			Ann Dorsey	I urge you to take immediate action regarding the cleanup of the Santa Susana Field Laboratory site. The Department of Toxic Substances Control has allowed a less than complete cleanup in the Programmatic Environmental Impact Report. The statute of limitations will run out in July, after which there will be no way to enforce a complete cleanup. We cannot allow Boeing, NASA and the Dept. of Energy to leave almost all of the contamination at the SSFL permanently, which will endanger nearby communities, our water supply and wildlife.

I am not an attorney, nor do I understand the legal system, legal terminology or legal procedures. Landlords are taking advantage of the fact that most renters have limited funds to seek legal counsel and lack the knowledge to fight an eviction on their own. Not only did this eviction take a financial toll on myself; I am still dealing with constant harassment from my landlord who seeks to evict us. Most tenants are not just facing one eviction filed against them, they are facing MULTIPLE evictions back-to-back! Especially those who have lived in their unit for a long time. Renters should not be punished or face homelessness simply because they did not have access to legal counsel. When you are arrested you are innocent until proven guilty and have the right to an attorney. In an eviction process you are being accused of "unlawful detaining" a unit until decided by judge/jury. Both scenarios should allow the defendant the right to legal counsel regardless of your income status.</p> <p>We ask that the Board vote Yes on the Right to Counsel Ordinance. Thank you.</p>



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Public Comment		Oppose	Abigail Keyes	<p>The following individuals submitted comments on agenda item:</p> <p>Hi, my name is Abigail Keyes, and I'm a born and raised Californian. My ancestors have been on this land for generations, including Spanish settlers and Chumash Indians.</p> <p>I'm writing to you to express my abject horror at the mask bans proposed by Mayor Karen Bass.</p> <p>I've tried to make this note poetic, but instead I will be blunt. ANY kind of restrictive legislation discouraging or prohibiting the wearing of protective face coverings, particularly respirators, is an act of violence against disabled people. Against immunocompromised people. Against people continuing to protect themselves and their loved ones not only against covid but also against wildfire smoke, pollution, allergies, and a wide range of airborne pathogens. We are still in a pandemic, despite all political and social efforts to deny and forget it.</p> <p>To even consider banning face coverings is utterly reprehensible, disgusting, and unbecoming of a leader who claims to believe in bodily autonomy (with regard to Roe v. Wade) and queer liberation. Did you know that trans people are more likely than others to have long-covid complications? How will this mask ban protect them, an already extremely marginalized and disadvantaged group of people?</p> <p>Mayor Bass: You were a PHYSICIAN'S ASSISTANT and you have a Bachelor's degree in health sciences. While you may not have taken the Hippocratic Oath, many of your colleagues certainly did.</p> <p>Banning masks will absolutely CAUSE HARM.</p> <p>Banning masks is anti-science. It is discriminatory against disabled and vulnerable people. It will disproportionately cause harm to Black, brown, and other minoritized people who are not only more likely to be taking covid precautions, but also more likely to be adversely affected by covid, lack of sick pay, and long-covid conditions. They will also be more likely to be harassed and bullied when wearing masks for legitimate health reasons and more likely to be targeted by law enforcement.</p> <p>I'm not sure who is trying to convince you otherwise, but I hope that you take a step back, look at who they claim this proposal will protect, and examine your conscience. Disabled people are practically BEGGING you to care about them. Please listen to them. Please do the right thing. DO NOT ban the wearing of protective face coverings in LA County.</p>
