAT REGULARLY THEIR ONLY JOB IS TO INSPECT OUR
- 7 JAILS. AND IT IS VERY TOUGH WORK AS YOU DESCRIBED RAY, BUT SO
- 8 VALUABLE. AND WE JUST REALLY WANT TO THANK YOU AND THE OTHER
- 9 COMMISSIONERS FOR THAT WORK. BUT READING WHAT BROUGHT US HERE
- 10 AND SOME OF THE THINGS THAT YOU SAID, THAT LIST, BROKEN
- 11 TOILETS IN CELLS, MOLD AND MILDEW IN PLACES, RATS AND
- 12 COCKROACHES IN CELLS, MISSING EYEGLASSES, MISSED MEDICAL
- 13 APPOINTMENTS, FAILURES TO CONTACT CONSULATES FOR FOREIGN
- 14 NATIONALS, DETAINEES IN NEED OF IMMEDIATE MEDICAL CARE, NON-
- 15 FUNCTIONING CELL DOORS, PUTTING BOTH THOSE IN CUSTODY AND THE
- 16 STAFF AT RISK. HUNGER DUE TO INADEQUATE OR SPOILED FOOD.
- 17 FLOODING RESULTING FROM PLUMBING ISSUES. DIRTY BUG-INFESTED
- 18 SINK WATER. STORAGE SHORTAGE OF GRIEVANCE FORMS. INSUFFICIENT
- 19 AND BROKEN CLEANING SUPPLIES. TRANSGENDER INDIVIDUALS REPORTED
- 20 NOT BEING PROVIDED APPROPRIATE CLOTHING. SO AGAIN, WE TALKED A
- 21 LOT ABOUT A LOT OF THINGS, AND I THINK WE'RE ALL CLEAR ABOUT
- 22 CLOSING MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL. I'D LIKE TO SEE A MENTAL HEALTH
- 23 TREATMENT FACILITY RISE UP. BUT IN THE MEANTIME, THAT'S WHAT
- 24 THIS ITEM IS ABOUT. THAT'S WHAT THE MOTION IS TODAY. IT'S IN
- 25 THE MEANTIME, HOW ARE WE TREATING THESE INMATES, THOSE WHO ARE



- 1 IN CUSTODY, WHO ARE IN OUR CARE. AND, YOU KNOW, WHAT YOU'RE
- 2 DESCRIBING IS UNACCEPTABLE. IT'S UNACCEPTABLE FOR US. NO
- 3 MATTER WHAT GOOD INTENTIONS WE HAVE ON CLOSING, WHAT GOOD
- 4 INTENTIONS WE HAVE OF REALIZING THAT IT'S ONE OF THE LARGEST
- 5 MENTAL HEALTH FACILITIES HAS ENDED UP BEING OUR JAIL. NO
- 6 MATTER ALL THAT, WHILE THEY'RE IN OUR CUSTODY, WE HAVE A MORAL
- 7 OBLIGATION TO TREAT THEM WITH THE UTMOST KINDNESS, RESPECT,
- 8 AND HUMANITY. AND FROM WHAT OUR SYBIL BRAND COMMISSION IS
- 9 TELLING US, THAT'S NOT THE CASE. AND YOU KNOW, WISH WE COULD
- 10 HAVE SPENT MORE TIME TODAY ACTUALLY TALKING ABOUT THIS ITEM,
- 11 WHICH WAS THE CONDITIONS. I MEAN, I THINK THE CONDITIONS ARE
- 12 SPURRINESS, WITH ALL URGENCY, YOU KNOW, FIGURE OUT HOW TO
- 13 CLOSE IT. BUT AGAIN, IN THE MEANTIME, NONE OF US CAN BE HAPPY
- 14 WITH WHAT WE'RE HEARING TODAY. AND I KNOW, SHERIFF, YOU'RE
- 15 HEARING IT TOO, AND I KNOW YOU'RE NOT HAPPY EITHER. BUT FOR A
- 16 MONTH LATER TO NOT HAVE HOT WATER IN THE SAME FACILITY,
- 17 WHETHER OR NOT SOME OF THE OTHER PLUMBING REQUESTS GOT
- 18 FULFILLED EARLIER, YOU KNOW, THAT'S UNBELIEVABLE TO HAVE A
- 19 NOOSE THAT THE COMMISSION FOUND. AND YOU SAID IT WAS ONLY
- 20 BECAUSE YOU BROUGHT IT TO THE ATTENTION OF ONE OF THE DEPUTIES
- 21 THAT WAS FINALLY TAKEN DOWN. THE OTHER THINGS THAT YOU
- 22 OBSERVED WHICH WERE HIGHLY INAPPROPRIATE AT A DEPUTIES
- 23 WORKSPACE. SO, YOU'RE REALLY UNCOVERING DEPLORABLE CONDITIONS
- 24 AND I APPRECIATE THAT YOU HAVE RAISED THEM TO OUR LEVEL, BUT
- 25 IT DOES FEEL A LITTLE BIT LIKE TO ME, LIKE THE COMMISSION IS



- 1 NOT BEING AS RESPECTED, IN MY OPINION, OR RESPONDED TO IN AN
- 2 APPROPRIATE WAY. TO EVEN ASK THEM TO FOLLOW UP WITH OTHER
- 3 CAPTAINS OR WHOEVER IN THE JAIL IS NOT REALLY THE RIGHT
- 4 RESPONSE. IT SEEMS LIKE THAT SHOULD BE THE SHERIFF'S
- 5 DEPARTMENT RESPONSIBILITY TO FOLLOW UP ONCE YOU HEAR A
- 6 COMPLAINT. LET ME JUST TALK ABOUT ONE OF THE CONCERNS WAS
- 7 PEOPLE SEEING THEIR MENTAL HEALTH CLINICIANS. AND DR.
- 8 BELAVICH, I WAS GOING TO ASK YOU LAST YEAR, THE CIVIL BRAND
- 9 COMMISSION FOUND THAT PEOPLE WITH THE LOW-LEVEL P2 DESIGNATION
- 10 HAD TO WAIT AN AVERAGE OF 47 DAYS TO BE SEEN BY A
- 11 PSYCHIATRIST. WHAT'S THAT LIKE NOW, AND IS THE AVERAGE TIME
- 12 ANY SHORTER?

- 14 DR. TIMOTHY BELAVICH: YES, THE AVERAGE TIME IS SIGNIFICANTLY
- 15 SHORTER. AT THIS POINT, WE'VE CHANGED SOME OF OUR STAFFING
- 16 MODEL BECAUSE WE HAVE OBTAINED MORE PSYCHIATRIC STAFF AND SO
- 17 THE PREDOMINANT NUMBER OF OUR P2S, P3S, THEY'RE SEEN IN THE
- 18 IRC WITHIN 24 HOURS. THOSE THAT ARE NOT, THE EXPECTATION IS
- 19 THAT THEY ARE, P2 IS SEEN WITHIN 7 DAYS BY THEIR PSYCHIATRIST.
- 20 AND WE HIT THAT OVER 90% OF THE TIME WHEREVER THE INDIVIDUAL
- 21 IS. ALSO, FOR P2S, ONCE THEY'RE ON MEDICATIONS AND STABLE, THE
- 22 EXPECTATION IS THAT PSYCHIATRY FOLLOWS UP WITH THEM AT LEAST
- 23 EVERY 90 DAYS. AND IT'S A VERY HIGH PERCENTAGE, OVER 90%, THAT
- 24 IS GETTING THAT VISIT ON A REGULAR BASIS AS WELL. SO, A LOT OF
- 25 THAT'S BEEN RESOLVED. THERE ARE 7 PSYCHIATRIC PROVIDERS AT



1 THIS POINT OVER IN MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL.

- 3 SUP. JANICE HAHN: AND SUPERVISOR SOLIS AND I INTRODUCED A
- 4 MOTION IN SEPTEMBER OF LAST YEAR SUGGESTING THAT INCENTIVES BE
- 5 LOOKED INTO TO EXPAND THE NUMBER OF MENTAL HEALTH ASSISTANCE
- 6 IN THE FORENSIC IMPATIENT STEP-DOWN PROGRAM. CAN YOU GIVE US
- 7 AN UPDATE MAYBE ON THE PROGRESS OF THAT REQUEST?

- 9 DR. TIMOTHY BELAVICH: YES. THAT PROGRAM IS IN TWIN TOWERS AND
- 10 AT CRDF FOR THE FEMALES. AND CURRENTLY, WE HAVE ACTUALLY 16
- 11 PODS IN TWIN TOWERS THAT HOUSE FIPP STEP-DOWNS. AND WE HAVE 22
- 12 MENTAL HEALTH ASSISTANTS WORKING IN THAT PROGRAM OR RECRUITED
- 13 FOR THAT PROGRAM. AT CRDF, THERE ARE 4 PODS FOR THE FEMALES,
- 14 AND THERE ARE CURRENTLY 14 MENTAL HEALTH ASSISTANTS EITHER
- 15 FULLY THERE OR BEEN RECRUITED. THERE'S BEEN A DEVELOPMENT OF
- 16 AN INTERDISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE THAT INDIVIDUALS ARE CONSIDERED
- 17 BASED ON THEIR, CLEARED BASED ON THEIR CUSTODY BACKGROUND.
- 18 ONCE THEY'RE CLEARED, THEY CAN APPLY, AND THE COMMITTEE IN AN
- 19 INTERDISCIPLINARY WAY MAKES RECOMMENDATIONS AS TO WHO MENTAL
- 20 HEALTH ASSISTANCE SHOULD BECOME. SO, IT'S BEEN, I THINK, QUITE
- 21 SUCCESSFUL.

- 23 SUP. JANICE HAHN: OKAY, GOOD. AND THEN I WAS JUST GONNA SAY,
- 24 YOU KNOW, WE'VE DONE SO MUCH ON THIS BOARD. WE'VE REALLY
- 25 EXPANDED OUR CRISIS RESPONSE TO PEOPLE WHO ARE HAVING MENTAL



- 1 HEALTH CRISIS OUT IN THE COMMUNITY. WE'VE PUT A LOT OF WORK
- 2 BEHIND THAT. WHAT HELP, OR DO YOU HAVE TEAMS OF CLINICIANS
- 3 AVAILABLE IN OUR JAILS TO RESPOND TO SOMEBODY MAYBE WHO'S
- 4 HAVING AN URGENT MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS MELTDOWN?
- 5 DR. TIMOTHY BELAVICH: YES, IN MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL, UP AT
- 6 PITCHES, AND AT CRDF, WE ALL HAVE A PROGRAM CALLED JMET. IT
- 7 MIRRORS WHAT WE SEE IN THE COMMUNITY WITH CUSTODY AND
- 8 CLINICIANS WHO WORK WITH INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE NOT NECESSARILY
- 9 ENROLLED IN MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS. AND THOSE CLINICIANS,
- 10 THEIR JOB IS TO RESPOND TO EMERGENCIES DURING THE HOURS OF
- 11 USUALLY AROUND 6 IN THE MORNING UNTIL 9 AT NIGHT. AND AFTER
- 12 THAT OUR IRC, WHICH IS STAFF 24-7 HANDLES EMERGENCIES. BUT
- 13 ALSO, PART OF THEIR FUNCTION IS DOING WHAT WE CALL A ROW
- 14 WALKS. THEY ARE WALKING THE TIERS, THEY'RE WALKING THE HOUSING
- 15 UNITS, INTERACTING AND TALKING TO PEOPLE, LOOKING FOR PEOPLE
- 16 WHO MAY NOT HAVE BEEN IDENTIFIED AS HAVING A MENTAL HEALTH
- 17 ISSUE THAT NEED TO BE BROUGHT INTO MENTAL HEALTH. AND THEN IN
- 18 THE MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS, WE HAVE THE STAFF THERE WHO ARE
- 19 SEEING THEIR PATIENTS AND ALWAYS AWARE OF THE POSSIBILITY OF
- 20 EMERGENCIES THAT ARISE.

- 22 SUP. JANICE HAHN: RIGHT, WELL, I APPRECIATE THAT. WE DO KNOW
- 23 THAT THERE ARE SO MANY WHO ARE INCARCERATED WHO HAVE MENTAL
- 24 HEALTH CHALLENGES. WE KNOW THAT'S A HUGE PART OF THE
- 25 POPULATION. AND I KNOW WE'VE HEARD OVER AND OVER AGAIN, YOU



- 1 CAN'T GET WELL IN A CELL, RIGHT? AND YET, YOU KNOW, WITH THEM
- 2 BEING THERE, WE DO HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO REALLY WORK WITH
- 3 THEIR MENTAL HEALTH, PARTICULARLY THOSE WHO ARE IN A CRISIS
- 4 SITUATION. SO THANK YOU FOR THAT. WELL, THANK YOU TO THE
- 5 PANEL. AND I JUST REALLY WANT TO THANK RAY REGALADO AND YOUR
- 6 FELLOW COMMISSIONERS, THE SYBIL BRAND INSPECTION COMMISSION.
- 7 YOU ARE REALLY DOING GOOD WORK. YOU ARE CLEARLY ADVOCATING ON
- 8 BEHALF OF THOSE WHO ARE INCARCERATED. AND YOU'VE GOT A VERY
- 9 UNIOUE, THIS IS A UNIOUE COMMISSION. IT'S REALLY NOT LIKE ANY
- 10 OF OUR OTHER COMMISSIONS, BUT IT'S IMPORTANT WORK. APPRECIATE
- 11 MY SUPERVISORS WHO BROUGHT THIS FORWARD TO DISCUSS THIS
- 12 REPORT. AND I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE CONTINUE TO ELEVATE
- 13 THAT COMMISSION'S REPORT IN ANY WAY WE CAN. THANK YOU.

15 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR BARGER.

- 17 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THANK YOU. AND I JUST WANTED THE COUPLE
- 18 OF THINGS THAT CAME TO MIND, MY STAFF REMINDED ME AND I WANT
- 19 TO THANK YOU JUDGE ARMSTEAD BECAUSE THE POINTS WE'RE TALKING
- 20 ABOUT REGARDING STATE LEGISLATION AS WELL AS THE COURTS DID
- 21 COME UP, AND YOU DID BRING THAT UP AS FACTORS THAT NEED TO BE
- 22 CONSIDERED. AND THEN TO MY ESTEEMED COLLEAGUES, TO PROFESSOR
- 23 MITCHELL, YOU'RE ASKING WHAT THIS BOARD CAN DO. THIS BOARD CAN
- 24 TAKE THE FACTS THAT 75% OF THOSE THAT THE SHERIFF IS NOW
- 25 SAYING CANNOT BE DIVERTED, ALTHOUGH I THINK THAT NUMBER IS



- 1 GOING TO BE LOWER BECAUSE OF PRETRIAL. YEAH. AND SO I THINK
- 2 THAT, AND THEN ASK THAT THEY WORK WITH PUBLIC DEFENDER,
- 3 ALTERNATE PUBLIC DEFENDER COURTS. I DON'T THINK THE COURTS
- 4 WANNA BE AT THE TABLE BECAUSE THEY DON'T FEEL THAT THAT'S
- 5 THEIR ROLE, AS I RECALL. AND THE SHERIFF, AS WELL AS MENTAL
- 6 HEALTH AND HEALTH, BRING US WHAT THAT WOULD LOOK LIKE.

- 8 AND KNOWING THAT WE NOW HAVE A CONSENSUS THAT WE RECOGNIZE
- 9 THAT WE NEED TO HAVE REPLACEMENT, THE QUESTION IS WHERE, THEN
- 10 WE LOOK AT PLACES. I KNOW THAT THERE ARE THOSE THAT HAVE
- 11 THROWN AROUND PITCHES. WE CAN THROW AROUND THE CURRENT CAMPUS
- 12 OF MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL BECAUSE I KNOW THAT THE DISCUSSION WAS

- 12 THAT CAME FROM THE MOST RECENT REPORT. SO, WE ACTUALLY DID

- 23 THANK YOU FOR INVITING ME TO THIS CONVERSATION. EVEN IF IT WAS
- 24 BASED ON A TEXT, I WAS PREPARED TO DO PUBLIC COMMENT. I'M

- 4 DIVERTING EVERYBODY WHO'S DIVERTIBLE OUT OF THE JAIL ALSO
- 5 TAKES SOME TIME. AND DURING THE TIME THAT THOSE 2 THINGS ARE
- 6 TAKING SOME TIME, IT'S IMPORTANT FOR THE PUBLIC DEFENDER TO
- 7 SAY THAT OUR CLIENTS DESERVE TO LIVE HUMANELY AND TO NOT BE

- 18 MET WITH RETALIATION THEIR MENTAL HEALTH DRASTICALLY SUFFERS.
- 19 EARLIER Y'ALL WERE TRYING TO FIGURE OUT HOW LASD CAN IMPROVE
- 20 CONDITIONS VIA NEW POLICIES BUT PLEASE RECOGNIZE THAT THEY
- 21 ALREADY HAVE MANDATED TITLE 15 SAFETY CHECKS FOR BOTH MENTAL

- 11 WE CERTAINLY HAVE AN ESTEEMED PANEL HERE BEFORE US. IF YOU
- 12 WOULD PLEASE INTRODUCE YOURSELVES AS YOU MAKE YOUR REPORT. I
- 13 THINK IT WAS OUR EXPECTATION YOU MIGHT PROVIDE A PRESENTATION
- 14 FIRST OR DO WE WANT TO JUST, OKAY, WE'LL TURN TO YOU FOR A
- 15 PRESENTATION FIRST AND THEN I WILL GO TO SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.

- 17 MYRON JOHNSON: GOOD MORNING OR GOOD AFTERNOON. I'M SORRY, BEEN
- 18 HERE SINCE THE MORNING, BUT GOOD AFTERNOON. YOU KNOW, I'D LIKE
- 19 TO FIRST ACKNOWLEDGE THAT THIS VERY COMPREHENSIVE CEO REPORT
- 20 BACK DELVES INTO SEVERAL KEY AREAS AND LISTS SOME VERY COMPLEX
- 21 CHALLENGES THAT ALL OF OUR DEPARTMENTS ARE FACING IN DEALING
- 22 WITH THESE ISSUES WITHIN OUR COMMUNITY. IN READING THE REPORT,
- 23 IT LAYS THE FOUNDATION OF THE OPPORTUNITIES TO IMPROVE OUR
- 24 LEGISLATIVE EFFORTS, OUR INFRASTRUCTURE, DESIGN AND STRENGTHEN
- 25 OUR COLLABORATION AMONGST ALL THE AGENCIES REPRESENTED HERE



- 1 TODAY. BUT IN THIS PRESENTATION, I'D LIKE TO TAKE A FEW
- 2 MOMENTS TO DESCRIBE THE RISE IN PUBLIC CONCERN AND THE IMPACTS
- 3 THAT THESE ISSUES HAVE ON OUR COMMUNITIES' MEMBERS AS WELL AS
- 4 OUR RESPONDING PERSONNEL. I WOULD LIKE TO TOUCH A LITTLE BIT
- 5 ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT'S EDUCATION AND ENFORCEMENT EFFORTS. AND
- 6 THEN I WOULD LIKE TO CONCLUDE BY AREAS WHERE I FEEL OR WE FEEL
- 7 THAT WE COULD GET A LITTLE HELP FROM THE BOARD AS WELL AS THE
- 8 PUBLIC TO HELP US ADDRESS THIS ISSUE IN A COLLABORATIVE
- 9 FASHION. SO IN TERMS OF SOME OF THE DANGEROUS TRENDS THAT
- 10 WE'RE OBSERVING WHEN IT COMES TO STREET RACING AND SIDESHOWS,
- 11 AS A NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS HAVE INCREASED, ASSAULTS,
- 12 SHOOTINGS, PEDESTRIANS STRUCK BY VEHICLES DOING DONUTS OR
- 13 DRIFTING IN THE STREET, THOSE HAVE ALSO RISEN AND THAT'S A
- 14 SERIOUS CONCERN OF OURS. WE'RE ALSO SEEING A TREND WHERE THE
- 15 INDIVIDUALS PARTICIPATING ARE DISABLING THE FIRE HYDRANTS AT
- 16 SOME OF OUR INTERSECTIONS WHICH OBVIOUSLY CAUSES A CONCERN FOR
- 17 FIRE IN THE EVENT THAT FIRE TOOK PLACE AND THEY HAVE TO PUT
- 18 OUT A FIRE NEARBY COMPROMISES THE A HYDRANT SYSTEM. AND WE
- 19 ALSO SEE THAT FLASH CRIMES ARE BEING COMMITTED. THEY'RE
- 20 ASSOCIATED WITH STREET TAKEOVERS AND STREET ROBBERIES. I'M
- 21 SORRY, STREET TAKEOVERS AND SIDESHOWS, EXCUSE ME. THEY'RE
- 22 ROBBERIES THAT ARE ASSOCIATED WITH THAT AS WELL. AND WE ALL
- 23 KNOW SOME OF THE BUSINESSES RECENTLY THAT HAVE MADE THE NEWS
- 24 THAT HAVE BEEN IMPACTED BY THIS CRIME, RUBEN'S BAKERY IN THE
- 25 CITY OF COMPTON. RECENTLY WE HAD A WING STOP IN L.A. CITY'S



- 1 AREA THAT WAS IMPACTED, 7-ELEVENS IN SOME OF OUR JURISDICTIONS
- 2 AS WELL, ALL ATTACKED RESULTING FROM STREET TAKEOVERS AND SIDE
- 3 SHOWS. NOW DANGER TO OUR LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL, OUR
- 4 RESPONDERS, CHP, DEPUTIES, LAPD, WE'RE SEEING WHERE OFFICERS
- 5 ARE FREQUENTLY BECOMING SURROUNDED AS THEY ADDRESS THESE TYPES
- 6 OF ISSUES. I MEAN, YOU HAVE PEDESTRIANS AND PARTICIPANTS
- 7 STANDING IN FRONT OF THE PATROL VEHICLES REFUSING TO MOVE,
- 8 VANDALIZING THE VEHICLES, KICKING IT, THROWING FIREWORKS ON
- 9 IT, BREAKING OUT THE WINDOWS OF THE PATROL VEHICLE. WE'RE
- 10 SEEING THAT, WHICH IS AN OBVIOUS CONCERN FOR OUR RESPONDERS.
- 11 PATROL CARS INTENTIONALLY BEING RAMMED BY STOLEN VEHICLES. A
- 12 LOT OF THE VEHICLES WE ENCOUNTER AT THESE TYPES OF EVENTS ARE
- 13 STOLEN. AND ONCE A DEPUTY OR OFFICER PULLS THAT CAR OVER, SOON
- 14 AS HE OR SHE GETS OUT OF THE CAR TO CONTACT THE OCCUPANT, IT
- 15 GOES IN REVERSE AND IT SLAMS INTO THE FRONT OF OUR RADIO CAR
- 16 BEFORE TAKING OFF. SO, WE'RE SEEING A RISE IN THE VIOLENCE IN
- 17 THIS, AND OBVIOUSLY THIS IS A SERIOUS CONCERN. ANOTHER ONE IS
- 18 LASER BEAMS ARE BEING USED TOWARDS OUR DEPUTIES AS WELL AS OUR
- 19 HELICOPTERS OVERHEAD WHO ARE ALSO ATTEMPTING TO DISPERSE
- 20 CROWDS OR GIVE THE GROUND UNITS SOME INTELLIGENCE ABOUT WHERE
- 21 THESE CROWDS ARE GOING. SO THAT'S A CONCERN OF OURS AS WELL.
- 22 NOW, A TRANSITION TO A LITTLE BIT OF OUR ENFORCEMENT EFFORTS.
- 23 SO, UNDER SHERIFF LUNA, WE HAVE A CRIME STRATEGY UNIT. AND
- 24 THIS UNIT IS TASKED WITH EVALUATING THE DEPARTMENT'S RESPONSE
- 25 TO THESE TYPES OF EVENTS. THIS UNIT IS GOING TO BE GATHERING



- 1 INTELLIGENCE, SEEKING OUT BEST PRACTICES FROM ACROSS THE
- 2 NATION BECAUSE THIS IS A NATIONAL ISSUE. AND LOOKING AT
- 3 DIFFERENT WAYS, DIFFERENT CITIES AND MUNICIPALITIES ARE
- 4 HANDLING THESE TYPES OF EVENTS. THEY'RE GONNA BE RESEARCHING
- 5 NEW TECHNOLOGY THAT'S OUT THERE, ROADWAY MODIFICATIONS BEING
- 6 DONE BY LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES ACROSS THE NATION. SO, THEIR
- 7 REPORT IS GONNA BE CRITICAL IN REDIRECTING OUR RESPONSE IN
- 8 DEALING WITH THIS EPIDEMIC THAT'S BEEN STRIKING OUR STREETS.
- 9 WE'RE ALSO SUPPORTING LEGISLATION IN SACRAMENTO. THERE ARE 2
- 10 BILLS THAT ARE BEING PUSHED THROUGH RIGHT NOW. THERE'S AB 1978
- 11 AND THERE'S AB 3085. AND THESE 2 BILLS WOULD MAKE IT EASIER TO
- 12 IMPOUND AND SEIZE VEHICLES AT STREET TAKEOVERS AND SIDESHOW
- 13 RACING EVENTS WHO BARRICADE THE STREETS OR THE PARKING LOTS
- 14 FOR THE PURPOSE OF FACILITATING THE STREET RACING ACTIVITY.
- 15 AND AS YOU KNOW, WE PARTICIPATE IN A JOINT TASK FORCE WITH
- 16 LAPD AND CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY PATROL, EXCUSE ME, AND THAT'S
- 17 FUNDED BY GRANT MONIES THAT WE'RE USING. IT'S UNDER THE TITLE
- 18 OF A STEP GRANT, OUR SELECTIVE TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM
- 19 GRANT. NOW, THIS GRANT IS SET TO EXPIRE IN SEPTEMBER OF THIS
- 20 YEAR. SO, WE'RE GOING TO BE LOOKING AT, FOR THE NEXT GRANT
- 21 PHASE, REALLOCATING MORE FUNDS TO ADDRESS THIS ISSUE BECAUSE
- 22 IT'S RISEN TO THAT LEVEL TO WHERE WE REALLY NEED TO DEDICATE
- 23 ALL OF OUR RESOURCES TO ADDRESS THIS EPIDEMIC, AGAIN, THAT'S
- 24 WREAKING HAVOC IN OUR COMMUNITIES. OUR DEPUTIES WHO ENFORCE
- 25 THE VEHICLE CODE ARE CONSISTENT WITH CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY PATROL



- 1 IN OUR UNINCORPORATED AREA. THEY USE THE VEHICLE CODE AS THE
- 2 SECTIONS FOR PARTICIPATING AS WELL AS SPECTATORS TO BE
- 3 CONSISTENT SINCE WE WORK TOGETHER IN OUR UNINCORPORATED AREA.
- 4 WE'VE ALSO ADAPTED THAT POSTURE AS WELL. AND THEN WHAT I'D
- 5 LIKE TO DO NOW IS DISCUSS SOME OF OUR PUBLIC AWARENESS AND
- 6 EDUCATION EFFORTS. AND AS I'VE BEEN SPEAKING, SOME OF THE
- 7 SLIDES HAVE BEEN GOING ACROSS THE SCREEN. AND WHAT YOU'RE
- 8 LOOKING AT NOW IS OUR LASD MOTORSPORTS, WHICH IS A 501-3C, OR
- 9 C-3 ORGANIZATION THAT WORKS WITH YOUTH. THEY DISCUSS THE
- 10 DANGER OF ILLEGAL STREET RACING ACTIVITY AND HAVE BEEN VERY
- 11 EFFECTIVE IN COLLABORATING WITH STREET RACING KILLS, THAT
- 12 ORGANIZATION TO HELP GET THE MESSAGE OUT TO OUR YOUTH THAT
- 13 THIS IS A DANGEROUS HOBBY. THERE'S SAFER PLACES TO DO IT. AND
- 14 WE'RE HERE TO GIVE YOU THOSE SAFER OPTIONS AS OPPOSED TO BEING
- 15 ON OUR STREETS CONDUCTING THIS ACTIVITY. SO, THE DEPARTMENT'S
- 16 RESPONSE TO THE YOUTH AND THE EDUCATION EFFORTS ARE
- 17 HIGHLIGHTED THERE AND I'M VERY PROUD OF THE DEPARTMENT'S
- 18 EFFORTS IN THAT REGARD. LASTLY, THERE'S A VIDEO THAT I'D LIKE
- 19 TO SHOW YOU THAT OUR VIDEO PRODUCTION UNIT PUT OUT AND IT WAS
- 20 ACTUALLY NOMINATED FOR AN EMMY IN PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT
- 21 CATEGORY THAT I THINK IS VERY EDUCATIONAL FOR THE PUBLIC AS
- 22 WELL AS INFORMATIVE FOR THE YOUTH INVOLVED IN THIS TYPE OF
- 23 ACTIVITY. SO IF I COULD GET THAT VIDEO PLAYED NOW I WOULD
- 24 GREATLY APPRECIATE IT.

- 24 CURRENTLY THERE'S A \$500 FEE FOR SPECTATORS AND I KNOW SOME OF
- 25 OUR CITIES THAT WE CONTRACT SERVICES WITH HAVE ADMINISTRATIVE



- 1 CITATIONS THAT ARE ELEVATED AND IT SERVES AS A STRONG
- 2 DETERRENT TO PARTICIPANTS AS WELL AS SPECTATORS IN THESE TYPES
- 3 OF EVENTS. AND THEN LASTLY, WE'D LIKE TO LOOK AT THE
- 4 FEASIBILITY OF DEVELOPING AN ORDINANCE THAT WOULD ADDRESS SOME
- 5 OF THE BUSINESSES. AND WHEN I SAY THAT, I MEAN THE MECHANIC
- 6 SHOPS, THE AUTO PARTS SHOPS THAT STAY OPEN AFTER HOURS TO
- 7 FACILITATE THIS TYPE OF ACTIVITY. WE'RE SEEING A RISE IN THAT.
- 8 WHERE TIRE SHOPS, MECHANICS SHOPS ARE OPENING, YOU KNOW, 2, 3
- 9 IN THE MORNING, MERELY TO SUPPORT THE STREET RACING EFFORTS.
- 10 SO, IF THERE WERE SOME LEGISLATION OR ORDINANCES THAT WOULD
- 11 HELP US FOCUS ON THAT BUSINESS ENFORCEMENT ASPECT OF THIS,
- 12 THAT WOULD BE GREATLY APPRECIATED AS WELL. SO, I KNOW I ONLY
- 13 HAVE 10 MINUTES, SO I'D LIKE TO CONCLUDE WITH SOME STATS THAT
- 14 I THINK ARE PRETTY POSITIVE FOR OUR DEPARTMENT IN ADDRESSING
- 15 THIS ISSUE, ALTHOUGH, YOU KNOW, IF THERE'S ONE STREET RACING
- 16 ACTIVITY IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD, IT'S 100% INCREASE. BUT IN THE
- 17 FIRST QUARTER OF 2024, THE DEPARTMENT RESPONDED TO 289
- 18 REPORTED STREET TAKEOVER EVENTS OCCURRING IN OUR AREA OF
- 19 RESPONSIBILITY. IN THE SECOND QUARTER, APRIL THROUGH JUNE OF
- 20 THIS YEAR, THAT NUMBER DROPPED TO 245. SO, IT'S A SLIGHT
- 21 DECREASE BY 17, 15.2%. WE WILL TAKE THAT AS A VICTORY.
- 22 COMPTON, WE SAW SHOW THE BIGGEST INCREASE WITH 17 ADDITIONAL
- 23 REPORTED EVENTS. I'M SORRY, THE BIGGEST, YEAH, 17, EXCUSE ME.
- 24 AND THEN CARSON SHOWED THE BIGGEST DECREASE WITH 61 FEWER
- 25 EVENTS FROM THE FIRST QUARTER SO CARSON IN SPEAKING TO CITY



- 1 OFFICIALS AS WELL AS THE DEPUTIES THERE ARE ATTRIBUTING THAT
- 2 TO THE ZERO TOLERANCE POSTURE UTILIZING THE VEHICLE CODE AND
- 3 THEN AGAIN I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT TO REMEMBER THAT THESE
- 4 SECTIONS THAT WE'RE ISSUING CITATIONS FOR ARE FOR THE
- 5 INDIVIDUALS WHO REFUSE TO DISPERSE, THE INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE
- 6 ACTIVELY COMMITTING CRIMES, ACTIVELY ENGAGED IN THE ILLICIT
- 7 ACTIVITY THAT WE SEE THAT'S MOST DANGEROUS, AND THOSE SITES
- 8 WERE REFLECTED IN THAT REGARD. SO, WITH THAT, I'LL TURN IT
- 9 OVER TO THE BOARD IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS.

- 11 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR THAT REPORT
- 12 AND FOR SHARING YOUR VIDEO WITH US. I ASSUME THAT'S SOMETHING
- 13 THAT'S SHAREABLE. SO, I APPRECIATE THAT. AND I WILL TURN IT TO
- 14 SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, WHO I KNOW HAS REALLY BEEN WORKING ON
- 15 THIS ISSUE TIRELESSLY.

- 18 CHAIR. MADAM CEO, WERE YOU JUST GONNA BE AVAILABLE FOR

- 21 FESIA DAVENPORT: I WAS ORIGINALLY PLANNING TO OPEN UP THE
- 22 DISCUSSION AND GIVE YOU SOME BACKGROUND ON THE REPORT, BUT I
- 23 THINK IN CONSIDERATION OF THE TIME, AND I THINK THEY STATED
- 24 SOME OF THE HIGHLIGHTS THAT WE WERE GONNA POINT OUT IN MY
- 25 OPENING REMARKS.



- 2 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: OKAY, ALL RIGHT, THANK YOU. SO, I
- 3 WANNA THANK ALL OF THE WORK THAT'S BEEN DONE. I WANNA THANK
- 4 THE COMMUNITY MEMBERS THAT CAME TO OUR COMMUNITY MEETING IN
- 5 FEBRUARY AND THE SYMPOSIUM IN MAY. I'LL HAVE TO GIVE YOU SOME
- 6 PICTURES SO YOU CAN INCLUDE THAT IN YOUR POWERPOINT
- 7 PRESENTATION. BECAUSE WE HAD ALMOST 400 PEOPLE BETWEEN THE 2
- 8 EVENTS WHERE WE WERE ASKING COMMUNITY PEOPLE AND COMMUNITIES
- 9 THAT HAVE BEEN IMPACTED TO COME AND LEND THEIR VOICE TO BEING
- 10 A PART OF THE SOLUTION. SO, I WANNA THANK TO ALL THE COUNTY
- 11 DEPARTMENTS, SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND ALL WHO ARE COMING
- 12 TOGETHER BECAUSE THIS REALLY IS LIKE ALL THE ISSUES WE'VE
- 13 TALKED ABOUT TODAY, VERY COMPLEX AND IS GONNA REQUIRE REALLY
- 14 KIND OF A MULTI-LAYER, MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL RESPONSE. AND I
- 15 APPRECIATE THAT THE REPORT, WHICH WAS A REPORT BACK FROM OUR
- 16 SEPTEMBER MOTION, LAID OUT A VARIETY OF RECOMMENDATIONS FROM
- 17 THE COMMUNITY, AGAIN RANGING FROM DIVERSION OPPORTUNITIES TO
- 18 POTENTIAL ALTERNATIVES LIKE LEGAL VENUES FOR RACING AND
- 19 BURNOUT. AND WHAT I HAVE TO SAY, I WAS STRUCK BY, YOU KNOW,
- 20 OUR ORIGINAL MOTION REALLY ASKED FOR A COUNTY-WIDE
- 21 PERSPECTIVE. AND WHAT I WAS STRUCK BY, I'VE GOT THE STATS FROM
- 22 FIRST QUARTER, JANUARY TO MARCH, IS REALLY HOW, YOU KNOW, NOT
- 23 EVERY COMMUNITY'S BEING DIRECTLY IMPACTED. FIRST DISTRICT HAD,
- 24 IN JUST THE FIRST QUARTER ALONE, JANUARY THROUGH MARCH, 15
- 25 TAKEOVERS, THE SECOND DISTRICT 219, FOURTH DISTRICT 55. AND



- 1 SO, ONE THING THAT STRUCK ME IN YOUR VIDEO IS WHEN I LOOKED AT
- 2 THE VENUES FOR STREET RACING ALTERNATIVES, NONE OF THEM ARE
- 3 NEAR OR IN SD2. AND SO, IF WE'RE GONNA TRACK OUR RESPONSES TO
- 4 WHERE THE ACTIONS ARE TAKING PLACE, I THINK WE HAVE TO BE
- 5 MINDFUL OF THAT. MAYBE BECAUSE THOSE VENUES ARE AVAILABLE AND
- 6 CLOSER TO THE OTHER DISTRICTS, THEY HAVE AN ALTERNATIVE. BUT
- 7 NONE OF THOSE PLACES, WE'RE NOT ONLY NOT IN, BUT EVEN IN
- 8 RELATIVE CLOSE PROXIMITY TO SD2, SO THAT STRUCK ME. I'VE SEEN
- 9 THE VIDEO, BUT I HADN'T LOOKED UP AT THE ALTERNATIVES, AND IF
- 10 YOU FEEL EARNESTLY THAT THAT IS A GREAT PREVENTION TOOL, I

- 1 AGAIN, I APPRECIATE IT SUMMARIZING ALL THE POTENTIAL
- 2 STRATEGIES, BUT WHAT I WAS DISAPPOINTED BY FRANKLY WAS THAT IT
- 3 DIDN'T GO INTO A DEEPER ANALYSIS OF KIND OF THE HOW, HOW WE
- 4 GET THERE. I REALLY HAD HOPED FOR AND EXPECTED A MORE ROBUST
- 5 PLAN THAT SETS THE STRATEGIES FOR HOW THE COUNTY SHOULD TACKLE
- 6 THE COMPLEX ISSUE. I THINK WE NEED A CLEAR FRAMEWORK FOR
- 7 UNDERSTANDING STREET RACING, WHY IT HAPPENS, AND APPROPRIATE
- 8 COMMUNITY-BASED SUPPORTED SOLUTIONS. AND SO, TO THE CEO, IF
- 9 YOU COULD SHARE, I THINK, WITH ME SOME OF THE ANTICIPATED
- 10 TIMELINE FOR THE WORK GROUP THAT THE REPORT BACK TALKS ABOUT
- 11 TO COME TOGETHER AND ACTUALLY PROVIDE RECOMMENDATIONS. WE'VE
- 12 TALKED TODAY ABOUT MANAGING OUR EXPECTATIONS AND THE
- 13 EXPECTATIONS OF THE PUBLIC. SO, WHAT'S THE TIMEFRAME FOR THE
- 14 WORK GROUP?

- 22 WHERE WE'RE SUPPOSED TO DO COST-OUTS. HOWEVER, BEFORE WE CAN
- 23 DO THE COST-OUTS, WE, AS YOU NOTED, WE NEED TO FIGURE OUT WHAT
- 24 SOME OF THE ACTION STEPS ARE FOR THESE RECOMMENDATIONS. WE
- 25 ALSO DON'T WANT TO BOIL THE OCEAN BECAUSE THAT'LL JUST MAKE



- 1 OUR REPORT BACK PERIOD LONGER. SO, I KNOW THAT THE COMMUNITY
- 2 HAS RANKED THESE RECOMMENDATIONS WHICH I WILL CALL SOME ARE
- 3 MORE CONCEPTUAL THAN OTHERS. WE NEED TO NOW GO BACK AND SAY
- 4 HERE ARE THE ONES THAT WE WOULD RECOMMEND TO THE BOARD THAT WE
- 5 PHASE IN AND HERE ARE THE SPECIFIC THINGS THAT NEED TO HAPPEN
- 6 AND HERE ARE ROUGH ORDERS OF MAGNITUDE. AND SO IN TERMS OF
- 7 MANAGING EXPECTATION I THINK WHAT I'M SAYING IS WE PROBABLY

- 14 DISAPPOINTMENT THAT I HAD HOPED THAT THE REPORT WOULD HAVE
- 15 DONE THAT FIRST STEP, THAT I'M LOOKING TO THE COUNTY. WE DID
- 16 THE CONVENINGS, WE GATHERED THE DATA. IT'S LIKE A SIFTER. THEN
- 17 FROM YOUR PERSPECTIVE, FROM THE COUNTY LEVEL, WHAT IS READY TO
- 18 GO NOW, WHAT MAKES SENSE, AND THEN THE COST OUT. SO, BOTH OF
- 19 THOSE STEPS WILL THEN COME IN THE NEXT REPORT.

- 1 DEPARTMENT, I APPRECIATE YOUR RECOMMENDATIONS, SEVERAL
- 2 ORDINANCES AND ALL THAT, AND I'M CLEAR THAT IT'S TWOFOLD. WE
- 3 NEED TO TALK PREVENTION AND TO MAKE SURE THAT YOU HAVE THE
- 4 RESOURCES AND THE LAW ON YOUR SIDE TO TAKE ACTION FROM
- 5 SPECTATORS TO ALL OF THE ABOVE. WHAT ARE SOME OF THE
- 6 CHALLENGES I THINK THAT YOU ALL HAVE FACED IN REALLY TRYING TO
- 7 ADDRESS THE ISSUE? ANYTHING THAT YOU DIDN'T COVER IN YOUR
- 8 PRESENTATION THAT YOU NEED TO ELEVATE TO US.

- 12 WE WOULD LIKE TO ENHANCE OUR EDUCATION, YOU KNOW, OF COMMUNITY
- 13 MEMBERS ABOUT THE ILLS OF STREET RACING AND TO YOUR POINT
- 14 EARLIER ABOUT FEWER OPPORTUNITIES IN DISTRICT 2. ZERO
- 15 OPPORTUNITIES IN DISTRICT 2.

- 19 MYRON JOHNSON: WE'RE WORKING ON THAT. AND TO THE, WHEN I SAY
- 20 THAT, I MEAN, SO THE NEXT GRANT PHASE, OUR TRAP UNIT, WHICH IS
- 21 OUR TASK FORCE REGIONAL AUTO THEFT PROGRAM HAVE 5 SCHEDULED
- 22 EVENTS IN THE CITY OF COMPTON. AND I THINK THAT'S GONNA BE
- 23 VERY HELPFUL FOR THE RESIDENTS TO BECOME MORE INFORMED, AS
- 24 WELL AS THE COMMUNITY MEMBERS TO KNOW THAT THERE'S A DIFFERENT

- 17 5013C, WHO ARE RETIRED AS WELL AS ACTIVE MEMBERS WHO HAVE
- 18 TAKEN A PASSION TO STREET RACING AND THEN GO TO EDUCATE SOME
- 19 OF THE COLLEGES, THE YOUTH CENTERS, ANY AREA THAT HAS A LARGE
- 20 POPULATION WHERE THEY CAN SPEAK TO ABOUT SOME OF THE ILLS OF
- 21 STREET RACING, ILLEGAL STREET RACING. SO, I THINK IN THAT

- 10 TALKING TO LACO, DYD, PROBATION, GOING TO WHERE YOUNG PEOPLE

- 21 FIRST LESSON IN TRAFFIC SAFETY AT THE AGE OF 13, SO
- 22 APPRECIATED THAT. I DON'T WANNA UNDER EMPHASIZE HOW SERIOUS OF
- 23 AN ISSUE IT WAS. I KNOW THAT AS I COME INTO THESE SPACES, I'M
- 24 ABOUT EDUCATION, OTHER OPPORTUNITIES, SECOND CHANCES, ET
- 25 CETERA, BUT CERTAINLY HEARD THE COMMUNITY LOUD AND CLEAR,



- 1 HEARD THE PAIN IN THEIR VOICES, YOU KNOW, SHED A FEW TEARS
- 2 HEARING THE VERY DETAILED STORIES THAT COMMUNITY MEMBERS TOLD.
- 3 BUT, YOU KNOW, WITH THAT BEING SAID, I THINK, YOU KNOW, LIKE
- 4 MOST OTHER PROBLEMS, YOU CAN'T ARREST AND FIND YOUR WAY OUT OF
- 5 IT. THOSE ARE CERTAINLY DETERRENTS, BUT I THINK YOU HAVE TO
- 6 EDUCATE, PROVIDE OTHER OPPORTUNITIES. WE, DYD PERSONALLY, I
- 7 MET WITH DOZENS OF YOUNG PEOPLE THAT WE WORK WITH IN A VARIETY
- 8 OF DIFFERENT SPACES. THEY SHARED WITH ME WHY THEY GO TO THE
- 9 TAKEOVERS. IT'S SOMETHING TO DO. IT'S A PLACE TO BE RECOGNIZED
- 10 IF YOU ARE A COMPETITOR AND TO BE ADMIRED. IT'S A CONNECTION
- 11 TO THE COMMUNITY, OFTENTIMES, IN WHICH YOU LIVE. AND THAT'S
- 12 WHY THEY'RE, AND IT'S AN ADRENALINE RUSH. I DON'T WANT TO
- 13 LEAVE THAT PART OUT OF IT. SO AS WE LOOK AT SOLUTIONS, WE'VE
- 14 GOT TO LOOK AT THINGS THAT PROVIDE THOSE DIFFERENT
- 15 OPPORTUNITIES. LOTS OF GOOD THINGS HAVE HAPPENED WITH REGARDS
- 16 TO MOVING ALONG THAT PROCESS SINCE THAT MEETING. WE ACTUALLY
- 17 TOOK SOME RECOMMENDATIONS AND MET SOME FOLKS AT THE CONVENING,
- 18 AND WE ARE ACTUALLY LOOKING AT PARTNERING WITH AN ORGANIZATION
- 19 THAT DOES THE PREVENTION, TRAINING, TRAFFIC SAFETY. IT WAS ONE
- 20 OF THE ORGANIZATIONS THAT WAS FEATURED IN THE POWERPOINT THAT
- 21 WAS GOING. AND SINCE THEN, WE FOUND OUT THAT THE PLACE PROGRAM
- 22 WITHIN DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH WAS ALSO LOOKING AT THE
- 23 SAME ORGANIZATION. SO, WE ARE LOOKING AT WORKING TOGETHER. THE

- 5 OF YOUR STAFF MEMBERS, THE CEO AND COUNTY COUNSEL HAVE ENGAGED
- 6 US IN THE LAST YEAR ABOUT THIS IMPORTANT TOPIC, SO I
- 7 APPRECIATE THE COLLABORATION. FOR PEOPLE IN THE AUDIENCE, WHY
- 8 IS THE HIGHWAY PATROL HERE? THE GOVERNMENT CODE AND THE

- 16 SO, THIS REALLY IS ABOUT GETTING MEDIA ATTENTION. THE OTHER
- 17 WAS UNDER THE WHITTIER BOULEVARD BRIDGE WHERE PEOPLE ON BIKES
- 18 AND LOUD MUSIC WERE BEING FILMED FOR A VIDEO SHOOT. SO,
- 19 PEOPLE, WHILE THEY GO TO COMPTON, BECAUSE IT'S COMPTON, THEY
- 20 WANT TO COME TO WHITTIER BOULEVARD BECAUSE THEY SEE THAT ARCH.
- 21 AND THAT OBVIOUSLY IS WHAT'S HAPPENING HERE. I KNOW THIS IS A
- 22 FAD. MAYBE IT ISN'T. I DON'T KNOW. BUT WE NEED TO DO
- 23 SOMETHING. AND I APPRECIATE EVERYTHING THAT YOU ALL ARE DOING
- 24 AND I'M GLAD TO HEAR CHP THAT YOU'RE REALLY INCORPORATING
- 25 TOOLS TO GO AFTER IDENTIFYING LICENSE PLATES AND ALL OF THAT

- 23 INSTRUCT THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO REPORT BACK IN
- 24 WRITING IN 60 DAYS ON AN ACTION PLAN SPECIFICALLY ADDRESSING
- 25 THE ILLEGAL STREET TAKEOVERS, SIDESHOW STREET RACES INCLUDING

- 10 TO OUR COMMUNITIES AND OUR RESIDENTS. THEY'RE SO DANGEROUS,
- 11 AND NOT JUST TO THOSE PARTICIPATING IN IT, AS WE'VE SAID, BUT
- 12 THE BYSTANDERS WHO ALSO MANY TIMES BECOME THE VICTIMS OF THESE

- 23 SUP. JANICE HAHN: I MEAN, I'M GLAD THAT WE'RE AT LEAST STILL
- 24 DISCUSSING ALTERNATIVES, BECAUSE I KNOW THE LAST TIME WE
- 25 DISCUSSED THIS, I DID BRING UP TERMINAL ISLAND, BECAUSE I



- 1 REMEMBER BIG WILLIE ROBINSON. HE WAS VERY ACTIVE IN THE STREET
- 2 RACING COMMUNITY. WHEN I WAS ON THE CITY COUNCIL OF LOS
- 3 ANGELES 20 YEARS AGO, HE WAS A BIG PROPONENT OF HE WORKED WITH
- 4 THEN MAYOR TOM BRADLEY. HE CREATED THE BROTHERHOOD RACEWAY
- 5 PARK, ALSO KNOWN AS THE TERMINAL ISLAND RACEWAY. AND IT WAS
- 6 KIND OF A DRAG STRIP ON TERMINAL ISLAND IN THE PORT OF LOS
- 7 ANGELES. AND HE THOUGHT IT PROVIDED THIS SAFE, CONTROLLED
- 8 ENVIRONMENT TO RACE CARS. SO I HAVE NO IDEA IF THAT'S EVEN
- 9 FEASIBLE ANYMORE TO DO THAT. I DON'T KNOW HOW THE PORT WOULD

- 23 SPECTATORS AS WELL, BECAUSE THEY COULD CERTAINLY GET CAUGHT UP

- 20 CEO, THERE'S CONCERN THAT THIS ACTUALLY CONSOLIDATES POWER AND
- 21 DIMINISHES THE VOICES OF THE ELECTED SUPERVISORS TO SERVE
- 22 MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES MOST EFFECTIVELY. I JUST WANTED TO
- 23 MAKE SURE THAT ALL THE MEMBERS GOT THIS LETTER, I THINK IT
- 24 CAME IN RATHER LATE, AND I KNOW THERE'S BEEN LOTS OF
- 25 CONVERSATION AND ASSUMPTIONS, AND LET ME SAY FOR THE RECORD



- 1 PUBLICLY, I DID NOT SOLICIT THESE ORGANIZATIONS. THESE ARE
- 2 ORGANIZATIONS WHO WORK IN THIS AREA AND HAVE THE CAPACITY TO
- 3 READ LANGUAGE AND FORM THEIR OWN OPINION, AND THEY DID SO AND
- 4 WROTE THE LETTER DATED JULY 30TH, AND I JUST THOUGHT IT WAS
- 5 IMPORTANT TO ELEVATE IT AND BRING THEIR CONCERNS TO EVERYONE'S
- 6 ATTENTION. AGAIN, FROM MY PERSPECTIVE, AS I WILL RESTATE, YOU

- 21 ON THE BOARD TO DO SO. I WANNA THANK THOSE ORGANIZATIONS THAT
- 22 PAID ATTENTION. GOVERNANCE ISN'T A PARTICULAR SEXY ISSUE, BUT
- 23 THERE WERE ORGANIZATIONS WHO STEPPED UP, UNDERSTOOD THE
- 24 MEANINGFUL RAMIFICATIONS OF IMPROVING OUR PROCESSES AS A BODY,
- 25 AND I WANNA THANK THEM. I'D LIKE TO REITERATE, WE'VE TALKED



- 1 ABOUT REPORT BACKS AND MOTIONS EARLIER TODAY, THAT I'M NOT
- 2 BRINGING FORWARD A MOTION, BUT I AM ASKING THAT THE EXECUTIVE
- 3 OFFICE GIVE US A COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF WHAT HAPPENED WITH
- 4 REGARD TO THE CONSULTANT PROCESS. IT'S MY EXPECTATION THAT
- 5 THAT WORK CONTINUES BECAUSE THERE ARE OTHER GOVERNANCE IDEAS
- 6 THAT THAT RESEARCH CAN ELEVATE. BUT BECAUSE IT BECAME SUCH AN
- 7 ISSUE IN TERMS OF THE DELAY, I THINK THE ENTIRE BOARD IS OWED
- 8 A REAL CLEAR EXPLANATION ABOUT HOW WE GOT TO WHERE WE WERE IN
- 9 TERMS OF NO REPORT. AND SO, WE CAN MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE NEVER
- 10 IN THAT POSITION AGAIN. IF THERE ARE BOARD MEMBERS WHO HAVE

- 1 MAKE SURE THAT I REITERATED THOSE 2 EXPECTATIONS. AGAIN,
- 2 CONTINUE TO EXPRESS MY CONCERN FOR BOTH THE PROCESS AND AS I
- 3 WON'T REPEAT ALL THE ISSUES I'VE RAISED IN THE PAST WITH
- 4 REGARD TO THE CONTENT I JUST THINK IT COULD HAVE BEEN DONE
- 5 DIFFERENTLY IT COULD HAVE BEEN A DIFFERENT APPROACH THAT COULD
- 6 HAVE BEEN MORE INCLUSIVE BECAUSE I WOULD HAVE LIKED NOTHING
- 7 MORE TO BE ABLE TO BE IN A POSITION TO HAVE BEEN A
- 8 COLLABORATOR AND BE ABLE TO COME TO A YES ON TALKING ABOUT OUR
- 9 PRIORITIES AROUND GOVERNANCE GOING FORWARD, BUT BASED ON THE
- 10 EXPERIENCE THE LAST 3 WEEKS, I'M NOT ABLE TO DO SO. THANK YOU,
- 11 MADAM CHAIR. SUPERVISOR HAHN.

- 13 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU, AND I APPRECIATE YOUR COMMENTS,
- 14 SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, AND I APPRECIATE, YOU KNOW, SUPERVISOR
- 15 BARGER, WHAT WE DID LAST TIME, SAYING THERE ARE CERTAIN THINGS
- 16 WE CAN DO NOW, WE DON'T HAVE TO WAIT. AND AN ETHICS COMMISSION
- 17 WAS ONE OF THOSE. BUT JUST TO REMIND EVERYBODY WHO'S MAYBE
- 18 LISTENING, THIS IS THE THIRD TIME THAT THIS REFORM PACKAGE HAS
- 19 BEEN IN FRONT OF OUR BOARD. AND I THINK THE DEBATE THAT WE'VE
- 20 BEEN HAVING, YOU KNOW, IS IMPORTANT. AND I KNOW THERE'S BEEN
- 21 SOME CONCERNS ABOUT HOW DECIDING THE FRAMEWORK OF THESE

- 2 L.A. COUNTY GOVERNMENT IS IN NEED OF REFORM. AND WHEN THEY
- 3 WERE ASKED IF THEY WANT AN INDEPENDENT ETHICS COMMISSION TO
- 4 KEEP L.A. COUNTY OFFICIALS IN LINE AND ELECTED COUNTY
- 5 EXECUTIVE AND EXPANDED BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF 9 MEMBERS, 74%
- 6 OF THEM SAID YES. SO, I THINK OUR RESIDENTS WANT SMALLER, MORE
- 7 REPRESENTATIVE DISTRICTS. I THINK THEY WANT CHECKS AND
- 8 BALANCES IN THEIR LOCAL GOVERNMENT. AND I THINK THEY WANT
- 9 COMMON SENSE ETHICS REFORM THAT HOLD OFFICIALS ACCOUNTABLE.
- 10 AND THE REFORMS IN THIS CHARTER AMENDMENT ARE WHAT I BELIEVE
- 11 ARE IN LINE WITH WHAT THE PUBLIC WANTS. WE COULD BE WRONG. I
- 12 KNOW THERE'S DISAGREEMENT ON THIS BOARD ABOUT THAT. BUT I
- 13 THINK WE SHOULD LET THE VOTERS DECIDE. AND APPROVING THIS
- 14 SECOND READING TODAY DOESN'T END THE DEBATE. IT JUST MOVES THE

- 1 BEFORE US AGAIN. I THINK IT'S VERY IMPORTANT. IF WE'RE GONNA

- 3 ROAD AHEAD FOR THE COUNTY. I THINK THAT THIS IS SOMETHING THAT
- 4 WE ALL HAVE BEEN THINKING ABOUT FOR THE LAST, I KNOW FOR ME AT
- 5 LEAST A DECADE. AND BEFORE THAT I KNOW THERE HAVE BEEN SEVERAL
- 6 ATTEMPTS TO TRY TO EXPAND THE BOARD AND REFORM THE COUNTY. SO
- 7 I KNOW THAT THIS IS A TOUGH, TOUGH THING FOR SOME OF US, BUT I
- 8 KNOW THAT IN THE END, IF WE DO OUR JOB AND EDUCATE THE PUBLIC
- 9 AND MAKE CLEAR THAT WHAT WE'RE DOING IS, WE HOPE IN THE BEST

- 19 ORDINANCE. SO, I WANNA PUT THAT FORWARD FOR THE RECORD AND

- 1 PARKS, BUT THERE ARE A LOT OF PEOPLE WHO DON'T LIKE PARKS AND
- 2 DON'T LIKE BEING CHARGED A FEE. BUT NONETHELESS, IT WAS VERY
- 3 POPULAR, WE FOUND OUT AFTER TALKING TO PEOPLE. AND ALL I HAVE
- 4 TO SAY IS SOMETIMES A DEMOCRACY IS HARD, BUT IN THESE CASES, I
- 5 THINK GOING TO THE VOTERS, WHETHER THEY SUPPORT IT OR NOT, LET
- 6 THEM DECIDE. AND I THINK THAT'S THE BEST WAY TO GO. SO, THANK
- 7 YOU, MADAM CHAIR, AND APPRECIATE THE OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK.

- 9 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR BARGER.
- 10 THANK YOU. AND I WANNA THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, NOT
- 11 ONLY FOR CONTINUING TO RAISE IMPORTANT AND PRESSING UNANSWERED
- 12 OUESTIONS, BUT ALSO FOR HAVING THE VISION ORIGINALLY TO BRING
- 13 THIS FORWARD. AND AS I RECALL, WHEN YOU BROUGHT IT FORWARD,
- 14 THIS BOARD WANTED TO STUDY IT. AND SO I DON'T KNOW WHAT
- 15 CHANGED BETWEEN WHEN YOU BROUGHT IT FORWARD AND WHEN OTHERS
- 16 WANTED IT STUDIED TO NOW, WE DON'T NEED TO STUDY IT ANYMORE.
- 17 WE NEED TO MAKE IT MOVE FORWARD AND OH, BY THE WAY, WE'RE
- 18 GOING TO ADD ELECTED GOVERNMENT, ELECTED TO CEO. SO I JUST
- 19 FEEL I JUST AM TRYING TO, I'M TRYING TO PUT THAT TOGETHER,
- 20 SUPERVISOR HAHN, BECAUSE I THINK YOU ACTUALLY ORIGINALLY DID
- 21 WANT IT STUDIED. AND YOU MADE COMPELLING ARGUMENTS AS TO WHY,
- 22 WHEN IT WAS BROUGHT FORWARD BY SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, THAT IT
- 23 SHOULD BE STUDIED. AT ANOTHER TIME, NOW IS NOT BECAUSE IT'S

- 1 KNOW THAT YOU ARE DOING THIS, AND I REMEMBER WHEN SUPERVISOR
- 2 HAHN, YOUR FATHER, BROUGHT THIS FORWARD. AND, YOU KNOW, FOR
- 3 ME, THE QUESTION HAS ALWAYS BEEN 7, 9, 15. I DON'T KNOW WHAT
- 4 THE NUMBER IS. THAT WAS WHAT I THOUGHT WE WERE HOPING TO GET
- 5 OUT OF THE STUDY. SO, YOU KNOW, I BELIEVE THAT THE
- 6 UNINCORPORATED AREAS, IF YOU WERE TO POLL THEM AND IT WAS

- 22 900 PEOPLE WERE ENGAGED, 900 OUT OF 10,000,000, AND YOU'RE NOT
- 23 GONNA GET ALL 10,000,000, BUT STILL, I MEAN, I HAVE TO WONDER
- 24 HOW THAT ALL CAME TO BE. I MEAN, I THINK WHEN YOU DO A POLL,
- 25 YOU USUALLY, UNLESS IT'S A SCIENTIFIC POLL, YOU POLL WITH



- 1 OUESTIONS BASED ON WHAT YOU HOPE TO GET OUT OF THAT POLL. AND
- 2 SO I STILL, I'M NOT HEARING IN MY DISTRICT OVERWHELMING
- 3 SUPPORT FOR THE ELECTED. I AM FOR THE EXPANDED BOARD. SO, I
- 4 WILL MAKE SURE I PUSH OUT TO MY CONSTITUENCY THAT, THAT, THAT
- 5 THIS WAS NOT SOMETHING THAT WAS ORIGINALLY ANTICIPATED WHEN
- 6 THE MOTION THAT YOU BROUGHT FORWARD, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, AND
- 7 I THINK IT WAS WITH SUPERVISOR, DID YOU CO-AUTHOR A MOTION? I

- 4 PROCESS. I AGREE WITH SUPERVISOR MITCHELL THAT THE PROCESS AND
- 5 HOW THIS PLAYED OUT TO ME IS ASTOUNDING. AND THE FACT THAT
- 6 DEALS WERE CUT AND THAT PROMISES WERE MADE OR WHATEVER I'M

- 12 KNOW THAT WHEN I FIRST CAME ONTO THE BOARD, YOU ALSO SHARED
- 13 WITH ME THINGS THAT YOU HEARD THROUGH THE GRAPEVINE ABOUT ME
- 14 AS A CANDIDATE AND AS A POTENTIAL COLLEAGUE THAT WERE NOT
- 15 TRUE. SO, I JUST WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE WHAT YOUR, I, IT'S

- 1 THE SIGNIFICANCE WHEN I SAID NASCAR. THAT'S JUST KIND OF A WAY
- 2 IN WHICH WE'VE TALKED ABOUT. LETTERHEAD, I DIDN'T WANT TO, SO
- 3 LET ME JUST ACKNOWLEDGE SINCE WE'VE TALKED ABOUT A PETITION OF
- 4 150 AND 900 PEOPLE, THE ORGANIZATIONS REPRESENTED HERE ON THE
- 5 LETTER TODAY REPRESENT 5,000. IT'S NOT MY IMPRESSION THAT OF
- 6 THE 900 FOLKS WERE TAPPED IN THE SECOND DISTRICT. THAT'S JUST

- 9 THIS PROPOSAL, I DON'T KNOW, ELEVATE TO THE TOP OF THE NEEDS
- 10 IN MY DISTRICT. WE TALKED ABOUT THE NEEDS IN MY DISTRICT
- 11 TODAY. STREET RACING, THE UNHOUSED, CRITICAL ISSUES THAT
- 12 PEOPLE LOOK TO THE COUNTY TO SOLVE FOR THEM. AND SO, WHILE I
- 13 KNOW THAT GOVERNANCE WILL IMPROVE OUR ABILITY TO BE RESPONSIVE
- 14 TO THOSE NEEDS, I CAN'T IN GOOD CONSCIENCE ACKNOWLEDGE THAT
- 15 THIS PROCESS, THAT THE CONTENTS OF THIS ORDINANCE WILL GET US
- 16 ANY CLOSER THERE. PEOPLE HAVE GREAT NEED IN THE SECOND
- 17 SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT AND I BELIEVE COUNTYWIDE. AND IT REALLY
- 18 CAUSES ME GREAT CONCERN WHEN WE LOOK AT EMPOWERING A SINGLE

- 3 COMPROMISED AND I'M CONCERNED. THANK YOU, BUT I JUST WANTED TO
- 4 ACKNOWLEDGE THE 5,000 PEOPLE THOSE ORGANIZATIONS REPRESENT.
- 5 THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

- 7 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH, CHAIR: THANK YOU VERY MUCH AND I WANT TO
- 8 THANK MY COLLEAGUES FOR THE ONGOING DISCUSSION ABOUT
- 9 GOVERNANCE REFORM. AND I WANT TO THANK EVERYONE WHO'S WEIGHED
- 10 IN SO FAR ON THIS IMPORTANT GOING FORWARD PROCESS. WE ALL, WE
- 11 NEED ALL OF OUR VOICES TO BE PART OF THIS NOW AND IN THE YEARS
- 12 TO COME IF THE VOTERS CHOOSE TO PASS THIS IN NOVEMBER. DEBATE
- 13 AND DISCOURSE ARE WHAT MAKE A HEALTHY DEMOCRACY AND SINCE I
- 14 JOINED THE BOARD I HAVE HEARD A RESOUNDING CALL FOR CHANGE.
- 15 CHANGE FOR A FUTURE WHERE LOS ANGELES COUNTY MORE URGENTLY AND
- 16 EFFECTIVELY MEETS THE NEEDS OF OUR COMMUNITIES, ESPECIALLY OUR
- 17 MOST VULNERABLE RESIDENTS WHO DEPEND ON COUNTY SERVICES AND
- 18 CARE. AFTER MORE THAN 100 YEARS OF THE STATUS QUO, THIS IS A
- 19 PROPOSAL THAT GIVES ANGELENOS THE OPPORTUNITY TO SHAPE A
- 20 COUNTY GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE FIT FOR THE 21ST CENTURY. TODAY,
- 21 AS WE CONSIDER WHETHER TO PLACE THE AMENDMENT ON THE COUNTY

- 25 ACCOUNTABILITY. HAVING AN ELECTED EXECUTIVE ACCOUNTABLE TO THE



- 1 PEOPLE IS NOT A FOREIGN CONCEPT. THE SEPARATION OF POWERS,
- 2 CREATING A DISTINCT EXECUTIVE BRANCH SEPARATE FROM THE
- 3 LEGISLATIVE BRANCH BUT EQUALLY EMPOWERED, LEADS TO A SYSTEM OF
- 4 CHECKS AND BALANCES TO ENSURE THAT NO ONE BRANCH OF GOVERNMENT
- 5 WOULD BECOME TOO POWERFUL, AND THAT POWER DOESN'T GO
- 6 UNCHECKED. THIS IS FOUNDATIONAL TO OUR DEMOCRATIC GOVERNMENT,
- 7 AND BECAUSE L.A. COUNTY HAS AN IMPLEMENTATION PROBLEM, TODAY'S
- 8 JAIL DISCUSSION COULD NOT MORE PERFECTLY EMBODY EXACTLY WHAT I

- 11 BUT WHAT COMES NEXT IS OFTEN TOO SLOW AND ACCOUNTABILITY IS
- 12 DIFFUSE. WE NEED SOMEONE WHO IS EMPOWERED TO TAKE ACTION AND
- 13 IS ACCOUNTABLE FOR IMPLEMENTING THE LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY OF
- 14 THIS BOARD. ACCOUNTABILITY TO CLOSE MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL, TO
- 15 ACTUALIZE YOUTH JUSTICE REIMAGINED, TO MOVE WITH GREATER
- 16 URGENCY ON OUR HOMELESSNESS CRISIS AND IMPLEMENTING CARE
- 17 COURT, SB43 AND OTHER STATE DIRECTIVES WHICH WE'VE DISCUSSED
- 18 TODAY, AND CLARITY AND AUTHORITY FOR OUR 38 DEPARTMENTS. THIS
- 19 IS THE CHANGE WE NEED FOR THE NATION'S LARGEST AND MOST
- 20 COMPLEX COUNTY. CREATING AN ELECTED COUNTY EXECUTIVE
- 21 ACCOUNTABLE TO THE PEOPLE OFFERS THE CHECKS AND BALANCES
- 22 NECESSARY AS WE ALSO EXPAND THE BOARD FROM 5 TO 9, WHICH IS
- 23 ABSOLUTELY ESSENTIAL TO ENSURE THIS BOARD REFLECTS THE
- 24 DIVERSITY THAT IS LOS ANGELES COUNTY. EXPANDING REPRESENTATION
- 25 IS LONG OVERDUE, AND IT'S THE RIGHT THING TO DO. 9 IS



- 1 MEASURED, 9 IS NOT NEW. L.A. COUNTY DESERVES THE OPPORTUNITY
- 2 TO SEE THEMSELVES REFLECTED IN THEIR BOARD OF SUPERVISORS,
- 3 WHETHER THAT'S GEOGRAPHY, RACE, GENDER, OR ORIENTATION. WE'VE
- 4 SEEN LOTS OF EXCITEMENT ON THE EXPANSION PROPOSAL FROM
- 5 COMMUNITIES WHO WOULD LIKE A SEAT AT THE TABLE, AND I DON'T
- 6 BUY INTO A SCARCITY MINDSET. I BELIEVE THAT INSTEAD OF
- 7 FIGHTING FOR SEATS AT THE TABLE, WE SHOULD BUILD A BIGGER

- 23 THERE'S A STAKEHOLDER PROCESS FOR IMPLEMENTATION THROUGH THE

- 3 PEOPLE HAVE LOST THEIR FAITH IN GOVERNMENT. THIS IS AN
- 4 INVITATION TO DELIVER A GOVERNMENT THAT IS MORE
- 5 REPRESENTATIVE, TRANSPARENT, AND ACCOUNTABLE, A GOVERNMENT
