On July 23, 2024, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved an ordinance calling for a special election to be held on November 5, 2024, to vote on an amendment to the County Charter that would by 2026, establish an independent Los Angeles County Ethics Commission; by 2028, establish the office of an elected County Executive; expand the membership of the Board of Supervisors from five to nine following the 2030 redistricting process; and establish a Governance Reform Task Force and Charter Review Commission. On July 23,

residents. As Los Angeles County's population grows and diversifies, we must innovate and re-evaluate how we can best meet residents' changing needs to ensure we deliver the support they need as 10 million inclusively, transparently, and equitably as possible. This is especially critical for residents in communities who have historically been left out of elected office and who deserve equal representation.
