Dear Board of Supervisors,

I am writing this note in support of increased funding to DHS to boost benefits and salaries of its physicians. Specifically, I urge the Board of Supervisors to support approval of Megaflex benefits and cost of living adjustments that are currently being negotiated.

Physicians work at DHS because they are mission-driven, and they accept lower salaries and inferior benefits for the privilege to work with like-minded peers dedicated to historically underserved patient populations. However, the discrepancy in salary and benefits between DHS and other institutions, for both primary care physicians and specialist physicians, is widening to a point that DHS is no longer able to attract the same caliber of doctors. For instance, DHS does not offer maternity and paternity leave to physicians, and I personally know of several excellent applicants who ultimately chose alternative jobs at UCLA or Kaiser because they planned on having children and were understandably concerned about having protected time to care for and bond with them. As a result of physician shortages, our patients are waiting scandalously long times for specialty appointments, and more and more specialty care is falling on the shoulders of primary care physicians like myself, and we are already stretched thin given our patients have a degree of psychosocial and medical complexity that far exceeds the average. It is not uncommon, for instance, for a patient to wait almost a year for a colonoscopy after a positive fecal blood test; guidelines insist on colonoscopy within 3 months of a positive fecal test to prevent a precancerous lesion from becoming advanced cancer. This is the direct result of DHS not being able to hire sufficient Gastroenterology (GI) physicians.

If DHS physicians were given Megaflex benefits, it would go a long way to not only showing currently employed physicians that they are valued by their leadership, but also help attract the best of the best doctors to serve Los Angeles County patients. It would help make DHS the premier local health system and solidify your own legacies as Supervisors who helped usher in a new high standard in medical care for the most vulnerable patients.
