A New Way of Doing Things

Instead of 88 cities making their own plans, a new structure will empower two county-wide bodies to create a single plan for the entire region to reduce homelessness.

Created by Board Motion in response to the recommendation from Blue Ribbon Commission on Homelessness and the CEO to operationalize the intent for executive level action and to create a transparent, inclusive, and accountable homelessness governance system, the following structures have now been stood up

The Executive Committee

Who:

Political leaders and government officials

Goal:

Provide unity across LA County + approve a regional plan that includes clear and measurable 5-year goals

The Leadership Table

Who:

Community representatives with City + County agency leaders

Goal:

Shape the plan, educate the public, and hold the system accountable for getting results

What does the Leadership Table do?

The Leadership Table has three primary functions:

01

Educate

Educate the public about the plan and keep them informed of its progress. Share updates with sectors and community organizations on the plan's implementation and results.

02

Represent

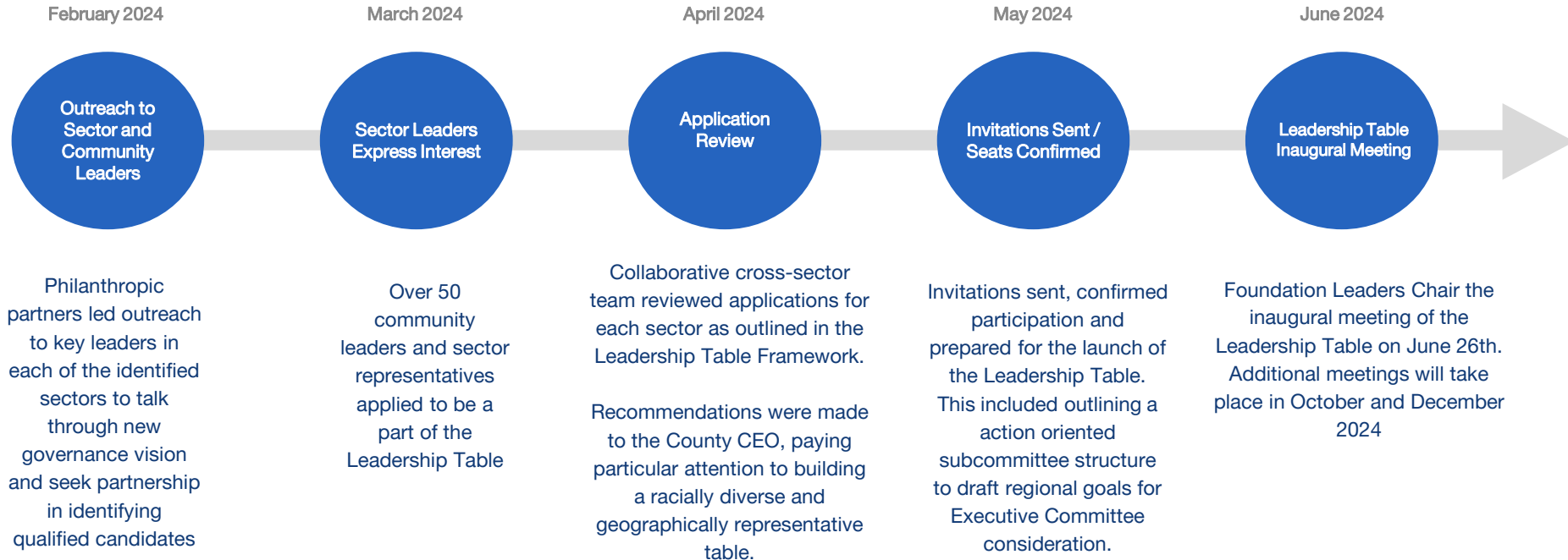
Represent specific sectors and communities and provide guidance as the plan is confirmed. Bring insight, suggestions, and feedback from the sector and community back to the Table.

03

Oversee

With the Executive Committee, provide oversight and accountability as the plan is continuously evaluated and improved

What Are the Goals?

1. Increase the number of people moving from encampments into permanent housing to reduce unsheltered homelessness
1. Reduce the number of people with mental illness and/or substance use disorders who experience homelessness
1. Increase the number of people permanently leaving homelessness
1. Prevent people from falling into homelessness
2. Increase the number of affordable housing units in Los Angeles County

Strategic

Reflects an important dimension of a longer-term vision or plan. For our purpose, this looks like progress towards and alignment with the strategic goal categories as outlined in the Affordable Housing, Homelessness Solutions, and Prevention Now Ordinance.

Measurable

Includes standards by which we will be able to discern and agree upon, as a region, if the goal has been met. Using data that is available and that can demonstrate directional improvement toward a goal, but not yet perfect is acceptable. Noting data constraints and recommendations for data improvement should be included as necessary.

Ambitious

Challenging enough that achievement would mean notable progress.

Realistic

Not so challenging that it takes an extraordinary amount of time, energy, and resources to begin to see progress toward the goal.

Time-bound

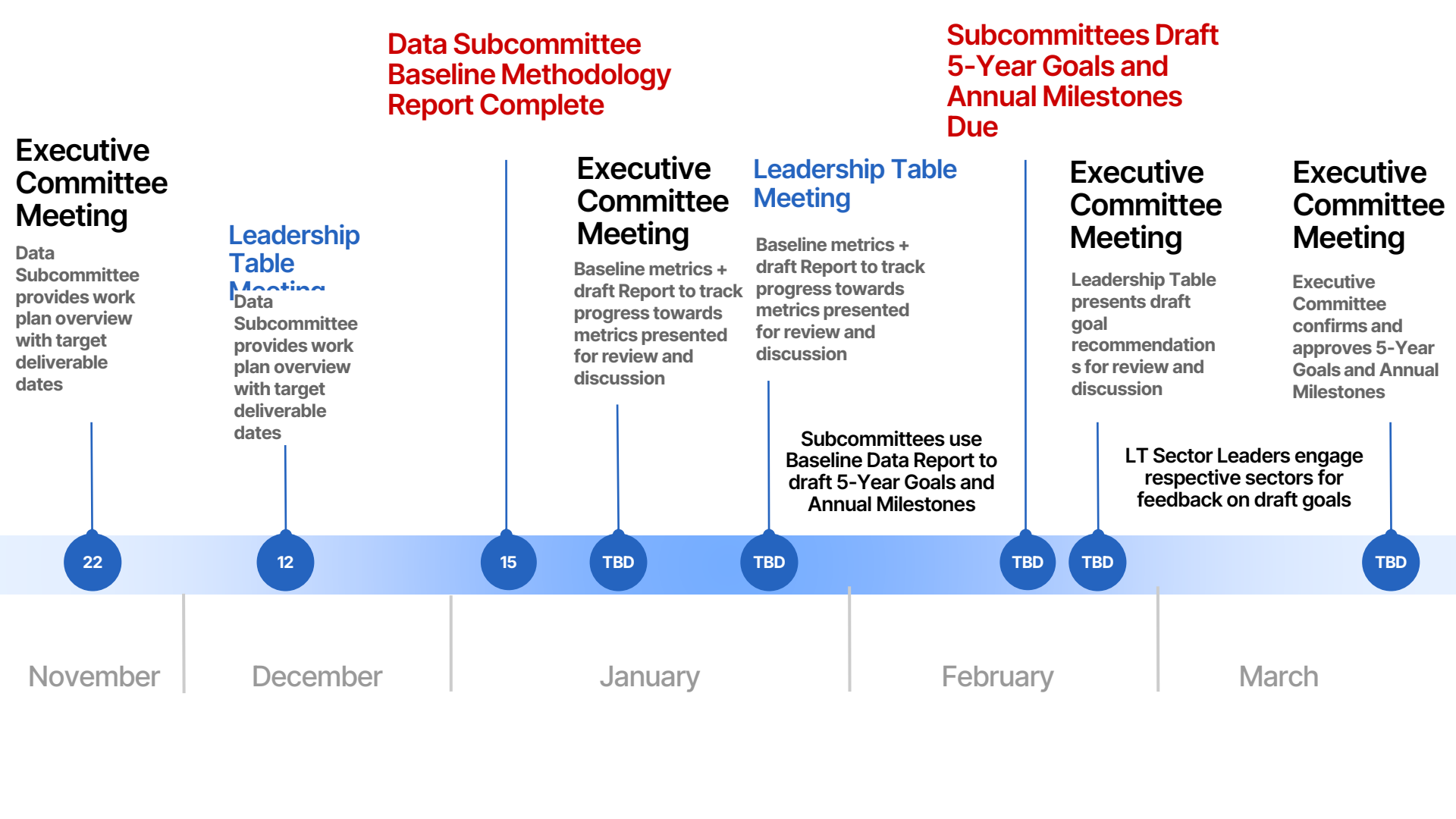
Includes a clear deadline for completion. Consider including a short, medium and/or long-term milestone based on the information that is available to demonstrate directional improvement toward goal achievement.

Inclusive

Consider the end user and other stakeholders in the process and decisions that inform the goal in a way that shares power. Inclusivity was central to building the Leadership Table, but there may be other voices or subject matter experts that will be important to include.

Equitable

Consider and discuss with subcommittee members how the outcome of the goal does not have unintended negative or disparate impacts on those affected by the goal.
