However, we must question whether this taxation truly serves our community and resolves the issues at hand.</p> <p>The harsh reality is that despite ongoing investments and tax increases aimed at reducing homelessness, we have yet to see a significant decline in the homeless population. It often feels like the Board of Supervisors is more focused on maintaining the 'Homeless Industrial Complex' than on implementing effective and meaningful solutions. Many of us have become understandably weary of pouring more money into a system that does not seem to yield the results we desperately need.</p> <p>I urge you to carefully consider your vote this November and to stand with me in voting NO on this proposed half-cent sales tax. **Support for Board Expansion Ballot Initiative,
Items 6 and 7 on Board of Supervisors Meeting Agenda**

On July 23, 2024, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved an ordinance calling for a special election to be held on November 5, 2024, to vote on an amendment to the County Charter that would by 2026, establish an independent Los Angeles County Ethics Commission; by 2028, establish the office of an elected County Executive; expand the membership of the Board of Supervisors from five to nine following the 2030 redistricting process; and establish a Governance Reform Task Force and Charter Review Commission.





Los Angeles County is the nation's largest county with 4,084 square miles and nearly 10 million residents. As Los Angeles County's population grows and diversifies, we must innovate and re-evaluate how we can best meet residents' changing needs to ensure we deliver the support they need as inclusively, transparently, and equitably as possible. This is especially critical for residents in communities who have historically been left out of elected office and who deserve equal representation. As of the 2020 Census count, there are over 4.8 million Latinos and 1.5 million Asian American and Pacific Islanders in Los Angeles County, which combined make up over 60 percent of the County's total population of 10 million residents. We need to make sure their diverse voices are amplified so that all of our communities have a say in how Los Angeles County is governed and how resources are directed. We, the undersigned support expansion of the Board of Supervisors and support Items 6 and 7 which will be heard at the July 30, 2024, meeting of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors.
