KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: ALL RIGHT, WE WILL GET STARTED. 5 GOOD MORNING, WELCOME TO THE REGULARLY SCHEDULED MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. TODAY IS TUESDAY, 6 OCTOBER 7, 2025. WE TAKE NOTE THAT A QUORUM OF THE BOARD IS 7 8 PRESENT, THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER, COUNTY COUNSEL, 9 EXECUTIVE OFFICER, AND THE SERGEANT AT ARMS ARE ALL HERE TO 10 ASSIST. WE WILL BEGIN TODAY'S BOARD MEETING WITH THE COUNTY'S 11 LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT. 12 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR [VIDEO]: THE COUNTY OF LOS 13 14 ANGELES RECOGNIZES THAT WE OCCUPY LAND ORIGINALLY AND STILL INHABITED AND CARED FOR BY THE TONGVA, TATAVIAM, SERRANO, 15 KIZH, AND CHUMASH PEOPLES. WE HONOR AND PAY RESPECT TO THEIR 16 ELDERS AND DESCENDANTS PAST, PRESENT, AND EMERGING AS THEY 17 CONTINUE THEIR STEWARDSHIP OF THESE LANDS AND WATERS. WE 18 ACKNOWLEDGE THAT SETTLER COLONIZATION RESULTED IN LAND 19 20 SEIZURE, DISEASE, SUBJUGATION, SLAVERY, RELOCATION, BROKEN 21 PROMISES, GENOCIDE, AND MULTIGENERATIONAL TRAUMA. THIS 22 ACKNOWLEDGMENT DEMONSTRATES OUR RESPONSIBILITY AND COMMITMENT TO TRUTH, HEALING, AND RECONCILIATION AND TO ELEVATING THE 23 STORIES, CULTURE, AND COMMUNITY OF THE ORIGINAL INHABITANTS OF 24 LOS ANGELES COUNTY. WE ARE GRATEFUL TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO 25 LIVE AND WORK ON THESE ANCESTRAL LANDS. WE ARE DEDICATED TO

- 18 >> RABBI HEATHER MILLER: THANK YOU FOR THAT WARM INTRODUCTION.
- 19 I WANT TO EXPRESS GRATITUDE TO YOU AND THE ENTIRE BOARD FOR
- 20 INVITING ME HERE TODAY TO DELIVER THE INVOCATION, ESPECIALLY
- 21 ON SUCH A SIGNIFICANT DAY. I INVITE TO YOU ASSUME A POSITION
- 22 OF PRAYER IF IT IS YOUR CUSTOM. RESPECTED LEADERS OF THE
- 23 BELOVED COUNTY OF ANGELS, RESIDENTS AND VISITORS, I AM
- 24 GRATEFUL THIS DAY TO GATHER WITH YOU. TODAY IS THE FIRST DAY
- 25 OF A JEWISH HOLIDAY KNOWN AS SUCOT A HOLY DAY THAT REMEMBERS



- 1 WHEN THE ISRAEL IT'S DWELLED IN HUTS ALONG THEIR JOURNEY
- 2 THROUGH THE DESERT OVER 3,000 YEARS AGO. THIS WEEK MEMBERS OF
- 3 THE JEWISH COMMUNITY ARE COMMANDED TO DWELL IN THE SUCCAH A
- 4 STRUCTURE COMMANDED TO HAVE A ROOF BUT ONE THAT MUST BE OPEN
- 5 THAN IT IS CLOSED. WHEN WE DWELL IN THE SUCCHA WE ARE REMINDED
- 6 OF THE TENUOUS NATURE OF EXISTENCE, THE FRAGILITY OF LIFE,
- 7 SUBJECTED TO THE HOWLING WINDS, BRIGHT SUN, AND RAINS.
- 8 INCLUDING THE WIND, SUN, AND RAIN FORECASTED THIS WEEK. THIS
- 9 IS A WEEK WHEN WE FEEL OUR VULNERABILITY. TWO YEARS AGO TODAY,
- 10 OCTOBER 7, 2023, THE JEWISH COMMUNITY FELT THE STARTERING
- 11 VULNERABILITY OF LIFE, HAVING WITH ITTED ON TELEVISION THE
- 12 GRUESOME SLAUGHTER OF 1200 OF OUR CO-RELIGIONISTS AND OTHERS
- 13 IN ISRAEL. THE IMAGES AND VIVID COLOR AWAKENED GENERATIONAL
- 14 TRAUMA MANY OF US HADN'T FELT IN OUR LIFE TIMES. WE KNOW THOSE
- 15 WHO WEREN'T MURDERED WERE TAKEN HOSTAGE IN THE TIMES SENSE,
- 16 DWELLING IN TENUOUSLY, SUBJECTEDTO THE WHIMS OF THEIR CAPTORS.
- 17 EVERY SECOND, EVERY MINUTE, EVERY DAY FOR 727 DAYS NOW. THEIR
- 18 DAYS ARE STILL NOT GUARANTEED. THOSE IN ISRAEL ARE ENDSLESSLY
- 19 SUBJECTED TO SIRENS THAT ALERT THE COMMUNITY OF INCOMING
- 20 ROCKETS AND INDISCRIMINATE TERROR ATTACKS. NO ONE SHOULD LIVE
- 21 THAT KIND OF TENUOUS EXISTENCE. I'M FEELING THE CHILLING
- 22 VULNERABILITY OF THOSE WHO DWELL IN HUTS OF THEIR OWN MADE OF
- 23 RECLAIMED RUBBLE AND SCRAP METAL, RESOURCED FROM BOMBED-OUT
- 24 BUILDINGS AND REPURPOSED TARPS FROM AID PACKAGES, LIVING ON A
- 25 LITERAL BATTLEFIELD. HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF CIVILIANS



- 1 CONTINUED THREATS FROM EVERY SIDE. NO ONE SHOULD LIVE THAT
- 2 KIND OF TENUOUS EXISTENCE. LEADERS ARE MEANT TO PROTECT THEIR
- 3 PEOPLE FROM THAT KIND OF FRAGILITY OF LIFE, TO PROVIDE BASIC
- 4 SUSTANANCE AND INFRASTRUCTURE THAT PROVIDES TYPE PIPELINES TO
- 5 ADVANCEMENT, TO ENSURE DOMESTIC TRANQUILITY, TO PROMOTE THE
- 6 GENERAL WELFARE, TO PROVIDE FOR THE COMMON GOOD. TODAY HERE IN
- 7 LOS ANGELES, I LIFT YOU HAVE A PRAYER FOR THE ESTEEMED BODY OF
- 8 THE LOS ANGELES BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. MAY I ENCOURAGE THAT
- 9 CALL TO PROTECT THE COMMUNITY FROM THE HARSH WINDS OF
- 10 INDIFFERENCE. PROTECT RESIDENTS FROM THE BLAZING HEAT OF
- 11 HATRED. MAKE DECISIONS THAT CONTRIBUTE TO THE STABILITY AND
- 12 FLOURISHING OF ALL IN THE REGION REGARDLESS OF RACE, RELIGION,
- 13 AGE, CREED, SEXUAL ORIENTATION, STATUS, INCOME, ABILITY,
- 14 NATIONAL STATUS OR PRIMARY LANGUAGE. SOY THAT ALL MAY BE NOT
- 15 ONLY TRANOUIL BUT SO THAT ALL MAY THRIVE. AND MAY YOU BE
- 16 BLESSED AS YOU DO SO. AMEN.

- 23 MILLER WAS NAMED A GIANT OF JUSTICE BY CLUE L.A. SHE SERVED AS
- 24 COMMISSIONER ON THE LOS ANGELES SHERIFF'S CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT
- 25 COMMISSION AND CONTINUES TO ADVANCE RACIAL AND ECONOMIC EQUITY

- 2 JEWISH JUSTICE ALLIANCE. I KNOW YOUR FAMILY FACES ARE MY

- 6 EMBEDDED AT DPH. WITH THE FURLOUGHING OF THAT STAFF PLUS THE
- 7 50% OF THE HHS STAFF THAT HAVE BEEN FURLOUGHED WE HAVE THREE
- 8 BIG ISSUES OF THE FIRST IS COMMUNICATIONS ISSUE. IT'S NOT JUST
- 9 COMMUNICATIONS ABOUT OUR DAY TO DAY WORK. ALL OF OUR CALLS,
- 10 OUR NATIONAL CALLS AROUND MEASLES, H5N1, AROUND RESPONDING TO
- 11 THREATS FROM ABROAD ARE CANCELLED. ALL OF THE REPORTS THAT WE
- 12 GET FROM CDC AROUND EMERGING DISEASES AND OUTBREAKS ARE ALSO
- 13 PAUSED INDEFINITELY. SO THERE IS A VACUUM. WE COLLECT
- 14 INFORMATION ON WHAT IS HAPPENING LOCALLY, AND THE STATE DOES A
- 15 GOOD JOB AROUND THE STATE. BUT WE HAVE NO SENSE AS WE HEAD
- 16 INTO RESPIRATORY VIRUS SEASON OF WHAT THE SCOPE OF THE WORK IS
- 17 THAT NEEDS TO BE DONE TO GET PREPARED BECAUSE ALL OF OUR
- 18 NATIONAL DATA REPORTS AND OUR NATIONAL MEETINGS TO CONNECT
- 19 WITH EACH OTHER AND SHARE INFORMATION ARE PAUSED INDEFINITELY
- 20 BECAUSE THEY'RE THE STAFF IS NOT THERE. THE SECOND IMPACT IS
- 21 WE DO RECEIVE A LOT OF FEDERAL GRANTS. WHILE IN GENERAL WE
- 22 SHOULD BE ABLE TO DRAW DOWN FUNDING THAT'S NOT TRUE FOR ANY
- 23 DRAWDOWNS THAT INVOLVE THE STAFF REVIEW. AS YOU KNOW, WITH
- 24 EXECUTIVE ORDERS, THERE ARE STAFF REVIEWS ON ALMOST EVERY
- 25 GRANT THAT WE HAVE. IT'S NOT REALLY CLEAR, WE DON'T HAVE THE



- 1 LIST OF WHICH ONES HAVE BEEN DESIGNATED FOR REVIEW. BUT COULD
- 2 MEAN THAT, IN FACT, MUCH OF OUR FUNDING GETS DELAYED ON THE
- 3 DRAWDOWNS. WE WON'T KNOW UNTIL WE SUBMIT OUR INVOICES AND
- 4 THEY'RE NOT PAID BECAUSE OF THIS SORT OF GRANT REVIEW
- 5 REOUIREMENT PUT IN PLACE THIS SUMMER. THEY HAVE ALSO
- 6 FURLOUGHED UP TO 90% OF THE EPA STAFF IS FURLOUGHED, THEY HELP
- 7 US WITH CHIQUITA CANYON RESPONSES THAT REQUIRE AN EPA
- 8 RESPONSE. THEY'RE FURLOUGHED. THE FDA FURLOUGHED 80% TO 90% OF
- 9 THEIR STAFF. THEY HELP US SECURE OUR FOOD SAFETY ISSUES AND
- 10 PARTICULARLY ARE HELPFUL ON INVESTIGATING BIRD FLU ON THE
- 11 CONNECTION WITH THE POULTRY FARMS AND CATTLE FARMS. WE HAVE
- 12 IMPACT ON FEMA WITH A LOT OF STAFF FURLOUGHED. WHILE THEY WILL
- 13 BE ABLE TO RESPOND TO EMERGENCY SITUATIONS, ONGOING RESPONSE
- 14 ACTIVITIES MAY HAVE A LOT OF STAFF THAT ARE FURLOUGHED THAT
- 15 ARE NO LONGER ABLE TO HELP US. I DO WANT TO POINT OUT THAT ONE
- 16 OF THE BIGGEST THREATS TO US IS, HOWEVER, THE THREAT OF THE
- 17 PREMIUMS NOT BEING SUBSIDIZED STARTING IN A COUPLE OF MONTHS.
- 18 SO WE'RE VERY CONCERNED THAT WE WOULD HAVE MILLIONS AND
- 19 MILLIONS OF PEOPLE IN CALIFORNIA BECOME UNINSURED IF THE
- 20 PREMIUMS DON'T GET EXTENDED. ONE OF THE ISSUES THAT WE HOPE
- 21 GETS RESOLVED, WITH A CONTINUING RESOLUTION, IS THAT WE DO SEE
- 22 THE EXTENSION OF THE OBAMACARE PREMIUM SUBSIDIES FOR PEOPLE ON
- 23 PRIVATE INSURANCE. I THINK THAT SUMMARIZES THE IMPACT ON
- 24 PUBLIC HEALTH.

- 13 SUBSIDY, THAT CAUGHT ME ATTENTION, 50 MILLION EVERY MONTH. AND
- 14 YOU HAVE ENOUGH TO GET YOU THROUGH MID-NOVEMBER?

- 16 >> EMILIO SALAS: MID-NOVEMBER WITH HUD FUNDING. WE HAVE
- 17 RESERVED -- TO DRAW FROM BEYOND THAT, CORRECT.

- 19 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND THEN I DON'T KNOW, FESIA,
- 20 IF THIS PERTAINS ON THE SERVICE SIDE OF IT, BUT THIS MORNING
- 21 WHEN I WAS DRIVING IN I HEARD THAT THERE WAS A COMMENT THERE'S
- 22 GOING TO BE NO RETROACTIVE PAY. I'M WONDERING IF THAT INCLUDES
- 23 RETROACTIVE PAYMENTS TO COUNTIES. IT WASN'T CLEAR BUT I KNOW
- 24 FOR EMPLOYEES THEY'RE SAYING THEY WILL NOT GET ANY RETROACTIVE

- 2 >> FESIA DAVENPORT: I'M GOING TO ASK, I KNOW DR. GHALY
- 3 MENTIONED SOMETHING ABOUT ONE OF THE PROGRAMS BEING AN
- 4 ENTITLEMENT PROGRAM.

- 6 >> DR. GHALY: THE COMMENT ON RETROACTIVE PAY WOULD NOT
- 7 NECESSARILY APPLY TO ANY DECISION MADE BY THE FEDERAL
- 8 GOVERNMENT ABOUT THE DSH CUTS, EXTEND THE DELAY, APPLYING
- 9 RETROACTIVELY. THE EXPECTATION AND ANTICIPATION IS THAT IT
- 10 WOULD APPLY. AND THEN IRRESPECTIVE OF THE DELAY FROM A PAYMENT
- 11 STANDPOINT, ONCE THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS BACK UP AND

- 17 TO THE SHUTDOWN, CORRECT? THAT'S BEEN SOMETHING THAT YOU'VE

- 20 >> DR. GHALY: YES, BUT THEY'VE BEEN SUBSEQUENTLY DELAYED EVERY
- 21 YEAR.

- 23 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: RIGHT, KEEP MOVING IT AND JUST
- 24 DELAYING. WHAT I WOULD SAY TO OUR TEAM BACK IN D.C. TO MAKE
- 25 SURE THAT WE'RE WATCHING THAT, BECAUSE IF YOU HAD TOLD ME AND



- 1 I THINK MY COLLEAGUES WOULD AGREE, YOU WERE BACK IN D.C. AND I
- 2 MEAN TO SAY YOU AREN'T GOING TO GET RETROACTIVE PAY FOR
- 3 EMPLOYEES, ESPECIALLY SOME THAT ARE ACTUALLY WORKING. IS
- 4 PROBLEMATIC TO SAY THE LEAST. I'M HOPING THAT WE MAKE SURE
- 5 WE'RE DILIGENT IN ENSURING THAT THE IMPACT TO OUR LABOR FORCE
- 6 AND THE WORK WE DO IS NOT IMPACTED. EMILIO, ARE YOU TALKING TO
- 7 OTHER COUNTIES IN TERMS OF THE SECTION 8 AND HOW THEY'RE GOING
- 8 ABOUT, AND WHAT THEIR PLANS ARE?

- 10 >> EMILIO SALAS: OTHER COUNTIES, ARE IN DIFFERENT SITUATIONS
- 11 DEPENDING ON THE RESERVE LEVELS THEY HAVE INDIVIDUALLY. SOME 2
- 12 TO 3 MONTHS, OURS IS ONLY ONE MONTH SINCE WE'RE VERY
- 13 AGGRESSIVE WITH OUR LEASEUP. WE DON'T HAVE ADEQUATE RESERVES.

14

- 15 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: AND FESIA, WITH THE SHUTDOWN
- 16 HOW IS THAT GOING TO IMPACT OUR DISASTER RESPONSE, IN OUR OWN
- 17 RECOVERY EFFORTS? I KNOW THAT WE HAVE BEEN FOCUSED ON
- 18 INFRASTRUCTURE WORKING TOWARD REBUILD. AND WORKING WITH FEMA,
- 19 WORKING WITH THE EPA. SO I JUST WANT -- WONDER HOW THAT IS
- 20 GOING TO IMPACT OUR ABILITY TO KEEP MOVING FORWARD.

- 22 >> FESIA DAVENPORT: SO THE LATEST UPDATE THAT I HAVE FROM MY
- 23 TEAM IS THAT THE FEMA DISASTER RESPONSE IS STILL OPERATIONAL.
- 24 AND FEMA IS STILL PROCESSING WILDFIRE REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAMS
- 25 AND CLAIMS AND ACTIVELY COORDINATING WITH CAL OES. WE KNOW WE



- 1 HAVE HEARD COMING OUT OF WASHINGTON, D.C. DIFFERENT COMMENTS
- 2 ABOUT FEMA AND I THINK THERE IS A HEIGHTENED FOCUS ON THE
- 3 FUTURE FEMA. I CAN SAY TODAY, WE ARE -- THEY ARE ACTIVE AND
- 4 THEY ARE PROCESSING CLAIMS. ON THE FEMA NONEMERGENCY RESPONSE
- 5 PROGRAMS SUCH AS TRAINING, WE WORK WITH FEMA EACH YEAR AND
- 6 WILL DO, LIKE, A DISASTER PREPARATION TRAINING THAT'S OFFERED
- 7 BY THE NATURAL DISASTER AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT UNIVERSITY.
- 8 THOSE TYPES OF THINGS ARE ON HOLD FOR NOW. AND WE ANTICIPATE
- 9 BUT DON'T ASSUME THAT THEY WILL BE REINSTATED WHEN FUNDING IS
- 10 ENACTED.

- 12 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: I HAVE A QUESTION OUT OF
- 13 CURIOSITY, DO THE SENATE AND CONGRESS AND THEIR STAFFS GET
- 14 PAID OR IS THEIR PAY WITHHELD AS WELL?

15

16 >> ANGELA OVALLE: THEY ARE BEING PAID.

17

- 18 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY. WELL, I MEAN, I'M GLAD
- 19 THEY'RE DEFERRING IT. BUT THE DECISIONMAKERS THAT SHOULD FEEL
- 20 THE PINCH ARE GOING TO STILL CONTINUE TO GET PAID AS ARE THEIR
- 21 STAFF.

- 23 >> WELL, MORE TO COME ON THIS. I THINK IT IS INCREDIBLY
- 24 FRUSTRATING TO KNOW THAT WE TALKED WITH THIS WHEN YOU
- 25 PRESENTED YOUR BUDGET, ALMOST THREE QUARTERS OF OUR BUDGET IS



- 1 GOING TO THE MOST VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES IN L.A. COUNTY. OF
- 2 WHICH WE GET MUCH OF OUR FUNDING THROUGH THE FEDERAL
- 3 GOVERNMENT AND THE STATE. AND I HOPE THAT THOSE LEADERS
- 4 ACTUALLY LOOK THE WORD UP AND BEGIN TO LEAD BACK IN D.C. BOTH
- 5 SIDES OF THE AISLE. THIS IS NOT ONE OR THE OTHER TO ME, THEY
- 6 ALL NEED TO WORK TOGETHER. AT THE END OF THE DAY THE IMPACT
- 7 HITS LOCAL. AND WE SEE IT UP CLOSE AND PERSONAL WITH OUR
- 8 CONSTITUENTS WHO ARE DEPENDING UPON US AS A SAFETY NET. THANK
- 9 YOU FOR YOUR UPDATE AND I LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH YOU TO
- 10 ADDRESS THIS ISSUE. SUPERVISOR HORVATH?

- 12 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: THANK YOU. THIS IS CRITICAL REPORT,
- 13 THANK YOU ALL FOR BEING HERE THIS MORNING TO HELP US
- 14 UNDERSTAND WHAT IT WILL ACTUALLY LOOK LIKE. I KNOW THESE
- 15 THREATS ARE REAL, THEY'RE SIGNIFICANT, AND CONCERNING TO ALL
- 16 OF US AT EVERY LEVEL OF COMMUNITY. I WAS IN BEVERLY HILLS LAST
- 17 NIGHT WITH COMMUNITY MEMBERS FROM ALL OVER THE THIRD DISTRICT.
- 18 SHARING WHAT THE IMPACTS ARE BEING -- HOW THE IMPACTS ARE FELT

- 12 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: ONE ISSUE THAT WAS RAISED TO US LEE
- 13 SENTLY, THAT THE -- RECENTLY THE ASSET LIMIT TEST IS CHANGING
- 14 WITH REGARD TO MEDI-CAL. CONCERNS AROUND THAT. THE STATE HAS
- 15 BEEN WORKING TO NOTIFY THOSE WHO WILL BE IMPACTED. COUNTYWIDE
- 16 IT COULD BE AS MANY AS 2 MILLION OR MORE. IF THE SHUTDOWN
- 17 LASTS SEVERAL MONTHS, AND DOES GO BEYOND DECEMBER WHICH WOULD
- 18 BE HORRIFYING, SO I UNDERSTAND WILL THOSE CHANGES BE IMPACTED

- 24 WHAT HAPPENS AFTER DECEMBER, IT IS AN ENTITLEMENT, I THINK
- 25 THAT WAS ALLUDED TO, THEY WOULD HAVE TO REAUTHORIZED FOR THE



- 1 NEXT OUARTER. IF IT WASN'T REAUTHORIZED THEN THAT WOULD BE A
- 2 MUCH LARGER ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION TAKEN TO NOT FUND A MANDATE.

- 4 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: I THINK THE MESSAGE HERE IS,
- 5 ESPECIALLY OVER THE NEXT MONTH SINCE THERE ARE SOME THINGS
- 6 THAT COULD BE IN JEOPARDY BY THE END OF THIS MONTH, WE HAVE TO
- 7 MAKE SURE WE'RE MAKING OUR VOICES CLEAR AND CONNECTING WITH
- 8 THOSE WITH WHOM WE HAVE RELATIONSHIP IN OTHER STATES TO MAKE
- 9 SURE THAT THE IMPACT IS KNOWN TO ALL OF THE LEGISLATORS WHO
- 10 HAVE A ROLE TO PLAY IN CHANGING THESE DECISIONS. I HEAR YOU,

- 21 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: YES, THANK YOU FOR THE PRESENTATION, TO
- 22 ALL OF YOU. I THINK WE ARE REALLY IN A TENUOUS SITUATION. 7
- 23 DAYS. WHILE SOME PEOPLE THINK IT'S NOT A LONG TIME IT IS. LOOK
- 24 AT WHAT HAPPENED AT BURBANK AIRPORT AND TWO OTHER AIRPORTS IN
- 25 THE COUNTRY. THIS IS GOING TO HAPPEN, A SLOW ROLLOUT AND IT IS



- 1 A STRATEGY IN MY OPINION. BOTH WAYS, DEMOCRATS, BUT
- 2 REPUBLICANS ALSO HAVE SOME BLAME HERE. I WANT TO POINT THAT
- 3 OUT. I THINK PART OF THE ARGUMENT, OR THE MISINFORMATION
- 4 THAT'S BEING PRESENTED IS THAT THE REASON WHY WE'RE NOT ABLE
- 5 TO COME TO, WHAT CAN I SAY, AN AGREEMENT ON THE BUDGET IS
- 6 BECAUSE DEMOCRATS DON'T WANT TO MEET AT THE TABLE AND THEY
- 7 WANT TO SOMEHOW EXTEND COVERAGE FOR THE 800 WHATEVER ELEPHANT
- 8 IN THE ROOM BLAMING IT ON UNDOCUMENTED. THAT IS SO FALSELY

- 15 OTHER PARTS OF THE COUNTRY THAT ARE FURLOUGHED RIGHT NOW,
- 16 DON'T HAVE -- ARE NOT GOING TO WORK, MAYBE MAKE LESS THAN
- 17 34,000 A YEAR, I HEARD IN UTAH THERE WAS A SMALL TOWN
- 18 IMPACTED, THE MAJORITY OF THE WORKFORCE IS EMPLOYED BY THE
- 19 IRS. 34,000, 40,000, 50,000 IS IN THE A LOT OF MONEY COMPARED
- 20 TO CALIFORNIA. BUT WITH THAT RESOURCE BEING TAKEN OUT, THERE
- 21 IS NO CONTINUING SUPPORT FOR LOCAL BUSINESSES. ALL THE MOM AND
- 22 POPS, HOTELS, THE RESTAURANTS, ALL OF THE OTHER SUPPLEMENTAL
- 23 SERVICES THAT ARE OFFERED THERE AROUND THOSE EMPLOYEES ALL OF
- 24 THAT IS SHUTTERED. IT IS A WEEK ALREADY. WE NEED TO THINK
- 25 ABOUT HOW WE LOOK AT THE ECONOMIC IMPACT THAT THIS IS HAVING



- 1 IN L.A. COUNTY. WHILE WE TALK ABOUT VITAL SERVICES, WE'RE ALSO
- 2 TALKING ABOUT THE TRIPLE IMPACT THAT HAPPENS ALSO TO OUR SMALL
- 3 BUSINESSES, PEOPLE THAT RELY ON THESE SERVICES, AND THE FACT
- 4 THAT NOW WE'RE GOING TO ASK FOR EXAMPLE OUR L.A. REGIONAL FOOD
- 5 BANK TO PICK UP THIS LOSS. THEY HAVE ALREADY ASKED US TIME AND
- 6 TIME AGAIN FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING. WE ARE TRYING TO GET SOME
- 7 OF THAT THROUGH, I KNOW THROUGH OTHER RESOURCES, PERHAPS CFCI
- 8 OR OTHER SOURCES THAT WE MAY HAVE. I'M JUST THROWING THAT ONE
- 9 OUT, WE ARE TALKING ABOUT A HEAVILY IMPACTED AND

- 16 BUSINESSES OF THE SMALL BUSINESSES ARE IMPACTED THE MOST. I'VE
- 17 SEEN THIS RECORD BEFORE, WENT THROUGH WHEN IT I WAS BACK THERE
- 18 IN THE ADMINISTRATION, AND IT IS DEVASTATING. I WOULD FURTHER
- 19 SAY THAT SOME OF THE GRANTS THAT YOU ALL ARE WAITING ON RIGHT
- 20 NOW, THEY MAY NOT BE PROCESSED. I SAID THIS AT A MEETING
- 21 BEFORE, BECAUSE WHAT WILL HAPPEN IS IF YOU DON'T HAVE CIVIL
- 22 SERVANTS THERE TO PROCESS AND EVALUATE AND GIVE THE REVIEW YOU
- 23 WILL LOSE OUT ON THAT MONEY. IT MEANS THAT WE HAVE TO BE
- 24 BETTER PREPARED ALSO JUST IN CASE THAT WE CAN TELL OUR CLIENTS
- 25 BUT ALSO OUR STAFF WHAT IS ACTUALLY HAPPENING. MY QUESTION TO



- 1 YOU, IS HOW ARE WE GOING TO PREPARE TO GIVE THEM THIS CAUTION,
- 2 BUT CAUTION WITH EVIDENCE. AND NOT JUST WHERE PEOPLE CAN GET
- 3 HELP BUT WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO THEN TO CALL ON THE COUNTY SO
- 4 THAT WE CAN ALSO HELP PROVIDE SOME BRIDGE WHERE WE CAN. AND
- 5 THAT TO ME IS MOST IMPORTANT RIGHT NOW. ESPECIALLY WHEN I HEAR
- 6 ABOUT THE ENORMOUS NUMBER OF YOUNG CHILDREN IN THE CAL WORKS
- 7 PROGRAM THAT WILL BE IMPACTED. THOSE CHILDREN CAN'T FEND. THEY
- 8 CAN'T COME UP HERE AND SPEAK TO THE BOARD. BUT THEY NEED TO BE
- 9 DEFENDED. I WOULD HOPE THAT WE CAN SOMEHOW FIGURE OUT, I WOULD
- 10 LOVE TO HEAR THAT REPORTBACK FROM OUR CEO, WHERE WE CAN HELP
- 11 OFF-RAMP OR HELP OUT IN SOME WAY. I'M VERY DISTURBED WHAT WILL
- 12 HAPPEN TO OUR HUD, OUR VOUCHER, OUR SECTION 8 PROGRAMS. I KNOW
- 13 I DON'T HAVE THE MAJORITY OF THEM IN MY DISTRICT I HAVE A
- 14 SUBSTANTIAL NUMBER. AND I WANT TO KNOW, EMILIO, ASKING YOU TOO
- 15 ON TOP OF THAT, HOW ARE WE GOING TO NAVIGATE THIS MESSAGE TO
- 16 OUR COMMUNITY AND HOW ARE WE GOING TO DO IT IN A MULTI LINGUAL
- 17 SETTING. NOT JUST SPANISH, WE HAVE AAPI, ARMENIAN, SO MANY
- 18 OTHER LANGUAGES WHAT ARE WE DOING AND CAN YOU GIVE ME SOME
- 19 IDEA. THAT ISN'T JUST FOR EMILIO, THAT'S FOR THE OTHER
- 20 DEPARTMENTS. EMILIO I'LL START WITH YOU.

- 22 >> EMILIO SALAS: THANK YOU. WE ARE CERTAINLY WORKING WITH ALL
- 23 OF THE VARIOUS GROUPS THAT WILL BE IMPACTED. ONE GROUP THAT I
- 24 FAILED TO MENTION ARE THE NONPROFIT DEVELOPERS THAT HAVE
- 25 THOUSAND OF PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING UNITS SUPPORTING



- 1 PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS. WE'RE WORKING THROUGH WITH
- 2 THEM TO FIGURE OUT WHAT OTHER ALTERNATIVE FUNDING SOURCES THEY
- 3 CAN TAP INTO, OR IF THEY HAVE REPLACEMENT RESERVES IN THEIR
- 4 DEVELOPMENTS THEY CAN PIVOT AND USE THOSE FUNDS TEMPORARILY
- 5 WHILE THE SHUTDOWN GETS RESOLVED.

- 7 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: WHAT IS THAT NUMBER TO GIVE US AN IDEA?
- 8 AS YOU RAISE IT.

- 10 >> EMILIO SALAS: WE HAVE OVER 5,000 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE
- 11 HOUSING UNITS WITH THE COUNTY ALONE. WHEN YOU LOOK AT THE
- 12 REGION, WELL OVER 15,000 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING
- 13 DEVELOPMENTS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. THOSE
- 14 DEVELOPERS OPERATE ON A THIN MARGIN. THEY CANNOT BEAR NOT
- 15 RECEIVING THAT RENTAL SUBSIDY PAYMENT. WE HAVE, OF THE 10,000
- 16 LIFE PLUS PROPERTY OWNERS THE VAST MAJORITY ARE SMALL MOM AND
- 17 POP PROPERTY OWNERS, ONE, TWO, THREE UNITS AND RELY ON THAT
- 18 RENTAL PAYMENT. ONE OF THE LONG LASTING EFFECTS IS THE IMPACT
- 19 OF THIS WILL REACH WELL BEYOND THE SHUTDOWN. IF WE AREN'T ABLE
- 20 TO MAKE THOSE PAYMENTS. THE RECRUITMENT OF PROPERTY OWNERS IS
- 21 ONE OF THE MOST DIFFICULT THINGS. THE BIGGEST SELLING POINTS
- 22 IS THAT THAT RENTAL PAYMENT WILL BE THERE EVERY SINGLE MONTH.
- 23 IT IS A SURE THING. IF WE'RE NOT ABLE TO MAKE THAT RENTAL
- 24 PAYMENT IT WILL TURN A LOT OF PROPERTY OWNERS OFF TO THE
- 25 SECTION 8 PROGRAM AND WE WILL BE IN A SITUATION WHERE IT WILL



- 1 BE MUCH MORE DIFFICULT TO USE THOSE VOUCHERS. WE HAVE ADDED ON
- 2 TOP OF THAT THE EMERGENCY HOUSING VOUCHERS THAT ARE SET TO
- 3 EXPIRE. WE WERE ABOUT TO ISSUE A COMMUNICATION TO THOSE 1,300
- 4 FAMILIES THEY HAD ONE YEAR BEFORE THAT FUNDING RUNS OUT. WE
- 5 NOW NEED TO ISSUE A DIFFERENT TYPE OF COMMUNICATION ON WHAT
- 6 WILL HAPPEN SHOULD THE SHUTDOWN BE PROLONGED. WE'RE LOOKING AT
- 7 HOW TO MESSAGE THAT IN A WAY THAT DOESN'T CREATE PANIC. BUT IN
- 8 THE WAY THAT INFORMS THEM AND LETS THEM KNOW THAT THEY'RE
- 9 GOING TO BE ABLE TO REMAIN IN THEIR UNITS AND FIGURE OUT A WAY
- 10 FORWARD.

- 12 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: I THINK THE TIME IS ALSO FOR US TO THINK
- 13 ABOUT REACHING OUT TO OTHER ORGANIZATIONS WHETHER THEY BE
- 14 FAITH-BASED TO HELP US. WHETHER WE LIKE IT OR NOT, IF THIS
- 15 GOES ON FOR ANOTHER MONTH, IT'S GOING TO IMPACT PEOPLE'S
- 16 LIVES. I WOULD THINK THAT MANY, I KNOW IN MY COMMUNITY, WILL
- 17 GO TO THE FAITH-BASED ORGANIZATIONS FIRST OFF TO ASK FOR HELP.
- 18 HOW ARE WE COORDINATING WITH THEM? I WOULD ASK US TO DO THAT
- 19 IF WE NEED TO KEEP THAT IN MIND RIGHT NOW. BUT THANK YOU. AND
- 20 THEN DPSS, YOU HAVE A TREMENDOUS CHALLENGE HERE.

- 22 >> MICHAEL SYLVESTER: YES, SUPERVISOR. OUR PROGRAMS ARE NOT
- 23 SMALL IN ANY WAY. BY PERSONS SERVED OR DOLLARS FUNDED. SO WE
- 24 HAVE LIMITED OPTIONS IN TERMS OF FINDING REPLACEMENT FUNDING.
- 25 SO WE'RE WORKING VERY CLOSELY WITH THE STATE ON WHAT KIND OF



- 1 CONTINGENCY PLAN COULD BE MADE HERE. AS YOU KNOW THE FEDERAL
- 2 SHUTDOWNS ACROSS ALL ASPECTS OF THE STATE. WE'RE JUST TRYING
- 3 TO IDENTIFY IS THERE ANYTHING AFTER OCTOBER THAT WOULD BE
- 4 THERE AS A BUFFER. SO FAR WE HAVE NOT GOTTEN CONFIRMATION ON
- 5 THAT BUT THAT'S WHERE WE LEAN TOWARDS. WE'RE REACHING OUT TO
- 6 COMMUNITY PARTNERS THAT CAN'T MAKE UP THE DIFFERENCE. BUT TO
- 7 EDUCATE OUR CUSTOMERS ON WHAT OTHER OUTLETS THERE ARE FOR FOOD
- 8 BENEFITS. THE REGIONAL FOOD BANK IS A WONDERFUL PARTNER
- 9 ALWAYS. AND THEY'RE ALREADY STRETCHED THIN. BUT IN TERMS OF
- 10 JUST CAL WORKS ALONE, IT'S 1.4 BILLION, ABOUT 117 MILLION
- 11 ASSISTANCE GOING STRAIGHT TO THE PUBLIC MONTHLY. THAT IS NOT
- 12 SURPLANTABLE. WE'RE WORKING WITH OUR STATE PARTNERS, WHAT IS
- 13 THE ONLY OTHER ENTITY THAT HAS THE KIND OF FUNDING WHERE WITH
- 14 ALL.

- 16 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: YOU SAID YOU'RE TALKING TO THE GOVERNOR
- 17 OR FOLKS UP THERE?

- 19 >> MICHAEL SYLVESTER: YES, ADMINISTRATION, TOP LEADERSHIP, THE
- 20 DIRECTORS IN CDSS HAVE HAD CONVERSATIONS WITH JACKIE WEEKLY.
- 21 WE'RE STAYING ON TOP OF THIS. WE'RE THIS CLOSE. WE JUST TALKED
- 22 ABOUT IT, OCTOBER IS THE ONLY ONE THAT WE HAVE ANY ASSURANCE
- 23 ACROSS THE PROGRAMS.

24

25 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: I'M CERTAIN THERE'S PROBABLY GOING TO BE



- 1 IF THIS IS PROLONGED THERE WILL BE MORE ACTIVITY IN
- 2 SACRAMENTO, MAYBE A SPECIAL SESSION CALLED TO DEAL WITH THIS.
- 3 IT IS GOING TO BE CATASTROPHIC FOR US. WE HAVE TO DOVETAIL
- 4 WITH THAT AS WELL. DR. GHALY?

- 6 >> DR. CHRISTINA GHALY: THE DSH PAYMENTS ARE REALLY FOR
- 7 HOSPITALS. THEY'RE A CERTAIN TYPE OF PAYMENT FOR HOSPITALS
- 8 THAT SERVE A HIGH PROPORTION OF LOW INCOME AND UNINSURED
- 9 PAYMENTS. WHILE MOST OF OUR PROBLEMS RELATED TO THE SHUTDOWN
- 10 AND THE LACK OF A DELAY AND THE DSH CUTS WHICH WE HOPE IS
- 11 RESOLVED THROUGH A CONTINUING RESOLUTION BILL GETS RESOLVED
- 12 AND HOPEFULLY A CASHFLOW PROBLEM. IT STILL CREATES TREMENDOUS
- 13 STRAIN ON HOSPITALS AT A TIME WHEN HOSPITALS ARE UNDER
- 14 INCREASING STRAIN FROM THE BENDING REVENUE CUTS AND ESCALATING
- 15 CUTS. HOSPITALS ARE REQUIRED TO TAKE CARE OF EVERYONE WHO
- 16 COMES IN THE DOOR REGARDLESS OF ABILITY TO PAY, REGARDLESS OF
- 17 INSURANCE STATUS. THAT'S THE FEDERAL REQUIREMENT, A FEDERAL
- 18 LAW. AT THE SAME TIME THAT FUNDING STREAM THAT AUTHORIZES
- 19 THOSE PAYMENTS IS ONE OF THE ONES THAT IS AT RISK. AS
- 20 DR. FERRER SHARED, THERE IS A VARIETY OF THREATS TO PEOPLE'S
- 21 INSURANCE STATUS. ONE IS THE PREMIUM TAX SUBSIDIES, THE
- 22 PREMIUM SUBSIDIES. IF THOSE AND OTHER CHANGES AREN'T REVERSED
- 23 WE'LL SEE INCREASED NUMBERS OF INDIVIDUALS THAT ARE UNINSURED.
- 24 REFERENCE MADE TO THE ASSET TESTS THAT WERE PUT IN PLACE BY
- 25 THE STATE. THERE'S THE A VARIETY OF CHANGES IN BOTH THE STATE



- 1 AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT THAT WILL INCREASE THE RANKS OF THE
- 2 UNINSURED. WHAT WE'RE FOCUSED ON IN DSH, MANY HOSPITALS
- 3 SIMILAR TO US, REALLY JUST REMAINING OPEN FOR THE PEOPLE THAT
- 4 NEED US, KEEPING THOSE SERVICES GOING. THE MESSAGE TO THE
- 5 PUBLIC IS WE'RE HERE, REGARDLESS OF INSURANCE STATUS, WE'RE
- 6 HERE TO TAKE CARE OF PEOPLE. WE NEED RESOLUTIONS TO THE
- 7 PROBLEMS THAT WE FACE ON THE FEDERAL FRONT AS WELL AS STATE
- 8 FRONT SO THAT WE DON'T HAVE LONGER TERM PROBLEMS AND START TO
- 9 FACE MORE DANGEROUS SITUATIONS IN THE FUTURE. THESE ARE SHORT
- 10 TERM PROBLEMS RIGHT NOW, HOPEFULLY SOLVABLE PROBLEMS. WE COULD
- 11 EASILY HARKEN IN A DAY THEY'RE NOT REVERSIBLE AND THEY WILL
- 12 HAVE DEVASTATING IMPACTS ON PEOPLE THAT RAE LIE ON US FOR
- 13 CARE.

- 15 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: A LOT OF MY PRIVATE HOSPITALS HAVE
- 16 CONTACTED ME BECAUSE OF THE DSH IMPACT, FUNDING CUT BACK. AND
- 17 SOME LIKE THE CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL AND OTHERS TO NAME A FEW,
- 18 BEVERLY HOSPITAL, WHITE MEMORIAL, I COULD GO ON AND A ON,
- 19 SEVERELY IMPACTED. THEY HELP TO SERVE AS A SAFETY NET FOR THE
- 20 COUNTY. I THINK IT WILL HAVE APPARENTLY A DOMINO EFFECT AS WE
- 21 KNOW. I THINK ALL OF US WORKING TOGETHER, TOO, WITH THESE
- 22 ASSOCIATIONS, I HOPE. I KNOW WE KNOW THAT, DR. GHALY, WORKING
- 23 WITH L.A. CARE AND OTHER GROUPS. JUST TO CONTINUE TO KEEP THAT
- 24 PRESSURE ON IS GOING TO BE REALLY CRITICAL. MAKING SURE WE CAN
- 25 GIVE THEM THE DATA, THE DATA EMPOWERS I THINK OUR MESSAGE.



- 2 >> DR. BARBARA FERRER: WE DON'T HAVE RESERVES. THE ONLY
- 3 PROGRAM AREA THAT HAS A RESERVE IS SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT
- 4 PROGRAM, WE DON'T HAVE ANY PROBLEMS AT THE MOMENT. BUT FOR
- 5 EVERYTHING ELSE THERE'S NO RESERVE. IF THE GRANT MONEY DOESN'T
- 6 COME PARTICULARLY BECAUSE 60% OF THE FEDERAL FUNDS ARE GOING
- 7 OUT TO COMMUNITY PARTNERS, THERE WILL BE NO PAYMENTS FOR THOSE
- 8 SERVICES. BOTH THE STAFF AND THE SERVICE THAT THEY'RE
- 9 PROVIDING WOULD NEED TO GET ADJUSTED. OUR HOPE IS THIS DOESN'T
- 10 GO ON, BECAUSE THERE'S NO RESERVE. IF WE DON'T GET PAYMENTS
- 11 BECAUSE STAFF AREN'T PROCESSING OUR INVOICES, THEN THE
- 12 SERVICES CAN'T GO ON. I WILL SAY THE OTHER BIG RISK FOR US,
- 13 EVERYTHING IS ON A GRANT CYCLE. FOR EXAMPLE, ALMOST OUR ENTIRE
- 14 TB PROGRAM IS FUNDED BY A GRANT THAT WE'RE DUE TO GET ON
- 15 JANUARY 1. BUT THE SUBMISSIONS ARE GOING IN NOW. NO ONE IS
- 16 PROCESSING THAT. IF THERE'S A DELAY ON GETTING AN AWARD FOR
- 17 THE TB PROGRAM THEN WE CAN'T RUN THE TB PROGRAM. THIS IS
- 18 SIMILAR PROBLEM THAT I HAVE RAISED ABOUT WHAT HAPPENS WHEN THE
- 19 GRANT FUNDING IS REDUCED SIGNIFICANTLY OR DISAPPEARS. BUT THIS
- 20 IS NOW AGGRAVATED BY THE FACT THAT THERE'S NO ONE PROCESSING
- 21 ANY OF THE INVOICES THAT NEED TO GET REVIEWED. WE HAVE NO
- 22 RESERVES.

- 24 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND LAST WEEK I TOOK A TOUR OF VIOLENCE
- 25 PREVENTION PROGRAM RUN BY MISS GIGGINS. SHE WAS FORCEFULFUL IN



- 1 TELLING ME THE CUTBACKS HAVE BEEN OUTLANDISH ACROSS THE BOARD
- 2 FOR MANY VIOLENCE PREVENTION, ESPECIALLY DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND
- 3 HOW IT WILL DECIMATE NOT JUST HER PROGRAM, A NATIONALLY
- 4 RECOGNIZED PROGRAM, BUT OTHERS. IN THIS CURRENT CLIMATE, I
- 5 JUST DON'T THINK THE PUBLIC MAY BE FULLY AWARE OF WHAT HAS
- 6 HAPPENED TO OUR BUDGETS, OUR FEDERAL BUDGET AND HOW IT IMPACTS
- 7 US HERE. THE MORE WE TALK ABOUT IT AND HAVE THOSE INDIVIDUALS
- 8 HELPING US AND MESSAGING IS IMPORTANT. I KNOW THEY WANT TO
- 9 WORK WITH US. BUT THEIR SERVICE IS VITAL. I WANT TO SAY THAT
- 10 I'M GLAD WE WERE ABLE TO STAND THESE PROGRAMS UP INITIALLY.
- 11 OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS. DR. FERRER. BUT WE CAN'T AFFORD TO
- 12 HAVE THEM GO AWAY NOW. FOR ME THAT IS A BOTTOM LINE.
- 13 UNFORTUNATELY OTHER PEOPLE MAY HAVE DIFFERENT OPINIONS ON
- 14 THAT. CEO, JUST KIND OF GIVE ME A THOUGHT HERE, HOW DO WE LOOK
- 15 AT THIS IN TERMS OF ANY BRIDGE? WE WENT THROUGH THIS BEFORE,
- 16 THIS ISN'T THE FIRST TIME WE HAVE GONE THROUGH A SHUTDOWN.
- 17 WHAT IS THE COUNTY PREPARED TO DO?

- 19 >> FESIA DAVENPORT: THANK YOU FOR ASKING THAT OUESTION. AND
- 20 YOU ARE CORRECT, THIS IS NOT THE FIRST TIME WE HAVE GONE
- 21 THROUGH A SHUTDOWN. BASED ON MY TIME AT THE COUNTY, THIS SEEMS
- 22 TO ME TO BE ONE OF THE MORE DIVISIVE SHUTDOWNS THAT WE HAVE
- 23 HAD. I TALK TO MY TEAM IN TERMS OF THIS IS AN ARMAGEDDON
- 24 BUDGET. THIS IS NOT A BUDGET DESIGNED TO PRESERVE, TO ADDRESS
- 25 BUDGETARY OVERSPENDS AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL. THE FEDERAL



- 1 GOVERNMENT DOESN'T HAVE A BUDGET LIMIT. THIS IS A BUDGET
- 2 THAT'S DESIGNED TO DRIVE A POLICY INITIATIVE. THE PRESIDENTIAL
- 3 POLICY INITIATIVE. WHAT THAT SAYS, I THINK WE SHOULD BE
- 4 CAREFUL OF MESSAGING TO ALL OF THE COULD BE CONSTITUENTS THAT
- 5 RELY ON YOUR LEADERSHIP, THE HOSPITALS THAT WILL CONTACT YOU,
- 6 COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATIONS THAT WILL CONTACT YOU. IN MANY
- 7 WAYS THEY'RE LEAVING DOLLARS THAT FLOW FOUGHT JUST FROM THE
- 8 FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND STATE GOVERNMENT WITHOUT FROM THE
- 9 COUNTY TO THEM. IT IS THE SAME SOURCE. I DO NOT SEE A
- 10 SITUATION WHERE THE COUNTY BUDGET, SOMEONE POINTED OUT TWO-
- 11 THIRDS IS FEDERAL AND SUBMISSION DOLLARS. I DO NOT SEE A
- 12 FUTURE WHERE WE WILL BE ABLE TO BACKFILL ALL OF THESE
- 13 PROGRAMS. WE HAVEN'T SAT DOWN, THIS IS A DYNAMIC AND EMERGENT
- 14 SITUATION TO WHAT THE DOLLAR IMPACT IS. I THINK WE NEED TO BE
- 15 MINDFUL OF OUR MESSAGING ONE PART IS YES TO SOUND, MAKE SURE
- 16 PEOPLE ARE AWARE THAT THIS IS WHAT IS HAPPENING AND THIS IS
- 17 HOW IT IMPACTS YOU. NOT THE COUNTY, IT IS THE FEDERAL
- 18 GOVERNMENT DOING IT. ON ONE OF OUR DEPARTMENT HEADS MENTIONED
- 19 THEY'RE WORKING WITH THE STATE. THE STATE IS IN THE SAME
- 20 POSITION WE'RE IN. THE BUDGET IS LARGER BUT THEY HAVE MORE
- 21 OBLIGATIONS THAN WE DO. WHAT I THINK IS MOST APPROPRIATE AT
- 22 THIS TIME IS THAT BECAUSE THIS IS A DYNAMIC SITUATION, MAYBE
- 23 THEY WILL BE BACK BEFORE THE 14th, MAYBE NOT. ALLOW THIS TO BE
- 24 THE FOCUS OF OUR FUTURE BUDGETARY UPDATES IN THE COMING WEEKS.
- 25 I DON'T SEE WHERE THE COUNTY CAN BEAK FILL THE CURTAILMENTS.



- 2 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: I DON'T DISAGREE. IF WE SEE ON THE
- 3 HORIZON THERE WILL SOMEBODY RECONCILIATION, IF WE CAN HELP
- 4 TEMPORARILY THEN, THAT'S WHAT I'M THINKING OF. IN THE PAST I'M
- 5 SURE THE COUNTY DID SOMETHING. NOT THAT WE CAN SAVE THE
- 6 TITANIC, I KNOW THAT.

- 8 >> FESIA DAVENPORT: THAT WOULD BE HELPFUL, WE HAVE ALREADY
- 9 STARTED PROVIDING THE BOARD AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS UPDATES AND
- 10 QUANTIFYING THE SCALE, SCOPE, AND MAGNITUDE OF FEDERAL CUTS
- 11 FROM THE FEDERAL POLICY CHANGES. WHAT MIGHT BE HELPFUL IS A

- 3 TO PROVIDE CRITICAL LEGAL SERVICES. SOMETHING SUPERVISOR HAHN,
- 4 I KNOW THAT YOU HAVE CONTINUED TO RAISE. WHILE WE HAVE NOT
- 5 SEEN THE DIRECT IMPACTS OF THE SERVICES THAT WE ARE PROVIDING
- 6 TO OUR FIRE IMPACTED COMMUNITIES AND SURVIVORS, THE ROAD

- 1 RACE CARD AS I AM WEEKLY BY A MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC, IT IS NOT
- 2 LOST ON ME THAT THEY WERE SOUTH LA DPSS OFFICES THAT WERE
- 3 TARGETED. I THINK THAT WAS NOT BY ACCIDENT. WHAT IS THE
- 4 PAINFUL IRONY MADAM CHAIR, AS YOU SAID, PEOPLE STAND IN LINE
- 5 AT A COUNTY SOCIAL SERVICES OFFICE TO GET HELP. THOSE ARE THE
- 6 SAME EXACT SERVICES AND PROGRAMS AND PERSONNEL THAT ARE BEING
- 7 IMPACTED BY THE CURTAILMENT. THE IRONY THOSE PEOPLE ARE
- 8 TARGETED AND GETTING HELP FROM DEPARTMENTS TO REDUCE THEIR
- 9 BUDGETS AS A RESULT OF THE AB218 SETTLEMENT IS IRONIC AND

- 14 INVESTIGATIVE REPORT. I BELIEVE MADAM CHAIR, THAT THERE IS
- 15 OPPORTUNITY GIVEN THE APPROPRIATE TIME AND REPRESENTATION FOR
- 16 US TO SEEK APPROPRIATE REPRIEVE THROUGH LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS
- 17 BECAUSE AB218 IS IMPACTING MUNICIPALITIES ACROSS THE BOARD.
- 18 AND EVERY RESIDENT OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA CAN'T AFFORD FOR
- 19 LOCAL GOVERNMENT TO GO BANKRUPT. AS WE HAVE SEEN IN OTHER
- 20 COUNTIES, IT HAS HAPPENED. OUR NEIGHBOR COUNTY IN ORANGE
- 21 COUNTY, SO I LOOK FORWARD TO THE OPPORTUNITY WHERE THOUGHTFUL,
- 22 STRATEGIC CONVERSATIONS CAN TAKE PLACE. WHERE THE UNINTENDED
- 23 CONSEQUENCES OF AB218 CAN BE ADDRESSED. WE ARE IN A CLIMATE
- 24 AND A CULTURE WHERE ABUSE VICTIMS ARE COMING FORWARD. AND
- 25 ORGANIZATIONS ARE EXPECTED TO PAY. ASK THE CATHOLIC CHURCH.



- 1 ASK BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA. NOW ASK LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND SCHOOL
- 2 DISTRICTS. AND SO HOW WE NAVIGATE THIS IN A WAY THAT TRUE
- 3 VICTIMS ARE ACKNOWLEDGED, SEEN, HEARD AND COMPENSATED. YET WE
- 4 ARE PROTECTED FROM THOSE WHO WISH TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF A VERY
- 5 SENSITIVE VOLATILE SITUATION. I THINK THROUGH THIS, LOCAL

- 5 ALSO AS WAS STATED BY MY COLLEAGUE SUPERVISOR MITCHELL, WE

- 18 THE COUNTY. THE ABUSE SUFFERED BY YOUNG PEOPLE AT THE HANDS OF
- 19 COUNTY PROBATION OFFICERS AND OTHERS TRUSTED ADULTS IS NOTHING
- 20 SHORT OF HORRIFIC AND A DEEP BETRAYAL OF PUBLIC TRUST. WE MUST
- 21 DO EVERYTHING WE CAN TO PREVENT THESE INJUSTICES FROM
- 22 HAPPENING AGAIN. I WANT TO ECHO SUPERVISOR MITCHELL'S COMMENTS
- 23 AROUND THE STEPS THE COUNTY HAS TAKEN AND CONTINUES TO TAKE.
- 24 AS A COUNTY WE HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY TO REPAIR THE HARM THAT
- 25 HAS BEEN CAUSED. THE UNPRECEDENTED \$4 BILLION SETTLEMENT IS



- 1 ONE STEP IN THAT DIRECTION. BUT IT MUST TRULY REACH THOSE WHO

- 13 REWARDING FALSE CLAIMS. WHILE MANY OF THESE CASES PREDATE THE
- 14 TENURE OF THIS BOARD, WE ARE FACED WITH THE PAINFUL OPTIONS
- 15 THAT WILL HAVE IMPACT FOR YEARS TO COME. THE COUNTY CHOSE
- 16 EARLY SETTLEMENT TO PREVENT EVEN DEEPER FINANCIAL CRISIS
- 17 THOUGH THE IMPACT IS ALREADY EXTREMELY SIGNIFICANT. THIS HAS
- 18 IMPACTS ON THOSE WHO RELY ON COUNTY SERVICES TO BE AVAILABLE
- 19 AND FUNDED. AND THOSE WHO PROVIDE THE SERVICES, OUR WORKFORCE
- 20 THAT FELT THE IMPACT IN RECENT LABOR NEGOTIATIONS. IT DID NOT
- 21 HAVE TO BE THIS WAY. OUR STATE PARTNERS MUST HELP US BUILD AND
- 22 ENFORCE A PROCESS THAT ENSURES JUST COMPENSATION FOR SURVIVORS
- 23 AND INCLUDES SAFEGUARDS TO PROTECT PUBLIC RESOURCES. AND THE
- 24 INTEGRITY OF THE SYSTEM. EVEN THE CAPPING POLICY HAS

- 3 THOUSANDS, SPREADING FEAR AND DESTABILIZING ENTIRE COMMUNITIES
- 4 ACROSS LOS ANGELES COUNTY. FAMILIES ARE NOW AFRAID TO GO TO
- 5 WORK. TO ATTEND SCHOOL. OR EVEN TO BUY GROCERIES. AS THIS FEAR
- 6 SPREADS, SO DOES ECONOMIC HARDSHIP. AND WITH IT, THE VERY REAL

- 1 DISTRICT. SO A OUICK OVERVIEW OF OUR PRESENTATION. WE'LL START
- 2 WITH A BRIEF EVICTION MORATORIUM OVERVIEW INCLUDING AN
- 3 EXPLANATION OF WHAT AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE IS, WHICH IS REALLY
- 4 WHAT EVICTION MORATORIUM IS. WE'LL THEN DISCUSS THE
- 5 REOUIREMENTS FOR EVICTION MORATORIUM INCLUDING THE DECLARATION
- 6 OF LOCAL EMERGENCY AND THEN DISCUSS LONG TERM CHALLENGES OF

- 14 RESOLUTIONS BETWEEN LANDLORDS AND TENANTS IMPACTED BY THE
- 15 EMERGENCY AND HOPEFULLY AVOID EVICTIONS. EVICTION MORATORIUM
- 16 IS SOMEWHAT OF A MISNOMER. EVICTION MORATORIUM DOES NOT BAN
- 17 ALL EVICTIONS. IT DOES NOT PROHIBIT LANDLORDS FROM FILING
- 18 EVICTION ACTIONS IN COURT. IN FACT, TENANTS MUST ASSERT THE
- 19 MORATORIUM PROTECTIONS BOTH TO THE LANDLORD AND ULTIMATELY IN
- 20 COURT IF THE LANDLORD FILES, FOR AN EVICTION ACTION, MOREOVER
- 21 THE COURTS CAN INQUIRE AND CONSIDER THE TENANT'S ELIGIBILITY
- 22 FOR THE PROTECTIONS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO AS I STATED
- 23 EVICTION MORATORIUM REALLY UNAFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE PROVIDED BY,
- 24 TO THE TENANT TO USE IN COURT. AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE IS LEGAL
- 25 DEFENSE THAT THE TENANT RAISES IN EVICTION COURT PROCEEDING.



- 1 IN LAYMAN'S TERMS, IT IS LIKE, SAYING, YES, I DID IT BUT HAD A
- 2 GOOD REASON. THE PERSON ADMITS THE BASIC FACTS. BUT ALSO
- 3 EXPLAINS WHY THE LAW SAYS THEY SHOULDN'T SUFFER THE
- 4 CONSEQUENCES. SO FOR EXAMPLE DURING COVID, TENANT CLAIMING
- 5 PROTECTION UNDER THE EVICTION MORATORIUM FOR COVID-19 WOULD
- 6 ADMIT YES I DIDN'T PAY THE RENT BUT COULDN'T, BECAUSE I
- 7 SUFFERED COVID RELATED FINANCIAL HARDSHIP. UNDER THE COUNTY
- 8 MORATORIUM, I'M LEGALLY PROTECTED FROM EVICTION FOR NON-
- 9 PAYMENT DUE TO COVID-19 FINANCIAL HARDSHIP. IMPORTANTLY, AS
- 10 STATED BEFORE, THIS IS NOT FAR A LANDLORD FROM SEEKING
- 11 EVICTION IN COURT. IT ONLY ALLOWS THE TENANT TO CLAIM
- 12 AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE IF AN EVICTION IS SOUGHT. MOREOVER, THE
- 13 TENANT BEARS THE BURDEN OF PROOF TO ESTABLISH ELIGIBILITY, TO
- 14 ASSERT THIS AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE. FOR EXAMPLE, IN THE CASE OF
- 15 COVID-19, THEY WOULD HAVE TO DEMONSTRATE THAT THEY COMPLY WITH
- 16 THE PROCEDURAL REQUIREMENTS TO ASSERT THE DEFENSE SUCH AS
- 17 GIVING THE LANDLORD LEGALLY REQUIRED NOTICE. TESTING THAT THEY
- 18 ARE FINANCIALLY IMPACTED BY COVID WITHIN THE SPECIFIC TIME
- 19 FRAMES. WITH THAT BACKGROUND UNDERSTANDING WHAT EVICTION
- 20 MORATORIUM IS, LET'S DISCUSS WHAT IS REQUIRED FOR MORATORIUM.
- 21 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. PERFECT. THANK YOU. I WANT TO ITERATE
- 22 PUTTING ASIDE THE COVID-19 AREA PROTECTIONS, EVICTION
- 23 MORATORIUM ARE RARE. THIS ISN'T COMMON. IT IS A LITTLE MORE
- 24 COMMON SINCE COVID, WE ARE ALL FAMILIAR WITH IT, BUT THIS IS A
- 25 RARE USAGE OF THE LAW. OUR REVIEW FOUND THAT THE COURTS HAVE



- 1 UPHELD MORATORIA THAT ARE FIRST OF ALL ADOPTED DURING AND IN
- 2 RESPONSE TO A DECLARED EMERGENCY. AND ALSO WHEN THE RELIEF WAS
- 3 TEMPORARY AND NARROWLY TAILORED TO ADDRESS THE IMPACTS OF THE
- 4 EMERGENCY. ALSO THE MORATORIA, REVIEWED, PROTECTED THE LAND'S
- 5 PROCESS RIGHTS AND RESTORED THE LANDLORD PROPERTY RIGHTS
- 6 FOLLOWING THE EXPLORATION OF THE EMERGENCY. AS DUE PROCESS,
- 7 THAT MEANS REOUIRING THE TENANT TO PROVIDE THE LANDLORD WITH
- 8 NOTICE AND PROVIDING THE LANDLORD AN OPPORTUNITY TO CHALLENGE
- 9 THE ASSERTIVE HARDSHIP. SIGNIFICANTLY THE EVICTION MORATORIA
- 10 HAVE NOT FORGIVEN BACK RENT DUE. THAT RENT STILL REMAINS DUE.
- 11 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. IMPORTANTLY, THE EVICTION MORATORIA
- 12 REVIEWED UPHELD AND ROSE OUT, THAT WERE UPHELD, ROSE OUT OF A
- 13 DECLARED EMERGENCY. THE COUNTY IS NOT DECLARED A LOCAL
- 14 EMERGENCY RELATED TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S IMMIGRATION
- 15 ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS. THE NECESSARY ELEMENTS FOR SUCH AN
- 16 EMERGENCY ARE FOUND IN CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION
- 17 8558C. AND I WANT TO PULL OUT THE TWO MAIN ELEMENTS OF THAT.
- 18 THE FIRST WOULD BE THE EXISTENCE OF CONDITIONS OF DISASTER OR
- 19 OF EXTREME PERIL TO THE SAFETY OF PERSONS AND PROPERTY IN LOS
- 20 ANGELES COUNTY. AND THEN THE SECOND MAIN ELEMENT IS RESPONSE
- 21 TO THOSE CONDITIONS IS BEYOND THE CONTROL OF COUNTY RESOURCES
- 22 AND REQUIRES MUTUAL AID FROM OTHERS OUTSIDE OF THE COUNTY.
- 23 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. IN ADDITION TO TWO MAIN ELMS, THEY PROVIDE
- 24 SPECIFIC EXAMPLES OF WHAT MIGHT BE CONSIDERED LOCAL
- 25 EMERGENCIES. YOU CAN SEE HERE ON THE SLIDE, WE HAVE ITALICIZED



- 1 THE MAIN ELEMENTS AND BOLDED THE MAIN SPECIFIC EXAMPLES THEY
- 2 OFFER. WE WILL READ IT FOR YOU. WE CONDENSED IT FOR YOU.
- 3 STATUTE THE DULY PROCLAIMED EXISTENCE OF CONDITIONS OF
- 4 DISASTER OR OF EXTREME PERIL FOR THE SAFETY OF PERSONS OR
- 5 PROPERTY WITHIN THE TERRITORIAL LIMITS OF A COUNTY CAUSED BY
- 6 CONDITIONS SUCH AS AIR POLLUTION, FIRE, FLOOD, STORM,
- 7 EPIDEMIC, RIOT, DROUGHT, CYBER TERRORISM, SEVERE ENERGY
- 8 SHORTAGE, ENERGIZE EVENT, ELECTRIC MAGNETIC PULSE ATTACK,

- 1 ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS. TENANTS COULD FACE SIGNIFICANT RENTAL
- 2 BURDENS ONCE THE PROTECTION EXPIRE INCLUDING CIVIL ACTIONS
- 3 FROM LANDLORDS TO RECOVER SUCH DEBT. OBVIOUSLY, LANDLORDS
- 4 WOULD EXPERIENCE LOSS OF INCOME WITH LIMITED RECOVERY OPTIONS
- 5 WHICH COULD LIMIT ABILITY TO MAINTAIN OR REPAIR THE PROPERTY.
- 6 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO WE DID WANT TO RECOMMEND THAT YOU
- 7 CONSIDER OR FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION OR ALTERNATIVES FOR
- 8 EVICTION MORATORIUM THAT COULD BE AVAILABLE TO PROTECT HOUSING
- 9 STABILITY. THOSE INCLUDE THE RENT RELIEF ASSISTANCE. YOU COULD
- 10 INCREASE THE RENTAL RELIEF ASSISTANCE PROGRAM TO TENANTS AND
- 11 LANDLORDS. YOU COULD ALSO CONSIDER INCREASING INVESTMENT IN

- 2 COVID EVICTION MORATORIUM. ALSO I BELIEVE ON THE FIRE EVICTION
- 3 MORATORIUM. SO WE HAVE SOME EXPERIENCE YES.

- 5 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: YES, DOES THIS TEAM JUST WORK ON
- 6 THOSE ISSUES OR OTHER ISSUES IN THE COUNTY AS WELL?

- 8 >> PETER BOLLINGER: AS COUNTY COUNSEL, WE WORK ON A MYRIAD OF
- 9 ISSUES. HOUSING IS JUST ONE OF THE ASSIGNMENTS FOR THIS TEAM.
- 10 BEHNAZ TASHAKORIAN WORKS ON IT AND GRACE, I'M NOT SURE,
- 11 PROPERTY DIVISION ALSO. WORKS ON SEVERAL OTHER ISSUES ASIDE
- 12 FROM AFFORDABLE HOUSING.

- 14 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: THOSE SOUND RELATED TO HOUSING. OTHER
- 15 ISSUES BEYOND US HOG.

17 >> PETER BOLLINGER: CORRECT.

- 19 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: I WANT TO BE CLEAR, THANK YOU FOR
- 20 YOUR PRESENTATION AND CLEAR, WHAT TOOLS ARE AVAILABLE TO US
- 21 BASED ON THE PRESENTATION? SO TO CONFIRM, THE COUNTY CANNOT
- 22 STOP LANDLORDS FROM FILING EVICTIONS BUT WE CAN PROVIDE
- 23 PROTECTION THAT GIVES TENANTS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE IN COURT.
- 24 IS THAT A CORRECT WAY TO SAY THE DISTINCTION?

- 2 FOR EVICTIONS. THAT IS CORRECT. THE STATE HAS PRETTY MUCH
- 3 OCCUPIED THE FIELD ON THAT. YES, WITH THE BOARD, THE BOARD CAN
- 4 MAKE A DETERMINATION AND DECLARE A LOCAL EMERGENCY. SEEK TO
- 5 PUT INTO EFFECT AN EVICTION MORATORIUM. THE SPECIFICS OF THAT
- 6 WERE DISCUSSED IN OUR CONFIDENTIAL MEMO THAT WAS PROVIDED TO

- 16 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: THIS AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE IS WHAT WE
- 17 USED IN THE COVID-19 MORATORIUM AND THE WILDFIRE EVICTION
- 18 PROTECTS, IS THAT RIGHT?

- 20 >> PETER BOLLINGER: SIMILAR TO WHAT WAS USED IN THE COVID-19
- 21 AND WHILE FIRE, CORRECT.

- 23 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: OKAY. MANY PEOPLE IMPACTED BY THE ICE

- 25 COUNTY. MAY BE HESITANT OR FEARFUL OF DISCLOSING PERSONAL



- 1 INFORMATION TO LANDLORDS. SO CAN YOU DISCUSS THE NOTICE
- 2 REQUIREMENT IN MORE DETAIL AND WHY IT IS A NECESSARY COMPONENT
- 3 OF EVICTION PROTECTION.

- 5 >> PETER BOLLINGER: SURE. TRYING TO BE CAREFUL NOT TO INVADE
- 6 OUR ATTORNEY CLIENT PRIVILEGE, LANDLORDS HAVE A DUE PROCESS
- 7 RIGHT. SO LANDLORDS WOULD BE ENTITLED TO NOTICE FROM THEIR
- 8 TENANTS AND IS PART OF THE COVID-19 PROTECTS AND WILDFIRE
- 9 EVICTION PROTECTIONS, LANDLORDS CAN STILL FILE EVICTION ACTION
- 10 AND CHALLENGE THE AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE IN COURT. SO THERE IS,
- 11 THERE IS NOT A WAY TO AVOID PROVIDING THE LANDLORD WITH NOTICE
- 12 AND OBVIOUSLY, THERE COULD BE UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES SINCE
- 13 THAT WOULD, THAT COULD IMPACT TENANTS.

- 15 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: WHAT PROTECTS CURRENTLY EXIST IN
- 16 STATE OR LOCAL LAW AGAINST LANDLORD RETALIATION SUCH AS
- 17 THREATS TO REPORT OR DISCLOSE SOMEONE'S IMMIGRATION STATUS.
- 18 HOW ARE THOSE PROTECTIONS ENFORCED AND DO YOU THINK THAT THEY
- 19 WOULD BE SUFFICIENT AT ACTUALLY PROTECTING PEOPLE?

- 21 >> PETER BOLLINGER: SO THERE IS STATE LAW THAT PROTECTS
- 22 TENANTS AGAINST LEGAL SECTION. 40.3B CIVIL LAW, PROHIBITS
- 23 LANDLORDS FROM ACQUIRING ABOUT, OR TAKING ACTIONS BASED ON THE
- 24 IMMIGRATION OR CITIZENSHIP STATUS OF TENANTS. HOUSING
- 25 DISCRIMINATION IS GENERALLY ILLEGAL IN THE COUNTY, PRIVATE



- 1 HOUSING PROVIDERS CANNOT INQUIRE ABOUT TENANTS, CITIZENSHIP OR
- 2 IMMIGRATION. SO THOSE GENERALLY PROTECT THAT. IN THIS CASE,
- 3 THAT WOULD COME UP AGAINST THE DUE PROCESS RIGHTS OF THE
- 4 LANDLORD TO BE AWARE OF THAT.

- 6 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: OKAY. WHAT, WHAT OTHER OPTIONS OR
- 7 TOOLS EXIST TO PROTECT VULNERABLE TENANTS?

- 9 >> PETER BOLLINGER: I THINK THE BEST TENANTS, PARDON ME, THE
- 10 BEST OPTIONS WERE PROBABLY THOSE CALLED OUT ON THE SLIDE.
- 11 WHICH ARE OPTIONS THAT PROVIDE FUNDING TO TENANTS OR LANDLORD
- 12 THROUGH THE RENTAL RELIEF PROGRAM WHICH I KNOW THAT THE BOARD
- 13 HAS TAKEN SOME ACTION ON. OTHER OPTIONS, COULD INCLUDE
- 14 ADDITIONAL FUNDING TO THE TENANTS RIGHT TO COUNSEL PROGRAM FOR
- 15 HOUSING. BUT IT WOULD BE MORE ON THE FUNDING SIDE OF THINGS.

- 17 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: OKAY. BASED ON WHAT YOU SHARED IN THE
- 18 PRESENTATION, I THINK, IT SOUNDS LIKE A FIRST STEP TO
- 19 CONSIDERING SOME OF THE TOOLS THAT ARE IN OUR TOOL BOX IS TO
- 20 INSURE THAT THERE IS A DECLARATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY
- 21 THAT IS NARROW, THAT IS FOCUSED ON EXISTING CONDITIONS THAT
- 22 ARE TEMPORARY IN NATURE. THAT WOULD PROVIDE THE COUNTY WITH A
- 23 BROADER SET OF TOOLS TO ACT OUICKLY AND DECISIVELY GIVEN THE
- 24 ESCALATING THREATS BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. WE SEEN DECLARED
- 25 EMERGENCIES IN RESPONSE TO THE HOMELESSNESS CRISIS, THE



- 1 SITUATION AT LOS PADRINOS, AND MOST RECENTLY DESTRUCTIVE
- 2 WILDFIRES. THESE EMERGENCY DECLARATIONS UNLOCK RESOURCES AND
- 3 POWERS LIKE STREAMLINE CONTRACTING AND PROCUREMENT,
- 4 ACCELERATED HIRING, STRONGER COMMUNICATION, AND OUTREACH AND
- 5 THE ABILITY TO IMPLEMENT URGENT RESPONSE ACTION. THE EMERGENCY
- 6 DECLARATION ALSO SIGNALS THAT WE NEED ASSISTANCE FROM OTHER

- 16 THOUSANDS OF OUR NEIGHBORS IN EXTREME PERIL SO I BELIEVE THAT
- 17 WE NEED TO ACT NOW. TO THAT END, I HAVE A READ-IN MOTION
- 18 ASKING COUNTY COUNSEL TO RETURN IN ONE WEEK WITH A
- 19 PROCLAMATION OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY FOR FEDERAL IMMIGRATION ON
- 20 THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. TO GIVE US EVERY TOOL AVAILABLE TO
- 21 FIGHT BACK. MADAM CHAIR, I CAN READ IT NOW OR LATER. I'LL TAKE
- 22 YOUR DIRECTION ON THAT. THE DIRECTIVE STATES, THAT THE BOARD
- 23 OF SUPERVISORS WOULD DIRECT COUNTY COUNSEL TO PREPARE A PRO
- 24 CLAM YEARS OF LOCAL EMERGENCY FOR FEDERAL IMMIGRATION ACTIONS
- 25 IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. PLACE IT ON THE AGENDA FOR THE



- OCTOBER 14, 2025 BOARD MEETING. THIS IS BECAUSE THE ONGOING
- 2 IMMIGRATION RAIDS PERPETUATED BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAVE
- 3 WREAK WREAKED HAVOC ON LOS ANGELES COUNTY INSTILLING FEAR,
- 4 INSTILLING CHAOS IN THE STREETS AND ADVERSELY IMPACTING OUR

- 8 POLLUTION AND IT GOES ON AND ON. SO HOW WOULD THE IMMIGRATION
- 9 WITH ENFORCEMENTS BY THE TRUMP ADMINISTRATION FALL, WOULD IT,
- 10 IN ANY WAY FALL UNDER ANY ONE OF THESE CATEGORIES?

- 23 WHICH WERE MENTIONED. A POTENTIAL RESPONSE TO THE DECLARATION
- 24 OF LOCAL EMERGENCY BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. AND THEN
- 25 OBVIOUSLY THE POTENTIAL LIABILITY THAT THE COUNTY WHICH WAS

- 8 PRESENTATION. AND THANK YOU SUPERVISOR HORVATH, I'M SUPPORTIVE
- 9 OF YOUR MOTION OF DECLARING A LOCAL VERSION. WHEN YOU THINK OF
- 10 THE TWO MAIN ELEMENTS, LOCAL EMERGENCY, THE CONDITION OF
- 11 DISASTER OR EXTREME PERIL TO THE SAFETY OF PERSONS, OR
- 12 PROPERTY WITHIN THE TERRITORIAL LIMITS OF A COUNTY AND
- 13 RESPONSE TO THOSE CONDITIONS, TO BE ON THE CONTROL OF COUNTY
- 14 RESOURCES. I MEAN, THIS IS CLEARLY WHAT IS HAPPENING RIGHT
- 15 NOW. I MEAN, THESE ICE RAIDS ARE PUTTING PEOPLE IN EXTREME
- 16 PERIL FOR THEIR SAFETY. FOR THEIR FAMILY'S SAFETY, CHILDREN'S
- 17 SAFETY. THESE IMMIGRANT PARENTS WHO ARE LEAVING WHEN THEY, IF
- 18 THEY DO VENTURE OUT OF THEIR HOMES, TO GO TO WORK, LEAVING
- 19 EXTENSIVE INSTRUCTIONS ON WHAT TO DO WITH THE REMAINING
- 20 CHILDREN IF IN FACT THEY DON'T COME HOME. I MEAN, WE ARE IN
- 21 EXTREME CONDITIONS RIGHT NOW. AND I KNOW IN MY DISTRICT, SOME
- 22 OF OUR DISTRICTS, WE ARE DISPROPORTIONATELY AFFECTED BY THE
- 23 ICE RAIDS. I KNOW THAT I HAVE JUST A COUPLE STAFF MEMBERS THAT
- 24 EVERY TIME THERE IS AN ICE RAID IN THE DISTRICT, THEY RACE TO
- 25 THAT PARTICULAR LOCATION TRYING TO GIVE HELP AND SUPPORT,



- 1 TRYING TO LOCATE FAMILY MEMBERS OF THOSE WHO HAVE BEEN
- 2 KIDNAPPED AND THROWN INTO THE BACK OF UNMARKED VANS. I MEAN,
- 3 IT IS A, IT IS A SITUATION I HAVE NEVER EXPERIENCED. WE ARE
- 4 TALKING ABOUT THE SAFETY OF THE KIDS WHEN THEY ARE IN SCHOOL.
- 5 THIS IS A, THIS IS A TERRIBLY DISASTROUS CONDITION. IT IS
- 6 UNFORTUNATELY, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, THAT IS A FEDERAL
- 7 DISASTER. THAT MAKES IT EVEN MORE COMPLICATED. I LIKE THE
- 8 SIGNS OUT THERE THAT SAY EVICT ICE AND NOT US. YOU KNOW, I
- 9 WISH THAT, THAT WAS A POSSIBILITY. I WOULD CERTAINLY VOTE FOR
- 10 THAT. I DO THINK THAT THE TOOLS WE TALKED ABOUT, OUTSIDE OF
- 11 DECLARING A LOCAL EMERGENCY, I THINK THAT WE, AS A BOARD
- 12 SHOULD DRILL DOWN ON. I KNOW THE ONE THAT STICKS OUT FOR ME,
- 13 OF COURSE, TRYING TO FIGURE OUT MORE RESOURCES AS IT RELATES
- 14 TO RENT RELIEF. BOTH FOR THE TENANT AND THE LANDLORD. I THINK
- 15 THAT ANY TIME IN THE PAST, WHEN WE HAVE HAD THE EVICTION
- 16 MORATORIUM, RIGHT, IT HAS BEEN A SEVERE HARDSHIP ON THE
- 17 LANDLORDS TOO. MANY OF THEM WERE NEVER MADE WHOLE NO MATTER
- 18 HOW HARD WE TRIED AND HOW MANY PROGRAMS WE HAD. I DO THINK
- 19 THAT TRYING TO GET MORE RESOURCES BOTH FOR THE TENANT AND THE
- 20 LANDLORDS TO PREVENT EVICTIONS IS CRITICAL. AND I DO WORRY
- 21 GOING FORWARD, IF IN FACT, IF THIS LOCAL EMERGENCY DECLARATION
- 22 PASSES AND THAT BECOMES A FIRST STEP IN THE IDEA OF DECLARING
- 23 A, AN EVICTION MORATORIUM. I DO WORRY ABOUT THE, WHAT
- 24 VULNERABLE POSITION WE ARE GOING TO BE PUTTING OUR IMMIGRANT
- 25 TENANTS IN AS IT RELATES TO VERIFYING THAT THEY, THEY NEED THE



- 1 HELP, IF IN FACT, YOU KNOW, A COURT BECOMES PART OF THE
- 2 PROCESS, I CAN SEE HOW THAT WOULD, EVEN IF WE ARE PROVIDING
- 3 DEFENSE AND RESOURCES, I CAN SEE HOW THAT WOULD BE EXTREMELY
- 4 ANXIOUS INDUCING FOR THIS VERY VULNERABLE POPULATION. SO I
- 5 WORRY ABOUT HOW AN EVICTION MORATORIUM ACTUALLY WOULD HAVE
- 6 THOSE UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES IN A NEGATIVE WAY. SO I WANT TO
- 7 MAKE SURE THAT WE EXPLORE ALL OF THAT. AS WE GO FORWARD. BUT I
- 8 DO THINK THAT THE FIRST THING IS DECLARING THE STATE OF LOCAL
- 9 EMERGENCY. I THINK THAT IS IMPORTANT. I ALWAYS AM INTERESTED.
- 10 WE HAVE DONE A FEW OF THE LOCAL EMERGENCIES DECLARATIONS. I'M
- 11 ALWAYS CURIOUS AS TO WHAT THEY ACTUALLY BRING. WHAT WE CAN
- 12 ACTUALLY DO. SOME OF THE THINGS IN DIRECT CONFLICT WITH BUDGET
- 13 PROCESS AND INABILITY TO HIRE US. SOME OF THE LOCAL
- 14 DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY, GIVE US ABILITY TO HIRE MORE STAFF.
- 15 CERTAINLY A LOT OF THE DEPARTMENTS WHO ARE DEALING WITH THIS
- 16 CRISIS FOR OUR IMMIGRANT COMMUNITIES COULD USE MORE STAFF AND
- 17 I'M WONDERING, IN THE FACE OF THIS BUDGET, EVEN IF WE DECLARE
- 18 A LOCAL EMERGENCY, IS THAT SOMETHING THAT WE CAN EVEN DELVE
- 19 INTO. I DON'T KNOW, FESIA, IS THAT SOMETHING -- YOU KNOW WHAT
- 20 I'M TRYING TO SAY?

- 22 >> FESIA DAVENPORT: I THINK THERE ARE A COUPLE OF THINGS
- 23 SUPERVISOR. TO ANSWER YOUR SPECIFIC QUESTION, GENERALLY
- 24 SPEAKING DECLARATIONS OF EMERGENCY, THE IMPACT. THEY DO TWO
- 25 MAJOR THINGS. ONE, THEY HELP US MAKE THINGS GO FASTER. WE GET



- 1 TO BY PASS THE PROCESSES AND THE RULES. TWO, THEY OPEN UP AN
- 2 OPPORTUNITY FOR FUNDING. OTHER COUNTERPARTS, OTHER, EITHER THE
- 3 STATE OR FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PROCLAIM. FOR EXAMPLE, WHEN WE DID
- 4 THE DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY FOR HOMELESSNESS, THERE IS NO
- 5 MONEY ASSOCIATED WITH THIS EMERGENCY. BUT WHAT IT ALLOWED US
- 6 TO DO IS TO STREAMLINE HIRING PROCESS. WHEN DECLARATION OF
- 7 EMERGENCY FOR COVID, WE WERE ALSO ALLOWED TO STREAMLINE A
- 8 BUNCH OF OUR PROCESSES BUT THEN WE HAVE THE CRF FUNDING AND

- 11 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: WE WON'T GET FEDERAL HELP ON THIS. ONE
- 12 POINT TO CONSIDER IS, I'M HEARING WHAT THE BOARD WANTS. THE
- 13 BOARD WANTS MORE RESOURCES FOR TENANT PROTECTIONS AND
- 14 LANDLORDS. ALSO HIRE UP. VACANCIES TO HIRE ON TO STREAMLINE
- 15 THE PROCESS. I'M HEARING COUNTY COUNSEL SAY, YOU DON'T NEED D
- 16 DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY TO DO THOSE THINGS. THOSE THINGS WE
- 17 CAN DO TODAY. AND THEN THE FINAL THING THAT I WILL SAY IS, AS
- 18 JUST SPEAKING WITH OUR DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT, OUR
- 19 EXPERIENCE HAS BEEN GENERALLY SPEAKING, WHEN YOU DECLARE AND
- 20 WE HAVE HAD THESE CONVERSATIONS WITH BOARD OFFICES BEFORE. IF
- 21 WE ARE ALREADY DOING THE WORK, IT, IT MUTES OUR, OUR
- 22 DECLARATION THAT WE ARE UNABLE TO DO IT. SO IF WE ALREADY HAVE
- 23 A DECLARATION, A TENANT PROTECTION PROGRAM, OR RENTER
- 24 PROTECTION PROGRAM, THE QUESTION THEN BECOMES YOU'RE ALREADY
- 25 DOING IT. THEN WHAT IS THE VALUE AT OF THE EMERGENCY. THE



- 1 SECOND THING THAT WE HAVE HAD DISCUSSIONS ABOUT IN THE PAST,
- 2 WHEN DECLARING LOCAL EMERGENCIES IS, SORT OF THIS IDEA OF
- 3 LIKE, THIS BUT FORTRESS. BUT FOR THE DECLARATION OF THE
- 4 EMERGENCY, WE WOULDN'T BE ABLE TO DO A, B AND C. I THINK THAT
- 5 WE NEED TO TALK WITH EXCESSIVE PRECISION ABOUT THE PROBLEM
- 6 THAT WE ARE ACTUALLY TRYING TO SOLVE. SO I, I THINK THAT YOU

- 10 ACTIONS THAT MIGHT BE TAKEN BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IN TERMS
- 11 OF NOT JUST IN TERMS OF TESTATIONS, BUT WE HAVE ISSUES RIGHT
- 12 NOW WITH DEPARTMENT HEADS HAVING TO SIGN THESE AGREEMENTS TO
- 13 DRAW DOWN FUNDING. SO I THINK THAT WE NEED TO TAKE A HOLISTIC
- 14 APPROACH. I KNOW A LONG ANSWER TO YOUR QUESTION.

- 16 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: RIGHT. I FORGOT MY QUESTION AFTER ALL OF
- 17 THAT. I APPRECIATE THAT. WE'LL GET THAT IN THE REPORT BACK.
- 18 BUT I DO THINK, YOU KNOW, DECLARING A STATE OF EMERGENCY
- 19 SPECIFICALLY AS IT RELATES TO THIS CRISIS, THAT WE ARE GOING
- 20 THROUGH, BECAUSE OF THESE UNPRECEDENTED IN MY OPINION, ILLEGAL
- 21 SEARCH AND SEIZURE RAIDS, I THINK THAT IT IS IMPORTANT THAT WE
- 22 ALSO TAKE A STAND AND SHOW OUR IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY THAT WE ARE
- 23 IN THIS EMERGENCY WITH YOU. BECAUSE I'M SURE THAT THEY FEEL
- 24 SOMETIMES VERY ALONE AND SCARED AND NOT SURE WHAT EACH AND
- 25 EVERY DAY WILL BRING. WHETHER IT IS THEM SENDING THEIR KIDS TO



- 1 SCHOOL. BUT AS YOU SAID, SUPERVISOR SOLIS, THEY ARE NOT

- 3 LOSING THE BREADWINNERS IN THE FAMILY BECAUSE THEY ARE TOO
- 4 AFRAID TO WALK OUTSIDE OF THEIR HOUSE. SO WE HAVE GOT, WE HAVE
- 5 A REAL CRISIS ON OUR HANDS. WE HAVE PEOPLE WHO ARE SLIPPING
- 6 THROUGH OUR SAFETY NET EVERY SINGLE HOUR. AS IT RELATES TO
- 7 THESE RAIDS. SO I THINK THAT I'M SUPPORTIVE OF US DECLARING
- 8 THIS STATE OF EMERGENCY. I THINK THAT IT IS IMPORTANT THAT WE

- 16 THEY WAKE UP. I FEEL LIKE WE AS THEIR COUNTY GOVERNMENT SHOULD
- 17 STAND WITH THEM AND SAY WE DECLARE, WE ARE IN AN ABSOLUTE
- 18 DISASTER AND THIS IS AN EMERGENCY. THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR

20 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.

- 22 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU. TO COUNTY COUNSEL, WHY
- 23 IS YOUR FULL REPORT CONSIDERED A CONFIDENTIAL REPORT? I'M
- 24 ASKING BECAUSE I'M JUST TRYING TO GET CLEAR ABOUT HOW FAR WE
- 25 CAN GO IN THE KIND OF CONVERSATIONS THAT WE'RE HAVING HERE.

- 6 ATTORNEY-CLIENT PRIVILEGE. WE PROVIDED THE BOARD WITH ADVICE,
- 7 LEGAL ADVICE IN OUR MEMO. THAT IS PRIVILEGED, THEREFORE
- 8 CONFIDENTIAL.

- 10 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: DOES THAT MEAN WE WILL HAVE A
- 11 FULLER CONVERSATION IN CLOSED SESSION OR IS THIS GOING TO BE
- 12 KIND OF THE NATURE OF THE CONVERSATION? I DON'T UNDERSTAND WHY
- 13 IT'S A CONFIDENTIAL REPORT. WE'RE TALKING ABOUT IT PUBLICLY
- 14 UNLESS WE HAVE A DEEPER CONVERSATION IN CLOSED SESSION.

- 16 >> JOSHUA BOBROWSKY: YOUR BOARD ASKED US TO RETURN WITH A
- 17 VERBAL PRESENTATION. THE BOARD CAN MEET IN CLOSED SESSION
- 18 UNDER SIGNIFICANT EXPOSURE TO LITIGATION.

- 20 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: WOULD YOU INTERPRET THE
- 21 CONVERSATION THAT WE'RE NOW HAVING POTENTIAL SUBJECT TO
- 22 LITIGATION?

- 24 >> JOSHUA BOBROWSKY: SO CERTAINLY, WE HAVE AVOIDED DISCUSSING
- 25 OUR LEGAL ADVICE IN THIS PUBLIC CONVERSATION. IF YOU WANTED TO



- 1 DISCUSS OUR LEGAL ADVICE, WE COULD MEET IN CLOSED SECTION,
- 2 THAT COULD BE SET FOR THE NEXT MEETING. AND JUST, AS YOU ARE
- 3 PROBABLY AWARE, FOR INSTANCE WITH OUR COVID EVICTION
- 4 MORATORIUM, THE COUNTY WAS SUED A NUMBER OF TIMES. SO THESE
- 5 KINDS OF ACTIONS TYPICALLY RESULT IN SOME FORM OF LITIGATION.

- 7 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: I'M GOING TO FOCUS MY QUESTIONS ON
- 8 KIND OF THE PRESENTATION IN CHIEF BECAUSE I CERTAINLY AGREE
- 9 WITH ALL OF THE COMMENTS MY COLLEAGUES HAVE MADE. AND I WANT
- 10 US TO BE IN THE STRONGEST POSITION WE CAN BE TO PROTECT OUR
- 11 RESIDENTS. I DON'T WANT A PUBLIC CONVERSATION TO JEOPARDIZE
- 12 THAT WHEN WE DIDN'T HAVE TO DO THAT, WE COULD HAVE -- SINCE
- 13 THE REPORT WAS PRIVATE. LET ME FOCUS COMMENTS ON THE REPORT
- 14 THAT WAS PRESENTED. LAST WEEK I HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO MEET
- 15 WITH MEMBERS WHO LIVE IN MY CONTRADICT OF THE L.A. TENANTS
- 16 UNION. I WANTED TO TALK ABOUT THE PROPOSED RESOLUTION LANGUAGE
- 17 THEY BROUGHT FORWARD AT A PREVIOUS MEETING. I HEARD SOME
- 18 REALLY HORRIFIC, PAINFUL TENANT STORIES, ABOUT HABITABILITY,
- 19 LACK OF RESPONSIVENESS OF PROPERTY OWNERS AND WORSE VIOLENCE,
- 20 VIOLENT ATTACKS. TENANTS HAVE EXPERIENCED, BROUGHT TO THEM BY
- 21 THEIR LANDLORDS. WHAT WE HEARD LOUD AND CLEAR ALSO WAS THAT
- 22 THERE ARE GAPS IN THE ENFORCEMENT OF EXISTING TENANT
- 23 PROTECTIONS. BOTH IN THE CITY OF L.A. AS WELL AS IN THE
- 24 COUNTY. HAVING HAD THAT CONVERSATION EXPERIENCE WHEN I LOOKED
- 25 AT THE REPORT, THE PUBLIC REPORT YOU HAVE GIVEN US, I'M CLEAR



- 1 THAT RENT STABILIZATION AND TENANT PROTECTIONS, WHAT WE HAVE
- 2 IS SOME OF THE STRONGEST IN THE STATE. BUT I'M REALLY OPEN TO
- 3 EXPLORING IMPROVEMENTS BASED ON WHAT DCBA IS LEARNING THROUGH
- 4 THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ORDINANCE, INCLUDING THE UPDATED
- 5 RENTAL INCREASE ALLOWANCE FORMULA AND LIVED EXPERIENCES OF
- 6 TENANTS AS WELL AS SMALL LANDLORDS. AS A RESULT OF THAT
- 7 CONVERSATION AND HEARING THINGS WE THOUGHT WE ADDRESSED
- 8 THROUGH PUBLIC POLICY BUT GAPS IN ENFORCEMENT, I ASKED MY TEAM

- 13 REPORTS THAT COME BACK FROM VARIOUS COUNTY DEPARTMENTS. SO,
- 14 AGAIN, AS BASED ON REVIEW OF THOSE ACTIONS WE HAVE TAKEN,
- 15 BASED ON THE ONE PAGE RECOMMENDATION YOU GAVE US IN THE PUBLIC
- 16 REPORT, I'M CLEAR THAT RELIEF IS IMPORTANT, GIVING PEOPLE THEY
- 17 DON'T HAVE TO PAY BACK. AS WELL AS RIGHT TO COUNSEL. I'M PROUD
- 18 TO HAVE BROUGHT THAT MOTION IN 2023. TWO REALLY STRONG TOOLS
- 19 IN OUR TOOLKIT TO KEEP PEOPLE HOUSED. IN LIGHT OF THOSE
- 20 OBSERVATIONS AND COMMENTS I HAVE A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS. I'M
- 21 PLEASED TO HEAR WE ALL WANT TO ADD MONDAY TO RENTAL
- 22 PROTECTIONS. I HAD AN AH-HAH MOMENT PARTICULARLY AS WE TRACK
- 23 ABOUT RELIEF FOR BOTH WILDFIRE VICTIMS AS WELL AS IMMIGRATION
- 24 RAIDS. CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY FOUNDATION RAISED A TON OF MONEY
- 25 DURING THESE EMERGENCY UNPRECEDENTED EFFORTS. I WONDER IF WE



- 1 HAVE ANY IDEA HOW MUCH WAS RAISED OVERALL, HOW MUCH THE COUNTY
- 2 HAS RECEIVED FROM CCF, BECAUSE IS THAT A SOURCE AS WE LOOK FOR
- 3 SOURCES OF FUNDS. HOW MUCH HAS BEEN MADE AVAILABLE TO THE
- 4 COUNTY, COULD POTENTIALLY BE MADE AVAILABLE FOR OUR RENT
- 5 RELIEF. MISS ANDERSON?

- 7 >> KATE ANDERSON: PARTNERSHIPS ARE MORE IMPORTANT THAN EVER,
- 8 WE HAVE BEEN PARTNERING WITH THE COMMUNITY FOUNDATION AND CITY
- 9 OF L.A. TO RAID FUNDS FOR CASH AID. WE'RE HAPPY TO GO TO THE
- 10 CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY FOUNDATION TO ASK HOW MUCH HAS BEEN
- 11 RAISED AND DISTRIBUTED WITHIN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. WE
- 12 KNOW IT IS IN THE MILLIONS TO THE VERY COMMUNITIES WE SEEK TO
- 13 SERVE.

- 16 AMOUNT. I KNOW THAT SO MUCH OF THE TARGETED FOCUS AREA WAS TO

- 18 HAS BENEFITTED DIRECTLY, ORGANIZATIONS AND INDIVIDUALS. DO WE

- 24 THROUGH DCBA TO SUPPORT THE PARTNER ORGANIZATION WORKING WITH
- 25 OUR REPRESENT L.A. CLIENTS. THEY HAVE BEEN PART OF THE FUNDERS



- 1 BRIEFING THAT SUPERVISOR SOLIS WAS A PART OF ARE AND MAYOR
- 2 BASS WAS A PART OF. WE'RE GOING TO UNUSUAL SUSPECTS FOR THIS

- 22 TO US GO FASTER. BUT IT IS NOT ADDITIONAL RESOURCES.

- 21 THAT BUT IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE UNDERSTAND WHO THEY ARE AND
- 22 WHAT KIND OF MONEY WE ARE TALKING ABOUT. STARTS WITH HOW MUCH
- 23 WAS RAISED SO WE KNOW WHAT THE DENOMINATOR IS SO WE CAN GET A
- 24 SENSE OF WHAT A FAIR ASK MAY BE FROM US TO ASK THEM TO SUPPORT
- 25 US IN BOLSTERING OUR RENT RELIEF EFFORTS, RECOGNIZING THAT



- 1 BASED ON OUR PAST DISCUSSIONS AND PAST PRACTICES AS WELL AS

- 9 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: THANK YOU. I WANTED TO NOTE THAT
- 10 SUPERVISOR HAHN HAS REQUESTED TO BE CO-AUTHOR ON THIS MOTION.
- 11 WHICH WE ARE HAPPY TO ACCEPT. I WANTED TO RESPOND TO SOME OF
- 12 THE COMMENTS THAT WERE MADE. I THINK THIS MOMENT, ESPECIALLY
- 13 FROM A BUDGET PERSPECTIVE, BUT SO MANY REASONS CALLS FOR AN
- 14 ALL-IN APPROACH. I WOULD SAY THAT OUR OFFICE OF IMMIGRANT
- 15 AFFAIRS, DCBA, COUNTY RESOURCES ALONE WON'T BE ABLE TO PROTECT
- 16 EVERYONE. I THINK THIS DECLARATION IS NOT ONLY A CLEAR
- 17 STATEMENT OF OUR VALUES, IT GIVES US OPTIONS FROM A BUDGETING
- 18 PERSPECTIVE, HOUSING ACCELERATION PERSPECTIVE, PROCESS
- 19 PERSPECTIVE INCLUDING SEEKING MUTUAL AID FROM CITIES. WE
- 20 DECLARED A STATE OF EMERGENCY ON HOMELESSNESS THAT WAS NOT
- 21 SHARED BY THE STATE BUT WAS DECLARED BY OTHER CITIES. IT
- 22 DECLARED THAT WE ARE WORKING TOGETHER TO ADDRESS THESE
- 23 EMERGENCIES. IT DIDN'T BRING ABOUT NEW FUNDING BUT IT DID
- 24 BRING ABOUT DIFFERENT TYPES OF RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN CITIES AND
- 25 THE COUNTY AS IT RELATES TO ADDRESSING THE CRISIS THAT WE'RE



- 1 ALL EXPERIENCING TOGETHER. THERE'S VALUE IN THIS MOTION WHILE
- 2 IT WAS BROUGHT FORWARD UNDER THE CONTEXT OF THIS DISCUSSION
- 3 AND THE RELATIONSHIP TO THE TERMS FOR RENT MORATORIUM. THERE
- 4 IS VALUE BEYOND A MORATORIUM. THOUGH AS I MENTIONED YOUR
- 5 PRESENTATION INDICATES THAT IT IS ESSENTIAL IF WE ARE GOING TO
- 6 CONSIDER A MORATORIUM AS A TOOL MOVING FORWARD. THE FRANKLIN
- 7 FIRE WAS NOT DECLARED A STATE EMERGENCY, IT WAS A LOCAL
- 8 EMERGENCY. EVENTUALLY WE HAD TO PUSH FOR THE STATE TO COME
- 9 ONBOARD. THE WINTER RAINS WHEN THEY WERE DECLARED AS
- 10 EMERGENCY, VERY RECENTLY, WERE NOT A STATE EMERGENCY. IT ISN'T
- 11 THE STRAIGHT PARTNERSHIP THAT'S REQUIRED BUT IT INDICATES TO
- 12 THE STATE PARTNERS THAT THE IMPACTS THAT WE'RE FEELING ARE
- 13 REAL, THEY ARE SIGNIFICANT, AND THEY WARRANT THEIR ONGOING
- 14 ENGAGEMENT WITH US IN ADDRESSING THE IMPACTS WE FEEL ON THE
- 15 STREET. WHILE ALSO SIGNALLING TO OUR RESPECTIVE CITIES THAT
- 16 THE COUNTY CAN'T DO THIS WORK ALONE. I WOULD ALSO NOTE THAT
- 17 THIS IS NOT A REPORTBACK, THE DIRECTIVE IS TO DRAFT
- 18 DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY FOR THE NEXT MEETING. I JUST WANT TO
- 19 NOTE THAT, THERE WAS DISCUSSION OF A REPORTBACK. IF SOMEBODY
- 20 WANTS ONE THAT'S FINE TO REQUEST. BUT THIS MOTION ASKS FOR A
- 21 DRAFTED DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY AT OUR NEXT MEETING. I ALSO
- 22 WANTED TO ADDRESS THE COMMENTS MADE ABOUT RETALIATION. YES, AS
- 23 A BOARD WE HAVE TO MAKE INFORMED DECISIONS. THAT'S WHY WE ALSO
- 24 HAVE STANDING ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION AS A BOARD SOMETIMES IN
- 25 CLOSED SESSION TO CONSIDER THOSE RISKS. THERE ARE RISKS THAT



- 1 THE COUNTY CONSIDERS ON A REGULAR BASIS. AND SOMETIMES WE
- 2 PROCEED EVEN WHEN THERE IS RISK BECAUSE IT IS OUR VALUES, IT
- 3 REPRESENTS OUR VALUES TO DO SO. I WOULD ALSO SAY THAT IF WE
- 4 HAVE INCREASED HOMELESSNESS ON OUR STREETS THAT COULD MAKE US
- 5 MORE OF A TARGET. WE HAVE SEEN HOW THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS
- 6 TARGETED US ON THAT ISSUE. AND IT IS CERTAIN THAT IF WE DO NOT
- 7 INCREASE THE KIND OF PROTECTION THAT WE NEED FOR PEOPLE WHO
- 8 ARE SEEKING TO CONTINUE TO BE HOUSED IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY,
- 9 THAT DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY COULD ALSO GET WORSE. WHILE WE
- 10 AREN'T USING THAT DECLARATION, THIS IS A UNIQUE SET OF
- 11 CIRCUMSTANCES, IT DOES RELATE TO HOMELESSNESS AND THE SERVICES
- 12 THAT ARE PROVIDED TO PEOPLE TO KEEP THEM PROTECTED. WE SHOULD
- 13 MAKE INFORMED DECISIONS. THAT'S WHY I'M ASKING LEGAL COUNSEL
- 14 TO DRAFT THIS DECLARATION FOR US TO CONSIDER BECAUSE I THINK
- 15 THE CIRCUMSTANCES WE HAVE OUTLINED WARRANT IT. BUT I WILL MAKE
- 16 SURE THAT WE FOLLOW YOUR LEGAL DIRECTION, WHICH IS WHY I ASKED
- 17 ABOUT MAKING SURE THAT WE HAVE -- WE'RE CONSIDERING ALL KINDS
- 18 OF EXPERTISE THAT NEED TO BE PART OF THIS CONVERSATION. I
- 19 WOULD ALSO SAY, YES, THERE IS EXTREME PERIL, JUST ASK THE
- 20 FAMILIES WHO HAVE SEEN THEIR FAMILY MEMBERS KIDNAPPED OFF THE
- 21 STREET. IT IS BEYOND OUR CONTROL, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS
- 22 DOING THIS TO US. IT IS NOT JUST HAPPENING TO THE COUNTY, IT
- 23 IS HAPPENING TO THE CITIES, IT IS HAPPENING IN THE STATE, IT
- 24 IS HAPPENING TO COMMUNITIES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY. WE NEED TO

- 5 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. I WOULD SAY THAT THE
- 6 GOVERNOR IS TAKING ON THE HOMELESS ISSUE. IT'S NOT JUST THE
- 7 FEDERAL GOVERNMENT THAT CHALLENGES US. I'VE BEEN LISTENING,
- 8 AND I DO THINK THIS IS GOING TO BE A STRETCH. I GET THE FIRES,
- 9 THAT WAS A NATURAL DISASTER. I THINK YOU HAVE OUTLINED WHAT
- 10 CRITERIA IS FOR SETTING UP A STATE OF EMERGENCY. I'M SURE WE
- 11 WILL BE CHALLENGED LEGALLY. BUT I THINK MY FRUSTRATION, AND I
- 12 APPRECIATED WHAT SUPERVISOR MITCHELL WAS ASKING, THE LANDLORDS
- 13 ARE GOING TO BE HELD FINANCIALLY RESPONSIBLE WHEN IT'S NO

- 19 LANDLORDS ARE NOW GOING TO BE BASICALLY FOOTING THE BILL.
- 20 UNLESS THERE'S SOMETHING I'M MISSING.

- 22 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: YES, THIS DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY IS
- 23 NOT DECLARING AN EVICTION MORATORIUM.

24

25 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: IT IS INCLUDED THERE, POTENTIAL



1 EVICTION ACTIONS.

- 14 HEALTHCARE BENEFITS, VACATION DAYS, SICK DAYS, CAREER PATHS,
- 15 RETIREMENT BENEFITS. IT IS CHEAPER TO GO WITH A CONTRACTOR WHO
- 16 DOESN'T OFFER THEIR WORKERS THOSE SAME BENEFITS. LIKE THIS
- 17 CONTRACT TODAY, FOR CUSTODIAN AND JANITORIAL SERVICES IN
- 18 JAILS. THIS CONTRACTOR DOES NOT PROVIDE THE SAME HEALTHCARE
- 19 BENEFITS. THIS MEANS THAT THE EMPLOYEES ARE GOING TO HAVE TO
- 20 PAY EXPENSIVE PREMIUMS JUST TO GET HEALTHCARE, WHICH MAY BE
- 21 GOING UP IF A DEAL CAN'T BE REACHED IN CONGRESS. THEY LIKELY
- 22 WON'T HAVE ACCESS TO SICK DAYS. THE CONTRACT ALSO IS NON-
- 23 UNION, THEY WON'T HAVE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING TO HELP THEM GET
- 24 THE BENEFITS IN THE FUTURE. OF COURSE MANY OF US BELIEVE THAT
- 25 UNION LABOR DOES BETTER QUALITY WORK. IS THIS EVEN THE BEST



- 1 WAY TO GET OUALITY SERVICES FOR OUR DEPARTMENTS? I INTRODUCED
- 2 A MOTION A FEW YEARS AGO THAT IMPLEMENTED A PILOT PROGRAM AT
- 3 THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES TO REQUIRE THAT ALL
- 4 CONTRACTORS PROVIDE TOP OF THE LINE HEALTHCARE. I HOPE THAT WE
- 5 CAN EXPAND THAT POLICY TO ALL OF OUR DEPARTMENTS. BECAUSE
- 6 OTHERWISE WE WILL ALWAYS BE READING ON OUR AGENDA THAT WE WILL
- 7 FIND WHATEVER SERVICES CAN BE PERFORMED MORE ECONOMICALLY BY
- 8 AN INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. I UNDERSTAND WHY THIS CONTRACT IS
- 9 BEFORE US TODAY. OUR JAILS NEED MORE CUSTODIAN SERVICES THAN
- 10 THEY HAVE RIGHT NOW. BUT IT IS MY -- THESE EMPLOYEES ARE GOING

- 13 AND COLLECTIVE BARGAINING POWERS. I UNDERSTAND THAT THIS
- 14 CURRENT CONTRACTOR GOES TO THE END -- CONTRACT GOES TO THE END
- 15 OF JANUARY. WE'RE NOT UP AGAINST TOO MUCH OF A WALL. I'M
- 16 REOUESTING COLLEAGUES THAT MICHAEL YOU REFER THIS BACK TO ISD.
- 17 TAKE ANOTHER LOOK AT THIS CONTRACT AND SEE IF WE MIGHT INCLUDE
- 18 BETTER PROTECTIONS FOR OUR EMPLOYEES. AGAIN I BROUGHT UP MY
- 19 CONCERNS ABOUT OUR COUNTY'S POLICIES OF CONTACTING OUT, SINCE
- 20 I WAS ELECTED IN 2016, AND YET OUR DEPARTMENTS CONTINUE TO
- 21 BRING THESE CONTRACTS BEFORE US, AGAIN, BASED ON WHAT IS

- 10 A BARGAINING GROUP AND THEY HAVE CERTAIN PROTECTIONS, USUALLY
- 11 IT'S CORRECT, THEY HAVE A BETTER QUALITY OF WORK, GET BETTER
- 12 BENEFITS. THEY AREN'T WORRIED AS SOME OTHER CONTRACTORS THAT
- 13 ARE JUST LOW BID AND NOT GOING TO PAY ANYTHING. THEY SQUEEZE

- 13 ELECTION COMING UP, WE HAVE TO DO IT IN EXTRAORDINARY SHORT
- 14 TIME FRAME. NORMALLY, THE REGISTRAR PLANS A YEAR IN ADVANCE.
- 15 THIS TIME, LESS THAN THREE MONTHS. WE HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY TO
- 16 OUR VOTERS TO MAKE SURE THAT THIS SPECIAL ELECTION IS CARRIED
- 17 OUT SMOOTHLY AND SECURELY EVEN ON A COMPRESSED TIMELINE SO
- 18 THAT IS WHY I PUT FORTH A MOTION, A FEW WEEKS AGO, ASKING FOR
- 19 DEAN LOGAN, OUR ESTEEMED REGISTRAR RECORDER TO JOIN US AT THIS
- 20 MEETING AND UPDATE US ON HOW HIS DEPARTMENT PREPARATIONS ARE
- 21 GOING. I THINK THAT HE HAS A PRESENTATION AND WHEN HE IS DONE,
- 22 I'LL HAVE A FEW QUESTIONS. THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR.

- 24 >> DEAN LOGAN: GOOD AFTERNOON, COUNTY CLERK, I'M HERE TO
- 25 REPORT ON THE MOTION PASSED ON SEPTEMBER 16 ABOUT PREPARATION



- 1 FOR THE NOVEMBER 4, 2025 STATEWIDE SPECIAL ELECTION. I WILL GO
- 2 THROUGH BRIEFLY SOME SLIDES AND THEN BE HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY
- 3 QUESTIONS. AN ELECTION, OVERVIEW OF THE ELECTION IS, IT IS
- 4 PROBABLY FIRST, MOST IMPORTANT TO SAY THAT THIS WAS NOT AN
- 5 ANTICIPATED ELECTION. WE DID NOT HAVE ON SCHEDULE AND ELECT A
- 6 COUNTY-WIDE ELECTION FOR 2025 WE, THIS CAME ABOUT WHEN THE
- 7 CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE PASSED A BILL AND THE GOVERNOR SIGNED
- 8 IT INTO LAW CALLING FOR A STATEWIDE SPECIAL ELECTION ON A
- 9 STATEWIDE PROPOSITION, CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT THAT IS
- 10 PROPOSED ADDRESSING CONGRESSIONAL REDISTRICTING AND I'LL TALK
- 11 ABOUT IT A LITTLE MORE IN A MOMENT. I DID WANT TO JUST, FROM
- 12 THE START SAY, IT WAS NOT A PLANNED OR ANTICIPATED ELECTION.
- 13 IT WAS ALSO NOT A BUDGETED ELECTION. WE ARE FORTUNATE IN THE
- 14 SENSE THAT THE LEGISLATURE RECOGNIZED THAT AND THE GOVERNOR
- 15 RECOGNIZED THAT WHEN THEY CALLED FOR THE STATEWIDE SPECIAL
- 16 ELECTION AND THE STATE IS PROVIDING FUNDING FOR THE ELECTION.
- 17 IN FACT, WE RECEIVED THAT FUNDING UPFRONT. WE ESTIMATED THE
- 18 COST WHICH IS UNUSUAL. WE ESTIMATED THE COST OF THIS ELECTION
- 19 IN LA COUNTY TO BE APPROXIMATELY \$67 MILLION. HUGE BUDGET
- 20 IMPACT FOR US. HAD THE STATE NOT PROVIDED THAT MONEY. THAT
- 21 MONEY WAS PROVIDED UPFRONT. IT ALSO HAD A PROVISION, ALSO
- 22 UNUSUAL BUT A PROVISION IN THE LAW THAT SAYS, IF WE COME IN
- 23 UNDER THAT ESTIMATE, THAT THE REMAINING BALANCE OF THAT CAN BE
- 24 CARRIED FORWARD TO HELP FUND THE NEXT ELECTION WHICH WOULD BE
- 25 THE JUNE STATEWIDE PRIMARY ELECTION. SO THE MEASURE THAT IS



- 1 BEFORE VOTERS IS STATE MEASURE 50 FOR MOST VOTER, ALL VOTERS
- 2 IN LA COUNTY WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE
- 3 SPRINGS WHICH ALSO HAS A LOCAL MEASURE ON THE BALLOT, THE REST
- 4 OF THE COUNTY, THIS IS THE ONLY MEASURE THAT APPEARS ON THE
- 5 BALLOT. IT IS STATE MEASURE 50. WHAT IT IS, A CONSTITUTIONAL
- 6 AMENDMENT THAT IS WHY IT HAS TO GO BEFORE THE VOTERS BECAUSE
- 7 IT AN AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION THAT WOULD ALLOW FOR
- 8 TEMPORARY CHANGES TO CALIFORNIA CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT
- 9 BOUNDARIES THAT WOULD BE IN EFFECT UNTIL THE YEAR 2030 WHAT
- 10 THAT MEANS FOR OUR VOTERS IS THAT, IF THIS IS PASSED, SOME
- 11 VOTERS MAY BE ASSIGNED TO A DIFFERENT U.S. HOUSE DISTRICT IN
- 12 FUTURE ELECTIONS INCLUDING IN 2026 THE NEXT STATEWIDE
- 13 ELECTION. WHAT IT DOES NOT DO, IT DOES NOT CHANGE YOUR VOTER
- 14 ELIGIBILITY. DOES NOT CHANGE VOTER REGISTRATION AND VOTER
- 15 OPTIONS. DOES NOT CHANGE THE BOUNDARIES OF STATE ASSEMBLY AND
- 16 STATE SENATE DISTRICTS, THIS IS SPECIFIC TO U.S.
- 17 REPRESENTATIVE DISTRICTS FOR CONGRESSIONAL SEATS. SO IN
- 18 PREPARATION FOR THIS ELECTION, AS WE SIT HERE TODAY, WE ARE 25
- 19 DAYS AWAY FROM THE ELECTION. WE HAD 75 DAYS FROM THE TIME THAT
- 20 THE GOVERNOR SIGNED THE, INTO LAW TO PREPARE FOR THIS
- 21 ELECTION. WE ARE ALREADY IN THE VOTING PERIOD FOR THE
- 22 ELECTION. IN SEPTEMBER, LATE SEPTEMBER, SEPTEMBER 25, VOTERS
- 23 WERE MAILED FROM OUR OFFICE AN OFFICIAL SAMPLE BALLOT FROM THE
- 24 REGISTRAR'S OFFICE AND SIMILARLY, THEY WERE MAILED A STATE
- 25 VOTER INFORMATION GUIDE FROM THE SECRETARY OF STATE'S OFFICE.

- 9 STARTS, WHEN TO EXPECT YOUR VOTE MY MAIL BALLOT, AND PROVIDES
- 10 FACSIMILE FROM THE BALLOT, SO VOTERS KNOW WHAT THEY SEE WHEN
- 11 THEY RECEIVE THEIR BALLOT. THE STATE VOTER INFORMATION GUIDE
- 12 WHICH IS WHAT YOU SEE ON THE RIGHT OF THE SCREEN, CONTAINS THE
- 13 DETAILED INFORMATION ABOUT THE STATE PROPOSITION INCLUDING
- 14 STATEMENTS FOR AND AGAINST THE PROPOSE SESSION AND IN THIS

- 4 MONITOR THE BALLOTS, BOXES ON A REGULAR BASIS. WE SEND TEAMS
- 5 OF TWO, WHO ARE IDENTIFIED AS COUNTY EMPLOYEES, THE BOXES ARE

- 2 WEEKEND OF VOTING MUCH AGAIN OPEN 10-7 UNTIL ELECTION DAY
- 3 WHERE WE HAVE STANDARD POLLING HOURS OF 7 A.M. TO 8 p.m. WE
- 4 ARE STAFFING THOSE LOCATIONS WITH A COMBINATION OF COMMUNITY
- 5 VOLUNTEER WORKERS, AND COUNTY EMPLOYEE WORKERS. ABOUT 1800
- 6 COMMUNITY WORKERS AND 1600 COUNTY EMPLOYEES. ALWAYS WANT TO
- 7 TAKE THE OPPORTUNITY TO THANK THIS BOARD FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF
- 8 THE COUNTY ELECTION WORKER PROGRAM THAT HAS MADE A TREMENDOUS

- 4 PAGE TO GIVE INFORMATION TO THOSE VOTERS. I'LL BE SPEAKING AT
- 5 EVENT THURSDAY EVENING IN ALTADENA ON THIS ISSUE AND WE HAVE
- 6 HAD A NUMBER OF PEOPLE SUPPORTING US AND GETTING THAT WORD OUT
- 7 TO VOTERS AS WELL. SECONDLY, I WANTED TO MENTION JUST THAT WE

- 25 VOTE BALLOT OR LOOK UP FEATURE ON THE WEB SITE OR GO TO A VOTE



- 1 CENTER THAT MAKES THEM FEEL COMFORTABLE OR THAT THEIR VOTE IS
- 2 HANDLED APPROPRIATELY. A COUPLE THINGS ABOUT POST ELECTION,
- 3 THIS IS SOMETHING THAT IS ALWAYS IMPORTANT TO EMPHASIZE,
- 4 CALIFORNIA AND LA COUNTY PROVIDE LOTS OF OPTIONS FOR VOTERS TO
- 5 CAST THEIR BALLOT. EVERYBODY SHOULD HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO DO
- 6 THAT. AS A RESULT OF THAT, THAT MEANS THAT THERE IS STILL A
- 7 SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF WORK TO DO AFTER ELECTION DAY. WE STILL
- 8 HAVE VALID BALLOTS THAT ARE COMING IN FROM OUR DROP BOXES,
- 9 THAT ARE COMING FROM THE U.S. POSTAL SERVICE, THAT HAVE TO GO
- 10 THROUGH THE SAME VERIFICATION, AUTHENTICATION AND SECURE
- 11 PROCEDURES BEFORE THEY CAN BE COUNTED. THAT IS BEING DONE
- 12 DURING THE POST ELECTION CANVAS. WE CONDUCT A 1% MANUAL TALLY
- 13 WHERE WE RANDOMLY SELECT 1% OF THE BALLOTS, HAND COUNT THOSE
- 14 AND COMPARE THOSE TO OUR TALLY TO VALIDATE THAT THE EQUIPMENT
- 15 IS OPERATING PROPERLY AND THAT THE OUTCOMES ARE ACCURATE. ALL
- 16 OF THOSE ACTIVITIES ARE OPEN FOR PUBLIC OBSERVATION. WE ALWAYS
- 17 EMPHASIZE THAT THIS PROCESS BELONGS TO THE VOTERS OF LA
- 18 COUNTY, AND THAT TAKES PLACE AT OUR BALLOT PROCESSING CENTER
- 19 IN THE CITY OF INDUSTRY. THAT BUILD WAGS DESIGNED FOR SECURITY
- 20 AND -- BUILDING WAS DESIGNED FOR SECURITY AND TRANSPARENCY.
- 21 THEY CAN COME IN PERSON TO OBSERVE THAT AND WATCH ANY OF THE
- 22 ACTIVITIES ON LIVE WEB STREAM ON OUR WEB SITE AS WELL. WE DO
- 23 EMPHASIZE THAT THE TRANSPARENT ELEMENT OF THAT. THIS JUST
- 24 GIVES KIND OF THE FINAL CANVASS CERTIFICATION, IT CAN BE
- 25 FRUSTRATING FOR VOTERS AND CAMPAIGNS, WAITING FOR THE POST



- 1 ELECTION PERIOD. WE PROVIDE UPDATES ON A REGULAR BASIS.
- 2 UPDATES TAILLIE, INCLUDING THE DAY AFTER THE ELECTION. THAT
- 3 WILL CONTINUE AS LONG AS WE HAVE BALLOTS TO BE ADDED TO THE
- 4 COUNT. AGAIN WE WILL COMPLETE OUR CANVASS AND CERTIFY THE
- 5 ELECTION ON DECEMBER 2. AND WITH THAT I WILL TAKE YOUR
- 6 QUESTIONS.

8 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR JANICE HAHN.

9

- 10 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU SUPERVISOR KATHRYN BARGER.
- 11 THANK YOU. IMPRESSIVE, REALLY. WITH THE SHORT TIME. SOUNDS
- 12 LIKE, ACCORDING TO THE PRESENTATION, YOU HAVE ENOUGH VOTE
- 13 CENTERS. SOUNDS LIKE YOU HAVE ENOUGH VOLUNTEERS, COUNTY
- 14 WORKERS AND OTHERS, OR ARE YOU STILL REQUESTING THAT MORE
- 15 VOLUNTEERS SIGN UP?

- 17 >> DEAN LOGAN: YEAH, THANK YOU SUPERVISOR. WE ARE IN GOOD
- 18 SHAPE. A GOOD MODEL THAT HAS BEEN PROVEN, EFFECTIVE IN LA
- 19 COUNTY. IT WAS CHALLENGING IN GETTING, SECURING THE VOTING
- 20 LOCATIONS BECAUSE UNDER THE SHORT PERIOD OF TIME, THE ROOMS
- 21 AND THE SPACES THAT YOU WOULD TYPICALLY USE FOR VOTING IN MANY
- 22 CASES WERE BOOKED FOR REVENUE PRODUCING EVENTS, FOR THE
- 23 PROPRIETORS OF THE LOCATIONS. THAT WAS, PROBABLY THE BIGGEST
- 24 CHALLENGE, BUT AGAIN, WE HAD A REDUCED NUMBER TO SECURE AND AT
- 25 THIS POINT, WE HAVE SECURED ALL OF THE LOCATIONS WE NEED AND I



- 1 SHOULD MENTION THAT VOTERS WILL ALSO RECEIVE A POSTCARD IN THE
- 2 MAIL TELLING THEM THE CLOSEST LOCATIONS WHERE THEY LIVE. THERE
- 3 WILL BE INFORMATION PROVIDED.

5 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: THEY DON'T HAVE TO USE THAT ONE.

6

7 >> DEAN LOGAN: ANYWHERE IN THE COUNTY.

8

- 9 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: YOU TOUCHED ON IT BECAUSE LAST WEEK,
- 10 STATE OFFICIALS HAD WARNED THAT SOME USPS LOCATIONS WERE NOT
- 11 POSTMARKING MAIL ON THE SAME DAY. THAT PEOPLE PUT IT IN THE
- 12 MAILBOX. SO THAT WOULD MEAN IF THEY PUT IT IN ON ELECTION DAY,
- 13 IT MIGHT NOT GET THE ELECTION DAY POST MARK. IT SEEMED TO BE,
- 14 THAT WAS AFFECTING SOME RURAL AREAS THAT WERE LIKE, 50 MILES
- 15 FROM --

- 17 >> DEAN LOGAN: YEAH. THANK YOU FOR THAT. THERE WAS A LOT OF
- 18 MEDIA ATTENTION ON THIS LAST WEEK. AND I THINK THAT IT IS A
- 19 GOOD EXAMPLE OF SITUATIONAL AWARENESS OF AGAIN, EMPOWERING
- 20 VOTERS TO KNOW WHAT THEIR OPTIONS ARE. HOW TO MAKE SURE THAT
- 21 THEIR VOTE IS COUNTED. YOU'RE CORRECT THAT INTERPRETATION OF
- 22 THAT REGULATION IS MORE ABOUT POSTAL STATIONS ARE 50 MILES
- 23 AWAY FROM THE LARGER PROCESSING CENTERS OF THE U.S. POSTAL
- 24 CENTER. MOST OF LA COUNTY, THAT WOULD NOT BE THE CASE. WE ARE
- 25 STILL ENCOURAGING VOTERS TO --



- 2 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: ENCOURAGING VOTER, IF THEY ARE THERE, ON
- 3 ELECTION DAY, TO ACTUALLY WALK UP TO THE COUNTER AND SAY, POST
- 4 MARK THIS.

6 >> DEAN LOGAN: YES, THAT IS CORRECT.

7

- 8 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: YOU KIND OF TOUCHED A LITTLE BIT TOO ON
- 9 SAFETY, SECURITY, MORE ABOUT GENERAL AWARENESS. BUT I'M A
- 10 LITTLE BIT CONCERNED IN THIS ERA OF INCREASED POLITICAL
- 11 VIOLENCE THAT WE MIGHT NEED TO TAKE MORE ACTION IN TERMS OF
- 12 SECURITY AROUND VOTE CENTERS. I DON'T KNOW, HAVE YOU TALKED TO
- 13 THE SHERIFF? OR HAVE WE TALKED WITH SOME OF THE LOCAL CITIES?
- 14 I'M JUST VERY CONCERNED. I'VE SEEN AN UPTICK IN POLITICAL
- 15 VIOLENCE AND I WANT TO MAKE SURE PEOPLE ARE SAFE WHEN THEY
- 16 EXERCISE THEIR RIGHT TO VOTE.

- 18 >> DEAN LOGAN: SUPERVISOR, I SHARE THAT CONCERN. THIS IS
- 19 SOMETHING TOP OF MIND AS SOON AS WE HEARD THAT THE LIKELIHOOD
- 20 OF THIS ELECTION. CANDIDLY THE NATURE OF THE ELECTION IS PART
- 21 OF THE POLITICAL DISCOURSE THAT IS HAPPENING IN THE COUNTRY
- 22 RIGHT NOW. WE RECOGNIZE THAT. IN FACT, DURING THE PRESS
- 23 CONFERENCE WHEN THE GOVERNOR SIGNED THE LEGISLATION CALLING
- 24 FOR THE ELECTION, THERE WERE ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES AND
- 25 DEMONSTRATIONS OUTSIDE OF THAT FACILITY AND FOR US, THAT WAS A



- 1 RED FLAG THAT WE NEED TO PAY ATTENTION TO THIS. IT IS, IT IS A
- 2 CHALLENGING SITUATION BECAUSE WE, UNDER STATE LAW AND JUST
- 3 COMMON COURTESY OF THE VOTING PROCESS, VOTING LOCATIONS ARE
- 4 INTENDED TO BE A NEUTRAL LOCATION WHERE PEOPLE CAN COME AND
- 5 HAVE THEIR VOICE HEARD AND CAST THEIR BALLOT. THERE ARE STATE
- 6 LAWS THAT PROHIBIT INTIMIDATE OF VOTER, PROHIBIT CAMPAIGNING
- 7 WITHIN CERTAIN DISTANCE OF THOSE LOCATIONS. WE ALSO KNOW THAT
- 8 NOT ALL OF THOSE ARE COMPLIED WITH. IN OTHER AREAS. WHAT WE
- 9 HAVE DONE IS, AGAIN, TRAINED OUR ELECTION WORKERS ON THAT. WE
- 10 ALWAYS, BEFORE ANY ELECTION, HAVE A BRIEFING WITH THE SHERIFF
- 11 AND THE POLICE CHIEFS FROM ALL OF THE JURISDICTIONS. WE ARE
- 12 EMPHASIZING THAT IN THIS CASE TOO. WE ALSO DON'T WANT A
- 13 SITUATION WHERE WE HAVE LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT AND FEDERAL LAW
- 14 ENFORCEMENT, THAT ELEVATES, OR ESCALATES THE SITUATION. THAT
- 15 IS WHY WE ARE REALLY TRYING TO ENCOURAGE VOTERS TO HAVE THEIR
- 16 AWARENESS. AGAIN, IF THEY ARE UNCOMFORTABLE WITH ANYTHING
- 17 GOING ON IN THAT LOCATION TO CHOOSE A LOCATION. BUT WE, A
- 18 COUPLE OTHER THINGS THAT WE ARE DOING ON THAT, WE ARE
- 19 COLLABORATING WITH THE HUMAN RIGHTS COUNSEL THAT HAS PEOPLE
- 20 WHO ARE TRAINED IN DEESCALATION TECHNIQUES JUST TO BE PART OF
- 21 THE FIELD TEAM AND AVAILABLE SHOULD WE NEED TO DISPATCH THEM
- 22 DURING THE VOTING PERIOD. AND AGAIN, HAVING SPECIFIC REPORTING
- 23 AND ESCALATION PROTOCOLS FOR THAT TYPE OF EVENT. I MEAN, IT IS
- 24 SOMEWHAT HARD TO PREDICT. WE KNOW THAT WE NEED TO BE PREPARED
- 25 FOR IT.



- 2 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: WE KNOW. YOU TALKED ABOUT THE ACTUAL DROP
- 3 BOXES AS WELL. MONITORING THEM, SENDING PEOPLE OUT REGULARLY.
- 4 WE HAD SOME ISSUES WITH THAT. I DON'T KNOW HOW MANY YEARS AGO,
- 5 ONE OF THE ONES IN MY DISTRICT, YOU KNOW, SOMEBODY PUT IT ON
- 6 FIRE. SO A LOT OF THE BALLOTS WERE BURNED INSIDE. AGAIN, THAT
- 7 HAS BEEN --

8

- 9 >> DEAN LOGAN: FORTUNATE THAT ONE INCIDENT WAS THE ONLY
- 10 INCIDENT WE HAD IN LA COUNTY SO FAR. WE WERE ABLE TO IDENTIFY
- 11 MOST OF THE VOTERS IN THAT CASE. AGAIN THE BOXES ARE DESIGNED
- 12 SO THEY DON'T GET A LOT OF AIR. FIRE GOES OUT OUICKLY. IN THAT
- 13 CASE, DAMAGE WAS REALLY CAUSED MORE BY THE RESPONSE OF THE
- 14 FIRE DEPARTMENT WHICH IS NOT A CRITICISM BUT A REALITY.

15

16 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: THEY PUT A LOT OF WATER ON IT.

17

- 18 >> DEAN LOGAN: WE DID, AS A RESULT OF THAT, IN OUR HISTORY IN
- 19 THIS PROCESS, WE INCREASED THE FREQUENCY IN WHICH WE SERVICE
- 20 THE BOXES.

21

22 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: EMPTY THEM.

- 24 >> DEAN LOGAN: PART OF THE BRIEFING WITH LOCAL LAW
- 25 ENFORCEMENT, WE ASK FOR PARTNERSHIP, GIVE THEM THE LIST OF



- 1 LOCATIONS, ASK THEM TO HAVE THEIR PATROLS AWARE AND LET US
- 2 KNOW IF THEY SEE ANYTHING.

- 4 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: JUST THE LAST ONE, WE HAD SOME
- 5 CONSTITUENTS CONCERNED OF, DUE TO THE ICE RAGE, SHOULD I CARRY
- 6 THE PASSPORT TO THE VOTE CENTER TO KNOW IF YOU WERE GIVING
- 7 ADVICE TO OUR VOTERS ON THAT ISSUE?

8

- 9 >> DEAN LOGAN: THAT IS AN INTERESTING QUESTION. I THINK FOR
- 10 PURPOSES OF VOTING, WHAT I WOULD WANT TO EMPHASIZE, THAT IS
- 11 NOT REQUIRED FOR VOTING. THAT YOU AS A REGISTERED VOTER, HAVE
- 12 ALREADY ESTABLISHED THAT YOU ARE A CITIZEN. AND THAT YOU MEET
- 13 THE QUALIFICATIONS TO BE REGISTERED TO VOTE. YOU ATTEST TO
- 14 THAT UNDER PENALTY OF PERJURY. NO ONE SHOULD ASK FOR THAT FOR
- 15 PURPOSES OF VOTING. I WOULD SAY, THAT IS MORE OF A PERSONAL
- 16 CHOICE OF, IF THAT MAKES YOU FEEL MORE SECURE TO HAVE THAT
- 17 WITH YOU WHEN YOU GO OUT TO A VOTE CENTER. CERTAINLY NOTHING
- 18 WRONG WITH THAT BUT NOT SOMETHING REQUIRED FOR VOTING.

- 20 >> SUP. JANICE HAHN: OKAY. GOOD. THANK YOU. THANK YOU MADAM
- 21 CHAIR.

22

23 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR HORVATH.

24

25 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: I TOO AM GLAD THAT THEY ARE COVERING



- 1 THE \$67 MILLION COST OF THE SPECIAL ELECTION SO THAT LA COUNTY
- 2 VOTERS CAN PARTICIPATE WITHOUT IMPACTING OUR LOCAL BUDGET. I'M
- 3 GRATEFUL TO YOU DEAN AND YOUR ENTIRE STAFF FOR THE TREMENDOUS
- 4 AMOUNT OF WORK IT TAKES TO MOVE ELECTION FORWARD ON SUCH A
- 5 SHORT TIMELINE. THESE PREPARATIONS ARE ESSENTIAL TO MAKING
- 6 SURE THAT EVERY COMMUNITY HAS THE INFORMATION AND ACCESS THAT
- 7 THEY NEED. THROUGH MAILED BALLOTS, ACCESSIBLE VOTE CENTERS AND
- 8 CLEAR TIMELY COMMUNICATION. ABOVE ALL, IT IS ABOUT ENSURING
- 9 THAT VOTERS CAN HAVE CONFIDENCE IN THE PROCESS AND EVERY
- 10 BALLOT IS ACCURATE, EVERY COMMUNITY IS SERVED AND EVERY VOICE
- 11 IS HEARD. IN MY DISTRICT, JUST THIS WEEKEND, I RECEIVED
- 12 CONCERNS FROM CONSTITUENTS ABOUT SAMPLE BALLOTS MISSING
- 13 IMPORTANT INFORMATION THAT APPEARED TO BE PHYSICALLY CUT OUT.
- 14 WHAT STEPS HAVE YOU TAKEN TO ADDRESS THOSE REPORTS? AND INSURE
- 15 THAT EVERY VOTER IS GETTING ACCURATE AND TIMELY VOTING
- 16 MATERIALS?

18 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: WHAT DOES THAT MEAN?

19

- 20 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: PAGES IN THE BALLOT, SPECIFICALLY,
- 21 THERE WERE TWO PAGES THAT INDICATE THE QUESTION THAT IS
- 22 SUPPOSED TO BE ON THE SAMPLE BALLOT. THE PAGES THEMSELVES,
- 23 WERE CUT. THAT IS HOW IT ARRIVED.

24

25 >> DEAN LOGAN: THANK YOU SUPERVISOR. I WANT TO BE REAL CLEAR



- 1 THAT THERE ARE NO PAGES MISSING IN ANY OF THE SAMPLE BALLOTS.
- 2 WE LOOKED INTO THIS. THERE IS A BINDING ISSUE BECAUSE OF THE
- 3 SIZE OF THE SAMPLE BALLOT, IT IS A THINNER SAMPLE BALLOT THAN
- 4 TYPICALLY, BECAUSE THERE IS JUST ONLY ONE MEASURE AND IT IS A
- 5 STATE MEASURE. SO THOSE PAGES, IT IS PART OF THE BINDING THAT
- 6 OUR PRINTER USES, THAT THERE IS OVERLAP FROM THE, I'LL USE THE
- 7 WORD ADJACENT PAGE. IF YOU LOOK AT THOSE BOOKLETS, THE PAGES
- 8 ARE SEQUENTIALLY NUMBERED AND THEY CONTAIN ALL OF THE
- 9 INFORMATION. I THINK WHAT HAS BEEN, THIS IS NOT THE FIRST TIME
- 10 THAT HAS OCCURRED, BUT I THINK THAT IT IS CONFUSING FOR SOME
- 11 VOTERS BECAUSE THEY ARE LOOKING FOR THE INFORMATION ABOUT THE
- 12 MEASURE AND THAT INFORMATION IS ACTUALLY CONTAINED IN THE
- 13 STATE VOTER GUIDE. THAT IS REFERENCED IN THE SAMPLE BALLOT.
- 14 BUT AGAIN, FROM A FAMILIARITY STANDPOINT, WE CERTAINLY
- 15 UNDERSTAND THE CONFUSION ABOUT THAT. WE HAVE DOUBLE CHECKED
- 16 AND CONFIRMED THAT THERE ARE NO PAGES THAT HAVE BEEN CUT OUT
- 17 OF ANY OF THE SAMPLE BALLOTS.

- 19 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: OKAY. I THINK THAT THERE WAS A
- 20 CONCERN THAT THE ACTUAL QUESTION WAS MISSING. SO IS THAT NOT
- 21 GOING TO APPEAR IN THE LA COUNTY SAMPLE BALLOT.

- 23 >> DEAN LOGAN: THERE IS IMAGE, IT LOOKS JUST LIKE THE BALLOT
- 24 YOU RECEIVED IN THE MAIL. THE BACKSIDE OF THAT, SAYS THE PAGES
- 25 INTENTIONALLY BLANK, THAT IS BECAUSE THE BACKSIDE OF THAT



- 1 BALLOT IS INTENTIONALLY BLANK. IT IS A, ESSENTIALLY A
- 2 PHOTOCOPY OF THE ACTUAL BALLOT.

- 4 >> SUP. LINDSEY HORVATH: I'LL GO BACK AND LOOK AT THE BALLOT
- 5 THAT WAS HANDED INTO THE OFFICE TO ADDRESS IT. I'M GLAD TO
- 6 HEAR THAT IT SOUNDS LIKE YOU ARE TAKING A LOOK AND MAKING SURE
- 7 THAT IT IS ADDRESSED.

8

9 >> DEAN LOGAN: ABSOLUTELY.

10

- 11 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR. THANK YOU
- 12 FOR THE PRESENTATION. IS IT NECESSARY IF THE STATE ONLY
- 13 MEASURE THAT TWO VOTER GUIDES ARE MAILED? THAT IN OF ITSELF IS
- 14 CONFUSING AND SEEMS EXCESSIVE.

15

- 16 >> DEAN LOGAN: THAT IS, AGAIN, A MATTER OF STATE ELECTION
- 17 CODE. NOW TYPICALLY THAT HAPPENS IN A SCHEDULED STATE ELECTION
- 18 WHERE YOU HAVE LOCAL BALLOT MEASURES AND YOU HAVE STATE
- 19 BALLOT.

20

- 21 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: BUT IN STATE ONLY MEASURE, THE
- 22 STATE CODE REQUIRE THAT COUNTIES ALSO SEND OUT --

- 24 >> DEAN LOGAN: WE ARE REQUIRED TO SEND OUT A BOOKLET THAT
- 25 GIVES THE INFORMATION ABOUT LOCAL VOTING LOCATIONS, THAT THE



- 1 ACTUAL VOTING EQUIPMENT AND THINGS THAT ARE UNIQUE TO OUR
- 2 COMMUNITY.

- 4 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THAT QUESTION CAME TO ME WHEN YOU
- 5 SAID WHAT, WHAT IS NOT IN THE LOCAL GUIDE BECAUSE IT IS IN THE
- 6 STATE ONLY GUIDE. YOU ARE RIGHT. THE LOCAL GUIDE TELLS YOU
- 7 WHERE TO GO. SECOND QUESTION, I WAS SURPRISED TO HEAR THERE
- 8 WAS A COUNTY THAT HAS A LOCAL MEASURE.

9

10 >> DEAN LOGAN: CITY.

11

- 12 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: THAT I WAS UNDER THE IMPRESSION,
- 13 TOLD BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE, NOTHING ELSE COULD GO ON THE
- 14 BALLOT. BECAUSE OF TIMING?

15

- 16 >> DEAN LOGAN: THE LAW THAT CALLED FOR THE STATE ELECTION DID
- 17 NOT ALLOW FOR JURISDICTIONS TO CONSOLIDATE ON TO THAT. HOWEVER
- 18 THERE WAS A LOCAL ELECTION ALREADY SCHEDULED IN THE CITY OF
- 19 SANTA FE SPRINGS PRIOR TO THEM.

20

- 21 >> SUP. HOLLY J. MITCHELL: GOT. IT THAT MAKES SENSE. THANK YOU
- 22 MADAM CHAIR.

23

24 >> SUP. KATHRYN BARGER, CHAIR: SOLIS.



- 1 >> SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU. WE ARE COMING TO THE DAY,
- 2 DEAN. IT IS IMPORTANT ELECTION. NO THE LOST ON ME. I HAVE MY
- 3 MATERIALS ON TIME AND FILLED OUT MY BALLOT. JUST WANTED TO ASK
- 4 A OUESTION ABOUT, SINCE WE HAVE A SMALLER NUMBER OF VOTING
- 5 CENTERS, WHAT ARE WE DOING TO ADDRESS AS, YOU KIND OF TOUCHED
- 6 ON IT, PEOPLE THAT REQUIRE MATERIALS AND INTERPRETERS THAT CAN
- 7 SPEAK DIFFERENT LANGUAGES, ESPECIALLY IN, YOU KNOW, IN POCKETS

- 12 OUR VOTING EOUIPMENT AT ALL LOCATIONS INCLUDES THE BALLOT IN
- 13 ALL 18 ADDITIONAL LANGUAGES THAT ARE PROVIDED IN LA COUNTY,
- 14 THAT IS TRUE AT EVERY LOCATION. AND THEN WE USE, WE TARGET THE
