As a mom and resident of unincorporated La Crescenta-Montrose, I am writing to express my strong support for the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP). While I believe the plan could be strengthened to incorporate responsible renewable energy planning and include stronger language to help establish at least one community center in our neighborhood, I agree with the vast majority of the plan and encourage you to approve the plan.		
There are many aspects of the WSGVAP that would help to create a more vibrant community that is less car dependent and more interesting/livable in terms of diversity of transportation, housing, and small businesses. In particular, I am excited about the following:		
1) Development of microtransit service, pedestrian safety/comfort, and bike network: As a family of 3 sharing 1 car and a few e-bikes, it would be beneficial not only for myself but for all to have diversity of mobility options and more frequent bus/microtransit services to be able to complete short errands and trips to neighboring hubs like Pasadena, Montrose, and Glendale without reliance on a personal vehicle.		
2) Access to Rosemont Preserve: As a docent at Rosemont Preserve, I enjoy the opportunity to share about ecology, watersheds, and native plants with young students. Many of my neighbors have never heard of or been to the Preserve before. It would be a huge asset to this community for Rosemont Preserve to be accessible.		
3) Vibrant, Diverse Small Businesses: As someone who used to live by Honolulu Shopping Park and who likes to support local business, I see great opportunity for there to be more diverse shops, restaurants, and offerings in our neighborhood, especially along Foothill Blvd. It's important to make it more competitive and attractive to set up small shops in the neighborhood, and to make the area more pleasant, walkable/bikeable, and family-friendly.		
In addition to the above, I am encouraged to see the emphasis on parking flexibility, climate-friendly designs, and support for multifunctional gathering and recreation spaces.

For lower Altadena and the other affected foothill communities, ironically, they are up zoning. The Alzada Road area is going from LD to H5. (5 units per acre) More H5 in the Meadows around Rising hill Road and El Prieto Road. Also H5 south of Loma Alta and around Rubio Canyon and north Allen Ave.. Up zoning to H-18 for areas just west of Lake and just North of Woodbury. That is very high density of 18 units per acre. 30 UNITS on the corner of Lincoln and Altadena Drive. 18 UNITS PER ACRE just west of Lincoln a few blocks above Woodbury. These are just a few examples but here is a link to a map of what the WSGVAP plans to do to Altadena. Might want to take a look and see how this will effect YOUR neighborhood. planning.lacounty.gov/wpcontent/uploads/2024/04/WSGVAP_LargeMap_LUP_240330_Altadena.pdf The plan has not comprehensively addressed the implications, known and unknown, which will be a byproduct of the radical transformation induced by the zone changes. Traffic, parking, pedestrian safety, preservation of the equestrian traditions, sewer availability, air quality, crime, etc.

Government subsidies are involved and developers are currently working with realtors to purchase properties in the affected areas in anticipation of the passage of the WSGVAP. The Los Angeles County Planning Commission unanimously voted to send the plan to the Board of Supervisors who will vote on it on December 10th.

Instructive, to examine the LaVina housing development which unfolded in Altadena in the 1980s and 1990s. Restrictive zoning in terms of density and ecology existed on the wild and semi wild land upon which LaVina is now located. Then, as now, that zoning, made it impossible for those who owned the to realize any financial gain from their land and they were thus forced to sell to powerful international developers who were able, with their vast resources, to implement zone changes, make promises, later broken, threaten, bribe and do whatever necessary to get what they wanted which was LaVina. Nothing in the WSGVAP prevents this from happening again and as such, that is what is likely to happen.

International developers and whoever controls them are behind the WSGVAP. Not any altruistic impulse on the part of the corporation known as the COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES or ground up community initiative from the inhabitants of Altadena.

Regional Planning claims extensive outreach and that the WSGVAP is a result of ground up community initiative. Not so. They have been working on this plan for at least 10 years and only recently conducted two moderately attended "visioning workshops" as cover. Also sent misleading letters to affected residents who would need expertise in planning to understand what they were reading. Thus, most inhabitants of Altadena are unaware of the negative implications of the WSGVAP.

I concede that Altadena can probably absorb the regional housing needs allocation planned for the commercial districts along Lake Avenue below Altadena drive. I have profound reservations however that Altadena as a whole will retain its unique multi-cultural characteristics and small town charm



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	as a result of the ham handed, haphazard imposition of high density pocket zoning along low quality transit quarters and elsewhere. State ADU mandates have already exacerbated the very problems I referred to earlier. It is blatantly false that the WSGVAP is a response to state laws mandating housing for an increasing population asc ountywide housing quotas and percentages have already been achieved. There is more than adequate housing due to extensive apartment construction across the entire Los Angeles region in the last 15 years. Many residents and community advocates feel that their input has not been fully considered in the planning process especially those communities in the El Monte/South El Monte neighborhoods, South San Gabriel region, and portions of West Altadena. The plan does not adequately capture the diverse needs of local communities, especially those that are marginalized or underserved, including low-income communities and communities of color.
	Exclusion of Vulnerable Populations: The plan's public engagement process doesn't reach or meaningfully involve vulnerable populations, such as renters, low-income residents, or immigrants. These groups are most affected by the policies outlined in the plan, but have had very little to no voice in its development.
	2. Focus on Development Over Community Needs
	Prioritizing Development Over Affordable Housing: The West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan focuses too much on large-scale development and economic growth without sufficiently addressing the region's housing crisis. While the plan may include provisions for increasing housing, my concern is that it does not go far enough to prioritize affordable housing and will lead to gentrification and displacement of existing residents.
	Gentrification and Displacement: The plan's emphasis on development, particularly near transit hubs or commercial corridors, will result in gentrification. This will drive up property values and rents, pushing out long-time residents who can no longer afford to live in those neighborhoods. This plan doesn't do enough to mitigate these risks.
	Environmental Impact and Sustainability
	Failure to Prioritize Sustainability: While the plan may include some environmental goals, the Plan does not sufficiently address sustainability in the long term. The increased traffic congestion and air pollution, particularly since the plan encourages more a limited transit mobility plan that fails to



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adequately assess and consider alternate mobility uses such as equestrian modes of transportation in the working-class equestrian communities.

Climate Change Resilience: The West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan lacks a strong focus on climate change adaptation and resilience. For example, it does not provide clear strategies to combat rising temperatures, water scarcity, or other climate impacts that will disproportionately affect lower-income and marginalized communities. By increasing the density in the upzoned areas, the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan fails to consider how the additional population density will impact a projected water scarcity due to climate change.

4. Transportation and Infrastructure

Insufficient Focus on Public Transit: The West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan is flawed because of its failure to offer a viable public transportation plan that also does not displace our working-class communities.

Traffic Congestion: The plan's proposed transportation solutions do not adequately address the region's existing traffic congestion issues. Expanding roads or adding new developments without a comprehensive transportation strategy could worsen traffic problems rather than alleviate them.

5. Equity and Social Justice Issues

Lack of Equity Focus: This plan needs to be addressed because it lacks the ability to promote social equity. The plan does not sufficiently address issues like racial and economic inequality. There are concerns that wealthier areas may benefit more from the plan's provisions, while low-income and communities of color could be left out of the benefits or bear the brunt of negative impacts, such as displacement and environmental degradation.

Housing Affordability and Accessibility: In areas with high housing demand, critics believe that the plan may fail to provide enough affordable housing or equitable access to housing opportunities for people of all income levels. Without strong affordable housing policies, the plan could exacerbate housing unaffordability and displacement.

6. Implementation Challenges

Implementation and Enforcement: While the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan may sound good in theory it lacks clear mechanisms for implementation and enforcement. While the plan may have ambitious goals, without a strong framework for monitoring and holding developers and municipalities accountable, it could fail to deliver meaningful outcomes.

The WSGVA downzoning of our property from 52 homes to just two isn't just a number—it destroys the dreams we've built for our family's future. This proposal robs us of the potential we have counted on for decades. We've invested almost 50 years of hard work and financial resources into this land, only to be told that we will lose nearly everything. This plan will effectively make our land a County Park & not pay us a dime. How is that fair? The way the plan changes the land use in our area makes it virtually impossible for us to continue to develop or even maintain the property in the way we envisioned. It's like pulling the rug out from under us, after years of our careful planning and investment. It's as if the County were claiming our property by eminent domain but refusing to pay us a cent. Our property, which has been an essential part of our family's financial stability, is now at risk of being rendered almost useless to us. We and our neighbors who collectively own over 200 acres are being treated



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	like trash. We've reviewed the Environmental Impact Report, and frankly, it's troubling. It doesn't properly address the real impact that such dramatic changes will have on existing land uses or the environment. The deficiencies in the report, particularly around population growth, traffic, and infrastructure, make it clear that the plan wasn't fully thought through. The plan claims that downzoning our property is necessary for fire safety and the protection of resources. But there is no evidence in the plan that actually supports this conclusion. As a matter of fact our property has been used as a staging area by local Fire Fighters & the California Conservation Corps during past fires in the area. Many of our collective area (those of us and our neighbors) have a great deal of land that is less than a 25% slope. Integrating equestrian-friendly trails into the broader transportation and recreation planning will benefit the community by improving access and ensuring that equestrian routes are preserved or expanded. These same greenways are also critical animal wildlife corridors, biodiverse habitats, that help sequester rain water to offset the impacts of climate change.

4. Equestrian-Focused Development and Zoning

Support for Equestrian Facilities: If the WSGVAP includes policies aimed at supporting rural or semi-rural land uses, it might provide protections for existing equestrian facilities and promote the development of new ones. This could include provisions for zoning that protects stable operations, equestrian businesses, and other related services.

Limits on Horsekeeping Zoning: In areas undergoing urbanization, equestrian communities may face challenges in maintaining the right to keep horses on their properties due to stricter zoning regulations or reduced parcel sizes. Changes in zoning laws could restrict the ability to keep horses on residential properties, making it more difficult for equestrians to continue their lifestyle.

5. Affordable Housing and Gentrification

Risk of Displacement: The West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan includes efforts to address the region's housing shortage, this could lead to increased demand for housing in areas traditionally home to equestrian communities. Endangered Habitats League (EHL) strongly *supports* the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP) due to its balanced "smart growth" provisions, its important natural resource protections, and contributions to fire safety. For your reference, EHL is a Southern California conservation organization dedicated to ecosystem protection and sustainable land use. We are long term participants in County planning endeavors.

The Western San Gabriel Valley contains designated Significant Ecological Areas (SEAs) in the Whittier Narrows and the Altadena Foothills. Another characteristic of the foothills is fire hazard. Lands adjacent to the National Forest, such as in Altadena and La Crescenta-Montrose, are in a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone.

The current land use designations for the Altadena foothills (e.g., R1 or H9) are *inconsistent* with the General Plan on several levels. Such subdivision would fragment the SEA and block wildlife movement. The SEA would be severely degraded. *To be consistent with the planning accomplished for other SEAs in the County*, the biologically sensitive Altadena foothills must be reduced in density as part of the Area Plan process.

Also, the current Altadena density designations would create excessive new development at the Wildland-Urban Interface, or WUI. Because the Altadena foothills are not surrounded by existing development, but rather border the National Forest, General Plan consistency calls for lands within the VHFSV be down-planned. This is consistent with the VHFSZ in Kinneloa Mesa, which is already RL 20 and not proposed for change. *The proposed changes for the WSGVAP will help in an emergency evacuation of current and future residents*.

As a complement to down-planning in natural resource and hazard locations, the WSGVAP implements the Housing Element and RHNA targets through up-planning in safe locations near services and infrastructure. EHL supports this strategy for density increases and housing production.

In summary, EHL strongly supports the proposed land use changes in the Western San Gabriel Valley to protect Significant Ecological Area biological resources and to improve fire safety for current and future residents. We also support the balanced and complementary provisions for additional housing in <u>safe</u> locations.

EHL applauds the excellent planning that went into this important area plan update, and urges expeditious adoption.

On September 25, 2024, the LA County Regional Planning Commission held a public hearing to review the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (Plan) and its associated Final Environmental Impact Report (EIR). The Plan is scheduled for its first reading at the Board of Supervisors meeting on December 10, 2024.

Beginning in July 2023, the Department of Regional Planning (DRP) initiated community outreach to highlight the need for an update to the Plan. Over several months, DRP conducted extensive outreach through both in-person and virtual meetings to solicit input and clarify the Plan's key elements and proposed changes. Additionally, postcards and letters were sent to addresses within the Plan's boundaries.

The Altadena Town Council (Council) has actively engaged with DRP, inviting representatives to present at our meetings, promoting the CEQA public meetings and five open houses, and addressing specific questions raised by Altadena residents. On November 20, 2024, the Council collaborated with Altadena Coalition of Neighborhood Associations (ACONA) to host a presentation by DRP staff aimed at clarifying misinformation shared on social media, followed by a robust and extensive Q&A session.

The Council has heard from both supporters and opponents of the Plan. The prevailing sentiment in Altadena is one of endorsement. Proponents believe the Plan was thoughtfully developed by DRP in consultation with Altadena residents and other affected unincorporated communities. The Plan, along with its proposed zoning and land use changes, will direct development away from the Altadena foothills and other high fire hazard zones, while protecting natural resources, preventing habitat fragmentation, and preserving wildlife corridors. The Plan acknowledges environmental and societal changes in recent decades and offers a forward-thinking vision for the future. Additionally, Altadena residents are concerned with improving general mobility including safe routes for walking and biking. Many residents who raised these issues want to make sure the zoning is compliant with state requirements to remain eligible for future state infrastructure funding.

We also acknowledge that there has been a small but vocal opposition to the Plan. The WSGVAP Planning Team addressed these concerns by releasing a detailed factsheet, which was posted to the DRP website and circulated in mid-October to clarify these misunderstandings.

The Altadena Town Council, in alignment with the broader community, wishes to formally express our support for the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan. We believe the Plan aligns with the State's goals for sustainable development and thoughtfully considers the needs of our community. We also appreciate the extensive outreach efforts made by DRP since July 2023, which have been instrumental in fostering transparent and informed dialogue with residents.

We are writing to express our strong support for the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP), specifically its provisions for conserving biological resources and protecting wildlife corridors.

The Chaney Trail Corridor Project is a not-for-profit association organized under California Corporations Code Section 18035. We are a professional biological and community science response to the sale of the Nuccio's land, initially to Polytechnic School, and now to the next potential buyer. Our goal is to protect and conserve the open space that's left in the Chaney Trail Corridor.

The WSGVAP aligns with critical policies in the Los Angeles County General Plan, including those that protect Significant Ecological Areas (SEAs) such as the Altadena Foothills and Arroyo Seco. These areas are vital for maintaining biodiversity, as they contain diverse plant communities like coastal sage scrub, riparian woodlands, and chaparral. They also provide habitat for a range of wildlife species, many of which depend on intact ecosystems for survival.

A key strength of the WSGVAP is its emphasis on maintaining wildlife corridors, which facilitate species movement between the low-lying basin and the high elevations of the San Gabriel Mountains. These corridors are essential for feeding, migration, and breeding, allowing wildlife populations to remain viable despite the pressures of urban development. Protecting these corridors also prevents habitat fragmentation, ensuring that plants and animals can adapt to environmental changes and maintain genetic diversity.

Dear Commissioners,

We wish to express our general support for the subject Plan and associated Draft Program Environmental Impact Report (dPEIR) to be reviewed by your Commission 9/25.

Altadena, where we have lived since 1994, and immediately adjacent to NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory where one of us worked for 43+ years starting in 1977 (and the other of us for 15 years), has a character that is important to residents' quality of life, health, and health of the natural environment on which we all depend. Altadena is of course the largest element covered by this plan.

Specifically, we are pleased to see focus in the plan on the following topics:

- Placing high value on the preservation of unbuilt areas, their natural environment, and the biodiversity they host. The Altadena Significant Ecological Area (SEA), as well as the San Gabriel Canyon and Puente Hills SEAs, plus surrounding parcels with a high fraction of natural environment, are crown jewels of the San Gabriel Valley. In the face of climate change, these areas are especially important for their considerable uptake of carbon dioxide, and for the watershed they protect that supplies a significant fraction of water that we all use.
- Frequent mention of trails for natural area access, hikers, equestrians and mountain bicyclists, among other users.
- Recognition of "dark sky" as an important natural resource.
- Focusing attention on Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones and the danger they pose in light of climate change, which is causing California's more frequent, more intense, and larger wildland fires.

Though we have not read every page of the Plan, we were disappointed to not see in the plan the following:

- Specifics to prioritize completing the Altadena Crest Trail (ACT) end-to-end. There are viable routes and supportive landowners, along with historical public access which some newer landowners have actively opposed, that could be leveraged into re-connection of this ~13 mile link through natural beauty and scenic value from the Arroyo Seco to Eaton Canyon. Residents who walked and rode the ACT's entire length are passing away, while the community becomes less aware of the value of this resource. Efforts underway to reconnect portions need to be augmented to create full through-connection off public streets.
- A policy to explore, and if feasible, monetize urban forest canopy to encourage its growth and maintenance on County- and privately-owned parcels. The West San Gabriel Valley would be an ideal region to set up a pilot program for this purpose, with potential carbon sequestration market income back to the County and private property owners (e.g., via small property tax credits). An initial estimate based on comparison with private projects over forested areas indicates a possible benefit of ~\$3 M - \$8M per year, or \$60 - \$160 M over the 20-year life of the plan, not counting likely increase in carbon sequestration market prices as the effects of climate change increase in severity. With the exception of protected oaks, the County and private property owners are free to cut down, damage, and severely trim their trees that do so much to keep our urban heat island from being more severe than it already is. While I am not entirely opposed to more restrictive measures, I think it is time to test and perhaps embrace financial measures of encouragement and reward for contributing to a healthy urban forest canopy. Home values are typically higher in such communities (e.g., La Canada Flintridge), while trees are typically reduced or eliminated in lower-income communities, resulting in greater suffering from heat effects by the population with the least health and financial resilience. This in turn increases County and County resident emergency services and medical costs.
- Elements to enable specific prohibition of increasing the occupancy (persons/acre) on all parcels within all Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones, and provisions to severely limit any increases in occupancy on parcels within High Fire Hazard Severity Zones.
- Lack of specifics about eliminating the expansion of light pollution that reduces dark sky that interferes with wildlife, creates unpleasant glare, and reduces driving safety. Today, pretty much any homeowner and business can put up higher-output lighting with little regard for its impact on neighbors or the environment. Driving around, I see more of this every month; limits and incentives are much in order. SCE put up numerous high-color-temperature street lights after a long dispute about about using lower color temperatures. Also, a fraction of their fixtures lack modest-cost features to reduce their glare as perceived by drivers and residents.
- Lack of a policy to specifically limit vehicular access to natural areas within Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones during periods of high fire danger (e.g., forecasted heat waves like we just experienced, and high wind events).

• More specific measures to promote preservation of the equestrian elements that make Altadena one of the few places within Los Angeles County where one does not need to be wealthy to own and ride a horse.

Arroyos & Foothills Conservancy (AFC) strongly supports the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP) for the critical protections it will provide for our region's wildlife and open spaces. As a land conservancy preserving natural habitat in and around the San Gabriel and Crescenta Valleys, we helped shape the Conservation and Open Space Element of the Plan. We encourage the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to approve the Plan when it comes to a final vote on December 10th, 2024.

We are being confronted with species extinction, biodiversity and habitat loss, more extreme and less predictable weather, and increased wildfires. The need for a forward-thinking vision for our planet is urgent. The WSGVAP effectively addresses the challenges we face locally. We feel that it is critical to adopt this plan for the benefit of all our urban animals, native flora, and natural habitats.

The WSGVAP is a comprehensive planning tool that will shape the long-term growth of unincorporated areas of the West San Gabriel Valley. Those that are within AFC's long term conservation area include Altadena, La Crescenta, Kinneola Mesa, and East Pasadena. During developmental and public review stages, AFC submitted our recommendations for the Conservation and Open Space Element and were very pleased that the Regional Planning Department embraced our comments. It now includes critical measures for wildlife and habitat protection.

The open space areas in our region, like the San Rafael Hills and Verdugo Mountains, function as disconnected islands of habitat, separated by freeways and development. Wildlife become stranded in these islands and are unable to travel to mate with larger populations, to find food and water, and to establish their own territory. The life of P-22, the mountain lion that lived in Griffith Park, most famously illustrated this problem. Isolation of individual wildlife can lead to genetic inbreeding and local species extinction, putting these islands at grave risk of ecological collapse.

Arroyos & Foothills Conservancy's Letter of Support for WSGVAP

The biodiversity crisis is exacerbated by climate change which is a problem for wildlife, and for us. We rely on biodiversity for the production of our food and clean water, and for overall environmental stability. The most effective solution is to create wildlife corridors—patches of natural habitat—that reconnect these islands. We must restore habitat with native plants and enable the movement of all species (think mountain lions, but also coyotes, birds, insects, pollinators, and reptiles). The Open Space and Conservation Element emphasizes the necessity to protect existing areas of habitat and wildlife corridors, and importantly, takes an active approach to increase them.

Specifically, The Element addresses the need for wildlife crossings and corridors that wildlife can safely move through in the Verdugo Mountains, San Rafael Hills, and biologically rich San Gabriel Mountains. It encourages native tree canopy coverage for both open spaces and residential areas. It promotes the creation of habitat stepping-stones of native plants in small spaces like parkways, driveways, and parking lots.

The County has included measures to promote habitat-sensitive designs for new developments. This includes wildlife-permeable fencing, enhancing biodiversity, the limited removal of native plants, and favoring limited inclusion of invasive and non-native plants. It also includes regulations limiting artificial light in natural areas to protect wildlife from the negative impacts of light pollution.

These are the measures we need to be taking to address the biodiversity crisis we are in, both locally and globally. We urge you to vote in approval of the WSGVAP. Let's take action together to protect our wildlife and precious open spaces.

Dear Madam Supervisor:

I express my full support for the County's West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP) and associated zoning and land use changes proposed for Altadena. The WSGVAP will direct growth away from hazard areas, protect natural and biological resources, and prevent habitat disturbance and fragmentation. The Plan recognizes environmental and societal changes over the past decades and proposes a rational and compelling vision for future developments.

As you know, Altadena is an unincorporated town of 43,000 residents situated in and against the San Gabriel Mountain foothills. It is the largest political jurisdiction covered by the WSGVAP, by both geography and population. Altadena residents have been actively involved in the formulation and refinement of the WSGVAP, starting from the initial Department of Regional Planning (DRP) kick-off workshop at the town's Main Library in October 2023. At that workshop, some 30 residents identified hundreds of visions for imagining Altadena in the next 20-40 years. DRP staff did a splendid job of assimilating these ideas into the WSGVAP and refining the document in a series of subsequent video tag-up meetings with an ad hoc Altadena Advisory Group.

The WSGVAP effectively discusses the major issues affecting land use, economic development, conservation, public services and mobility in the unincorporated areas of the West San Gabriel Valley. The Area Plan succinctly identifies numerous opportunities that can be realized through future implementation plans. The WSGVAP does a superb job of balancing smart growth with sustainability and the preservation of wildlands. It captures the increasing risks associated with growth and living the wildlands-urban interface along the foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains. Of relevance to the 2200 Altadena homeowners living in a State-designated Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone, the Area Plan's goals of discouraging new developments in hazard zones and directing them to urbanized areas along mass-transit corridors is laudable.

The parallel efforts to refine the land-use classifications and zoning categories in the Altadena foothills is also to be applauded. These efforts will bring some needed rationalities to the many

discrepancies existing now. Combined with the contents of the WSGVAP, it is hoped they will prevent future developments that increase the intensity of people and/or intensity of activity in hazard zones.

Since the Regional Planning Commission (RPC) unanimously endorsed the WSGVAP on September 25, a small – but loud -- contingent of property owners in northern Altadena have come out to oppose the WSGVAP. Unfortunately, their campaign petition and social media posts have been rife with misinformation – and even disinformation. Their arguments have been wide ranging and disjointed. A couple of their false arguments were addressed by me in an October 22 Op-Ed posted by LocalNewsPasadena.com, "Countering Misinformation About the LA County Rezoning Plan." Addressing the rest would take a series of Op-Eds.

The opponents seem to be coalescing around arguments against <u>any</u> increase in density within Altadena. Such arguments reveal ignorance of the legislative and executive State actions mandating the construction of more housing, and the pressure from the Attorney General's office on local municipalities to remove obstacles to doing so. They fail to recognize that many of the proposed changes in zoning and land use classifications are administrative (corrective) in nature and would have been proposed independent of the WSGVAP. These changes create consistency with several *existing and previously enacted* land use constraints that limit potential development in hazard zones and in hillside and significant ecological areas.

Moreover, there is a scent of hypocrisy permeating their actions, given that some of the same landowners have discussed sub-dividing their properties in applications to the County, on websites, or in public hearings at the RPC. They argue against increasing densities in Altadena -- while taking steps to increase densities on their own properties in a very high fire hazard zone.

In summary, the WSGVAP is a comprehensive, forward-looking plan that balances smart growth with the need to limit the risks of continued expansion into hazard and protected areas. It will discourage new developments in fire hazard zones, while allowing — but not mandating — new developments in urban areas near main transit corridors. I Look forward to seeing the Board of Supervisors adopt the "greatest good" and to endorse the WSGVAP.

Dear Supervisor Barger,

I support the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP). I have lived in Altadena for over 22 years in my home directly adjacent to the Angeles National Forest and San Gabriel Mountains National Monument. I am an advocate for protecting our foothills and mountains, and for preserving and enhancing Altadena's unique town character. The WSGVAP does both. The WSGVAP promotes protection of undeveloped wildlands, and promotes preserving Altadena's character while mindfully directing moderate future growth in appropriate urban areas.

Prevention of human-created disturbances in the natural environment, including prevention of wildfires and ecological degradation, is essential to our harmonious and safe co-existence with nature. The WSGVAP's goals and policies and companion zone updates restrict future development and land use intensities in Altadena's foothills and mountains. The WSGVAP proposed zone updates incorporate multiple existing land use and regulatory constraints, which have been codified elsewhere over the last many years, that restrict future development within protected areas and hazard zones. The proposed zone updates reflect such existing constraints on parcels (1) in the Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone, Hillside Management Areas (where development is limited according to the steepness of slopes), Significant Ecological Areas (which contain designated sensitive habitats and species), and the Angeles National Forest; (2) that contain Significant Ridgelines (pursuant to the Altadena Communities Standard Distrift), seismic hazards and landslide zones, restricted road access and limited infrastructure, and streams and creeks; and (3) that adjoin the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument.

At the same time, the WSGVAP's goals and policies promote moderate development in Altadena's more urban areas near main transit corridors to provide opportunities for future housing, commercial, and mixed-use development. The WSGVAP supports vibrant, walkable mixed-use commercial districts with public realm improvements, local services, and amenities for local residents, with particular attention to the needs of West Altadena residents. By focusing moderate growth along primary roads with access to services, amenities, existing infrastructure and transit and ensuring such development fits the community character, Altadena has an opportunity to enhance, through mindful design and development, its unique town character.

The WSGVAP will limit expansion of the wildland/urban interface, protect natural and biological resources, and provide multi-benefit open spaces for the public's health and enjoyment. The WSGVAP sensibly directs growth away from hazard areas and protected zones by providing means for concentrating development in the denser urban areas near transit corridors and commercial hubs. Such smart growth strategies have the potential for enhancing a 'sense of place' in our town centers and a 'sense of peace' in our low-density neighborhoods and undeveloped wildland foothills and mountains. The WSGVAP is an essential mechanism for promoting responsible growth, ensuring the public's health and

safety, and preserving our natural environment.





Countering Misinformation about the LA County Rezoning Plan

Citizen viewpoints should at least be factual.

The L.A. County Regional Planning Commission (RPC) recently endorsed — unanimously — the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP), which will go to the Board of Supervisors for final approval in December. Since the RPC action, a handful of Altadena residents have circulated an online petition opposing the WSGVAP. Unfortunately, the language in their petition and social media posts disseminates misinformation. While we should respect any citizen's views, we should also demand that their claims be factual.

One claim is that the County's Department of Regional Planning (DRP) failed to conduct adequate community outreach to prepare the WSGVAP. This claim is false.

Starting with a visioning workshop at the Altadena library in October 2023, DRP staff synthesized hundreds of recommendations from Altadenans to envision, over the next few decades, a more sustainable town. The DRP outreach included in-person and virtual meetings, a project Web site, community surveys, an email list, fact sheets, flyers, postcards, notices, mailers, and social media posts – widely distributed in multiple languages. These community engagement efforts were recently

cited by one Commissioner as "the most comprehensive and extensive outreach ever presented" to the RPC. To see for yourself, read the <u>Land Use and Conservation/Open Space</u> chapters of the WSGVAP.

Another social media claim is that the WSGVAP and associated zoning changes will make it "MORE likely that there will be development in wildlife corridors and the fire [hazard] zone." This claim is false.

The WSGVAP updates zone designations for some properties in northern Altadena and its foothills to create consistency with several existing, previously enacted land use constraints that limit potential development in hazard zones and in the hillside and significant ecological areas. The WSGVAP land use policies direct growth away from established protected and hazard areas, preserve natural and biological resources and prevent habitat disturbance and fragmentation. The plan allows new development in urban areas near main transit corridors. To argue against any growth in Altadena is unreasonable at a time when the State is pressuring local municipalities to reduce obstacles to building more housing.

The WSGVAP recognizes environmental and societal changes over the past decades and presents a rational, compelling vision for future development in Altadena. It is a comprehensive, forward-looking plan that

balances smart growth with the undeniable need to limit the risks of continued expansion into hazard and protected areas. The WSGVAP embodies common sense. Will the WSGVAP make everyone happy? No. Does it create conditions for the "greatest good" to prevail in our community? Yes.

To me, the most critical thing is to limit development and decrease intensity of activity within high hazard fire zones. The increase in wildfire danger, especially in the wildland-urban interface areas such as the Altadena foothills, is becoming apparent to all. Especially those of us who live in single road access areas in the high fire zones, it is critical that we are knowledgeable and prepared for the real possibility of fire within 1/4" of our home, such as it was in the 2009 Station Fire. While there is a well-known housing shortage, developing in high hazard fire zone areas only increases the likelihood that those homes would be lost and more personal tragedy occur with those losses. Good morning, Board of Supervisors. I'm Desiree Portillo Rabinov, a resident of La Crescenta for 35 years. This is where my children were born and raised, and I continue volunteering to enhance the quality of life in our area. One of my goals when we moved here was to request a specific plan for our community, and it's finally happening. I'm thrilled to support the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan as a former Sr. Transportation Manager at MTA with over 3 decades of practice. I appreciate the opportunity to share my experience and knowledge during the planning process with county staff, who were exceptional to work with in this effort.

I want to emphasize several topics of the plan that highlight the absolute need to be approved because it creates a more vibrant, less car-dependent community by enhancing transportation diversity by increasing multi-use and affordable housing options, a community center, and small businesses. Three areas of interest are:

Micro transit Service, Pedestrian Safety, and Bike Network: The plan promotes diverse mobility options, such as frequent bus and micro transit services, to reduce reliance on personal vehicles. This would benefit families and residents who work, attend college, attend schools, or shop within a 5-mile radius with added convenience. Also, more frequent public transit services connecting to the metro light rail station in Pasadena and BRT will be linked with more multi-use housing development on Foothill Blvd. for those longer destinations and traffic-calming infrastructure to improve pedestrian mobility.

- Access to parks and creating more park space and the Rosemont Preserve Improving accessibility to the Rosemont Preserve would be a significant asset to the community. Many of our residents, like my husband, volunteer as docents and stewards and are very knowledgeable about ecology, watersheds, and native plants that they share with students. Many neighbors are unaware of the Preserve, and better access and availability would enhance community engagement and understanding of outdoor conservation. - Vibrant, Diverse Small Businesses: Incentivizing diverse shops, restaurants, and offerings, especially along Foothill Blvd, would make the neighborhood more competitive and attractive for small businesses like La Canada. This would create a more pleasant, walkable, and family-friendly area, supporting local businesses and a sense of belonging to the community's vibrancy.

Other planning actions include parking flexibility, pedestrian-scale street improvements, climate-friendly designs, and multifunctional gathering and recreation spaces, which contribute to the livability of families in La Crescenta-Montrose.

These comments are written in response to the Draft PEIR, prepared by Environmental Science Associates (ESA) for the West San Gabriel Valley Planning Committee ("WSGVP"). I am a long-term resident of Altadena and I object to any and all plans, projects and/or construction whether proposed in the draft Plan Environmental Impact Report ("PEIR") or not, as well as the proposed amendment of Title 22, for the reasons discussed in this Memorandum.

Volatile Organic Compounds in the Soil, Water and Air Pose Significant Health Risks in the West San Gabriel Valley ("WSGV")

- All of the contemplated activities (excavation, grading, dewatering, removal of soil, creation
 of fugitive dust, removal of construction debris and other ground-disturbing activities) pose
 an unacceptable risk to residents' health and safety from exposure to toxic volatile
 (vaporous) organic compounds in the soil and groundwater of Altadena.
- The consulting firm hired by Los Angeles County (ESA) recognized this issue in a Background Brief, dated December 2023: "Four major superfund sites are found within the WSGV and soil contamination from underground storage tanks is <u>dispersed</u> throughout the area." (Emphasis provided). ESA Task B1 Background Brief at page 68.
- The Jet Propulsion Lab, located at Hahamonga Watershed near Altadena and La Canada Flintridge, is one of these four Superfund sites and has been designated as a National Priorities Sife or one that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) deems to be most in need of clean-up due to risks to the public health and safety. (CERCLIS CA 9800013030, August 5, 1999).
- For fifteen years, from 1945-1960, toxic liquid and solid wastes were disposed into forty seepage pits and waste pits at the current site of JPL. (Supra at page 3).
- As a result, volatile organic compounds (VOC's) were released into the soil and water. (Supra at page 1).
- These VOC's traveled in an underground plume to drinking water wells in Altadena and Pasadena. (Supra at page 4).
- By 1980, two VOC's (carbon tetrachloride and trichloroethylene) were identified in wells by the City of Pasadena. (Supra at page 4).
- Carbon tetrachloride may cause liver problems and increase the risk of cancer. [EPA list of drinking water contaminants and maximum contaminant levels (MCL's)].
- Trichloroethylene may cause liver problems and increase the risk of cancer. [EPA list of drinking water contaminants and maximum contaminant levels (MCL's)].
- The groundwater plume can change direction and even reverse for short periods of time. (CERCLIS CA 9800013030, August 5, 1999, at page 12).
- Around 1980, VOC's were also detected in the wells of Lincoln Water, located in Altadena. (Supra at page 4)
- When the contaminant concentration exceeded drinking water standards in 1985, Pasadena closed two wells. (Supra at page 4)

- When the contaminant concentration exceeded drinking water standards in 1987, Lincoln Avenue (in Altadena) closed two wells. (Supra at page 4)
- When the contaminant concentration continued to exceed drinking water standards in 1989, Pasadena closed another two wells. (Supra at page 4)
- This was wide-spread contamination by the underground plume.
- In 1992, the EPA identified other VOC contaminants at the JPL/Hahamonga site: 1,1-dichloroethane and tetrachloroethylene. (Supra at page 4)
- 1,1 dichloroethane and1,2 dichloroethane are associated with an increased risk of cancer and 1,1 dichloroethylene is associated with liver problems). [EPA list of drinking water contaminants and maximum contaminant levels (MCL's)].
- Tetrachloroethylene is associated with increased risk of cancer and liver problems. [EPA list of drinking water contaminants and maximum contaminant levels (MCL's)].
- A total of six Raymond Water Basin purveyors operate wells within four miles of the JPL/Hahamonga site. These include Rubio Canyon, Los Flores and Lincoln Avenue Water. The cities of Alhambra, Arcadia, La Canada-Flintridge, San Marino and Sierra Madre also received water from the Raymond Basin. (CERCLIS CA 9800013030, August 5, 1999, at page 8).
- This Raymond Groundwater Basin extends about 41 square miles. (PEIR at page 4.10-5)
- Groundwater extraction accounts for nearly one-third of the water usage in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. (ESA Task B1 Background Brief at page 68, referencing LACounty Planning 2022a).
- VOC's can be easily vaporized or become gaseous. (CERCLIS CA 9800013030, August 5, 1999, at Appendix A-7).
- Routes for exposure can be inhalation, ingestion or by skin contact. (Supra at page A-7).
- Since the VOC's are in the soil and water of Altadena's area, activities that create disruption cause release into the air.
 - o Take, for example, "pre-watering and de-watering" discussed in the PEIR. (At page 4.3-32 to 4.3-33; page 4.7-11; page 4.7-17; and page 4.9-17).
 - VOC-contaminated water can evaporate into the air creating a toxic environment for humans.
- The WSGVP's PEIR recognizes that soils can contain toxic contaminants that are released through particle emissions. (PEIR at page 4.3-53)
- In its background brief, the ESA firm, hired by the County, stated that the cancer rate in Altadena was 6%, or above average. This means that 2,559 of Altadena's current residents (42,658) have had cancer diagnoses.
- In 2004, Dr. Thomas Mack, Norris Cancer Center, analyzed cancer surveillance data from ten million people in Los Angeles County over a twenty-six (26) year period. Elsevier Academic Press published the first edition in 2004, entitled <u>Cancers in the Urban Environment</u>, <u>Patterns of Malignant Disease in Los Angeles County and its Neighborhoods</u>. Dr. Mack identified census tracts at high risk and adjusted for social class. There were at least six instances of nonrandom distribution that did not

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- conform to the pattern that would have been predicted by available knowledge. (Mack at page 645)
- The identified nonrandom cancers included oropharyngeal carcinoma, small cell carcinoma and adenocarcinoma of the lung, papillary carcinoma of the thyroid, squamous carcinoma of the bladder and diffuse mixed B-cell non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. (Mack at page 645):
 - o For oropharyngeal carcinoma, there was a cancer cluster of female patients in Altadena and another cluster of males in Pasadena. (Mack at page 55).
 - o For salivary gland malignancies, there was a cancer cluster of males in Altadena. (Mack at page 62).
 - o For carcinoma of the larynx, there were cancer clusters of males in Pasadena and Altadena. (Mack at page 167)
 - o For small cell carcinoma of the lung, there was a cancer cluster of males in Altadena. (Mack at page 197)
 - For adenocarcinoma of the lung and bronchi, there was a cancer cluster of females in La Canada Flintridge. (Mack at page 205)
 - o For osteosarcoma, there was a cancer cluster of females in Altadena. (Mack at page 261-262)
 - o For squamous carcinoma of the bladder, there was a cancer cluster of males near the Glendale and Altadena area. (Mack at page 352).
 - o For brain malignancies (gliomas), there was a cancer cluster of females in Altadena. (Mack at page 379)
 - For papillary carcinoma of the thyroid, there was a large cancer cluster of females in La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 412)
 - o For nodular sclerosis Hodgkin's lymphoma, there was a large cancer cluster of males between Altadena and La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 460)
 - For diffuse mixed B-cell non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, there were two male clusters, one in Pasadena and one in La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 503).
 - For chronic lymphocytic leukemia, there was a large mixed gender cluster near La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at 581)
 - For other leukemias, there were two clusters, one for females in Altadena and another for mixed genders in Pasadena. (Mack at page 609)
 - There was also a large cluster of malignancies in older children extending from Altadena to La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 623)
 - o Finally, there was also a large cluster of young adult females with malignancies in La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 630)
- Future development would increase the number of residents (in Altadena) and would potentially increase the number of people exposed to toxic contaminants. (PEIR at page 4.9-25).
- It is reasonably foreseeable that future projects and/or natural disasters would release hazardous materials into the environment. (PEIR at page 4.9-27).
 - Although the ESA (WSGVP) adopts OSHA as its band aid fix, that is a statute designed to protect workers. OSHA remedial measures do not reduce the adverse impact to Altadena's residents.

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- O Although the PEIR states that the WSGVP was required to consult the EPA National Priorities List and the EPA's CERCLIS site, as well as archived sites, the ESA and the WSGVP "overlooked" the hazards site at JPL/Hahamonga Superfund site. (PEIR at page 4.9-2 to page 4.9-4).
- Although the PEIR acknowledges that VOC's, including tetrachloroethane, may be in the soil and groundwater throughout the Plan area and that soil vapor intrusion may occur, the impact of VOC's on human health and safety is not mentioned. (PEIR at page 4.9-7, page 4.9-12, page 4.9-17)
- Construction or redevelopment on contaminated properties could potentially generate vapors or fugitive dust containing contaminants that pose a health risk. (PEIR at page 4.9-27).
 - As demonstrated in Dr. Mack's book, above, the risk is significant and it is not limited to "sensitive receptors," young children, persons with disabilities and older residents.
- The ESA (WSGVP) asserts that future projected growth would result in 25,954 new residents, 10,874 new jobs and 16,243 new housing units. This would increase the demand for water and pumping from groundwater wells. (PEIR at page 4.10-22).
- It is not clear how many new residents would be added to Altadena's current population of 43,344, as this section was conveniently omitted from the PEIR and Appendices. Altadena is only 8.5 square miles. (PEIR at page 4.11-2)
- It is also not clear how many new housing units would be added to Altadena's current total of 15,334, as this section was omitted from the PEIR and Appendices. The Regional Housing Needs Allocation assigned 4,479 new units to the entire WSGV. (PEIR at page 4.11-8).
- Although the ESA (WSGVP) naively asserts that compliance with applicable environmental laws would protect the public from resulting contaminant exposure, causing serious health risks (PEIR at page 4.9-29), this is an overstatement.
 - Take, for example, the history of the JPL/Hahamonga Superfund site on the National Priorities List. Carcinogenic volatile organic chemicals were allegedly first discovered in 1980. Almost twenty years later, the EPA and JPL published the CERCLIS report and held the required Superfund meeting to inform Altadena residents.
 - Another resounding example of government inaction is the Stringfellow Acid Pits in Jurupa. Toxic waste, including volatile organic compounds, spilled into groundwater in 1972. Toxins had been spilling into the nearby creek between 1969 and 1980. Litigation related to this site lasted three decades and involved the conviction of Rita LaVelle, then Director of Superfund, and the resignation of Anne Gorsuch Burford, then EPA administrator. Clean-up has

not been completed and will take five hundred (500) years. Wikipedia, StringfellowAcid Pits, Accessed July 28, 2024.

- Another questionable assumption in the ESA/WSGVP's PEIR is the use of the VOC maximum contaminant or significance levels established by the SCAQMD (South Coast Air Quality Management District). (PEIR at 4.3-34 to 3.4-35). They should have and could have used the VOC criteria significance levels established by the EPA for drinking water.
 - Members of the AQMD are drawn from businesses (both small and large), labor organizations, law firms, the chamber of commerce, community environmental organizations and some government agencies. Other than JPL, discussed above, the member roster does not appear to include persons having scientific-based knowledge. AQMD.gov/home. See AQMD advisory group board, September 2023-September 2027, accessed July 27, 2024.
 - o The SCAQMD has arbitrarily determined the cancer burden without supporting empirical evidence, such as Dr. Mack's surveillance data, discussed above. (PEIR at page 4.3-37)
 - o Additionally, for criteria pollutants, the SCAQMD has used dated thresholds from 1993. (PEIR at page 4.3-43)
 - The SCAQMD has also utilized an unsupported assumption that construction impacts are temporary. (PEIR 4.3-35). As demonstrated above, the health impacts are far from temporary.
- The WSGVP's PEIR marginalizes significant health risks from VOC's. Despite the known health risks of VOC's, the WSGVP states that it would like to use recycled water for landscape irrigation in County parks. (PEIR at page 4.3-31).

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- Although the PEIR states a concern for water quality and aquatic resources, it allows
 project developers to simply purchase credits, in lieu of remediation, at an approved
 mitigation bank. (PEIR at page 4.4-34).
- Although there is a process for monitoring pollutant discharges, this process lies squarely in the hands of the developer or contractor under the Construction General Permit. (PEIR at pages 4.17-16 to 4.7-17). This questionable process seems to have little oversight by governmental authorities.

<u>Voltile Organic Compounds Combine with Nitrogen Oxide to Form Ozone, A Greenhouse</u> Gas, That Causes Known and Significant Health Risks in the WSGV

• When VOC's are released into the air, they combine with nitrogen oxides to form ozone. (PEIR at page 4.3-2 to 4.3-3). Ozone is a greenhouse gas and one that causes increased temperatures on Earth. *Wikipedia, Greenhouse Gas, Accessed 7/25/24*.

- JANA SANDARSELECT CONTRACTOR CONT
- Based on ambient air quality monitoring, Los Angeles County regularly exceeded the state's one hour and federal eight hour ozone level within the last five years. (PEIR at page 4.3-9). This is considered extreme "non-attainment" in the PEIR. (Page 4.3-36)
- Ozone is a criteria pollutant and one which can lead to the following medical problems:

Breathing problems, such as asthma, emphysema and chronic bronchitis;

Inflammation and damage to airways;

Aggravation of lung diseases;

Susceptibility to lung infections;

Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease; and

Permanent lung damage. (PEIR at page 4.3-2 to 4.3-3).

- Ozone (made by the combination of VOC's and nitrogen oxide, as noted in the WSGVP PEIR) creates risk to human health, particularly in older adults, children and outdoor workers ("sensitive receptors"). (PEIR at page 4.3-2 to 4.3-3).
 - Altadena has 19.5% residents aged sixty-five and older. (ESA Background Brief).

The WSGVP's PEIR Contemplates the Release of Both Small and Large Particulate Matters that Cause Known and Significant Health Risks in WSGV.

- Projects developed under the WSGVP would involve ground-disturbing activities during construction. (PEIR at page 4.5-24). Excavating, grading, handling, treating, stock-piling, transferring and removing soil, construction/demolition and travel of construction equipment may cause "fugitive dust emissions." (PEIR at page 4.3-22 to 4.3-24).
 - o The topography of the San Gabriel Mountains rising to the north of Altadena is conducive to trapping of pollutants in the foothill communities.

Emissions may be downwind of sensitive receptors. One option is to cease all activities. (PEIR at page 4.3-22 to 4.3-24).

- Particulate matter (PM 10 micrometers and PM 2.5 micrometers) may be inhaled by residents.
- Particulate matter (PM 10 and PM 2.5) is deposited into the lungs and can cause tissue damage and lung inflammation. (PEIR page 4.3-5).
- PM 10 particles include dust from construction sites and landfills.

Despite the known risks from release of particulates, the WSGVP wants to recycle construction and demolition debris from construction sites. (PEIR at page 4.3-31)

- Sources of PM 2.5 particles arise from combustion of gasoline, oil and diesel.
 - o Bulldozers, loaders, backhoes, cranes, excavators, forklifts and haul trucks are frequently diesel powered and emit criteria air pollution. (PEIR at page 4.3-15, page 4.3-32).
 - O Although idling at construction sites is purportedly limited to five minutes, the equipment fleet has not been fully replaced by new emissions-controlled fleets. (PEIR at page 4.3-15 to page 4.3-16)
- Based on ambient air quality monitoring, Los Angeles County regularly exceeded the state and federal PM10 and PM2.5 standards within the last five years. (PEIR at page 4.3-9). This is considered "non-attainment" status. (PEIR at page 4.3-42 to page 4.3-43)

The Scope of the WSGVP is Very Large, Impacting Many Residents, Many of Whom Did Not Receive Notice From Los Angeles County's Department of Regional Planning.

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- The scope of the proposed Plan is very large, impacting many residents and areas of Los Angeles County, including Altadena.
- Most residents did not receive notice of the NOP or scoping in November-December 2023. This author received no notice until Spring 2024.
- In Spring 2024, a few residents attended the meeting at the Altadena library, and two subsequent Zoom meetings. The initial meeting was cast as proposed "administrative corrections" of zoning to reflect how properties were actually being utilized in Altadena.
- At the Altadena library meeting, residents were asked to complete a forced choice survey to rank their preferences. Question No. 7 asked residents to rank what they would like to see more of in their community. Question No. 9 asked residents to rank the issues they would like to see "managed" in their community. Question 12 asked residents to select the "housing types" that could fit into their community.

Many of these questions were economically divisive, pitting citizens of West Altadena against those in East Altadena. This perpetrated a historical racial and socio-economic division within Altadena.

The survey had few open-ended questions on whether residents were satisfied with their community and whether they wanted additional development.

In the survey, there was no explanation of the broad intended scope of the WSGVP.

At the Altadena library meeting, the development maps were taped to the wall, had glare and could not be seen at eye level. Even the smaller paper maps placed on the tables were not fully legible in terms of streets.

- When the draft PEIR was released in June 2024, most residents were on summer vacations. By including boilerplate recitation of laws and regulations (without much discussion of applicability to the facts), the WSGVP has made the PEIR into eight hundred, ten (810) pages. The sheer length of the PEIR imposes an impediment to transparency.
- Although the WSGVP PEIR references the County General Plan, by incorporation, the author did not receive notice of the EIR for the County General Plan and cannot compare the two documents.
- When the WSGVP ultimately sent post cards, with QR codes, to each resident, the post card did not inform residents of the extent of the plan, or projects, with the dates of hearings and matters to be addressed. It was purposefully designed to look like a throw-away piece of mail. Most residents do not know what the County envisions for their community. Many residents and businesses believed that the development was limited to the former location of Webster's Pharmacy.

Altadena is Unique in Several Important Ways. In the Spirit of Self-Determination, Altadena Should Keep Its Own Community Standards ("CSD's")

- In June 2024, the draft PEIR laid out the vast extent of the development plan and used a process called "tiering." The process of "tiering," or assuming that all unincorporated areas of Los Angeles are the same in enough ways that they should be included within the rubric of one single Plan, the WSGVP, is not well-taken.
- After the WSGVP PEIR was drafted, the San Gabriel Mountains were designated as a
 federal National Monument. The foothills in Altadena are immediately south of, and
 directly abut, this National Monument. The WSGVP's PEIR does not consider the
 designation.
- A stated goal of the WSGVP is to reduce wildfire hazards and to preserve biological resources by decreasing density in areas adjacent to natural resources. (PEIR at page 4.7-19). Altadena is directly adjacent to the natural resources in the San Gabriel Mountains. Density should not be increased by any new development in Altadena.
- The San Gabriel Mountains' designation causes more traffic in Altadena's limited north-south roads and increases the Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT's) beyond that contemplated by the WSGVP's PEIR.
- The only freeway that runs near Altadena, but not necessarily through Altadena, is the 210 Freeway. By framing the geographic area more broadly, the WSGVP has misstated the extent of freeway access.

To access Altadena for evacuation purposes, there are no north-south "highways." However, there are several secondary roads, running north-south: Lake, Allen, Hill, Lincoln, Los Robles, Altadena Drive and Fair Oaks. Many of these roads have traffic choke-points due to drive-through establishments and commercial build-out near Pasadena.

The other unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County have more freeway access: the 60 Freeway, the 10 Freeway, the 605 Freeway, the 2 Freeway, the 5 Freeway and the 105 Freeway. These are the more reasonable choices for new growth.

- The hilly topography of Altadena is not conducive to walking, riding bicycles or razor scooters unless one plans a one-way trip, downhill. The buses that run from the Lake Avenue Metro Station are infrequent and take a long time.
- In Altadena, there are "areas with underlying materials that include undocumented fills, soft compressible deposits or loose debris that could be inadequate to support development" especially of multi-story buildings. (PEIR at page 4.7-25). This is another reason to keep height and set-back limits in Altadena's own CSD.
- Altadena is an historic area that should be preserved. More than one hundred and ninety (190) homes in Altadena were built in Jane's Village between 1924 and 1926.
 There are eighty (80) additional Jane's homes outside the Village area and in Altadena.

A Jane's home could be purchased for as little as \$ 7,950-\$11,000 with as little as \$ 500 down payment and monthly payments of only \$100.

The Jane's homes are recognized in the PEIR as "Altadena Heritage" homes but dismissively referred to as having no "legally binding" protection. (PEIR at page 4.5-8)

- The WSGVP would like to take Altadena's Community Standards ("CSD") and fold it into a "one-size fits all" area Plan or PASD, despite the differences between Altadena and the other three unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. (PEIR at page 4.4-31).
- "Local land use plans and policies... are not required to be consistent with either the Regional Transportation Plan or the Sustainable Communities Strategy." (PEIR at page 4.6-9). Altadena should keep its self-determined CSD.

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What is the Extent of Development and Displacement Contemplated by the WSGVP for Altadena's 8.5 Square Miles?

- Superficially, the WSGVP wants to increase "development" intensity along commercial corridors and in "select" areas near commercial corridors and transit with low existing residential density. (PEIR at page 4.3-32)
- The WSGVP wants to concentrate growth within one mile from major transit stops, one-half mile from high quality transit corridors and one quarter mile from commercial corridors and commercial areas where there is access to existing or *proposed* transit. (PEIR at page 4.11-16)

To change the growth pattern, all the planners have to do is propose new transit in an area of Altadena.

- The WSGVP wants to increase population density over and beyond that contemplated by the Regional Housing Element Regional Allocation. (PEIR at page 5-39).
- The WSGVP contemplates infill development and re-development on "underutilized" sites, as well as "adaptive reuse" of "underutilized structures," "appropriate residential density" along transit corridors, "encouragement of sustainable subdivisions" and "acquisition" of resource-sensitive lands. (PEIR at page 4.3-29 to page 4.3-30; page 4.4-25).

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If we look at the context of "appropriate residential density," the WSGVP disfavors existing single family homes in Altadena (referred to as "aging stock") and favors mixed use, multi-story residences that concededly block scenic views and full enjoyment of a National Monument, the San Gabriel Mountains.

• The WSGVP PEIR states that they want to utilize anti-displacement measures, so "existing community members can remain in …their neighborhoods, while accepting new residents through more compact, mixed use development." (PEIR at page 4.8-36).

The WSGVP has identified no site(s) for new residents and no sites for multidensity complexes. Vulnerable elderly people, people of color and people with limited economic means would be systemically displaced from their homes. See, for example, the historic seizure of Chavez Ravine in Los Angeles or the large scale razing of homes in Capetown, South Africa.

In Altadena, 19.5% of residents are 65 years or older and 74% of all residents are home owners. Many residents are retired, living on fixed income. If these home owners had to transition to rentals in Altadena, they would likely have to pay more than their mortgage. Currently, the average rental in Altadena is \$ 1,626. (ESA Background Brief).

"Relocation assistance" is not adequate to compensate the susceptible elderly for the disruption and health risks near the end of life.

Displacement of elderly people also imposes a burden on intergenerational transfer of wealth in Altadena, a neighborhood that was historically favored by African-Americans.

Vulnerable older individuals in R-1 housing would be disfavored to the advantage of younger residents with families. Younger newlyweds and families resent not being able to buy a home. Older residents just want to live their lives in peace, without the noise and nuisance of nearby construction. The WSGVP creates division.

Although there are needs for affordable housing, builders would not be required to offer affordable housing in Altadena. Mr. Drevno, one of the planners, stated that all units could be offered at market rates in Altadena. The background brief prepared by the ESA consulting firm also stated that Altadena was not eligible for market incentives due to the residents' higher income.

The WSGVP's PEIR is Defective Due to Vagueness, Inconsistencies and Omissions of Significant Impacts on Human Health and Safety.

- The WSGVP does not propose any site-specific development because "specific location, timing and type of future projects proposed to be developed are unknown," detailed analysis would be speculative and beyond the scope of this PEIR. (PEIR at page 4.3-32, page 4.3-46, page 4.4-20, page 4.7-19).
- Although the PEIR acknowledges a potential increase in cancer, acute or chronic risk from exposure to toxic air contaminants based on the nature and extent of future projects under the WSGVP, it states: "Since the exact nature, location and operation of future developments are unknown"...quantification of health risks from toxic air contaminants "would be speculative." (PEIR at page 4.3-53, page 4.3-34).
- Although the PEIR stated that the quantification of the health risks from toxic air contaminants is considered speculative, it also stated that the health risk is considered significant and unavoidable. (PEIR at page 4.3-53 and page 4.3-50)

The PEIR considered only the health impact on "sensitive receptors." (PEIR at page 4.3-53)

The draft PEIR states that "construction of future projects developed under the Plan (WSGVP) would be consistent with AQMD." (PEIR at page 4.3-43).

Only one page later, the draft PEIR states "all future projects would be required to demonstrate compliance with air quality on a project-by-project basis." (PEIR at page 4.3-45).

"Impacts related to criteria pollutants associated with future projects developed under the Plan (WSGVP) are considered significant and unavoidable. (PEIR at page 4.3-47).

Fortunately, a table explains that mobile emissions, only, under the Plan (WSGVP) would exceed threshold for *all* criteria pollutants by 2045, as opposed to "No Project" by 2045. (PEIR at page 4.3-48).

The WSGVP Does Not Achieve Many of its Ostensible Goals.

• One stated goal of the WSGVP is to reduce VMT's or vehicle miles traveled. (PEIR at page 4.3-29). The PEIR does not achieve its goal. The total VMT's are increased by implementation of the WSGVP. (PEIR at page 4.6-21; page 4.8-48 to 4.8-49)

By increasing the population of residents or denominator, the WSGVP plays a numbers game by arguing that the VMT per service population is lower. (PEIR at page 4.6-21) This is disingenuous.

- Although another stated goal of the WSGVP is to reduce greenhouse gases, the planned construction increases ozone, a greenhouse gas.
- Construction of future projects under the WSGVP would have the potential to further increase GHG emissions through the use of heavy duty equipment such as excavators, cranes, forklifts and haul trucks. (PEIR at page 4.8-39)

The WSGVP increases the mobile source of GHG as opposed to the "No Project" alternative. (PEIR at page 4.8-48)

- Fuel consumption, a primary source of greenhouse gas, is greater under the WSGVP than the "No Project" alternative. (PEIR at page 4.6-20)
- The "Cap and Trade" program sets an overall limit on greenhouse gas emissions for covered entities. It does not guarantee reductions in any discrete location or by any source. Reductions are only guaranteed on a state-wide basis. This program allows covered facilities to trade permits to emit GHG. (PEIR at pages 4.8-23 to 4.8-24).
 - o This is an easy escape for prolific polluters who use diesel-powered bulldozers, loaders, backhoes and forklifts. (PEIR at page 4.8-25)

The WSGVP believes that Alternative # 3, Housing Element, Regional Housing Needs, Is the Superior Plan. (PEIR at page 5-44).

The WSGVP wants to cram an additional 25,954 residents into WSGV.

The Regional Housing Needs Allocation Plan wants to add only 17,875 new residents into WSGV. (PEIR at page 5-31)

The WSGVP wants to crowd an additional 16,243 new housing units into WSGV.

The Regional Housing Needs Allocation Plan wants to add only 7,875 new housing units into WSGV. (PEIR at page 5-31)

 The Regional Housing Needs Allocation Plan could satisfy its vision for WGSV by building new units in the other unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County.

The WSGVP's concerns for wildfire hazard and wildlife can be mitigated by imposing a moratorium on new building in and near the San Gabriel Mountains, a newly designated federal national monument.

Due to pandemic-related remote work, there are many vacant and unused commercial buildings in downtown Los Angeles and Pasadena.

Increase the number of emissions-free vehicle charging stations in these areas. New zero-emission car sales grew from less than 8% in 2020 to more than 25% in the third quarter of 2023. (PEIR at page 4.6-3)

Increase parking and charging stations near Metro stations.

Make Metro safe again with enhanced police and safety presence.

To further reduce greenhouse gas, mandate electric leaf-blowers throughout the County and give gardeners a tax incentive for buying them.

Another step would be providing education on the benefits of green waste recycling.

- Under the alternatives presented in the WSGVP summary (PEIR at page 5-45), the WSGVP concedes that its own Plan's impacts to aesthetics, air quality, biological resources, cultural resources, noise and transportation are significant and unavoidable.
 - O Development and construction vibration also pose risks to existing structures in Altadena and risks to residents' health from the increased noise.

The Risks to and Burden on Residents' Health Outweigh Benefits of Earth-disturbing Activities in Altadena

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- Minimize the health risks from VOC's, ozone and particulate matter by minimizing earth-disturbing construction in Altadena.
 - Vision a sustainable world where old buildings are re-purposed into wine bars, restaurants and small retail stores. This has happened naturally on Mariposa and Lake without new construction, whole scale demolition and zoning changes.

• The risks of serious adverse health consequences from construction activities outweigh the benefits of the WSGVP's vision of cohesiveness, pedestrian-friendly and green areas, creation of jobs in one sector (construction/infrastructure) and planning consistency in building design and zoning.

To iterate, the health risks to Altadena residents involve cancer, liver damage, breathing problems, inflammation and damage to airways, aggravation of lung diseases, susceptibility to lung infections, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, permanent lung damage and lung inflammation.

To iterate, the environmental burdens from the WSGVP involve an increase in volatile organic compounds, ozone, exposure from toxic water, soil and air quality, increase in particulate matter(s), an increase in total vehicle miles traveled and an increase in greenhouse gas(es).

To iterate, the social burdens from the WSGVP involve aggravation of racial, age and socio-economic divisions in Altadena.

The risk of wildfire and interference with wild land preservation may be minimized by a moratorium on new development in Altadena. Altadena's 8.5 square miles are near and abut the San Gabriel Mountains, a protected National Monument. Los Angeles County's need for additional housing can be directed to areas that have little to no risks of this nature.

Preliminary Objections to Title 22

- The objections to amendment of Title 22 are:
 - There is no zoning protection for the many religious entities or churches in Altadena. (Free Exercise Clause of both federal and California Constitutions);
 - The proposed rezoning to commercial (C-3) or mixed use, with the proposed amendment of Title 22, allows buildings with a height of 50 feet. This may undermine the full enjoyment of scenic views of National Monuments, such as the San Gabriel Mountains;
 - A buffer zone of only 5 feet between a commercial zone and a residence is not enough for harmonious relations;
 - Altadena has chosen its own Community Standards District and should reject the PASD;
 - Yards, exteriors, fences, walls and driveways are regulated under the proposed PASD regulations; These regulations can easily be used to strong-arm or displace current non-compliant residents whose properties stand in the way of developers.

- Under the proposed PASD, there are restrictions on renovations, remodeling, the number of windows, parking, floor area and even restoration after damage. This is a possible deprivation of property rights without due process.
- O Although the proposed Title 22 references the Lake Avenue, Mixed Use Center at the end of this Chapter, it is missing. (Pages 136-137). In any event, the proposed amendment previously suggested that a building in this area may be 35-45 feet high. Again, this proposed height restricts enjoyment of the scenic San Gabriel Mountains.

I reserve the right to further comment on the proposed amendments to Title 2 and Title 22 in the "Tune-Up 003 Ordinance" by September 5, 2024. Of particular concern, based on headings, are Numbers 9, 10, 12 and 13 in the e-mail dated July 31, 2024.



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


Figure 9: Map of census tracts at high risk.





Figure 10: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts.







Figure 9: Map of census tracts at high risk.

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


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


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


Figure 11: Map of census tracts at high risk, adjusted for social class.





Figure 12: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts, adjusted for social class.



Squamous Bladder Carcinoma




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


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



Figure 10: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts.



Papillary Carcinoma of the Thyroid





Figure 11: Map of census tracts at high risk, adjusted for social class.

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Nodular Sclerosis Hodgkin Lymphoma





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Diffuse Mixed B-Cell Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma





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

Figure 11: Map of census tracts at high risk, adjusted for social class.


Figure 12: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts, adjusted for social class.

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

All Malignancies of Young Adults





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Figure 12: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts, adjusted for social class.



Overall Summary

By describing the patterns of occurrence of malignancies in Los Angeles County, we have demonstrated that "cancer" is not a single disease, but a collection of many different diseases, each occurring because a different type of cell has grown out of control. We have tried to acquaint readers with the factors, notably chance and bias, which make it difficult to verify a local increase in incidence. We have explained that dramatic nonrandom patterns of occurrence sometimes are produced by exposures that are very personal and have nothing to do with pollution. Malignancies with different patterns of occurrence can be safely assumed to have different causes, whether or not the latter are all known.

A total of 72 different malignancies plus 12 combinations have been examined in the various ways permitted by available information. Excluding geographical considerations, every malignancy in some way or other gives evidence of occurring in a systematic, that is a nonrandom, pattern, although in the case of a few very rare malignancies the number of cases is too small to be completely certain. In general, the degree of variability in risk goes far beyond age differences. In most cases, there are differences between persons according to sex, race/ethnicity, or social class, all indicating

some form of personal or environmental factor.

In many cases there are characteristic trends over time, and about half the individual malignancies also provide evidence of some degree of systematic, i.e., nonrandom, geographic variation, thus indicating that factors other than chance determine the pattern of community incidence. Among the factors known to be responsible are personal experiences, such as occupational exposures, habits, recreational preferences, past reproductive and medical events, and genetic inheritance.

In at least six instances in this book the geographic distribution of high risk of disease was clearly nonrandom, but did not conform to the pattern that would have been predicted by available knowledge. The malignancies in question include oropharyngeal carcinoma, small cell carcinoma and adenocarcinoma of the lung, papillary carcinoma of the thyroid, squamous carcinoma of the bladder, and diffuse mixed B-cell non-Hodgkin lymphoma. The true explanation for none of these patterns is currently known, although educated guesses provide tentative hypotheses that are currently under evaluation. As of this writing, no evidence of a malignancy caused by a strictly environmental carcinogen has yet been confirmed.

Rule Summary

The chemical contaminants were promulgated in phases collectively called the Phase II/V Rules or the Chemical Contaminant Rules. These rules regulate over 65 contaminants in three contaminant groups:

In 2001, EPA adopted a lower standard for arsenic in drinking water that applies to both community water systems and non-transient non-community water systems. Rule History

Background Information on the Chemical Contaminant Rules

The chemical contaminants were promulgated in phases collectively called the Phase II/V Rules or the Chemical Contaminant Rules. These rules regulate over 65 contaminants in three contaminant groups:

• Inorganic Contaminants (IOCs) (including arsenic and nitrate),

- Volatile Organic Contaminants (VOCs), and
- · Synthetic Organic Contaminants (SOCs).

The rules apply to all public water systems (PWS). PWS type, size, and water source type determine which contaminants require monitoring for that system.

Over a five year period, EPA gathered and analyzed occurrence and health effects data. Through the Phase II/V Rules, EPA established:

- Maximum Contaminant Level Goals (MCLGs),
- Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs),
- · Monitoring requirements, and
- Best available technologies for removal for 65 chemical contaminants.

The Chemical Contaminants Rules provide public health protection through the reduction of chronic, or long-term, risks from:

- Cancer,
- · Organ damage,
- · Circulatory system disorders,
- · Nervous system disorders, and
- Reproductive system disorders.

There is an acute health risk from nitrate and nitrite. The regulations reduce the risk of Methemoglobinemia or "blue baby syndrome." Blue Baby Syndrome is caused from ingestion of high levels of nitrate or nitrite.

Regulated Chemical Contaminants

EPA set a Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) for each contaminant. The MCLG is the maximum level of a contaminant in drinking water at which no known or anticipated adverse effect on the health of persons would occur, and which allows an adequate margin of safety. MCLGs are not enforceable.

The MCLG is not a legal limit set for PWSs. It is based solely on human health. For known cancer-causing contaminants the MCLG is set at zero. This is because any chemical exposure could present a cancer risk.

The Chemical Contaminants Rules also set Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for each contaminant. EPA sets MCLs as close to the health goal as possible. The MCL weighs the technical and financial barriers with public health protection.

Background Information on Arsenic

Arsenic is one of the inorganic contaminants regulated under the Phase II/V Rules. In 2001, under the Arsenic Rule, EPA adopted a lower standard for arsenic in drinking water. The lower standard of 10 parts per billion (ppb) replaced the prior standard of 50 ppb.

Arsenic is a semi-metal element in the periodic table. It is odorless and tasteless. It can enter drinking water supplies from natural deposits in the earth or from agricultural and industrial practices.

Non-cancer effects of arsenic can include:

- Thickening and discoloration of the skin,
- · Stomach pain,
- Nausea,
- · Vomiting,
- Diarrhea,
- Numbness in hands and feet,
- · Partial paralysis, and
- Blindness.

Arsenic has been linked to a number of cancers. These include cancer of the bladder, lungs, skin, kidney, nasal passages, liver, and prostate.

EPA set the arsenic standard for drinking water at 10 ppb (or 0.010 parts per million). This protects consumers from the effects of long-term, chronic exposure to arsenic. PWSs had to comply with the lower standard by January 23, 2006.

 $^{^{2}}$ The MCL for nickel was remanded in 1995 but PWSs are still required to monitor.

Background Information on Nitrate and Nitrite

Nitrate and Nitrite are the only acute inorganic contaminants regulated under the Phase II/V Rules. The greatest use of nitrates is as a fertilizer.

Nitrates and nitrites are nitrogen-oxygen chemical units which combines with various organic and inorganic compounds. Once taken into the body, nitrates are converted into nitrites. High levels of nitrate and nitrite are most serious for infants.

The conversion of nitrate to nitrite by the body, can interfere with the oxygen-carrying capacity of the child's blood, sometimes called Blue Baby Syndrome. This acute condition can occur rapidly over a period of days. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blueness of the skin.

The standard for Nitrate is 10 mg/L or ppm and for Nitrite it is 1 mg/L or ppm.





BACKGROUND

Site Description and History

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) is located in Pasadena, California, northeast of Interstate 210. JPL consists of approximately 155 buildings on a 176-acre campus situated on a foothill ridge of the San Gabriel Mountains (see Figure 1). The facility is located within the boundaries of the cities of Pasadena and La Cañada-Flintridge; residential areas of these cities and the community of Altadena are within 1 to 3 miles of JPL. JPL is bordered to the north by the Angeles National Forest; to the east by the Arroyo Secco (an intermittent stream bed) and spreading grounds (a series of man-made basins used to percolate runoff water to replenish the aquifer); to the west by a residential neighborhood; and to the south by an equestrian club, a fire station, a U.S. Forest Service Ranger Station, and the Hahamonga Community Watershed Park (formerly known at Oak Grove Park). Also located south of the facility are several schools and the Devil's Gate Reservoir.

In 1936, a group of researchers began experimenting with rocket fuels in Pasadena's Arroyo Secco area. The group was soon enlisted to conduct research for the U.S. military, and in 1945 the group was designated the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Army. In 1958, the facility was transferred to NASA and assigned a mission of research and development in aeronautics, space technology, and space transportation (JPL, 1991b).

The California Institute of Technology is currently under contract with NASA to perform research and development at JPL, as well as to manage the facilities. NASA maintains a presence at the facility in a supervisory role only. Primary activities at JPL currently include automated exploration of the solar system and deep space (including the Mars Pathfinder mission) and design and operation of the Deep Space Network that tracks spacecraft.

In performing these tasks, support facilities and research and development laboratories at JPL have used a variety of chemicals, including chlorinated solvents, solid rocket fuel propellants, cooling tower chemicals, sulfuric acid, Freon, mercury, and various laboratory chemicals. From 1945 to 1960, JPL disposed of liquid and solid wastes, including chemical wastes, in over 40 seepage pits and waste pits on the facility grounds (JPL, 1991a). It is believed that the seepage pits were backfilled between 1960 and 1963, when JPL installed a sewer system (Ebasco, 1990a, 1993). Since there is very little undeveloped land on the facility grounds, these disposal areas are now located under buildings, retaining walls, parking lots, roads, and flower planters. JPL now transports all of its hazardous wastes off site for destruction, disposal, or recycling.

Remedial and Regulatory History

In 1980, the city of Pasadena detected volatile organic compounds (VOCs)—carbon tetrachloride (CTC) and trichloroethylene (TCE)—in municipal wells located in and east of the Arroyo Secco spreading grounds southeast of JPL. VOCs were also detected at around the same time in two drinking water wells operated by the Lincoln Avenue Water Company, which primarily supplies the community of Altadena. Although the detected VOC concentrations initially did not exceed California drinking water standards (5 parts per billion [ppb] for CTC and TCE) the contaminant levels gradually rose so that the contamination in these wells was eventually above state standards (JPL, 1997a, 1994). These elevated contaminant concentrations forced the temporary closure of two Pasadena municipal wells in 1985, followed by the temporary closure of the two Lincoln Avenue wells in 1987, and finally the remaining two Pasadena wells in 1989 (JPL, 1994).

Because JPL is the major industrial establishment near these wells, it was suspected to be the source of the groundwater contamination. JPL and the city of Pasadena conducted preliminary assessment (PA) activities in 1982, 1984, 1986, and 1987 to identify the source(s) of contamination (JPL, 1991a).

In 1990, NASA funded the construction of a water treatment plant for the four contaminated Pasadena municipal wells. This allowed the city of Pasadena to resume production of drinking water from these wells. Also in 1990, JPL removed a suspected contaminant source area consisting of a storm drain and 160 cubic yards of soil and sludge (JPL, 1994). The Lincoln Avenue Water Company built a water treatment system in 1992, which allowed them to reopen the two closed drinking water wells.

In 1992, following an expanded site inspection (ESI) that identified CTC, TCE, and 1,1-dichloroethane (DCA), and to a lesser extent tetrachloroethylene (PCE), above drinking water standards in on-site groundwater (Ebasco, 1990a), JPL was placed on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) National Priorities List (NPL). Later that year (December 1992), EPA, the state of California, and JPL negotiated a Federal Facilities Agreement specifying how investigation and cleanup work at the site would be conducted.

During the site investigation process, JPL was divided into three operable units (OUs) to facilitate characterization of the sources, nature, and extent of contamination at and around the installation and to enable the proper design of cleanup measures. At each OU, JPL is conducting both a remedial investigation (RI) to identify and characterize the contamination and a feasibility study (FS) to determine the best methods of remediation. For OUs 1 and 3, JPL anticipates completing

Basin, an aquifer covering approximately 40 square miles which is replenished by water flows from the San Gabriel Mountains, including the Arroyo. The Raymond Basin is an important source of drinking water for many communities in the area including Alhambra, Altadena, Arcadia, La Cañada-Flintridge, Pasadena, San Marino, and Sierra Madre. Sixteen water purveyors, who are each allowed to pump a certain amount of water per year, supply groundwater from the Raymond Basin to the public. In 1944 the Superior Court of California approved the Raymond Basin Judgement, which adjudicated the rights to groundwater production to preserve the safe yield of the groundwater basin (Raymond Basin, 1998b). Under authority of a 1984 court order, the Raymond Basin Management Board, made up of representatives of the water purveyors, oversees the management and protection of the Raymond Basin (Raymond Basin, 1997a, 1997b). A total of six Raymond Basin water purveyors operate wells within 4 miles of JPL. The closest—within 2,500 feet of JPL—are four drinking water wells, directly east of the Arroyo Secco, that are operated by the city of Pasadena. Other nearby municipal wells are located in Altadena, La Cañada-Flintridge, and Pasadena (locations of nearby drinking water wells and monitoring wells are shown in Figure 3).

The climate in Pasadena is semiarid and is characterized by hot, dry summers and mild winters with intermittent rain. The average annual precipitation in the area is 22.5 inches. The local aquifer is recharged by both natural infiltration of precipitation and artificial recharge from spreading grounds located on the eastern edge of the Arroyo Secco. The spreading basins and the Arroyo Secco are used for flood control during rainy months (December to March), when the intermittent stream running through the arroyo reaches its highest levels. The arroyo drains into the Devil's Gate Reservoir located 1 mile south of JPL. The reservoir is formed by the Devil's Gate Dam, which is situated at the southern edge of the reservoir by Interstate 210. The level of the reservoir fluctuates during the year, with little or no standing water present during dry seasons. During major floods, water has risen over portions of Hahamonga Community Watershed Park to the west and the spreading basins to the east. The Devil's Gate Dam and Reservoir has undergone renovations that should result in a several-acre-large permanent pond. The level of this pond will be raised and lowered throughout the year to maintain proper flow downstream of the dam. There are no other lakes, ponds, or wetlands in the vicinity of JPL.

ATSDR Involvement

ATSDR conducted initial site visits at JPL on August 12 and August 20, 1997, to meet with JPL environmental personnel and state public health and environmental officials and to gather information pertinent to the preparation of a public health assessment (PHA) for this site. On December 2 and 3, 1997, ATSDR conducted another site visit to collect further information for

Arroyo Secco, although the direction can change, and even reverse for short periods of time, depending on seasonal variations, pumping rates of the various supply wells in the area, and the quantity of infiltration of surface runoff water in the Arroyo Secco basins (Ebasco, 1993). Groundwater elevations at JPL are generally lower between July and December and higher between January and June.

Thrust faults in the vicinity of JPL include the Mount Lukens Thrust Fault, the south branch of the San Gabriel Thrust Fault, and the JPL Thrust Fault. These faults comprise part of the Sierra Madre Fault system that separates the San Gabriel Mountains from the Raymond Basin. The JPL Thrust Fault runs along the hillside at the uphill edge of the JPL campus, and creates an uplifted, or perched, aquifer that is separate from the larger regional aquifer (Ebasco, 1993).

Groundwater Quality and Sources of Contamination

Through the RI and previous investigations, JPL has installed a total of 19 monitoring wells on site and in the adjacent Arroyo Secco to characterize contaminant concentrations in groundwater beneath source areas of the site, and to track contaminant movement (see Figure 3). There are a number of suspected contaminant source areas at JPL. Some of the source areas include seepage pits, waste pits, stormwater discharge points, and spill areas where hazardous waste may have been released indirectly to groundwater through the soil.

Many of these monitoring wells have screens at several different depths in the aquifer to provide information about the three-dimensional distribution of contaminants beneath JPL. Since August 1996, JPL has sampled its monitoring wells quarterly and analyzed the samples for VOCs and metals; JPL now analyzes these quarterly samples for perchlorate, as well (Foster Wheeler, 1997a, 1997b).

As part of the RI/FS, JPL has also installed five off-site monitoring wells to the south and east of the facility, in Altadena, Pasadena, and the Hahamonga Community Watershed Park (see Figure 3). These wells will help identify groundwater contamination that may have migrated from JPL and determine the horizontal and vertical extent of contamination. JPL also samples these wells quarterly.

The available data indicate that JPL is a source of VOC and perchlorate contamination in both onsite and off-site groundwater. Of the contaminants detected on site, TCE, CTC, 1,2-DCA, and perchlorate were detected most frequently and at concentrations above California maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) or action levels. The highest concentrations of these chemicals were found in the north-central portion of the site, just downgradient from the Liquid and Solid Propellant Laboratory and the Assembly Handling and Equipment and Shipping Facility.

Much lower concentrations of VOCs and perchlorate have migrated off site. Following the current direction of groundwater flow (southeastward), CTC, TCE, and perchlorate plumes have migrated approximately 2,500 feet downgradient toward the city of Pasadena and Lincoln Avenue Company production wells. (1,2-DCA has not been observed at any off-site well over the course of the RI groundwater monitoring.) While the highest levels of these VOCs were largely found in the upper layer of the aquifer, lower levels (0.5 to 5 ppb) had extended vertically to the deeper aquifer and laterally to the city of Pasadena wells. Concentrations and direction of contaminant flow can fluctuate in response to pumping of wells and seasonal variations in groundwater elevations. Since 1996, however, the shapes of the plumes have stayed relatively stable, suggesting that widespread or higher levels of contaminants are not traveling further downgradient and in the direction of public water supply wells (Foster Wheeler, 1998a).

Groundwater investigations performed by JPL indicate that VOC concentrations beneath JPL vary seasonally and may indicate the presence of an off-site sources in addition to on-site sources (JPL, 1997b). One such potential source of contamination is associated with the use of septic systems in La Cañada-Flintridge, an area without sewers. According to JPL and the Valley Water Company, citizens in these areas have often cleaned their plumbing pipes by pouring solvent down their drains (JPL, 1997a; Raymond Basin, 1997a).

The groundwater investigation conducted by JPL of Operable Units 1 and 3: on-site and off-site groundwater (Foster Wheeler, 1999) developed additional information on the configuration of the contaminated groundwater plumes and the distribution of contaminants within those plumes. Although not conclusive, the evidence gathered strongly suggests that potential additional sources of groundwater contamination lie upgradient to the west, in the direction of the Valley Water Company wells. Because VOCs are used in a wide variety of commercial application, many potential sources exist upgradient for those compounds. The injection of imported Colorado River water for aquifer recharge by Valley Water Company may be the source of additional perchlorate contamination detected in local municipal wells. The source of the perchlorate contamination (recently detected at levels as high as 16 ppb) in the water of the Colorado River may be traced to two sites near Henderson, Nevada associated with the manufacture of ammonium perchlorate.

Route of Exposure

The way in which a person may contact a chemical substance. For example, drinking (ingestion) and bathing (skin contact) are two different routes of exposure to contaminants that may be found in water.

Significant Health Risk

Circumstances where people are being or could be exposed to hazardous substances at levels that pose an urgent public health hazard or a public health hazard; public health advisories are generally issued when urgent public health hazards have been identified.

Superfund

Another name for the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 (CERCLA), which created ATSDR.

Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act (SARA)

The 1986 legislation that broadened ATSDR's responsibilities in the areas of public health assessments, establishment and maintenance of toxicologic databases, information dissemination, and medical education.


Toxicological Profile

A document about a specific substance in which ATSDR scientists interpret all known information on the substance and specify the levels at which people may be harmed if exposed. The *toxicological profile* also identifies significant gaps in knowledge on the substance, and serves to initiate further research, where needed.

Volatile organic compounds (VOCs)

Substances containing carbon and different proportions of other elements such as hydrogen, oxygen, fluorine, chlorine, bromine, sulfur, or nitrogen; these substances easily become vapors or gases. A significant number of the VOCs are commonly used as solvents (paint thinners, lacquer thinner, degreasers, and dry cleaning fluids).

I appreciate the time and energy DRP staff have taken to listen to the concerns of Altadena residents. While I recognize that change is difficult and some residents don't want to see any development in Altadena, this does not reflect the reality of living in a county of 10 million people.

There have also been concerns expressed about the environmental impact of building more housing. I would like to see LA County mandate and enforce green building codes and standards in line with CalGreen, and encourage green building certifications such as LEED, to mitigate the GHG emissions of buildings, both in their construction and operations.

That being said, the WSGVAP is our best chance to address the housing crisis, the impacts of climate change, and growing our community economically over the next 10-

20 years. The plan is also in line with other LA County efforts such as the Climate Action Plan and Sustainability Plan.

Overall, I'm pleased that the WSGVAP prioritizes development around transit corridors and away from the wildland-urban interface. We need to preserve and protect our open spaces for all to enjoy - access to nature is one of the main reasons for living in Altadena. Our foothills and the ecosystems they support are a precious resource. I left the meeting confused because several of the individuals attending seemed to believe the plan would rob them of their property, despite being told the plan has no provisions for the government exercising eminent domain and reassuring attendees that the plan is intended to limit not increase development in the high fire hazard zones at the topmost part of Altadena.

Reviewing the plan after hearing claims made at the meeting, I now know that those objecting to the plan are basing their objections on information and assumptions that are not true (alternate facts, if you will).

I fully support the plan's stated goals. I support LA County's West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan. There are many good reasons to support it. First and foremost, it makes sense AND it was developed with our community's reasoned input. It is clear that those in charge of developing the plan wanted to hear from the community and took the time and effort to listen and incorporate the community's thoughts into their plan. It is a wonderful example of government working for and WITH the community. Thank you to all involved.

To me, the most critical thing is to limit development and decrease intensity of activity within high hazard fire zones. The increase in wildfire danger, especially in the wildland-urban interface areas such as the Altadena foothills, is becoming apparent to all. Especially those of us who live in single road access areas in the high fire zones, it is critical that we are knowledgeable and prepared for the real possibility of fire within 1/4" of our home, such as it was in the 2009 Station Fire. Adding more usage of space in these areas, beyond what it is currently, just adds to that hazard. The WSGVAP clearly addresses this concern, and I applaud it.

While there is a well-known housing shortage, developing in high hazard fire zone areas only increases the likelihood that those homes would be lost and more personal tragedy occur with those losses. There are more urban lots with access to transportation corridors that could satisfy the need for more homes.

Last but not least is the protection of wildlife and wildlife corridors in the LA area. Access to wild, undeveloped spaces is important for human health as well as the health of the lands and the plants and animals that live or pass through them. I'm gratified to see that the state of California officially recognizes the freedom and necessity for animals to roam and have connected territories (AB 1889). The WGSVAP can directly support this by allowing the open spaces that animals need, and initiating conservation and open space volunteer programs to protect them.

The WSGVAP will direct growth away from hazard areas, protect natural and biological resources, and prevent habitat disturbance and fragmentation. The Plan recognizes environmental and societal changes over the past decades and proposes a rational and compelling vision for future developments.

As you know, Altadena is an unincorporated town of 43,000 residents situated in and against the San Gabriel Mountain foothills. It is the largest political jurisdiction covered by the WSGVAP, by both geography and population. Altadena residents have been actively involved in the formulation and refinement of the WSGVAP, starting from the initial Department of Regional Planning (DRP) kick-off workshop at the town's Main Library in October 2023. At that workshop, some 30 residents identified hundreds of visions for imagining Altadena in the next 20-40 years. DRP staff did

a splendid job of assimilating these ideas into the WSGVAP and refining the document in a series of subsequent video tag-up meetings with an ad hoc Altadena Advisory Group.

The parallel efforts to refine the land-use classifications and zoning categories in the Altadena foothills is also to be applauded. These efforts will bring some needed rationalities to the many discrepancies existing now. Combined with the contents of the WSGVAP, it is hoped they will prevent future developments that increase the intensity of people and/or intensity of activity in hazard zones.

Since the Regional Planning Commission (RPC) unanimously endorsed the WSGVAP on September 25, a small – but loud – contingent of property owners in northern Altadena have come out to oppose the WSGVAP. Unfortunately, their campaign petition and social media posts have been rife with misinformation – and even disinformation. Their arguments have been wide ranging and disjointed. A couple of their false arguments were addressed by me in an October 22 Op-Ed posted by LocalNewsPasadena.com, "Countering Misinformation About the LA County Rezoning Plan." Addressing the rest would take a series of Op-Eds.

The opponents seem to be coalescing around arguments against <u>any</u> increase in density within Altadena. Such arguments reveal ignorance of the legislative and executive State actions mandating the construction of more housing, and the pressure from the Attorney General's office on local municipalities to remove obstacles to doing so. They fail to recognize that many of the proposed changes in zoning and land use classifications are administrative (corrective) in nature and would have been proposed independent of the WSGVAP. These changes create consistency with several *existing and previously enacted* land use constraints that limit potential development in hazard zones and in hillside and significant ecological areas.

Moreover, there is a scent of hypocrisy permeating their actions, given that some of the same landowners have discussed sub-dividing their properties in applications to the County, on websites, or in public hearings at the RPC. They argue against increasing densities in Altadena -- while taking steps to increase densities on their own properties in a very high fire hazard zone.

In summary, the WSGVAP is a comprehensive, forward-looking plan that balances smart growth with the need to limit the risks of continued expansion into hazard and protected areas. It will discourage new developments in fire hazard zones, while allowing – but not mandating -- new developments in urban areas near main transit corridors. I Look forward to seeing the Board of Supervisors adopt the "greatest good" and to endorse the WSGVAP.

I support the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP). I have lived in Altadena for over 22 years in my home directly adjacent to the Angeles National Forest and San Gabriel Mountains National Monument. I am an advocate for protecting our foothills and mountains, and for preserving and enhancing Altadena's unique town character. The WSGVAP does both. The WSGVAP promotes protection of undeveloped wildlands, and promotes preserving Altadena's character while mindfully directing moderate future growth in appropriate urban areas.

Prevention of human-created disturbances in the natural environment, including prevention of wildfires and ecological degradation, is essential to our harmonious and safe co-existence with nature. The WSGVAP's goals and policies and companion zone updates restrict future development and land use intensities in Altadena's foothills and mountains. The WSGVAP proposed zone updates incorporate multiple existing land use and regulatory constraints, which have been codified elsewhere over the last many years, that restrict future development within protected areas and hazard zones. The proposed zone updates reflect such existing constraints on parcels (1) in the Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone, Hillside Management Areas (where development is limited according to the steepness of slopes), Significant Ecological Areas (which contain designated sensitive habitats and species), and the Angeles National Forest; (2) that contain Significant Ridgelines (pursuant to the Altadena Communities Standard Distrift), seismic hazards and landslide zones, restricted road access and limited infrastructure, and streams and creeks; and (3) that

adjoin the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument.

At the same time, the WSGVAP's goals and policies promote moderate development in Altadena's more urban areas near main transit corridors to provide opportunities for future housing, commercial, and mixed-use development. The WSGVAP supports vibrant, walkable mixed-use commercial districts with public realm improvements, local services, and amenities for local residents, with particular attention to the needs of West Altadena residents. By focusing moderate growth along primary roads with access to services, amenities, existing infrastructure and transit and ensuring such development fits the community character, Altadena has an opportunity to enhance, through mindful design and development, its unique town character.

The WSGVAP will limit expansion of the wildland/urban interface, protect natural and biological resources, and provide multi-benefit open spaces for the public's health and enjoyment. The WSGVAP sensibly directs growth away from hazard areas and protected zones by providing means for concentrating development in the denser urban areas near transit corridors and commercial hubs. Such smart growth strategies have the potential for enhancing a 'sense of place' in our town centers and a 'sense of peace' in our low-density neighborhoods and undeveloped wildland foothills and mountains. The WSGVAP is an essential mechanism for promoting responsible growth, ensuring the public's health and safety, and preserving our natural environment.

Attached is an op-ed I co-authored with Michael Bicay of AltadenaWILD responding to recent social media posts prompted by an Altadena resident's petition in opposition to the WSGVAP. In addition to the petition stirring up confusion regarding zone densities for Altadena under the WSGVAP, some on social media expressed dissatisfaction with DRP's outreach (see op-ed). My experience with DRP's outreach was more than satisfactory. The WSGVAP Planners have been exemplary in working with the community from start to finish. I received all public notices regarding the WSGVAP preparation, and I became engaged in the process at the beginning. I attended the live and virtual presentations and meetings. 

Countering Misinformation about the LA County Rezoning Plan

Citizen viewpoints should at least be factual.

The L.A. County Regional Planning Commission (RPC) recently endorsed — unanimously — the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP), which will go to the Board of Supervisors for final approval in December. Since the RPC action, a handful of Altadena residents have circulated an online petition opposing the WSGVAP. Unfortunately, the language in their petition and social media posts disseminates misinformation. While we should respect any citizen's views, we should also demand that their claims be factual.

One claim is that the County's Department of Regional Planning (DRP) failed to conduct adequate community outreach to prepare the WSGVAP. This claim is false.

Starting with a visioning workshop at the Altadena library in October 2023, DRP staff synthesized hundreds of recommendations from Altadenans to envision, over the next few decades, a more sustainable town. The DRP outreach included in-person and virtual meetings, a project Web site, community surveys, an email list, fact sheets, flyers, postcards, notices, mailers, and social media posts – widely distributed in multiple languages. These community engagement efforts were recently

cited by one Commissioner as "the most comprehensive and extensive outreach ever presented" to the RPC. To see for yourself, read the <u>Land Use and Conservation/Open Space</u> chapters of the WSGVAP.

Another social media claim is that the WSGVAP and associated zoning changes will make it "MORE likely that there will be development in wildlife corridors and the fire [hazard] zone." This claim is false.

The WSGVAP updates zone designations for some properties in northern Altadena and its foothills to create consistency with several existing, previously enacted land use constraints that limit potential development in hazard zones and in the hillside and significant ecological areas. The WSGVAP land use policies direct growth away from established protected and hazard areas, preserve natural and biological resources and prevent habitat disturbance and fragmentation. The plan allows new development in urban areas near main transit corridors. To argue against any growth in Altadena is unreasonable at a time when the State is pressuring local municipalities to reduce obstacles to building more housing.

The WSGVAP recognizes environmental and societal changes over the past decades and presents a rational, compelling vision for future development in Altadena. It is a comprehensive, forward-looking plan that

balances smart growth with the undeniable need to limit the risks of continued expansion into hazard and protected areas. The WSGVAP embodies common sense. Will the WSGVAP make everyone happy? No. Does it create conditions for the "greatest good" to prevail in our community? Yes.

Dear Commissioners,

We wish to express our general support for the subject Plan and associated Draft Program Environmental Impact Report (dPEIR) to be reviewed by your Commission 9/25.

Altadena, where we have lived since 1994, and immediately adjacent to NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory where one of us worked for 43+ years starting in 1977 (and the other of us for 15 years), has a character that is important to residents' quality of life, health, and health of the natural environment on which we all depend. Altadena is of course the largest element covered by this plan.

Specifically, we are pleased to see focus in the plan on the following topics:

- Placing high value on the preservation of unbuilt areas, their natural environment, and the biodiversity they host. The Altadena Significant Ecological Area (SEA), as well as the San Gabriel Canyon and Puente Hills SEAs, plus surrounding parcels with a high fraction of natural environment, are crown jewels of the San Gabriel Valley. In the face of climate change, these areas are especially important for their considerable uptake of carbon dioxide, and for the watershed they protect that supplies a significant fraction of water that we all use.
- Frequent mention of trails for natural area access, hikers, equestrians and mountain bicyclists, among other users.
- Recognition of "dark sky" as an important natural resource.
- Focusing attention on Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones and the danger they pose in light of climate change, which is causing California's more frequent, more intense, and larger wildland fires.

Though we have not read every page of the Plan, we were disappointed to not see in the plan the following:

- Specifics to prioritize completing the Altadena Crest Trail (ACT) end-to-end. There are viable routes and supportive landowners, along with historical public access which some newer landowners have actively opposed, that could be leveraged into re-connection of this ~13 mile link through natural beauty and scenic value from the Arroyo Seco to Eaton Canyon. Residents who walked and rode the ACT's entire length are passing away, while the community becomes less aware of the value of this resource. Efforts underway to reconnect portions need to be augmented to create full through-connection off public streets.
- A policy to explore, and if feasible, monetize urban forest canopy to encourage its growth and maintenance on County- and privately-owned parcels. The West San Gabriel Valley would be an ideal region to set up a pilot program for this purpose, with potential carbon sequestration market income back to the County and private property owners (e.g., via small property tax credits). An initial estimate based on comparison with private projects over forested areas indicates a possible benefit of ~\$3 M - \$8M per year, or \$60 - \$160 M over the 20-year life of the plan, not counting likely increase in carbon sequestration market prices as the effects of climate change increase in severity. With the exception of protected oaks, the County and private property owners are free to cut down, damage, and severely trim their trees that do so much to keep our urban heat island from being more severe than it already is. While I am not entirely opposed to more restrictive measures, I think it is time to test and perhaps embrace financial measures of encouragement and reward for contributing to a healthy urban forest canopy. Home values are typically higher in such communities (e.g., La Canada Flintridge), while trees are typically reduced or eliminated in lower-income communities, resulting in greater suffering from heat effects by the population with the least health and financial resilience. This in turn increases County and County resident emergency services and medical costs.
- Elements to enable specific prohibition of increasing the occupancy (persons/acre) on all parcels within all Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones, and provisions to severely limit any increases in occupancy on parcels within High Fire Hazard Severity Zones.
- Lack of specifics about eliminating the expansion of light pollution that reduces dark sky that interferes with wildlife, creates unpleasant glare, and reduces driving safety. Today, pretty much any homeowner and business can put up higher-output lighting with little regard for its impact on neighbors or the environment. Driving around, I see more of this every month; limits and incentives are much in order. SCE put up numerous high-color-temperature street lights after a long dispute about about using lower color temperatures. Also, a fraction of their fixtures lack modest-cost features to reduce their glare as perceived by drivers and residents.
- Lack of a policy to specifically limit vehicular access to natural areas within Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones during periods of high fire danger (e.g., forecasted heat waves like we just experienced, and high wind events).

• More specific measures to promote preservation of the equestrian elements that make Altadena one of the few places within Los Angeles County where one does not need to be wealthy to own and ride a horse.

Arroyos & Foothills Conservancy (AFC) strongly supports the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP) for the critical protections it will provide for our region's wildlife and open spaces. As a land conservancy preserving natural habitat in and around the San Gabriel and Crescenta Valleys, we helped shape the Conservation and Open Space Element of the Plan. We encourage the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to approve the Plan when it comes to a final vote on December 10th, 2024.

We are being confronted with species extinction, biodiversity and habitat loss, more extreme and less predictable weather, and increased wildfires. The need for a forward-thinking vision for our planet is urgent. The WSGVAP effectively addresses the challenges we face locally. We feel that it is critical to adopt this plan for the benefit of all our urban animals, native flora, and natural habitats.

The WSGVAP is a comprehensive planning tool that will shape the long-term growth of unincorporated areas of the West San Gabriel Valley. Those that are within AFC's long term conservation area include Altadena, La Crescenta, Kinneola Mesa, and East Pasadena. During developmental and public review stages, AFC submitted our recommendations for the Conservation and Open Space Element and were very pleased that the Regional Planning Department embraced our comments. It now includes critical measures for wildlife and habitat protection.

The open space areas in our region, like the San Rafael Hills and Verdugo Mountains, function as disconnected islands of habitat, separated by freeways and development. Wildlife become stranded in these islands and are unable to travel to mate with larger populations, to find food and water, and to establish their own territory. The life of P-22, the mountain lion that lived in Griffith Park, most famously illustrated this problem. Isolation of individual wildlife can lead to genetic inbreeding and local species extinction, putting these islands at grave risk of ecological collapse.

Arroyos & Foothills Conservancy's Letter of Support for WSGVAP

The biodiversity crisis is exacerbated by climate change which is a problem for wildlife, and for us. We rely on biodiversity for the production of our food and clean water, and for overall environmental stability. The most effective solution is to create wildlife corridors—patches of natural habitat—that reconnect these islands. We must restore habitat with native plants and enable the movement of all species (think mountain lions, but also coyotes, birds, insects, pollinators, and reptiles). The Open Space and Conservation Element emphasizes the necessity to protect existing areas of habitat and wildlife corridors, and importantly, takes an active approach to increase them.

Specifically, The Element addresses the need for wildlife crossings and corridors that wildlife can safely move through in the Verdugo Mountains, San Rafael Hills, and biologically rich San Gabriel Mountains. It encourages native tree canopy coverage for both open spaces and residential areas. It promotes the creation of habitat stepping-stones of native plants in small spaces like parkways, driveways, and parking lots.

The County has included measures to promote habitat-sensitive designs for new developments. This includes wildlife-permeable fencing, enhancing biodiversity, the limited removal of native plants, and favoring limited inclusion of invasive and non-native plants. It also includes regulations limiting artificial light in natural areas to protect wildlife from the negative impacts of light pollution.

These are the measures we need to be taking to address the biodiversity crisis we are in, both locally and globally. We urge you to vote in approval of the WSGVAP. Let's take action together to protect our wildlife and precious open spaces.

We are writing to express our strong support for the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP), specifically its provisions for conserving biological resources and protecting wildlife corridors.

We are a professional biological and community science response to the sale of the Nuccio's land, initially to Polytechnic School, and now to the next potential buyer. Our goal is to protect and conserve the open space that's left in the Chaney Trail Corridor.

The WSGVAP aligns with critical policies in the Los Angeles County General Plan, including those that protect Significant Ecological Areas (SEAs) such as the Altadena Foothills and Arroyo Seco. These areas are vital for maintaining biodiversity, as they contain diverse plant communities like coastal sage scrub, riparian woodlands, and chaparral. They also provide habitat for a range of wildlife species, many of which depend on intact ecosystems for survival.

A key strength of the WSGVAP is its emphasis on maintaining wildlife corridors, which facilitate species movement between the low-lying basin and the high elevations of the San Gabriel Mountains. These corridors are essential for feeding, migration, and breeding, allowing wildlife populations to remain viable despite the pressures of urban development. Protecting these corridors also prevents habitat fragmentation, ensuring that plants and animals can adapt to environmental changes and maintain genetic diversity.

Additionally, policies in the WSGVAP that discourage development in sensitive habitat areas and create natural buffers around SEAs (e.g., Policy COS-1.2 and Policy COS-5.1) are indispensable for reducing human-wildlife conflict and preserving ecological integrity.

By directing growth away from hazard-prone and biologically sensitive areas, the WSGVAP not only mitigates risks from wildfires and preserves remaining open space, it also ensures that future generations can enjoy the benefits of thriving ecosystems.

I urge the Board to adopt the WSGVAP and continue championing policies that balance community development with the preservation of our precious natural spaces.

Dear Supervisor Barger:

On September 25, 2024, the LA County Regional Planning Commission held a public hearing to review the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (Plan) and its associated Final Environmental Impact Report (EIR). The Plan is scheduled for its first reading at the Board of Supervisors meeting on December 10, 2024.

Beginning in July 2023, the Department of Regional Planning (DRP) initiated community outreach to highlight the need for an update to the Plan. Over several months, DRP conducted extensive outreach through both in-person and virtual meetings to solicit input and clarify the Plan's key elements and proposed changes. Additionally, postcards and letters were sent to addresses within the Plan's boundaries.

The Altadena Town Council (Council) has actively engaged with DRP, inviting representatives to present at our meetings, promoting the CEQA public meetings and five open houses, and addressing specific questions raised by Altadena residents. On November 20, 2024, the Council collaborated with Altadena Coalition of Neighborhood Associations (ACONA) to host a presentation by DRP staff aimed at clarifying misinformation shared on social media, followed by a robust and extensive Q&A session.

The Council has heard from both supporters and opponents of the Plan. The prevailing sentiment in Altadena is one of endorsement. Proponents believe the Plan was thoughtfully developed by DRP in consultation with Altadena residents and other affected unincorporated communities. The Plan, along with its proposed zoning and land use changes, will direct development away from the Altadena foothills and other high fire hazard zones, while protecting natural resources, preventing habitat fragmentation, and preserving wildlife corridors. The Plan acknowledges environmental and societal changes in recent decades and offers a forward-thinking vision for the future. Additionally, Altadena residents are concerned with improving general mobility including safe routes for walking and biking. Many residents who raised these issues want to make sure the zoning is compliant with state requirements to remain eligible for future state infrastructure funding.

We also acknowledge that there has been a small but vocal opposition to the Plan. The WSGVAP Planning Team addressed these concerns by releasing a detailed factsheet, which was posted to the DRP website and circulated in mid-October to clarify these misunderstandings.

The Altadena Town Council, in alignment with the broader community, wishes to formally express our support for the West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan. We believe the Plan aligns with the State's goals for sustainable development and thoughtfully considers the needs of our community. We also appreciate the extensive outreach efforts made by DRP since July 2023, which have been instrumental in fostering transparent and informed dialogue with residents.

It has recently come to my attention that the LA County Planning Commission is proposing to implement the WSGVAP in the coming new year. As a resident of the affected Altadena/Pasadena area I wish to voice my opposition to that plan as currently proposed.

First of all I do not believe that this plan and its rezoning implications have been adequately explained to the surrounding homeowners and businesses. Most of the plans provisions are outlined on a mail postage card containing a link to the Planning Commission's detailed proposal. The details reveal ostensible benefits to the community but shortchange and indeed obscure the considerable effects that the rezoning will cause.

The Plan's benefits include:

- 1. An assurance that wildlife areas and trail accesses in the surrounding foothills will be preserved and protected against rezoning for developmental incursions.
- 2. An assurance that the Plan will lead to an expansion and improvement of pedestrian walkways in business and residences especially in the Lake Avenue corridor of Altadena and Pasadena.

The negative effects of this Plan are:

- 1. Residential and business areas identified and detailed in the plan will be opened for rezoning to permit considerable more density per acre than is currently the case in Altadena and county areas.
- 2. Rezoning changes the character of our area and leads to the construction of 3-6 multistory buildings and apartments which are currently restricted in the county.
- 3. Street parking of vehicles in Altadena in particular will be severely affected by the influx of a

substantial number of individuals and families to the area.

Altadena, where I have resided for over 50 years, is already experiencing some level of street parking problems. Several business on Lake have opened without providing sufficient parking leading to contention with residents on the surrounding streets. And because Pasadena restricts street parking overnight, some residents relocate their vehicles for overnight or longer-term parking. The influx of many new families with multiple vehicles to this area will not only exacerbate this problem but contribute to more traffic congestion.

Altadena has recently experienced development out-of-character with the neighborhood. Witness the structures at 2408 Lincoln Ave (at Figueroa) and the 4-story colossus at 2052 N Lake Avenue (the Pax House Recovery). I understand that there is a CA State mandate in effect to develop more available housing for people who cannot otherwise afford it. Well and noble as that goal is, it should be approached in a reasonable manner and not be used to blithely override the expressed fears and desires of current residents and businesses.

We express our full support for the County's West San Gabriel Valley Area Plan (WSGVAP) and associated zoning and land use changes proposed for Altadena. The WSGVAP will direct growth away from hazard areas, protect natural and biological resources, and prevent habitat disturbance and fragmentation. The Plan recognizes environmental and societal changes over the past decades and proposes a rational and compelling vision for future developments.

As you know, Altadena is an unincorporated town of 43,000 residents situated in and against the San Gabriel Mountain foothills. It is the largest political jurisdiction covered by the WSGVAP, by both geography and population. Altadena residents have been actively involved in the formulation and refinement of the WSGVAP, starting from the initial Department of Regional Planning (DRP) kick-off workshop at the town's Main Library in October 2023. At that workshop, some 30 residents identified hundreds of visions for imagining Altadena in the next 20-40 years. DRP staff did a splendid job of assimilating these ideas into the WSGVAP and refining the document in a series of subsequent video tag-up meetings with an ad hoc Altadena Advisory Group.

The WSGVAP discusses the major issues affecting land use, economic development, conservation, public services and mobility in the unincorporated areas of the West San Gabriel Valley. The Area Plan succinctly identifies numerous opportunities that can be realized through future implementation plans. The WSGVAP balances smart growth with sustainability and the preservation of wildlands. It captures the increasing risks associated with growth and living in the wildlands-urban interface along the foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains. Of relevance to the 2200 Altadena homeowners living in a State-designated Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone, the Area Plan's goals of discouraging new developments in hazard zones and directing them to urbanized areas along mass-transit corridors is laudable.

The parallel efforts to refine the land-use classifications and zoning categories in the Altadena foothills are also to be applauded. These efforts will bring some needed

rationalities to the many discrepancies existing now. Combined with the contents of the WSGVAP, it is hoped they will prevent future developments that increase the intensity of people and/or intensity of activity in hazard zones.

Since the Regional Planning Commission (RPC) unanimously endorsed the WSGVAP on September 25, a small – but loud -- contingent of property owners in northern Altadena have come out to oppose the WSGVAP. Unfortunately, their campaign petition and social media posts have been rife with misinformation – and even disinformation. Their arguments have been wide ranging and disjointed. A couple of their false arguments were addressed in an October 22 Op-Ed posted by LocalNewsPasadena.com, "Countering Misinformation About the LA County Rezoning Plan." Addressing the rest would take a series of Op-Eds.

The opponents seem to be coalescing around arguments against <u>any</u> increase in density within Altadena. Such arguments reveal ignorance of the legislative and executive State actions mandating the construction of more housing, and the pressure from the Attorney General's office on local municipalities to remove obstacles to doing so. They fail to recognize that many of the proposed changes in zoning and land use classifications are administrative (corrective) in nature and would have been proposed independent of the WSGVAP. These changes create consistency with several *existing and previously enacted* land use constraints that limit potential development in hazard zones and in hillside and significant ecological areas.

Moreover, there is a scent of hypocrisy permeating their actions, given that some of the same landowners have discussed sub-dividing their properties in applications to the County, on websites, or in public hearings at the RPC. They argue against increasing densities in Altadena -- while taking steps to increase densities on their own properties in a very high fire hazard zone.

In summary, the WSGVAP is a comprehensive, forward-looking plan that balances smart growth with the need to limit the risks of continued expansion into hazard and protected areas. It will discourage new developments in fire hazard zones, while allowing – but not mandating -- new developments in urban areas near main transit corridors. As a non-profit organization acting as the voice of the Altadena foothills, we fully endorse the WSGVAP.

As some of you are aware, and some are not, the Society of Organic Architects represents the Architects, Landscape Architects, Residential Designers, Interior Decoratos and Artisans who follow the design philosophy most famously associated with Frank Lloyd Wright, but practiced by many before and many after. We have over sixteen hundred members globally and over 200 in California.

We sent the WSGVAP to the 63 Los Angeles County members for comment. Fifty one responded negatively and most with very simular comments. Three responded liteally with "Why Bother, They will do as they please it's all a stage peformance." I was one of those three, but duty compells me to send along the more helpful comments.

One concern expressed by multiple Architects was that this is being done inverse of the normal planning proceedure and the proper way to do things. The case is taht general plans are supposed to be for the entire jurisdiction, Area plans modify the General Plan to meet area specific needs, Community Plans modify area plans to meet the specific needs of communities and neighbor hood plans modify the

Community Plans to meet neighborhood specific needs. Here we have a previously non existant Area plan and non existant area pla planning area that is modifying several Community and Neighborhood Plans and on an accelorated schedule. This is simply bad and improper practice.

Another concer noted by several Architects,
Designers and Contractors was that in West Altadena
in particular development is being planned in areas
where the Sewer System, Electrical gris, and water
systems are already functioning well beyond thier
rated capacity, and are in fact crumbling. Two
Arcitects noted they raised these concerns two
decades ago when Hollywood Boulevard had its zoning
upscaled for high rise apartments in Los Angeles.
These concerns were ignored in Los Angeles and ther
eare almost weekly infrastructure failures there due
directly to the concentration of units. It is
believed this plan will have the same result.

Of major concern also was that these communities do not naturally belong in the same planning group.
"The Monrovia Islands" have nothing in common geographically, culturally or historically with LaCrescenta, or Altadena or even unincorpoated Acadia or unincorporated East Pasadena. This plan is not cafted to meet the needs of these communities but rather the convieniance of planning staff. Again very bad practice.

Finally, twelve of our members expressed that they are known to be practicing in the local area by planning staff and they never recieved any notification of any public meetings about this plan. Quite logically, they believe the community outeach was insufficient and deliberately so.

Re: Objections and Comments to LA County (WSGVP) Draft PEIR, dated June 2024

These comments are written in response to the Draft PEIR, prepared by Environmental Science Associates (ESA) for the West San Gabriel Valley Planning Committee ("WSGVP"). I am a long-term resident of Altadena and I object to any and all plans, projects and/or construction whether proposed in the draft Plan Environmental Impact Report ("PEIR") or not, as well as the proposed amendment of Title 22, for the reasons discussed in this Memorandum.

Volatile Organic Compounds in the Soil, Water and Air Pose Significant Health Risks in the West San Gabriel Valley ("WSGV")

- All of the contemplated activities (excavation, grading, dewatering, removal of soil, creation
 of fugitive dust, removal of construction debris and other ground-disturbing activities) pose
 an unacceptable risk to residents' health and safety from exposure to toxic volatile
 (vaporous) organic compounds in the soil and groundwater of Altadena.
- The consulting firm hired by Los Angeles County (ESA) recognized this issue in a Background Brief, dated December 2023: "Four major superfund sites are found within the WSGV and soil contamination from underground storage tanks is <u>dispersed</u> throughout the area." (Emphasis provided). ESA Task B1 Background Brief at page 68.
- The Jet Propulsion Lab, located at Hahamonga Watershed near Altadena and La Canada Flintridge, is one of these four Superfund sites and has been designated as a National Priorities Sife or one that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) deems to be most in need of clean-up due to risks to the public health and safety. (CERCLIS CA 9800013030, August 5, 1999).
- For fifteen years, from 1945-1960, toxic liquid and solid wastes were disposed into forty seepage pits and waste pits at the current site of JPL. (Supra at page 3).
- As a result, volatile organic compounds (VOC's) were released into the soil and water. (Supra at page 1).
- These VOC's traveled in an underground plume to drinking water wells in Altadena and Pasadena. (Supra at page 4).
- By 1980, two VOC's (carbon tetrachloride and trichloroethylene) were identified in wells by the City of Pasadena. (Supra at page 4).
- Carbon tetrachloride may cause liver problems and increase the risk of cancer. [EPA list of drinking water contaminants and maximum contaminant levels (MCL's)].
- Trichloroethylene may cause liver problems and increase the risk of cancer. [EPA list of drinking water contaminants and maximum contaminant levels (MCL's)].
- The groundwater plume can change direction and even reverse for short periods of time. (CERCLIS CA 9800013030, August 5, 1999, at page 12).
- Around 1980, VOC's were also detected in the wells of Lincoln Water, located in Altadena. (Supra at page 4)
- When the contaminant concentration exceeded drinking water standards in 1985, Pasadena closed two wells. (Supra at page 4)

- When the contaminant concentration exceeded drinking water standards in 1987, Lincoln Avenue (in Altadena) closed two wells. (Supra at page 4)
- When the contaminant concentration continued to exceed drinking water standards in 1989, Pasadena closed another two wells. (Supra at page 4)
- This was wide-spread contamination by the underground plume.
- In 1992, the EPA identified other VOC contaminants at the JPL/Hahamonga site: 1,1-dichloroethane and tetrachloroethylene. (Supra at page 4)
- 1,1 dichloroethane and 1,2 dichloroethane are associated with an increased risk of cancer and 1,1 dichloroethylene is associated with liver problems). [EPA list of drinking water contaminants and maximum contaminant levels (MCL's)].
- Tetrachloroethylene is associated with increased risk of cancer and liver problems. [EPA list of drinking water contaminants and maximum contaminant levels (MCL's)].
- A total of six Raymond Water Basin purveyors operate wells within four miles of the JPL/Hahamonga site. These include Rubio Canyon, Los Flores and Lincoln Avenue Water. The cities of Alhambra, Arcadia, La Canada-Flintridge, San Marino and Sierra Madre also received water from the Raymond Basin. (CERCLIS CA 9800013030, August 5, 1999, at page 8).
- This Raymond Groundwater Basin extends about 41 square miles. (PEIR at page 4.10-5)
- Groundwater extraction accounts for nearly one-third of the water usage in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. (ESA Task B1 Background Brief at page 68, referencing LACounty Planning 2022a).
- VOC's can be easily vaporized or become gaseous. (CERCLIS CA 9800013030, August 5, 1999, at Appendix A-7).
- Routes for exposure can be inhalation, ingestion or by skin contact. (Supra at page A-7).
- Since the VOC's are in the soil and water of Altadena's area, activities that create disruption cause release into the air.
 - o Take, for example, "pre-watering and de-watering" discussed in the PEIR. (At page 4.3-32 to 4.3-33; page 4.7-11; page 4.7-17; and page 4.9-17).
 - VOC-contaminated water can evaporate into the air creating a toxic environment for humans.
- The WSGVP's PEIR recognizes that soils can contain toxic contaminants that are released through particle emissions. (PEIR at page 4.3-53)
- In its background brief, the ESA firm, hired by the County, stated that the cancer rate in Altadena was 6%, or above average. This means that 2,559 of Altadena's current residents (42,658) have had cancer diagnoses.
- In 2004, Dr. Thomas Mack, Norris Cancer Center, analyzed cancer surveillance data from ten million people in Los Angeles County over a twenty-six (26) year period. Elsevier Academic Press published the first edition in 2004, entitled <u>Cancers in the Urban Environment</u>, <u>Patterns of Malignant Disease in Los Angeles County and its Neighborhoods</u>. Dr. Mack identified census tracts at high risk and adjusted for social class. There were at least six instances of nonrandom distribution that did not

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- conform to the pattern that would have been predicted by available knowledge. (Mack at page 645)
- The identified nonrandom cancers included oropharyngeal carcinoma, small cell carcinoma and adenocarcinoma of the lung, papillary carcinoma of the thyroid, squamous carcinoma of the bladder and diffuse mixed B-cell non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. (Mack at page 645):
 - o For oropharyngeal carcinoma, there was a cancer cluster of female patients in Altadena and another cluster of males in Pasadena. (Mack at page 55).
 - o For salivary gland malignancies, there was a cancer cluster of males in Altadena. (Mack at page 62).
 - For carcinoma of the larynx, there were cancer clusters of males in Pasadena and Altadena. (Mack at page 167)
 - o For small cell carcinoma of the lung, there was a cancer cluster of males in Altadena. (Mack at page 197)
 - For adenocarcinoma of the lung and bronchi, there was a cancer cluster of females in La Canada Flintridge. (Mack at page 205)
 - o For osteosarcoma, there was a cancer cluster of females in Altadena. (Mack at page 261-262)
 - o For squamous carcinoma of the bladder, there was a cancer cluster of males near the Glendale and Altadena area. (Mack at page 352).
 - o For brain malignancies (gliomas), there was a cancer cluster of females in Altadena. (Mack at page 379)
 - For papillary carcinoma of the thyroid, there was a large cancer cluster of females in La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 412)
 - o For nodular sclerosis Hodgkin's lymphoma, there was a large cancer cluster of males between Altadena and La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 460)
 - For diffuse mixed B-cell non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, there were two male clusters, one in Pasadena and one in La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 503).
 - For chronic lymphocytic leukemia, there was a large mixed gender cluster near La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at 581)
 - For other leukemias, there were two clusters, one for females in Altadena and another for mixed genders in Pasadena. (Mack at page 609)
 - There was also a large cluster of malignancies in older children extending from Altadena to La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 623)
 - o Finally, there was also a large cluster of young adult females with malignancies in La Canada-Flintridge. (Mack at page 630)
- Future development would increase the number of residents (in Altadena) and would potentially increase the number of people exposed to toxic contaminants. (PEIR at page 4.9-25).
- It is reasonably foreseeable that future projects and/or natural disasters would release hazardous materials into the environment. (PEIR at page 4.9-27).
 - Although the ESA (WSGVP) adopts OSHA as its band aid fix, that is a statute designed to protect workers. OSHA remedial measures do not reduce the adverse impact to Altadena's residents.

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- O Although the PEIR states that the WSGVP was required to consult the EPA National Priorities List and the EPA's CERCLIS site, as well as archived sites, the ESA and the WSGVP "overlooked" the hazards site at JPL/Hahamonga Superfund site. (PEIR at page 4.9-2 to page 4.9-4).
- Although the PEIR acknowledges that VOC's, including tetrachloroethane, may be in the soil and groundwater throughout the Plan area and that soil vapor intrusion may occur, the impact of VOC's on human health and safety is not mentioned. (PEIR at page 4.9-7, page 4.9-12, page 4.9-17)
- Construction or redevelopment on contaminated properties could potentially generate vapors or fugitive dust containing contaminants that pose a health risk. (PEIR at page 4.9-27).
 - As demonstrated in Dr. Mack's book, above, the risk is significant and it is not limited to "sensitive receptors," young children, persons with disabilities and older residents.
- The ESA (WSGVP) asserts that future projected growth would result in 25,954 new residents, 10,874 new jobs and 16,243 new housing units. This would increase the demand for water and pumping from groundwater wells. (PEIR at page 4.10-22).
- It is not clear how many new residents would be added to Altadena's current population of 43,344, as this section was conveniently omitted from the PEIR and Appendices. Altadena is only 8.5 square miles. (PEIR at page 4.11-2)
- It is also not clear how many new housing units would be added to Altadena's current total of 15,334, as this section was omitted from the PEIR and Appendices. The Regional Housing Needs Allocation assigned 4,479 new units to the entire WSGV. (PEIR at page 4.11-8).
- Although the ESA (WSGVP) naively asserts that compliance with applicable environmental laws would protect the public from resulting contaminant exposure, causing serious health risks (PEIR at page 4.9-29), this is an overstatement.
 - Take, for example, the history of the JPL/Hahamonga Superfund site on the National Priorities List. Carcinogenic volatile organic chemicals were allegedly first discovered in 1980. Almost twenty years later, the EPA and JPL published the CERCLIS report and held the required Superfund meeting to inform Altadena residents.
 - Another resounding example of government inaction is the Stringfellow Acid Pits in Jurupa. Toxic waste, including volatile organic compounds, spilled into groundwater in 1972. Toxins had been spilling into the nearby creek between 1969 and 1980. Litigation related to this site lasted three decades and involved the conviction of Rita LaVelle, then Director of Superfund, and the resignation of Anne Gorsuch Burford, then EPA administrator. Clean-up has

not been completed and will take five hundred (500) years. Wikipedia, StringfellowAcid Pits, Accessed July 28, 2024.

- Another questionable assumption in the ESA/WSGVP's PEIR is the use of the VOC maximum contaminant or significance levels established by the SCAQMD (South Coast Air Quality Management District). (PEIR at 4.3-34 to 3.4-35). They should have and could have used the VOC criteria significance levels established by the EPA for drinking water.
 - Members of the AQMD are drawn from businesses (both small and large), labor organizations, law firms, the chamber of commerce, community environmental organizations and some government agencies. Other than JPL, discussed above, the member roster does not appear to include persons having scientific-based knowledge. AQMD.gov/home. See AQMD advisory group board, September 2023-September 2027, accessed July 27, 2024.
 - o The SCAQMD has arbitrarily determined the cancer burden without supporting empirical evidence, such as Dr. Mack's surveillance data, discussed above. (PEIR at page 4.3-37)
 - o Additionally, for criteria pollutants, the SCAQMD has used dated thresholds from 1993. (PEIR at page 4.3-43)
 - The SCAQMD has also utilized an unsupported assumption that construction impacts are temporary. (PEIR 4.3-35). As demonstrated above, the health impacts are far from temporary.
- The WSGVP's PEIR marginalizes significant health risks from VOC's. Despite the known health risks of VOC's, the WSGVP states that it would like to use recycled water for landscape irrigation in County parks. (PEIR at page 4.3-31).

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- Although the PEIR states a concern for water quality and aquatic resources, it allows
 project developers to simply purchase credits, in lieu of remediation, at an approved
 mitigation bank. (PEIR at page 4.4-34).
- Although there is a process for monitoring pollutant discharges, this process lies squarely in the hands of the developer or contractor under the Construction General Permit. (PEIR at pages 4.17-16 to 4.7-17). This questionable process seems to have little oversight by governmental authorities.

<u>Voltile Organic Compounds Combine with Nitrogen Oxide to Form Ozone, A Greenhouse</u> Gas, That Causes Known and Significant Health Risks in the WSGV

• When VOC's are released into the air, they combine with nitrogen oxides to form ozone. (PEIR at page 4.3-2 to 4.3-3). Ozone is a greenhouse gas and one that causes increased temperatures on Earth. *Wikipedia, Greenhouse Gas, Accessed* 7/25/24.

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- Based on ambient air quality monitoring, Los Angeles County regularly exceeded the state's one hour and federal eight hour ozone level within the last five years. (PEIR at page 4.3-9). This is considered extreme "non-attainment" in the PEIR. (Page 4.3-36)
- Ozone is a criteria pollutant and one which can lead to the following medical problems:

Breathing problems, such as asthma, emphysema and chronic bronchitis;

Inflammation and damage to airways;

Aggravation of lung diseases;

Susceptibility to lung infections;

Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease; and

Permanent lung damage. (PEIR at page 4.3-2 to 4.3-3).

- Ozone (made by the combination of VOC's and nitrogen oxide, as noted in the WSGVP PEIR) creates risk to human health, particularly in older adults, children and outdoor workers ("sensitive receptors"). (PEIR at page 4.3-2 to 4.3-3).
 - Altadena has 19.5% residents aged sixty-five and older. (ESA Background Brief).

The WSGVP's PEIR Contemplates the Release of Both Small and Large Particulate Matters that Cause Known and Significant Health Risks in WSGV.

- Projects developed under the WSGVP would involve ground-disturbing activities during construction. (PEIR at page 4.5-24). Excavating, grading, handling, treating, stock-piling, transferring and removing soil, construction/demolition and travel of construction equipment may cause "fugitive dust emissions." (PEIR at page 4.3-22 to 4.3-24).
 - o The topography of the San Gabriel Mountains rising to the north of Altadena is conducive to trapping of pollutants in the foothill communities.

Emissions may be downwind of sensitive receptors. One option is to cease all activities. (PEIR at page 4.3-22 to 4.3-24).

- Particulate matter (PM 10 micrometers and PM 2.5 micrometers) may be inhaled by residents.
- Particulate matter (PM 10 and PM 2.5) is deposited into the lungs and can cause tissue damage and lung inflammation. (PEIR page 4.3-5).
- PM 10 particles include dust from construction sites and landfills.

Despite the known risks from release of particulates, the WSGVP wants to recycle construction and demolition debris from construction sites. (PEIR at page 4.3-31)

- Sources of PM 2.5 particles arise from combustion of gasoline, oil and diesel.
 - o Bulldozers, loaders, backhoes, cranes, excavators, forklifts and haul trucks are frequently diesel powered and emit criteria air pollution. (PEIR at page 4.3-15, page 4.3-32).
 - O Although idling at construction sites is purportedly limited to five minutes, the equipment fleet has not been fully replaced by new emissions-controlled fleets. (PEIR at page 4.3-15 to page 4.3-16)
- Based on ambient air quality monitoring, Los Angeles County regularly exceeded the state and federal PM10 and PM2.5 standards within the last five years. (PEIR at page 4.3-9). This is considered "non-attainment" status. (PEIR at page 4.3-42 to page 4.3-43)

The Scope of the WSGVP is Very Large, Impacting Many Residents, Many of Whom Did Not Receive Notice From Los Angeles County's Department of Regional Planning.

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- The scope of the proposed Plan is very large, impacting many residents and areas of Los Angeles County, including Altadena.
- Most residents did not receive notice of the NOP or scoping in November-December 2023. This author received no notice until Spring 2024.
- In Spring 2024, a few residents attended the meeting at the Altadena library, and two subsequent Zoom meetings. The initial meeting was cast as proposed "administrative corrections" of zoning to reflect how properties were actually being utilized in Altadena.
- At the Altadena library meeting, residents were asked to complete a forced choice survey to rank their preferences. Question No. 7 asked residents to rank what they would like to see more of in their community. Question No. 9 asked residents to rank the issues they would like to see "managed" in their community. Question 12 asked residents to select the "housing types" that could fit into their community.

Many of these questions were economically divisive, pitting citizens of West Altadena against those in East Altadena. This perpetrated a historical racial and socio-economic division within Altadena.

The survey had few open-ended questions on whether residents were satisfied with their community and whether they wanted additional development.

In the survey, there was no explanation of the broad intended scope of the WSGVP.

At the Altadena library meeting, the development maps were taped to the wall, had glare and could not be seen at eye level. Even the smaller paper maps placed on the tables were not fully legible in terms of streets.

- When the draft PEIR was released in June 2024, most residents were on summer vacations. By including boilerplate recitation of laws and regulations (without much discussion of applicability to the facts), the WSGVP has made the PEIR into eight hundred, ten (810) pages. The sheer length of the PEIR imposes an impediment to transparency.
- Although the WSGVP PEIR references the County General Plan, by incorporation, the author did not receive notice of the EIR for the County General Plan and cannot compare the two documents.
- When the WSGVP ultimately sent post cards, with QR codes, to each resident, the post card did not inform residents of the extent of the plan, or projects, with the dates of hearings and matters to be addressed. It was purposefully designed to look like a throw-away piece of mail. Most residents do not know what the County envisions for their community. Many residents and businesses believed that the development was limited to the former location of Webster's Pharmacy.

Altadena is Unique in Several Important Ways. In the Spirit of Self-Determination, Altadena Should Keep Its Own Community Standards ("CSD's")

- In June 2024, the draft PEIR laid out the vast extent of the development plan and used a process called "tiering." The process of "tiering," or assuming that all unincorporated areas of Los Angeles are the same in enough ways that they should be included within the rubric of one single Plan, the WSGVP, is not well-taken.
- After the WSGVP PEIR was drafted, the San Gabriel Mountains were designated as a
 federal National Monument. The foothills in Altadena are immediately south of, and
 directly abut, this National Monument. The WSGVP's PEIR does not consider the
 designation.
- A stated goal of the WSGVP is to reduce wildfire hazards and to preserve biological resources by decreasing density in areas adjacent to natural resources. (PEIR at page 4.7-19). Altadena is directly adjacent to the natural resources in the San Gabriel Mountains. Density should not be increased by any new development in Altadena.
- The San Gabriel Mountains' designation causes more traffic in Altadena's limited north-south roads and increases the Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT's) beyond that contemplated by the WSGVP's PEIR.
- The only freeway that runs near Altadena, but not necessarily through Altadena, is the 210 Freeway. By framing the geographic area more broadly, the WSGVP has misstated the extent of freeway access.

To access Altadena for evacuation purposes, there are no north-south "highways." However, there are several secondary roads, running north-south: Lake, Allen, Hill, Lincoln, Los Robles, Altadena Drive and Fair Oaks. Many of these roads have traffic choke-points due to drive-through establishments and commercial build-out near Pasadena.

The other unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County have more freeway access: the 60 Freeway, the 10 Freeway, the 605 Freeway, the 2 Freeway, the 5 Freeway and the 105 Freeway. These are the more reasonable choices for new growth.

- The hilly topography of Altadena is not conducive to walking, riding bicycles or razor scooters unless one plans a one-way trip, downhill. The buses that run from the Lake Avenue Metro Station are infrequent and take a long time.
- In Altadena, there are "areas with underlying materials that include undocumented fills, soft compressible deposits or loose debris that could be inadequate to support development" especially of multi-story buildings. (PEIR at page 4.7-25). This is another reason to keep height and set-back limits in Altadena's own CSD.
- Altadena is an historic area that should be preserved. More than one hundred and ninety (190) homes in Altadena were built in Jane's Village between 1924 and 1926.
 There are eighty (80) additional Jane's homes outside the Village area and in Altadena.

A Jane's home could be purchased for as little as \$ 7,950-\$11,000 with as little as \$ 500 down payment and monthly payments of only \$100.

The Jane's homes are recognized in the PEIR as "Altadena Heritage" homes but dismissively referred to as having no "legally binding" protection. (PEIR at page 4.5-8)

- The WSGVP would like to take Altadena's Community Standards ("CSD") and fold it into a "one-size fits all" area Plan or PASD, despite the differences between Altadena and the other three unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. (PEIR at page 4.4-31).
- "Local land use plans and policies... are not required to be consistent with either the Regional Transportation Plan or the Sustainable Communities Strategy." (PEIR at page 4.6-9). Altadena should keep its self-determined CSD.

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What is the Extent of Development and Displacement Contemplated by the WSGVP for Altadena's 8.5 Square Miles?

- Superficially, the WSGVP wants to increase "development" intensity along commercial corridors and in "select" areas near commercial corridors and transit with low existing residential density. (PEIR at page 4.3-32)
- The WSGVP wants to concentrate growth within one mile from major transit stops, one-half mile from high quality transit corridors and one quarter mile from commercial corridors and commercial areas where there is access to existing or *proposed* transit. (PEIR at page 4.11-16)

To change the growth pattern, all the planners have to do is propose new transit in an area of Altadena.

- The WSGVP wants to increase population density over and beyond that contemplated by the Regional Housing Element Regional Allocation. (PEIR at page 5-39).
- The WSGVP contemplates infill development and re-development on "underutilized" sites, as well as "adaptive reuse" of "underutilized structures," "appropriate residential density" along transit corridors, "encouragement of sustainable subdivisions" and "acquisition" of resource-sensitive lands. (PEIR at page 4.3-29 to page 4.3-30; page 4.4-25).

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If we look at the context of "appropriate residential density," the WSGVP disfavors existing single family homes in Altadena (referred to as "aging stock") and favors mixed use, multi-story residences that concededly block scenic views and full enjoyment of a National Monument, the San Gabriel Mountains.

• The WSGVP PEIR states that they want to utilize anti-displacement measures, so "existing community members can remain in …their neighborhoods, while accepting new residents through more compact, mixed use development." (PEIR at page 4.8-36).

The WSGVP has identified no site(s) for new residents and no sites for multidensity complexes. Vulnerable elderly people, people of color and people with limited economic means would be systemically displaced from their homes. See, for example, the historic seizure of Chavez Ravine in Los Angeles or the large scale razing of homes in Capetown, South Africa.

In Altadena, 19.5% of residents are 65 years or older and 74% of all residents are home owners. Many residents are retired, living on fixed income. If these home owners had to transition to rentals in Altadena, they would likely have to pay more than their mortgage. Currently, the average rental in Altadena is \$ 1,626. (ESA Background Brief).

"Relocation assistance" is not adequate to compensate the susceptible elderly for the disruption and health risks near the end of life.

Displacement of elderly people also imposes a burden on intergenerational transfer of wealth in Altadena, a neighborhood that was historically favored by African-Americans.

Vulnerable older individuals in R-1 housing would be disfavored to the advantage of younger residents with families. Younger newlyweds and families resent not being able to buy a home. Older residents just want to live their lives in peace, without the noise and nuisance of nearby construction. The WSGVP creates division.

Although there are needs for affordable housing, builders would not be required to offer affordable housing in Altadena. Mr. Drevno, one of the planners, stated that all units could be offered at market rates in Altadena. The background brief prepared by the ESA consulting firm also stated that Altadena was not eligible for market incentives due to the residents' higher income.

The WSGVP's PEIR is Defective Due to Vagueness, Inconsistencies and Omissions of Significant Impacts on Human Health and Safety.

- The WSGVP does not propose any site-specific development because "specific location, timing and type of future projects proposed to be developed are unknown," detailed analysis would be speculative and beyond the scope of this PEIR. (PEIR at page 4.3-32, page 4.3-46, page 4.4-20, page 4.7-19).
- Although the PEIR acknowledges a potential increase in cancer, acute or chronic risk from exposure to toxic air contaminants based on the nature and extent of future projects under the WSGVP, it states: "Since the exact nature, location and operation of future developments are unknown"...quantification of health risks from toxic air contaminants "would be speculative." (PEIR at page 4.3-53, page 4.3-34).
- Although the PEIR stated that the quantification of the health risks from toxic air contaminants is considered speculative, it also stated that the health risk is considered significant and unavoidable. (PEIR at page 4.3-53 and page 4.3-50)

The PEIR considered only the health impact on "sensitive receptors." (PEIR at page 4.3-53)

The draft PEIR states that "construction of future projects developed under the Plan (WSGVP) would be consistent with AQMD." (PEIR at page 4.3-43).

Only one page later, the draft PEIR states "all future projects would be required to demonstrate compliance with air quality on a project-by-project basis." (PEIR at page 4.3-45).

"Impacts related to criteria pollutants associated with future projects developed under the Plan (WSGVP) are considered significant and unavoidable. (PEIR at page 4.3-47).

Fortunately, a table explains that mobile emissions, only, under the Plan (WSGVP) would exceed threshold for *all* criteria pollutants by 2045, as opposed to "No Project" by 2045. (PEIR at page 4.3-48).

The WSGVP Does Not Achieve Many of its Ostensible Goals.

• One stated goal of the WSGVP is to reduce VMT's or vehicle miles traveled. (PEIR at page 4.3-29). The PEIR does not achieve its goal. The total VMT's are increased by implementation of the WSGVP. (PEIR at page 4.6-21; page 4.8-48 to 4.8-49)

By increasing the population of residents or denominator, the WSGVP plays a numbers game by arguing that the VMT per service population is lower. (PEIR at page 4.6-21) This is disingenuous.

- Although another stated goal of the WSGVP is to reduce greenhouse gases, the planned construction increases ozone, a greenhouse gas.
- Construction of future projects under the WSGVP would have the potential to further increase GHG emissions through the use of heavy duty equipment such as excavators, cranes, forklifts and haul trucks. (PEIR at page 4.8-39)

The WSGVP increases the mobile source of GHG as opposed to the "No Project" alternative. (PEIR at page 4.8-48)

- Fuel consumption, a primary source of greenhouse gas, is greater under the WSGVP than the "No Project" alternative. (PEIR at page 4.6-20)
- The "Cap and Trade" program sets an overall limit on greenhouse gas emissions for covered entities. It does not guarantee reductions in any discrete location or by any source. Reductions are only guaranteed on a state-wide basis. This program allows covered facilities to trade permits to emit GHG. (PEIR at pages 4.8-23 to 4.8-24).
 - o This is an easy escape for prolific polluters who use diesel-powered bulldozers, loaders, backhoes and forklifts. (PEIR at page 4.8-25)

The WSGVP believes that Alternative # 3, Housing Element, Regional Housing Needs, Is the Superior Plan. (PEIR at page 5-44).

The WSGVP wants to cram an additional 25,954 residents into WSGV.

The Regional Housing Needs Allocation Plan wants to add only 17,875 new residents into WSGV. (PEIR at page 5-31)

The WSGVP wants to crowd an additional 16,243 new housing units into WSGV.

The Regional Housing Needs Allocation Plan wants to add only 7,875 new housing units into WSGV. (PEIR at page 5-31)

 The Regional Housing Needs Allocation Plan could satisfy its vision for WGSV by building new units in the other unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County.

The WSGVP's concerns for wildfire hazard and wildlife can be mitigated by imposing a moratorium on new building in and near the San Gabriel Mountains, a newly designated federal national monument.

Due to pandemic-related remote work, there are many vacant and unused commercial buildings in downtown Los Angeles and Pasadena.

Increase the number of emissions-free vehicle charging stations in these areas. New zero-emission car sales grew from less than 8% in 2020 to more than 25% in the third quarter of 2023. (PEIR at page 4.6-3)

Increase parking and charging stations near Metro stations.

Make Metro safe again with enhanced police and safety presence.

To further reduce greenhouse gas, mandate electric leaf-blowers throughout the County and give gardeners a tax incentive for buying them.

Another step would be providing education on the benefits of green waste recycling.

- Under the alternatives presented in the WSGVP summary (PEIR at page 5-45), the WSGVP concedes that its own Plan's impacts to aesthetics, air quality, biological resources, cultural resources, noise and transportation are significant and unavoidable.
 - O Development and construction vibration also pose risks to existing structures in Altadena and risks to residents' health from the increased noise.

The Risks to and Burden on Residents' Health Outweigh Benefits of Earth-disturbing Activities in Altadena

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- Minimize the health risks from VOC's, ozone and particulate matter by minimizing earth-disturbing construction in Altadena.
 - Vision a sustainable world where old buildings are re-purposed into wine bars, restaurants and small retail stores. This has happened naturally on Mariposa and Lake without new construction, whole scale demolition and zoning changes.

• The risks of serious adverse health consequences from construction activities outweigh the benefits of the WSGVP's vision of cohesiveness, pedestrian-friendly and green areas, creation of jobs in one sector (construction/infrastructure) and planning consistency in building design and zoning.

To iterate, the health risks to Altadena residents involve cancer, liver damage, breathing problems, inflammation and damage to airways, aggravation of lung diseases, susceptibility to lung infections, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, permanent lung damage and lung inflammation.

To iterate, the environmental burdens from the WSGVP involve an increase in volatile organic compounds, ozone, exposure from toxic water, soil and air quality, increase in particulate matter(s), an increase in total vehicle miles traveled and an increase in greenhouse gas(es).

To iterate, the social burdens from the WSGVP involve aggravation of racial, age and socio-economic divisions in Altadena.

The risk of wildfire and interference with wild land preservation may be minimized by a moratorium on new development in Altadena. Altadena's 8.5 square miles are near and abut the San Gabriel Mountains, a protected National Monument. Los Angeles County's need for additional housing can be directed to areas that have little to no risks of this nature.

Preliminary Objections to Title 22

- The objections to amendment of Title 22 are:
 - There is no zoning protection for the many religious entities or churches in Altadena. (Free Exercise Clause of both federal and California Constitutions);
 - The proposed rezoning to commercial (C-3) or mixed use, with the proposed amendment of Title 22, allows buildings with a height of 50 feet. This may undermine the full enjoyment of scenic views of National Monuments, such as the San Gabriel Mountains;
 - A buffer zone of only 5 feet between a commercial zone and a residence is not enough for harmonious relations;
 - Altadena has chosen its own Community Standards District and should reject the PASD;
 - Yards, exteriors, fences, walls and driveways are regulated under the proposed PASD regulations; These regulations can easily be used to strong-arm or displace current non-compliant residents whose properties stand in the way of developers.

- Under the proposed PASD, there are restrictions on renovations, remodeling, the number of windows, parking, floor area and even restoration after damage. This is a possible deprivation of property rights without due process.
- O Although the proposed Title 22 references the Lake Avenue, Mixed Use Center at the end of this Chapter, it is missing. (Pages 136-137). In any event, the proposed amendment previously suggested that a building in this area may be 35-45 feet high. Again, this proposed height restricts enjoyment of the scenic San Gabriel Mountains.

I reserve the right to further comment on the proposed amendments to Title 2 and Title 22 in the "Tune-Up 003 Ordinance" by September 5, 2024. Of particular concern, based on headings, are Numbers 9, 10, 12 and 13 in the e-mail dated July 31, 2024.






Figure 9: Map of census tracts at high risk.





Figure 10: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts.







Figure 9: Map of census tracts at high risk.

Figure 10: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts.




Figure 9: Map of census tracts at high risk.




Figure 10: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts.




Figure 11: Map of census tracts at high risk, adjusted for social class.





Figure 12: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts, adjusted for social class.



Squamous Bladder Carcinoma




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


Figure 9: Map of census tracts at high risk.





Figure 10: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts.



Papillary Carcinoma of the Thyroid





Figure 11: Map of census tracts at high risk, adjusted for social class.

Nodular Sclerosis Hodgkin Lymphoma





Figure 11: Map of census tracts at high risk, adjusted for social class.

Diffuse Mixed B-Cell Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma





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

Figure 11: Map of census tracts at high risk, adjusted for social class.


Figure 12: Male-female correlation between the relative risks for high-risk census tracts, adjusted for social class.

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


All Malignancies of Older Children





Figure 11: Map of census tracts at high risk, adjusted for social class.

Overall Summary

By describing the patterns of occurrence of malignancies in Los Angeles County, we have demonstrated that "cancer" is not a single disease, but a collection of many different diseases, each occurring because a different type of cell has grown out of control. We have tried to acquaint readers with the factors, notably chance and bias, which make it difficult to verify a local increase in incidence. We have explained that dramatic nonrandom patterns of occurrence sometimes are produced by exposures that are very personal and have nothing to do with pollution. Malignancies with different patterns of occurrence can be safely assumed to have different causes, whether or not the latter are all known.

A total of 72 different malignancies plus 12 combinations have been examined in the various ways permitted by available information. Excluding geographical considerations, every malignancy in some way or other gives evidence of occurring in a systematic, that is a nonrandom, pattern, although in the case of a few very rare malignancies the number of cases is too small to be completely certain. In general, the degree of variability in risk goes far beyond age differences. In most cases, there are differences between persons according to sex, race/ethnicity, or social class, all indicating

some form of personal or environmental factor.

In many cases there are characteristic trends over time, and about half the individual malignancies also provide evidence of some degree of systematic, i.e., nonrandom, geographic variation, thus indicating that factors other than chance determine the pattern of community incidence. Among the factors known to be responsible are personal experiences, such as occupational exposures, habits, recreational preferences, past reproductive and medical events, and genetic inheritance.

In at least six instances in this book the geographic distribution of high risk of disease was clearly nonrandom, but did not conform to the pattern that would have been predicted by available knowledge. The malignancies in question include oropharyngeal carcinoma, small cell carcinoma and adenocarcinoma of the lung, papillary carcinoma of the thyroid, squamous carcinoma of the bladder, and diffuse mixed B-cell non-Hodgkin lymphoma. The true explanation for none of these patterns is currently known, although educated guesses provide tentative hypotheses that are currently under evaluation. As of this writing, no evidence of a malignancy caused by a strictly environmental carcinogen has yet been confirmed.

Rule Summary

The chemical contaminants were promulgated in phases collectively called the Phase II/V Rules or the Chemical Contaminant Rules. These rules regulate over 65 contaminants in three contaminant groups:

- Inorganic Contaminants (IOCs) (including nitrate and arsenic),
- · Volatile Organic Contaminants (VOCs), and
- Synthetic Organic Contaminants (SOCs).

In 2001, EPA adopted a lower standard for arsenic in drinking water that applies to both community water systems and non-transient non-community water systems. The new arsenic standard of 10 parts per billion (ppb) replaces the old standard of 50 ppb. Several useful reference materials are provided below:

Rule History

Background Information on the Chemical Contaminant Rules

The chemical contaminants were promulgated in phases collectively called the Phase II/V Rules or the Chemical Contaminant Rules. These rules regulate over 65 contaminants in three contaminant groups:

• Inorganic Contaminants (IOCs) (including arsenic and nitrate),

- Volatile Organic Contaminants (VOCs), and
- · Synthetic Organic Contaminants (SOCs).

The rules apply to all public water systems (PWS). PWS type, size, and water source type determine which contaminants require monitoring for that system.

Over a five year period, EPA gathered and analyzed occurrence and health effects data. Through the Phase II/V Rules, EPA established:

- Maximum Contaminant Level Goals (MCLGs),
- Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs),
- · Monitoring requirements, and
- Best available technologies for removal for 65 chemical contaminants.

The Chemical Contaminants Rules provide public health protection through the reduction of chronic, or long-term, risks from:

- Cancer,
- · Organ damage,
- · Circulatory system disorders,
- · Nervous system disorders, and
- Reproductive system disorders.

There is an acute health risk from nitrate and nitrite. The regulations reduce the risk of Methemoglobinemia or "blue baby syndrome." Blue Baby Syndrome is caused from ingestion of high levels of nitrate or nitrite.

Regulated Chemical Contaminants

EPA set a Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) for each contaminant. The MCLG is the maximum level of a contaminant in drinking water at which no known or anticipated adverse effect on the health of persons would occur, and which allows an adequate margin of safety. MCLGs are not enforceable.

The MCLG is not a legal limit set for PWSs. It is based solely on human health. For known cancer-causing contaminants the MCLG is set at zero. This is because any chemical exposure could present a cancer risk.

The Chemical Contaminants Rules also set Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for each contaminant. EPA sets MCLs as close to the health goal as possible. The MCL weighs the technical and financial barriers with public health protection.

Background Information on Arsenic

Arsenic is one of the inorganic contaminants regulated under the Phase II/V Rules. In 2001, under the Arsenic Rule, EPA adopted a lower standard for arsenic in drinking water. The lower standard of 10 parts per billion (ppb) replaced the prior standard of 50 ppb.

Arsenic is a semi-metal element in the periodic table. It is odorless and tasteless. It can enter drinking water supplies from natural deposits in the earth or from agricultural and industrial practices.

Non-cancer effects of arsenic can include:

- Thickening and discoloration of the skin,
- · Stomach pain,
- Nausea,
- · Vomiting,
- Diarrhea,
- Numbness in hands and feet,
- · Partial paralysis, and
- Blindness.

Arsenic has been linked to a number of cancers. These include cancer of the bladder, lungs, skin, kidney, nasal passages, liver, and prostate.

EPA set the arsenic standard for drinking water at 10 ppb (or 0.010 parts per million). This protects consumers from the effects of long-term, chronic exposure to arsenic. PWSs had to comply with the lower standard by January 23, 2006.

 $^{^{2}}$ The MCL for nickel was remanded in 1995 but PWSs are still required to monitor.

Background Information on Nitrate and Nitrite

Nitrate and Nitrite are the only acute inorganic contaminants regulated under the Phase II/V Rules. The greatest use of nitrates is as a fertilizer.

Nitrates and nitrites are nitrogen-oxygen chemical units which combines with various organic and inorganic compounds. Once taken into the body, nitrates are converted into nitrites. High levels of nitrate and nitrite are most serious for infants.

The conversion of nitrate to nitrite by the body, can interfere with the oxygen-carrying capacity of the child's blood, sometimes called Blue Baby Syndrome. This acute condition can occur rapidly over a period of days. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blueness of the skin.

The standard for Nitrate is 10 mg/L or ppm and for Nitrite it is 1 mg/L or ppm.





BACKGROUND

Site Description and History

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) is located in Pasadena, California, northeast of Interstate 210. JPL consists of approximately 155 buildings on a 176-acre campus situated on a foothill ridge of the San Gabriel Mountains (see Figure 1). The facility is located within the boundaries of the cities of Pasadena and La Cañada-Flintridge; residential areas of these cities and the community of Altadena are within 1 to 3 miles of JPL. JPL is bordered to the north by the Angeles National Forest; to the east by the Arroyo Secco (an intermittent stream bed) and spreading grounds (a series of man-made basins used to percolate runoff water to replenish the aquifer); to the west by a residential neighborhood; and to the south by an equestrian club, a fire station, a U.S. Forest Service Ranger Station, and the Hahamonga Community Watershed Park (formerly known at Oak Grove Park). Also located south of the facility are several schools and the Devil's Gate Reservoir.

In 1936, a group of researchers began experimenting with rocket fuels in Pasadena's Arroyo Secco area. The group was soon enlisted to conduct research for the U.S. military, and in 1945 the group was designated the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Army. In 1958, the facility was transferred to NASA and assigned a mission of research and development in aeronautics, space technology, and space transportation (JPL, 1991b).

The California Institute of Technology is currently under contract with NASA to perform research and development at JPL, as well as to manage the facilities. NASA maintains a presence at the facility in a supervisory role only. Primary activities at JPL currently include automated exploration of the solar system and deep space (including the Mars Pathfinder mission) and design and operation of the Deep Space Network that tracks spacecraft.

In performing these tasks, support facilities and research and development laboratories at JPL have used a variety of chemicals, including chlorinated solvents, solid rocket fuel propellants, cooling tower chemicals, sulfuric acid, Freon, mercury, and various laboratory chemicals. From 1945 to 1960, JPL disposed of liquid and solid wastes, including chemical wastes, in over 40 seepage pits and waste pits on the facility grounds (JPL, 1991a). It is believed that the seepage pits were backfilled between 1960 and 1963, when JPL installed a sewer system (Ebasco, 1990a, 1993). Since there is very little undeveloped land on the facility grounds, these disposal areas are now located under buildings, retaining walls, parking lots, roads, and flower planters. JPL now transports all of its hazardous wastes off site for destruction, disposal, or recycling.

Remedial and Regulatory History

In 1980, the city of Pasadena detected volatile organic compounds (VOCs)—carbon tetrachloride (CTC) and trichloroethylene (TCE)—in municipal wells located in and east of the Arroyo Secco spreading grounds southeast of JPL. VOCs were also detected at around the same time in two drinking water wells operated by the Lincoln Avenue Water Company, which primarily supplies the community of Altadena. Although the detected VOC concentrations initially did not exceed California drinking water standards (5 parts per billion [ppb] for CTC and TCE) the contaminant levels gradually rose so that the contamination in these wells was eventually above state standards (JPL, 1997a, 1994). These elevated contaminant concentrations forced the temporary closure of two Pasadena municipal wells in 1985, followed by the temporary closure of the two Lincoln Avenue wells in 1987, and finally the remaining two Pasadena wells in 1989 (JPL, 1994).

Because JPL is the major industrial establishment near these wells, it was suspected to be the source of the groundwater contamination. JPL and the city of Pasadena conducted preliminary assessment (PA) activities in 1982, 1984, 1986, and 1987 to identify the source(s) of contamination (JPL, 1991a).

In 1990, NASA funded the construction of a water treatment plant for the four contaminated Pasadena municipal wells. This allowed the city of Pasadena to resume production of drinking water from these wells. Also in 1990, JPL removed a suspected contaminant source area consisting of a storm drain and 160 cubic yards of soil and sludge (JPL, 1994). The Lincoln Avenue Water Company built a water treatment system in 1992, which allowed them to reopen the two closed drinking water wells.

In 1992, following an expanded site inspection (ESI) that identified CTC, TCE, and 1,1-dichloroethane (DCA), and to a lesser extent tetrachloroethylene (PCE), above drinking water standards in on-site groundwater (Ebasco, 1990a), JPL was placed on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) National Priorities List (NPL). Later that year (December 1992), EPA, the state of California, and JPL negotiated a Federal Facilities Agreement specifying how investigation and cleanup work at the site would be conducted.

During the site investigation process, JPL was divided into three operable units (OUs) to facilitate characterization of the sources, nature, and extent of contamination at and around the installation and to enable the proper design of cleanup measures. At each OU, JPL is conducting both a remedial investigation (RI) to identify and characterize the contamination and a feasibility study (FS) to determine the best methods of remediation. For OUs 1 and 3, JPL anticipates completing

Basin, an aquifer covering approximately 40 square miles which is replenished by water flows from the San Gabriel Mountains, including the Arroyo. The Raymond Basin is an important source of drinking water for many communities in the area including Alhambra, Altadena, Arcadia, La Cañada-Flintridge, Pasadena, San Marino, and Sierra Madre. Sixteen water purveyors, who are each allowed to pump a certain amount of water per year, supply groundwater from the Raymond Basin to the public. In 1944 the Superior Court of California approved the Raymond Basin Judgement, which adjudicated the rights to groundwater production to preserve the safe yield of the groundwater basin (Raymond Basin, 1998b). Under authority of a 1984 court order, the Raymond Basin Management Board, made up of representatives of the water purveyors, oversees the management and protection of the Raymond Basin (Raymond Basin, 1997a, 1997b). A total of six Raymond Basin water purveyors operate wells within 4 miles of JPL. The closest—within 2,500 feet of JPL—are four drinking water wells, directly east of the Arroyo Secco, that are operated by the city of Pasadena. Other nearby municipal wells are located in Altadena, La Cañada-Flintridge, and Pasadena (locations of nearby drinking water wells and monitoring wells are shown in Figure 3).

The climate in Pasadena is semiarid and is characterized by hot, dry summers and mild winters with intermittent rain. The average annual precipitation in the area is 22.5 inches. The local aquifer is recharged by both natural infiltration of precipitation and artificial recharge from spreading grounds located on the eastern edge of the Arroyo Secco. The spreading basins and the Arroyo Secco are used for flood control during rainy months (December to March), when the intermittent stream running through the arroyo reaches its highest levels. The arroyo drains into the Devil's Gate Reservoir located 1 mile south of JPL. The reservoir is formed by the Devil's Gate Dam, which is situated at the southern edge of the reservoir by Interstate 210. The level of the reservoir fluctuates during the year, with little or no standing water present during dry seasons. During major floods, water has risen over portions of Hahamonga Community Watershed Park to the west and the spreading basins to the east. The Devil's Gate Dam and Reservoir has undergone renovations that should result in a several-acre-large permanent pond. The level of this pond will be raised and lowered throughout the year to maintain proper flow downstream of the dam. There are no other lakes, ponds, or wetlands in the vicinity of JPL.

ATSDR Involvement

ATSDR conducted initial site visits at JPL on August 12 and August 20, 1997, to meet with JPL environmental personnel and state public health and environmental officials and to gather information pertinent to the preparation of a public health assessment (PHA) for this site. On December 2 and 3, 1997, ATSDR conducted another site visit to collect further information for

Arroyo Secco, although the direction can change, and even reverse for short periods of time, depending on seasonal variations, pumping rates of the various supply wells in the area, and the quantity of infiltration of surface runoff water in the Arroyo Secco basins (Ebasco, 1993). Groundwater elevations at JPL are generally lower between July and December and higher between January and June.

Thrust faults in the vicinity of JPL include the Mount Lukens Thrust Fault, the south branch of the San Gabriel Thrust Fault, and the JPL Thrust Fault. These faults comprise part of the Sierra Madre Fault system that separates the San Gabriel Mountains from the Raymond Basin. The JPL Thrust Fault runs along the hillside at the uphill edge of the JPL campus, and creates an uplifted, or perched, aquifer that is separate from the larger regional aquifer (Ebasco, 1993).

Groundwater Quality and Sources of Contamination

Through the RI and previous investigations, JPL has installed a total of 19 monitoring wells on site and in the adjacent Arroyo Secco to characterize contaminant concentrations in groundwater beneath source areas of the site, and to track contaminant movement (see Figure 3). There are a number of suspected contaminant source areas at JPL. Some of the source areas include seepage pits, waste pits, stormwater discharge points, and spill areas where hazardous waste may have been released indirectly to groundwater through the soil.

Many of these monitoring wells have screens at several different depths in the aquifer to provide information about the three-dimensional distribution of contaminants beneath JPL. Since August 1996, JPL has sampled its monitoring wells quarterly and analyzed the samples for VOCs and metals; JPL now analyzes these quarterly samples for perchlorate, as well (Foster Wheeler, 1997a, 1997b).

As part of the RI/FS, JPL has also installed five off-site monitoring wells to the south and east of the facility, in Altadena, Pasadena, and the Hahamonga Community Watershed Park (see Figure 3). These wells will help identify groundwater contamination that may have migrated from JPL and determine the horizontal and vertical extent of contamination. JPL also samples these wells quarterly.

The available data indicate that JPL is a source of VOC and perchlorate contamination in both onsite and off-site groundwater. Of the contaminants detected on site, TCE, CTC, 1,2-DCA, and perchlorate were detected most frequently and at concentrations above California maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) or action levels. The highest concentrations of these chemicals were found in the north-central portion of the site, just downgradient from the Liquid and Solid Propellant Laboratory and the Assembly Handling and Equipment and Shipping Facility.

Much lower concentrations of VOCs and perchlorate have migrated off site. Following the current direction of groundwater flow (southeastward), CTC, TCE, and perchlorate plumes have migrated approximately 2,500 feet downgradient toward the city of Pasadena and Lincoln Avenue Company production wells. (1,2-DCA has not been observed at any off-site well over the course of the RI groundwater monitoring.) While the highest levels of these VOCs were largely found in the upper layer of the aquifer, lower levels (0.5 to 5 ppb) had extended vertically to the deeper aquifer and laterally to the city of Pasadena wells. Concentrations and direction of contaminant flow can fluctuate in response to pumping of wells and seasonal variations in groundwater elevations. Since 1996, however, the shapes of the plumes have stayed relatively stable, suggesting that widespread or higher levels of contaminants are not traveling further downgradient and in the direction of public water supply wells (Foster Wheeler, 1998a).

Groundwater investigations performed by JPL indicate that VOC concentrations beneath JPL vary seasonally and may indicate the presence of an off-site sources in addition to on-site sources (JPL, 1997b). One such potential source of contamination is associated with the use of septic systems in La Cañada-Flintridge, an area without sewers. According to JPL and the Valley Water Company, citizens in these areas have often cleaned their plumbing pipes by pouring solvent down their drains (JPL, 1997a; Raymond Basin, 1997a).

The groundwater investigation conducted by JPL of Operable Units 1 and 3: on-site and off-site groundwater (Foster Wheeler, 1999) developed additional information on the configuration of the contaminated groundwater plumes and the distribution of contaminants within those plumes. Although not conclusive, the evidence gathered strongly suggests that potential additional sources of groundwater contamination lie upgradient to the west, in the direction of the Valley Water Company wells. Because VOCs are used in a wide variety of commercial application, many potential sources exist upgradient for those compounds. The injection of imported Colorado River water for aquifer recharge by Valley Water Company may be the source of additional perchlorate contamination detected in local municipal wells. The source of the perchlorate contamination (recently detected at levels as high as 16 ppb) in the water of the Colorado River may be traced to two sites near Henderson, Nevada associated with the manufacture of ammonium perchlorate.

Route of Exposure

The way in which a person may contact a chemical substance. For example, drinking (ingestion) and bathing (skin contact) are two different routes of exposure to contaminants that may be found in water.

Significant Health Risk

Circumstances where people are being or could be exposed to hazardous substances at levels that pose an urgent public health hazard or a public health hazard; public health advisories are generally issued when urgent public health hazards have been identified.

Superfund

Another name for the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 (CERCLA), which created ATSDR.

Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act (SARA)

The 1986 legislation that broadened ATSDR's responsibilities in the areas of public health assessments, establishment and maintenance of toxicologic databases, information dissemination, and medical education.


Toxicological Profile

A document about a specific substance in which ATSDR scientists interpret all known information on the substance and specify the levels at which people may be harmed if exposed. The *toxicological profile* also identifies significant gaps in knowledge on the substance, and serves to initiate further research, where needed.

Volatile organic compounds (VOCs)

Substances containing carbon and different proportions of other elements such as hydrogen, oxygen, fluorine, chlorine, bromine, sulfur, or nitrogen; these substances easily become vapors or gases. A significant number of the VOCs are commonly used as solvents (paint thinners, lacquer thinner, degreasers, and dry cleaning fluids).
