### The Backdrop...

- Worst overdose crisis in local and national history
- National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH)
  - > 95% of people with Substance Use Disorders (SUDs) who don't access services don't want or don't think they need treatment
- Drug Medi-Cal Organized Delivery System and CalAIM Waivers → Once-in-a-generation opportunities for SUD system transformation
- Payment reform, legislative changes, and other funding opportunities

## **OPPORTUNITIES** / Challenges

The time is now for investment in substance use systems and novel approaches to address longstanding problems



### Reaching the 95% (R95) Initiative

- Fundamentally, we need to take a different approach to address SUDs to substantively increase our reach into the 95% and increase our treatment penetration rates.
- Data demonstrates that we will be unlikely to substantively increase the people we serve without focusing on engaging this 95%.
- The R95 Initiative was launched by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health's
   Substance Abuse Prevention and Control (DPH-SAPC) in 2023 to focus on needed CULTURE
   CHANGE WITHIN THE SPECIALTY SUD SYSTEM to shape the way that we think about and treat
   those with SUD.
  - Key Goals
    - 1. Optimizing Outreach & Engagement
    - 2. Establishing Lower Barriers to SUD Care



### **Better** Reaching the 95% Board Motion

- DPH-SAPC's original R95 Initiative focuses on the specialty SUD system.
- In Oct 2023, your Board significantly expanded the focus of the R95 Initiative to include a wide spectrum of health, mental health, child welfare, justice, and educational partners.
  - Key aim: Expand the reach of the R95 Initiative through coordination, staff training, and innovative strategies across multiple sectors to better identify and engage people with SUDs to better reach the 95%.



### **SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICE HELPLINE**

- Toll-free, available 24/7/365
- Interpretation available, including TTY



- **1.** Anyone can call the SASH to be connected to publicly funded SUD treatment
- **2.** Professional staff (clinician or counselor) conduct a screening and helps to connect the caller to a treatment provider that meets their needs.
- **3.** Appointment scheduled by the end of this 3-way call between the caller, SASH agent, and treatment provider.




The Service & Bed Availability Tool (SBAT) allows anyone with internet to find SUD treatment services and site contact information.



#### **Accessing SUD Services by Population\***

### People Experiencing Homelessness

- SAPC-contracted CENS staff support ~200 interim & permanent supportive housing, and encampment sites
- Field-Based 'In-Home'
   SUD treatment
   services available to
   PEH
- Approximately 1,200
   Recovery Bridge
   Housing for PEH
   enrolled in outpatient
   SUD treatment

### Justice-Involved Individuals

- SAPC's network of justice-involved SUD treatment agencies address SUD and criminogenic needs, with the goal of reintegrating into the community
- CENS are co-located at 14 courthouses, 11
   Probation Area offices, Los Padrinos Juvenile
   Hall, and other settings where justiceinvolved clients are served

#### **Self-Referrals**

- •39 Student Wellbeing Centers
- 6 CORE Centers
- •8 SPA-based CENS Area Offices
- Word of mouth and direct presentation to SUD treatment agencies
- Social media/public messaging campaigns
- Health fairs and summits
- Presentations at community/tenant meetings

# Referrals from Caregivers or Service Providers

- Training and connections to primary care, housing providers, etc.
- Presentations at conferences, partners and service provider sites (e.g., DMH, DHS, Probation, Public Defenders, Court staff, DCFS, Schools, LAHSA, Interim Housing, etc.)
- Social media/public messaging campaigns

### **DPH-SAPC** Activities – Implementing the R95 Initiative

- Contract augmentations for SUD treatment network to offer capacity building and incentive funds to establish lower-barrier treatment system and enhance client engagement and retention.
- Innovative cost-sharing agreement to fund over 70 prescribers of Medications for Addiction Treatment (MAT) as a bridge to sustainability through higher payment reform rates.
- Expanding access to MAT in residential settings, at Federally Qualified Health Centers, and throughout the specialty SUD system.
- Adding new harm reduction agencies to join SAPC's network of Engagement and Overdose Prevention (EOP) Hubs.



### **Collaborative Opportunities Across the County**

 DPH-SAPC engaged all pertinent partners identified in the R95 Board motion on several key focus areas:

#### 1. Developing Organizational Plan

 Organizational plan to prioritize the engagement and referrals of participants they serve who would benefit from substance use services

#### 2. Training Staff

• SAPC developed "SUD 101" training available to service participants

#### 3. Public Messaging

Provided culturally relevant materials included animated videos for partners to use



### **Collaborative R95 Focuses Across County Depts**

#### Awareness

- Enhancing websites and social media channels with substance use resources and referral information.
- Increasing awareness of substance use and treatment in schools, housing systems, and other settings.
- Fentanyl on the Frontlines SAPC's current large-scale multi-media campaign with SUD resources on billboards and buses across the County, social media outlets, connected TV, and <a href="https://www.FentanylFrontline.com">www.FentanylFrontline.com</a>.

#### Prioritizing SUD Considerations

- Revising contracts to prioritize engagement and referrals of participants they serve for harm reduction and substance use treatment services.
- Updating policies to screen youth for substance use, train social workers, caregivers, and peer mentors on how to better engage and support system-involved youth with substance use.
- Enhanced SUD screenings and improved referral processes for managed care plan members.



### Collaborative R95 Focuses Across County Depts (cont'd)

- Enhancing SUD Services
  - Expanding CENS by partially leveraging Drug Medi-Cal.
  - Increasing field-based SUD treatment and navigation services in interim housing and settings that serve high-risk youth and adults, including people experiencing homelessness (PEH).
  - Grow juvenile detention facility services through the Substance Use Unit and Credible Messenger program.
