THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS 2 TUESDAY, OCTOBER 14TH, 2025 3 4 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: ALL RIGHT, WE'RE GOING TO GO AHEAD 5 AND START THE BOARD MEETING. GOOD MORNING. WE WELCOME YOU TO OUR REGULAR SCHEDULED MEETING OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF 6 SUPERVISORS. TODAY IS TUESDAY, OCTOBER 14TH, 2025. WE TAKE 7 8 NOTE THAT A QUORUM OF THE BOARD IS PRESENT. THE ACTING CHIEF 9 EXECUTIVE OFFICER, COUNTY COUNSEL, EXECUTIVE OFFICER, AND THE 10 SERGEANT AT ARMS ARE ALL HERE TO ASSIST WE WILL BEGIN TODAY'S BOARD MEETING WITH THE LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT. 11 12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR [VIDEO RECORDING]: THE COUNTY OF 13 14 LOS ANGELES RECOGNIZES THAT WE OCCUPY LAND ORIGINALLY AND 15 STILL INHABITED AND CARED FOR BY THE TONGVA, TATAVIAM, SERRANO, KIZH, AND CHUMASH PEOPLES. WE HONOR AND PAY RESPECT 16 TO THEIR ELDERS AND DESCENDANTS, PAST, PRESENT, AND EMERGING, 17 AS THEY CONTINUE THEIR STEWARDSHIP OF THESE LANDS AND WATERS. 18 WE ACKNOWLEDGE THAT SETTLER COLONIZATION RESULTED IN LAND 19 20 SEIZURE, DISEASE, SUBJUGATION, SLAVERY, RELOCATION, BROKEN 21 PROMISES, GENOCIDE, AND MULTI-GENERATIONAL TRAUMA. THIS 22 ACKNOWLEDGEMENT DEMONSTRATES OUR RESPONSIBILITY AND COMMITMENT TO TRUTH, HEALING, AND RECONCILIATION, AND ELEVATING THE 23 24 STORIES, CULTURE, AND COMMUNITY OF THE ORIGINAL INHABITANTS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. WE ARE GRATEFUL TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO 25

LIVE AND WORK ON THESE ANCESTRAL LANDS. WE ARE DEDICATED TO

- 22 FOR BEING HERE. IN HONOR OF LGBTIA+ HISTORY MONTH, I'M PLEASED
- 23 TO WELCOME THE REVEREND WALLY HOEGER, WHO SERVES AS THE
- 24 ASSOCIATE MINISTER FOR THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH IN LONG
- 25 BEACH. REVEREND WALLY GREW UP IN SAN BERNARDINO AND HAS LIVED



- 1 IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA HER WHOLE LIFE. SHE ATTENDED CHAPMAN
- 2 UNIVERSITY, WHERE SHE EARNED A BACHELOR OF ARTS IN RELIGIOUS
- 3 STUDIES AND ORGANIZATIONAL LEADERSHIP, AND LATER CLAREMONT
- 4 SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY, WHERE SHE EARNED HER MASTER OF DIVINITY.
- 5 ORDAINED IN THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST, SHE HAS SERVED THREE
- 6 CHURCHES OVER HER 20 YEARS OF MINISTRY. SHE CURRENTLY SERVES
- 7 AT FIRST CHURCH, AS IT'S AFFECTIONATELY KNOWN, WHICH SITS
- 8 PROUDLY AT THE CORNER OF ARTS AND JUSTICE. THEY HAVE A LONG
- 9 HISTORY OF ENGAGING IN THE ISSUES IMPORTANT TO OUR LOCAL
- 10 COMMUNITY AND BEYOND. DURING THE AIDS CRISIS OF THE '80S AND
- 11 '90S, THEY WERE FIERCE ADVOCATES FOR THE LGBTQ+ COMMUNITY, A
- 12 LEGACY THAT CONTINUES TODAY. EVERY YEAR AT THE LONG BEACH
- 13 PRIDE PARADE, FOR A PORTION OF THE PARADE, THEY UNFURL A 60-
- 14 FOOT-LONG BANNER THAT SHIELDS MARCHERS FROM PROTESTERS WITH
- 15 THE WORDS WE PROTECT OUR CHILDREN FROM HATE AND THANK YOU FOR
- 16 THAT BECAUSE I GET YELLED AT SOMETIMES WHEN I'M IN THAT
- 17 PARADE. THEY WERE ALSO THE FIRST CHURCH IN LONG BEACH TO HOST
- 18 A DRAG SHOW IN THEIR SANCTUARY, AND MOST RECENTLY THEY RAISED
- 19 OVER \$5,000 AT THEIR DRAG TRIVIA NIGHT TO BENEFIT THE TREVOR
- 20 PROJECT, WHICH PROVIDES LIFE-SAVING CRISIS SUPPORT AND SUICIDE
- 21 PREVENTION SERVICES FOR OUR LGBTQ+ YOUTH. WHEN SHE'S NOT
- 22 LEADING WORSHIP OR ORGANIZING AT CHURCH YOU'LL OFTEN FIND
- 23 WALLY SPEAKING AT CITY HALL, RALLIES AND PROTESTS. FOR
- 24 EXAMPLE, SHE WAS HONORED TO OFFER THE PRAYER AT LONG BEACH'S
- 25 TRANS DAY OF REMEMBRANCE. WALLY LIVES IN LONG BEACH WITH HER



- 1 WIFE, KELLY. THEY JUST CELEBRATED THEIR 10-YEAR WEDDING
- 2 ANNIVERSARY LAST WEEKEND. THEIR FOUR-YEAR-OLD DAUGHTER LAUREL
- 3 AND THEIR MANY CHICKENS AND CATS LIVE WITH THEM. SO, THANK YOU
- 4 SO MUCH FOR BEING HERE THIS MORNING. YOU HONOR US WITH YOUR
- 5 PRESENCE AND YOUR WORDS. SO, ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY OF LOS
- 6 ANGELES WE HAVE A LITTLE TOKEN OF OUR APPRECIATION FOR YOU

- 18 WHERE HE OVERSEES THE SHERIFF'S INFORMATION BUREAU PERSONNEL,
- 19 WHO ARE ALL IN THE AUDIENCE, BY THE WAY. HE ALSO WAS
- 20 PREVIOUSLY WORKED AT PATROL FOR BOTH THE PALMDALE STATION AND
- 21 THE TEMPLE STATION AS A FIELD TRAINING OFFICER. HE IS
- 22 CURRENTLY FINISHING UP HIS BACHELOR'S DEGREE IN CRIMINAL
- 23 JUSTICE WITH NATIONAL UNIVERSITY AND PLANS TO BEGIN A DEGREE
- 24 PROGRAM IN HOMELAND SECURITY AND CRIMINAL INTELLIGENCE NEXT
- 25 YEAR. SERGEANT LOVETT IS FROM SANTA CLARITA WHERE HE RESIDES

- 16 SITUATION IN DC HAS NOT IMPROVED SINCE LAST WEEK. YESTERDAY,
- 17 HOUSE SPEAKER MIKE JOHNSON PREDICTED THAT THIS GOVERNMENT
- 18 SHUTDOWN COULD BECOME THE LONGEST IN US HISTORY, LONGER EVEN
- 19 THAN THE PREVIOUS RECORD 35-DAY SHUTDOWN IN 2019 DURING
- 20 PRESIDENT TRUMP'S FIRST TERM OF OFFICE. SPEAKER JOHNSON ALSO
- 21 SIGNALED A REFUSAL TO NEGOTIATE WITH DEMOCRATS OVER THE
- 22 EXTENSION OF AFFORDABLE CARE ACT SUBSIDIES THAT EXPIRE AT THE
- 23 END OF THE YEAR. IN SHORT, PRODUCTIVE DISCUSSIONS APPEAR TO BE
- 24 AT A BIT OF A STANDSTILL AND TODAY'S PRESENTATION WILL FOCUS A
- 25 LITTLE BIT ON WHAT'S NEXT FOR THE COUNTY. IF I COULD HAVE THE



- 1 NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. AS THE SHUTDOWN DRAGS ON, THE SCALE OF ITS
- 2 IMPACTS WILL BE UNPREDICTABLE AND POTENTIALLY UNPRECEDENTED.
- 3 AND I THINK IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT AS WE
- 4 START THIS PRESENTATION. VULNERABLE COUNTY RESIDENTS AND
- 5 MILLIONS LIKE THEM ALL OVER THE COUNTRY RISK LOSING ACCESS TO
- 6 FOOD ASSISTANCE, HOUSING ASSISTANCE, HEALTHCARE SERVICES, AND
- 7 OTHER SAFETY NET PROGRAMS THAT THEY RELY ON TO MEET BASIC
- 8 DAILY NECESSITIES. ONE OF THE MOST CONCERNING ASPECTS OF A
- 9 PROLONGED GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN IS THAT THERE IS NO GUARANTEE,
- 10 NO GUARANTEE THAT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WILL MAKE STATES AND
- 11 COUNTIES WHOLE FOR FEDERALLY FUNDED BENEFITS THEY PROVIDE
- 12 USING STATE OR LOCAL FUNDING DURING THE SHUTDOWN. OUR
- 13 LEGISLATIVE TEAM IN DC REPORTS THAT THERE IS NO PUBLIC LAW
- 14 THAT REQUIRES REIMBURSEMENT FOR BENEFITS OR SERVICES PROVIDED
- 15 DURING A LAPSE OF FUNDING ASSOCIATED WITH THE FEDERAL
- 16 GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN. DURING PAST SHUTDOWNS, LEGISLATIVE
- 17 LANGUAGE WAS ADVANCED TO ALLOW FOR FULL REIMBURSEMENT. AFTER
- 18 THE LONGEST SHUTDOWN IN 2019, CONGRESS EXPLICITLY PROVIDED FOR
- 19 SUCH FUNDING AND LEGISLATION IN THE CONTINUING APPROPRIATIONS
- 20 ACT FOR THAT FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR. OF COURSE, OUR COUNTY
- 21 LEGISLATIVE ADVOCATES WILL PUSH FOR LEGISLATIVE LANGUAGE THAT
- 22 REQUIRES REIMBURSEMENTS. BUT LIKE I SAID, THERE ARE NO
- 23 GUARANTEES. IT IS IMPOSSIBLE TO PREDICT WHAT THIS
- 24 ADMINISTRATION AND CONGRESS WILL DO AND THAT UNCERTAINTY

- 1 CONCERNING? TODAY WE'LL FOCUS OUR PRESENTATION ON FEDERALLY

- 3 SOCIAL SERVICES AND THE L.A. COUNTY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY.
- 4 THEY WERE HERE LAST WEEK AND THEY HAVE SOME ADDITIONAL
- 5 INFORMATION TO SHARE TODAY. THE FEDERAL BENEFITS ADMINISTERED
- 6 BY DPSS AND LACDA ARE MOST IMMEDIATELY AT RISK AND THE TWO
- 7 DEPARTMENTS ADMINISTER SOME OF THE MOST CRITICAL BENEFITS FOR
- 8 OUR COMMUNITY. FOR DPSS ALONE, BEGINNING ON NOVEMBER 1ST, THE
- 9 COST TO THE COUNTY TO BACKFILL THE LOSS OF FEDERAL FUNDING
- 10 WOULD BE ABOUT \$120,000,000 A WEEK. SO, I'D LIKE TO JUST PUT
- 11 THAT INTO PERSPECTIVE. SO ABOUT THREE WEEKS OF BACKFILL WOULD
- 12 EXCEED THE ANNUAL BUDGET FOR OUR PUBLIC DEFENDER. WITHIN ABOUT

- 14 OUR ENTIRE RAINY DAY FUND BALANCE. SO, I'VE TALKED TO DR.

- 14 JACKIE CONTRERAS, DIRECTOR OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SOCIAL
- 15 SERVICES, AND EMILIO SALAS, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE L.A.
- 16 COUNTY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY. I'M GOING TO HAND IT OVER FIRST
- 17 TO MS. O'VAILLIE FOR A MORE DETAILED UPDATE ON A LEGISLATIVE
- 18 ADVOCACY FOLLOWED BY PROGRAM SPECIFIC AND CONTINGENCY PLANNING
- 19 UPDATES FROM OUR DEPARTMENT HEADS.

- 21 ANGELA OVALLE: THANK YOU, JOE, AND GOOD AFTERNOON,
- 22 SUPERVISORS. WE ARE NOW IN DAY 14 OF THE SHUTDOWN WHICH BEGAN
- 23 ON OCTOBER 1ST AND THE SENATE HAS VOTED ON AND FAILED TO
- 24 ADVANCE A HOUSE PASSED CONTINUING RESOLUTION H.R.5317 SEVEN
- 25 TIMES MOST RECENTLY ON THURSDAY. NOW THIS IS A CLEAN CR WHICH



- 1 MEANS IT WOULD KEEP THE GOVERNMENT OPEN THROUGH NOVEMBER 21ST
- 2 AND IT INCLUDES NO POLICY WRITERS ADDITIONALLY, THE SENATE HAS
- 3 ALSO VOTED ON AND FAILED TO PASS A COMPETING DEMOCRATIC LED CR
- 4 SEVERAL TIMES THIS PROPOSAL S2882 WOULD FUND THE GOVERNMENT
- 5 THROUGH OCTOBER 31 AND WOULD ALSO EXTEND THE ENHANCED
- 6 AFFORDABLE CARE TAX ACT'S CREDITS THAT ARE SET TO EXPIRE ON
- 7 DECEMBER 31. AFTER FAILING TO ADVANCE EITHER PROPOSAL ON
- 8 THURSDAY, THE SENATE LEFT TOWN, ENSURING THE SHUTDOWN
- 9 CONTINUED UNRESOLVED INTO THIS WEEK. NOW THE SENATE IS
- 10 SCHEDULED TO VOTE THIS AFTERNOON AT APPROXIMATELY 2.30 OUR
- 11 TIME TO TAKE UP THE CLEAN CR TO TRY AND END THE SHUTDOWN.
- 12 THERE WILL NOT BE A VOTE TO PROCEED ON THE DEMOCRATIC
- 13 ALTERNATIVE BILL. BUT WITHOUT A BIPARTISAN DEAL IN PLACE
- 14 BEFORE TODAY'S VOTE, IT IS SURE TO FAIL. MEANWHILE, THE
- 15 REDUCTION IN FORCE ACTIONS AT FEDERAL AGENCIES CONTINUE.
- 16 ACCORDING TO MEDIA REPORTS, OVER 4,000 FEDERAL WORKERS HAVE
- 17 BEEN HIT WITH SHUTDOWN-RELATED LAYOFFS SO FAR. AND THESE
- 18 LAYOFFS ARE IMPACTING NEARLY EVERY FEDERAL DEPARTMENT,
- 19 INCLUDING HUD, WHICH SAW OVER 400 EMPLOYEES FIRED IN RECENT
- 20 WEEKS. FURTHER COMPLICATING MATTERS, THE HOUSE ANNOUNCED LATE
- 21 ON FRIDAY THAT IT HAS CANCELED ALL FLOOR VOTES FOR THIS WEEK,
- 22 PUTTING ADDED PRESSURE ON THE SENATE TO END THE SHUTDOWN. AND
- 23 WHILE WE HAVE SEEN SOME MOVEMENT ON SOME ISSUES, SUCH AS THE
- 24 ADMINISTRATION REPORTING IT PLANS TO MOVE UNUSED FUNDING TO
- 25 ENSURE THAT WIC WILL CONTINUE TO SAIL FLOAT THROUGH OCTOBER,



- 1 THE PRIMARY STICKING POINT REMAINS OVER WHETHER TO VOTE ON
- 2 REOPENING THE GOVERNMENT FIRST AND THEN NEGOTIATING ON THE
- 3 EXPIRING HEALTH CARE TAX CREDITS, OR COMING UP WITH A DEAL TO
- 4 ADDRESS BOTH ISSUES AT THE SAME TIME. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SO,
- 5 AS JOE MENTIONED, CEO LAIR HAS BEEN WORKING HAND IN HAND WITH
- 6 COUNTY DEPARTMENTS AND THE BUDGET POLICY AND REVIEW ALIGNMENT
- 7 BRANCH TO DRILL DOWN AND DETERMINE HOW OUR PROLONGED SHUTDOWN
- 8 MAY IMPACT COUNTY FUNDING, OUR PERSONNEL AND PROGRAMS. AND THE
- 9 INFORMATION WE'RE GATHERING IN THESE EXERCISES INFORMS OUR
- 10 ADVOCACY WITH OUR STATE AND FEDERAL PARTNERS. ON THE FEDERAL
- 11 SIDE, SINCE BEFORE THE SHUTDOWN STARTED, LAIR HAS BEEN
- 12 COMMUNICATING CONSISTENTLY WITH THE COUNTY'S DELEGATION,
- 13 APPROPRIATORS, AND KEY COMMITTEE LEADERSHIP TO URGE THE
- 14 PASSAGE OF A CONTINUING RESOLUTION TO ENSURE FUNDING FOR KEY
- 15 PROGRAMS SUCH AS SNAP AND TANF, AND SO THEY WILL NOT LAPSE.
- 16 WE'VE ALSO ADVOCATED THAT THE CR INCLUDE AN EXTENSION FOR THE
- 17 MEDICAID DISPROPORTIONATE SHARE HOSPITAL CUT DELAY, WHICH
- 18 EXPIRED ON SEPTEMBER 30TH, WHICH DR. GHALY SPOKE ABOUT LAST
- 19 WEEK. WE HAVE ALSO PROVIDED CONGRESSIONAL OFFICES WITH IMPACT
- 20 INFORMATION FROM OUR DEPARTMENTS AS AVAILABLE. AND SINCE THE
- 21 SHUTDOWN BEGAN ON OCTOBER 1ST, WE HAVE CONTINUED OUTREACH WITH
- 22 OUR CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION AND DEMOCRATIC LEADERSHIP,
- 23 REOUESTING AN END TO THE GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN AND PASSAGE OF A
- 24 CR, GIVEN THE BROAD AND NEGATIVE FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS ON THE

- 2 HAVE ALSO MADE OURSELVES AVAILABLE TO ADDRESS ALL
- 3 CONGRESSIONAL INQUIRIES RELATED TO THE SHUTDOWN IMPACTS AND
- 4 HAVE RESPONDED TO SPECIFIC INFORMATION REQUESTS FROM SENATOR
- 5 SCHIFF AND REPRESENTATIVE REBUS. WE ARE ALSO PARTNERING,
- 6 COORDINATING WITH PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS LIKE NACO TO ADVANCE
- 7 COUNTY PRIORITIES AND ADVOCATE FOR REIMBURSEMENT OR BACKFILL
- 8 OF ANY LOST FEDERAL RESOURCES. AND IN FACT, COMMUNICATION WAS
- 9 ISSUED THIS MORNING FROM NACO ENCOURAGING A OUICK BIPARTISAN
- 10 RESOLUTION TO THE SHUTDOWN. ON THE STATE SIDE, TO DATE, THE
- 11 GOVERNOR HAS NOT SIGNALED AN INTENT TO CALL A SPECIAL SESSION
- 12 TO ADDRESS THE FINANCIAL IMPACTS OF THE SHUTDOWN. AND AS YOU
- 13 KNOW, YESTERDAY WAS THE DEADLINE FOR THE GOVERNOR TO SIGN AND
- 14 VETO LEGISLATION FOR THE YEAR. SO HE HAS BEEN FOCUSED ON THAT
- 15 FOR THE PAST FEW WEEKS. AND WITH THE SPECIAL ELECTION COMING
- 16 UP IN NOVEMBER, WE DO NOT BELIEVE THAT THE GOVERNOR WILL CALL
- 17 LEGISLATORS BACK TO SACRAMENTO BEFORE THAT FOR A SPECIAL
- 18 SESSION. HOWEVER, WE ARE ACTIVELY COMMUNICATING WITH THE STATE
- 19 AND OUR DELEGATION MEMBERS AND THEY HAVE BEEN REGULARLY
- 20 APPRISED OF WHAT WE ARE FACING. OUR SACRAMENTO ADVOCATES
- 21 REACHED OUT TO THE DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE TO FIND OUT IF THEY
- 22 HAVE BEEN ABLE TO ASSESS THE POTENTIAL IMPACT OF THE SHUTDOWN
- 23 TO STATE PROGRAMS. DOF REPORTS THAT THEY ARE CURRENTLY
- 24 COORDINATING WITH STATE DEPARTMENTS TO ASSESS RISKS TO KEY
- 25 HUMAN SERVICE PROGRAMS SUCH AS WIC, THE CHILD AND ADULT CARE



- 1 FOOD PROGRAM, AND SNAP. AND THEY ARE ALSO DETERMINING IF PRIOR
- 2 YEAR CARRYOVER FUNDS CAN TEMPORARILY SUSTAIN OPERATIONS FOR
- 3 OTHER IMPORTANT PROGRAMS SUCH AS CALWORKS, CHILD CARE AND
- 4 DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANTS, AND VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION
- 5 PROGRAMS. THIS ASSESSMENT IS ONGOING AND WILL LIKELY BE USED
- 6 BY THE DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE TO INFORM AND DEVELOP THE
- 7 GOVERNOR'S JANUARY BUDGET PROPOSAL. AND AS DR. CONTRERAS WOULD
- 8 DETAIL, DPSS HAS BEEN IN CONSTANT COMMUNICATION WITH THE STATE
- 9 ON THIS ISSUE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. NOW BEFORE I TURN IT OVER TO
- 10 DR. CONTRERAS AND EMILIO FOR THEIR UPDATES, I JUST WANTED TO
- 11 OUICKLY REMIND EVERYBODY OF THE IMPACTS THAT WE DISCUSSED LAST
- 12 WEEK. THE PROGRAMS AT RISK OR SIGNIFICANT RISK INCLUDE SECTION
- 13 8, PUBLIC HOUSING OPERATING FUND, CALFRESH, MEDI-CAL,
- 14 CALWORKS, AND PUBLIC HEALTH PROGRAMS. AND DEPARTMENTS SUCH AS
- 15 PUBLIC WORKS, PARKS, AND OTHERS THAT RECEIVE SIGNIFICANT GRANT
- 16 FUNDING FOR PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS ALSO REPORT POTENTIAL
- 17 IMPACTS RELATED TO DELAYS IN FEDERAL VIEW OF FUNDING REQUESTS
- 18 AND LOAN AWARDS. THERE ARE POSSIBLE DELAYS IN EXECUTING
- 19 FINANCING AGREEMENTS, AND THERE ARE ALSO POSSIBLE DELAYS IN
- 20 PLAN APPROVALS OR PERMITS, WHICH WOULD IMPACT THE STATE
- 21 REQUIRED ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS NEEDED BEFORE A PROJECT CAN
- 22 PROCEED. AND WITH THAT I WILL TURN IT OVER TO DR. CONTRERAS
- 23 FOR HER PRESENTATION. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE.

25 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: THANK YOU. GOOD AFTERNOON MADAM CHAIR,



- 1 SUPERVISORS, JACKIE CONTRERAS, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SOCIAL
- 2 SERVICES. SO THE LONGER INTO OCTOBER THE SHUTDOWN GOES THE
- 3 MORE CONCERNS GROW ABOUT THE AVAILABILITY OF CASH AID AND FOOD
- 4 ASSISTANCE FOR OUR CUSTOMERS AND OUR ABILITY TO FUND OUR
- 5 DEPARTMENT'S OPERATIONS AND JUST BY WAY OF CONTEXT THIS IS ON
- 6 TOP OF AN 8.5% NCC CURTAILMENT THAT WE'VE ALREADY EXPERIENCED,
- 7 WHICH FOR US TRANSLATED INTO A TOTAL REDUCTION OF 21,900,000
- 8 AND 82 STAFF. AS YOU CAN SEE FROM THE SLIDE, MEDI-CAL IS
- 9 CONSIDERED AN ENTITLEMENT PROGRAM AND, AND THE AND IS
- 10 IMPORTANT HERE, IT IS NOT DEPENDENT ON AN APPROPRIATION BY
- 11 CONGRESS. SO, WE ANTICIPATE THE SHUTDOWN WILL HAVE NO
- 12 IMMEDIATE IMPACT ON IT. THIS INCLUDES IN-HOME SUPPORTIVE
- 13 SERVICES OR IHSS. WE ARE CERTAIN THAT MEDI-CAL IS SOLVENT
- 14 THROUGH THE END OF THE YEAR, HOWEVER, SHOULD THE SHUTDOWN
- 15 CONTINUE INTO DECEMBER AND BEYOND, IT IS UNCLEAR AS TO WHAT
- 16 THE IMPACT WOULD BE. CURRENTLY, OUR MOST IMMEDIATE CHALLENGES
- 17 WITH THE SHUTDOWN ARE IN BOTH CALFRESH, WHICH IS FOOD
- 18 ASSISTANCE TO INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES, AND CALWORKS, OUR CASH
- 19 AID TO FAMILIES. WHILE THESE PROGRAMS ARE ALSO ENTITLEMENTS,
- 20 THEY ARE DEPENDENT ON AN APPROPRIATION BY CONGRESS. BOTH
- 21 BENEFITS ARE ISSUED BETWEEN THE FIRST AND THE 10TH OF EACH
- 22 MONTH. CALFRESH IS ISSUED DIRECTLY FROM USDA. THESE ASSISTANCE
- 23 DOLLARS DO NOT PASS THROUGH THE COUNTY OR THE STATE. CALWORKS
- 24 ASSISTANCE DOLLARS COME TO THE COUNTY VIA THE STATE. IF BY
- 25 TOMORROW, OCTOBER 15TH, WE CANNOT CONFIRM THAT BENEFITS WILL



- 1 BE AVAILABLE IN NOVEMBER, OUR CUSTOMERS WILL BE INFORMED SO
- 2 THAT THEY CAN PLAN. WE WILL, OF COURSE, IMMEDIATELY UPDATE
- 3 THEM SHOULD ANYTHING CHANGE. IT IS MY UNDERSTANDING THAT THE
- 4 STATE WILL ALSO BE SENDING OUT NOTIFICATIONS AT SOME POINT
- 5 PRIOR TO NOVEMBER.

- 7 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: CAN I INTERRUPT YOU ON THAT? SO
- 8 WHAT WOULD THE DATE BE THAT IT WOULD IMPACT? I MEAN, IS IT
- 9 LIKE OCTOBER 31ST? IS IT NOVEMBER?

- 11 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: IT WOULD BE NOVEMBER 1ST NOVEMBER IF WE
- 12 DON'T HAVE IT THE BELIEF IS THAT IF WE DON'T HAVE THE MONEY
- 13 SECURED BY OCTOBER 25TH THEN WE'RE GOING TO SEE AN IMPACT IT
- 14 WAS OUR DECISION TO COMMUNICATE WITH OUR CUSTOMERS BECAUSE
- 15 THEY NEED TO PLAN WITH THE RESOURCES THEY HAVE AVAILABLE NOW.

- 17 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SO, NOVEMBER 1ST IS WHAT WE'RE
- 18 LOOKING AT. OKAY, THANKS.

- 20 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: YES. SO, WE ARE REACHING OUT TO 140 FOOD
- 21 BANKS, WHICH INCLUDE A NUMBER OF FAITH-BASED ORGANIZATIONS
- 22 THAT CONDUCT FOOD DISTRIBUTION TO COORDINATE ON MESSAGING AND
- 23 OUTREACH TO OUR CUSTOMERS. AS DURING THE PANDEMIC, IT WAS THE
- 24 FOOD BANKS THAT STEPPED INTO THE GAP AND WE ARE COUNTING ON
- 25 THEM TO DO SO AGAIN DURING THIS CHALLENGING TIME. AND I KNOW



- 1 FROM A CONVERSATION WITH COMMISSIONER FLOOD THAT THEY ARE IN
- 2 THE PROCESS OF PLANNING SEVERAL LARGE FOOD DISTRIBUTIONS. AND
- 3 I KNOW THAT THEY WORK CLOSELY WITH ALL OF YOUR OFFICES IN
- 4 ORDER TO BE ABLE TO DO THAT. SO YOU SHOULD BE HEARING MORE
- 5 ABOUT, SHOULD BE HEARING SHORTLY MORE ABOUT THAT IF YOU
- 6 HAVEN'T ALREADY. ONCE THE GOVERNMENT IS REOPENED, AS ACTING
- 7 CEO NICCHITTA INDICATED, IT IS AN OPEN QUESTION AS TO WHETHER
- 8 OUR CUSTOMERS WILL RECEIVE RETROACTIVE BENEFITS. IT IS OUR
- 9 UNDERSTANDING THAT CONGRESS MUST INCLUDE LANGUAGE TO AUTHORIZE
- 10 FUNDING TO COVER ANY MISSED BENEFITS. AN ADDITIONAL CHALLENGE
- 11 IS OUR FISCAL SOLVENCY BEGINNING IN NOVEMBER. WE ARE ENGAGING
- 12 IN DISCUSSIONS WITH THE CEO AND THE AUDITOR CONTROLLER TO
- 13 DETERMINE WHAT FUNDING MAY BE AVAILABLE TO REPLACE THE FEDERAL
- 14 FUNDING WE WOULD NEED TO OPERATE. AND AS THE SLIDE INDICATES,
- 15 WE HAVE CALWORKS ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDING AVAILABLE THROUGH THE
- 16 END OF THE YEAR HOWEVER, CALFRESH ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDING WILL
- 17 NOT BE AVAILABLE STARTING IN NOVEMBER SHOULD THE SHUTDOWN
- 18 CONTINUE THERE HAVE ALSO BEEN A LOT OF OUESTIONS AROUND
- 19 WHETHER THE STATE WILL ASSIST WITH THESE STOPGAP MEASURES.
- 20 UNFORTUNATELY, AS RECENT AS YESTERDAY, ACTUALLY AS RECENT AS
- 21 THIS MORNING, THE STATE HAS INDICATED THEY DO NOT HAVE THE
- 22 RESOURCES TO FILL THESE GAPS. NOW, THE EXCEPTION TO THIS MAY
- 23 BE CALWORKS, HOWEVER, WE HAVE NOT GOTTEN VERIFICATION THAT
- 24 THOSE NOVEMBER BENEFITS WILL BE MADE AVAILABLE. AS WITH THE
- 25 BENEFITS, RETROACTIVE ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDING WILL ALSO NEED TO

- 1 BE AUTHORIZED BY CONGRESS. AGAIN, AND LASTLY, OUR IMMEDIATE
- 2 FOCUS IS NOVEMBER AND WE ARE DOING EVERYTHING WE CAN TO LESSEN
- 3 THE IMPACT ON OUR CUSTOMERS SHOULD THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT NOT
- 4 BE REOPENED SOON. AND IN ALL TRANSPARENCY, I ALSO WANT TO
- 5 SHARE THAT WE ARE PLANNING FOR ADDITIONAL SECURITY TO ENSURE
- 6 THE SAFETY OF OUR CUSTOMERS AND OUR STAFF SHOULD BENEFITS BE
- 7 UNAVAILABLE COME NOVEMBER 1ST. THAT CONCLUDES MY UPDATE.

11 EMILIO SALAS: GOOD AFTERNOON SUPERVISORS, EMILIO SALAS,

- 12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY DEVELOPMENT
- 13 AUTHORITY. AS I REPORTED LAST WEEK, WE OPERATE THE FEDERAL
- 14 HOUSING PROGRAMS ON BEHALF OF LOW-INCOME RESIDENTS HERE IN LOS
- 15 ANGELES COUNTY. AND AS A REMINDER, THE IMPACT OF THE FEDERAL
- 16 PROGRAMS, WE ISSUE \$50,000,000 OF RENTAL ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS
- 17 EVERY MONTH ON BEHALF OF 30,000 HOUSEHOLDS TO APPROXIMATELY
- 18 10,000 PROPERTY OWNERS. LAST WEEK I REPORTED THAT HUD HAD
- 19 COMMUNICATED THAT IT HAD FUNDS AVAILABLE TO TAKE US ALL THE
- 20 WAY THROUGH THE MIDDLE OF NOVEMBER. HUD RECENTLY ISSUED A
- 21 REVISED COMMUNICATION WITH BETTER NEWS THAT IT HAD OBLIGATED
- 22 FUNDS NOT ONLY THROUGH THE END OF NOVEMBER BUT ALL THE WAY
- 23 THROUGH THE END OF DECEMBER. SO, THERE WILL BE HOUSING
- 24 ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS THAT WILL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO THOSE
- 25 PROPERTY OWNERS AND ON BEHALF OF THOSE HOUSEHOLDS THROUGH THE



- 1 END OF THE CALENDAR YEAR. THERE IS NO GUARANTEE OF ANY OTHER
- 2 FUNDING BEING AVAILABLE AFTER DECEMBER 31ST. WE ARE PREPARING
- 3 COMMUNICATIONS. WE HAD ALREADY PREPARED COMMUNICATIONS TO OUR
- 4 PROPERTY OWNERS AS WELL AS TO OUR CLIENTS, BUT WE ARE REVISING
- 5 THAT TO LET THEM KNOW THAT THERE IS ENOUGH FUNDING AVAILABLE
- 6 TO TAKE US THROUGH THE END OF THE CALENDAR YEAR. BUT THERE IS
- 7 NOTHING GUARANTEED BEYOND THAT. THAT CONCLUDES MY REPORT.
- 8 THANK YOU

- 10 ANGELA OVALLE: AND WE'RE AVAILABLE FOR ANY QUESTIONS YOU MIGHT

- 17 \$120,000,000 PER WEEK LOST FOR DPSS IS JUST MIND-BOGGLING. CAN
- 18 YOU KIND OF PUT THAT IN PERSPECTIVE FOR US WITH A LITTLE BIT
- 19 MORE DETAIL, DR. CONTRERAS? I MEAN, WHEN WE THINK ABOUT WHAT
- 20 THAT REALLY MEANS, HOW MANY PEOPLE AND HOW FAR AND WIDE IN THE
- 21 SERVICES, IF YOU COULD BE A LITTLE BIT.

- 23 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: SURE, SURE. SO LET ME FOCUS FIRST ON
- 24 CALFRESH BECAUSE THAT'S OUR LARGEST PROGRAM. SO, THERE WE'RE
- 25 LOOKING AT A DISBURSEMENT OF 3,800,000,000 OVER A YEAR FOR



- 1 1,500,000 RECIPIENTS. THE AVERAGE AMOUNT, I BELIEVE IS AROUND
- 2 \$300. AND SO, THAT'S THE IMPACT. IF WE LOOK AT IT, THIS IS
- 3 LOOKING AT A WEEKLY BASIS BUT I WANT TO REMIND THE BOARD THAT
- 4 DISBURSEMENTS ARE MADE ON A MONTHLY BASIS SO IT'S THE FIRST
- 5 THROUGH THE TENTH IS WHEN THE DISBURSEMENTS GO OUT. SO WE
- 6 WOULD HAVE TO FIGURE OUT EVEN LOGISTICALLY IF WE WANTED TO DO
- 7 SOMETHING FOR A WEEK, HOW COULD THAT ACTUALLY HAPPEN AT THIS
- 8 POINT? FOR CALWORKS, THAT IS ABOUT 220,000 HOUSEHOLDS THAT
- 9 RECEIVE CALWORKS BENEFITS, AND THAT AVERAGE BENEFIT IS CLOSER
- 10 TO \$1,000 A MONTH.

- 12 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND YOU TALKED ABOUT MAKING AVAILABLE
- 13 INFORMATION, I GUESS COORDINATING WITH THE L.A. REGIONAL FOOD
- 14 BANK, AND YOU HAVE ABOUT 140 PANTRIES OR PARTICIPANTS. HOW ARE
- 15 THEY DOING? BECAUSE WE GET CALLS FROM THEM AS WELL, THAT
- 16 THEY'RE LOOKING FOR US TO HELP PROVIDE THEM WITH FINANCIAL
- 17 ASSISTANCE.

- 19 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: YEAH, SO THEY RECOGNIZE THE ROLE THAT
- 20 THEY PLAY DURING COVID AND HOW THIS IS A VERY SIMILAR DYNAMIC.
- 21 THIS IS A SIGNIFICANT CRISIS AND SO THEY ARE REALLY GEARING UP
- 22 TO DO WHAT THEY DO BEST, AND THAT IS TO PARTNER WITH THE
- 23 COMMUNITIES AT LARGE, YOUR OFFICES, TO MAKE SURE THAT THEY CAN
- 24 GET THE FOOD OUT. I THINK THAT THEY KNOW, JUST LIKE DURING
- 25 COVID, ANY INFUSION OF RESOURCES, ANY DONATIONS THEY CAN



- 1 RECEIVE, ANY SUPPORT THAT THEY CAN RECEIVE IS MUCH APPRECIATED
- 2 AND THEY WILL, YOU KNOW, MAXIMIZE THAT TO THE EXTENT THAT
- 3 THEY'RE ABLE.

- 5 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: ARE WE PARTNERING WITH THEM TO GET THAT
- 6 REQUEST OUT?

- 8 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: WE ARE AND WE DID THAT DURING COVID
- 9 WHERE WE GOT OUT THE MESSAGING

11 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND TO MAKE DONATIONS AVAILABLE

13 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: AS WELL.

- 15 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND MAYBE IF YOU CAN BREAK THAT DOWN FOR US,
- 16 I THINK BY DISTRICT THAT MIGHT BE HELPFUL AS WELL. BECAUSE WE
- 17 GET CALLS FROM DIFFERENT PARTS OF THE COUNTY AND IF WE HAD AN
- 18 EASY WAY OF IDENTIFYING WHERE PEOPLE CAN GO FOR HELP, BUT ALSO
- 19 HELP TO CONTINUE TO TARGET, BECAUSE I THINK WE DO NEED TO, WE
- 20 SHOULD BE BEEFING UP OUR MESSAGE THAT GROUPS THAT CAN GIVE,
- 21 ECONOMICALLY SHOULD, AND OF COURSE I'M VERY SENSITIVE ABOUT
- 22 THE DISTRIBUTION EFFORTS, BECAUSE WE STILL HAVE PEOPLE WHO
- 23 DON'T WANT TO COME OUT VISIBLY AND THAT HAS TO BE HANDLED IN A
- 24 VERY SENSITIVE MANNER AND THERE ARE CERTAIN GROUPS I KNOW THAT
- 25 WILL HELP US WITH THAT SO I HOPE YOU'RE WORKING WITH THEM AS



- 1 WELL. SO WE'RE ALL ON ONE PAGE HERE, BECAUSE IT'S GOING TO BE
- 2 VERY UNIQUE HOW SOME OF THAT SERVICE AND PRODUCT GOES OUT TO
- 3 PEOPLE. AND IT ISN'T JUST FOOD, WE'RE TALKING ABOUT DIAPERS,
- 4 WE'RE TALKING ABOUT NECESSITIES FOR FAMILIES. AND I THINK IN
- 5 SOME WAYS, I KNOW SOMETIMES OUR DEPARTMENTS PROVIDE A LOT OF,
- 6 I WANT TO CALL IT CHUM, YOU KNOW, ITEMS THAT THEY PROVIDE TO
- 7 THE PUBLIC. MIGHT WE ASK OUR COUNTIES TO HELP IN SOME WAY TO
- 8 PACKAGE SOME OF THAT FOR THESE DISTRIBUTIONS? BECAUSE THEY
- 9 HAVE DONE THAT DURING COVID. AND IN MANY WAYS, IT'S VERY

- 19 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: SO, I JUST HAD A CONVERSATION WITH THE
- 20 DEPARTMENT HEADS FOR DEO AND DCBA, JUST TO KIND OF TOUCH BASE
- 21 IN WHAT THEY'RE HEARING FROM BUSINESSES. AS I SAID, IT'S A
- 22 LARGE AMOUNT OF MONEY THAT INFUSES THE ECONOMY. AND SO WE WANT
- 23 TO MAKE SURE THAT PEOPLE ARE AWARE OF WHAT IS HAPPENING AND
- 24 ALSO THAT THEY'RE ABLE TO PLAN FOR THAT SHOULD THE RESOURCES
- 25 NOT BE AVAILABLE. SO, WE'LL DEFINITELY COORDINATE. WE

- 5 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: SO, DEO, WHICH HAS AND CONSUMER AND BUSINESS
- 6 AFFAIRS HAVE PROGRAMS THAT THEY'RE OPERATING OR WILL BE
- 7 OPERATING IN THE NEXT COUPLE OF WEEKS OR MONTHS TO HELP SOME
- 8 OF THESE DISTRESSED BUSINESSES.

- 10 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: AND I'M THINKING ABOUT THE LITTLE MOM
- 11 AND POP MARKET ON THE CORNER THAT WON'T KNOW HOW TO EVEN
- 12 PROCESS TO ASK FOR A GRANT, BECAUSE WE'RE GIVING OUT GRANTS IN
- 13 DIFFERENT INCREMENTS, AND HOW IMPORTANT IT IS TO GIVE THAT
- 14 INFORMATION TO THE DIFFERENT LANGUAGES, NOT JUST SPANISH, BUT
- 15 API AND ALL THE OTHER TOP RANKING LANGUAGES. I'D LOVE TO SEE
- 16 WHAT WE'RE DOING THERE, ACTUALLY SEE IT, NOT JUST HEAR A
- 17 REPORT, BUT UNDERSTAND IT AT A GRANULAR LEVEL, IF POSSIBLE. I
- 18 KNOW THAT FOR OUR HUD, I'M DEEPLY CONCERNED ABOUT OUR SECTION
- 19 8 AND THE FACT THAT IT IS RELIEVING TO HEAR THAT THERE'S GOING
- 20 TO BE AN ADDITIONAL MONTH, BUT THAT CERTAINLY IS NOT GOING TO
- 21 PROVIDE A RELIEF FOR MANY OF OUR FAMILIES WHO ARE VERY ANXIOUS
- 22 RIGHT NOW AND MAYBE HAVE HOUSEHOLDS MORE THAN FIVE PEOPLE.
- 23 WHERE WILL THEY GO? WHAT KIND OF RESOURCES CAN WE MAKE
- 24 AVAILABLE OR REFERENCES REFERRALS OF THAT NATURE, EMILIO?



- 1 EMILIO SALAS: THANK YOU FOR THAT QUESTION, SUPERVISOR. I THINK
- 2 WHEN YOU CONSIDER THE MAGNITUDE AND THE SCALE OF THE IMPACT
- 3 THAT WOULD BE REQUIRED TO SUPPORT THAT MANY HOUSEHOLDS SHOULD
- 4 THE HOUSING ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS STOP, THERE REALLY ISN'T ANY
- 5 LOCAL RESOURCE THAT WILL BE ABLE TO PROVIDE A REASONABLE
- 6 BACKSTOP THERE JUST SIMPLY AREN'T ENOUGH RESOURCES IF YOU
- 7 CONSIDER FOR EXAMPLE THE RENT RELIEF PROGRAM THAT THIS BOARD
- 8 JUST LAUNCHED TO THE TUNE OF \$20,000,000 WE ISSUE 50,000,000
- 9 DOLLARS IN PAYMENTS IN ONE MONTH ALONE SO THERE REALLY ISN'T
- 10 NECESSARILY ANYTHING OUT THERE THAT WILL PROVIDE THE LEVEL OF
- 11 SUPPORT FOR THE FAMILIES SHOULD THERE JUST BE A COMPLETE, YOU
- 12 KNOW, THE RESOURCES NOT BE THERE FOR THAT HOUSING ASSISTANCE
- 13 PAYMENT. WE WILL CERTAINLY BE WORKING WITH OUR PROPERTY OWNER
- 14 COMMUNITY TO LET THEM KNOW THAT WE WOULD WANT THEM TO KEEP
- 15 THEM HOUSED, THAT WHILE WE TRY TO FIGURE OUT A SOLUTION,
- 16 LUCKILY WE HAVE SOME LEVEL OF RUNWAY FROM HERE UNTIL THE END
- 17 OF THE CALENDAR YEAR. BUT IF IT BECOMES PROTRACTED MUCH LONGER
- 18 THAN THAT, I DON'T KNOW WHERE WE WOULD BE ABLE TO IDENTIFY
- 19 THAT LEVEL OF RESOURCES.

- 21 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND WE ALREADY KNOW THAT OUR HOMELESS AND
- 22 UNHOUSED SERVICES ARE ALREADY IMPACTED. SO, I'M REALLY
- 23 CONCERNED WHAT OUR CEO AND EXECUTIVE OFFICES ARE THINKING IN
- 24 TERMS OF WHAT KIND OF READINESS PLAN WE MIGHT HAVE AVAILABLE.
- 25 BECAUSE WE ARE, AND ASIDE FROM THAT, WE'RE GOING TO HAVE, YOU



- 1 KNOW, WEATHER ISSUES. I MEAN, LOOK AT TODAY. I'M FEARFUL OF
- 2 WHAT'S HAPPENING THERE AS WELL BECAUSE OF FOLKS THAT ALSO ARE
- 3 IN HOUSES THAT ARE OUTSIDE RIGHT NOW IN THE WATERSHEDS. THAT'S
- 4 ONE PART OF IT. BUT THEN I'M THINKING ABOUT IF THESE FAMILIES
- 5 THAT LIVE IN URBAN, SUBURBAN AREAS IN SECTION 8 OR THESE
- 6 VOUCHER-BASED PROPERTIES, WHERE DO THEY GO? AND DO WE HAVE A
- 7 STRATEGIC PLAN IN PLACE? ARE WE THINKING ABOUT THAT, CEO?

- 9 JOSEPH NICCHITTA: YEAH, IT'S A GREAT QUESTION. TWO THINGS, ONE
- 10 SPECIFIC TO THE FOOD RESOURCES, WE HAVE A SURVEY OUT TO
- 11 DEPARTMENTS THAT ASK THEM TO TELL US ALL OF THE INTERSECTION
- 12 POINTS THEY HAVE WITH ANY ORGANIZATION THAT PROVIDES FOOD OR
- 13 FOOD SERVICES. WE WILL SUPPLEMENT IT BASED ON YOUR COMMENTS
- 14 MOMENTS AGO ABOUT THINGS THAT THEY ALSO CAN PROVIDE, LIKE PET
- 15 FOOD, FOR EXAMPLE, FOR OUR DEPARTMENT OF ANIMAL CARE AND
- 16 CONTROL. WHAT WE NEED TO FIND OUT RIGHT AWAY IS WHERE ARE WE
- 17 ALREADY WORKING WITH THESE ORGANIZATIONS, AND WHAT ARE THE
- 18 MECHANISMS FOR MAKING SURE THAT THEY'RE READY ALONGSIDE WITH
- 19 US FOR ANYTHING THAT HAPPENS. I THINK ON THE BROADER STRATEGIC
- 20 PLANNING, WE'LL BE TALKING TO DEPARTMENTS LATER THIS WEEK
- 21 ABOUT THAT AND GETTING READY. I'M CONCERNED, JUST LIKE
- 22 DIRECTOR SALAS IS, ABOUT THE SCALE BEING SOMETHING THAT WE'VE
- 23 REALLY NEVER SEEN A DROP OFF LIKE THIS OF THIS KIND. COVID WAS
- 24 THE CLOSEST PERHAPS, BUT WITH COVID WE HAD CARES ACT AND THEN
- 25 WE HAD AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT, WHICH REALLY, REALLY HELPED



- 1 US WEATHER THOSE STORMS AND THEN REBUILD SOME OF OUR
- 2 COMMUNITIES. I AM NOT EXPECTING ANYTHING LIKE THAT TO COME TO
- 3 US THIS TIME AROUND. SO, THIS IS GOING TO BE A BIT OF A
- 4 DIFFERENT CONVERSATION. WE NEED TO PLAN, WE NEED TO HAVE A
- 5 PLAN IN PLACE AND WE CAN COME BACK TO YOUR BOARD WITH THAT.
- 6 BUT I'M CONCERNED, I'M VERY CONCERNED ABOUT OUR ABILITY TO
- 7 REALLY WEATHER THIS IF THIS GOES ON FOR A PROLONGED PERIOD OF
- 8 TIME.

- 10 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: DURING COVID, WE ACTUALLY STOOD UP DIFFERENT
- 11 STAKEHOLDER GROUPS. MIGHT WE START TO GO BACK TO THAT PAGE AND
- 12 THINK ABOUT THE FAITH-BASED, SOME OF THE OTHER GROUPS THAT WE
- 13 HAD STOOD UP, INCLUDING LABOR PARTNERS AND ALL OF THAT, TO ASK
- 14 THEM HOW THEY CAN HELP US PREPARE. AND I WOULD EVEN ASK THAT
- 15 OUR STAFFS, IN SOME WAY OUR DEPUTIES BE ENGAGED, BECAUSE IT IS
- 16 A LITTLE DIFFERENT. AND IF THAT CAN BE DONE, ACTING CEO, I
- 17 THINK I PERSONALLY WOULD APPRECIATE THAT. THANK YOU. THANK
- 18 YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

20 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR HAHN.

- 22 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I JUST WANTED TO
- 23 FOLLOW UP ON A COUPLE OF THINGS. ONE, JUST ON THIS FOOD BANK
- 24 ISSUE. AND I THINK IT FEELS LIKE THE DIFFERENCE NOW IS THERE
- 25 IS NOT AS MUCH PUBLIC AWARENESS ABOUT THE NEED TO DISTRIBUTE



- 1 FOOD AS WE HAD UNDER COVID. SO, WONDERING IF WE MIGHT LAUNCH,
- 2 BESIDES KIND OF OUR INTERNAL COMMUNICATION WITH OUR DEPARTMENT
- 3 HEADS, IF WE MIGHT LAUNCH AN AWARENESS CAMPAIGN TO THE GENERAL
- 4 PUBLIC THAT DONATIONS OF MONETARY DONATIONS, FOOD DONATIONS TO
- 5 OUR FOOD BANKS IN THIS VERY CRITICAL TIME WOULD BE WELCOME.
- 6 CAUSE IT JUST DOESN'T FEEL THE SAME KIND OF URGENCY OR EMPATHY
- 7 MAYBE AS WE FELT DURING COVID. SO IT SEEMS TO ME TO BE A GREAT
- 8 COUNTYWIDE, I DON'T KNOW IF WE DO PSAS ANYMORE, BUT SOMETHING
- 9 ON THAT MAGNITUDE THAT WOULD GET TO THE PUBLIC THAT VERY
- 10 URGENT NEED FOR OUR FOOD BANKS BECAUSE YOU'RE RIGHT SO THEY'RE
- 11 ALWAYS ASKING FOR OUR HELP AND I KNOW I GIVE A LOT OF
- 12 DISCRETIONARY DOLLARS TO FOOD BANKS AS WELL BUT THIS SEEMS
- 13 LIKE WE MIGHT ENGAGE THE LARGER PUBLIC IN WHAT WE SEE AS A
- 14 REAL SERIOUS LOOMING CRISIS AS IT RELATES TO PEOPLE GETTING
- 15 FOOD. SO THAT WOULD BE ONE. AND THEN EMILIO, I WAS JUST GOING
- 16 TO ASK YOU, YOU SAID THAT YOU WILL RUN OUT OF SECTION 8
- 17 FUNDING AND PUBLIC HOUSING OPERATION FUNDS. WE MAKE IT THROUGH
- 18 THE END OF THE YEAR, RIGHT? SO, IT'S LIKE AFTER DECEMBER 31ST
- 19 WE RUN OUT.

21 EMILIO SALAS: THAT'S CORRECT, SUPERVISOR.

- 23 SUP. JANICE HAHN: YEAH. SO, CAN YOU CLARIFY A LITTLE BIT WHAT
- 24 THAT MEANS FOR OUR TENANTS WHO BENEFIT FROM THESE PROGRAMS? IS
- 25 THERE A RISK OF SECTION 8 EVICTIONS OR IMPACTS TO OUR



1 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, AND WHAT KIND OF COMMUNICATION

2 ARE YOU DOING WITH OUR SECTION 8 RECIPIENTS AND LANDLORDS?

4 EMILIO SALAS: THANK YOU FOR THAT OUESTION, SUPERVISOR. SO JUST

- 5 TO GIVE SOME CONTEXT TO WHAT IT WOULD MEAN TO BOTH A PROPERTY
- 6 OWNER AND SOMEONE WHO IS RENTING A UNIT. SO JUST TAKE OUR
- 7 EMERGENCY HOUSING VOUCHER PROGRAM AS AN EXAMPLE. IN THAT
- 8 PARTICULAR PROGRAM, THE AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD PAYS ABOUT \$475 A
- 9 MONTH IN RENT, AND THE HOUSING ASSISTANCE PAYMENT IS ROUGHLY
- 10 BETWEEN \$2400 TO \$2500 ON AVERAGE. THAT WOULD BE THE DELTA
- 11 THAT THAT FAMILY AND THAT HOUSEHOLD WOULD NEED TO COME UP
- 12 WITH, SHOULD THE FUNDS RUN OUT. AND SO, FOR A HOUSEHOLD THAT'S
- 13 AT 30% AREA MEDIAN INCOME AND BELOW, IT IS ALMOST AN
- 14 IMPOSSIBLE TASK TO COME UP WITH THAT MONEY EVERY SINGLE MONTH.
- 15 FOR THE PROPERTY OWNER, OF COURSE, THEY ARE RELYING ON THAT
- 16 RENTAL REVENUE AND IN FACT JOINED THE SECTION 8 PROGRAM
- 17 BECAUSE IT WAS THE MOST SECURE AND THAT RENT WAS DIRECTLY
- 18 DEPOSITED INTO THEIR ACCOUNT ON THE FIRST OF EACH MONTH. SO
- 19 FOR THEM, IT WOULD THEN BE THE DIFFERENCE IN TRYING TO FIGURE
- 20 OUT HOW THEN TO PAY FOR THE MORTGAGES, INSURANCE, AND COSTS
- 21 ASSOCIATED WITH THE UPKEEP OF A RENTAL UNIT. SO THAT IS WHAT
- 22 WE'RE TALKING ABOUT AS IT RELATES TO IMPACT. WE'RE TALKING
- 23 ABOUT THE MOST VULNERABLE. WE'RE TALKING ABOUT FAMILIES WITH
- 24 CHILDREN, SENIORS, DISABLED, HOMELESS VETERANS, THAT GROUP.



- 1 SUP. JANICE HAHN: RIGHT. DOES, AFTER THE LAST SHUTDOWN, DID WE
- 2 GET SECTION 8 DOLLARS PAID BACK RETROACTIVELY? DURING THE LAST
- 3 SHUTDOWN WE DID NOT RUN OUT OF FUNDING SO THE GOVERNMENT
- 4 REOPENED WITHOUT ACTUALLY HAVING TO GO BACK RETROACTIVELY SO
- 5 THERE WAS ENOUGH FUNDING SUFFICIENTLY TO TAKE US THROUGH THE
- 6 END OF THAT SHUTDOWN. DO WE THINK THAT THAT'S AN OPTION?
- 7 GETTING THOSE DOLLARS PAID BACK OR NOT?

- 9 EMILIO SALAS: BECAUSE HUD HAS ALREADY OBLIGATED FUNDING ALL
- 10 THE WAY THROUGH DECEMBER 31ST, THERE WOULD BE NO RETROACTIVITY
- 11 NEEDED SHOULD THE GOVERNMENT OPEN BEFORE THEN. I KNOW, I'M
- 12 MEANING AFTERWARDS. AFTERWARDS THERE IS NO GUARANTEE THAT
- 13 THERE WOULD BE ANY SORT OF RETROACTIVE PAYMENT.

- 15 SUP. JANICE HAHN: WELL I THINK IT'S, YEAH, I REALLY DO THINK
- 16 IT'S KEY THAT WE IN SOME WAY COMMUNICATE, PARTICULARLY WITH
- 17 THE LANDLORDS, THAT WE'RE IN THIS PROBLEM, BUT WE EXPECT, YOU
- 18 KNOW, SOMEDAY FOR THE GOVERNMENT TO REOPEN AND THESE DOLLARS
- 19 WILL START FLOWING AGAIN BECAUSE AS YOU KNOW, WE ALREADY HAVE
- 20 SOMETIMES DIFFICULTY RECRUITING LANDLORDS TO PARTICIPATE IN
- 21 SECTION 8 PROGRAMS, BUT AS YOU SAID, IT REALLY IS THE MOST
- 22 SECURE WAY FOR THEM TO GET THEIR RENT PAID IN A TIMELY MANNER.
- 23 SO JUST, I THINK WE NEED TO REALLY HOLD THEIR HANDS THROUGH
- 24 THIS ONE, BECAUSE THE LAST THING WE WANT IS TO HAVE MORE
- 25 LANDLORDS PULL OUT AND WORSE, EVICT SOME OF THESE TENANTS. SO



- 1 ANY WORK YOU CAN DO WITH THE LANDLORDS AS WE SORT OF REALLY
- 2 WALK THIS LINE WOULD BE APPRECIATED. THANK YOU.

4 EMILIO SALAS: SURE, THANKS, SUPERVISOR.

- 6 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: ALL RIGHT, SEEING NO OTHER
- 7 SUPERVISORS THAT WISH TO SPEAK ON THIS, BUT I JUST HAVE ONE
- 8 REALLY QUICK QUESTION FOR YOU, JOE, BASED ON WHAT WE JUST
- 9 HEARD OVER HERE, AT WHAT POINT IS THE BOARD AT A FISCAL CLIFF
- 10 WITH A SHUTDOWN AS IT RELATES TO FINANCIALLY IMPACTING OUR
- 11 DELIVERY SERVICE? TO ME, CALWORKS, CALSNAP IS A VITAL PROGRAM,
- 12 BUT IT DOESN'T FALL UNDER THE CATEGORY, YOU SAID IT HAS TO GO

- 15 OTHER SERVICES GOING TO BE HIT WITH A FISCAL CLIFF? AND THEN
- 16 WHAT IS OUR OPTIONS?

- 18 JOSEPH NICCHITTA: SO, IN MY MIND, THE CLIFF HAPPENS ON OCTOBER
- 19 31ST IF THERE'S NO BACKFILL, THERE'S NO OPENING UP OF THE
- 20 GOVERNMENT OR SOME KIND OF APPROVAL OF SOME CONTINUING FUNDING
- 21 WHILE THEY CONTINUE TO DISCUSS REOPENING THE GOVERNMENT
- 22 BECAUSE THAT FUNDING IS SO SUBSTANTIAL. DR. CONTRERAS
- 23 MENTIONED IT, BUT SHE HAS AN ADMINISTRATIVE COMPONENT AS WELL
- 24 THAT'S BAKED IN THERE. THAT'S COUNTY STAFF. AND SO COME
- 25 OCTOBER 31ST, AND MAYBE A LITTLE BIT AFTER THAT, WE'RE GOING



- 1 TO RUN OUT OF MONEY TO PAY OUR OWN STAFF. AND SO IT'S REALLY
- 2 BARRELING DOWN UPON US. WE HAVEN'T GOTTEN THE FULLEST
- 3 UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT OTHER HAMMERS WILL DROP ACROSS OUR
- 4 ENTIRE PORTFOLIO PROGRAMS AT THIS POINT. WE'RE WORKING ON
- 5 THAT, BUT IT IS CLOSE, AND THAT IS WHY IT IS ALL HANDS ON DECK
- 6 FOR NOT ONLY OUR FOLKS IN DC, BUT EVERYBODY'S FOLKS IN DC TO
- 7 GET THE SHUTDOWN RESOLVED. WE DON'T KNOW WHEN THAT WILL HAPPEN
- 8 AND NOBODY CAN TELL ME WHAT THEY THINK WILL HAPPEN WITH ANY
- 9 SORT OF SPECIFICITY AT THIS POINT.

- 11 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: BUT YOU KNOW IS SPECIFICITY WHEN
- 12 WE WOULD BE IMPACTED BY NOT GETTING REIMBURSED FOR THE SUB
- 13 VENTED DEPARTMENTS AND THAT IS NOVEMBER 1ST?

15 JOSEPH NICCHITTA: NOVEMBER 1ST FOR DPSS, YEP.

- 17 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: TO ME THAT'S THE FIRST HAMMER TO
- 18 DROP FOR THE COUNTY. AND SO WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO BE
- 19 RECOMMENDING?

- 12 BENEFITS WOULD DRAIN OUR COFFERS IN A MATTER OF WEEKS AS WELL.
- 13 SO, I'M CONFIDENT SITTING HERE THAT I DON'T SEE A LOCALLY
- 14 FUNDED PATH TO KEEPING THESE BENEFITS MOVING FORWARD. IF
- 15 SOMETHING CHANGED AND THERE WERE SOME LAW PATHS THAT
- 16 GUARANTEED THAT WE WOULD BE REIMBURSED, WE CAN DISCUSS A
- 17 BRIDGE AND THEN IT BECOMES A CASHFLOW ISSUE, BUT THAT IS NOT
- 18 NECESSARILY THE MOST LIKELY SCENARIO AT THIS POINT.
- 20 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND WE'VE DEPLETED OUR RESERVE
- 21 THROUGH THE GONZALES BILL, THE 218.
- 23 JOSEPH NICCHITTA: WE HAVE NOT DEPLETED OUR RAINY DAY FUND.
- 25 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: NO, BUT WE'VE GOT ENOUGH IN SO IT



1 DOESN'T IMPACT OUR CREDIT RATING.

- 3 JOSEPH NICCHITTA: RIGHT. WE ARE ON A RAZOR THIN EDGE RIGHT
- 4 NOW. I THINK THAT'S THE PROBLEM. WE HAVE A RAINY-DAY FUND THAT
- 5 IS TO BACKFILL THE LOSS OF OUR LOCALLY GENERATED REVENUE AND
- 6 NOT THE LOSS OF FEDERALLY FUNDED ENTITLEMENT PROGRAMS. I THINK
- 7 USING THAT MONEY WOULD PUT OUR CREDIT RATING AT GREAT RISK AND
- 8 PUT US FINANCIALLY AT PRETTY SUBSTANTIAL RISK TOO. SO, WE'RE
- 9 NOT IN A GREAT PLACE TO FIND A BUNCH OF MONEY HERE. I THINK
- 10 WHAT WE CAN DO IS, THE BEST WE CAN DO IS SHAKE THE TREES AND
- 11 MAYBE ADD SOME ADDITIONAL FUNDING TO THE FOOD BANKS OR OTHER
- 12 ORGANIZATIONS THAT WILL HELP. BUT I DON'T SEE A PATH TO BACK
- 13 FILLING THESE FUNDS.

- 19 THE TERM ENTITLEMENT. SO AGAIN, REMIND ME, THE FEDERAL
- 20 GOVERNMENT DOESN'T DEEM CALWORK, SNAP, THOSE POVERTY
- 21 ALLEVIATION PROGRAMS ENTITLEMENTS.

- 23 DR. JACKIE CONTRERAS: SO, THEY ARE ALL ENTITLEMENTS, BUT THE
- 24 ALLOCATION NEEDS TO BE PROVIDED BY CONGRESS FOR CALWORKS AND
- 25 FOR SNAP. IT DOES NOT FOR MEDI-CAL. SO MEDI-CAL CAN CONTINUE



- 1 AS AN ENTITLEMENT. SO, IF SOMEBODY IS ELIGIBLE FOR THESE
- 2 PROGRAMS, THEY ARE ENTITLED TO THESE PROGRAMS. THAT REMAINS
- 3 THE SAME. BUT WHETHER OR NOT WE ACTUALLY HAVE THE CASH FLOW IS
- 4 WHAT'S AT ISSUE.

- 6 SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: MY, SINCE MY WHOLE CAREER HAS BEEN
- 7 ENTITLEMENT MET, GUARANTEED APPROPRIATION. I REMEMBER YEARS

- 3 DEPARTMENT. SO, IF WE COULD GO AHEAD. AGAIN, MR. ZENNER, THANK

- 6 JAMES ZENNER: YOU BET, SUPERVISOR. AND THANK YOU FOR HAVING ME
- 7 TODAY. SO, CHAIR AND MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, THANK YOU FOR THE
- 8 OPPORTUNITY TO PROVIDE CONTEXT ON IMMIGRANT VETERANS. FOR THE
- 9 RECORD, MY NAME IS JIM ZENNER. I SERVE AS THE DIRECTOR OF L.A.
- 10 COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY VETERAN AFFAIRS. AS THIS BOARD
- 11 KNOWS, L.A. COUNTY IS HOME TO ONE OF THE LARGEST VETERAN
- 12 POPULATIONS IN THE COUNTRY. AMONG THOSE VETERANS WHO HAVE
- 13 SERVED, THE CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH SERVICE ESTIMATES THAT 40%
- 14 OF FOREIGN-BORN VETERANS HAVE SERVED SINCE THE GLOBAL WAR ON
- 15 TERROR BEGAN IN 2001. MANY OF THESE VETERANS HAVE NATURALIZED,
- 16 BUT OTHERS REMAIN IN UNCERTAIN IMMIGRATION STATUS DESPITE
- 17 HONORABLE SERVICE TO OUR COUNTRY. UNFORTUNATELY, THERE IS ALSO

- 22 NOT TO SAY THAT THEY AREN'T HERE ON OTHER TYPES OF, SAY, I
- 23 DON'T WANT TO SAY VISA BUT GREEN CARDS AND WHAT HAVE YOU. AND
- 24 MANY OF THEM HAVE PROVIDED VERY MUCH NEEDED SERVICE SINCE AS
- 25 LONG AS I COULD REMEMBER, EVEN MY DAYS IN THE CONGRESS, I



- 1 RECALL SOME OF THE FIRST VICTIMS THAT WERE KILLED IN THE IRAO
- 2 WAR WERE IN FACT GREEN CARD SOLDIERS. AND THERE'S A WHOLE
- 3 LITANY OF INFORMATION REGARDING THAT. AND IT WAS UNFORTUNATE,
- 4 BECAUSE MANY WERE GRANTED POSTIVUS CITIZENSHIP AFTER THEY HAD
- 5 ALREADY BEEN KILLED IN ACTION. AND ONE OF THE THINGS THAT I
- 6 KNOW, MEMBERS OF CONGRESS, AND AT THE TIME THAT I WAS THERE,
- 7 WE WORKED VERY HARD TO SEE IF WE COULD GRANT THEM SOME KIND OF
- 8 CITIZENSHIP, AND ALSO A PATHWAY TO CITIZENSHIP. BUT WHAT'S
- 9 HAPPENING HERE RIGHT NOW IS EVEN A BIT MORE EGREGIOUS, BECAUSE

- 16 THIS COUNTRY. MANY OF THEM I HAVE MET OVER THE LAST SEVERAL
- 17 YEARS. SOME HAD STABILIZED FAMILIES THAT LIVE IN THE FIRST
- 18 DISTRICT THAT I HAD COME TO KNOW. AND I KNOW THAT IT'S A
- 19 SENSITIVE SITUATION RIGHT NOW, BUT I DO THINK IT'S WARRANTED
- 20 TO SUPPORT THIS LEGISLATION THAT CONGRESSMAN MARK TAKANO HAS
- 21 PUT FORWARD. AND WHAT IT DOES IS HELP US TO THINK ABOUT HOW TO
- 22 CREATE A PATHWAY FOR THESE INDIVIDUALS THAT SIGN UP NOW THAT
- 23 ARE IN THE MILITARY THAT DON'T HAVE PERMANENT STATUS HERE BUT
- 24 IT ALSO GIVES THEM AN OPPORTUNITY I THINK TO GIVE THAT KIND OF
- 25 ASSURANCES EVEN TO THEIR OWN FAMILIES BECAUSE ONCE THEY ARE



- 1 DEPORTED, THEIR BENEFITS ARE ALSO CUT OFF. THEY MAY HAVE
- 2 EARNED THOSE BENEFITS, BY THE WAY, FOR SERVICE THAT THEY
- 3 PROVIDED, BUT NONETHELESS BECAUSE THEY ARE NOT IN THE COUNTRY
- 4 OR THEY WERE DEPORTED, THEY CEASE TO RECEIVE THOSE BENEFITS.
- 5 AND I KNOW THERE'S BEEN AN EFFORT FOR LAST COUPLE OF YEARS, AT
- 6 LEAST ALMOST A DECADE OR MORE, THAT HAS FOCUSED ON THIS ISSUE.
- 7 AND I KNOW IT'S CAUGHT ATTENTION ON A BIPARTISAN LEVEL. SO IT
- 8 ISN'T JUST A DEMOCRATIC OR REPUBLICAN ISSUE, IT'S ONE THAT
- 9 IMPACTS SO MANY OF OUR MILITARY INDIVIDUALS ACROSS THE BOARD.
- 10 SO I DO SEE THIS AS A BILL THAT HAS BIPARTISAN SUPPORT, AND
- 11 THAT'S WHY I BROUGHT IT FORWARD TO SEE HOW WE COULD, AS A
- 12 BOARD, SUPPORT IT, SEND A LETTER OF SUPPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF
- 13 THE HOUSE, BUT ALSO TO GET OUR DEPARTMENTS, MILITARY, VETERANS
- 14 SERVICES, AS WELL AS OIA, TO CONTINUE TO PUSH OUT ASSISTANCE

- 1 DESERVE BETTER TREATMENT. THAT'S WHY THE MOTION BEFORE US IS
- 2 TO ASK FOR SUPPORT OF THE BILL AND ASK FOR OUR DEPARTMENTS TO
- 3 GET INVOLVED WITH THIS AND HELP TO CONTINUE TO EXPAND THE
- 4 SERVICES THAT WE CURRENTLY PROVIDE TO OUR VETERANS. AND I
- 5 WOULD JUST UNDERSCORE, THERE ARE MANY WOMEN, FEMALE VETERANS
- 6 THAT ALSO ARE IMPACTED. AND I DON'T KNOW THAT WE'RE DOING
- 7 ENOUGH TO ACTUALLY REACH OUT TO THEM AS WELL. AS YOU KNOW,

- 9 TIME, CHANGE HAS A LONG TIME COMING. AND IT'S LIKE EVERY,
- 10 EVERY ATTEMPT AT ANY KIND OF LEGISLATION, IT'S REALLY ABOUT
- 11 FINDING A PATHWAY TO CITIZENSHIP. AND THAT IS JUST SOMETHING
- 12 WE HAVE NOT PROVIDED OUR IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY SINCE THE '80S
- 13 WHEN PRESIDENT REAGAN DECLARED AMNESTY. AFTER THAT, THERE HAS
- 14 BEEN NO CLEAR WAY FOR PEOPLE TO HAVE A PATHWAY TO CITIZENSHIP.
- 15 THIS MAKES A LOT OF SENSE. I REMEMBER WHEN I WAS ON THE CITY
- 16 COUNCIL OF LOS ANGELES IN 2003, ONE OF THE VERY FIRST
- 17 SERVICEMEN KILLED IN IRAQ WAS JOSE GUTIERREZ, HE WAS 22, HE
- 18 WAS FROM GUATEMALA. HE WAS BASED AT CAMP PENDLETON. I THINK HE
- 19 WAS THE SECOND PERSON TO DIE IN THAT WAR. HE CAME FROM
- 20 GUATEMALA, HE CAME HERE WHEN HE WAS 16 WITHOUT PAPERS, BUT HE
- 21 SIGNED UP TO FIGHT AND WAS KILLED. AND A MONTH AFTER HE WAS
- 22 KILLED, HE WAS AWARDED CITIZENSHIP POSTHUMOUSLY. SO THERE IS,
- 23 THE GOVERNMENT DOES THAT, BUT IN A WAY THAT'S A LITTLE BIT OF
- 24 AN INSULT TO WAIT UNTIL THEY'VE GIVEN THE ULTIMATE SACRIFICE.
- 25 I FEEL LIKE EVERYONE WHO SIGNS UP AND GOES GIVES THE ULTIMATE



- 1 SACRIFICE OF THEIR LIVES, THEIR FAMILY'S LIVES, AND THEY LEAVE
- 2 BEHIND SO MUCH. SO, THANK YOU FOR BRINGING THIS FORWARD. I
- 3 WILL VOTE FOR IT. I SUPPORT US SUPPORTING THIS LEGISLATION. I
- 4 WANT TO THANK MARK TAKANO FOR THE WORK HE'S ALWAYS DONE IN

- 8 \$2,600,000 SIMILARLY IS USED TO INFUSE FUNDING INTO THE SAME
- 9 PROGRAM, THP+ PROGRAM. AND THEN THE HOUSING NAVIGATION AROUND
- 10 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$4,400,000 FUNDS THE HOUSING NAVIGATORS AS
- 11 YOU MENTIONED EARLIER, BUT NOT ONLY THEY ARE CASE MANAGERS
- 12 THAT REALLY HELP CONNECT THE YOUTH TO SERVICES AS NECESSARY,
- 13 SERVICES SUCH AS MENTAL HEALTH, MEDICAL CARE, SUBSTANCE USE
- 14 DISORDER, COMMUNITY SUPPORTS. THEY ALSO CHECK IN WITH YOUNG
- 15 ADULTS, AT LEAST ON A QUARTERLY BASIS OVER A TWO-YEAR PERIOD.
- 16 AND THEY ALSO IDENTIFY OR HELP THE YOUNG ADULT IDENTIFY LONG-
- 17 TERM PERMANENT HOUSING AS WELL. OUR DEPARTMENT CURRENTLY HAS
- 18 AN MOU WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE PROGRAM.
- 19 THERE ARE 14 PROVIDERS THAT SERVE OUR TAY ADULTS AND WITH
- 20 INTENSIVE CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES. THE FUNDING WILL ENSURE
- 21 THE CONTINUITY OF THE PROGRAM, ESPECIALLY IN THIS CLIMATE OF
- 22 UNCERTAINTY. FOR CURRENT CONTRACTS, IT'LL HELP MAINTAIN THE

- 23 COMMUNITY POWER COLLECTIVE, UTLA, AND SO MANY MORE
- 24 ORGANIZATIONS WHO JOINED US THIS MORNING FOR A PRESS
- 25 CONFERENCE ABOUT THIS VERY MOTION. BECAUSE WE ALL KNOW WHAT IS



- 1 HAPPENING IN OUR COMMUNITIES IS AN EMERGENCY. AND
- 2 UNFORTUNATELY, IT ISN'T NEW. FOR MONTHS, FAMILIES HAVE BEEN
- 3 LIVING UNDER THREAT. WORKERS HAVE BEEN KIDNAPPED FROM JOB
- 4 SITES AND CHILDREN HAVE BEEN COMING HOME TO EMPTY DINNER

- 10 PROPERTY. IT ALLOWS THE COUNTY TO REQUEST ASSISTANCE FROM THE

- 20 THOMAS J. FAUGHNAN: YES IT WOULD IF IT IS IN RESPONSE TO THE
- 21 EMERGENCY AND FOR THE PROTECTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY.

- 23 SUP. LINDSEY P. HORVATH: OKAY. I JUST WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT
- 24 WE ARE CLEAR ABOUT WHAT WE CAN AND CAN'T DO AND THAT WHILE

- 10 COUNTYWIDE. I DON'T THINK THAT WE COULD IMPOSE IT UPON PRIVATE
- 11 PROPERTY.

- 13 SUP. LINDSEY P. HORVATH: OK. WELL, I DO THINK THAT MAKING SURE
- 14 THAT WE ARE USING EVERY AVAILABLE TOOL THAT WE HAVE AND MOVING
- 15 WITH THE SENSE OF URGENCY THAT PEOPLE FELT DURING COVID, THAT
- 16 PEOPLE FEEL DURING THE FIRES AND OTHER EMERGENCIES THAT WE
- 17 HAVE RESPONDED TO, THAT WE ALSO HAVE TO MOVE WITH THE SAME
- 18 SENSE OF URGENCY TO PROTECT OUR RESIDENTS, BECAUSE WE KNOW

- 8 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. THANK YOU,
- 9 SUPERVISOR HORVATH FOR PARTNERING AND LETTING ME CO-AUTHOR
- 10 THIS MOTION. THANKS TO THE COUNTY COUNSEL FOR THE TIME AND
- 11 EFFORT YOU PUT INTO WRITING THIS PROCLAMATION OF EMERGENCY.
- 12 AND THIS IS VERY DIFFERENT. THE CIRCUMSTANCES THAT WE HAVE
- 13 FOUND OURSELVES IN BEFORE WHERE WE DECLARED EMERGENCY HAD TO
- 14 DO WITH WEATHER, FLOODS, FIRE, EARTHQUAKES, MOVING LAND, AND

- 22 NEVER CAME HOME AND THEY DON'T KNOW IF THEY WERE TAKEN BY
- 23 I.C.E. OR WHERE THEY'VE BEEN TAKEN. WE HAVE ENTIRE FAMILIES
- 24 WHO ARE DESTITUTE BECAUSE THEIR FATHERS OR MOTHERS WERE TAKEN
- 25 FROM THEIR WORKPLACES AND THEY HAVE NO WAY TO PAY THEIR RENT



- 1 OR PUT FOOD ON THE TABLE. THESE I.C.E. RAIDS ARE BEING CARRIED
- 2 OUT INDISCRIMINATELY AGAINST PEOPLE BASED ON THE COLOR OF
- 3 THEIR SKIN, WHERE THEY WORK, THEIR ACCENT. THEY ARE
- 4 TERRORIZING OUR RESIDENTS, BOTH IMMIGRANT AND NON-IMMIGRANT
- 5 ALIKE. SO LAST WEEK, MASS TO I.C.E. AGENTS RAIDED OUR OWN
- 6 COUNTY PARK IN SAN PEDRO, THE DEAN DANA FRIENDSHIP PARK, AND
- 7 TOOK THREE PEOPLE WHO WERE JUST THERE WALKING IN THE MORNING.
- 8 AND I WANT TO GIVE A BIG SHOUT OUT TO OUR COUNTY STAFF, MARIA
- 9 CHAVEZ PARTICULARLY, WHO WAS CALM AND COOL AND REALLY TRIED TO
- 10 HANDLE THE SITUATION THE BEST SHE COULD, EVEN WHEN THEY
- 11 THREATENED TO ARREST HER. L.A. COUNTY IS THE LARGEST COUNTY IN
- 12 THE NATION, BUT UP AGAINST THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, IT FEELS
- 13 LIKE WE'RE DAVID AND GOLIATH. WE'RE DAVID GOING AGAINST
- 14 GOLIATH. THAT HAS A GOOD ENDING AND MAYBE THIS WILL TOO. WE'RE

- 6 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: YES, THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I WANT TO THANK
- 7 SUPERVISOR HORVATH AND HAHN FOR BRINGING THIS MOTION, A
- 8 PROCLAMATION OF LOCAL EMERGENCY FOR FEDERAL IMMIGRATION IN THE
- 9 COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. WE HERE ON THE BOARD HAVE PASSED
- 10 SEVERAL INITIATIVES TO HELP SUPPORT OUR IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY,
- 11 ONE OF WHICH IS CREATING SENSITIVE LOCATIONS, THAT POLICY TO
- 12 HELP PROVIDE PROTECTIONS TO OUR RESIDENTS AS WELL AS TO OUR
- 13 OWN COUNTY EMPLOYEES. WE'VE ESTABLISHED REPRESENT L.A., A
- 14 DEFENSE FUND TO HELP MANY OF OUR RESIDENTS HERE AND WE HOPE TO
- 15 CONTINUE THAT EFFORT. BUT IT ISN'T JUST ABOUT THAT, IT'S ALSO
- 16 MAKING SURE THAT WE PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO OUR SMALL
- 17 BUSINESSES. WE'VE EVEN DEVELOPED A RESILIENCY FUND AND A CASH
- 18 AID PROGRAM TO HELP OUR FAMILIES. BUT WE KNOW THAT OUR DOLLARS
- 19 ARE SOMEWHAT LIMITED HERE IN THE COUNTY, AND WE NEED TO CALL

- 3 IN THE AUDIENCE, THAT ACTUALLY HAVE NOT CAUSED ANY CRIMINAL
- 4 ACTIVITY BUT NONETHELESS HAVE BEEN PICKED UP IN MANY WAYS AND
- 5 HAVE NOT BEEN OFFICIALLY CHARGED. SOME ARE STILL AWAITING TO
- 6 BE HEARD BEFORE A JUDGE AND SOME FROM L.A. COUNTY HAVE BEEN

- 13 HAVE A LOT OF WORK TO DO AND I KNOW THERE ARE MANY PEOPLE

- 15 THEM. MY HOPE IS THAT OTHER CITIES, SOME OF THE 88 CITIES WILL

- 23 EXPERIENCING. I THINK THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S ACTIONS HAVE
- 24 EMBOLDENED OTHERS TO COMMIT ACTS OF RACE-BASED VIOLENCE AND
- 25 HATE, THE HANGING OF YOUNG BLACK MEN, THE VERBAL AND PHYSICAL



- 1 ASSAULT OF PEOPLE OF ASIAN DESCENT, AND TARGETING INDIVIDUALS
- 2 WHO, FROM THEIR PERSPECTIVE, DON'T LOOK LIKE THEY'RE US
- 3 CITIZENS. I AM NOT REFERENCING HISTORICAL ACTIONS. THESE ARE
- 4 THINGS THAT ARE TAKING PLACE TODAY, EACH AND EVERY DAY IN OUR
- 5 COUNTY AND ACROSS THE COUNTRY. AND SO, I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT
- 6 THAT WE RESPOND THAT WE RESPOND SWIFTLY AND APPROPRIATELY. I,
- 7 AS A BOARD MEMBER WHO REPRESENTS COMMUNITIES LIKE LITTLE
- 8 ETHIOPIA AND KOREATOWN, REPRESENTING A SIGNIFICANT HAITIAN
- 9 POPULATION, I'M PAINFULLY AWARE OF WHAT OUR COMMUNITIES ACROSS
