Favor	Evangeline Chapman	Violence erupted on the campus of UCLA just after midnight on Wednesday, May 1st, when armed violent extremists attacked a peaceful pro-Palestinian student run encampment in the middle of the night with fireworks, chairs, sticks, and chemical sprays. The New York Times examined more than 100 videos filmed by journalists, witnesses, and protesters and found that violence went on for nearly five hours while campus police mostly hid in a nearby building. Three hours into the attack the Los Angeles Police Department and the California Highway Patrol arrived and then stood 300 feet away for over an hour as the violence continued. In fact, according to the NYTimes video analysis, "Just four minutes after the officers arrived, violent extremists attacked a man standing dozens of feet from the officers." More than 200 UCLA students and faculty were arrested the day after the night time riot. None of the UCLA arrests were a follow up to the violence of the night before, all those violent extremists went home free no tear gas, no zip ties, no detainment nothing. No, the UCLA arrests were of peaceful protesters practicing peaceful civil disobedience on the campus lawn. Nationwide, the student encampments have been peaceful and non-violent, but they have faced standoffs with police in riot gear, using tactical vehicles and flash-bang devices to clear tent encampments and occupied buildings. The injustice of peaceful anti-war protesters being arrested by the hundreds while violent extremists attack encampments for hours, directly in front of law enforcement and no one is even detained, is dangerous. This was in severe violation of the student's First Amendment rights. Under existing University policy and the US Constitution, students have the right to engage in peaceful protest. When faced with the Palestine Solidarity encampment, UCLA administration unilaterally changed its policies without providing notice or bargaining. In so doing it violated its policy of content neutrality toward speech by favoring employees engaged in anti-Palestine speech over employees engaged in Pro-Palestine speech. It went further by unilaterally changing policies by prohibiting pro-Palestine speech at the school. UCLA used its powers to not only change policy but then, in an unprecedented act, used brute force and police intervention to prevent students and workers from exercising what have historically been rights at the University. Los Angeles County should use its power to defend the rights of our young minds to speak out against injustice without fear of retaliation. Sydney Smanpongse	Violence erupted on the campus of UCLA just after midnight on Wednesday, May 1st, when armed violent extremists attacked a peaceful pro-Palestinian student run encampment in the middle of the night with fireworks, chairs, sticks, and chemical sprays. The New York Times examined more than 100 videos filmed by journalists, witnesses, and protesters and found that violence went on for nearly five hours while campus police mostly hid in a nearby building. Three hours into the attack the Los Angeles Police Department and the California Highway Patrol arrived and then stood 300 feet away for over an hour as the violence continued. In fact, according to the NYTimes video analysis, "Just four minutes after the officers arrived, violent extremists attacked a man standing dozens of feet from the officers." More than 200 UCLA students and faculty were arrested the day after the night time riot. None of the UCLA arrests were a follow up to the violence of the night before, all those violent extremists went home free no tear gas, no zip ties, no detainment nothing. No, the UCLA arrests were of peaceful protesters practicing peaceful civil disobedience on the campus lawn. Nationwide, the student encampments have been peaceful and non-violent, but they have faced standoffs with police in riot gear, using tactical vehicles and flash-bang devices to clear tent encampments and occupied buildings. The injustice of peaceful anti-war protesters being arrested by the hundreds while violent extremists attack encampments for hours, directly in front of law enforcement and no one is even detained, is dangerous. The New York Times examined more than 100 videos filmed by journalists. witnesses, and protesters and found that violence went on for nearly five hours while campus police mostly hid in a nearby building. Three hours into the attack the Los Angeles Police Department and the California Highway Patrol arrived and then stood 300 feet away for over an hour as the violence continued. In fact, according to the NYTimes video analysis, "Just four minutes after the officers arrived, violent extremists attacked a man standing dozens of feet from the officers." I write in support as a fellow UCLA student who is worried about the safety of fellow students and classmates.

Signed, Lani Jacobson UCLA has unequivocally failed its students. No matter who you are or where you come from, your life should never be in danger on a university campus. No matter your race, creed, religion, or political affiliation, you should not have more or fewer rights than any other. It is time for accountability.

On Wednesday, May 6th, 2024, UCLA failed its students when emboldened and violent pro-Israeli counter-protesters attacked the Palestinian encampment. UCPD stood by as this happened. LAPD later stood by as this happened. Students were attacked with metal poles, 2x4 pieces of wood, bear spray, and illicit fireworks. It is an immense blessing everyone made it out alive, though students are now left with irreparable emotional damage.

Yet, despite their injuries, students continued to utilize their First Amendment rights to stand for what they believe in. They held steadfast in their peaceful protest, advocating for an end to the Palestinian genocide. After experiencing an event that nearly killed them, students faced another terror. This time, not in the form of violent counter-protestors, but in another form: police.

Police claimed students were illegally occupying UCLA campus – ironic, considering the illegal occupation of Israel on Palestinian land has been met with impunity. Despite UCLA's Vice Chancellor agreeing that the encampment was peaceful, police still decided to enter the encampment.

Students who had hours earlier been attacked by violent mobs were now being pushed from their peaceful encampment by police in riot gear. The same police who failed to protect students hours before utilized batons and 'non-lethal' forms of crowd control such as tear gas and rubber bullets. Though categorized as 'non-lethal', these forms of crowd control cost students dearly: one student nearly lost a finger, and many more were hospitalized.

Even more disturbing, it was later revealed *by pro-Israeli counter-protestors* that they were working in tandem with police. Under so biased a system, it is clear that justice could not have been served. It is clear that LAPD was acting under bias during its arrests of pro-Palestinian demonstrators in the early hours of May 7th, 2024. With all they have gone through in recent days, students should *not* have been arrested.

UCLA has failed to protect its students' First Amendment rights. UCLA has failed to protect students' lives. It is time for LA County to end the suffering.

We call upon the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to protect UCLA students from biased arrests and grant them amnesty from their charges.

I write in strong support of Item 89-A to instruct the LA County Public Defender's office to direct resources to defend arrested UCLA students who were asserting their First Amendment rights to peaceful protest and assembly as part of the UCLA encampment protests. In the early morning hours of May 2nd, 2024, 132 students were arrested, 25 students were hospitalized, and over 100 injured (including five shot in the head with rubber bullets) by the California Highway Patrol and LA County Sheriff's Department. This was in severe violation of the student's First Amendment rights. Under existing University policy and the US Constitution, students have the right to engage in peaceful protest. When faced with the Palestine Solidarity encampment, UCLA administration unilaterally changed its policies without providing notice or bargaining. In so doing it violated its policy of content neutrality toward speech by favoring employees engaged in anti-Palestine speech over employees engaged in Pro-Palestine speech. It went further by unilaterally changing policies by prohibiting pro-Palestine speech at the school. UCLA used its powers to not only change policy but then, in an unprecedented act, used brute force and police intervention to prevent students and workers from exercising what have historically been rights at the University.

Los Angeles County should use its power to defend the rights of our young minds to speak out against injustice without fear of retaliation. This was a severe overreach by the LA County Sheriff's Department, who have a long history of repressive violence that the Board of Supervisors has been a champion of fighting against. Many students are on financial aid and do not have the financial backing to defend themselves in court. If charges are not dropped, the students will be on their own to defend their rights. We ask for your support in facing up against police violence and oppression so that the students exerting their fundamental rights can have the legal defense resources they need. Please support Item 89-A.

The students had undertaken a peaceful protest which involved only members of the university community (IDs were checked for all who entered) and which attempted not to engage with hecklers who surrounded them. Their presence prompted counterprotests which were far less attentive to these issues, raising money outside the university community for a Jumbotron to harass the students, drawing many non-UCLA activists, and heckling shamelessly. The university did not protect the encampment during the days leading up to the attack, and both the university and law enforcement stood back on April 30 while they were assault by a mob largely made up of older white males, some sporting white supremacist gear, and many making racist statements and even threatening rape.

Police watched all this transpire and then came in the next night to attack the encampment, using various weapons. Their detention was long (11 hours) and uncomfortable (no food, no water, no bathroom access, too tight zip ties), and one officer was quoted as saying the DA would drop charges so the police would make them suffer now.

This suppression is unacceptable, and students should not be punished for trying to exercise their rights to freedom of speech and freedom of assembly.

Protect the First Amendment Rights of Students

I'm writing to beg the LA County Board of Supervisors to protect the First Amendment Rights of students at UCLA. Despite repeated accusations of violence, the UCLA Solidarity Encampment only ever engaged in peaceful protest. Chanting, singing, yoga, poetry readings, and teachings were the activities which apparently so provoked the LAPD and UCLAPD that they had no other option but to assault students.

This country was built with the understanding that participation is necessary in democracy. Despite our attempts to make our voices heard and participate in this democracy by ensuring our institution listens to its constituency, we were shut down. The dogmatic, unwavering ignorance of UCLA, UCLAPD, and the LAPD demonstrated a fundamental lack of understanding of the importance of peaceful protest and what it means for the future of our country.

We were shot, beaten, and brutalized by those who were sworn to protect us. Despite the accusations, I implore you to see that our protests were nothing but peaceful. I even recall some people leaving the rally saying, "Nothing's even happening," because, in short, nothing was. We were peaceful. The only violence was perpetrated by the UCLA Administration who allowed the LAPD to run roughshod over the people. The UC system allowed the LAPD to brutalize its constituency because it fails to understand the importance of the moment.

As students, alumni, and faculty, we are the constituency of the University of California. The UC system exists to serve us and the community and they have repeatedly ignored our cries to be heard. When our peaceful protest was enacted, they ignored us once more. When our peaceful protest was attacked by Israeli counter-protestors and right-wing radicals, they ignored us again. Finally, when the world was watching-- they attacked. Rubber-bullets at point-blank range shot against 19-year old students. Our protest was nothing but peaceful and any violence was perpetrated by counter-protestors or by police themselves.

You must protect our First Amendment Right or you have doomed democracy.
