## THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS 2 TUESDAY, JULY 29TH, 2025 3 4 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: GOOD MORNING, EVERYBODY. WE 5 WELCOME YOU TO THE REGULARLY SCHEDULED MEETING OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. TODAY IS TUESDAY, JULY 29, 2025. 6 WE NOTE THAT A QUORUM OF THE BOARD IS PRESENT. THE CHIEF 7 EXECUTIVE OFFICER, COUNTY COUNSEL, EXECUTIVE OFFICER, AND 8 SERGEANT AT ARMS ARE ALL HERE TO ASSIST. WE WILL BEGIN TODAY'S 9 10 BOARD MEETING WITH THE COUNTY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT. 11 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR [VIDEO RECORDING]: THE COUNTY OF 12 LOS ANGELES RECOGNIZES THAT WE OCCUPY LAND ORIGINALLY AND 13 14 STILL INHABITED AND CARED FOR BY THE TONGVA, TATAVIAM, SERRANO, KIZH AND CHUMASH PEOPLES. WE HONOR AND PAY RESPECT TO 15 16 THEIR ELDERS AND DESCENDANTS, PAST, PRESENT, AND EMERGING, AS 17 THEY CONTINUE THEIR STEWARDSHIP OF THESE LANDS AND WATERS. WE ACKNOWLEDGE THAT SETTLER COLONIZATION RESULTED IN LAND 18 19 SEIZURE, DISEASE, SUBJUGATION, SLAVERY, RELOCATION, BROKEN 20 PROMISES, GENOCIDE, AND MULTI-GENERATIONAL TRAUMA. THIS 21 ACKNOWLEDGEMENT DEMONSTRATES OUR RESPONSIBILITY AND COMMITMENT 22 TO TRUTH, HEALING, AND RECONCILIATION, AND ELEVATING THE STORIES, CULTURE, AND COMMUNITY OF THE ORIGINAL INHABITANTS OF 23 LOS ANGELES COUNTY. WE ARE GRATEFUL TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO 24 LIVE AND WORK ON THESE ANCESTRAL LANDS. WE ARE DEDICATED TO 25

- 22 INTEGRITY AND COMPASSION. AS THESE SUPERVISORS HAVE BEEN
- 23 ENTRUSTED WITH A POSITION OF AUTHORITY, MAY THEY CARRY OUT
- 24 THEIR DUTY WITH EXCELLENCE. MAY THIS MEETING BE MINDFUL OF THE
- 25 DIVERSE COMMUNITIES THAT MAKE UP LOS ANGELES COUNTY, EACH WITH



- 1 UNIOUE NEEDS, VOICES, AND HOPES. LET THE DECISIONS MADE TODAY
- 2 REFLECT A DEEP COMMITMENT TO FAIRNESS, JUSTICE, AND THE COMMON
- 3 GOOD. YOU, O GOD, HAVE TOLD US WHAT IS GOOD AND WHAT IS
- 4 REOUIRED OF US TO DO JUSTICE, TO LOVE KINDNESS, TO WALK HUMBLY
- 5 WITH OUR GOD. THEREFORE, AS THEY CONSIDER MATTERS OF PUBLIC
- 6 HEALTH, HOUSING, INFRASTRUCTURE, SAFETY, AND ECONOMIC
- 7 OPPORTUNITY, MAY THEY BE GUIDED BY WISDOM, HUMILITY, AND A
- 8 SPIRIT OF UNITY. MAY THEY DO ALL THINGS FROM A POSITION OF
- 9 LOVE, LOVE FOR YOU AND A LOVE FOR OTHERS. AND MAY THEIR MINDS
- 10 BE FOCUSED ON SOLUTIONS THAT UPLIFT EVERY RESIDENT. GRANT THEM
- 11 THE COURAGE TO ACT WITH FAIRNESS, THE PATIENCE TO LISTEN WITH
- 12 COMPASSION, AND THE CLARITY TO LEAD WITH PURPOSE. MAY THIS
- 13 MEETING BE A SPACE OF RESPECTFUL DIALOGUE, THOUGHTFUL
- 14 DELIBERATION, AND MEANINGFUL PROGRESS WITH HOPE AND UNITY AS
- 15 THEY BEGIN THIS DAY'S WORK. AMEN.

- 18 THE FLAG, PLACE YOUR RIGHT HAND OVER YOUR HEART, AND BEGIN. I

- 20 AND TO THE REPUBLIC FOR WHICH IT STANDS, ONE NATION UNDER GOD,

- 25 MASTERS UNIVERSITY IN SANTA CLARITA AND TOOK UP HIS FIRST



- 1 PASTORAL POSITION IN LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA. LATER, HE SERVED
- 2 FOR 14 YEARS AS A PASTOR AND CHURCH PLANNING MISSIONARY TO
- 3 CHURCHES IN OXFORD, ENGLAND AND BOSTON, MASSACHUSETTS. IN
- 4 2022, PASTOR ALLEN RETURNED TO SANTA CLARITA AND JOINED THE
- 5 STAFF AT GRACE BAPTIST CHURCH, WHERE HE NOW SERVES AS A PASTOR
- 6 OF CONGREGATIONAL CARE. HE IS MARRIED TO ANNA AND HAS TWO
- 7 CHILDREN, SILAS AND MILLIE, WHO ARE ALSO VERY INVOLVED IN
- 8 THEIR CHURCH. GRACE BAPTIST CHURCH HAS FAITHFULLY SERVED THE
- 9 SANTA CLARITA VALLEY FOR OVER 50 YEARS. GRACE BAPTIST ACTIVELY
- 10 PURSUES INVOLVEMENT WITH THE SANTA CARITA VALLEY COMMUNITY,
- 11 LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS, AND VARIOUS BUSINESSES TO FACILITATE
- 12 RELATIONSHIPS BETWEEN THE CHURCH AND THE NEEDS OF THE
- 13 COMMUNITY. THEY ALSO MODEL THEIR FAITH BY DISTRIBUTING 100
- 14 BAGS OF FOOD A MONTH AT GOLDEN VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL, REGULARLY
- 15 FACILITATING GAME NIGHT FOR RESIDENTS OF BRIDGE TO HOME AND
- 16 PROVIDING CURRICULUM AND CLASSES AT HOPE GARDENS THROUGHOUT
- 17 THE YEAR. I AM PROUD TO HAVE GRACE BAPTIST CHURCH IN THE FIFTH
- 18 DISTRICT. PASTOR ALLEN, THANK YOU FOR LEADING US IN TODAY'S
- 19 INVOCATION AND FOR YOUR SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY. AND NOW I'M
- 20 GOING TO DIRECT YOUR ATTENTION TO THE SCREEN FOR OUR LOVABLE
- 21 PET FROM PALMDALE. WE'RE NOT GOING TO HAVE AN IN-PERSON PET
- 22 TODAY. THIS IS LOLAPOP, A FOUR-MONTH-OLD GERMAN SHEPHERD WHO

- 25 ANTELOPE VALLEY AND ALL ACROSS OUR CARE CENTERS WHO ARE

- 20 ALSO AT THE STATE LEVEL. THERE'S UNCERTAINTIES THERE AS WELL.
- 21 AND I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT FOR US TO HAVE IN REAL TIME AN
- 22 UPDATE BY THE CEO REGARDING OUR FISCAL HEALTH AND ANY CHANGES
- 23 OR DECISIONS THAT NEED TO BE MADE BY THIS BOARD TO PROTECT THE
- 24 SAFETY NET IN L.A. COUNTY. AND SO THIS IS GOING TO BE A WEEKLY
- 25 STAND AT 9:45 TO HAVE THIS UPDATE BY FESIA AND HOPEFULLY WE



- 1 WON'T NEED IT LONG TERM BUT I THINK ON THE SHORT TERM IT'S
- 2 IMPORTANT FOR THIS BOARD AND THE PUBLIC BECAUSE WE'RE
- 3 COMMITTED BEING TRANSPARENT ABOUT HOW OUR BUDGET IS ROLLED OUT
- 4 THAT WE PROVIDE AS MUCH INFORMATION TO THE PUBLIC AS POSSIBLE.
- 5 SO, SUPERVISOR SOLIS.

- 24 THAT YOU HAVE BUDGET COMMUNITY MEETINGS AND GET INPUT AND SO
- 25 THIS STANDS PRETTY MUCH IN LINE WITH YOUR FOCUS ON



1 TRANSPARENCY AS WELL. FESIA, THE FLOORS YOURS.

- 3 FESIA DAVENPORT: THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR AND GOOD MORNING BOARD
- 4 OF SUPERVISORS. I APPRECIATE THE OPPORTUNITY TO BRING YOU
- 5 TODAY'S BRIEFING ON BUDGETARY PRESSURES AND IMPACTS. AND AS
- 6 YOU STATED, SUPERVISOR, THIS IS THE FIRST OF WHAT WILL BE A
- 7 REGULAR SERIES OF UPDATES ON THE COUNTY'S BUDGET AS WE
- 8 NAVIGATE THE MOST CHALLENGING BUDGETARY PERIOD IN OUR RECENT
- 9 HISTORY. THE INTENT OF THE PRESENTATIONS AND THE WAY THAT WE
- 10 INTEND TO ROLL THEM OUT IS THERE ARE A LOT OF PRESSURES ON THE
- 11 BUDGET RIGHT NOW AND WHAT WE HOPE TO BE ABLE TO DO IS TO
- 12 PROVIDE YOU WITH JUST ONE PRESSURE AS WE GO FORWARD EACH WEEK
- 13 AND TAKE A DEEPER DIVE TO UNDERSTAND WHERE THE PRESSURE IS
- 14 COMING FROM, WHAT STRATEGIES WE NEED TO DEPLOY TO MANAGE THOSE
- 15 PRESSURES, AND THEN WHAT ARE THE REAL-WORLD IMPACTS TO OUR
- 16 CONSTITUENTS. ALTHOUGH THE COUNTY'S TRACK RECORD IS STRONG FOR
- 17 RESPONSIBLE FISCAL MANAGEMENT, AND THAT HAS HELPED US TO
- 18 NAVIGATE CHALLENGING TIMES BEFORE, TODAY IS TRULY DIFFERENT.
- 19 WE ARE LOOKING AT WHAT I CALL A TIDAL WAVE OF PROFOUND

- 21 HAVE IMPLEMENTED UP UNTIL THIS POINT, WHICH HAVE BEEN AIMED AT
- 22 PRESERVING THE STATUS QUO, ARE UNLIKELY TO ADDRESS ALL OF OUR
- 23 NEEDS TODAY. OUR VERY ABILITY TO CONTINUE TO MAINTAIN
- 24 ESSENTIAL SERVICES, WHICH I'LL TALK ABOUT MORE LATER, AND
- 25 PRESERVE THE SAFETY NET IS FRANKLY IN DANGER, SUPERVISORS. TO



- 1 KEEP THE SAFETY NET STRONG AND TO AVOID STRUCTURAL DEFICITS
- 2 AND ALL OF THE IMPACTS OF HAVING A STRUCTURAL DEFICIT, DAMAGE
- 3 TO OUR CREDIT RATING, MAKING OUR FINANCIAL POSITION EVEN
- 4 WORSE. WE KNOW THAT WE MUST TAKE BOLD AND PAINFUL ACTIONS THIS
- 5 YEAR AND IN THE ENSUING SEVERAL BUDGET CYCLES. I HAVE A SHORT
- 6 POWERPOINT TO GO OVER SOME OF THE MAJOR CONCERNS AND THE
- 7 SOLUTIONS THAT ARE IN THE MAKING. CAN I HAVE THE FIRST SLIDE
- 8 PLEASE? THIS PAGE SHOWS SOME OF OUR LARGER, VERY PROFOUND
- 9 BUDGETARY IMPACTS THAT WE ARE FACING. I'M NOT GOING TO GO OVER
- 10 ALL OF THESE IN DETAIL TODAY, BUT IT GIVES YOU AN OVERVIEW OF
- 11 THE MAJOR CHALLENGES THAT WE ARE FACING. TODAY, DUE TO THE
- 12 BUDGET CUTS THAT THE BOARD HAS ALREADY APPROVED, I WANT TO BE
- 13 REALLY CLEAR THAT THE BUDGET IS SOLVENT. OUR BUDGET IS
- 14 BALANCED. WE ARE NOT IN A STRUCTURAL DEFICIT DUE TO CUTS THE
- 15 BOARD HAS ALREADY APPROVED AND WE HAVE ACHIEVED AND MAINTAINED
- 16 EXCEPTIONALLY HIGH CREDIT RATINGS DUE TO THE LEADERSHIP OF
- 17 YOUR BOARD. BUT THE ELEMENTS ON THIS SLIDE, WHEN TAKEN
- 18 TOGETHER, THEY PRESENT A SERIOUS THREAT. SURVIVING THIS
- 19 LOOMING CRISIS SO WE CAN PROVIDE A STRONG SAFETY NET TO OUR
- 20 RESIDENTS WILL REQUIRE BOLD ADDITIONAL CUTS, SUSTAINED
- 21 DISCIPLINE IN FOLLOWING ESTABLISHED BOARD BUDGET POLICIES AND
- 22 YOUR STEADFAST LEADERSHIP. BY THE WAY, AS I MENTIONED EARLIER,
- 23 THESE ARE JUST THE LARGEST IMPACTS. THEY'RE NOT THE ONLY
- 24 IMPACTS. OUR GROWING LIST OF PRESSURES ALSO INCLUDES DECLINING
- 25 PROPERTY TAX REVENUE GROWTH, WHICH IS NOW AT THE LOWEST IT HAS



- 1 BEEN IN THE PAST FOUR YEARS. WE'VE TALKED ABOUT THAT BEFORE IN
- 2 OUR RECOMMENDED BUDGET DISCUSSION AND IN OUR FINAL CHANGES
- 3 BUDGET DISCUSSION, AND IT MAY BE OLD NEWS TO SOME, BUT IT IS
- 4 STILL VERY IMPORTANT TO US TODAY. TRACKING AND RESPONDING TO
- 5 THE PRESSURES SHOWN ON THIS SLIDE WILL BE OUR MAIN CHALLENGE
- 6 IN THE MONTHS AHEAD, SO YOU WILL BE SEEING A LOT OF THIS SLIDE
- 7 IN MY UPCOMING BRIEFINGS. TO GO THROUGH SOME OF THESE
- 8 CHALLENGES JUST IN ORDER, LET ME START WITH THE FEDERAL CUTS.
- 9 WE ARE CURRENTLY ESTIMATING MORE THAN \$1,500,000,000, THAT'S
- 10 BILLION WITH A B, IN IMPACTS FROM THE SO-CALLED BIG BILL AND
- 11 RELATED CUTS. THAT INCLUDES ROUGHLY \$714,000,000 THAT WE KNOW
- 12 OF FROM THE BIG BILL SPECIFICALLY AND AN ADDITIONAL
- 13 \$800,000,000 WE ANTICIPATE FROM OTHER FEDERAL CUTS INCLUDING
- 14 ADDITIONAL CUTS TO MEDICAID. THESE CUTS WILL HAVE A PROFOUND
- 15 IMPACT ON COUNTY DEPARTMENTS AND SERVICES MOVING FORWARD.
- 16 PROGRAM REDUCTIONS AND CLOSURES ARE LIKELY, AS WELL AS
- 17 FACILITY CLOSURES AND, YES, LAYOFFS. I DO NOT THINK THAT THESE
- 18 CAN BE AVOIDED WITH THE TOOLS THAT WE HAVE IMPLEMENTED TO DATE
- 19 ALONE, GIVEN THE MAGNITUDE OF THE FEDERAL LOSSES THAT ARE ON
- 20 THE HORIZON. AND I WILL TALK MORE ABOUT THE FEDERAL CUTS,
- 21 WHICH WILL BE THE FOCUS OF TODAY'S PRESENTATION WHEN WE GET TO
- 22 THE NEXT SLIDES. LET ME TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT AB218. WE'VE
- 23 ALREADY BUDGETED FOR THE LARGEST SETTLEMENT IN COUNTY HISTORY,
- 24 WHICH HAS BEEN \$4,000,000,000, TO SETTLE THOUSANDS OF
- 25 CHILDHOOD SEXUAL ASSAULT CLAIMS FILED UNDER AB218. BUT THAT IS



- 1 JUST THE BEGINNING. WE HAVE MORE THAN 2,500 ADDITIONAL CLAIMS
- 2 PENDING. SO, THE WRITING IS ON THE WALL. ALTHOUGH WE PLANNED
- 3 AHEAD TO MANAGE THE ADDITIONAL \$4,000,000,000 SETTLEMENT WITH
- 4 A COMBINATION OF STRATEGIC CUTS, BORROWING AND USE OF ONE-TIME
- 5 RESERVE FUNDS, THOSE SOLUTIONS IN AND OF THEMSELVES WILL NOT
- 6 BE ENOUGH TO MANAGE A CONTINUING STREAM OF CLAIMS GOING
- 7 FORWARD. AND I WILL RETURN TO YOUR BOARD AT A FUTURE UPDATE TO
- 8 DISCUSS SOME OF THE LEGISLATIVE FIXES WE ARE PURSUING AND
- 9 WHICH WILL BE REQUIRED TO ADDRESS THE DISASTROUS UNINTENDED
- 10 CONSEQUENCES OF AB218 FOR L.A. COUNTY AND OTHER PUBLIC
- 11 ENTITIES. A LITTLE BIT ON LABOR AS YOUR BOARD IS AWARE WE HAVE
- 12 REACHED THE TENTATIVE AGREEMENT WITH SEIU LOCAL 721 ON A FAIR
- 13 AND REASONABLE ECONOMIC PACKAGE FOR OUR VALUED EMPLOYEES. THE
- 14 ELEMENTS INCLUDE A \$5,000 ONE-TIME PAYMENT UPON RATIFICATION
- 15 OF THE CONTRACT, A 2% COLA AND A \$2,000 BONUS EFFECTIVE
- 16 OCTOBER 1, 2026, AND A 5% COLA EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1, 2027. IN
- 17 ADDITION TO THAT, THERE'S AN 8% ANNUAL BENEFIT, ANNUAL
- 18 HEALTHCARE CONTRIBUTIONS BENEFIT TOTALING 24% OVER THREE
- 19 YEARS. GIVEN OUR PRECARIOUS FINANCIAL POSITION, THIS IS A VERY
- 20 REASONABLE PACKAGE, AND IT'S THE BEST WE CAN RESPONSIBLY OFFER
- 21 AT THIS TIME. AS IT IS, THE ANNUAL COST OF THIS PACKAGE WILL
- 22 TOTAL MORE THAN \$2,000,000,000, THAT'S THE GROSS AMOUNT, AND
- 23 \$778,000,000 OVER THE ENTIRE TERM OF THE CONTRACT. THAT'S THE
- 24 NCC PORTION. I WANT TO POINT OUT THAT WE STILL HAVE 38
- 25 NEGOTIATING TABLES OPEN AND SALARY INCREASES REMAIN ON THE



- 1 TABLE. IN ADDITION, THE PERSONAL ASSISTANCE SERVICE COUNCIL
- 2 THAT WORKS WITH IN-HOME SERVICES WORKERS, WE ARE ALSO IN
- 3 NEGOTIATION WITH SEIU 2015. WHILE IHSS, AS WE CALL IT, IS A
- 4 STATE PROGRAM ADMINISTERED IN EACH COUNTY, THE COUNTY SHARES
- 5 IN THE COST OF LOCALLY NEGOTIATED WAGE INCREASES. SO, THE
- 6 OUTCOME OF THESE NEGOTIATIONS WILL ALSO HAVE AN IMPACT ON THE
- 7 COUNTY'S BOTTOM LINE. TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE FIRES. WE
- 8 ARE FULLY COMMITTED TO THE COUNTY'S BLUEPRINT FOR REBUILDING.
- 9 THIS UPCOMING ROADMAP FOR AN ACCELERATED RECOVERY WE KNOW IS
- 10 NON-NEGOTIABLE AS WE HELP RESIDENTS, BUSINESSES, AND
- 11 COMMUNITIES RETURN HOME, GET BACK TO WORK, AND THRIVE.
- 12 HOWEVER, WE MUST NOTE THAT THE COUNTY IS ALREADY FACING AT
- 13 LEAST \$800,000,000 IN INITIAL BUDGETARY IMPACTS FROM THE
- 14 FIRES, A FIGURE THAT IS LIKELY TO GROW TO \$2,000,000,000 IN
- 15 THE YEARS AHEAD WHEN YOU ADD BOTH THE COST OF LOST REVENUE ARE
- 16 FACTORED IN. AND LET ME BE MORE SPECIFIC, THE COST OF OUR
- 17 INCREASED EXPENDITURES AND LOST REVENUE. THE COST OF DEFERRING
- 18 PERMIT FEES WILL ALSO ADD TO OUR RESOURCE DEMANDS AS WE WORK
- 19 URGENTLY TO IDENTIFY REVENUE TO GET THE JOB DONE. WE ARE
- 20 WORKING VERY CLOSE WITH THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA AND WITH THE
- 21 FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO SECURE REVENUES TO HELP OFFSET OUR COSTS

- 2 UNDER RECEIVERSHIP, THE DEPARTMENT'S FUNDING WOULD ALSO MOVE
- 3 UNDER THE RECEIVERS CONTROL WITH POTENTIAL SIGNIFICANT IMPACTS
- 4 ON THE COUNTY'S OVERALL BUDGET GOING FORWARD. WE DO NOT KNOW,
- 5 I DO NOT KNOW, AS I SIT HERE TODAY, THE BREADTH, THE SCOPE,
- 6 AND THE DEPTH OF THE POTENTIAL RECEIVERS, IF ONE IS APPOINTED,
- 7 POWER NOT JUST OVER THE PROBATION BUDGET BUT BUDGETARY IMPACTS
- 8 OVER THE LARGER COUNTY GENERAL FUND. I'LL TAKE THE NEXT SLIDE
- 9 PLEASE. SO, THIS SLIDE IS A ROADMAP TO REMIND US OF THE
- 10 ESCALATING CUTS WE HAVE ALREADY MADE OR THE ONES THAT ARE ON
- 11 THE HORIZON. THE SLIDE STARTS ON THE LEFT-HAND SIDE WITH THE
- 12 3% CUTS TO DEPARTMENTAL BUDGETS AND THOSE WERE IMPLEMENTED IN
- 13 APRIL OF THIS YEAR. THESE ARE PRIMARILY CUTBACKS IN PROGRAMS,
- 14 REDUCTIONS IN SERVICES AND SUPPLIES, AND ELIMINATION OF VACANT
- 15 POSITIONS.AND IF I COULD JUST GO OVER JUST A LITTLE BIT OF THE
- 16 DETAIL IN THIS SLIDE. SO, WE KNOW THAT PARKS AND RECREATION
- 17 DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN IMPACTED. THOSE 3% CUTS HAS RESULTED IN
- 18 SHORTER PARK HOURS, THAT'S STARTING IN FISCAL YEAR 25/26, A
- 19 REDUCED SWIM SEASON, AND CUTBACKS IN THE PARKS AFTER DARK
- 20 PROGRAM. WE ALSO HAVE OTHER IMPACTS. ONE ADDITIONAL IMPACT IS
- 21 TO OUR JUSTICE, CARE, AND OPPORTUNITIES DEPARTMENT. THESE CUTS
- 22 ENDS THE COLLEGE AND CAREERS PROGRAMS AT TWO COMMUNITY
- 23 COLLEGES, WHICH ESSENTIALLY REDUCES SUPPORT FOR JUSTICE
- 24 INVOLVED INDIVIDUALS TRYING TO GET THEIR LIVES BACK ON TRACK.
- 25 THESE ARE NOT ALL OF THE IMPACTS FROM THE 3% CUT THAT WE TOOK



- 1 IN THE RECOMMENDED BUDGET IN APRIL, BUT THOSE ARE TWO AS AN
- 2 EXAMPLE JUST TO HIGHLIGHT. THE SECOND COLUMN REPRESENTS THE 5
- 3 1/2% CUTBACKS THAT WILL BE PART OF THE SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET IN
- 4 SEPTEMBER. THESE CUTS GO DEEPER AND THEY ARE ALREADY AFFECTING
- 5 PUBLIC FACING PROGRAM IN SIGNIFICANT WAYS. ONE OF THE THINGS
- 6 THAT I SHOULD POINT OUT IS ON THAT FIRST COLUMN, THAT 3%
- 7 INITIAL CUT, THAT CUT WAS TAKEN TO HELP PAY FINANCE OUR LONG-
- 8 TERM PLAN TO PAY FOR THE AB218 SETTLEMENTS. THE CUTS IN THE
- 9 SECOND COLUMN UNDER THE 5 1/2% THOSE CUTS WILL BE TAKEN IN THE
- 10 SUPPLEMENTAL CHANGES BUDGET TO FUND THE COST OF NEGOTIATED
- 11 LABOR INCREASES. SO LET ME PROVIDE A LITTLE BIT OF CONTEXT.
- 12 NORMALLY, WHEN WE NEGOTIATE OUR LABOR IN CONTRACTS EVERY THREE
- 13 YEARS, WE NORMALLY PAY FOR INCREASES OUT OF THE NEW ADDITIONAL
- 14 REVENUE THAT WE RECEIVE FROM PROPERTY TAXES, PRIMARILY FROM
- 15 PROPERTY TAXES, AND THAT HAS BEEN OUR TRIED-AND-TRUE PRACTICE
- 16 FOR MANY, MANY YEARS. BUT AS I STATED EARLIER, OUR PROPERTY
- 17 TAX REVENUE IS DOWN. IT IS THE LOWEST AMOUNT IT HAS BEEN IN
- 18 OVER FOUR YEARS OR IN FOUR YEARS. AND SO FOR THIS CONTRACT
- 19 NEGOTIATION, WE DID NOT HAVE A SUFFICIENT AMOUNT OF ADDITIONAL
- 20 REVENUE IN ORDER TO FUND OUR NEGOTIATED INCREASES. AND SO,
- 21 WHAT WE'VE DONE THIS YEAR IS WE'VE DONE SOMETHING
- 22 UNPRECEDENTED IN THE COUNTY. WHAT WE'VE DONE IS WE'VE TAKEN
- 23 CURTAILMENTS TO COUNTY DEPARTMENTS, WHICH BASICALLY MEANS
- 24 CURTAILMENTS TO COUNTY SERVICES TO THE PUBLIC, IN ORDER TO
- 25 FUND AND PAY FOR OUR LABOR AGREEMENT. ONE OF THE THINGS THAT



- 1 WE WANTED TO BE MINDFUL OF DOING IS NEGOTIATING INTO A
- 2 STRUCTURAL DEFICIT. WE KNOW THAT OTHER JURISDICTIONS HAVE DONE
- 3 THAT. WE DO NOT BELIEVE THAT THAT IS FISCALLY RESPONSIBLE AND
- 4 IT ALSO HAS LARGER IMPACTS OUTSIDE THE JURISDICTION SO WE KNOW
- 5 THAT THERE COULD BE AN IMPACT TO OUR CREDIT RATING WHICH IS
- 6 VERY IMPORTANT TO US BECAUSE WE HAVE TO TAKE OUT DEBT TO DO
- 7 OTHER THINGS. SO LET ME JUST TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT WHAT WE
- 8 SEE IN THIS COLUMN. THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION IS
- 9 PLANNING TO CLOSE REGIONAL PARKS AND LAKES TWO DAYS A WEEK.
- 10 SUPERVISOR MITCHELL ALLUDED TO THIS TODAY. SO EVEN THOUGH THE
- 11 PARKS DEPARTMENT HAS OVER 180 PARKS, ONE OF THE IMPACTS FROM
- 12 THIS 5 1/2% CURTAILMENT IS THE CLOSURE OF REGIONAL PARKS TWO
- 13 DAYS A WEEK. THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION HAS ALSO
- 14 HAD TO, AT LEAST THEY WERE PLANNING TO FULLY ELIMINATE THE
- 15 VERY POPULAR PARKS AFTER DARK PROGRAM AND THE EXTENDED SWIM
- 16 SEASON. FINALLY, WE ALSO HAVE THE QUESTION MARKS ABOUT THE
- 17 IMPACTS AND WELL LET ME SAY THIS ON THE 5 1/2% CURTAILMENT
- 18 COLUMN YOU ALSO SEE IMPACTS TO PROBATION. PROBATION WILL BE
- 19 CLOSING TWO OFFICES, SANTA MONICA AND THE VALENCIA OFFICES.
- 20 BEACHES AND HARBORS, WHAT IS THE IMPACT OF THOSE 5.5% CUTS?
- 21 THEY WILL HAVE LESS FREQUENT BEACH CLEANING AND SHORTER REST
- 22 ROOM HOURS DUE TO STAFF CUTS. ANIMAL CARE AND CONTROL. WHAT IS
- 23 THE IMPACT TO ANIMAL CARE AND CONTROL? SLOWER ANIMAL ADOPTIONS
- 24 DUE TO LOSS OF CARE CENTER STAFF. SLOWER RESPONSE TO
- 25 RESIDENTIAL COMPLAINTS DUE TO FEWER ENFORCEMENT POSITIONS. AND



- 1 THEN THE LIST GOES ON. CUTS TO ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY. CUTS TO
- 2 ABOUT 100 YOUTH JOBS FOR VULNERABLE POPULATIONS. WE USE OUR
- 3 YOUTH AT WORK PROGRAM TO HELP SUPPORT EMPLOYMENT, PARTICULARLY
- 4 FOR OUR FOSTER YOUTH, OUR HOMELESS YOUTH, OUR LGBTQ YOUTH. SO
- 5 THAT PROGRAM WILL BE IMPACTED. AND THEN WE ALSO HAVE CUTS TO
- 6 STAFFING IN PUBLIC HEALTH FOR STAFFING FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND
- 7 PREVENTION. AGAIN, THIS LIST IS JUST A SNAPSHOT OF THE IMPACTS
- 8 OF THE 5 1/2% CUT THAT THE BOARD WE WILL BE PRESENTING DURING
- 9 THE FINAL CHANGES PHASE OF THE BUDGET IN SUPPLEMENTAL. THEN WE
- 10 GET TO THE THIRD COLUMN, THE FEDERAL CUTS. IT SEEMS CLEAR FROM
- 11 THE INFORMATION WE HAVE NOW THAT WE WILL HAVE TO USE EVERY
- 12 SINGLE TOOL AT OUR DISPOSAL TO NAVIGATE THESE IMPACTS. THESE
- 13 INCLUDE SOME OF THE THINGS THAT YOU WOULD NORMALLY DO WHEN
- 14 YOU'RE TRYING TO MANAGE YOUR BUDGET, HIRING FREEZES AND SOME
- 15 FORM OF FURLOUGHS. BUT IT ALSO INCLUDES MORE SUBSTANTIAL
- 16 POTENTIAL MOVES SUCH AS LAYOFFS, MERGING COUNTY DEPARTMENTS TO
- 17 SAVE ON ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS, AS WELL AS FACILITY CLOSURES. WE
- 18 HAVE BEEN IN COMMUNICATION WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH
- 19 SERVICES AND THEIR LEADERSHIP TEAM UNDER DR. GHALY. PERHAPS
- 20 THE MOST CONSEQUENTIAL OF ALL IS ONE OF THE RESULTS FROM THE
- 21 BIG BILL IS WE WILL LIKELY NEED TO LAY OFF THOUSANDS OF
- 22 EMPLOYEES AND POTENTIALLY CLOSE A COUNTY HOSPITAL WHICH WILL
- 23 DIRECTLY IMPACT THE RESIDENTS WHO RELY ON US. I'LL TAKE THE
- 24 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. EACH WEEK I WILL BE BRINGING TO YOUR BOARD
- 25 THE LATEST BUDGET UPDATES ALONG WITH MORE UPDATED, MORE IN-



- 1 DEPTH REPORTS ON SPECIFIC CHALLENGES. SO TODAY WE WANT TO
- 2 FOCUS ON THE BIG BILL. THIS SLIDE SHOWS HOW THE BIG BILL IS
- 3 IMPACTING US AND HOW THESE IMPACTS WILL GROW PROGRESSIVELY
- 4 WORSE THROUGH FISCAL YEAR 27/28. THESE ARE MAJOR HITS THAT
- 5 WILL UNDERMINE OUR WORK ON BEHALF OF VULNERABLE RESIDENTS,
- 6 PARTICULARLY THOSE WHO DEPEND ON MEDICAID OR RECEIVE NUTRITION
- 7 ASSISTANCE. IN THE FIRST THREE YEARS ALONE, THE COUNTY'S
- 8 ESTIMATED REVENUE LOSS DUE TO JUST THE BIG BILL WILL TOTAL
- 9 APPROXIMATELY \$714,000,000. THAT'S THE TABLE ON THE LEFT-HAND
- 10 SIDE, AND AS YOU CAN SEE, IT IS BROKEN DOWN BY DEPARTMENT.
- 11 THESE PRACTICAL IMPACTS, I'M SORRY, THE PRACTICAL IMPACTS ARE
- 12 THAT HEALTHCARE AND NUTRITION HEALTH FOR THOUSANDS OF OUR MOST
- 13 VULNERABLE RESIDENTS WILL DISAPPEAR. AS FEDERALLY FUNDED
- 14 SERVICES ARE DRAMATICALLY REDUCED, THE COUNTY WILL HAVE NO
- 15 CHOICE BUT TO LAY OFF THOUSANDS AND THOUSANDS OF EMPLOYEES AND
- 16 CLOSE ONE OR MORE FACILITIES. THAT WILL BE A DEVASTATING BLOW
- 17 TO THE RESIDENTS WHO NEED US TO PROVIDE A STRONG SAFETY NET

- 1 ONLY. WE KNOW THAT AS THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, CONGRESS, MOVES
- 2 TO IMPLEMENT ITS BUDGET, THAT THERE ARE BETWEEN 12 AND 14
- 3 APPROPRIATIONS BILLS THAT WILL NEED TO MAKE ITS WAY THROUGH
- 4 CONGRESS AND ULTIMATELY TO THE PRESIDENT'S DESK. AND EACH OF
- 5 THOSE APPROPRIATIONS BILLS HAS THE POTENTIAL FOR ADDITIONAL
- 6 CUTS. AS A MATTER OF FACT, WE KNOW THAT SOME OF THE LANGUAGE
- 7 IN THOSE BILLS DO HAVE POTENTIAL CUTS. THE QUESTION IS WHAT
- 8 WILL THE ULTIMATE APPROPRIATIONS BILL LOOK LIKE? SO, I WANT TO
- 9 BE REALLY CLEAR THESE CUTS ARE FOR THE BIG BILL ALONE. THEY
- 10 ARE SEPARATE AND DISTINCT FROM ANY ADDITIONAL CUTS THAT MAY
- 11 COME DOWN THE PIPELINE AS THE APPROPRIATIONS BILLS MAKE THEIR
- 12 WAY THROUGH CONGRESS AND TO THE PRESIDENT'S.

- 14 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: MADAM CEO, CAN YOU CLARIFY THAT? CAN YOU
- 15 MAKE SURE THAT YOU CAN RESTATE THESE CUTS ARE FOR FEDERAL
- 16 PROGRAMS? AND WE'VE ALREADY UNDERTAKEN, AS YOU SAID, AB218,
- 17 AND THEN OUR POTENTIAL COSTS FOR LABOR NEGOTIATIONS. SO, CAN
- 18 YOU BE CLEAR ABOUT THAT?

- 20 FESIA DAVENPORT: YES. SO, IF WE COULD GO BACK TO SLIDE, I
- 21 THINK IT'S ONE, THAT ONE. SO THIS SLIDE SHOWS YOU VARIOUS
- 22 PRESSURES ON THE COUNTY'S BUDGET, AND BY PRESSURES WHAT I MEAN
- 23 IS THEY EITHER TAKE MONEY OFF THE TABLE THAT WE WOULD NOT
- 24 RECEIVE OR THEY WILL INCREASE THE AMOUNT OF MONEY THAT WE WILL
- 25 HAVE TO PAY OUT FOR THINGS AND SO IN THAT FIRST ROW WHEN I



- 1 TALK, WHEN IT SAYS FEDERAL, THE FEDERAL COST THAT I'M TALKING
- 2 ABOUT TODAY, THAT'S \$714,000,000, IS DUE TO THE RECENTLY
- 3 PASSED, SIGNED BY THE PRESIDENT, BIG BILL. THAT'S ONE CATEGORY
- 4 OF COSTS. THERE ARE ADDITIONAL IMPACTS ON THE HORIZON AT THE
- 5 FEDERAL LEVEL. SO, AS THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT DOES ITS BUDGET,
- 6 AS THOSE BILLS START BEING APPROVED AND THEY'RE SIGNED BY THE
- 7 PRESIDENT, WE WILL BE LOOKING AT ADDITIONAL CUTS OVER AND
- 8 ABOVE THE \$714,000,000.

- 10 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: IS THAT \$800,000,000 IN THE
- 11 SECOND?

- 13 FESIA DAVENPORT: YES, THAT IS. AND WHAT I WOULD SAY IS
- 14 \$800,000,000 IS BASED ON OUR ESTIMATE OF WHAT WE KNOW TODAY
- 15 AND THAT NUMBER CAN CHANGE. THE NUMBERS ARE EVOLVING AS WE GET
- 16 MORE INFORMATION. DID THAT ANSWER YOUR QUESTION SUPERVISOR
- 17 SOLIS? SO, IF I COULD GO BACK TO SLIDE FIVE. YES, NEXT SLIDE
- 18 PLEASE. SO, SUPERVISORS, WE ARE ENTERING A DIFFICULT FINANCIAL
- 19 PERIOD, PERHAPS THE TOUGHEST OF OUR PROFESSIONAL LIFETIMES. I
- 20 WAS HERE DURING COVID WHEN IN A MATTER OF MONTHS, WE THOUGHT
- 21 WE WOULD LOSE OVER \$900,000,000 IN REVENUE, AND WE DID LOSE
- 22 HUNDREDS OF MILLION DOLLARS IN REVENUE, BUT IT WAS NOT THE 900
- 23 FIGURE THAT WE HAD ANTICIPATED. THIS MOMENT WITH ALL OF THESE
- 24 PRESSURES COMING AT US AT THE SAME TIME IS THE TOUGHEST OF MY
- 25 PROFESSIONAL LIFETIME HERE IN THE COUNTY AND I SUSPECT MANY OF



- 1 YOU ALL SITTING ON THE DAIS AS WELL. SO, THERE ARE MANY HARD
- 2 CHOICES FOR US AHEAD BUT WITH FINANCIAL DILIGENCE, STRATEGIC
- 3 REDUCTIONS, AND WITH YOUR BOARD'S BUDGET POLICIES AS A GUIDE,
- 4 I BELIEVE WE WILL BE ABLE TO MAINTAIN A STRONG FISCAL
- 5 FOUNDATION NECESSARY TO PROVIDE THE MOST CRITICAL SERVICES TO
- 6 OUR RESIDENTS OVER THE COMING YEARS AND WITH THAT I THANK YOU.
- 7 THIS CONCLUDES MY PRESENTATION AND I'LL TAKE ANY QUESTIONS YOU
- 8 MAY HAVE.

- 10 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU FOR THAT PRESENTATION.
- 11 SUPERVISOR SOLIS.

- 13 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: YES, THANK YOU. THANK YOU, CEO, FOR THE
- 14 PRESENTATION. I WANTED TO ASK IF IN THE FUTURE WHEN YOU COME

- 20 THERE'S AN ADDITIONAL 2,500 CASES THAT ARE PENDING. IN YOUR
- 21 ESTIMATION, WHAT ARE WE LOOKING AT IN TERMS OF A PAYOUT,
- 22 AGAIN, A SETTLEMENT ON THESE CASES?

- 24 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, THANK YOU FOR THAT, SUPERVISOR. I DON'T
- 25 KNOW. WHAT I WILL SAY IS THAT THE COUNTY COUNSEL IS WORKING



- 1 WITH THE ATTORNEYS WHO ARE WHO THE PLAINTIFF'S COUNCIL ON
- 2 THOSE CASES. WE ARE ALREADY PAID TO PAY \$4,000,000,000 THAT WE
- 3 DO NOT HAVE AND SO EVEN A SINGLE PENNY MORE WOULD BE
- 4 PROBLEMATIC AND CHALLENGING FOR US BUT WE KNOW THAT IT'S NOT
- 5 GOING TO BE THAT AMOUNT. AND SO, I DON'T WANT TO SPECULATE,
- 6 AND COUNTY COUNSEL IS SHAKING HER HEAD NO, THAT I SHOULDN'T,
- 7 BUT WHAT I WILL SAY IS I AM EXPECTING ANOTHER VERY LARGE
- 8 MATERIAL COST AND IMPACT TO OUR BUDGET.

- 10 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: SO, WOULD THAT BE GIVEN THE CASES THAT WERE
- 11 ALREADY SETTLED THAT WE'RE ALREADY PUTTING ASIDE, THIS IS A
- 12 SMALLER NUMBER, BUT YET IT IS STILL LARGE AND COSTS GO UP AND
- 13 EVERYTHING SO IF OUR SETTLEMENT WAS \$4,000,000,000 IS IT SAFE
- 14 TO SAY? 2,500,000,000 MORE OR LESS.

15

- 16 DAWYN R. HARRISON: I WOULD NOT WANT TO SPECULATE IT IS VERY,
- 17 VERY LARGE.

18

- 19 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: IT'S VERY LARGE, OKAY, UNDERSCORE. OKAY. I
- 20 JUST WANTED TO ASK THAT. AND THEN IF YOU COULD ON SLIDE THREE
- 21 OF YOUR PRESENTATION, YOU MENTIONED SEVERAL STRATEGIES. WHICH
- 22 OF THOSE STRATEGIES CAN WE DO NOW, AND WHICH ONES WILL TAKE
- 23 SOME TIME TO IMPLEMENT?

24

25 FESIA DAVENPORT: THANK YOU FOR THAT. SO, SOME OF THE



- 1 STRATEGIES THAT WE CAN DO NOW IS HIRING FREEZE. THAT IS ONE OF
- 2 THE BASIC THINGS THAT GOVERNMENTS DO WHEN YOU ARE UNCERTAIN
- 3 ABOUT YOUR BUDGETARY FUTURE OR THAT YOU NEED TO CONTAIN YOUR
- 4 COSTS. SO, WE WILL NEED TO IMPLEMENT A HIRING FREEZE. DHS HAS
- 5 ALREADY IMPLEMENTED ONE OR IS ABOUT TO DO ONE IMMINENTLY.

7 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: WOULD THAT BE ACROSS THE BOARD?

9 FESIA DAVENPORT: I'M SORRY.

10

- 11 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: WOULD THAT BE ACROSS THE BOARD? BECAUSE I
- 12 KNOW WE'VE MADE EXCEPTIONS TO SOME DEPARTMENTS.

13

- 14 FESIA DAVENPORT: YES, SO THERE ARE, IT WOULD NOT BE ACROSS THE
- 15 BOARD. THERE ARE CERTAIN POSITIONS IN THE COUNTY SUPERVISOR
- 16 THAT UNDER LAW, IT MUST HAVE A PERSON DOING THE WORK. WE CALL
- 17 THOSE POST POSITIONS AND SO GENERALLY SPEAKING WE WANT TO MAKE
- 18 SURE THAT WE'RE ABLE TO COMPLY WITH THE LAW AND MAKE SURE THAT
- 19 POSITIONS THOSE POSITIONS ARE FILLED AND GENERALLY SPEAKING IN
- 20 WHEN WE'VE HAD HIRING FREEZES IN THE PAST, WE HAVE EXEMPTED
- 21 FROM THE HIRING FREEZE, THOSE TYPES OF POSITIONS WHERE WE KNOW
- 22 THAT WE NEED TO PROVIDE A 24 HOUR SERVICE, EITHER WE'RE
- 23 LEGALLY OBLIGATED TO DO IT OR MANDATED TO DO IT BY COUNTY
- 24 CODE.

- 3 FESIA DAVENPORT: SOME OF THE MORE, WHAT I WILL SAY, UNCOMMON
- 4 STRATEGIES ARE FACILITY CLOSURES. WE SAW THAT I JUST MENTIONED
- 5 PROBATION IS GOING TO BE CLOSING TWO OFFICES. YOU CAN SEE THAT
- 6 ON THE 5 1/2% COLUMN OF DHS IN SOME OF THEIR PROJECTIONS.
- 7 LOOKING AT THE BIG BILL AND SOME OF THE OTHER CHANGES COMING
- 8 DOWN THE PIPELINE THAT WE THINK ARE COMING DOWN THE PIPELINE
- 9 RELATIVE TO MEDICAID IS TALKING ABOUT CLOSING A HOSPITAL. AND
- 10 THEN WE HAVE MERGING DEPARTMENTS. WE HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO GO
- 11 BACK AND SEE FROM OUR ORGANIZATIONAL COUNTY DESIGN HOW WHICH
- 12 DEPARTMENTS DO WHAT THINGS AND HOW MANY DEPARTMENTS WE HAVE.
- 13 WE NEED TO GO BACK AND LOOK TO SEE IF THERE'S AN OPPORTUNITY
- 14 TO CONSOLIDATE SO THAT WE CAN SAVE MONEY. SO, WHAT I WOULD SAY
- 15 IS THOSE LAST TWO ON THAT LIST ARE TWO UNCOMMON, BUT THEY MAY
- 16 BE NECESSARY STRATEGIES.

- 18 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: OKAY. MADAM CHAIR, JUST ONE OUESTION. I KNOW
- 19 DR. CONTRERAS IS HERE. I WANTED TO ASK HER A QUESTION BECAUSE
- 20 YOUR DEPARTMENT IS GOING TO BE THE SECOND HARDEST HIT
- 21 FINANCIALLY.

- 23 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND THEN DR. GHALY, YOU MIGHT WANT
- 24 TO COME UP TO, BECAUSE I'M SURE THERE WILL BE QUESTIONS.

- 2 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: YEAH. AND EXCUSE ME, MADAM CHAIR. SO I
- 3 WANTED TO ASK YOU IF YOU COULD ESTIMATE HOW MUCH IN FUNDING
- 4 CUTS YOUR DEPARTMENT ARE GOING TO EXPERIENCE, BUT MORE
- 5 IMPORTANTLY, WHAT DOES THAT MEAN IN TERMS OF RECIPIENTS, THOSE
- 6 THAT ARE ON MEDICAID, THAT RECEIVE THE SNAP PROGRAM, THE FOOD,
- 7 WHAT USED TO BE CALLED THE FOOD STAMPS, AND ANY OTHER
- 8 PROGRAMS? AND THAT'S MY QUESTION.

10 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: GOOD MORNING SUPERVISORS.

11

- 12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: CAN YOU PULL IT DOWN TO YOUR,
- 13 THERE YOU GO.

- 15 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: I WANT TO PREFACE MY COMMENTS BY SAYING
- 16 THAT THESE NUMBERS ARE CHANGING IN REAL TIME. SO, ANYTHING
- 17 THAT I PROVIDE TO YOU TODAY ARE OUR BEST SORT OF ESTIMATES.
- 18 SO, WE KNOW ALREADY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT FOR OUR CALFRESH
- 19 ADMIN COSTS HAS REDUCED THEIR CONTRIBUTION FROM 50% TO 25%. SO
- 20 THAT MEANS THE STATE IS NOW RESPONSIBLE FOR 75%. FOR L.A.
- 21 COUNTY, THAT'S A HIT OF \$200,000,000. THE STATE HAS LET US
- 22 KNOW THAT THEY ARE GOING TO SPLIT THAT, 70-30, WHICH IS IN THE
- 23 WIC CODE. THAT'S THE EXPECTATION THAT THEY WOULD DO THAT. SO
- 24 THAT IN AND OF ITSELF IS APPROXIMATELY A \$59,300,000 HIT FOR
- 25 US. AND AGAIN, THIS MAY CHANGE OVER TIME. REGARDING OUR



- 1 CALFRESH ASSISTANCE COSTS, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS ALSO
- 2 IMPLEMENTING, AND THIS IS AN EXPECTATION, THAT IF OUR ERROR
- 3 RATE EXCEEDS A CERTAIN AMOUNT, SO 5%, 10%, OR 15%, THAT THIS
- 4 IS ON THE ASSISTANCE SIDE, RIGHT, THE BENEFITS THAT WE PROVIDE
- 5 TO OUR CUSTOMERS, THAT WE WILL BE CHARGED THAT PERCENTAGE
- 6 BASED ON OUR ERROR RATE. SO DPSS HAS TRADITIONALLY HELPED TO
- 7 KEEP THE STATE UNDER THE NATIONAL AVERAGE, WHICH IS THE
- 8 STANDARD CHARGE FOR OUR ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS, BUT THAT IS NOT
- 9 AT THE NUMBERS THAT THEY'RE PUTTING FORTH IN TERMS OF WHAT THE
- 10 EXPECTATION IS. AND SO, THE STATE, AGAIN, IS RESPONSIBLE FOR
- 11 THESE DOLLARS. AND THEY'RE ESTIMATING IT'S ROUGHLY A
- 12 \$2,000,000,000 HIT FOR THE STATE IF WE'RE IMPACTED AT THE
- 13 HIGHEST LEVEL. NOW, EVEN IF THAT COST DOESN'T COME TO THE
- 14 COUNTY, THAT COST HAS TO COME FROM SOMEWHERE. SO, WE RECOGNIZE
- 15 THAT WE NEED TO TRACK THIS CLOSELY. AND WE HAVE ALWAYS FOCUSED
- 16 ON OUR ERROR RATE TO MAKE SURE THAT WE GET THAT AS LOW AS
- 17 POSSIBLE. BUT THAT'S ANOTHER POTENTIALLY SIGNIFICANT CUT. AND
- 18 AGAIN, THESE ARE ESTIMATES. IN TERMS OF OUR CUSTOMERS, SO ON
- 19 THE MEDICAID SIDE, WE KNOW THAT APPROXIMATELY 2,200,000 PEOPLE
- 20 ARE BETWEEN THE AGES OF 19 TO 64. AND THAT IS THE EXPANDED AGE
- 21 RANGE FOR THOSE THAT ARE GOING TO REQUIRE WORK REQUIREMENTS.
- 22 AND WE KNOW BASICALLY THAT MANY, MANY, THE VAST MAJORITY OF
- 23 THE PEOPLE ON MEDICAID ARE WORKING ALREADY, BUT THIS MEANS
- 24 THAT THEY WILL HAVE TO SUBMIT DOCUMENTATION, AND THAT MAKES
- 25 THE PROCESS MORE CUMBERSOME. IN ADDITION FOR THE CALFRESH, WE



- 1 ALSO HAVE WORK REOUIREMENTS THAT ARE GOING TO GO INTO EFFECT
- 2 SHORTLY. AND SO, WE'RE WORKING WITH THE STATE TO TRY TO MAKE
- 3 SURE THAT WE CONSOLIDATE THAT, AND WE DON'T CREATE TWO
- 4 SEPARATE TRACKS IN TERMS OF HOW WE MONITOR. BUT WE EXPECT THAT
- 5 MANY PEOPLE MAY FALL OFF BECAUSE OF THAT. AND SO, YOU KNOW,
- 6 WE'RE WORKING CLOSELY WITH OUR MANAGED CARE PROVIDERS TO TRY
- 7 TO MAKE SURE THAT WE DO EVERYTHING POSSIBLE TO KEEP PEOPLE ON
- 8 BENEFITS. IT'S ALWAYS BEEN A FOCUS OF THE DEPARTMENT. DURING
- 9 COVID, WE WANTED TO MAKE SURE THAT PEOPLE DIDN'T FALL OFF THE
- 10 BENEFITS. BUT THE CONSEQUENCES FOR OUR CUSTOMERS IS SUCH MORE
- 11 SEVERE THAN IT HAS EVER BEEN. AND SO, IF SOMEBODY IS
- 12 UNDOCUMENTED AS OF JANUARY 1ST AND THEY FALL OFF MEDI-CAL,
- 13 THEY WILL NO LONGER BE ABLE TO APPLY AFTER THAT 90-DAY CURE
- 14 PERIOD. IF THEY DON'T GET BACK ON, THEY WON'T BE ABLE TO APPLY
- 15 FOR FULL SCOPE MEDI-CAL. ANY LONGER, THEY WON'T BE ELIGIBLE.
- 16 SO, IT'S CRITICAL THAT WE KEEP THEM ON THE BENEFIT. SO THOSE
- 17 ARE SOME OF THE HIGHLIGHTS THAT I WOULD OFFER FOR CALFRESH AND
- 18 MEDI-CAL.

- 20 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: SO, WHEN YOU SAY THERE'S WHAT OF \$59,300,000
- 21 YOU SAID, POTENTIAL, THAT'S A CUT. CAN YOU PUT THAT IN TERMS
- 22 OF SERVICE TO RESIDENTS? WHAT DOES THAT MEAN?

- 24 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: SO, OUR ESTIMATES RIGHT NOW IS THAT IT'S
- 25 ABOUT 245 POSITIONS THAT WE MAY HAVE TO REDUCE IN ORDER TO



- 1 ACCOMMODATE THAT CUT. THAT, OF COURSE, ALWAYS MEANS THE
- 2 POTENTIAL FOR INCREASED WAIT TIMES IN OUR OFFICES, ON THE
- 3 PHONE. WE ARE, IF I CAN SAY, AND THIS IS THINKING OF DPSS A
- 4 LITTLE BIT IN A SILO, WE HAVE ATTRITION WEIGHT OF ABOUT 70 EWS
- 5 PER MONTH, AND FOR GOOD REASONS, MANY OF THEM PROMOTE OR THEY
- 6 RETIRE OR OTHER THINGS LIKE THAT, BUT WE HAVE THAT ATTRITION
- 7 AND SO FOR THAT CUT IN ISOLATION, WE WOULD PLAN FOR THOSE
- 8 REDUCTIONS IN THAT WAY OVER ATTRITION. BUT THAT, AGAIN, IS
- 9 JUST LOOKING AT US IN ISOLATION. IT'S NOT LOOKING AT THE
- 10 BIGGER PICTURE FOR THE COUNTY AND POSSIBLE IMPLICATIONS.

- 12 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND I AM REALLY SO DISTRESSED ABOUT AND
- 13 UPSET. I JUST HAVE TO SAY THAT AND NOTHING DIRECTED AT ANY OF
- 14 YOU OR MEMBERS HERE, OUR CEO, BUT I THINK THE PUBLIC REALLY
- 15 HAS TO UNDERSTAND THAT WHEN CUTS ARE PROPOSED AT THIS
- 16 MAGNITUDE, AT THIS LEVEL, THAT THERE ARE GOING TO BE A DROP IN
- 17 SERVICES AND IMPLICATIONS THAT WILL IMPACT THOSE THAT ARE MOST
- 18 IN NEED, THE MOST VULNERABLE, BECAUSE OUR PROGRAM IS SET UP TO
- 19 HELP AS THAT, YOU KNOW, UNFUNDED MANDATE. WE ARE OBLIGED TO
- 20 PROTECT PEOPLE THAT CAN'T GO ANYWHERE ELSE. AND IN MANY WAYS,
- 21 I BELIEVE OUR DOORS ARE GOING TO BE CLOSED. AND THAT'S THE
- 22 LAST THING I WANT TO SEE, BUT I WANT TOBE REALISTIC AS WELL.
- 23 SO, I APPRECIATE YOUR COMMENTS TODAY. AND THANK YOU AGAIN,
- 24 MADAM CHAIR, FOR ALLOWING ME TO ASK THESE QUESTIONS.



- 1 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: YEAH, AND I ASKED DR. FERRER AS
- 2 WELL TO COME UP IN CASE ANY OF MY COLLEAGUES HAVE A QUESTION.
- 3 I KNOW I'M GOING TO HAVE A FEW. SUPERVISOR HORVATH.

- 5 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I KNOW THAT
- 6 LIABILITIES AND SETTLEMENTS HAVE ALWAYS BEEN A CHALLENGE FOR
- 7 THE COUNTY, BUT NOW WE ARE CERTAINLY IN UNPRECEDENTED TIMES
- 8 FROM 218 TO THE DISASTER IMPACTS AND RESPONSE AND FEDERAL
- 9 GOVERNMENT SWEEPING CHANGES THAT YOU'VE HIGHLIGHTED. THESE
- 10 CHALLENGES ARE UNLIKE ANY THE COUNTY HAS SEEN. AND I KNOW THAT
- 11 YOU IDENTIFIED LABOR, AND I KNOW THAT THAT'S A SIGNIFICANT
- 12 COST TO THE COUNTY, THOUGH I WOULD NOT CHARACTERIZE IT IN THE
- 13 SAME WAY, BECAUSE I THINK LABOR IS HOW WE DELIVER SERVICE TO
- 14 OUR COMMUNITIES. AND SO, WE NEED TO BE INVESTING IN PEOPLE WHO
- 15 ARE DOING THAT WORK, BECAUSE THAT IS ACTUALLY HOW WE UPLIFT
- 16 OUR COMMUNITIES. SO, I SEE IT DIFFERENTLY, THOUGH I CERTAINLY
- 17 UNDERSTAND THAT WHAT WE ARE SPENDING ON LABOR IS SOMETHING
- 18 THAT WE HAVE TO CONSIDER. WE ALSO HAVE TO CONSIDER MAKING SURE
- 19 THAT WE ARE DELIVERING OUALITY SERVICE TO OUR RESIDENTS. BUT I
- 20 THINK IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE SEE EVERYTHING IN CONTEXT, SO I'M
- 21 GLAD THAT WE HAVE THIS CONVERSATION. SO, TO THAT END, HOW DO
- 22 YOU ANTICIPATE APPROACHING OUR SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET DUE TO
- 23 THESE FINANCIAL THREATS?

24

25 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, PART OF THE PLAN FOR SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET



- 1 HAS ALREADY BEEN SET BECAUSE WE DO NEED TO IMPLEMENT THE 5
- 2 1/2% CURTAILMENT IN THE DEPARTMENTS. SO, WE'VE BEEN WORKING
- 3 WITH THEM FOR A WHILE NOW. WE KNOW WHAT THE PLANS ARE, WE KNOW
- 4 WHICH SERVICES WILL BE IMPACTED, WE KNOW WHAT POSITIONS WILL
- 5 BE IMPACTED. THE OTHER PART OF SUPPLEMENTAL WILL, AND PART OF
- 6 IT DEPENDS ON, YOU KNOW, I'VE MENTIONED EARLIER THAT THERE ARE
- 7 TWO BASIC CATEGORIES OF IMPACTS FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.
- 8 ONE IS THE BIG BILL AND THAT'S THE ONE WE CAN PLAN FOR. WE
- 9 HAVE MORE OF A LONGER RUNWAY. THE OTHER IMPACTS ARE WHAT WE'VE
- 10 SEEN THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, WHERE WE JUST HAVE GRANTS THAT ARE
- 11 RESCINDED OR THAT ARE NOT RENEWED. AND SO, ONE OF THE THINGS
- 12 THAT WE WILL HAVE TO WORK WITH THE DEPARTMENTS DOING AS WELL
- 13 AS DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES IS WORKFORCE REDUCTION PLANS.
- 14 AND THE REASON WHY I SAY THAT SUPERVISOR IS THE COUNTY'S
- 15 BUDGET IS SO LARGE WE CANNOT TURN OUR BUDGET ON A DIME. IT
- 16 TAKES US AND WE HAVE REQUIREMENTS AND OBLIGATIONS AND SO WE
- 17 WILL BE WORKING WITH THE DEPARTMENTS ON OUR WORKFORCE
- 18 REDUCTION PLANS. IN TERMS OF REQUESTS FROM DEPARTMENTS, WE
- 19 HAVE NOT STARTED OUR INTERNAL BUDGET HEARINGS FOR
- 20 SUPPLEMENTAL, BUT I ANTICIPATE ALMOST ALL OF THOSE WILL BE
- 21 DENIED. AND THEN WHAT WILL BE LEFT TO DECIDE IS IF THERE IS
- 22 AVAILABLE REVENUE, HOW MIGHT THAT REVENUE BE APPORTIONED BASED
- 23 ON WHAT WE ARE LOOKING AT NOW AND WHAT WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO
- 24 LOOK AT TOMORROW.



- 1 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: SO, GIVEN THAT, WHAT DO YOU SEE AS THE
- 2 TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTING THE IMPACTS, ESPECIALLY OF THE
- 3 FEDERAL CUTS? WHEN DO YOU THINK WE'LL SEE THAT MATERIALIZE IN
- 4 TERMS OF OUR WORKFORCE AND SERVICE PROVISION TO THE COMMUNITY?

- 6 FESIA DAVEPORT: SOME OF IT IS HAPPENING RIGHT NOW IN THIS
- 7 CURRENT FISCAL YEAR, RIGHT NOW IN 25/26, I THINK DPH HAS
- 8 ALREADY STARTED TO IMPLEMENT SOME OF THOSE THINGS. IN ONE OF
- 9 THE SLIDES, AND I'LL DEFER TO THE DEPARTMENT SPECIFICALLY, MY
- 10 MAJOR TAKEAWAY IS THAT FOR 25/26, THE CURRENT YEAR THAT WE'RE
- 11 IN, WE'RE STARTING TO SEE SOME OF THE IMPACTS, AND THAT THOSE
- 12 ARE MANAGEABLE FOR THE TIME BEING. 26/27 IS WHERE WE WILL
- 13 CONTINUE TO RECEIVE THESE IMPACTS. SO THAT'S STARTING JULY 1,
- 14 2026, WHERE WE THINK, I THINK THAT WE'RE GOING TO START TO
- 15 IMPLEMENT SOME OF THESE MORE IMPACTFUL, WHAT SOME MIGHT CALL
- 16 DRACONIAN MEASURES, INCLUDING LAYOFFS AND REDUCTIONS, TO BE
- 17 ABLE TO ADDRESS THE IMPACTS COMING DOWN FROM THE FEDERAL
- 18 GOVERNMENT. AND THEN LET ME JUST ASK IF ANY OF THE DEPARTMENT
- 19 HEADS IF YOU THINK THAT THAT'S DIFFERENT. SO, MY ANSWER IS
- 20 THERE ARE SOME THAT ARE HAPPENING NOW THEY SEEM TO BE
- 21 MANAGEABLE. WHAT WE ARE EXPECTING IS STARTING IN 26/27 IS
- 22 WHERE WE WILL REALLY HAVE TO IMPLEMENT A LOT OF THOSE
- 23 STRATEGIES THAT WERE ON THE SLIDE.

25 DR. BARBARA FERRER: YEAH, I THINK FOR PUBLIC HEALTH, THE



- 1 THREAT IS REAL RIGHT NOW. FOR EXAMPLE, THE SNAP-ED PROGRAM
- 2 DISAPPEARS AT \$16,000,000. IT'S FUNDING 20 COMMUNITY
- 3 ORGANIZATIONS AND A WHOLE HOST OF STAFF. THAT MONEY'S GONE,
- 4 YOU KNOW, LITERALLY BEFORE OCTOBER. WE'VE ALSO GOTTEN CUTS IN
- 5 JUST ABOUT EVERYTHING EXCEPT FOR OUR HIV GRANTS THAT ARE IN
- 6 THE 25-BUDGET CYCLE. SO, REMEMBER, BECAUSE OF THE FEDERAL
- 7 GRANT YEARS, SOME OF THE 25-BUDGET GRANTS ARE STILL ACTIVE AND
- 8 BEING RENEWED AND PRETTY MUCH EVERYTHING EXCEPT HIV WAS
- 9 ALREADY CUT I THINK FESIA'S RIGHT YOU KNOW WE'RE MANAGING I
- 10 DON'T THINK WE'LL MANAGE THE \$16,000,000 CUT IN SNAP THAT I
- 11 MEAN I'LL HAVE A HUGE IMPLICATION THAT MONEY JUST DISAPPEARS.
- 12 BUT 26-BUDGET FOR US IS AN OCTOBER BUDGET WITH THE THREATS
- 13 FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND THEY'RE IN TWO WAYS. ONE IS
- 14 THEY'VE REDUCED THE CDC BUDGET, FOR EXAMPLE, OUR MAJOR FUNDER,
- 15 BY 50% IN THE PROPOSED BUDGETS. IF WE GET 50 PERCENT CUT IN
- OUR FEDERAL GRANTS, THAT'S \$450,000,000. THAT WILL HAVE A HUGE
- 17 IMPACT, AND IT WILL START, SADLY, IN OCTOBER FOR US. IT WON'T
- 18 NECESSARILY COME IN OUR FISCAL YEAR NEXT YEAR. SO, I THINK WE
- 19 HAVE SOME RISKS THERE. I ALSO WANT TO SAY THAT THE CONTRACT
- 20 LANGUAGE THAT'S BEING HANDED DOWN WHEN WE GET OUR GRANTS, SO
- 21 WE'RE GOING TO GET CUTS IN FUNDING, BUT WE'RE ALSO GETTING
- 22 CONTRACT LANGUAGE THAT MAY BE UNTENABLE. WE'RE GETTING
- 23 LANGUAGE THAT MAY SAY WE HAVE TO COOPERATE WITH ICE. WE'RE
- 24 GETTING LANGUAGE THAT SAYS WE HAVE TO CHECK EVERYONE'S
- 25 IMMIGRATION STATUS. WE'RE A PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT. WE CAN'T



- 1 REALLY CHECK EVERYONE'S IMMIGRATION STATUS TO DO OUR WORK. WE
- 2 SERVE EVERYONE FOR THE GOOD OF EVERYONE. SO, WE MIGHT GET
- 3 LANGUAGE IN CONTRACTS THAT WE ALSO THEN HAVE TO FIGURE OUT HOW
- 4 WE'RE GOING TO MANAGE. SO, I THINK FOR US THE FEDERAL PICTURE
- 5 IS VERY BLEAK AND IT WILL START IN OCTOBER FOR SURE ALTHOUGH
- 6 SOME IMPACTS ARE ALREADY HAPPENING.

- 8 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: SO, I CAN JUST ADD THAT FOR OUR
- 9 CUSTOMERS MANY OF THE IMPACTS WILL HAPPEN SOONER THAN NEXT
- 10 FISCAL YEAR BECAUSE SOME OF THEM ARE TIED TO STATE CHANGES AND
- 11 ELIGIBILITY, IN TERMS OF BUDGETARY IMPACTS WE'RE REALLY
- 12 LOOKING AT NEXT FISCAL YEAR WHERE WE'LL SEE THOSE IMPLEMENTED.

- 14 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, CAN I JUST CLARIFY ONE THING WHEN YOU
- 15 SAID FOR CUSTOMERS AND IT'S TIED TO ELIGIBILITY SO THOSE ARE
- 16 CHANGES IN THE REQUIREMENTS TO QUALIFY FOR A SERVICE, AND THAT
- 17 THOSE REQUIREMENTS MAY CHANGE, AND THEREFORE PEOPLE MAY NOT
- 18 OUALIFY FOR THE PROGRAM? IS THAT WHAT YOU'RE SAYING?

19

- 20 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: CORRECT. SO, FOR INSTANCE, I WAS
- 21 REFERENCING EARLIER THE IMMIGRATION STATUS, SO THAT
- 22 ELIGIBILITY. AND THEN WE ALSO HAVE A SHARE OF COSTS THAT'S
- 23 GOING TO BE IMPLEMENTED SOONER AS WELL.

24

25 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: FOR HEALTH SERVICES, WE'VE ALREADY



- 1 STARTED IMPLEMENTING A NUMBER OF EFFICIENCY MEASURES JUST TO
- 2 TRY TO STRETCH OUT OUR EXISTING FUND BALANCE AND ALLOW IT TO
- 3 LAST LONGER WHILE WE WORK THROUGH VARIOUS MITIGATION
- 4 STRATEGIES ON SOME OF THE REVENUE CUTS THAT ARE COMING DOWN
- 5 THE ROAD IN THE BIG BILL A NUMBER OF FOR HEALTH SERVICES A
- 6 NUMBER OF THE LARGER FINANCIAL CHANGES IN THE BIG BILL ARE
- 7 BACKLOADED IN THE BILL SO WE DON'T HAVE THE LARGEST FEDERAL
- 8 CUTS UNTIL 27/28 AND 28/29 SO THAT BOTH GIVES US A LITTLE BIT
- 9 OF TIME TO WORK ON MITIGATION STRATEGIES AND ALSO TIME TO
- 10 DEVELOP OTHER ALTERNATIVES. THAT SAID WE DO HAVE NEAR-TERM
- 11 CUTS. WE ALREADY HAD A CUT ON A REDUCTION IN OUR
- 12 DISPROPORTIONATE HOSPITAL SHARE PAYMENTS THAT HIT US IN 24/25
- 13 AND UNLESS THE DISH CUTS ARE DELAYED BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT
- 14 IN A CONTINUING RESOLUTION BILL WILL HAVE AN ADDITIONAL CUT ON
- 15 DISH PAYMENTS IN 25/26. THERE'S A NUMBER OF DR. CONTRERAS
- 16 ALREADY ALSO SPOKE TO THE CHANGE ON THE STATE SIDE FOR
- 17 ENROLLMENT INTO MEDI-CAL FOR INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE UNDOCUMENTED
- 18 THAT THAT ENROLLMENT WILL BE FROZEN STARTING JANUARY 1, 2026,
- 19 AND THAT WILL HAVE A NEGATIVE IMPACT ON DHS'S FINANCES AS
- 20 SADLY THERE WILL BE A NUMBER OF PEOPLE THAT FALL OFF THE ROLLS
- 21 AND THEN DON'T REDETERMINE AND GET BACK ON WITHIN THAT 90-DAY
- 22 CURE PERIOD THAT DR. CONTRERAS MENTIONED. I THINK ALSO
- 23 STEPPING BACK PART OF THE PROBLEM THAT WE'RE FACING, AND I
- 24 KNOW IT'S OTHER DEPARTMENTS AS WELL, IS THAT HISTORICALLY
- 25 WE'VE MANAGED OUR INCREASED COSTS BY BEING ABLE TO PULL IN



- 1 ADDITIONAL REVENUE, WHETHER IT'S STATE OR FEDERAL MEDICAID
- 2 REVENUE. WHEN WE TALK ABOUT THE CUTS, WHETHER THEY'RE CUTS IN
- 3 THE BIG BILL OR CUTS IN THIS BY THE STATE OR CUTS IN DISH, AND
- 4 WE TALK ABOUT TRYING TO AVOID THE CUTS, THAT PRESUMES THEN
- 5 THAT WE'RE FLAT ON THE REVENUE AND THAT WE DON'T HAVE A
- 6 DECLINE IN THE REVENUE. HOWEVER, THAT DOES NOT PROVIDE, EVEN
- 7 IF WE COULD DO THAT AND ACHIEVE THAT, THAT DOESN'T PROVIDE THE
- 8 ADDITIONAL REVENUE THAT WE WOULD NEED TO FUND THE COST
- 9 INCREASES. SO, FOR DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES, WE PROJECT A
- 10 \$1,800,000,000 BUDGET GAP, A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN OUR ONGOING
- 11 REVENUE AND OUR ONGOING COSTS BY 28/29. SEVEN HUNDRED AND
- 12 FIFTY MILLION DOLLARS OF THAT IS FROM REVENUE CUTS. A
- \$1,000,000,000 OF THAT IS FROM ANTICIPATED COST INCREASES, A
- 14 COMBINATION OF THE COST OF ADDITIONAL COSTS FOR LABOR,
- 15 ADDITIONAL COSTS FOR MEDICAL SUPPLIES, ADDITIONAL COSTS FOR
- 16 FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS AND UPGRADES, ADDITIONAL COSTS FOR
- 17 PHARMACEUTICALS. AND SO, WHEN WE DON'T HAVE MORE REVENUE TO
- 18 PULL IN TO FUND THE COSTS, THAT CONTRIBUTES TO THAT IMBALANCE
- 19 BETWEEN COSTS AND REVENUE, WHICH IS WHY WE'VE NEEDED TO REALLY
- 20 TAKE ACTION STARTING NOW, EVEN IF WE'RE ABLE TO FULLY MITIGATE
- 21 THE FEDERAL BIG BILL CUTS.

- 23 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: I WOULD SAY MY REFRAIN ON THIS TOPIC HAS
- 24 CONSISTENTLY BEEN, THESE ARE NOT CHANGES THAT THE COUNTY WANTS
- 25 TO BE MAKING. THESE ARE CHANGES THAT ARE COMING FROM



- 1 CIRCUMSTANCES THAT ARE EXTERNAL TO HOW WE TYPICALLY DO
- 2 GOVERNMENT HERE. TO UNDERSTAND THE SWEEPING CHANGES FROM THE
- 3 FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, STATE LEGISLATION AND ITS IMPACTS. OF
- 4 COURSE, THE IMPACTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE THAT CAUSED THE FIRE
- 5 DISASTERS, THESE ARE NOT THINGS THAT THE COUNTY IS CHOOSING TO
- 6 DO. IT'S ULTIMATELY WHAT WE HAVE TO DO, AND WE WILL HAVE TO
- 7 REIMAGINE HOW WE DO COUNTY SERVICE AS A RESULT IN ORDER TO
- 8 MEET THE BOTTOM-LINE REQUIREMENTS THAT THE COUNTY IS SUPPOSED
- 9 TO PROVIDE IN ALL AREAS OF SERVICE. AND GIVEN THESE REALITIES,
- 10 THE COUNTY, I THINK, ESPECIALLY IN PARTNERSHIP WITH OUR
- 11 RESIDENTS WITH BALLOT INITIATIVES THAT HAVE BEEN INVESTING IN
- 12 SOME OF OUR MOST COMPLICATED CHALLENGES LIKE HOMELESSNESS, WE
- 13 KNOW, AND INVESTMENT IN OUR FIRE DEPARTMENT THROUGH MEASURE E.
- 14 THE VOTERS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY HAVE INVESTED KNOWING WHAT
- 15 THE CHALLENGES ARE THAT WE FACE, BUT WHEN WE ARE THEN
- 16 ADDITIONALLY IMPACTED, EVEN THE WAYS IN WHICH WE'VE TRIED TO
- 17 PROTECT OURSELVES AND PREVENT THIS KIND OF WORK, THIS KIND OF
- 18 IMPACT. WE'RE NOW HAVING TO USE WHAT SHOULD HAVE BEEN ON TOP
- 19 OF, IN ORDER TO DO THE WORK THAT WE HAVE ALREADY BEEN DOING.
- 20 AND SO, AND I KNOW PEOPLE ARE ALREADY FEELING IT AT A TIME
- 21 WHERE PEOPLE ARE HURTING SO SEVERELY TO EVEN SUGGEST THAT THE
- 22 COUNTY IS GOING TO HAVE TO DO LESS AS A RESULT, I KNOW WILL
- 23 CAUSE A LOT OF CONCERN AND HARM FOR OUR COMMUNITIES THAT ARE
- 24 ALREADY IMPACTED. SO, I APPRECIATE WHY WE'RE HAVING THIS
- 25 CONVERSATION, BUT I JUST WANT TO, AGAIN, AFFIRM THAT THIS IS



- 1 NOT THE DIRECTION THE COUNTY WANTS TO BE GOING. AND I THINK
- 2 THAT WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT WE CONTINUE TO IDENTIFY ANY
- 3 SORT OF OPPORTUNITIES WE HAVE TO CREATE NEW STREAMS OF
- 4 REVENUE, TO BE CREATIVE IN HOW WE ARE PARTNERING WITH
- 5 COMMUNITY PARTNERS, AND TO STRETCH THE FUNDING SOURCES THAT WE
- 6 HAVE EVEN FURTHER. I KNOW THAT WE'RE TRYING TO DO THAT, FOR
- 7 EXAMPLE, IN HOW WE'RE ESTABLISHING OUR NEW HOMELESSNESS
- 8 DEPARTMENT TO MAKE SURE THAT THE COUNTY DOLLARS THAT ARE
- 9 COMING IN STRETCH FARTHER. AND WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO DO THAT

- 14 THE BOARD NEEDS TO BE DOING. I THINK CERTAINLY ADVOCACY
- 15 EFFORTS, VERY PUBLIC ADVOCACY EFFORTS IN THE SPACES WHERE
- 16 WE'RE IDENTIFYING WHAT THE ACTUAL IMPACT, YOU KNOW, WHERE
- 17 THESE IMPACTS ARE COMING FROM, I THINK IS GOING TO BE AN
- 18 IMPORTANT COMPONENT.

- 22 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR AND MADAM CEO.
- 23 THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR THE PRESENTATION. YOU MADE IT, YOU
- 24 MADE A PLAIN, SO THANK YOU. THERE WERE A COUPLE OF TIMES I
- 25 THOUGHT THAT SHE BURIED THE LEAD, BUT THEN YOU, THE HAMMER



- 1 CAME OUT AND I THINK ALL OF US HEARD LOUD AND CLEAR THE
- 2 REALITY. YOU TALKED ABOUT IT BEING THE MOST DIFFICULT TIME IN
- 3 YOUR CAREER. I THINK THAT'S TRUE. I THINK ABOUT MY TIME
- 4 ENTERING ELECTED OFFICE DURING THE GREAT RECESSION. AND THE
- 5 DIFFERENCE THEN WAS IT REALLY WAS A RECESSION. THIS ISN'T
- 6 ABOUT A RECESSION. THIS ISN'T ABOUT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT
- 7 DOESN'T HAVE THE MONEY. THIS IS ABOUT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT
- 8 HAS PRIORITIZED WINNERS AND LOSERS. THIS IS ABOUT THE FEDERAL
- 9 GOVERNMENT HAS SAID I'M GOING TO GIVE A TAX BREAK TO THE TOP
- 10 1% ON THE BACKS OF PEOPLE OF COLOR AND POOR PEOPLE. AND IN MY
- 11 HISTORIC DAYS LOBBYING FOR WESTERN CENTER, WE TALKED ABOUT THE
- 12 AGED, BLIND, AND DISABLED, THOSE WHO GOT MEDICAID COVERAGE.
- 13 SO, WE SHOULD ALL BE CLEAR, THIS ISN'T ECONOMICS, THIS IS
- 14 CHOICE. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS MADE A PUBLIC POLICY CHOICE
- 15 TO SCREW US, LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND OUR SHARED CONSTITUENCIES.
- 16 SO, I HOPE, I DIDN'T BURY THAT LEAD, THAT'S CLEAR. COUPLE
- 17 THINGS, IT'S ALSO CLEAR TO ME AS WE HEAR YOU PRESENT, THEN WE
- 18 THEN COME BACK AND ASK YOU QUESTIONS, MADAM CEO, AS IF YOU
- 19 HAVE SOME MAGIC WAND TO MAKE THIS ALL OKAY. AND I'M CLEAR YOU
- 20 DON'T. THE RUG HAS BEEN PULLED OUT FROM UNDER YOU AND US AND
- 21 THE PEOPLE OF L.A. COUNTY. TWO THINGS FOR ME, MADAM CHAIR. I
- 22 READ A PRETTY POWERFUL ARTICLE IN THE NEW YORK TIMES. I
- 23 EMAILED IT TO MY COLLEAGUES. I'M A BIG FAN OF JENNIFER POLKA,
- 24 THE AUTHOR OF RECODING AMERICA. AND THE ARTICLE IS ENTITLED,
- 25 THE CITIES AND STATES THAT ARE GETTING IT RIGHT. AND IT TALKS



- 1 ABOUT TRUMP'S DOMESTIC POLICY LAW WILL CREATE BUDGET PROBLEMS
- 2 FOR MANY STATES AND CITIES, AND THAT BUDGET SHORTFALLS AREN'T
- 3 NEW. BUT SHE TALKS ABOUT NEITHER IS THE PLAYBOOK WE WILL ALL
- 4 FOLLOW. AND WHAT I FOUND PROFOUND ABOUT THE ARTICLE, SHE TALKS
- 5 ABOUT, YOU KNOW, IT'S THE WRONG PLAYBOOK. IT'S TYPICAL
- 6 GOVERNMENT REACTION. IN A RECESSION WHEN RESOURCES ARE LOW, WE
- 7 TEND TO CUT THE PROGRAMS THAT THE PUBLIC NEEDS THE MOST DURING
- 8 A RECESSION. IT'S COMPLETELY COUNTERINTUITIVE. AND SO, THE
- 9 ARTICLE SUGGESTS THAT WE SHOULDN'T USE THE OLD PLAYBOOK OF
- 10 ACROSS-THE-BOARD CUTS, THAT WE HAVE TO USE A CONCEPT SHE CALLS
- 11 INTELLIGENT DISRUPTION, WHERE WE'RE EVEN GOING TO HAVE TO
- 12 CHECK OURSELVES ABOUT WHAT IS THE BEST WAY TO MANAGE AT THIS

- 19 WE DON'T LOSE SIGHT OF COMMITMENTS THIS COUNTY AND PREVIOUS
- 20 BOARDS HAVE MADE, OUR COMMITMENT TO EQUITY, OUR COMMITMENT TO
- 21 CARE FIRST, JAILS LAST, THAT THOSE FOUNDATIONAL ELEMENTS THAT
- 22 WE HAVE IDENTIFIED AS OUR GUIDING PRINCIPLES STAY TRUE. BUT
- 23 THAT WE USE THIS CONCEPT OF INTELLIGENT DISRUPTION AND NOT
- 24 KIND OF RESORT TO OLD SCHOOL, HOW DO YOU BALANCE A BUDGET IN
- 25 OLD TIMES? I DON'T KNOW THAT I HAVEN'T NECESSARILY EXPECTED AN



- 1 ANSWER, BUT I JUST REALLY WANTED TO KIND OF PUT THAT OUT THERE
- 2 THAT I HOPE THAT WE ARE ABLE TO AS A BOARD AND IN
- 3 COLLABORATION WITH YOU FIGURE THAT OUT. NOW MY DIRECT QUESTION
- 4 TO THE CEO HAS TO DO WITH TIMING. I HAPPENED TO MEET AND GOT
- 5 BRIEFED YESTERDAY BY THE NEW DIRECTOR OF OUR HOMELESS
- 6 DEPARTMENT, AND IN HER JUST KIND OF GENERAL BRIEFING, IT WAS
- 7 OUR FIRST MEETING IN HER NEW POSITION, SHE TALKED ABOUT
- 8 BRINGING FORWARD A BUDGET NOVEMBER, DECEMBER. AND I THOUGHT,
- 9 THAT FEELS A LITTLE LATE TO ME WITH REGARD TO THE TIMING OF
- 10 OUR FINAL BUDGET. SO, MY COLLEAGUE ASKED ABOUT WHEN OUR
- 11 CONSTITUENTS COULD EXPECT TO FEEL AND SEE THE TIMING OF THIS
- 12 CONTRACTED BUDGET. I'M ALSO CONCERNED ABOUT OTHER THINGS THAT
- 13 WILL SHOW UP LATE. THE NEW DEPARTMENT'S FISCAL NEEDS AND
- 14 WHATEVER ELSE MAY COME THROUGH MOTIONS OR WHATEVER THE CASE
- 15 MAY BE. SO, SINCE THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS A MOVING TARGET,
- 16 WE KNOW WHAT'S IN THE BIG UGLY BILL. YOU TALKED ABOUT OTHER
- 17 APPROPRIATIONS BILLS THAT MAY COME LATER. ARE YOU LOOKING AT
- 18 ADJUSTING THE TIMING OF OUR BUDGET PROCESS? HOW WILL WE, IN
- 19 TERMS OF PROCESS, WHICH WE ALL KNOW I FIXATE ON, HOW WILL WE
- 20 PLAN FOR AND BE READY IN TERMS OF THE TIMING OF POTENTIAL NEW
- 21 CUTS COMING DOWN, NEW PRESSURES THAT WE MAY CREATE FOR
- 22 OURSELVES ON THE BUDGET?

24 FESIA DAVENPORT: THANK YOU FOR THAT QUESTION. LET ME PROVIDE A

25 LITTLE CONTEXT FIRST. SO, THE NEW HOMELESSNESS DEPARTMENT



- 1 WOULD BE FUNDED PRIMARILY THROUGH THE MEASURE A SALES TAX
- 2 REVENUE. THE MEASURE A SALES TAX REVENUE HAS ALREADY BEEN
- 3 APPROPRIATED BY THE BOARD IN APRIL. WHAT NORMALLY HAPPENS IS
- 4 THE HOMELESS INITIATIVE WOULD BRING FORTH A SPENDING PLAN MUCH
- 5 EARLIER IN THE YEAR. SO, THEY BRING FORTH THEIR SPENDING PLAN
- 6 IN LIKE JANUARY. AND THE REASON WHY THEY WOULD DO THAT IS SO
- 7 THAT THE BOARD COULD APPROVE IT AND THEN THE SPENDING PLAN AND
- 8 THE AMOUNTS WOULD GO TO LAHSA. AND THEN THAT WOULD GIVE LAHSA
- 9 MORE TIME TO GET THE CONTRACTS OUT. AND THEN THE PROVIDERS
- 10 WOULD THEN HAVE THEIR CONTRACT BY DAY ONE OF THE FISCAL YEAR,
- 11 BY JULY 1ST, 20--, YOU KNOW, BY JULY 1ST OF EACH YEAR. THAT
- 12 WAS A PROBLEM THAT TOOK US A COUPLE OF YEARS TO SOLVE. SO, MY,
- 13 WITHOUT HAVING BEEN IN THAT CONVERSATION, WHAT I'M THINKING
- 14 THAT THE NEW DIRECTOR MAY HAVE BEEN REFERRING TO IS THE
- 15 SPENDING PLAN FOR 26/27 AND SO THEY WILL NORMALLY BRING THAT
- 16 SPENDING PLAN TO THE BOARD MUCH EARLIER IN THE YEAR. WE DID IT
- 17 LATE THIS YEAR FOR A NUMBER OF REASONS. BUT THE MEASURE A
- 18 REVENUE HAS BEEN BUDGETED AND IT WAS BUDGETED AND RECOMMEND.
- 19 OKAY, THAT'S ONE PIECE, THAT'S JUST CONTEXT. BUT WE KNOW FOR
- 20 EXAMPLE, THERE'S RECENTLY AN EXECUTIVE ORDER ISSUED BY THE
- 21 PRESIDENT THAT RELATES TO PUBLIC HOUSING AGENCIES AS WELL AS
- 22 CONTINUUMS OF CARE. AND THAT EXECUTIVE ORDER AGAIN LOOKS LIKE
- 23 THERE WILL BE IMPLICATIONS AND RAMIFICATIONS FOR THE WORK THAT
- 24 WE DO IN OUR HOMELESSNESS SERVICES. BASICALLY, THAT FUNDING
- 25 WILL BE CUT OR REDUCED IN SOME SHAPE, FORM, OR FASHION. AND



- 1 SO, WITHOUT KNOWING EXACTLY WHAT'S GOING TO HAPPEN, WHAT THE
- 2 NEW HOMELESSNESS DEPARTMENT WILL NEED TO KNOW AND HAVE
- 3 EXCESSIVE PRECISION ABOUT, AND I THINK THEY ALREADY DO AS THEY
- 4 TRANSITION OVER FROM LAHSA, IS WHERE ARE ALL OF THEIR FUNDING
- 5 STREAMS? WE DO A LOT OF BRAIDED FUNDING IN THE COUNTY AND WE
- 6 PRIDE OURSELVES ON DOING THAT. SO, FOR EACH AND EVERY
- 7 CONTRACT, FOR EACH AND EVERY SERVICE, WHAT ARE THE FUNDING
- 8 SOURCES AND HOW ARE THEY BRAIDED TOGETHER SO THAT IF
- 9 CURTAILMENTS FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT DO MATERIALIZE, THEY
- 10 NEED TO HAVE A PLAN ON HOW TO UNWIND THAT FUNDING AND THEN
- 11 ASSESS WHAT THE IMPACT WILL BE. I WAS JUST ON A CALL YESTERDAY
- 12 WITH THE CITY OF, WITH REGARDING HOMELESSNESS IN A NEW
- 13 DEPARTMENT WITH LAHSA AND THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, AND WE WERE
- 14 TALKING ABOUT THAT VERY THING, ABOUT UNWINDING OUR FUNDING,
- 15 AND WHAT I MEAN BY THAT IS SEPARATING OUT ALL THE DIFFERENT
- 16 TYPES OF MONEY THAT'S COLLAPSED TOGETHER TO PAY FOR A SERVICE
- 17 SEPARATING IT ALL OUT SO I DO THINK THAT THE WORK THAT'S
- 18 HAPPENING NOW WILL POSITION THE NEW HOMELESS DEPARTMENT SHOULD
- 19 CUTS MATERIALIZE, THEY WILL HAVE ALREADY DONE A LOT OF THE
- 20 PREP WORK, SO TO SPEAK, TO KNOW WHERE THEIR FUNDING IS COMING
- 21 FROM AND PICK IT TO EACH SPECIFIC SERVICE.

- 15 DO. AND SO, GIVEN THAT, WILL THAT IMPACT THE TIMING OF OUR
- 16 BROADER, OUR OVERALL DISCUSSION IN TERMS OF ALL OF THESE
- 17 DEPARTMENTS?

- 19 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, I THINK THE ONE WAY TO ANSWER THAT,
- 20 SUPERVISOR, IS AS WE MOVE FORWARD WITH THE BUDGET YOU KNOW WE
- 21 HAVE A LOT OF DIFFERENT MOVING PARTS AND FUNDING STREAMS. ONE
- 22 OF THE THINGS THAT WE HAVE TO BE PREPARED WHAT WE HAVE TO HAVE
- 23 PREPARED AND WE HAVE BEEN WORKING ON THIS SINCE LAST NOVEMBER
- 24 OR DECEMBER, WE NEED TO HAVE CURTAILMENT PLANS READY BECAUSE
- 25 THEY TAKE A VERY LONG TIME TO PUT TOGETHER, PARTICULARLY THE



- 1 TYPE OF PLAN THAT YOU MENTIONED WHERE IT'S NOT AN ACROSS THE
- 2 BOARD CURTAILMENT WHERE IT'S MORE QUALITATIVE AND LESS
- 3 QUANTITATIVE. AND SO, ONE THING IS, ONE, HAVE YOUR FUNDING
- 4 SOURCES IDENTIFIED. TWO, HAVE A CURTAILMENT PLAN READY. WE HAD
- 5 ONE READY, WE DID A THREE, WE ASKED DEPARTMENTS IN DECEMBER,
- 6 COME BACK TO US WITH A 3%, A 5%, AND A 8% CURTAILMENT
- 7 SCENARIO. WE, BY THE END OF THIS FISCAL YEAR, WE WILL HAVE
- 8 DEPLOYED THAT FULL 3, 5, AND 8%. NOW WE ARE GOING BACK TO THE
- 9 DEPARTMENTS SAYING WE NEED YOU TO CURTAIL, WE NEED YOU TO
- 10 DEVELOP ADDITIONAL CURTAILMENT PLANS FOR THE VERY REASONS THAT
- 11 YOU MENTIONED.

- 13 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU AND I APPRECIATE THE
- 14 DIALOGUE. I APPRECIATE THE CLARIFICATION IN TERMS OF WHEN THAT
- 15 THE BILL THAT PASSED, WHEN IT'S GOING TO IMPACT THE COUNTY,
- 16 ESPECIALLY FROM A HEALTH STANDPOINT. AND SO, IF MY
- 17 UNDERSTANDING IS CORRECT, YOU SAID IN 26/27 IS WHEN THAT IS

- 22 BUDGET IS THE FREEZING OF ENROLLMENT IN STATE-ONLY FULL-SCOPE
- 23 MEDI-CAL, AND THAT FREEZES EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2026.

25 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SO, MY QUESTION IS ACTUALLY



- 1 OUTSIDE THE COUNTY, BECAUSE WE TALK ABOUT THE COUNTY BEING THE
- 2 SAFETY NET. THESE IMPACTS ARE ALSO GOING TO IMPACT HOSPITALS
- 3 IN AREAS LIKE ANTELOPE VALLEY, LIKE WHITE MEMORIAL. HOSPITALS
- 4 THAT TAKE A LOT OF THE PATIENTS AS WELL. HOW ARE YOU FIGURING
- 5 IN THAT IMPACT? BECAUSE IF THEY ARE NOT ABLE TO SERVE THESE
- 6 PATIENTS, THEY'RE GOING TO COME TO THE COUNTY AND ALREADY PUSH
- 7 THE COUNTY THAT IS ALREADY REALLY STRESSED TO THE LEVEL OF NOT
- 8 HAVING BEDS AVAILABLE.

- 10 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: YEAH, THANKS. MEDICAID IS SUCH A LARGE
- 11 PAYER IN CALIFORNIA. A THIRD OF PATIENTS WITHIN CALIFORNIA ARE
- 12 ON MEDICAID. SO, THERE ARE SO MANY HOSPITALS, NOT JUST THE DHS
- 13 HOSPITALS, YOU NAMED A FEW OF THE PRIVATE ONES, BUT THE LIST
- 14 IS LONG OF PRIVATE HOSPITALS THAT SEE A VERY LARGE SHARE OF
- 15 MEDICAID PATIENTS. HOSPITALS ARE SUBJECT TO FEDERAL EMTALA
- 16 LAWS, HOWEVER, SO THEY ARE REQUIRED TO CARE, PROVIDE EMERGENCY
- 17 AND STABILIZING SERVICES FOR ANYONE THAT COMES TO THEIR
- 18 EMERGENCY ROOM. SO REGARDLESS OF WHETHER OR NOT THE
- 19 INDIVIDUALS MAINTAIN THEIR MEDICAID COVERAGE THE HOSPITALS
- 20 WILL BE REQUIRED TO PROVIDE CARE. THAT CREATES A DIFFICULT
- 21 FISCAL SITUATION FOR THOSE HOSPITALS AS THEY DON'T NECESSARILY
- 22 HAVE REVENUE STREAMS TO BE ABLE TO FUND THAT CARE. IT'S
- 23 POSSIBLE THAT THAT COULD LEAD TO HOSPITAL CLOSURES WITHIN THE
- 24 COMMUNITY AND THEN THERE WOULD BE MORE PRESSURE ON THE
- 25 EXISTING HOSPITALS. IT'S ALSO POSSIBLE THAT HOSPITALS, AND



- 1 WE'VE SEEN THIS AGAIN AND AGAIN, MIGHT TRY TO DISCHARGE
- 2 PATIENTS AT THE POINT WHERE THE PATIENT IS STABILIZED. AND
- 3 THEN I THINK AT WHAT YOU'RE GETTING AT, THEY MAY ALSO BE LESS
- 4 INCLINED TO SEE PATIENTS IN OUTPATIENT FOLLOW-UP, SCHEDULE
- 5 THEM FOR SPECIALTY CARE OR SURGERY OR AN OUTPATIENT IMAGING
- 6 STUDY. AND WE GET PATIENTS SENT TO US FREQUENTLY WITHIN DHS
- 7 FROM PRIVATE HOSPITALS WHERE THE PATIENT WAS APPROPRIATELY
- 8 STABILIZED AND PROVIDED THAT EMERGENCY CARE BUT THEN THEY NEED
- 9 THAT OUTPATIENT FOLLOW-UP. DHS WILL DO EVERYTHING WE CAN TO
- 10 PROVIDE THAT OUTPATIENT FOLLOW-UP. WE DON'T HAVE ANY PLANS TO
- 11 CURTAIL OUTPATIENT IMAGING DIAGNOSTIC SPECIALTY CARE SERVICES
- 12 AT THE PRESENT TIME BECAUSE WE WANT TO MAINTAIN THAT VOLUME
- 13 FOR BOTH OUR MEDICAID PATIENTS AS WELL AS THE RESIDUAL
- 14 UNINSURED BUT THIS IS WHAT WE'LL NEED TO DO, FISCAL MODELING
- 15 ON BOTH HOW EFFECTIVE ARE WE AT CURBING COSTS WHERE WE CAN
- 16 WITHOUT COMPROMISING THOSE SERVICES THAT YOU MENTIONED, AND
- 17 HOW EFFECTIVE ARE WE AT TRYING TO MITIGATE SOME OF THE REVENUE
- 18 LOSSES OR BRING IN ADDITIONAL REVENUE, AND THEN WHERE ARE WE
- 19 AT IN BEING ABLE TO MAINTAIN THOSE SERVICES THAT THE PUBLIC
- 20 NEEDS.

- 22 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SO HOW CAN A HOSPITAL PUT
- 23 THEMSELVES ON DIVERSION OR DOES IT HAVE TO BE APPROVED BY DHS
- 24 WHEN A HOSPITAL WANTS TO GO ON DIVERSION?



- 1 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: A HOSPITAL CAN PUT THEMSELVES ON
- 2 DIVERSION IT GETS MANAGED THROUGH THE EMS AGENCY WHICH IS
- 3 UNDER DHS BUT A HOSPITAL CAN PUT THEMSELVES ON DIVERSION AND
- 4 THEN THEY HAVE TO REDO DIVERSION EVERY FEW HOURS, DEPENDING ON
- 5 WHAT KIND OF DIVERSION IT IS. THE ISSUE, THOUGH, IS THAT IN A
- 6 GIVEN CATCHMENT AREA AND GEOGRAPHIC AREA, IF EVERYONE'S ON
- 7 DIVERSION, NO ONE'S ON DIVERSION. THE AMBULANCE HAS TO GO
- 8 SOMEWHERE. SO, IF ALL HOSPITALS ARE SAYING WE ARE FULL AND WE
- 9 CAN'T TAKE MORE PATIENTS, THEN THE AMBULANCE WILL JUST GO TO
- 10 THE HOSPITALS. THAT'S CLOSE.

- 12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND I APPRECIATE THAT. I GUESS MY
- 13 ASK WOULD BE, AND I KNOW YOU ARE, TALKING TO THE HOSPITAL
- 14 COUNCIL SO THAT WE'RE COORDINATED. BECAUSE I ALWAYS LOOK AT IT
- 15 AS A SYSTEM-WIDE CARE. WHEN WE WERE TALKING ABOUT MARTIN
- 16 LUTHER KING HOSPITAL, THAT'S WHAT I WAS TALKING ABOUT, THE
- 17 FACT THAT WHILE IT'S NOT A COUNTY FACILITY, IT'S IN AN AREA
- 18 THAT IF ANYTHING HAPPENS TO THAT HOSPITAL, THE IMPACT IT HAS,
- 19 RIPPLING IMPACT ACROSS THE REGION QUITE FRANKLY. SO, I HOPE
- 20 THAT WE ARE WORKING WITH THE HOSPITAL COUNCIL TO TRY TO WORK
- 21 TOGETHER BECAUSE THE IMPACT I BELIEVE ON THE SYSTEM AS A WHOLE
- 22 IS GOING TO BE FAR GREATER THAN I THINK ANY OF US REALIZE. AND
- 23 TO THAT POINT WITH PUBLIC HEALTH, YOU KNOW, WE'VE TALKED ABOUT
- 24 THIS. THE MEASLES DOESN'T KNOW WHETHER YOU'RE HERE LEGALLY OR
- 25 ILLEGALLY. AND SO PUBLIC HEALTH IS ABOUT PROTECTING



- 1 EVERYBODY'S PUBLIC HEALTH COLLECTIVELY. AND SO, I APPRECIATE
- 2 THAT COMMENT, DR. FERRER, BECAUSE AT THE END OF THE DAY THAT
- 3 REALLY IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY. I MEAN, WITH COVID, SAME THING.
- 4 I MEAN, YOU HAD TO LOOK AT IT FROM THE STANDPOINT OF
- 5 PROTECTING PEOPLE. AND IT DIDN'T DISCRIMINATE ON THEIR COLOR,
- 6 THEIR RACE, WHETHER THEY'RE HERE IN THIS COUNTRY LEGALLY OR
- 7 NOT. AND SO, I'M COGNIZANT OF THAT AS WELL. AND I KNOW THAT
- 8 PASADENA HEALTH DEPARTMENT, WHICH HAS THEIR OWN PUBLIC HEALTH
- 9 DEPARTMENT, HAS EXPRESSED CONCERN. AND SO, I THINK IT'S
- 10 IMPORTANT FOR US ALSO TO WORK ACROSS THE BOARD WITH LONG BEACH
- 11 AND PASADENA MOVING FORWARD, WHICH I KNOW YOU DO. AND THEN,
- 12 FESIA, MY OUESTION TO YOU IS, I APPRECIATE THESE, AND EVEN
- 13 LOOKING AT THE MERGING DEPARTMENTS, I HEARD SOME QUESTIONING
- 14 THAT, BUT AT THE END OF THE DAY, I THINK THAT WE ARE GOING TO
- 15 HAVE TO MAKE TOUGH DECISIONS. AND I DON'T KNOW WHAT MERGING
- 16 DEPARTMENTS LOOKS LIKE. I KNOW THAT DR. GHALY IS LOOKING AT
- 17 MOVING SERVICES TO MORE CONSOLIDATE AND DO COST SAVINGS,
- 18 CORRECT? YOU'RE MOVING I THINK SOMETHING FROM ALL OF YOU AND
- 19 LOOKING AT MOVING IT DOWN TO GENERAL?

- 21 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: WE HAVE NO SPECIFIC PLANS IN THAT REGARD
- 22 BUT WE HAVE A LONG LIST OF IDEAS THAT WE'RE DOING FINANCIAL
- 23 MODELING ON AND ALSO PATIENT IMPACT MODELING ON AND WE'RE
- 24 DOING SOME BRIEFINGS WITH YOUR DEPUTIES BEGINNING TOMORROW AND
- 25 WITH THE HOSPITAL COMMISSION BEGINNING NEXT WEEK TO SHARE WHAT



- 1 THOSE PRELIMINARY IDEAS ARE. SOME OF THEM DO FOCUS ON
- 2 CONSOLIDATING SERVICES SO IF WE OFFER CERTAIN SERVICES AT FIVE
- 3 SITES OR SEVEN SITES WOULD IT BE MORE COST EFFECTIVE AND STILL
- 4 BE ABLE TO PROVIDE PATIENTS' ACCESS. I UNDERSTAND NOT AS
- 5 CONVENIENTLY AND THERE ARE CERTAINLY PATIENT IMPACTS TO THOSE
- 6 CHOICES. BUT IF WE PROVIDED IT AT THREE SITES INSTEAD OF FIVE,
- 7 HOW MUCH MONEY WOULD WE BE ABLE TO SAVE? AND THOSE
- 8 CALCULATIONS AND FINANCIAL MODELING IS ONGOING.

- 10 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND YOU CAN COMMENT, FESIA, BUT I
- 11 JUST WANT TO SAY THAT I APPRECIATE DAWYN'S LEGAL ANALYSIS
- 12 ABOUT BEELENSON. THAT WOULD NOT TRIGGER BEELENSON BECAUSE
- 13 WE'RE STILL PROVIDING A LEVEL OF SERVICES JUST NOT AT THE SAME
- 14 LOCATION.

15

- 16 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: WE WOULD RUN ALL OF THESE SPECIFIC
- 17 SITUATIONS THROUGH COUNSEL BECAUSE IT'S ALL VERY CASE
- 18 DEPENDENT, BUT IN GENERAL, AND I DON'T KNOW IF DAWYN WANTS TO
- 19 WEIGH IN FURTHER, AS LONG AS THE SERVICE IS BEING PROVIDED TO
- 20 THE SAME AMOUNT, THE SAME EXTENT, IT WOULD NOT TYPICALLY
- 21 TRIGGER A BEELENSON HEARING.

- 23 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: YEAH, WHAT WERE YOU GOING TO SAY
- 24 IF YOU?



- 1 FESIA DAVENPORT: SUPERVISOR, ON MY SLIDE WHERE I TALK ABOUT
- 2 DIFFERENT STRATEGIES, THAT IS NOT SOMETHING THAT WE WOULD
- 3 NORMALLY LOOK TO. WE WOULD SORT OF LOOK TO SOME OF OUR, YOU
- 4 KNOW, THE SOFTER THINGS TO DO, A HIRING FREEZE, SPENDING
- 5 FREEZE, BUT WE DO THINK BECAUSE WE ARE IN THIS UNPRECEDENTED
- 6 TIMES THAT WE DO NEED TO LOOK AT SOME CONSOLIDATIONS AND AS
- 7 CHRISTINE, DR. GHALY POINTED OUT, THE QUESTION IS NOT JUST HOW
- 8 CAN WE BECOME MORE EFFICIENT BUT WHAT SAVINGS MIGHT BE
- 9 REALIZED. AND SO THAT IS WORK THAT WE WILL WORK ON TO COME
- 10 BACK TO THE BOARD WITH RECOMMENDATIONS SHOULD THEY BE NEEDED
- 11 AND NECESSARY.

- 13 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND THEN MY LAST TASK WOULD BE
- 14 IT'D BE HELPFUL BECAUSE I ALWAYS SAY ALMOST 3/2 OF OUR BUDGET
- 15 GOES TO HEALTH AND WELFARE, GIVE OR TAKE. IT WOULD BE HELPFUL
- 16 FOR ME TO LOOK AT WHERE, WHAT DISCRETIONARY FUNDING WE HAVE,
- 17 ONE COLUMN, BECAUSE WHEN YOU LOOK AT DCFS, I THINK DHS HAS GOT
- 18 SOME, DPSS HAS SOME, THAT ARE SUBVENTION. I MEAN, YOU'VE GOT
- 19 FUNDING COMING FROM BOTH STATE AND FEDERAL DOLLARS TO MAKE UP
- 20 THE SALARY FOR AN EMPLOYEE, CORRECT? AND SO, I THINK IT'D BE
- 21 HELPFUL TO UNDERSTAND THE DISCRETIONARY FUNDING AND THEN THE
- 22 FUNDING THAT IS SUBVENTION SO THAT IF WE CUT, YOU KNOW, \$5 IN
- 23 DCFS, THAT EQUALS \$15 BECAUSE YOU'RE LOSING REVENUE COMING IN
- 24 THAT OFFSETS SALARIES. I KNOW I'M GETTING OVER-TECHNICAL, BUT
- 25 I THINK YOU UNDERSTAND WHAT I'M THINKING.



- 2 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, WE CAN DO THAT. WE COULD COME BACK WITH
- 3 AN ANALYSIS AND SHOW HOW MUCH OF OUR LOCAL DOLLARS ARE USED TO
- 4 DRAW DOWN ADDITIONAL MONEY FROM THE FEDERAL AND THE STATE
- 5 GOVERNMENT. AND SO, WE CAN, THERE'S A MATCH FOR VARIOUS
- 6 PROGRAMS AND WE CAN COME BACK TO THE BOARD WITH THAT.

- 8 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: BECAUSE TO YOUR POINT, SUPERVISOR
- 9 MITCHELL, I THINK THAT WHEN YOU TALK ABOUT WE HAVE TO RETHINK
- 10 HOW WE DO THINGS, WHEN YOU LOOK AT HOW WE ARE GETTING THE
- 11 MONEY, THE INTERVENTION, THAT IS FOR THE MOST VULNERABLE
- 12 POPULATION. SO, I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT FOR US TO SET A
- 13 THRESHOLD. AND I APPRECIATED THE ARTICLE THAT YOU SENT. THANK
- 14 YOU FOR THAT. BUT I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT FOR US TO BE VERY
- 15 STRATEGIC MOVING FORWARD AND LOOK AT OPPORTUNITIES AND
- 16 RECOGNIZE THAT THERE ARE GOING TO BE DIFFICULT DECISIONS THAT
- 17 ARE GOING TO NEED TO BE MADE. AND MORE OFTEN THAN NOT, THAT'S
- 18 GOING TO COME WITH THE DISCRETIONARY FUNDING, IN MY OPINION.
- 19 SO, THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.

- 21 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR, AND IT
- 22 TRIGGERED FOR ME WHEN YOU MENTIONED THE BEELENSON HEARINGS,
- 23 BECAUSE YOU'VE ASKED ABOUT THAT A COUPLE TIMES, AND THEN I
- 24 LOOKED UP AND REALIZED, MS. GARRETT IS HERE, AND SO, YOU KNOW,
- 25 MUCH LIKE BEELENSON ON PROGRAMS, THERE ARE ALSO HEARINGS AND



- 1 PUBLIC NOTICE YOU HAVE TO GIVE WHEN YOU HAVE WORKFORCE
- 2 REDUCTIONS OF ANY SIGNIFICANT SIZE. SO, IT TRIGGERED FOR ME,
- 3 IF YOU COULD JUST KIND OF UPDATE US ON YOUR PLANNING, BECAUSE
- 4 AS WE'VE HEARD, TIMING IS OF THE ESSENCE, BECAUSE WE CAN'T
- 5 TURN A BUDGET TO SIZE TOO OUICKLY AND CERTAINLY NOT TOO LATE.
- 6 IF YOU TURN IT TOO LATE, THAT REQUIRES DEEPER CUTS. SO ARE
- 7 THERE WORKFORCE, ARE THERE PLANS THAT'S APPROPRIATE FOR YOU TO
- 8 SHARE WITH US PUBLICLY AT THIS POINT?

- 10 LISA GARRETT: ABSOLUTELY, CAN YOU HEAR ME? ABSOLUTELY, WE CAN
- 11 SHARE WHAT WE HAVE BEEN DOING. WE HAVEN'T BEEN WAITING, SEEING
- 12 WHAT'S HAPPENING. THE WRITING IS ON THE WALL. AND AS YOU SAID,
- 13 UNPRECEDENTED TIMES CALL FOR EXTRAORDINARY MEASURES, WHICH MAY
- 14 INCLUDE WORKFORCE REDUCTIONS. AND SO, WE HAVE STARTED WORKING
- 15 WITH DEPARTMENTS ALREADY WHO BELIEVE THAT THEY MAY HAVE
- 16 WORKFORCE REDUCTIONS WITHIN THEIR DEPARTMENTS. I CAN SAY THIS,
- 17 THAT THE DEPARTMENT HEAD IS THE NAVIGATOR ALONG WITH CEO AND
- 18 DHR OF THE WORKFORCE REDUCTION PROCESS. BEFORE WE START
- 19 TALKING ABOUT REDUCTIONS, WE STARTED OFF WITH LET'S TALK ABOUT
- 20 MITIGATION EFFORTS BEFORE WE START TALKING ABOUT THE PEOPLE.
- 21 SO, IF THE DEPARTMENT CAN LOOK AT REDUCTIONS, VOLUNTARY
- 22 REDUCTIONS OR INVOLUNTARY REDUCTIONS BY EMPLOYEES OR EMPLOYEES
- 23 CAN ALSO LOOK AT VOLUNTARILY TAKING TIME OFF, THAT'S WHAT WE
- 24 CALL. WE DON'T HAVE FURLOUGHS, BUT WE DO HAVE VOLUNTARY TIME
- 25 OFF. WHAT THE DEPARTMENTS ARE DOING NOW, WE'RE WORKING WITH



- 1 ABOUT FIVE DEPARTMENTS. THEY ARE DOING THE PREP WORK FOR
- 2 WORKFORCE REDUCTION. SO, WORKFORCE REDUCTIONS ARE GUIDED
- 3 REALLY BY ONE, VACANCIES. IF YOU HAVE MORE PEOPLE THAN YOU
- 4 HAVE POSITIONS, THEN WORKFORCE REDUCTION IS COMING. IT'S ALSO
- 5 DRIVEN BY SENIORITY AND THE STATUS OF EMPLOYEES TEMPORARY
- 6 VERSUS PERMANENT EMPLOYEES IS DRIVEN BY PERFORMANCE AND IN
- 7 THAT ARTICLE YOU SAID IT'S ALSO DRIVEN BY THE SKILL SETS OF
- 8 PARTICULAR EMPLOYEES. SO, WHAT THE DEPARTMENTS ARE DOING RIGHT
- 9 NOW ARE LOOKING AT THEIR VACANCIES, THEY'RE LOOKING AT THEIR
- 10 FUNDING STRUCTURES, THEY'RE LOOKING AT POSITIONS THAT MAY HAVE
- 11 TO BE CUT. AND FROM THAT, WE ARE, SO FAR THERE'S NONE, NO ONE
- 12 THAT'S GOING FORTH WITH WORKFORCE REDUCTION RIGHT NOW, BUT
- 13 AGAIN, LIKE I SAID, WE'RE IN THE PLANNING STAGES FOR THAT. SO,
- 14 WORKFORCE REDUCTION IS BY DEPARTMENT. WORKFORCE REDUCTION IS
- 15 BY A PARTICULAR JOB TITLE. AND SO, THE DEPARTMENTS WILL BE
- 16 LOOKING WITH US AND CEO ON POSITIONS THAT MAY NEED TO BE CUT.
- 17 IT'S ALSO BASED UPON THE STATUS OF THE EMPLOYEE. WHEN I SAY
- 18 THAT, IF WE HAVE TO, BEFORE WE GET TO PERMANENT EMPLOYEES,
- 19 WE'D BE LOOKING AT RELEASING CONTRACTORS, AND WE HAVE A LOT OF
- 20 THOSE WITHIN THE COUNTY, THE TEMPORARY EMPLOYEES, THE
- 21 RECURRENT EMPLOYEES, PROBATIONARY EMPLOYEES, AND THEN
- 22 PERMANENT EMPLOYEES. AND I'D LOVE TO COME BACK AND GIVE A
- 23 FULL-BLOWN PRESENTATION ON HOW WORKFORCE REDUCTION WORKS
- 24 WITHIN THE COUNTY. SO, SENIORITY IS A BIG DRIVER OF WORKFORCE
- 25 REDUCTION IN THE COUNTY. SO THOSE WHO CAME IN LAST WOULD BE



- 1 THE FIRST ONES WHO WOULD BE RELEASED. AGAIN, RIGHT NOW, ALL OF
- 2 THE DEPARTMENTS ARE WORKING ON PLANS. ONE OF THE BIG THINGS WE
- 3 HAVE DONE IS CALLED AN EMPLOYEE VERIFICATION FORM. THE
- 4 EMPLOYEES, ALL OF THE EMPLOYEES IN AN IMPACTED DEPARTMENT
- 5 ACTUALLY FILL OUT FORMS INDICATING WHAT THEIR SENIORITY IS,
- 6 HOW LONG THEY'VE BEEN IN THEIR POSITIONS, HOW LONG THEY'VE
- 7 BEEN IN THE COUNTY, BECAUSE THIS IS SUCH A BIG DRIVER OF
- 8 WORKFORCE REDUCTION. FROM THOSE THE DEPARTMENTS ARE LOOKING
- 9 AT, WE USE THAT TO SET UP WHAT'S CALLED SENIORITY LIST. AND
- 10 BECAUSE WORKFORCE REDUCTION IS BY SENIORITY, WE'LL BE PUTTING
- 11 THOSE TOGETHER FOR THE DEPARTMENTS BEFORE WE TALK ABOUT ACTUAL
- 12 REDUCTIONS. AND SO, WE'RE DOING ALL THE PRELIMINARY WORK WE
- 13 CAN RIGHT NOW, SUPERVISORS, AND WE WILL ENSURE THAT THE
- 14 WORKFORCE PLANS ARE APPROVED AND THAT THE WORKFORCE PLANS LOOK
- 15 AT THE EMPLOYEES AND THAT THE EMPLOYEES ARE PROTECTED WITH
- 16 GIVEN WITH A GIVEN CARE RESPECT AND EQUITY AS REQUIRED THROUGH
- 17 THE WORKFORCE REDUCTION PROCESS. SO, IT IS LABORIOUS BUT WE
- 18 HAVE ALREADY STARTED THAT WORK AND AT LEAST FOUR OTHER
- 19 DEPARTMENTS HAVE ALREADY STARTED WITH THE EMPLOYEE
- 20 VERIFICATION FORM SO WE CAN SEE WHAT THE STATUS OF THE VARIOUS
- 21 EMPLOYEES ARE THAT MIGHT BE IMPACTED IN EACH DEPARTMENT.
- 23 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: WHEN YOU SAY WE DON'T HAVE FURLOUGHS,
- 24 WHAT DOES THAT MEAN? THE COUNTY'S NEVER HAD TO DO A FURLOUGH

- 20 WHICH WAS HELD BY SUPERVISOR HAHN. FOR MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC
- 21 ON THE TELEPHONE, PLEASE PRESS 1 THEN 0 NOW TO COMMENT ON THIS
- 22 ITEM.

- 24 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR HAHN? I'M SORRY, I
- 25 THOUGHT, GO AHEAD.



- 2 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU. THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I WAS
- 3 WAITING FOR YOUR PERMISSION TO SPEAK.

4

5 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: YES, YOU MAY.

- 7 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU. AS WE KNOW FOR OVER A MONTH NOW,
- 8 RESIDENTS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY HAVE EXPERIENCED COUNTLESS
- 9 HORRIFYING RAIDS BY FEDERAL ICE AGENTS. THESE AGENTS HAVE
- 10 RACIALLY PROFILED AND VIOLENTLY DETAINED COMMUNITY MEMBERS WHO
- 11 WERE SIMPLY GOING ABOUT THEIR DAYS, CATCHING THE BUS TO GO TO
- 12 WORK, GOING TO WATCH THEIR CHILD GRADUATE OR TAKING THEIR KIDS
- 13 TO SCHOOL. AND THESE ICE AGENTS WHO HAVE CONDUCTED THESE RAIDS
- 14 HAVE COMPLETELY HIDDEN THEIR IDENTITIES. BEING FORCIBLY
- 15 DETAINED BY A FEDERAL OFFICER IN THE MIDDLE OF THE DAY IS
- 16 SCARY ENOUGH. HAVING IT DONE BY SOMEONE WEARING A FACE MASK OR
- 17 BALACLAVA WHOSE NAME AND BADGE ARE COMPLETELY COVERED UP IS
- 18 EVEN MORE DISTURBING AND MANY OF THEM ARRIVE TO THESE RAIDS IN
- 19 UNMARKED VANS. SOME OF TIMES THEIR LICENSE PLATES HAVE BEEN
- 20 BLURRED. IN CONTRAST OUR LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT ALWAYS SHOWS
- 21 THEIR FACES, IDENTIFIES THEMSELVES WHEN ENGAGING WITH THE
- 22 PUBLIC. SO, ICE SHOULD BE HELD TO THAT SAME STANDARD. THIS
- 23 MOTION TODAY DIRECTS COUNTY COUNSEL TO DRAFT A COUNTY
- 24 ORDINANCE THAT WOULD PROHIBIT ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS,
- 25 INCLUDING STATE AND FEDERAL, FROM CONCEALING THEIR IDENTITIES



- 1 WHILE INTERACTING WITH THE PUBLIC IN THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS
- 2 OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY, AND TO BRING THAT ORDINANCE BACK TO
- 3 THIS BOARD IN 60 DAYS FOR APPROVAL. THE ORDINANCE SHOULD BE
- 4 DRAFTED IN A WAY THAT ACCOUNTS FOR CERTAIN ALLOWABLE
- 5 EXCEPTIONS WHEN THEY ARE REQUIRED FOR LEGITIMATE LAW
- 6 ENFORCEMENT DUTIES LIKE GAS MASK, SMOKE MASK, MEDICAL GRADE
- 7 MASK, OR UNDERWATER MASK. AND WE'RE NOT THE ONLY ONES TRYING
- 8 TO MAKE IT CLEAR THAT ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT MUST IDENTIFY
- 9 THEMSELVES, THEIR AGENCIES, AND THEIR FACES WHEN INTERACTING
- 10 WITH THE PUBLIC. SENATOR PADILLA INTRODUCED A BILL AT THE
- 11 FEDERAL LEVEL THAT WOULD REQUIRE THIS FOR FEDERAL AGENTS
- 12 INCLUDING ICE AND THERE HAVE BEEN TWO BILLS INTRODUCED IN THE
- 13 CALIFORNIA STATE ASSEMBLY AND THIS BOARD HAS UNANIMOUSLY VOTED
- 14 TO SUPPORT ALL OF THOSE BILLS. BUT WE HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY, AND
- 15 I THINK WE NEED TO ACT RIGHT NOW WITHIN OUR JURISDICTIONAL
- 16 AUTHORITY TO DO WHAT WE CAN. YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE ARGUMENTS I
- 17 HAVE HEARD AGAINST THIS IS THAT ICE AGENTS COVER THEIR FACES
- 18 BECAUSE THEY'RE AFRAID OF BEING DOXED. OKAY, I UNDERSTAND THAT
- 19 FEAR. AS ELECTED OFFICIALS, WE ALSO FACE THAT RISK. OUR FACES
- 20 ARE VERY PUBLIC, AND I IMAGINE EVERY ONE OF YOU HAS BEEN
- 21 PROTESTED ONE TIME OR ANOTHER. I KNOW I'VE HAD PEOPLE COME TO
- 22 MY HOUSE. WE CERTAINLY HAVE PEOPLE WHO COME TO OUR BOARD
- 23 MEETING EVERY DAY AND TELL US THAT THEY DISAGREE WITH US. SO,
- 24 I UNDERSTAND THAT CONCERN, BUT I ALSO KNOW THAT THIS COMES
- 25 WITH THE TERRITORY OF PUBLIC SERVICE. THERE ARE MANY JOBS THAT



- 1 COME WITH THIS TERRITORY, NOT JUST BEING AN ICE AGENT. AND I
- 2 BELIEVE WE NEED TO WEIGH THE RISKS. AND I THINK IT'S MUCH MORE
- 3 OF A RISK TO THE OVERALL SAFETY OF OUR COMMUNITIES TO HAVE
- 4 MASS LAW ENFORCEMENT DETAINING AND ARRESTING PEOPLE IN PUBLIC.
- 5 THIS LEADS TO A VERY REAL RISK OF IMPOSTERS POSING AS POLICE
- 6 OFFICERS OR ICE AGENTS AS THEY COMMIT CRIMES. OUR LOCAL LAW
- 7 ENFORCEMENT UNDERSTANDS THE IMPORTANCE OF CLEARLY SHOWING
- 8 THEIR IDENTITIES WHEN THEY INTERACT WITH THE PUBLIC AND ICE
- 9 AGENTS SHOULD BE ABLE SHOULD BE HELD TO THE SAME STANDARD. THE
- 10 OTHER BIG OUESTION PEOPLE ARE WONDERING ARE WE GOING TO BE
- 11 ABLE TO ENFORCE THIS ORDINANCE WHEN IT COMES TO ICE? IT'S
- 12 UNCLEAR IF WE HERE AT THE COUNTY CAN REGULATE FEDERAL AGENTS.
- 13 ULTIMATELY, IT'S PROBABLY GOING TO BE DECIDED IN COURT. BUT
- 14 REGARDLESS, IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE SET THE CLEAR EXPECTATION
- 15 THAT WHEN YOU ARE IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY, THIS IS HOW ALL LAW
- 16 ENFORCEMENT SHOULD CONDUCT THEMSELVES. OUR COMMUNITIES ARE
- 17 ASKING US TO PROTECT THEM. AND I BELIEVE THAT IMPLEMENTING
- 18 THIS ORDINANCE WILL SHOW THAT LOS ANGELES COUNTY STANDS UP TO
- 19 INJUSTICE AND HATE BY WORKING TO HOLD ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT
- 20 OFFICERS ACCOUNTABLE TO THEIR DUTY TO PROTECT AND TO SERVE.
- 21 THIS IS A COMMON SENSE, REASONABLE EXPECTATION OF LAW
- 22 ENFORCEMENT IN OUR COMMUNITIES. YOU KNOW, ALL OF US WERE
- 23 RAISED TO, WHEN SOMEONE KNOCKS ON YOUR DOOR AT ANY TIME OF THE
- 24 DAY OR NIGHT, AND THEY SAY THEY'RE FROM MAYBE DWP, OR THEY'RE
- 25 FROM THE GAS COMPANY, OR THEY'RE FROM A POLICE DEPARTMENT,



- 1 WHAT IS THE FIRST THING WE'VE BEEN TOLD TO DO? ASK FOR THEIR
- 2 IDENTIFICATION. VERIFY THAT THAT IS WHO THEY ARE. THIS IS NO
- 3 DIFFERENT AND THEY SHOULD RESPECT OUR WISHES IN LOS ANGELES
- 4 COUNTY IF THEY CONTINUE TO BE HERE. SUPERVISOR SOLIS, THANK
- 5 YOU FOR CO-AUTHORING THIS MOTION. WOULD YOU LIKE TO SAY A FEW
- 6 WORDS?

- 8 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: YES, THANK YOU SO MUCH SUPERVISOR HAHN. I'M
- 9 EXCITED THAT YOU AND I CAN BRING THIS FORWARD AND THAT YOU
- 10 EXPERIENCE SO MUCH IN YOUR OWN DISTRICT RECENTLY IT'S HORRIFIC
- 11 FOR PEOPLE NOT TO UNDERSTAND THE GRAVITY OF THIS PROBLEM THAT
- 12 PEOPLE ARE BEING STOPPED EVERY SINGLE DAY NOW EVEN THOUGH THIS
- 13 STARTED ALMOST A MONTH AGO. AND PEOPLE ARE STILL COVERING UP,
- 14 ALLEGEDLY COVERING UP THEIR FACES, NOT SHOWING BADGES, COMING
- 15 IN UNMARKED CARS OR CARS THAT DON'T EVEN HAVE A LICENSE PLATE,
- 16 AND THEN THROWING PEOPLE ON THE GROUND WITHOUT SHOWING THEM A
- 17 FEDERAL WARRANT OR A REASON WHY THEY'RE BEING DETAINED OR HELD
- 18 AT THAT POINT IN TIME. AND I THINK IT'S UNREASONABLE.
- 19 UNREASONABLE SEARCH AND SEIZURE IS WHAT I WOULD CALL IT. AND I
- 20 KNOW IT'S A VIOLATION OF OUR CONSTITUTIONAL AND CIVIL RIGHTS.
- 21 SO, I TOTALLY AGREE WITH THE FACT THAT SOMETHING HAS TO BE
- 22 DONE, BUT WE AREN'T THE ONLY ONES CALLING THIS OUT. AS YOU
- 23 SAID, SENATOR PADILLA HAS A BILL. I'M SURE THERE WILL BE
- 24 OTHERS THAT WILL BE INTRODUCED IN WASHINGTON. AND I KNOW IN
- 25 SACRAMENTO, THERE'S SB627, NO SECRET POLICE ACT INTRODUCED BY



- 1 SENATORS WEINER, ARGUEYAN, AND PEREZ, WHICH WOULD BAN LAW
- 2 ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS FROM WEARING MASKS. SB805, THE NO
- 3 VIGILANTE ACT INTRODUCED BY SENATOR PEREZ AND WEINER, WOULD
- 4 REOUIRE LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS TO DISPLAY THEIR NAME OR
- 5 BADGE. IT'S TRUE THAT THIS IS SOMETHING MUCH GREATER THAN JUST
- 6 L.A. COUNTY. THIS IS HAPPENING IN OTHER PARTS OF CALIFORNIA IN
- 7 THE STATE, AND I DO BELIEVE THAT WE HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO HELP
- 8 STAND UP FOR OUR RESIDENTS. ALSO, I WANT TO MENTION THAT IN
- 9 CONGRESS, THE VISIBLE ACT WAS INTRODUCED BY REPRESENTATIVES
- 10 VINCENT GONZALEZ, JUDY CHU, SIDNEY KALWAGER DOVE, AND VERONICA
- 11 ESCOBAR. AND IT WOULD REQUIRE IMMIGRATION OFFICERS TO WEAR
- 12 VISIBLE IDENTIFICATION INFORMATION. AND AS I SAID EARLIER,
- 13 SENATOR PALAK, PADILLA AND CORY BOOKER ALSO INTRODUCED A
- 14 SENATE VERSION OF THE VISIBLE ACT THAT ALSO BANS NON-MEDICAL
- 15 FACE COVERINGS OF ICE AGENTS. SO AT OUR HIGHEST LEVELS OF
- 16 GOVERNMENT, OUR REPRESENTATIVES ARE HEEDING THIS CONCERN AND
- 17 UNDERSTAND THAT WE MUST DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT. SUPERVISOR
- 18 HAHN, I KNOW THIS TOOK PLACE IN YOUR DISTRICT, BUT A FEW WEEKS
- 19 AGO, A BORDER PATROL AGENT, A GENTLEMAN BY THE NAME OF
- 20 HODGSON, WHO WAS IN LOS ANGELES TO CONDUCT ICE RAIDS, WAS
- 21 ARRESTED IN LONG BEACH FOR RESISTING ARREST AND ATTEMPTING TO
- 22 ASSAULT AN OFFICER. THE POLICE WERE CALLED BECAUSE WHILE OFF
- 23 DUTY HODGSON WAS INTOXICATED AND ARMED WITH A HANDGUN AND
- 24 ENTERED A WOMAN'S RESTROOM WHERE HE APPROACHED A WOMAN. THIS
- 25 INCIDENT, TO ME, DEMONSTRATES THE LAWLESSNESS OF ICE



- 1 IMMIGRATION ENFORCEMENT AND THE THREATS TO OUR PUBLIC SAFETY.
- 2 IT'S UNFORTUNATE THAT HAPPENED, BUT IT JUST TELLS YOU THAT WE
- 3 NEED TO BE VERY VIGILANT AND PEOPLE NEED TO KNOW THAT WHATEVER
- 4 UNIFORM YOU WEAR, EVEN IF YOU'RE OFF DUTY, YOU NEED TO RESPECT
- 5 YOUR ROLE. AND I THINK THAT'S WHAT WE'RE ASKING FOR AS WELL.
- 6 SOME CITIES IN OUR COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES ARE ALREADY TAKING
- 7 STEPS TO ADDRESS THE ISSUE. THE CITY OF HUNTINGTON PARK THAT
- 8 YOU REPRESENT, SUPERVISOR HAHN AND I USED TO, ASKED THE POLICE
- 9 DEPARTMENT TO VERIFY WHETHER MASKED INDIVIDUALS WITHOUT
- 10 VISIBLE ID WHO ARE CLAIMING TO BE LAW ENFORCEMENT ARE ACTUALLY
- 11 LAW ENFORCEMENT. SO, YOU HAVE LAW ENFORCEMENT FROM OUR LOCAL
- 12 PDS ASKING FEDERAL AGENTS TO IDENTIFY THEMSELVES
- 13 APPROPRIATELY. I DON'T SEE THAT THERE'S ANYTHING WRONG WITH
- 14 THAT. THE PROTOCOL HELPED THEIR POLICE IDENTIFY A MAN WHO MAY
- 15 HAVE BEEN POSING AS A FEDERAL IMMIGRATION AGENT AND HAD A
- 16 CRIMINAL RECORD RELATING TO HUMAN SMUGGLING. HOW IRONIC. THIS
- 17 IS WHY I WAS PLEASED WHEN YOU ASKED ME TO CO-AUTHOR THIS
- 18 MOTION AND TO ASK FOR A REPORT BACK WITH PROPOSED LANGUAGE FOR
- 19 A DRAFT ORDINANCE THAT WOULD PROHIBIT LAW ENFORCEMENT FROM
- 20 CONCEALING THEIR IDENTITY, PROTECT RESIDENTS IN UNINCORPORATED
- 21 AREAS, UNDERSCORE, AND FROM IMPERSONATORS, AND SEND A CLEAR
- 22 MESSAGE THAT L.A. COUNTY STANDS WITH OUR COMMUNITIES. I TOO
- 23 ASK MY COLLEAGUES FOR THEIR AYE VOTE. THANK YOU, MADAM. CHAIR.

25 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. AND THANK YOU FOR THE



- 1 MOTION. AND AS YOU SAID, THIS BOARD HAS UNANIMOUSLY SUPPORTED
- 2 IT. AND I APPRECIATE, SUPERVISOR SOLIS, YOU BRINGING UP THOSE
- 3 THAT ARE IMPERSONATING LAW ENFORCEMENT. I BROUGHT THAT UP
- 4 ABOUT A MONTH AGO, AND I THINK SUPERVISOR HAHN, YOU OUESTIONED
- 5 WHAT I WAS TALKING ABOUT WHEN I SAID THERE ARE PEOPLE
- 6 IMPERSONATING ICE, AND WE'VE HAD ARRESTS, AND THERE HAVE
- 7 PROBABLY BEEN COUNTLESS PEOPLE WHO HAVE BEEN VICTIMIZED
- 8 BECAUSE THEY CAN'T GO TO LAW ENFORCEMENT BECAUSE THEY'RE
- 9 AFRAID TO GO TO LAW ENFORCEMENT. SO, I'M HAPPY THAT WE ARE
- 10 ACKNOWLEDGING THAT IN FACT THERE ARE INDIVIDUALS OUT THERE
- 11 IMPERSONATING ICE, WHICH BRINGS US TO THE ISSUE BEFORE US
- 12 TODAY. THERE IS NO OUESTION, AND THAT'S WHY I'VE SAID A MONTH
- 13 AGO, WE SHOULD REQUIRE ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT, WHETHER IT BE AT
- 14 THE FEDERAL LEVEL OR THE STATE LEVEL, TO SHOW ID, AND I THINK
- 15 I ASKED OUR COUNTY COUNSEL ABOUT THE LAW ON THAT, AND I DON'T
- 16 THINK WE GOT A CLEAR ANSWER IN TERMS OF WHAT THE REQUIREMENT
- 17 IS WHEN SOMEONE IS APPROACHED BY SOMEONE THAT SAYS THEY'RE
- 18 WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT. WHAT, HAVE YOU FOUND OUT WHAT THE ANSWER
- 19 IS IN TERMS OF WHAT THE REQUIREMENT IS AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL
- 20 FOR PEOPLE TO IDENTIFY THEMSELVES COMING FORWARD?
- 22 DAWYN R. HARRISON: YES, THE QUESTION WAS SPECIFICALLY ABOUT
- 23 FEDERAL AGENTS AND I BELIEVE MY COLLEAGUE WHO WAS HERE AT THE
- 24 TIME READ THE PROVISION THAT UPON ARREST THEY DO HAVE TO
- 25 IDENTIFY THEMSELVES. SO THAT IS A REQUIREMENT.



- 2 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: UPON ARREST, BUT PRIOR TO BEING
- 3 ARRESTED. AND THAT'S WHAT I THINK WE ARE ALL COLLECTIVELY
- 4 OUESTIONING IS WHEN SOMEBODY IS APPROACHED. AND I THINK AN
- 5 EXAMPLE THAT WAS USED A MONTH AGO, I THINK I TALKED ABOUT IT
- 6 IS THAT PEOPLE CAN BUY ON AMAZON CLOTHING THAT LOOKS LIKE LAW
- 7 ENFORCEMENT, LOOKS LIKE THE FEDERAL AGENTS THAT ARE GOING OUT
- 8 THERE. SO, THE QUESTION WAS, IS THERE A REQUIREMENT WHEN
- 9 SOMEBODY HAS STOPPED TO IDENTIFY THEMSELVES OR HAVE SOMETHING
- 10 CLEARLY IDENTIFYING WHO THEY ARE AND THAT THEY HAVE TO
- 11 IDENTIFY THE AGENCY THEY'RE WITH?

- 13 DAWYN R. HARRISON: OTHER THAN THE PROVISION THAT WE CITED TO
- 14 LAST TIME, WE DON'T HAVE, I COULD NOT, OR MY OFFICE COULD NOT
- 15 FIND ANYTHING THAT ADDRESSES THAT SPECIFIC ISSUE, OTHER THAN
- 16 UPON ARREST. CLEARLY THIS ORDINANCE WOULD DEAL WITH THAT
- 17 SCENARIO, BUT UP UNTIL NOW WE'VE NOT FOUND ANYTHING THAT
- 18 SPECIFICALLY ADDRESSES THAT PARTICULAR ISSUE.

- 20 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: BECAUSE I, AND SUPERVISOR SOLIS, I
- 21 BROUGHT IT UP A MONTH AGO, THAT YOU ACTUALLY WERE THE CHAMPION
- 22 AS IT RELATES TO THOSE PEOPLE THAT WERE IMPERSONATING
- 23 THEMSELVES AS LAWYERS SAYING THAT THEY COULD GET PEOPLE A
- 24 GREEN CARD OR WHATNOT, TOOK MONEY AND THEN DISAPPEARED. SO,
- 25 THERE IS DEFINITELY BAD PLAYERS OUT THERE THAT ARE



- 1 IMPERSONATING AND TAKING ADVANTAGE OF THE VULNERABLE
- 2 POPULATION. BUT MY QUESTION ACTUALLY NOW, DAWYN, IS TO YOU.
- 3 WE'RE GOING TO GET A LEGAL ANALYSIS. BUT MY UNDERSTANDING IS
- 4 THAT THE US CONSTITUTION SUPREMACY CLAUSE DOES NOT ALLOW THE
- 5 STATE OR THE COUNTY TO REGULATE THE ACTIONS OF THE FEDERAL
- 6 GOVERNMENT AS IT RELATES TO THIS. CAN YOU TOUCH ON THAT?

- 8 DAWYN R. HARRISON: WELL, WHEN YOU SAY AS RELATES TO THIS, I
- 9 DON'T KNOW THAT IT SPEAKS SPECIFICALLY TO THIS. AT THIS TIME,
- 10 WE'RE UNAWARE OF ANY LAW THAT WOULD PROHIBIT THE COUNTY FROM
- 11 ADOPTING THIS PARTICULAR ORDINANCE HOWEVER AS YOU NOTE IT
- 12 WOULD MOST LIKELY BE CHALLENGED IT WOULD MOST LIKELY BE
- 13 CHALLENGED ON THE SUPREMACY CLAUSE WHICH IS A PART OF THE --

- 15 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: WHY DON'T YOU GO OVER WHAT THE
- 16 SUPREMACY CLAUSE IS.

- 18 DAWYN HARRISON: IT WOULD BE THAT IT WOULD BE CLAIMING INTER
- 19 THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY THAT'S WHAT THEY WOULD BE
- 20 CLAIMING AND THIS ONE YOU --

- 22 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: WHY DON'T YOU BREAK IT DOWN WHAT
- 23 WOULD OUALIFY AS THE US CONSTITUTION'S FIRMACY CLAUSE THAT WE
- 24 WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO IMPOSE REGULATIONS ON, GIVE ME SPECIFICS.



1 DAWYN HARRISON: WELL, I PREFER TO PROVIDE MY LEGAL ANALYSIS TO

2 THIS BOARD CONFIDENTIALLY. WHAT I WILL INDICATE IS THAT-

- 4 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: GIVE ME ONE EXAMPLE THAT SEEMS
- 5 OBVIOUS.

- 7 DAWYN R. HARRISON: WELL, WHAT I WILL SAY IS WE CANNOT CONTROL
- 8 THE ACTS OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, THEY WOULD LIKELY CLAIM
- 9 NOT ONLY THE PROVISION ITSELF OR THE ORDINANCE ITSELF UNDER
- 10 THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL SUPREMACY CLAUSE OR IMMUNITY CLAUSE
- 11 WOULD VIOLATE. THEY WOULD CLAIM THAT THE ORDINANCE VIOLATES
- 12 THAT. THEY WOULD ALSO PROBABLY CLAIM THAT ENFORCING IT ITSELF
- 13 WOULD BE A VIOLATION OF DOES --

- 15 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SHERIFF NOW HAVE THE JOB OF
- 16 REGULATING WHETHER OR NOT FEDERAL AGENTS ARE WEARING MASKS OR
- 17 NOT.

- 20 DON'T KNOW HOW THAT WOULD WORK. THAT WHO WOULD ENFORCE IT
- 21 WOULD BE THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY AND THE CITY ATTORNEYS. I WILL
- 22 ALSO NOTE THIS PARTICULAR MOTION IS NOT SPECIFIC. IT IS ALL
- 23 LAW ENFORCEMENT. SO, IT'S NOT SPECIFIC. IT'S NOT AN ICE
- 24 ORDINANCE. IT'S AN ORDINANCE FOR ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT.



- 1 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: I THINK WE ALL KNOW THE COMMENTS.
- 2 AND AGAIN, I'M NOT CRITICAL OF THE WHY. IT'S THE HOW. I MEAN,
- 3 I COMPLETELY, COMPLETELY BELIEVE THAT THE UNINTENDED
- 4 CONSEQUENCES OF THIS ALL TAKING PLACE ARE THAT THOSE IN
- 5 COMMUNITIES THAT ARE THE MOST VULNERABLE THAT ARE NOW GOING
- 6 UNDERGROUND, DON'T FEEL THEY CAN GO TO LAW ENFORCEMENT REPORT
- 7 WHETHER THEY'VE BEEN VICTIMS OR NOT, DON'T FEEL SAFE TO GO OUT
- 8 AS WE'VE HEARD. AND NOW WE'RE DRAFTING AN ORDINANCE THAT'S
- 9 GOING TO SAY IF YOU SEE SOMEONE WITH A MASK, THEY'RE NOT
- 10 COMPLYING WITH A COUNTY ORDINANCE, THEREFORE, AND THEN YOU
- 11 FILL IN THE BLANK, AND I FEEL LIKE IT'S A FALSE SENSE OF, AND
- 12 I DON'T EVEN WANT TO USE THE WORD SECURITY BECAUSE I DON'T

- 23 BACK. BUT I MEAN, I BELIEVE IT WOULD BE IN TERMS OF
- 24 PROSECUTING. IT WOULD BE THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY AND CITY
- 25 ATTORNEY WHO WOULD FILE THE COMPLAINTS IT COULD EITHER BE THE



- 1 INDIVIDUAL CITIZENS IT COULD BE BYSTANDERS LOOKING ON IT COULD
- 2 BE ADVOCACY GROUPS. IT COULD BE THERE'S A NUMBER OF FOLKS WHO
- 3 COULD FILE COMPLAINTS, RIGHT? IT WOULD BE THE ULTIMATE
- 4 PROSECUTION OF THE PROSECUTORS WOULD BE THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY
- 5 AND CITY ATTORNEYS.

- 7 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY, SO THE DA CAN PROSECUTE A
- 8 FEDERAL AGENT.

10 DAWYN R. HARRISON: THEY'RE COMMITTING A CRIME, YES.

11

- 12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: IF THE ORDINANCE ENDS UP BEING- IS
- 13 THIS FELONY OR IS THIS A MISDEMEANOR? THESE ARE QUESTIONS
- 14 BECAUSE AGAIN, IF WE'RE DOING A MOTION JUST TO DO A MOTION,
- 15 I'M FINE, I'LL VOTE YES, I'M KNOWING THAT IT'S GOING TO
- 16 PROBABLY GO NOWHERE, BUT I JUST WANT TO PUT ON THE TABLE WHAT
- 17 I SEE AS THE PITFALLS. SO THAT THE PUBLIC DOESN'T HAVE A FALSE
- 18 IMPRESSION ABOUT WHAT WE CAN AND CANNOT DO. THAT'S ALL.

- 20 DAWYN R. HARRISON: WHICH IS WHY WE'LL BE DOING A LEGAL
- 21 ANALYSIS AND OUR REPORT BACK AND WE'LL HOPEFULLY RESEARCH AND
- 22 ADDRESS ALL THESE ISSUES.

- 24 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY, ALL RIGHT, SUPERVISOR
- 25 MITCHELL.



- 2 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU VERY MUCH AND THANK YOU FOR
- 3 THIS HEARTY DISCUSSION. FIRST OF ALL, I'LL BE SUPPORTING THE
- 4 MOTION. I SUPPORTED THE PASS MOTION WHERE WE LOOKED AT THE
- 5 LEGISLATION BEING PASSED AT THE STATE LEVEL. I AGREE WITH THE

- 14 DAWYN R. HARRISON: WE'RE LOOKING AT ALL THOSE PIECES OF
- 15 LEGISLATION, SUPERVISOR.

- 17 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AT THE STATE AND THE FEDERAL. IF IT'S
- 18 THE PENAL CODE, THEN WE'LL KNOW IT'S AGAINST THE LAW, YOU CALL
- 19 THE POLICE, AND THEN WE KNOW, ACCORDING TO COUNSEL, WHO WOULD
- 20 THEN HAVE THE RIGHT TO PROSECUTE. YOU KNOW, I ALSO HOPE THAT,
- 21 IN THAT WE'RE HAVING THIS DISCUSSION IN THE PUBLIC, THAT THE
- 22 ORGANIZATIONS THAT ARE DOING THE KNOW YOUR RIGHTS TRAININGS,
- 23 THAT THIS IS INCORPORATED INTO THE KNOW YOUR RIGHTS TRAININGS
- 24 SO PEOPLE UNDERSTAND. YOU KNOW, IT'S INTERESTING, THE
- 25 RATIONALE TO PROTECT THEIR IDENTITIES. THERE'S NO OTHER LAW



- 1 ENFORCEMENT ENTITIES THAT I KNOW THAT WEARS MASKS, A. B,
- 2 POBAR, THE POLICE OFFICER BILL OF RIGHTS, IS RIPE WITH
- 3 PROTECTIONS FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT. IT'S FULL. BECAUSE THEY
- 4 CONTINUE TO ARGUE AND DEFEND POBAR AGAINST ALL ODDS THAT
- 5 BECAUSE OF THE NATURE OF THE WORK THEY DO, THAT THEY HAVE TO
- 6 HAVE SOME RIGHT TO PRIVACY. POBAR DOESN'T GIVE THEM THE RIGHT
- 7 TO COVER THEIR FACE WITH MASKS. POBAR DOESN'T GIVE THEM THE

- 16 SUPERVISOR HAHN'S REFERENCE IN TERMS OF THE JUDICIAL AUTHORITY

- 23 COLLEAGUES. AND I INTEND TO ALSO SUPPORT THIS MOTION TO MAKE
- 24 CLEAR OUR COMMITMENT TO TRANSPARENCY AND PROTECTING PUBLIC

- 19 ICONIC BUILDING INTO UP TO POTENTIALLY 700 UNITS OF HOUSING.

- 3 ENROLLEES ACROSS THE COUNTRY. THIS INCLUDES THE DATA OF
- 4 INDIVIDUALS LIVING IN OUR OWN STATE OF CALIFORNIA, INCLUDING
- 5 ILLINOIS, WASHINGTON STATE, AND WASHINGTON, D.C., ALL OF WHICH
- 6 HAVE EXPANDED MEDICAID TO IMMIGRANTS USING ONLY STATE TAXPAYER
- 7 DOLLARS. THIS DATA INCLUDES HOME ADDRESSES, ETHNICITIES, AND
- 8 OTHER PERSONAL INFORMATION THAT IS PROTECTED BY THE HEALTH
- 9 INSURANCE PROBABILITY AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT, KNOWN AS HIPAA.

- 12 HEALTH INFORMATION, GIVING THEM RIGHTS OVER THEIR DATA, AND

- 4 A SERIES OF L.A. COUNTY TAKING ACTION TO STAND AND PROTECT OUR
- 5 RESIDENTS FROM THE ONGOING EFFORTS OF THIS FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

- 2 AND THE STATE THEN PROVIDES THAT ELIGIBILITY FILE AS PART OF
- 3 NORMAL BUSINESS FOR BOTH FULL SCOPE AND LIMITED SCOPE MEDI-CAL
- 4 OVER TO CMS. SO, WHEN SOMEONE IS ELIGIBLE FOR LIMITED SCOPE
- 5 MEDI-CAL, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WOULD HISTORICALLY REIMBURSE
- 6 FOR THOSE EMERGENCY SERVICES. IF THEY'RE ELIGIBLE FOR FULL
- 7 SCOPE MEDI-CAL, THEY HAVE A BROADER ARRAY OF SERVICES. SO THAT

- 2 CODES, ICD-10, A VARIETY OF DIFFERENT CODES DEPENDING ON THE
- 3 EXACT SERVICE. THE STATE KNOWS DEPENDING ON WHAT THE AID CODE
- 4 IS FOR THE PATIENT, IF THEY'RE A UIS OR SATISFACTORY
- 5 IMMIGRATION STATUS PATIENT. WHICH CODES THEN ARE ABLE TO BE
- 6 SENT ON TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT FOR FEDERAL REIMBURSEMENT
- 7 FOR UNDER LIMITED SCOPE MEDI-CAL AND WHICH ONES CANNOT, BUT

- 10 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SO, AND I APOLOGIZE FOR THIS
- 11 QUESTION BECAUSE MAYBE YOU ANSWERED IT. WHEN WE SEND IT TO THE
- 12 STATE AND THEN THE STATE SEEKS REIMBURSEMENT, DO THEY PROVIDE
- 13 ANY PATIENT INFORMATION TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AS IT
- 14 RELATES TO THE REIMBURSEMENT?

16 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: YES, IT'S A FULL CLAIM.

- 18 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SO CONCEIVABLY THEN THAT COULD BE
- 19 WHERE SOME OF THE, I MEAN, MY CONCERN IS THAT I WANT TO MAKE
- 20 SURE, FIRST OF ALL, THAT WE FIXED THE PROBLEM. BECAUSE WHEN I
- 21 SAW HOW MUCH THEY CLAWED BACK, IT WAS LIKE \$52,700,000. I WANT

- 4 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: RIGHT. BUT THE STATE THEN IN TURN
- 5 SUBMITTED THE INFORMATION TO THE FEDS EVEN THOUGH IT DIDN'T
- 6 OUALIFY. BUT NOW THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS THAT INFORMATION
- 7 IN THEIR SYSTEM BECAUSE THEY OBVIOUSLY FIGURED IT OUT AND
- 8 CLAWED BACK THE MONEY.

- 11 ANYWAYS BECAUSE PEOPLE ARE ELIGIBLE FOR EMERGENCY SERVICES
- 12 UNDER A LIMITED SCOPE MEDI-CAL SO THOSE CLAIMS END UP GOING TO
- 13 THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT REGARDLESS AND THEY HAVE THE FULL THEY
- 14 HAVE THE FULL ENROLLMENT FILE SO THEY KNOW THEY HAVE THE FULL
- 15 ENROLLMENT FILE THAT GOES TO CMS FOR SIS AND UIS CLIENTS AND
- 16 SO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS THAT FULL ELIGIBILITY FILE AND
- 17 KNOWS WHICH AID CODE INDIVIDUALS ARE A PART OF.

- 19 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY, I'M GOING TO HAVE YOU COME
- 20 UP AND GIVE ME A CRASH COURSE ON THIS BECAUSE THERE'S STILL
- 21 SOMETHING MISSING, BUT I'M NOT GOING TO BELABOR IT HERE. YOU
- 22 KNOW, OBVIOUSLY WHEN IT COMES TO HIPAA AND ALL, WE ALL TAKE
- 23 PRIVACY VERY SERIOUSLY. AND I KNOW THAT EVEN WHEN WE'VE HAD
- 24 SITUATIONS WHERE RECORDS HAVE NOT BEEN PROPERLY DISPOSED OF,
- 25 YOU SEND OUT ALERTS TO LET PEOPLE KNOW. I MEAN, AND THAT



- 1 HASN'T HAPPENED IN KNOCK ON WOOD FOR A LONG TIME, BUT IT IS
- 2 SOMETHING THAT, IF YOU CAN'T PROTECT A PATIENT'S PRIVACY,
- 3 COMING INTO A SAFE SPACE, THEN TO SURPRISE SOLIS'S POINT,
- 4 YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE PEOPLE NOT COMING IN FOR SERVICES AND
- 5 PREVENTIVE CARE WE KNOW IS THE BEST CARE FOR ESPECIALLY PEOPLE
- 6 THAT HAVE CHRONIC ILLNESSES. YOU KNOW, BUT I'M TRYING TO
- 7 UNDERSTAND JUST THE WHOLE PROCESS AS IT RELATES TO WHAT WE'RE
- 8 ASKING AND MAYBE YOU CAN WALK US THROUGH HOW THIS MOTION IS
- 9 GOING TO IMPACT WHAT WE DO.

- 11 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: SURE, AND JUST A COMMENT PRIOR TO THAT
- 12 AND THIS WAS ALLUDED TO IN YOUR COMMENTS SUPERVISOR BARGER AND
- 13 THE INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS BY SUPERVISORS HAHN AND SOLIS. HIPAA
- 14 IS THERE TO PROTECT PATIENT PRIVACY. THERE ARE SPECIFIC
- 15 EXCEPTIONS IN HIPAA FOR, IT'S FOR PATIENT CARE, IT'S FOR
- 16 HEALTHCARE OPERATIONS, AND IT'S FOR BILLING AND CLAIMING. AND
- 17 THAT THIRD BILLING AND CLAIMING CATEGORY IS WHY IT'S OKAY FOR
- 18 THE STATE TO SEND A CLAIM TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, BECAUSE
- 19 THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS A ROLE IN REIMBURSING FOR THAT
- 20 CLAIM. BUT THERE'S NO PURPOSE OF SENDING THAT IMMIGRATION,
- 21 THAT INFORMATION OUTSIDE OF CMS OVER TO ANY OTHER ENTITY. AND
- 22 THAT IS, IN MY MIND, A CLEAR VIOLATION OF THE LETTER OF THE
- 23 LAW AND THE INTENT OF HIPAA, WHICH IS PROTECTING PATIENT
- 24 PRIVACY. AND THEN TO GET TO YOUR QUESTION, THE FILE COMES, AND
- 25 DR. CONTRERAS CAN SPEAK MORE TO IT, IT COMES THROUGH THE DPS



- 1 OFFICE AND THEN TO THE STATE AND THEN IT GETS TRANSMITTED TO
- 2 CMS. BUT THE FEAR BY PATIENTS IS IMMENSE. THE FILE, MY
- 3 UNDERSTANDING OF THE FILE THAT HAS BEEN SHARED WITH THE
- 4 IMMIGRATION AUTHORITY INCLUDES PATIENT'S NAMES, ADDRESS. I
- 5 DON'T KNOW IF THERE'S SPECIFIC HEALTHCARE UTILIZATION
- 6 INFORMATION ON THAT FILE. THAT INFORMATION HASN'T BEEN MADE
- 7 AVAILABLE. I DON'T KNOW IF THEY KNOW WHERE PEOPLE ARE SEEKING
- 8 CARE, IF IT'S THE ACTUAL CLINICAL CLAIM OR IT'S JUST THE
- 9 DEMOGRAPHIC INFORMATION. BUT EITHER WAY, IT STOKES FEAR. IT
- 10 RISKS PEOPLE NOT COMING IN FOR EMERGENCY SERVICES AND URGENT
- 11 CARE SERVICES. DHS HAS SEEN ROUGHLY A 15 TO 20% DECLINE IN ER
- 12 AND URGENT CARE VISITS SINCE THIS ISSUE BEGAN. IT RISKS, TO
- 13 YOUR POINT, PEOPLE NOT COMING IN FOR PREVENTIVE SERVICES,
- 14 PRIMARY CARE SERVICES, SPECIALTY CARE SERVICES, AND THEN THEIR
- 15 CLINICAL CONDITIONS WORSENING. SO, I'M FULLY SUPPORTIVE OF THE
- 16 MOTION AND LOOKING AT WHAT LEGAL AVENUES ARE AVAILABLE TO TRY
- 17 TO RESTRICT THE FURTHER SHARING OF THIS INFORMATION AND HOW WE
- 18 CAN HELP PREVENT IT FROM HAPPENING AGAIN.

- 20 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: BUT WE DON'T ASK FOR ANY PATIENT'S
- 21 RESIDENCY WHEN THEY PRESENT THEMSELVES, DO WE?

- 23 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: DO YOU MEAN THEIR IMMIGRATION STATUS AS A
- 24 PROVIDER? NO, BUT IN THE IN THE MEDI-CAL ELIGIBILITY AND
- 25 DETERMINATION PROCESS AS CONDUCTED BY DPSS. THEY HAVE TO



- 1 DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT SOMEONE IS ELIGIBLE FOR FULL SCOPE OR
- 2 LIMITED SCOPE MEDI-CAL.

- 4 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: BUT IF THEY COME INTO OUR ER OR
- 5 THEY PRESENT THEMSELVES AT OUR CLINIC.

7 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: WE DON'T ASK.

8

- 9 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND THEY DO LIKE AN ABILITY TO
- 10 PAY?

11

- 12 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: NO, WE DO NOT ASK OR KEEP THAT
- 13 INFORMATION. THAT'S IN THE MEDI-CAL ELIGIBILITY FILE.

14

- 15 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: BUT IF THEY HAVE NO INSURANCE,
- 16 LET'S SAY THAT I NO LONGER FEEL SAFE GOING TO DPSS, NO
- 17 OFFENSE, TO FILL OUT THE APPLICATION. AND I PRESENT MYSELF AT
- 18 A CLINIC AT ALL OF YOU FOR CHRONIC ASTHMA. I DON'T HAVE ANY
- 19 INSURANCE, BUT YOU'RE STILL GOING TO SEE ME. YOU'RE STILL
- 20 GOING TO TREAT ME.

21

22 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: WE WILL SEE YOU. WE WILL SEE YOU.

- 24 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND THEN SO, BUT AT THAT POINT, WE
- 25 DON'T ASK FOR ANY DOCUMENTATION AS IT RELATES TO RESIDENCY.



- 2 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: WE GO THROUGH A PROCESS TO SEE IF PEOPLE
- 3 ALREADY HAVE COVERAGE, IF THEY ALREADY HAVE MEDI-CAL, IF
- 4 THEY'RE NOT ALREADY ON MEDI-CAL. WE GO THROUGH THE INITIATION
- 5 OF A PROCESS TO SEE IF THEY ARE ABLE OR WILLING, INTERESTED IN
- 6 SIGNING UP FOR MEDI-CAL. BUT IF INDIVIDUALS STOP THAT PROCESS
- 7 FOR ANY ONE OF A NUMBER OF REASONS, WE WILL STILL SEE THE
- 8 PATIENTS AND WE RUN THEM THROUGH OUR ATP PROGRAM.

- 10 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SO, NO MATTER WHAT, BECAUSE WE'RE
- 11 A SAFETY NET, THAT'S MY POINT, YOU DON'T HAVE TO BE ON MEDI-
- 12 CAL. YES. WE WILL SEE ANYBODY WHO PRESENTS THEMSELVES EITHER
- 13 IN A CLINIC OR AT THE HOSPITAL.

14

15 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: YES.

16

- 17 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY. WELL, NO, BUT IF THEY'RE
- 18 UNDOCUMENTED THEY WOULDN'T GET REIMBURSED ANYWAY. THAT'S MY

- 24 OF AN INPATIENT HOSPITALIZATION.



- 1 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: WELL, CHRONIC ILLNESS, THAT'S
- 2 WHAT-

4 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: NOT FOR OUTPATIENT.

5

- 6 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: YEAH, AND THAT'S REALLY WHAT I WAS
- 7 FOCUSED ON I MEAN, I KNOW IN EMERGENCY YOU HAVE TO WRITE YOU
- 8 HAVE TO ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.

- 10 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU, I'VE BEEN SITTING HERE
- 11 ASKING MY QUESTIONS BECAUSE WHILE I FULLY BELIEVE IN A PROCESS
- 12 AND I ADVOCATE FOR IT AND USE IT THAT ALLOWS OUR EMOTIONS TO
- 13 BE TRANSPARENT AND INFORMED BY AS MANY PEOPLE AS POSSIBLE, I
- 14 ALSO, AND I AM NOT AN ATTORNEY, JUST HAVE A CONCERN SOMETIMES
- 15 WHEN WE GO DEEP INTO A CONVERSATION AROUND LEGAL STRATEGY. AND
- 16 SO, I WOULD HOPE THAT COUNTY COUNSEL WOULD PIPE UP AT SOME
- 17 POINT TO TELL US YOU'VE GONE TOO FAR, BECAUSE WHAT I DON'T
- 18 WANT TO DO IS COMPROMISE OUR LEGAL STRATEGY, PARTICULARLY WHEN
- 19 WE CONSIDER THE ADVERSARY THAT WE'RE GOING UP AGAINST. SO, I
- 20 WILL CAREFULLY ASK MY QUESTION, BECAUSE AGAIN, I DON'T WANT TO

- 4 INFRASTRUCTURE IS IMPORTANT FOR EVERYONE HAVING LIVED THROUGH

- 15 THAT WE'RE UP AGAINST WHO APPARENTLY IS GOING TO COME FOR US
- 16 EVERY DAY. I WANT US TO BE STRONG IN OUR DEFENSE. THANK YOU
- 17 MADAM CHAIR.

- 19 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: MADAM CHAIR IF I MAY, THE LAST PORTION OF
- 20 THE MOTION WE FURTHER MOVE THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, DIRECT
- 21 COUNTY COUNSEL IN CONSULTATION WITH RELEVANT DEPARTMENTS,
- 22 INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO DEPARTMENTS, HEALTH SERVICES,

- 15 TO THE BOARD IN 60 DAYS WITH A FRAMEWORK THAT CONSOLIDATED
- 16 MENTAL HEALTH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER TREATMENT BED REPORTS
- 17 INTO ONE NEW STREAMLINED AND COORDINATED REPORT. THE
- 18 DEPARTMENTS HAVE BEEN MEETING TOGETHER TO CREATE THE REPORT
- 19 FRAMEWORK, COMPILE THE MOTIONS AND REPORTS RELATED TO BH
- 20 TREATMENT BEDS, AND TO AGREE ON THE FORMAT AND LAYOUT OF HOW
- 21 WE REPORT AND VISUALIZE THE DATA. AS DIRECTED THE DRAFT
- 22 FRAMEWORK WAS PRESENTED TO THE HEALTH CLUSTER FOR INPUT AND TO
- 23 ENSURE THE REPORT CAPTURES WHAT YOU ALL ARE LOOKING FOR AND
- 24 WITH YOUR APPROVAL TODAY WE CAN MOVE FORWARD TO PREPARE THE
- 25 FIRST BED REPORT FOR AUGUST 29TH. IN THE PREFACE OF THE MEMO



- 1 WE WANTED TO DISTINGUISH THE SPECIFIC AND UNIQUE ROLES EACH
- 2 DEPARTMENT HAS IN THE COUNTY CONTINUUM OF CARE, I THOUGHT THAT
- 3 WAS VERY IMPORTANT. SO DMH AND DPH-SAPC ARE REALLY RESPONSIBLE
- 4 FOR MANAGING AND IMPLEMENTING OUR COUNTY'S MEDI-CAL SYSTEM OF
- 5 CARE. DMH AS THE LOCAL MENTAL HEALTH AUTHORITY AND MENTAL
- 6 HEALTH PLAN PROVIDES OR ARRANGES FOR THE PROVISION OF
- 7 SPECIALTY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES TO ALL MEDI-CAL
- 8 BENEFICIARIES. THEN, DPH-SAPC IS THE COUNTY'S SPECIALTY
- 9 MANAGED CARE PLAN FOR SUD SERVICES, AND DHS OPERATES
- 10 PSYCHIATRIC EMERGENCY SERVICES AND ACUTE PSYCHIATRIC BEDS IN
- 11 DHS HOSPITALS AND MANAGES DHS'S OFFICE OF DIVERSION AND
- 12 REENTRY CONTRACTS FOR ACUTE AND SUBACUTE MENTAL HEALTH
- 13 TREATMENT BEDS. SO THE NEW REPORT IS PROPOSED TO HAVE TWO
- 14 SECTIONS TO SUPPORT A COMPREHENSIVE VIEW AND UNDERSTANDING OF
- 15 AVAILABLE AND NEEDED BEDS FOR MENTAL HEALTH AND SUD ACROSS THE
- 16 COUNTY. SECTION 1, FIRST, THE REPORT WILL INCLUDE THE
- 17 FOLLOWING STRATEGIES TO MANAGE RESOURCES, UTILIZATION
- 18 MANAGEMENT THAT LOOKS AT ENSURING THE RIGHT LEVEL OF CARE FOR
- 19 EACH PERSON IS IN PLACE, THEN THERE'S THE DATA AND OUTCOMES WE
- 20 TRACK AND THE INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL CHALLENGES AND

- 16 SUBMITTED BIANNUALLY. THE FIRST REPORT FOCUSING ON DATA FROM
- 17 JANUARY THROUGH JUNE 2025 WILL BE DUE AT THE END OF AUGUST,
- 18 AND THE SECOND DUE AT THE END OF FEBRUARY FOR JULY THROUGH
- 19 DECEMBER. THE REPORTING DEADLINES FACTOR INTO THE LAG FOR
- 20 POSTING DATA AND THE TIME DEPARTMENTS NEED TO POST AND PULL

- 1 SWITCHING NOW TO GIVE A OUICK OVERVIEW OF OUR STATUS ON THE
- 2 ALLIANCE AND DOJ SETTLEMENT TARGETS. WE'RE PLEASED TO SHARE
- 3 THAT THE DEPARTMENTS CONTINUE TO REMAIN ON TRACK. NOW, IN
- 4 TERMS OF THE L.A. ALLIANCE SETTLEMENT, FOR ALLIANCE THESE
- 5 COMMITMENTS ARE SHARED BETWEEN DMH, DPH, SAPC AND INCLUDE BOTH
- 6 HOUSING AND TREATMENT BEDS. I'LL PRESENT DMHS AND I WILL PASS
- 7 TO DR. FERRER FOR SAPCS. THE ALLIANCE BEDS ENCOMPASS HOUSING,
- 8 MEANING INTERIM HOUSING, PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, AND
- 9 TREATMENT BEDS. AND BOTH DMH AND DPH ARE WORKING TOWARDS THESE
- 10 ANNUAL CALENDAR YEAR COMMITMENTS, TOTALING 3,000 BY THE END OF
- 11 THE YEAR 2026. WE'RE PLEASED TO REPORT THAT THE COUNTY WAS AT
- 12 52% OF ITS GOAL IN DECEMBER 2024 AND REMAINS ON TRACK IN 2025.
- 13 BECAUSE WE'LL CONTINUE TO REPORT ALLIANCE AND DOJ TO THE
- 14 RESPECTIVE COURTS. A SUMMARY WILL BE PROVIDED AS PART OF THIS
- 15 CONSOLIDATED BID REPORT WITH LINKS TO THE FULL REPORTS. NOW
- 16 I'LL INVITE DR. FERRER TO COMMENT ON SAPC.

- 18 DR. BARBARA FERRER: YEAH, THANKS SO MUCH. I MEAN, WE ARE ALSO
- 19 HITTING ALL OF OUR TARGETS. ON THE SOBERING CENTERS, WE'VE
- 20 ADDED 16 BEDS. SOME OF THEM ARE NOT QUITE ONLINE, BUT THEY'RE
- 21 ALL IN DEVELOPMENT OF THE NEW BEDS. WE HAVE 15 BEDS THAT HAVE
- 22 ALREADY BEEN ONLINE. FOR HOSPITAL LEVEL CARE FOR ACUTE
- 23 INPATIENT, THIS IS REALLY WITHDRAWAL MANAGEMENT BEDS,
- 24 INPATIENT WITHDRAWAL MANAGEMENT. WE HAVE 78 BEDS. WE HAVEN'T
- 25 ADDED HERE YET, BUT THERE IS A COMMITMENT WITH THE ROUND ONE



- 1 FUNDING FROM BHCIP THAT WE'LL BE ABLE TO ADD ANOTHER 15 BEDS
- 2 THERE. WE'VE ADDED 42 BEDS TO RESIDENTIAL WITHDRAWAL
- 3 MANAGEMENT. WE WERE AT 108. WE'RE APPROACHING 42 MORE TO THAT.
- 4 IT'S ALMOST AT OVER 150. AND THEN FOR RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT,
- 5 WE'VE MADE OUR BIGGEST GAINS. WE HAVE 2,724 BEDS, ADDING 217
- 6 BEDS, ALL IN DEVELOPMENT, AND HAVE ABOUT ANOTHER 850 BEDS
- 7 THAT, AGAIN, WITH BHCIP ROUND ONE MONEY HAVE BEEN AWARDED.
- 8 AGAIN, THAT TAKES A LITTLE BIT OF TIME FOR THOSE TO COME OUT.
- 9 AND WE'VE ADDED SOME BEDS TO RECOVERY BRIDGE HOUSING, ALTHOUGH
- 10 HERE IS THE ONE AREA WHERE WE'RE REALLY STRUGGLING TO GET THE
- 11 FUNDING. WE HAVE ABOUT 1,700 BEDS IN RECOVERY BRIDGE HOUSING.
- 12 HAVEN'T BEEN ABLE TO ADD ANY THERE. WE HAVE 139 BEDS IN
- 13 RECOVERY HOUSING. THIS IS PEOPLE WHO NEED SOBER LIVING,
- 14 ESSENTIALLY, NOT ATTACHED TO A PROGRAM, ADDING 11 BEDS THERE.
- 15 BUT IT'S SUPER HARD FOR US TO GET RECOVERY HOUSING FOR FOLKS,
- 16 THE WAY THE FINANCING IS SET UP RIGHT NOW. BUT WE'RE ON TARGET
- 17 WITH OUR GOALS FOR THE ALLIANCE AGREEMENT, FOR SURE. I MEAN,
- 18 WE'LL EXCEED OUR TARGETS, ACTUALLY.

- 20 DR. LISA WONG: THANK YOU, DR. FERRER. NOW, IN TERMS OF THE
- 21 DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE IN RUTHERFORD, THE RIGHT BOX REFLECTS
- 22 THE DOJ BED COMMITMENTS, WHICH ARE SHARED BETWEEN DHS AND DMH.
- 23 AND THERE ARE ACUTE AND SUBACUTE TREATMENT BEDS AVAILABLE TO
- 24 P3 AND P4 INDIVIDUALS CURRENTLY IN JAIL, INCLUDING LPS
- 25 CONSERVED, NON-CONSERVED, FELONY INCOMPETENT TO STAND TRIAL.



- 1 AND THE 256 BEDS ARE PART OF THE RAMP-UP REPORTED FOR THE US
- 2 VERSUS COUNTY AND RUTHERFORD CASES. IN ADDITION TO THE DOJ
- 3 SETTLEMENT, THE BOARD PASSED THE P3P4 MOTION TO FURTHER ITS
- 4 COMMITMENT TO THE MIST AND FIST POPULATION. AND THE COUNTY
- 5 INCREASED ITS GOAL TO 500 WITH THIS MOTION TO ADDRESS BOTH
- 6 COMMITMENTS. THEREFORE, THIS DATA REFLECTS THE OVERALL 500 BED
- 7 GOAL. THE BED TARGETS ARE STRATIFIED ACROSS LEVELS OF CARE BUT
- 8 AREN'T RESTRICTED TO THESE QUANTITIES AND DMH AND DHS HAVE THE

- 15 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: THANK YOU. WITH RESPECT TO ODR FOR THE
- 16 DOJ AND RUTHERFORD SETTLEMENTS, YOU'LL SEE THAT IN TOTAL, WE
- 17 ARE ON TRACK FOR THE DOJ COMPLIANCE ON BUILDING UP THE BEDS.
- 18 YOU'LL SEE THAT THE NUMBERS ARE SLIGHTLY BELOW TARGET FOR FIST
- 19 AND ABOVE TARGET FOR ODR HOUSING, AND THAT WAS DUE TO AN
- 20 INTENTIONAL SHIFT IN CAPACITY FROM FIST TO ODR HOUSING BASED
- 21 ON WHERE THE PATIENT AND CLIENT NEED IS. WITH RESPECT TO THE
- 22 P3, P4 BEDS THAT DR. WONG JUST MENTIONED, OF THOSE 500 BED
- 23 TARGETS SET FORTH BY THE BOARD, 300 ARE DMH AND 200 ARE DHS.
- 24 THOSE ARE FOR SUBACUTE AND ACUTE LEVEL OF CARE AND DHS WILL
- 25 ACHIEVE THAT 200 BED TARGET BY THE END OF 2025.



- 2 DR. LISA WONG: THANK YOU DR. GHALY. SO, AS YOU CAN SEE FOR A
- 3 DMH WE ONLY HAVE THE TWO LINES THERE BUT FOR 24/25 FISCAL YEAR
- 4 OUR TARGET WAS 72 AND WE REACHED 84. THIS YEAR'S WAS 164 AND
- 5 WE REACHED 168. OUR COMING YEAR TARGET IS 256 AND WE STILL
- 6 HAVE THOSE BEDS PENDING, BUT WE ARE ANTICIPATING TO BE ON
- 7 TRACK WITH THOSE AS WELL. SO, IN CONCLUSION THESE SETTLEMENT
- 8 COMMITMENTS CONTRIBUTE TO EXPANSION OF THE DMH BED NETWORK AND
- 9 THE TARGETS ARE INFORMED BY THE NEEDS AND PRIORITIES WITHIN
- 10 THE SYSTEM OF CARE AND OUR BED PIPELINES WILL SERVE TO FILL
- 11 OUR SETTLEMENT COMMITMENTS. IT'S IMPORTANT TO NOTE THOUGH THAT
- 12 THE OBLIGATIONS FOR BED DEVELOPMENT FROM BOTH THE DOJ LAWSUIT
- 13 AND THE L.A. ALLIANCE LAWSUIT ARE SEPARATE AND EXCLUSIVE. WE
- 14 CANNOT ATTRIBUTE THE SAME BED TO BOTH LAWSUITS AND ALL THE
- 15 DEPARTMENTS INVOLVED HAVE TAKEN GREAT CARE TO MAKE THAT CLEAR.
- 16 WHAT CAN THE BOARD DO TO HELP? WELL, PUSH FOR IMD FULL REPEAL,
- 17 THAT'S PROBABLY AT THE TOP OF OUR LIST. AND AS YOU KNOW, THE
- 18 COUNTY HAS AN OPPORTUNITY TO PARTICIPATE IN AN IMD WAIVER
- 19 WITHIN BH CONNECT. WE ARE ASSESSING THE COST BENEFIT OF
- 20 PARTICIPATING GIVEN THE TIGHT RESTRICTIONS AROUND THE CURRENT
- 21 WAIVER AND ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS THAT ARE ATTACHED TO THE
- 22 IMD WAIVER OPPORTUNITY. AND WHILE WE'LL LIKELY MOVE AHEAD,
- 23 BARRING ANY MAJOR FINANCIAL BARRIERS, WE WOULD STILL LIKE TO
- 24 ENCOURAGE THE BOARD TO HELP SUPPORT US IN GAINING A MORE
- 25 EXPANSIVE IMD RELAXATION, ESPECIALLY IN RESIDENTIAL SETTINGS



- 1 WHERE PEOPLE LIVE AND RECEIVE SERVICES AS THEY CONTINUE TO
- 2 RECOVER. ANOTHER AREA THE BOARD WOULD LOVE TO SEE, YOU KNOW,
- 3 SUPPORT US IS A SHIFT IN THE WORKFORCE LANDSCAPE. THINGS LIKE
- 4 SHIFT DIFFERENTIALS, CHANGES IN SALARIES, STAFF TRAININGS.
- 5 IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT THAT WE FORTIFY STAFF SALARIES AT KEY
- 6 LEVELS OF CARE TO DECREASE RELIANCE ON HIGHER LEVELS OF CARE.
- 7 AND I KNOW THAT WHILE WE DON'T OPERATE THE SUBACUTE BEDS OR
- 8 SUBACUTE FACILITIES, THE ABILITY FOR OUR ENTIRE SYSTEM OF CARE
- 9 TO APPROPRIATELY CARE FOR PEOPLE WHEN THEY NEED THE HELP WHERE
- 10 THEY NEED IT IMPACTS HOW MANY PEOPLE END UP AT THOSE HIGH-END
- 11 CARE BEDS. AND WHAT WE WOULD IDEALLY LIKE TO SEE IS
- 12 INVESTMENTS ON THE LOWER END SO PEOPLE DON'T HAVE TO GET TO
- 13 THAT POINT IN THEIR TREATMENT. AND I ALSO WANT TO POINT OUT
- 14 THAT THE COUNTY ENTERED INTO THESE SETTLEMENT AGREEMENTS NOT
- 15 KNOWING WHAT THE FUTURE HOLDS. AND WHILE WE'RE FINANCIALLY
- 16 COMMITTED TO THE CURRENT AND FORECASTED EXPANSION, THERE HAVE
- 17 BEEN, AS WE ALL KNOW, MEDICAID POLICY SHIFTS BOTH FEDERALLY
- 18 AND LOCALLY THAT COULD IMPACT US, SUCH AS INCREASING THE
- 19 PERCENTAGE OF THOSE WHO MAY BECOME UNINSURED. AS THINGS
- 20 CONTINUE TO EVOLVE, THE COUNTY IS KEEPING A CLOSE WATCH AND
- 21 CONTINUING TO MONITOR. WE WILL BRING UP THESE CONCERNS WITHIN
- 22 THE REPORTS OR BETWEEN AS NEEDED.
- 24 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU FOR THAT AND I WOULD
- 25 CHALLENGE YOU. I MEAN GIVEN WHAT YOU WANT TO SUPPORT,



- 1 OBVIOUSLY ON THE IMD THERE IS A POSITION THAT THIS COUNTY LED
- 2 WITH NACO TO SUPPORT THAT. IT WAS REAUTHORIZED THIS YEAR, SO
- 3 IT'S ONE OF THE PRIORITIES FOR NACO, AND THAT'S JUST NOT L.A.
- 4 COUNTY SPEAKING, THAT'S COUNTIES ACROSS THE NATION, BECAUSE
- 5 THIS IS IMPACTING. I ALWAYS SAY WE'RE THE BIGGEST, SO WE
- 6 DEFINITELY SEE IT, BUT IT'S HAPPENING. THIS IS HAPPENING IN
- 7 SMALLER COUNTIES AND THE IMPACT IS REAL, ESPECIALLY WHEN IT
- 8 COMES TO CO-DISORDER. BUT THE GOAL OF THIS PRESENTATION, ALONG
- 9 WITH THE FRAMEWORK, IS TO UNDERSTAND WHAT BEDS ARE AVAILABLE
- 10 TODAY. AND I APPRECIATE, DR. FERRER, YOUR HONESTY ABOUT THE
- 11 SOBER BEDS. I MEAN, SOBER LIVING BEDS, BECAUSE THAT'S BEEN AN
- 12 ISSUE FOR AS LONG AS TIME. WHEN PEOPLE ARE DONE WITH TREATMENT
- 13 AND NEED TO GO SOMEPLACE, A SAFE ENVIRONMENT, THOSE BEDS ARE
- 14 NEAR IMPOSSIBLE TO FIND. SO, WHEN WE GET THE SUPPORT, IT'S
- 15 REALLY A TOOL TO HELP US BETTER FORECAST FUTURE NEEDS AND TO
- 16 UNDERSTAND THE CHALLENGES WITH BED EXPANSION. SO, IN TERMS OF
- 17 REDUCING THE JAIL POPULATION, HOW ARE YOUR DEPARTMENTS, AND I
- 18 THINK THIS MIGHT BE FOR YOU, DR. GHALY, HOW ARE YOUR
- 19 DEPARTMENTS WORKING WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND THE
- 20 COMMUNITY SAFETY IMPLEMENTATION TEAM TO ENSURE THAT BED
- 21 EXPANSION IS ADEQUATELY SUPPORTING THE NEEDS OF THOSE THAT ARE
- 22 BEING PROPOSED FOR RELEASE.

24 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: THANKS SUPERVISOR. OUR TEAM PREDOMINANTLY

25 THE CORRECTIONAL HEALTH SERVICES TEAM AND ALSO THE ODR TEAM



- 1 ARE WORKING VERY CLOSELY WITH CSIT. THERE'S A VARIETY OF DATA
- 2 THAT WE'RE SHARING BACK AND FORTH. AND I KNOW THAT CSID IS
- 3 DOING A PRETTY COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENT OF HOW TO MAKE A DENT
- 4 IN THAT JAIL POPULATION THROUGH MANY LEVERS. THEY'RE LOOKING
- 5 AT JUSTICE-SIDED LEVERS OF HOW TO POTENTIALLY SPEED UP THAT
- 6 JUDICIAL PROCESS. THEY'RE LOOKING AT THE INFLOW INTO THE JAIL,
- 7 LENGTH OF STAY INTO THE JAIL, AND THEN THE OUTFLOW. AS FAR AS
- 8 THE OUTFLOW, THAT'S REALLY WHERE WE COME IN THE MOST WITH ODR,
- 9 IS UNDERSTANDING WHAT CAPACITY IS AVAILABLE, DOING ASSESSMENTS
- 10 ABOUT HOW MANY PEOPLE ARE IN JAIL THAT COULD POTENTIALLY BE
- 11 DIVERTED. THERE ARE PEOPLE IN JAIL THAT COULD BE DIVERTED.
- 12 MOST OF THE FOCUS OF ODR HAS BEEN ON THE P3 AND P4 POPULATION
- 13 AS A RESULT OF THE DIRECTION BY THE BOARD, AND THAT'S
- 14 WONDERFUL. THOSE POPULATIONS WHERE APPROPRIATE FROM A CLINICAL
- 15 AND JUDICIAL LENS SHOULD BE DIVERTED. BUT THERE'S ALSO A LOT
- 16 OF P2S WITHIN THE JAIL THAT COULD POTENTIALLY BE DIVERTED. AND
- 17 THERE'S BEEN LESS ATTENTION FOCUSED THERE. IN ORDER TO FURTHER
- 18 EXPAND, ODR AND DR. HONG CAN ADDRESS THIS MORE IF YOU'D LIKE
- 19 ODR WOULD NEED ADDITIONAL FUNDING AS IT WILL NOT HAVE FURTHER
- 20 FUNDING TO SUPPORT BED EXPANSION AFTER 2025.

22 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: WHAT WOULD BE A P2?

- 24 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: P2 IS THE INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE IN MODERATE
- 25 OBSERVATION HOUSING.



- 2 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: I THOUGHT DIVERSION FOR THEM WAS
- 3 ALMOST AN AUTOMATIC, DEPENDING UPON THE CHARGE, THAT ONE
- 4 SEEMED, I WAS ALWAYS TOLD WAS NOT THE MOST CHALLENGING TO FIND
- 5 PLACEMENT FOR. IS THAT NOT TRUE?

6

- 7 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: MOST OF THE FOCUS BY ODR HAS SHIFTED OVER
- 8 TO THE P3 AND P4 POPULATION IN ORDER TO TRY TO DECOMPRESS, IN
- 9 PART DUE TO THE DOJ COMPLIANCE-RELATED ISSUES AND THE DESIRE
- 10 TO MOVE THOSE MORE ACUTE, SICKER PATIENTS OUT OF THE JAIL. BUT
- 11 THERE'S A LOT OF OPPORTUNITY WITHIN THE P2 POPULATION. I THINK
- 12 THE OTHER OUESTION, AND THIS IS SOMETHING THAT CSID IS
- 13 MODELING, IS THEY REALLY NEED TO UNDERSTAND FOR THE PURPOSE OF
- 14 JAIL CLOSURE HOW MANY DAYS IN JAIL ARE POTENTIALLY AVOIDED BY
- 15 DIVERTING SOMEONE. SO, YOU HAVE TO MAKE ASSUMPTIONS IF FOR A
- 16 GIVEN PERSON WITH A GIVEN CHARGE OR SET OF CHARGES HOW LONG
- 17 WOULD WE COUNTY HAVE ANTICIPATED THAT THEY WOULD BE IN JAIL
- 18 BASED ON AND THEN HOW LONG WOULD THEY BE IN JAIL IF THEY WERE
- 19 A DIVERTED AND THAT DELTA IS WHAT COULD BE APPLIED TO A
- 20 POTENTIAL JAIL CLOSURE CALCULATION. DO YOU WANT TO ADD
- 21 ANYTHING ON THE P2?

- 23 DR. CLEMENS HONG: YEAH, I THINK THAT THE P2, SORRY. THE LEGAL
- 24 PIECE OF IT OBVIOUSLY IS WHAT OFTEN DETERMINES THE DIVERSION.
- 25 AND FROM A TREATMENT PERSPECTIVE, YOU ARE CORRECT THAT THEY



- 1 OFTEN COME OUT TO LOWER LEVELS OF CARE, SO IT'S EASIER TO FIND
- 2 THOSE SORTS OF RESOURCES GIVEN THE ISSUES THAT WE'VE HAD
- 3 IDENTIFYING ENOUGH SUBACUTE AND ACUTE LEVEL TREATMENT BEDS,
- 4 AND SO THEY COME IN OUT AT A LOWER LEVEL OF CARE, AND SO WE
- 5 COULD SORT OF RECEIVE THEM IN THE COMMUNITY IN OUR INTERIM
- 6 HOUSING SETTINGS. SO, IT MAKES IT MORE EASY FROM THAT
- 7 PERSPECTIVE.

- 9 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SO, THIS QUESTION IS FOR DMH, BUT
- 10 I THINK IT WOULD APPLY TO DHS AS WELL. HOW ARE YOU NAVIGATING
- 11 SITUATIONS WHERE COURT ORDER PLACEMENTS CONFLICT WITH CLINICAL
- 12 ASSESSMENTS FOR LEVEL OF CARE?

- 14 DR. LISA WONG: OKAY. WELL, IF THE COURT SETS AN ORDER FOR A
- 15 LEVEL OF CARE THAT IS LOWER THAN THE CLINICAL ASSESSMENT, FOR
- 16 EXAMPLE, LIKE WHEN ERS IS RECOMMENDED AND INSTEAD, LIKE
- 17 THERE'S SOMETHING ABOUT SUB-ACUTE. DMH WILL REFER TO THAT
- 18 LOWER LEVEL OF CARE, WHICH INCLUDES SENDING MEDICAL RECORDS TO
- 19 OUR CONTRACT PROVIDERS. SINCE IT'S UNLIKELY THAT ANY PROVIDER
- 20 WOULD ACCEPT A CONSERVATEE AT A PARTICULAR LEVEL OF CARE NOT
- 21 SUPPORTED BY THE CLINICAL RECORD, DMH WOULD SIMULTANEOUSLY
- 22 NOTIFY THE CONSERVATOR, EITHER THE PUBLIC GUARDIAN OR PRIVATE
- 23 CONSERVATOR, OF THE DISCREPANCY AND THEN COUNSEL FOR THE
- 24 CONSERVATOR WOULD BE RESPONSIBLE FOR BRINGING MATTER TO THE
- 25 COURT'S ATTENTION AND REQUESTING A HEARING TO CONTEST THE



- 1 COURT'S ORDER AT THEIR DISCRETION. BUT WE ALWAYS TRY TO HAVE A
- 2 CONVERSATION THOUGH WITH COUNSEL AND WITH, YOU KNOW, WHOEVER
- 3 THE JUDGE IS TO TALK ABOUT WHY IT IS THERE'S A DISCREPANCY AND
- 4 MAYBE WE CAN GIVE YOU KNOW SOME MORE BACKGROUND INTO IT AND
- 5 OFTENTIMES THAT IS ENOUGH TO SWAY THINGS AND GET PEOPLE TO THE
- 6 RIGHT LEVEL OF CARE. I THINK WHERE WE RUN INTO PROBLEMS IS
- 7 THERE ARE SOMETIMES LIKE WHEN FSP FIRST CAME OUT, FULL-SERVICE
- 8 PARTNERSHIP, EVERYONE WANTED FSP, EVERY JUDGE WAS RECOMMENDING
- 9 FSP, WHATEVER LEVEL OF CARE PEOPLE WERE. SO, WE HAD TO DO A
- 10 LOT OF EDUCATION AROUND THAT.

- 12 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: MAY I ADD. THIS IS SOMETHING THAT I THINK
- 13 WE'LL LEARN A LOT ABOUT OVER THE NEXT YEAR AS WE ROLL OUT MORE
- 14 OF THESE SUBACUTE AND ACUTE BEDS, AT LEAST FOR ODR, WE DON'T
- 15 HAVE THE SAME LEGAL AUTHORITIES THAT DMH HAS ON THE
- 16 CONSERVATORSHIP SIDE AND THE ABILITY TO HAVE PEOPLE GO DOWN
- 17 THAT LPS CONSERVATORSHIP PATHWAY. BUT FOR DHS, I THINK THE
- 18 ISSUE ISN'T OFTEN THAT THERE'S A DISCREPANCY AT THE START. SO
- 19 AT THE POINT OF DIVERSION, THE CLINICIAN WILL RECOMMEND A
- 20 CERTAIN LEVEL OF CARE, AND THEN THE COURT, THROUGH THE
- 21 JUDICIAL PROCESS AND THE CLINICAL PROCESS, THE TWO COME TO AN
- 22 AGREEMENT ON WHATEVER THAT LEVEL OF CARE SHOULD BE, AND THEN
- 23 PRESUMING THE JUDGE MAKES AN ORDER OF FINDING OF DIVERSION,
- 24 THE PATIENT IS RELEASED TO THAT LEVEL OF CARE. I THINK WHERE
- 25 IT BECOMES MORE COMPLEX IS AS THE PATIENT HOPEFULLY CLINICALLY



- 1 IMPROVES AND STABILIZES, PHYSICIANS, CLINICIANS, THE LICENSURE
- 2 OF OUR FACILITIES, OUR CLINICAL TRAINING, OUR PROFESSIONAL
- 3 REQUIREMENTS, WE KEEP PATIENTS AT THE LEVEL OF CARE THAT THEY
- 4 ARE CLINICALLY INDICATED FOR. SO, IF A PATIENT IMPROVES, THEN
- 5 THEY NEED TO BE STEPPED DOWN TO A LOWER LEVEL OF CARE, THERE'S
- 6 THEN POTENTIALLY IT RAISES A SITUATION WHERE THAT LEVEL OF
- 7 CARE THAT IS CLINICALLY INDICATED NO LONGER MATCHES WHAT WAS
- 8 ORDERED BY THE COURT. WE DON'T HAVE THE ABILITY TO HOLD
- 9 PEOPLE, PHYSICALLY RESTRAIN PEOPLE AND HOLD PEOPLE IN A LEVEL
- 10 OF CARE THAT MIGHT DISAGREE WITH A COURT ORDER, WE WOULD BE
- 11 REQUIRED IF THE PATIENT WANTS TO LEAVE THAT LEVEL OF CARE TO
- 12 LEAVE. AND THEN WE WOULD NOTIFY THE COURTS, GO THROUGH A
- 13 PROCESS OF MAKING THE COURT AWARE OF THAT. THAT DEPARTURE FROM
- 14 THE FACILITY AND THE COURT COULD TAKE WHATEVER ACTION IN
- 15 PARTNERSHIP WITH PROBATION THAT THEY CHOOSE TO TAKE. BUT ON
- 16 THE CLINICAL SIDE WE DON'T HAVE THE ABILITY, OUR DECISION-
- 17 MAKING IS DRIVEN BY CLINICAL GROUNDS BASED ON WHO REMAINS IN A
- 18 FACILITY OF A CERTAIN LEVEL OF CARE.

- 20 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: GOT IT. I'LL ASK ONE MORE QUESTION
- 21 BECAUSE I SEE SOME OF MY COLLEAGUES WANT TO ASK QUESTIONS.
- 22 THIS ONE'S MORE, YOU HAD MENTIONED THE SETTLEMENT, BOTH DMH
- 23 GETTING 300 ON THE DMH BEDS ADDED UNDER THE MISFIST OR P3, P4
- 24 JAIL POPULATION INITIATIVES. I THINK YOU SAID DMH GETS 300,
- 25 DHS GETS 200. WAS THAT CORRECT? THAT WAS THE NUMBER I THINK?



- 2 DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: THAT WAS THE SPLIT ON THE P3, P4 FOR THE
- 3 500 BEDS.

- 5 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: HOW DO WE ENSURE, BECAUSE I KNOW
- 6 THAT GOING INTO COURT WITH THE ALLIANCE, THERE'S ALWAYS THIS
- 7 ALLEGATION THAT WE'RE DOUBLE COUNTING. HOW ARE WE MAKING SURE
- 8 THAT WE'RE NOT DOUBLE COUNTING AS HAS BEEN CHARACTERIZED?
- 9 BECAUSE I KNOW WE DON'T FEEL WE ARE, BUT HOW CAN WE MAKE CLEAR
- 10 THAT WE'RE NOT?

11

- 12 DR. LISA WONG: DMH NETWORK COMMITTEE DETERMINES THE BED
- 13 ATTRIBUTION BASED ON CLINICAL NEED AND PROVIDER FIT, AND WE
- 14 DETERMINE WHICH POPULATION THE BEDS CAN BEST SERVE AND ASSIGN
- 15 IT WITHIN OUR BED MANAGEMENT PLATFORM CALLED MERLIN. AND
- 16 MERLIN HAS ALL THE SPECIFIC BEDS MAPPED OUT. SO, THE BEDS ARE
- 17 DESIGNATED WITHIN THE SYSTEM AND THE TRACKING IS ONGOING. SO,
- 18 EACH BED IS JUST A SINGLE BED SO YOU CAN'T LIKE YOU KNOW GIVE
- 19 IT AWAY TWICE. BUT WHAT CAN HAPPEN IS IT COULD BE SOMEBODY
- 20 FROM ONE SIDE NEEDS THIS LEVEL OF CARE ON THIS DAY, AND
- 21 SOMEBODY FROM ANOTHER SIDE NEEDS THIS LEVEL OF CARE. AND WE
- 22 REALLY HAVE TO GO TO WHAT THE APPROPRIATE LEVEL OF CARE IS.
- 23 BUT THE NUMBER OF BEDS AND THE PROJECTED NUMBER WITHIN LEVELS
- 24 OF CARE IS THERE AND TRACKED.



- 1 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY SUPERVISOR MITCHELL AND THANK
- 2 YOU AGAIN FOR BEING HERE.

- 4 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR FOR THAT
- 5 LAST OUESTION BECAUSE THAT WAS ALSO OUR GOAL WITH THIS REPORT,
- 6 WOULD BE TO MAKE IT VERY CLEAR TO THE PUBLIC AND TO THE BENCH
- 7 THAT WE COULD MONITOR OURSELVES. IMAGINE THAT. I REALLY WANT
- 8 TO THANK THE THREE DEPARTMENTS FOR YOUR COLLABORATION. WE
- 9 SPENT A LOT OF TIME TALKING ABOUT SILOS AND ASKING YOU TO
- 10 COLLABORATE. AND THIS IS A TRUE MANIFESTATION OF
- 11 COLLABORATION. THE REPORT FOR ME WAS NEVER ALWAYS JUST VOLUME
- 12 OF BEDS. SO THE THREE DEPARTMENTS WORKING TOGETHER, I THINK,
- 13 MAKES IT CLEAR. SUPERVISOR SOLIS AND I WERE HAVING A SIDEBAR
- 14 ON OUR FAVORITE TOPIC, IMD WAIVER. REMIND ME, ARE FEDERAL
- 15 DOLLARS USED TO FUND THOSE BIDS?

16

- 17 DR. LISA WONG: NO, WHAT HAPPENS IS WHEN THERE'S IMD EXCLUSION,
- 18 THEN WE HAVE THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR PAYING THEM.

- 20 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: SO, I WOULD JUST BE, AS I THINK ABOUT,
- 21 AS I DO MORE OFTEN THAN I'D LIKE, I THINK ABOUT THIS FEDERAL
- 22 ADMINISTRATION. I'M NOT SURE THAT THEY WOULD NOT SUPPORT AN
- 23 IMD WAIVER. I DON'T KNOW THAT THEY SHARE THE, THANK YOU, THE
- 24 CONCERN THAT AROSE THAT CREATED THE LIMITATION. SO, THIS MIGHT
- 25 BE OUR OPPORTUNITY.



2 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THEY SUPPORTED IT IN 2016.

4 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THEY SUPPORTED A WAIVER OR THE LIMIT?

5

- 6 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THE IMD WAIVER EXCLUSION CAME UP
- 7 IN 2016, AND IT CAME UP BECAUSE OF OPIOID USE, AND THEY FELT
- 8 THAT WE NEEDED MORE BEDS AND IT NEVER WENT ANYWHERE. WE
- 9 ACTUALLY TRIED TO GET TO MOVE THAT, BUT THERE WAS THE STATE
- 10 WAS NOT INTERESTED IN THEN WITH THE NEXT ADMINISTRATION IN
- 11 2020 IN TALKING TO DHS, THE SECRETARY FELT THERE WAS NOT AN
- 12 APPETITE BECAUSE THEY THOUGHT I'M A COST.

13

- 14 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I'M YEAH, I'M CLEAR ABOUT THAT HISTORY
- 15 YEAH, I KNOW THAT THAT AND MY POINT WAS AT THIS CURRENT
- 16 ADMINISTRATION NOT EVEN KNOWING THAT HISTORY JUST LOOKING AT
- 17 THE POLITICS OF THE CURRENT ADMINISTRATION. I THOUGHT I'M SURE
- 18 THEY WOULD SUPPORT A WAIVER.

- 20 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: WELL, IT'D BE A COST SAVINGS FOR
- 21 US IF YOU LOOK AT ALL OF YOU, WHERE WE'VE GOT FIVE DIFFERENT
- 22 PROVIDERS.

- 24 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I AGREE. SO, I'M WONDERING IF NACO,
- 25 SINCE NACO IS SUPPORTING IT, THAT NOW WE GO FOR A WAIVER. WE



- 1 TRIED PREVIOUSLY. I KNOW THE GOVERNOR WAS A BIT SLOW IN THE
- 2 UPTAKE, BUT FINALLY GOT THERE. SO, WE WERE ALL BOATS WERE
- 3 ROWING THE SAME DIRECTION. SO, I'M WONDERING IF THAT'S
- 4 SOMETHING WE SHOULD PURSUE AGAIN. WE WERE NOT SUCCESSFUL THE
- 5 LAST ADMINISTRATION, BUT MY ASSUMPTION WAS THIS ADMINISTRATION
- 6 WOULDN'T CARE. AND SO MAYBE IT'S SOMETHING WE CAN PURSUE. SO,
- 7 THANK YOU FOR THAT. AGAIN, APPRECIATE THE COLLABORATION. I AM
- 8 HOPING A COUPLE THINGS. MADAM CHAIR ASKED THE QUESTION ABOUT
- 9 HOW CLOSE ARE WE GETTING TO OUR NEED AROUND MCJ. AND MY
- 10 CONCERN ABOUT THAT IS THINGS HAVE HAPPENED SINCE WE STARTED
- 11 THIS PROCESS. AND WE ARE SEEING WE'RE INCARCERATING MORE
- 12 PEOPLE, THEREBY INCREASING THE NUMBER OF BEDS WE PROBABLY
- 13 INITIALLY PROJECTED. SO, I'M HOPING YOU'RE WORKING WITH THE
- 14 COMMUNITY SAFETY IMPLEMENTATION TEAM AS THESE REPORTS ARE
- 15 BEING DEVELOPED TO MAKE SURE THAT OUR TARGETS ARE ALIGNED WITH
- 16 OUR NEW REALITY. AGAIN, WITH OUR EXPECTATION THAT THESE BEDS
- 17 ARE ALSO THE SOURCE OF PLACES FOR PEOPLE TO GO TO ALLOW US TO
- 18 GET ONE STEP CLOSER TO CLOSURE OF MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL. I WOULD
- 19 ASK, AGAIN, BECAUSE I SAID I THINK THE REPORT SHOULD BE MORE

- 24 ABOUT THAT FROM OUR PSYCHIATRIC URGENT CARE CENTERS, WHO I
- 25 KNOW ARE DOING THE BEST THEY CAN. BUT WE ARE HEARING MORE AND



- 1 MORE ABOUT WAIT TIMES FOR PEOPLE THERE BEING LONGER THAN THEY
- 2 ARE INTENDED TO BE. AND SO AGAIN, WAIT TIMES FOR BEDS WOULD BE

- 6 ARE THE TWO CLASSIFICATIONS THAT STAFF THE JUVENILE HALLS. ONE
- 7 POINT OF CLARIFICATION HERE IS THAT THESE NUMBERS AND FOR THE
- 8 FOLLOWING SLIDES AS WELL IS FOR FOLKS THAT STAFF THE THOSE
- 9 JUVENILE HALLS. THEY'RE COMBINED BECAUSE THERE WAS A

- 20 THE WORK, THE INTRODUCTION TO THE ACTUAL WORK ONCE YOU LEAVE
- 21 THE ACADEMY, THOSE ARE CHALLENGES. AND FOLKS ARE LEAVING AT A
- 22 SLIGHTLY HIGHER RATE THAN WE'VE SEEN.

- 24 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: UNFORTUNATELY, THE ONES THAT WE'RE
- 25 RETAINING ARE THE ONES THAT ARE OFF ON IOD THAT DON'T WANT TO



- 1 COME BACK TO WORK. AND THE ONES THAT WE'RE LOSING ARE THE ONES
- 2 THAT WE WANT TO COPY AND HAVE THROUGHOUT THE ENTIRE SYSTEM.
- 3 THAT'S THE UNFORTUNATE PART, WHICH IS SOMETHING THAT'S A
- 4 CHALLENGE TO DHR, TO FIGURE OUT A WAY TO WEED OUT THOSE THAT
- 5 ARE OFF, THAT ARE MILKING THE SYSTEM, AND INVEST IN THOSE THAT
- 6 ARE ON, THAT ARE GETTING BURNED OUT BECAUSE THEY DON'T FEEL
- 7 SUPPORTED OR EVEN HAVE THE ABILITY TO REALLY WORK BY
- 8 THEMSELVES BECAUSE PEOPLE AREN'T SHOWING UP.

- 10 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: ALL OF THAT IS TRUE. IF I COULD, JUST
- 11 FOR A MOMENT, AND I KNOW IT'S UNCOMMON FOR ME, BUT FOCUS ON
- 12 SOMETHING POSITIVE WHICH IS I THINK THAT THE COLLABORATION
- 13 WITH DHR IS IMPORTANT BECAUSE SELECTING THE RIGHT
- 14 CLASSIFICATION FOR THE WORK WITH THE RIGHT BACKGROUND, THE
- 15 RIGHT PERSON, AND THEN PROVIDING THEM THE CORRECT TRAINING,
- 16 MAKING SURE THAT THEY'RE PHYSICALLY ABLE AND WILLING TO DO THE
- 17 JOB. AND THEN THE LAST COMPONENT THAT WE HAVE HERE IS MAKING
- 18 SURE THAT THERE'S A FIELD TRAINING PROGRAM SO THAT THE
- 19 TRAINING ISN'T OVER AND THE SUPPORT ISN'T OVER ONCE YOU LEAVE
- 20 THE ACADEMY, BUT YOUR INTRODUCTION TO THE ACTUAL WORK. I THINK
- 21 THAT ON THE ONSET IS ENCOURAGING BECAUSE YOU'RE NOT GOING TO
- 22 SEE IT IMMEDIATELY BECAUSE THAT MEANS THAT YOU MAY LOSE MORE
- 23 PEOPLE DURING THE ONBOARDING PROCESS OF THE SELECTION PROCESS
- 24 BUT IT ONCE THEY GET PASSED AND THEY GO THROUGH THE ACADEMY
- 25 YOU CAN EXPECT FOR THEM TO STAY LONGER AND FOR THEM TO SORT OF



- 1 HAVE THE RIGHT TRAINING BE THE RIGHT PEOPLE. BUT YOU DON'T SEE
- 2 THAT IMMEDIATELY. IT'S AN INVESTMENT. AND SO, I DON'T WANT
- 3 ANYBODY TO FEEL SADDENED BY THE REPORT HERE AND REALLY FOCUS
- 4 WHAT WE'RE DOING AS A COMPLETE ORGANIZATIONAL AND PROCESS
- 5 CHANGE. IT'S GOING TO TAKE A LITTLE BIT.

- 7 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: IN RESPONSE TO THE CHAIR'S QUESTION,
- 8 IS THERE A NET GAIN ON THE SUPERVISOR?

10 SHEILA WILLIAMS: NO, AT THIS TIME, SUPERVISOR, NO.

11

12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: HOLD ON, SUPERVISOR HAHN.

- 14 SUP. JANICE HAHN: YEAH, THANKS. I JUST WANTED TO KIND OF DRILL
- 15 DOWN ON THIS A LITTLE BIT, BECAUSE AS YOU SAID, I THINK THE
- 16 NEXT SLIDE PROBABLY WOULD HAVE SHOWED THAT. BUT JUST MAKING
- 17 577 CONTINGENT OFFERS IS ONE THING. BUT ACCORDING TO YOUR
- 18 REPORT, ONLY OF THOSE OFFERS, ONLY 1.7% HAVE BEEN CLEARED FOR
- 19 A FINAL OFFER. SO YEAH, SO THAT'S LIKE, NOW WE'RE REALLY DOWN.
- 20 AND THEN IN YOUR REPORT, THE TIME TO HIRE, MADAM CHAIR, IS
- 21 REALLY FRUSTRATING FOR ME BECAUSE THAT'S ONE OF THE THINGS WE
- 22 KEPT HEARING FROM PROBATION WAS THE PROBLEM IS IT'S TAKING TOO
- 23 LONG TO HIRE. SO, I HAD A MEETING IN MY OFFICE WITH YOU MS.
- 24 GARRETT, THE CHIEF, THE HR PERSON IN PROBATION. I GATHERED YOU
- 25 ALL AROUND MY CONFERENCE ROOM AND I SAID, WHAT IS HAPPENING?



- 1 AND MS. GARRETT, YOU COULD MAYBE COMMENT ON THAT. BUT IT
- 2 SEEMED TO ME WE WERE GOING TO DRILL DOWN A LITTLE BIT TO SEE
- 3 IF ONCE THEY'VE BEEN CLEARED, RIGHT, ONCE THEY'VE CHECKED ALL

- 9 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: CAN I ASK, WHEN YOU'RE ASKING
- 10 THAT, YOU POINT OUT SOMETHING REALLY INTERESTING, BECAUSE WHY
- 11 WOULD SOMEONE APPLY FOR A JOB IF THEY'RE NOT GOING TO DO
- 12 BACKGROUND, I MEAN, IF THEY'RE NOT GOING TO PASS BACKGROUND?
- 13 SO, MY QUESTION IS, ARE WE LOOKING AT WHAT IS DISQUALIFYING
- 14 THEM FROM BACKGROUND? IS ONE OF THE QUESTIONS, HAVE YOU GOTTEN
- 15 HIGH? AND AUTOMATICALLY, THEY'RE DISQUALIFIED, WHICH GIVEN THE
- 16 FACT THAT IT'S LEGAL, I WOULD THINK THAT WOULDN'T BE
- 17 DISQUALIFICATION. BUT WHAT ARE THE, I MEAN- IT'S --

- 19 SUP. JANICE HAHN: YEAH, I MEAN, IF ONLY 1% HAVE BEEN CLEARED,
- WHERE'S THE OTHER 99%?

- 22 **GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA:** YEAH, PART OF THE DIFFICULTY IN THE
- 23 NUMBERS WE'RE PRESENTING YOU IS THAT WE'RE SHOWING YOU FIRST
- 24 QUARTER AND WE'RE ALSO SHOWING YOU A DIFFERENCE WHEN WE SWITCH
- 25 CLASSIFICATIONS. SO, YOU SAW THAT THERE WAS A SIGNIFICANT



- 1 IMPROVEMENT IN THE TOTAL LENGTH FROM SOMEONE ASSERTING THAT
- 2 THEY WANTED THE JOB TO WHEN THEY WENT ALL THE WAY THROUGH TO
- 3 CLEAR BACKGROUND, WE MADE A SIGNIFICANT IMPROVEMENT TO THE
- 4 POINT WHERE WE'RE COMPETITIVE WITH ANY OTHER LAW ENFORCEMENT
- 5 JURISDICTION. THEN YOU SEE THAT IT GOES UP, BUT BEAR IN MIND
- 6 THAT THIS WAS WHEN WE SWITCHED EXAMINATION. SO, WHAT YOU'RE
- 7 SEEING IS THE SWITCH FROM CONSOLIDATING A NUMBER OF
- 8 CLASSIFICATIONS TO CREATING A NEW EXAMINATION TO MAKING NEW
- 9 OFFERS.

- 11 SUP. JANICE HAHN: I HEAR YOU, BUT STILL, TO IT TAKE AN AVERAGE
- 12 OF 347 DAYS TO HIRE? ONCE THEY'VE GONE THROUGH ALL THAT,
- 13 THAT'S WHERE I'M WONDERING, BECAUSE SOME THINGS WE HAVE
- 14 CONTROL OF, SOME THINGS WE DON'T. WHY CAN'T WE GET IT DOWN TO
- 15 UNDER A YEAR? I DON'T CARE ABOUT, WE'RE SWITCHING EVERYTHING.
- 16 THAT'S A LONG, IN MY OPINION, MAYBE NOT MISS GARRETT, YOU
- 17 COULD, IS THAT A LONG TIME, OR IS THAT NORMAL DOING BUSINESS
- 18 IN THE COUNTY.

- 20 DR. JOHAN JULIN: IT TAKES A BIT IF I COULD ANSWER THAT IT
- 21 TAKES A LITTLE BIT LONGER FOR FOLKS WHO ARE SWORN AND THE
- 22 REASON FOR THAT IS THE EXTENSIVE BACKGROUND PROCESS SO IF YOU
- 23 LOOK AT FOR EXAMPLE THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, THEY HAVE A
- 24 LENGTHIER PROCESS AS WELL AS SOME AS WELL AS SOME OF THE FIRE
- 25 --



- 2 SUP. JANICE HAHN: BUT WE CAN'T GET IT DOWN UNDER TO UNDER A
- 3 YEAR.

- 5 DR. JOHAN JULIN: WELL, THE ONE OF THE REASONS THAT THAT YOU
- 6 SEE THIS NUMBER SPIKE FOR THE PROBATION DEPARTMENT IS THE
- 7 BACKGROUND INVESTIGATORS WHO DO THAT BACKGROUND INVESTIGATION.

8

- 9 SUP. JANICE HAHN: I'M JUST SAYING, THIS IS ONE OF THE THINGS
- 10 THAT WE WERE PLEADED TO FROM OUR PROBATION WORKERS. THEY WERE
- 11 LIKE, PLEASE HIRE MORE PEOPLE. IT'S TOO DIFFICULT. IT'S TOO
- 12 LONG. AND I'M JUST TRYING TO FIGURE OUT, CAN WE EVER GET IT
- 13 UNDER A YEAR?

14

- 15 DR. JOHAN JULIN: I CERTAINLY HOPE SO. THE IDEA WOULD BE TO
- 16 MOVE MORE OF THOSE BACKGROUND INVESTIGATORS, OR MOVE MORE OF
- 17 THOSE BACKGROUND INVESTIGATORS BACK INTO DOING BACKGROUND
- 18 INVESTIGATION.

- 20 SUP. JANICE HAHN: WELL, I MEAN, AGAIN, I HAD A MEETING IN MY
- 21 OFFICE TRYING TO FIGURE THIS OUT. YOU KNOW, IS THIS A HOPE
- 22 THAT WE'RE GOING TO DO THIS OR WE ARE GOING TO DO THIS?

- 24 LISA GARRETT: SUPERVISOR, I THINK IT'S MORE THAN A HOPE AND
- 25 ACTUALLY WE HAVE SEEN IN 2023 THE TIME TO HIRE WENT DOWN FROM



- 1 434 DAYS TO 291 DAYS AND THEN THEN 2024 287 DAYS. THERE'S SOME
- 2 THINGS THAT ARE GOING ON WITH 2025. ONE THE DEPARTMENT WAS
- 3 PHASING OUT THE GSN AND DSO POSITIONS. THE SECOND THING WAS
- 4 THE NEW RECRUITMENT FOR DPO.

- 6 SUP. JANICE HAHN: OKAY, WHATEVER. I'M NOT INTERESTED IN ALL
- 7 THESE REASONS. I JUST THINK THIS WAS A CRISIS, IS TRYING TO
- 8 HIRE MORE OFFICERS. THAT'S WHAT WE WERE GETTING DINGED FOR
- 9 EVERY TIME THAT WE DID NOT HAVE ENOUGH OFFICERS WHO WERE THERE
- 10 TO WALK KIDS TO SCHOOL, TO BE INVOLVED IN THE PROGRAMMING, TO
- 11 GET THEM TO THEIR MEDICAL APPOINTMENT, WHATEVER IT IS. AND SO,
- 12 THE PLEA WAS, CAN'T WE HIRE MORE OFFICERS? SO, WE'RE TRYING TO
- 13 LEAN INTO THAT. IT'S SAD TO ME THAT THE GRADUATION RATE IS 78%
- 14 THIS YEAR, LAST YEAR IT WAS 90%. AND THEN THE ONE THING IN
- 15 YOUR REPORT THAT REALLY GOT TO ME, 65% OF THOSE WHO GRADUATED
- 16 THE ACADEMY LEFT WITHIN A YEAR OF GRADUATING THE ACADEMY.
- 17 SO IT DOES FEEL LIKE EVERYTHING'S STACKED AGAINST US, BUT
- 18 WHATEVER WE CAN CONTROL, I MEAN, I DON'T KNOW HOW MUCH WE CAN
- 19 CONTROL PEOPLE WHO WILL NEVER CLEAR THE BACKGROUND OR WHO ARE
- 20 DECIDED THIS IS NOT FOR THEM AND LEAVE, BUT IF WE CAN AT LEAST
- 21 CONTROL THE HIRING PHASE, THAT'S WHERE I WOULD LIKE TO SEE US
- 22 LEAN IN.

- 24 LISA GARRETT: I THINK IT'S A COMBINATION OF THE HIRING AND
- 25 ALSO YOU'RE TALKING TO RETENTION. ONE THING THAT THE PROBATION



- 1 DEPARTMENT HAS DONE IS TO SET UP A PROACTIVE SUPERVISION TEAM
- 2 THAT WORKS TO DO REALISTIC JOB REVIEWS AND HOLD THE HANDS OF
- 3 THOSE PEOPLE WHO ARE IN THE ACADEMY TO KEEP THEM LONGER THAN
- 4 ONE YEAR AFTER THEY COMPLETE THE ACADEMY. AND THEY'RE ALSO
- 5 DOING SOME OTHER THINGS TO HELP JOB RETENTION FOR THESE
- 6 POSITIONS.

- 8 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: WHY DON'T WE GO AHEAD, I JUST LOST
- 9 MY SCREEN.SO I THINK THAT RATHER THAN GO THROUGH THE SLIDES,
- 10 BECAUSE I THINK SUPERVISOR HAHN, YOU DID A GREAT JOB OF GOING
- 11 THROUGH THEM, NOW WE KNOW. BUT SUPERVISOR, I CAN'T TELL WHO
- 12 WAS UP BECAUSE MY SCREEN JUST WENT, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.

- 14 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MADAM CHAIR. AND
- 15 I HEAR YOU, SUPERVISOR HAHN, AND I JUST, THANK YOU. WONDER IF
- 16 WE HAVE A, I'LL SPEAK FOR MYSELF, HAVE A CLEAR PICTURE OF WHAT
- 17 THE HIRING PROCESS IS. JUST WHEN I HEAR A YEAR, IT SOUNDS
- 18 OUTRAGEOUS, BUT THEN I BEGIN TO THINK ABOUT IT. I KNOW THAT
- 19 YOU RELY ON NATIONAL DATABASES IN THE BACKGROUND. THAT WAS NO
- 20 CONTROL. AND IN PAST LIVES, I KNEW THOSE COULD TAKE FOREVER.
- 21 I'VE HAD EXPERIENCE RECENTLY FOR YOUNG ADULTS ON MY BLOCK WHO
- 22 ARE APPLYING FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT AND THE INVESTIGATORS COMING
- 23 ASKING NEIGHBORS OUESTIONS. INTENSIVE, IT WAS AN HOUR LONG
- 24 INTERVIEW FOR THE KID I SAW GREW UP, BUT I HAVEN'T SEEN HIM IN
- 25 THE PAST FOUR YEARS. AND I ASKED, HOW MANY OF THESE DO YOU DO?



- I MEAN, SO THE PROCESS TO MAKE SURE IT'S THE RIGHT PEOPLE IN
- 2 THE RIGHT SEATS ON THE BUS IS MORE INTENSE, I THINK, THAN I
- 3 EVER ASSUMED, MORE INTENSE THAN PROBABLY OTHER DEPARTMENTS. I
- 4 THINK TO SOME DEGREE THAT'S GOOD BECAUSE WE DO NEED THE RIGHT
- 5 PEOPLE. WE KNOW THAT WE ARE ASKING YOU TO AFFECT A CULTURE
- 6 SHIFT IN PROBATION. AND SO I THINK I WILL SHARE IN MY
- 7 COLLEAGUES' FRUSTRATION. AND I WILL SAY, I JUST NEED TO
- 8 UNDERSTAND THE GIVE AND TAKE. WE WANT THE RIGHT PEOPLE. DO ALL
- 9 THAT YOU CAN TO MAKE SURE WE'RE GETTING THE RIGHT PEOPLE FROM
- 10 ALL OF THAT PRE-HIRE ANALYSIS AND DIAGNOSTIC. BUT AGAIN, WE'RE
- 11 TRYING TO MAKE SURE THAT WE AREN'T ARTIFICIALLY SLOWING UP THE
- 12 PROCESS. AND SO, I GUESS WHAT WOULD BE HELPFUL TO GIVE US A
- 13 CONTEXT IN TERMS OF WHAT IS A REASONABLE TIMEFRAME BASED ON
- 14 WHAT YOU CAN CONTROL BASED ON ALL THOSE STEPS WE NEED TO DO TO
- 15 MAKE SURE WE GET THE RIGHT PEOPLE. BECAUSE I'M NOT INTERESTED
- 16 IF YOU CAN HIRE SOMEBODY IN TWO WEEKS AND ITS STATUS QUO IN
- 17 TERMS OF WHAT WE'RE EXPERIENCING IN PROBATION RIGHT NOW.

- 19 DR. JOHAN JULIN: I CAN SPEAK TO SOME OF THE PROCESS PIECES.
- 20 SO GENERALLY AT DHR WE WILL TRACK THE AMOUNT OF TIME THAT IT
- 21 TAKES FOR SOMEONE TO GO THROUGH THE VARIOUS PROCESSES TO GET
- 22 HIRED ANYWHERE IN THE COUNTY, INCLUDING AT THE PROBATION
- 23 DEPARTMENT. AND WE HAVE THREE SORT OF BIG BUCKETS OF TIME, IF
- 24 YOU WILL. ONE IS SORT OF THE ASSESSMENT PART WHERE SOMEONE
- 25 SUBMITS THEIR APPLICATION, THEY GET TESTED, AND THEY GET



- 1 PLACED ON A LIST. SO THAT'S ONE PART. AND THERE'S A LIST TIME
- 2 WHERE YOU ARE SITTING ON A LIST, SOMETIMES FOR A VERY LONG
- 3 TIME, UNFORTUNATELY, AND THAT'S A FUNCTION OF OUR CIVIL
- 4 SERVICE RULES. AND THEN --

- 6 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: SO, SAY THAT AGAIN. WE'RE SITTING ON
- 7 THE LIST BECAUSE WHAT DOES THAT MEAN THAT IT'S A FUNCTION OF
- 8 OUR CIVIL SERVICE?

9

- 10 DR. JOHAN JULIN: SO, WHAT HAPPENS IS YOU MIGHT TAKE A TEST FOR
- 11 A JOB.

12

13 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND I'M RANKED.

- 15 DR. JOHAN JULIN: AND YOU'RE RANKED, EXACTLY. AND LET'S SAY
- 16 YOU'RE RANKED, I DON'T KNOW, SOMEPLACE IN THE MIDDLE, RIGHT?
- 17 AND YOU WON'T THEN THE DEPARTMENT ONLY HAS X NUMBER OF
- 18 VACANCIES. WELL, THEY FILL THOSE VACANCIES WITH PEOPLE HIGHER
- 19 THAN YOU ON THE LIST. SO NOW ALL THE VACANCIES ARE FILLED AND
- 20 THE PERSON SITS FOR A MINUTE. AND THEN AS ANOTHER VACANCY
- 21 COMES UP, WELL, YOU MIGHT GET CALLED, BUT THAT MIGHT BE A
- 22 HUNDRED DAYS LATER. AND YOU HAVE TO KEEP THAT PERSON ACTIVE.
- 23 IT'S NOT LIKE I'M FROM THE PRIVATE SECTOR WHERE WE WOULD HAVE
- 24 JUST SAID GOODBYE TO THAT PERSON AND MADE THEM REAPPLY, RIGHT?
- 25 BUT THAT IS NOT THE WAY WE WORK. SO, THE IDEA WOULD BE YOU



- 1 CONTINUE TO GIVE THAT PERSON AN OPPORTUNITY EVEN THOUGH
- 2 THEY'VE BEEN SITTING ON THIS LIST FOR A MINUTE. SO AS A RESULT
- 3 OF THAT, YOU KNOW, THE TIME ENDS UP GETTING CLOSER. BUT THE
- 4 THING IS WITH THE PROBATION DEPARTMENT, WHAT'S INTERESTING IS
- 5 THAT THAT EXAM TIME AND THAT LIST TIME, THOSE ARE SHORT.
- 6 THEY'RE FAST. THE ISSUE IS MORE OF THE ONBOARDING TIME AND
- 7 THIS IS TYPICAL OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENTS. AND BECAUSE
- 8 OF SOME OF THE STAFFING CHALLENGES THAT THE PROBATION
- 9 DEPARTMENT HAS HAD, IT'S TAKEN THEM LONGER FOR THIS ONBOARDING
- 10 PHASE, WHICH IS EXACTLY SUPERVISOR, WHAT YOU WERE TALKING
- 11 ABOUT. IT'S LIKE IT'S THE INTERVIEWS, AND THEY TALK TO THE
- 12 NEIGHBORS, AND THEY'LL KNOCK ON DOORS, AND IT'S JUST THIS
- 13 WHOLE PROCESS THAT CAN TAKE A WHILE, PARTICULARLY IF YOU'VE
- 14 ENDED UP MOVING SOME OF THOSE FOLKS THAT TYPICALLY DO THAT JOB
- 15 INTO THE HALLS TEMPORARILY TO TRY TO ALLEVIATE THE STAFFING
- 16 CONCERNS IN THE HALLS. SO THOSE FOLKS THEN AREN'T AVAILABLE TO
- 17 DO THOSE BACKGROUND INVESTIGATIONS. THEN THAT CONTRIBUTES TO
- 18 THE TIME.

- 22 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: BACK TO MY DOOR FOUR OR FIVE TIMES
- 23 BECAUSE I WASN'T THERE. SO, I LEFT THIS CARD, LEFT THIS CARD.
- 24 SO THEN THEY HAD TO KEEP COMING BACK TO --



- 1 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: BUT DOES THAT INCLUDE FOR
- 2 LATERALS? SO, IF I'M IN SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY AND YOU WERE
- 3 OFFERING ME A LATERAL POSITION, DO I HAVE TO GO THROUGH THE
- 4 SAME BACKGROUND CHECK?

6 SHEILA WILLIAMS: NO, IT'S MODIFIED.

- 8 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: SO THAT THAT WOULD EXPEDITE. HOWEVER, WE
- 9 HAVE HAD NO LATERALS.

- 11 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: HOW LONG DOES THAT TAKE? 290 DAYS.
- 12 I MEAN, WHAT IS THE TO HUMAN RESOURCES, I GUESS.

13

- 14 DR. JOHAN JULIN: WE'VE OPENED A LATERAL RECRUITMENT, BUT WE'VE

- 17 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: HOW MANY, THE ONES THAT YOU HAVE
- 18 HAD, HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE TO GET THEM IN?

19

- 20 DR. JOHAN JULIN: I DON'T KNOW THAT WE'VE HAD ENOUGH TO EVEN DO
- 21 AN ANALYSIS.

- 23 SHEILA WILLIAMS: YEAH. AND I DON'T KNOW IF YOU'VE DONE ANY
- 24 WORK WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT ON HOW OFTEN. BUT USUALLY,
- 25 THERE'S A MODIFIED BACKGROUND PROCESS. SO, IT DOESN'T HAVE TO



1 GO AS LONG.

- 3 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: I JUST WANT TO MAKE SOMETHING CLEAR THAT
- 4 THE RIGOR THAT IS REQUIRED TO HIRE A PEACE OFFICER CANNOT BE
- 5 MODIFIED BY US. WE ARE NOT ADDING TO THE PROCESS BEYOND WHAT
- 6 IS REQUIRED BY THE STATE. AND I WOULD NOT ADVOCATE FOR US TO
- 7 LOWER THE STANDARDS, QUITE THE OPPOSITE. AND SO, WHEN I SEE,
- 8 FOR EXAMPLE, A 100% ACADEMY PASS RATE, THAT'S NOT A GOOD SIGN.
- 9 IT MEANS THAT WE'RE DOING A DISSERVICE BECAUSE WE'RE NOT
- 10 SELECTING FOLKS THAT ARE ACTUALLY MEANT FOR THE JOB. AND SO, I
- 11 VIEW THIS DIFFERENTLY, I SUPPOSE, THAT MAYBE SOMEONE THAT'S
- 12 JUST LOOKING FOR RAW NUMBERS. IN ADDITION, TO ANSWER DIRECTLY,
- 13 WHAT IS WITHIN OUR CONTROL IS TO GET BACK TO THOSE NUMBERS OF
- 14 287. I THINK LAST YEAR IS A FANTASTIC EXAMPLE OF WHAT COULD BE
- 15 EXPECTED IN A DEPARTMENT THAT IS STILL BEING RESPONSIBLE BUT
- 16 BEING VERY EFFICIENT. AND SO, OUR UPTAKE, AND WE'RE ATTEMPTING
- 17 TO EXPLAIN SOME OF THE REASONS, THE EXPECTATION IS THAT WE'RE
- 18 MOVING BACK TOWARD THAT NUMBER THAT WE HAD LAST YEAR. BUT WE

- 4 IS NO SUCH GROUP OF PEOPLE TO BRING OVER REGARDLESS OF THESE
- 5 EFFORTS. WHAT WE HAVE TO FOCUS ON IS MAKING SURE THAT THE
- 6 GROUP OF FOLKS THAT WE'RE PAYING ARE COMING TO WORK AND ARE

- 13 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU FOR WALKING ME THROUGH
- 14 BECAUSE THAT JUST GAVE ME. AND SO THE 300 SEM ODD DAYS, IS
- 15 THAT, AND THEN IT HIT ME AS YOU TALKED ABOUT THE CIVIL
- 16 SERVANTS. THERE'S SOME AT THE TOP OF THE LIST, MIDDLE, SOME AT
- 17 THE BOTTOM. SO, WAS THAT 300 SEM ODD DAYS AN AVERAGE?

- 19 DR. JOHAN JULIN: YEAH, THE NUMBER IS AN AVERAGE. BUT THE BULK
- 20 OF THAT AVERAGE IT COMES FROM THAT ONBOARDING PHASE.

21

22 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I GOT IT. I GOT IT.

- 24 DR. JOHAN JULIN: RIGHT. THE LIST TIME BECAUSE YOU KNOW THERE'S
- 25 A THERE'S A BIT OF A CHURN RIGHT AND THEY HAVE THOSE VACANCIES



- 1 ARE ABLE TO PEOPLE'S LIST TIME IS SHORT THEY DON'T SPEND A LOT
- 2 OF TIME ON THE LIST. IT'S THE TIME AFTER. YEAH.

- 4 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: GOT IT. MADAM CHAIR, CAN I ASK A
- 5 OUESTION ABOUT DEPOPULATION? ARE WE ONLY TALKING ABOUT
- 6 STAFFING NOW?

- 8 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: NO, I HIJACKED THE WHOLE THING. SO
- 9 JUST GOT EXACTLY.

10

- 11 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: SO, MY LAST QUESTION, MADAM CHAIR,
- 12 DEALS WITH THE DEPOPULATION SECTION OF THE REPORT. AND IF YOU
- 13 COULD PROVIDE ANY UPDATE ON THE ASSESSMENTS OF YOUNG PEOPLE
- 14 FOR SAFE RELEASE INTO THE COMMUNITY OR INTO LESS RESTRICTIVE
- 15 PLACEMENTS. LOOKS LIKE THAT MIGHT BE SLIDE. WELL, IT MIGHT

- 19 SHEILA WILLIAMS: SO, FOR CAMP PAIGE, IN TERMS OF THE NUMBER OF
- 20 YOUTH THAT WERE RELEASED PRIOR TO MOVEMENT WE HAD FIVE YOUTH
- 21 OUT OF CAMP PAIGE THAT WERE RELEASED TO THE COMMUNITY. THE 11
- 22 REMAINING YOUTH WERE THEN ASSIGNED TO THE TWO REMAINING CAMPS
- 23 OF CAMP AFFLERBAUGH AND ROCKEY. FOR CAMP KILPATRICK WE HAD A
- 24 TOTAL OF 16 YOUTH THAT WERE THERE. 8 YOUTH WERE TRANSFERRED TO
- 25 STEP DOWN INTO THE COMMUNITY AND THEN THE EIGHTH YOUTH WERE



1 TRANSFERRED TO BARRY J. NIDORF.

- 3 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND THOSE NUMBERS ARE BETTER THAN
- 4 WE'VE BEEN DOING. THAT SHOWS MORE AGGRESSIVE ACTIONS IN TERMS
- 5 OF RELEASES AND TO COMMUNITY OR STEP DOWN?

6

- 7 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: THOSE WERE, AS WERE THE ASSESSMENTS OF
- 8 THE YOUNG PEOPLE IN KILPATRICK AND THAT WAS SENT TO COURT. I
- 9 DON'T, I MEAN TO JUMP FORWARD HERE, ESSENTIALLY IRRESPECTIVE
- 10 OF THESE EFFORTS, THE POPULATION INCREASED.

11

- 12 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: WE'VE TALKED ABOUT THAT BEFORE AND I'M
- 13 CLEAR AND THAT SOME, BECAUSE WE'VE TALKED ABOUT ALL THE, IT
- 14 HASN'T CHANGED, AND THEN IT BECAME CLEAR. IT HASN'T CHANGED
- 15 BECAUSE IT'S THE SAME KIDS. SOME HAVE GONE OUT, OTHERS ARE
- 16 COMING IN BECAUSE WE HAVE A SITUATION WHERE MORE ARE BEING
- 17 SENT TO YOU AS A RESULT OF THE ORIENTATION OF OUR DA IN THE
- 18 COURTS. I'M CLEAR.

20 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: YEAH, THE INTAKE INCREASED.

- 22 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: BUT WHAT IS WITHIN YOUR CONTROL, WHICH
- 23 IS WHY I'M ASKING, HOW MANY HAVE YOU GONE THROUGH THIS
- 24 ASSESSMENT PROCESS AND BEEN ABLE TO PUT IN LEAST RESTRICTIVE
- 25 ENVIRONMENTS?



- 2 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: YEAH, THAT'S ONGOING. AND SO
- 3 ESSENTIALLY, THE TONE IS EVERYBODY UNDERSTANDS THAT WHERE

- 5 ALTERNATIVE UNFORTUNATELY, IT JUST HASN'T YOU KNOW THAT BUCKET

- 16 PLACEMENTS. AT ONE POINT YOU GAVE US SOME NUMBERS, BUT I GOT
- 17 THE FEELING ALSO, JUST LIKE WITH OUR PREVIOUS BID REPORT THAT
- 18 THAT IT'S SLOW GROWTH DIFFICULT. SO, CAN YOU TELL ME IF THERE
- 19 ARE MORE? SPACES BEFORE WE GO TO THE BENCH AND SAY CAN YOU
- 20 CONSIDER THESE SPACES, PLEASE?

- 22 DAVID CARROLL: YEAH, ABSOLUTELY SO WE ARE IN THE PROCESS OF A
- 23 REFINED REPORT BACK FROM THAT PREVIOUS CONVERSATION. I KNOW I
- 24 GAVE YOU THE LARGE NUMBER OF POTENTIAL AVAILABLE BEDS. WHAT
- 25 WE'VE BEEN DOING OVER THE PAST SEVERAL WEEKS IS ACTUALLY GOING



- 1 TO VISIT EACH ONE OF THOSE SITES AND FIGURING OUT WHO EXACTLY
- 2 HAS AVAILABLE BEDS. SO I KNOW IT'S TWO PARTICULAR LOCATIONS
- 3 THAT ACTUALLY HAVE PHYSICAL BEDS. I DON'T HAVE THAT DRILL DOWN
- 4 NUMBER WITH ME TODAY, BUT IT'LL BE COMING IN THE NEXT FEW DAYS

- 7 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: AND IT WOULD BE HELPFUL WHEN YOU DO
- 8 THAT IF YOU COULD ALSO TELL US IF ANY OF THOSE BEDS ARE
- 9 AVAILABLE OR APPROPRIATE FOR GIRLS OR GENDER EXPANSIVE YOUTH.
- 10 RIGHT AND THAT'S EXCITING RIGHT NOW IN THAT WE ARE FUNDING
- 11 FOUR DIFFERENT ORGANIZATIONS TO DRILL DOWN ON THE SAFE HEALING
- 12 CENTER CONCEPT WHICH IS FOCUSED ON GIRLS AND GENDER EXPANSIVE
- 13 YOUTH AND WE ACTUALLY JUST GOT OUR FIRST TWO PLACEMENTS WITH
- 14 ONE OF THE CBOS THAT WE'RE WORKING WITH. SO, I KNOW THAT'S NOT
- 15 A HUGE NUMBER BUT IN EFFECT THAT SAFE HEALING CENTER CONCEPT
- 16 IS STARTING TO COME TO FRUITION AND WE ANTICIPATE IN THE NEXT
- 17 FEW MONTHS QUITE A FEW MORE BEDS ARE GOING TO BE AVAILABLE
- 18 WITH THOSE OTHER ORGANIZATIONS.

20 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU AND THANKS MADAM CHAIR.

- 22 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU SUPERVISOR SOLIS AND
- 23 THEN SUPERVISOR HORVATH.

24

25 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: RIGHT, I'LL TRY NOT TO BE REDUNDANT BUT I AM



- 1 CONCERNED ABOUT THE RETENTION RATES OF PEOPLE THAT WE BRING
- 2 IN, AND THEN WE BRING THEM ON BOARD THEM, AND THEN THEY DON'T
- 3 STAY. AND I WANTED TO ASK YOU MORE ABOUT THE TRAINING
- 4 SESSIONS, BECAUSE I THINK ONCE YOU BRING THEM ON BOARD AND YOU
- 5 ASK THEM TO GO TO TRAINING SESSIONS, IS THAT DURING THEIR WORK
- 6 HOURS? OR HOW DOES THAT HAPPEN? IS THAT HAPPEN BEFORE THEY
- 7 ACTUALLY PUT ON THEIR UNIFORM? OR EXPLAIN THAT TO ME.

- 9 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: YEAH. ARE YOU REFERRING TO THE NEW FTO
- 10 PROGRAM? WHICH ESSENTIALLY IN IN RESPONSE TO THIS REALLY THE
- 11 BEST PRACTICE IN LAW ENFORCEMENT IS THAT AFTER YOU DO A
- 12 TRAINING. AND BY THE WAY, OUR TRAINING IS RELATIVELY SHORT.
- 13 SOME TRAINING ACADEMIES ARE UP TO SIX MONTHS. BUT IN
- 14 PROBATION, OUR ACTUAL FROM THE MOMENT YOU GO INTO WHEN YOU'RE
- 15 RELEASED AND WE'RE CLOSER TO THAT TEN WEEK MARK BUT A BEST
- 16 PRACTICE IS THAT ONCE YOU RELEASE YOU DON'T SIMPLY GO TAKE A
- 17 SHIFT THAT YOU'RE ACTUALLY ACCOMPANIED BY A FIELD TRAINING
- 18 OFFICER OR AN INSTITUTIONAL TRAINING OFFICER. THAT'S SOMETHING
- 19 THAT THE DEPARTMENT HASN'T HAD BEFORE THEY'VE HAD MENTORING
- 20 PROGRAMS WITH DIFFERENT LEVELS OF SUCCESS AND SO I THINK WHAT
- 21 YOU'RE GOING TO SEE HERE AS A RESPONSE TO IT IS AN OFFICIAL
- 22 WHAT'S CALLED FIELD TRAINING PROGRAM SO THAT WHEN YOU'RE DONE
- 23 WITH THE ACADEMY YOU DON'T REPORT SOLO. WHAT YOU HAVE IS A
- 24 SENIOR OFFICER OR A TRAINING OFFICER WITH YOU THAT SHADOWS
- 25 YOU, SHOWS YOU HOW TO DO THINGS, SIGNS OFF ON DIFFERENT



- 1 EXPERIENCES THAT YOU HAVE. IT'S A CONTINUED ASSESSMENT BUT
- 2 ALSO TRAINING AND THAT TYPICALLY THAT WOULD MIRROR ANOTHER TEN
- 3 WEEKS. WE'RE GOING TO START BY DOING SIX WEEKS.

- 5 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: WELL, IT HASN'T STARTED YET? HAS THIS
- 6 STARTED ALREADY?

7

- 8 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: NO. OKAY, MAYBE THAT'S MY QUESTION.
- 9 YEAH, THE NEXT ACADEMY THAT GRADUATES WILL BE FOLLOWED BY SIX
- 10 WEEKS OF THAT.

11

12 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: OKAY.

13

14 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: OF THREE WEEKS.

15

- 16 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: I THOUGHT I RECALLED HEARING THAT SOME STAFF
- 17 WERE UPSET OR WHATEVER BECAUSE THEY COULDN'T GO TO TRAINING
- 18 BECAUSE THERE WERE NO SHOWS AND THEY HAD TO THEREFORE SHOW UP
- 19 TO THE JOB AND COULDN'T GO TO TRAINING ADDITIONAL TRAINING SO
- 20 IF I'M TRYING TO RECALL THAT CAME UP THAT ONE TIME.

- 22 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: OH, I SEE I THINK THAT WAS A SEPARATE
- 23 ISSUE. YOU'RE REPORTING TO EXISTING STAFF THAT'S ON THE WORK
- 24 SITE, BUT THEN NORMALLY YOU HAVE A CERTAIN NUMBER OF
- 25 CONTINUING EDUCATION OR TRAINING THAT YOU DO ANNUALLY. AND



- 1 IT'S BEEN HAMPERED BY THE FACT THAT PEOPLE HAVE TO WORK DOUBLE
- 2 SHIFTS, THEY HAVE TO COVER, AND THEN THEY'RE NOT ABLE TO GO.
- 3 SO, FOR THE NEXT YEAR, WE'VE CHANGED OUR TRAINING MODEL TO BE
- 4 BLOCK TRAINING IN WHICH WE'RE SIMPLY TELLING STAFF WHEN TO GO
- 5 AND WE'RE RELIEVING THEM FOR THAT ENTIRE PERIOD SO THAT THEY

- 8 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: SO, THEY'RE COVERED THEN? YES. I THINK THAT
- 9 WAS A CONCERN THAT I HAD AND THEN WANTED TO ASK YOU A LITTLE
- 10 BIT ABOUT THE RETENTION BONUSES, THE \$24,000 THAT WE GAVE FOR
- 11 TWO YEARS. HOW DID THAT, IN YOUR ASSESSMENT, HOW DID THAT WORK
- 12 OUT? IT WENT AWAY, RIGHT? BUT STILL.

13

- 14 SHEILA WILLIAMS: YES, SUPERVISOR, SO IN 2024, I THINK WE
- 15 OFFERED STAFF, IF THEY COMPLETED UP TO 2,000 OF HOURS OF
- 16 DIRECT SUPERVISION OF YOUTH INSIDE OUR JUVENILE HALL, ONE TIME
- 17 BONUS, I THINK UP TO \$17,000. AND SO, WE DID IMPLEMENT THAT
- 18 PROGRAM. HOWEVER, I GUESS AT THE END OF THE DAY, WE DIDN'T
- 19 DEEM IT SUCCESSFUL BECAUSE WE STILL CONTINUE TO STRUGGLE IN
- 20 TERMS OF STAFFING WITH RESPECT TO THE JUVENILE INSTITUTIONS.

21

22 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: SO THOSE THAT PARTICIPATED?

- 24 SHEILA WILLIAMS: THOSE THAT PARTICIPATED DID RECEIVE THE LUMP
- 25 SUM BONUS. BUT RIGHT NOW, WE ARE CURRENTLY IN NEGOTIATIONS



1 WITH THE UNION AND SO THAT'S NOT SOMETHING WE CAN OFFER AT

2 THIS TIME.

- 4 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: OKAY. AND THEN JUST THE OUTREACH TO THE
- 5 PARENTS AND THE COMMUNITY, THE CITIES, HOW'S THAT GONE? I SEE
- 6 THE SLIDE THERE THAT YOU'VE GONE OUT TO THE, YOU'VE HAD TOWN
- 7 HALLS, RIGHT? AND A VIRTUAL TOWN HALL MEETINGS AND IN-PERSON
- 8 FAMILY TOWN HALLS. I JUST WANT TO GET A SENSE OF WHAT FEEDBACK
- 9 THEY'RE GIVING US OR GIVING YOU, NOT ME, BUT YOU, YOU KNOW, TO
- 10 THE DEPARTMENT. WHERE IS THAT CAPTURED?

- 12 SHEILA WILLIAMS: SO, SUPERVISOR, AS YOU CAN SEE, WE DID SOME
- 13 YOUTH ENGAGEMENT WHERE FACILITY MANAGEMENT TOOK THE YOUTH
- 14 INSIDE THEIR LIVING UNITS AND DISCUSSED THE DEPOPULATION PLAN,
- 15 THE IMPACT ON THEM, AND WE HAD VARIOUS ORGANIZATIONS AS
- 16 INDICATED THAT PARTICIPATED IN THAT EFFORT WE ALSO DID FAMILY
- 17 ENGAGEMENTS IN TERMS OF HOLD HOSTING DURING THE VISITING HOURS
- 18 ON THE WEEKENDS WITH THE FAMILIES EXPLAINING AS WELL THE
- 19 DEPOPULATION PLAN AND ITS IMPACT ON HIS YOUTH AND THAT OF
- 20 COURSE THAT IF ANY OF THEIR YOUNG PERSONS WERE BEING MOVED TO

- 3 INFORMATION AND WERE THERE MAYBE PARTNERS OUR PARTNERS HELPING

- 9 SHEILA WILLIAMS: THE FAMILY AND YOUTH ENGAGEMENTS WE HAD OUR
- 10 WEBSITE WE HAD A QR CODE WHERE THEY COULD INTERACT WITH US,
- 11 SUBMIT THEIR FEEDBACK, SUBMIT THEIR QUESTIONS, THOUGHTS AND
- 12 CONCERNS THAT WE WOULD THEN BE RESPONSIVE TO. SO, ALL OF THAT
- 13 INFORMATION WAS PROVIDED TO THE YOUTH AS WELL AS THEIR FAMILY
- 14 MEMBERS DURING THOSE TOWN HALL MEETINGS.

- 22 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: CAN YOU GIVE IT GIVE US THAT INFORMATION I'D
- 23 LIKE TO SEE SURE WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE YOU KNOW BECAUSE IT IS
- 24 IMPORTANT AND ESPECIALLY IN LIGHT OF SOME PARENTS MAY BE
- 25 RELUCTANT TO COME OUT AND SAY ANYTHING OR EVEN SHOW UP TO A



- 1 TOWN HALL AND MAY NOT HAVE ACCESS TO VIRTUAL TOWN HALL SO THEN
- 2 WHAT?

- 4 SHEILA WILLIAMS: YES SOME OF THE TOWN HALLS WERE ALSO
- 5 AVAILABLE VIRTUALLY AS WELL AS IN-PERSON IF THEY DID COME
- 6 DURING VISITING HOURS.

- 8 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: PARTICIPATION RATES, ALL THAT, IF YOU CAN
- 9 KIND OF SHED SOME LIGHT ON THAT. I'M CONCERNED ABOUT THE
- 10 FAMILIES, OBVIOUSLY, AND THE WELL-BEING OF WHAT THAT MEANS
- 11 ALSO TO THEM AND HOW THEY VIEW THEIR CHILD, HOW THEY INTERPRET
- 12 THAT, AND WHAT THEY MIGHT ALSO NEED. I DON'T EVEN KNOW IF WE
- 13 HAVE KIND OF AN ABUZZMENT, SO TO SPEAK, FOR PARENTS WHO FEEL

- 20 INTERACTIONS AND MAKE SURE WE'LL GIVE YOU THAT INFORMATION.

22 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: WHAT WAS THAT ABOUT, MR. CARROLL?

- 24 DAVID CARROLL: YES, SUPERVISOR. WE ALSO DID SEND OUT THE RECAP
- 25 OF THE COMMUNITY LISTENING SESSIONS TO THE JUSTICE DEPUTIES.

11 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THEY WERE OUTSIDE. AND WITH PARENTS?

13 DAVID CARROLL: IN SOME CASES.

15 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: IN SOME CASES.

16

- 17 DAVID CARROLL: I WOULD SAY IT WAS MORE ATTENDED BY COMMUNITY
- 18 MEMBERS PROVIDERS THAN IT WAS BY ACTUAL YOUNG PEOPLE.

- 20 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: SO MAYBE THAT'S JUST SOMETHING TO LOOK BACK
- 21 ON IN TERMS OF AS WE PUSH THIS OUT TO GET THE INPUT FROM THE
- 22 FAMILY MEMBERS THE PARENTS ESPECIALLY IF PEOPLE ARE GOING TO
- 23 BE LOCATED TO A DIFFERENT CAMP THAT MAY BE FARTHER AWAY FROM
- 24 THEIR HOME AND WHAT HAVE YOU, AND THERE'S GOING TO BE ISSUES,
- 25 TRANSPORTATION AND OTHERWISE.



- 2 SHEILA WILLIAMS: AND LIKE I MENTIONED, SUPERVISOR, WE DID A
- 3 DEDICATED WEBSITE AND WE ALSO DID AN FAQ FOR THE PARENTS THAT
- 4 WAS BOTH IN ENGLISH AND SPANISH AS WELL AS LIKE I MENTIONED
- 5 THEY HAD A OR CODE THAT WAS OFFERED TO THEM IN ORDER FOR THEM
- 6 TO PROVIDE US WITH THEIR FEEDBACK.

- 8 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND THEN I'M SURE MY COLLEAGUES WILL ASK
- 9 ABOUT THE OUTREACH TO THE CITIES I'M CONCERNED ABOUT IN THE
- 10 FOOTHILL AREAS BECAUSE I SHARE LA VERNE. YEAH. CLAREMONT, I
- 11 USED TO REPRESENT AND SAN DIMAS, BUT WHAT HAS BEEN THE
- 12 FEEDBACK FROM?

- 14 ROBERT N. ARCOS: YEAH, GOOD AFTERNOON, DEPUTY DIRECTOR ROBERT
- 15 ARCOS, OFFICE OF SAFETY AND SECURITY. PART OF THE DEPOPULATION
- 16 STRATEGY ALSO INCLUDED OUR COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT WITH EVERY
- 17 CITY THAT'S IMPACTED BY DEPOPULATION. SO, FROM MAY TO JULY, WE
- 18 MET WITH THE CITY OF LA VERNE, SAN DIMAS, COMMERCE, DOWNEY,
- 19 AND MALIBU WITH THE EXECUTIVE TEAM. AND IT WAS TWOFOLD. FIRST,
- 20 WE WANTED TO MAKE SURE WE GAVE THEM CLEAR AND TRANSPARENT
- 21 INFORMATION ABOUT WHAT THE DEPOPULATION STRATEGY MEANT TO THAT
- 22 CITY. AND SECONDLY, WAS ABOUT BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS BECAUSE
- 23 WE REALLY DIDN'T HAVE STRONG RELATIONSHIPS IN EACH OF THESE
- 24 CITIES. AND I THINK WE ACCOMPLISHED BOTH VERY CLEARLY IN EVERY
- 25 MEETING. EVERY MEETING TO EACH CITY STARTED A LITTLE TENSE AND



- 1 WITH A LITTLE ANXIETY AND FRUSTRATION ABOUT THE LACK OF
- 2 COMMUNICATION THAT WAS OCCURRING BETWEEN US AND THEIR CITY.
- 3 BUT I THINK WITH THE CHIEF AND THE EXECUTIVE TEAM THAT WERE
- 4 PRESENT, I THINK WE REALLY DID ESTABLISH A VERY OPEN LINE OF
- 5 COMMUNICATION AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE WORK GOING FORWARD AND
- 6 WHAT OUR COMMITMENT WAS TO EACH CITY TO MAKE SURE THAT WE WERE
- 7 VERY CLEAR WITH THEM ON THINGS THAT AFFECTED THEIR CITY. WITH
- 8 IMMEDIATE NOTIFICATIONS RELATED TO ANY INCIDENTS AROUND THE
- 9 CITY SPECIFICALLY LA VERNE. WE MET WITH THE MAYOR, THE CITY
- 10 MANAGER, SOME COUNCIL MEMBERS, THE CHIEF OF POLICE, AND THEIR
- 11 CAPTAIN TO REALLY MAKE SURE THAT WE HAD A VERY OPEN LINES OF
- 12 COMMUNICATION. WE ALSO IMPLEMENTED A SYSTEM WHERE CAMP PAIGE
- 13 AND AFFLERBAUGH ARE REPORTING INTO LA VERNE TO THEIR WATCH
- 14 COMMANDER WITH A STATUS REPORT ON THE SYSTEMS. SO THAT'S A
- 15 BEST PRACTICE THAT WE THINK WE HAVE ESTABLISHED THERE THAT
- 16 WE'RE GOING TO INCLUDE WITH ALL OF OUR CITY PARTNERS TO MAKE
- 17 SURE THAT WE ARE VERY TRANSPARENT AND COMMUNICATIVE WITH OUR
- 18 PARTNERS. SO, IT WENT VERY WELL.

- 20 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: GOOD. HOPEFULLY THAT WILL LEAD TO SOMETHING
- 21 IN THE FUTURE TOO BECAUSE I THINK YOU CAN GAIN THEIR SUPPORT
- 22 THEY'LL WANT TO INTERACT WITH THE CAMPS OR WITH THE YOUTH
- 23 THERE AND I'VE SEEN THAT HAPPEN BEFORE BUT I THINK THAT'S
- 24 SOMETHING THAT CERTAINLY COULD BE PUT OUT THERE SO PEOPLE HAVE
- 25 A DIFFERENT UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT ACTUALLY TAKES PLACE AND HOW



- 1 THEY CAN ALSO BE SUPPORTIVE. JUST LIKE THE SHERIFF'S SUPPORTS
- 2 DIFFERENT YOUTH GROUPS, THERE COULD BE A CITY THAT ADOPTS A
- 3 TEAM SPORT OR SOMETHING, YOU KNOW, TO HELP OUT WITH THAT
- 4 INTERACTION. SO JUST A THOUGHT. THANK YOU.

6 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU.

- 8 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: IF I COULD JUST BRIEFLY TAKE THE
- 9 OPPORTUNITY, AND I'LL BE BRIEF, BUT SUPERVISOR SOLIS, IF I
- 10 COULD JUST, I HEAR YOU WITH RESPECT TO THE COMMUNICATION WITH
- 11 THE FAMILIES AND I SEE IT REALLY NOT SIMPLY SOMETHING THAT WE
- 12 WOULD DO BECAUSE OF THE DEPOPULATION PLAN, BUT REALLY THAT
- 13 THIS IS A LITMUS TEST FOR HOW WELL WE'RE DOING COMMUNICATING
- 14 WITH OUR FAMILIES. BECAUSE WHAT WE'RE DESCRIBING IS WHAT
- 15 HAPPENS WITH THEM EVERY DAY, REGARDLESS OF THE DEPOPULATION
- 16 PLAN. WHEN A YOUNG PERSON LANDS IN ONE OF OUR FACILITIES, IT'S
- 17 THE EXACT SAME CONCERNS AND SO HOW HEALTHY THE SYSTEM IS IN
- 18 ALLOWING FOR THAT TWO-WAY COMMUNICATION SHOULD BE OCCURRING
- 19 FROM THE BEGINNING AND SHOULD BE OCCURRING IRRESPECTIVE OF
- 20 THIS PARTICULAR CHALLENGE. AND SO, WHAT WE'VE LEARNED IS THAT
- 21 WE HAVE SOME HOLES TO FILL HERE AND THAT WHATEVER WE'RE DOING
- 22 TO BRIDGE THIS COMMUNICATION GAP FOR THIS INCIDENT REALLY
- 23 SHOULD BE AN ONGOING PROCESS, THEIR ABILITY TO COMMUNICATE

- 3 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. SO JUST SO I'M
- 4 CLEAR FROM, I KNOW YOU DIDN'T GET TO QUITE FINISH YOUR
- 5 PRESENTATION, SO THE TWO TOPICS WE'RE FOCUSING ON ARE STAFFING
- 6 SPECIFICALLY RELATED TO HIRING AND THEN SORT OF WHERE WE ARE
- 7 WITH THE DEPOPULATION PLAN. OKAY. NOW SOMETHING THAT YOU HAD
- 8 MENTIONED WAS THE BONUS THAT WAS GIVEN LAST YEAR. WAS THAT
- 9 GIVEN BECAUSE PEOPLE WORKED EXTRA HOURS?

- 11 SHEILA WILLIAMS: NO, SUPERVISOR. IT WAS BASICALLY TO BE THEIR
- 12 FULL-TIME JOB IN TERMS OF SUPERVISION OF THE YOUTH. SO, IF YOU
- 13 DID LESS HOURS, YOU RECEIVED LESS. IF YOU DID MORE HOURS, YOU
- 14 RECEIVED THE COMPLIMENT OF \$17,000. BUT IT WASN'T LIKE OVER
- 15 TIME. YOU WERE DEDICATED AND ASSIGNED TO THE SITE PROVIDING
- 16 DIRECT SUPERVISION OF YOUTH.

- 18 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: SO, WE'RE PAYING PEOPLE A BONUS TO DO
- 19 THEIR JOB?

20

- 21 SHEILA WILLIAMS: NO, THESE WERE FOLKS FROM THE FIELD AS WELL
- 22 AS THOSE THAT WERE ASSIGNED TO THE INSTITUTION. YES.

23

24 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: OKAY.



- 1 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: SUPERVISOR HORVATH IF I COULD BECAUSE I
- 2 APPRECIATE THIS QUESTION. THIS WAS A BONUS INTENDED TO
- 3 INCENTIVIZE ATTENDANCE. AND IF YOU DO THE MATH, IF YOU
- 4 ATTENDED FULL TIME, YOU WOULD RECEIVE A BONUS. AND THAT DID

- 7 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: I'M VERY CLEAR ABOUT WHAT THE INTENTION
- 8 WAS. I JUST WANT TO, I THINK THERE HASN'T BEEN ENOUGH
- 9 CONVERSATION AROUND WHAT HAS BEEN DONE IN ORDER TO ADDRESS THE
- 10 STAFFING PROBLEM. I DON'T THINK THAT'S BEEN VERY PUBLIC HERE.
- 11 AND THE FACT THAT YOU WERE PAYING A BONUS JUST TO GET PEOPLE
- 12 TO SHOW UP TO WORK, AND IT STILL WASN'T WORKING, SHOWS NOT
- 13 ONLY HOW BROKEN AND HOW SIGNIFICANT A SITUATION IT IS THAT
- 14 PEOPLE AREN'T SHOWING UP TO WORK, BUT ALSO THAT THIS COUNTY
- 15 WOULD HAVE TO PAY PEOPLE BEYOND WHAT THEY'RE ALREADY BEING
- 16 PAID JUST TO SHOW UP TO WORK, I THINK SAYS A LOT ABOUT SORT OF
- 17 THE STATE OF WHERE WE ARE. AND CLEARLY, I WOULD SAY THEN, THIS
- 18 IS INDICATIVE OF A BROADER CULTURAL PROBLEM WITHIN THE
- 19 DEPARTMENT. SO, I KNOW THAT WE HAVE TO TALK ABOUT HIRING

- 1 BUDGETED POSITIONS OF WHICH 2,408 ARE FILLED SO WE HAVE A
- 2 VACANCY OF APPROXIMATELY 1,353 OR 36% OF OUR POSITIONS ARE
- 3 VACANT AND HOW MANY YOUTH DO WE HAVE IN OUR CUSTODY RIGHT NOW?
- 4 562.

- 6 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: OK. SO, WE HAVE MORE THAN 2,000. I KNOW
- 7 THAT WE HAVE A SIGNIFICANT VACANCY BASED ON WHAT YOU JUST
- 8 SAID, BUT FOR THE POSITIONS THAT ARE FILLED, WE HAVE MORE THAN
- 9 2,000, AND WE HAVE ABOUT 500 YOUTH CURRENTLY. AND AS PART OF
- 10 THE DEPOPULATION PROCESS, AND I THINK ALSO JUST TO MAKE SURE
- 11 THAT WE ARE CLEAR ABOUT WHICH YOUTH SHOULD BE STAYING WITH US.
- 12 I UNDERSTOOD THAT YOU WERE TRYING TO ADOPT A REVISED INTAKE
- 13 ASSESSMENT TOOL, IN PART TO AVOID UNNECESSARY DETAINMENT FOR
- 14 YOUNG PEOPLE FOR WHOM IT DIDN'T NEED TO APPLY. SO WHERE ARE WE
- 15 IN TERMS OF IMPLEMENTING THAT ASSESSMENT TOOL, THAT INTAKE
- 16 ASSESSMENT TOOL?

- 18 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: YOU KNOW, WE, THE TOOL THAT WE'RE
- 19 UTILIZING IS THE ONE THAT WE INTENDED TO UTILIZE. THERE WAS A
- 20 OUESTION AS TO WHETHER WE WERE OVERDETAINING AND I THINK WE'VE
- 21 GOT THROUGH GREAT LENGTHS TO TRY TO SHOW THAT THAT'S NOT THE
- 22 CASE. THE MOST RECENT WAS YOU KNOW AN INVITATION TO THE CHAIR
- 23 OF POC TO VISIT AND SIT WITH OUR DIRECTOR OVER THAT AREA, AND
- 24 THAT HAS OCCURRED. SO, I, THAT'S, YOU KNOW, THAT WAS AN AREA
- 25 THAT WAS OF GREAT CONCERN TO ME BECAUSE IT'S THE SINGLE PLACE



- 1 WHERE IF WE'RE GETTING IT WRONG WE CAN HAVE AN IMPACT ON THE
- 2 SYSTEM. WE'VE SINCE DONE THE FIDELITY TO THE ASSESSMENT OF
- 3 FIDELITY TO IT AND I DON'T THINK THERE'S, THERE ISN'T ANY ROOM
- 4 HERE IN ORDER TO KEEP LESS YOUTH IN. I THINK THAT THE NEXT
- 5 PIECE IS GOING TO BE AFTER THAT INITIAL RISK ASSESSMENT IS
- 6 CONDUCTED AND THERE ISN'T A LEAST RESTRICTIVE PLACE FOR THEM
- 7 TO GO IMMEDIATELY, THAT BEFORE THAT FIRST OR SECOND HEARING,
- 8 TO FIND A SUITABLE PLACEMENT WITH THEM. SO I THINK THAT REALLY
- 9 MY RECOMMENDATION FOR FOCUS AND WHAT WE'RE TRYING TO DO IS, IT
- 10 IS TOO RISKY IN THAT MOMENT FOR THE YOUNG PERSON, BUT THAT
- 11 DOESN'T MEAN THAT THREE DAYS FROM THEN THERE HASN'T BEEN
- 12 STABILIZATION AND WE'VE HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO FIND SOMETHING
- 13 ELSE AND I THINK THAT'S SORT OF PART OF THE INTERACTION WITH
- 14 THE YD AND TRYING TO LOOK FOR OTHER OPTIONS TO GIVE THE JUDGES
- 15 SO I DON'T THINK IT'S AT THE ASSESSMENT PIECE THAT IS UNDER
- 16 WAY AND FEEL COMFORTABLE WITH IT, IT'S THAT NEXT PHASE. THE
- 17 OUALITY OF THE REPORTS THAT GO AND FINDING ALTERNATIVE
- 18 SUITABLE PLACEMENT.

- 20 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: AND I KNOW THAT WE'VE ALREADY
- 21 ACKNOWLEDGED THAT OUR NUMBERS ARE GOING UP. DOES THAT APPLY
- 22 ALSO TO THE GIRLS AND GENDER EXPANSIVE YOUTH POPULATION, OR
- 23 HAVE WE BEEN FOLLOWING WHAT OUR GOAL HAS BEEN IN TERMS OF
- 24 REDUCING THAT POPULATION?

- 6 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: MID-50S, 54 TO 56 THAT'S REMAINED THERE.
- 7 THE MAIL POPULATION HAS GONE UP. WE THINK IT'S JUST THE NORMAL
- 8 SUMMER TREND, BUT WE'RE KEEPING AN EYE ON IT TO MAKE SURE THAT
- 9 IT'S NOT THAT SOMETHING ELSE IS HAPPENING.

10

- 11 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: I KNOW AS PART OF THE PLAN THAT YOU
- 12 PROPOSED, THE GOAL IS TO HAVE GIRLS AND GENDER EXPANSIVE YOUTH
- 13 AT KILPATRICK. BUT RIGHT NOW KILPATRICK, HAS BEEN EMPTY, I
- 14 THINK, MOST OF THE MONTH OF JULY. HOW MUCH LONGER, ESPECIALLY
- 15 GIVEN THAT KILPATRICK, YOU KNOW, WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THAT
- 16 BEING, YOU KNOW, THE MODEL FOR HOW WE WANT TO DO WORK IN
- 17 PROBATION AND NOBODY'S THERE. SO HOW LONG IS IT GOING TO BE
- 18 EMPTY AND WHEN DO WE CHANGE THAT?

- 20 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: YEAH, SO IT'S BEEN EMPTY TO ALLOW FOR
- 21 SOME PHYSICAL PLANT MODIFICATIONS. BY THE FIRST WEEK IN
- 22 AUGUST, THAT SHOULD BE READY TO HOUSE GIRLS. OF COURSE THAT
- 23 DOESN'T ANSWER THE BSCC APPROVAL FOR IT, BUT IN TERMS OF FROM
- 24 A COUNTY PERSPECTIVE AND HAVING MADE THE MODIFICATIONS SUCH AS
- 25 ENHANCED PRIVACY, THE FIRST WEEK OF AUGUST WE'D BE PREPARED.



- 2 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: OKAY, SO WE'LL BE READY. I UNDERSTAND
- 3 THIS BOARD ASKED YOU TO MAKE A LOT OF CHANGES AND THINGS THAT
- 4 YOU OBVIOUSLY HAVE TO CONSIDER AS THE POPULATION IS CHANGING.
- 5 I KNOW THAT YOU'RE ALSO WORKING ON BRINGING BARRY J. INTO
- 6 COMPLIANCE. SO WHERE ARE YOU AT IN TERMS OF EXPECTATION AND

- 12 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: SO, THE NIDORF COMPONENT IS SLIGHTLY
- 13 DIFFERENT IN THAT FROM A PHYSICAL PLANT PERSPECTIVE, WE'RE
- 14 READY TO HOUSE JUVENILE HALL FROM A PREPARATION STANDPOINT
- 15 PHYSICAL.

16

17 SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: SYTF AND PREDISPOS?

- 19 GUILLERMO VIERA ROSA: THE PREDISPOS. WITH RESPECT TO THE SYTF
- 20 AND THE FINDING THAT REQUIRED A CAP FROM BSCC ON THE SYTF SIDE
- 21 TO THREE AREAS. WE BELIEVE WE'VE REMITTED THEM AND SUBMITTED
- 22 FOR TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO BSCC ALREADY. SO, WE DID AN URGENT

- 4 BY TELLING OUR STORIES WITH COURAGE, LEADING WITH COMPASSION,
- 5 AND MAKING SPACE FOR JOY, JUST LIKE HE DID.
- 6 AND FINALLY, I MOVE THAT WHEN WE ADJOURN TODAY, WE ADJOURN IN
- 7 MEMORY OF OZZY OSBORNE, WHO PASSED AWAY ON JULY 22ND IN
- 8 BIRMINGHAM, ENGLAND. HE WAS A LONGTIME RESIDENT OF BEVERLY
- 9 HILLS. BORN IN BIRMINGHAM, OZZY WAS THEN JUST JOHN MICHAEL
- 10 OSBORNE. AS A HYPERACTIVE, DYSLEXIC YOUNG PERSON, HE WASN'T
- 11 SUITED FOR SCHOOL AND DROPPED OUT AT A YOUNG AGE. INSTEAD, HE
- 12 FOUND SUCCESS IN MUSIC. IN 1968, HE PERFORMED FOR THE FIRST
- 13 TIME WITH A GROUP THAT WOULD GO ON TO BECOME THE ICONIC ROCK
- 14 BAND, BLACK SABBATH. OZZY WAS KNOWN FOR HIS INCREDIBLE
- 15 SHOWMANSHIP, WHICH CATAPULTED HIM TO FAME AND NOTORIETY AS A
- 16 FRONT MAN AND A SOLO ACT. HE MET HIS WIFE, SHARON AND BECAME
- 17 THE LOVABLE REALITY TV FATHER SO MANY PEOPLE MET ON THE
- 18 OSBOURNES. OVER HIS LIFETIME HE CONTRIBUTED GENEROUSLY TO THE
- 19 MUSIC INDUSTRY AS A PERFORMER, COLLABORATOR AND MENTOR. HIS
- 20 MUSIC FESTIVAL, OZFEST, MAY BE THE BEST EXAMPLE OF THE DOORS
- 21 HE OPENED FOR YOUNG, HEAVY METAL MUSICIANS IN HIS LIFE. IN
- 22 2006, HE WAS INDUCTED INTO THE ROCK AND ROLL HALL OF FAME. AND
- 23 IN 2019, HE RECEIVED A LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD FROM THE
- 24 GRAMMYS. HE PLAYED HIS FINAL FAREWELL EARLIER THIS MONTH IN
- 25 HIS HOMETOWN OF BIRMINGHAM, A TRUE ROCK AND ROLL ICON HIS



- 1 ENTIRE LIFE. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE, SHARON, HIS CHILDREN
- 2 JACK, KELLY, AMY, AND LOUIS. THANK YOU.
