

Delegated Authorities Hiring Update

HIGHLIGHTS

- Total number of new staff hired across all types and authorities is 1,331
- Average time to hire decrease by 60% from 276 days using traditional hiring to 108 days under the emergency declaration
- 127 contract requests approved with a valuation of \$567.1 million
- 18 purchasing approvals valued at \$4.618 million
- 14 grant requests approved to allow the expeditated acceptance of \$135.9 million

What is Pathway Home?

The LA County Board of Supervisors is investing **\$108M** in local FY 2025 resources, primarily Measure H, for our full-circle encampment solution focused on housing stability:

Encampment Resolution

Unhoused individuals voluntarily choose to leave the encampment.

Interim Housing Options

Every individual is guaranteed placement into interim housing.

Connection to Services

Individuals receive connections to County services to increase income, benefits, and wellness.

Housing Navigation

Life Skills, Case Management, and Housing Navigation are offered to help people achieve housing stability.


Funded Permanent Housing

People are offered fully-funded, permanent housing.




Municipal Partnerships: Real Examples

CEO-HI has focused on building transformational municipal partnerships that accomplish three goals:

- (1) use Measure H to expand access to interim and permanent housing in more communities;
- (2) demonstrate that regional collaboration unlocks mutually beneficial solutions to unsheltered homelessness; and
- (3) ensure our municipal partnerships help address the disproportionate impact of vehicular homelessness on unincorporated areas.

The Cities of Baldwin Park and El Monte helped us rehouse ~100 people in flood hazard areas during Tropical Storm Hilary. The City of Pomona expanded its interim housing capacity near an existing shelter. Challenges & Opportunities: Municipalities

Participants

- Acuity: Participants continue to struggle even after coming inside, and stabilization can take longer for some than others.
- Demand: Many people experiencing unsheltered homelessness in the surrounding community are not inside yet but know someone in the program, and sometimes show up hoping to get into the program.
- Terminations: Violence and verbal threats to participants and/or staff can trigger a program exit, but we make every effort to place people safely elsewhere.
- Animals: Animal care services are critical because it is a challenge for many participants and can hinder the rehousing process.

Partners

- Capacity: Provider capacity can make or break relationships between the County, Motel Owners, and the municipality.
- Mythbusting: Local officials play a critical role in circulating accurate information about the program, our partners, and participants.
- Expectations: Pathway Home is not a magic wand, so local communities must have appropriate expectations for people with significant challenges who are adjusting to getting the support they need.
- Housing: Everything we can do to expand access to affordable permanent housing in the community will increase the success of this program and our partnership.

Communications

- **Direct:** Open communication channels with CEO-HI and the on-site provider at the municipal leadership level is critical.
- Honest: Being honest about the "Journey Curve" as we weather the highs and lows of the rehousing process is critical to building and maintaining trust.
- Clear: Maintaining clarity over appropriate protocols, particularly at the intersection of survival behaviors and criminal behaviors, can help ensure we are keeping participants and everyone in the community safe.
- Transparent: Sharing the data and triumphs as frequently as we share the challenges is key to achieving mutual belief in the effectiveness of this work.
