Briefly provide a description of the incident/event:	<p style="text-align: center;">Summary Corrective Action Plan 2023-114</p> <p>Based on initial traffic reports, on December 16, 2019, at approximately 5:10 p.m., an on-duty Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department deputy sheriff (Deputy One), assigned to Century Station, was in a marked patrol vehicle driving eastbound on the Interstate 105 Freeway, eastbound, east of Long Beach Boulevard. Deputy One was driving approximately 10 miles per hour in the number three lane. The Plaintiff was driving her vehicle in the number three lane in front of the patrol vehicle. The Plaintiff and other vehicles on the 105 Freeway reduced their speed. Deputy One attempted to brake but collided with the rear of the Plaintiff's vehicle.</p> <p>At approximately 5:25 p.m., two officers from the California Highway Patrol (CHP), South Los Angeles Division, responded to the collision scene and conducted a traffic collision investigation. The CHP Officers determined Deputy One caused the collision by driving at an unsafe speed, in violation of California Vehicle Code section 22350.</p> <p>The CHP Officers noted in their collision report that the patrol vehicle sustained moderate damage consisting of a scratched front bumper, a dented hood, a scratched push bumper guard, and a cracked nose panel. The report indicated the Plaintiff's vehicle sustained moderate damage consisting of a dented rear bumper and a dented trunk door.</p> <p>A sergeant from Century Station responded to the collision scene and conducted a traffic investigation. During the traffic investigation, the Plaintiff stated she was driving approximately 10-15 miles per hour on the freeway before Deputy One rear-ended her. The Plaintiff stated she was "in shock" and "a little startled." The investigating sergeant asked the Plaintiff if she needed paramedics, and she said she did not and was "okay." The Plaintiff did not complain of any pain or injuries.</p> <p>The Los Angeles County Fire Department responded to the location and rendered aid to the Plaintiff. The Plaintiff declined transport to the hospital the day of the incident but received medical treatment the following day for complaints of pain to her neck and back.</p> <p>The Deputy Sheriff did not sustain injuries during traffic collision and was wearing his seatbelt.</p>

1. Briefly describe the **root cause(s)** of the claim/lawsuit:

A **Department** root cause in this incident was Deputy One's operations of a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than was reasonable, a violation of California Vehicle Code section 22350.

**Traffic Collision Investigation**

This incident was investigated by two officers from the California Highway Patrol.

The collision investigation concluded the Deputy Sheriff caused the collision by operating a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than reasonable, a violation of California Vehicle Code 22350 **(Exhibit A)**.

**Administrative Investigation**

This incident was investigated by representatives from Century Sheriff's Station to determine if any administrative misconduct occurred before, during, or after this incident. The results of the investigation were presented for Department executive adjudication.

An executive evaluation found the collision was preventable, resulting in one point being added to the employee's Department driving record. Further accumulation of points within a 36-month period could result in reassignment to a non-driving position.

On March 13, 2020, it was determined that Deputy One's unsafe speed caused the collision.

Since this incident, Deputy One has not been involved in any additional traffic collisions.

Deputy One attended training pertaining to the circumstances surrounding this incident.

**Traffic Collision Assessment and Review**

As a result of this collision, an assessment of employee-involved traffic collisions was conducted from 2019 to December 2023. The audit revealed the following:

The number of preventable traffic collisions at Century Station has decreased in the last five years, along with the number of non-preventable traffic collisions. Personnel who have been involved in more than one traffic collision attended Department training, such as the Sheriff's Traffic Accident Reduction Driving Program, Emergency Vehicle Operations, and the Alternatives to Discipline Driving Course.
