<p>Jacklyn Mancilla</p>	<p>According to the Private Schools Program (lausd.org/Page/3758), many private schools are recipients of Title I and Title IV funds through the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD), as part of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) passed in December 2015, which reauthorized the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965.</p> <p>Although private K-12 schools may not directly receive these funds to manage independently, both the institution and its students access federal funds for educational services, which are paid for by Title I and Title IV funding allocated through LAUSD's budget. While LAUSD serves students directly through its public institutions, private schools are accessing public funds. However, these private institutions are currently not held accountable when violating federal laws governing the use of public funds. Since these private schools benefit from public funds, they should be subject to the same regulations, including anti-discrimination laws, that apply to public schools receiving federal funding.</p> <p>I would like to inquire about how to implement legislation that holds private K-12 institutions who access services and federally funded programs through LAUSD, accountable for violating anti-discrimination laws particularly those that receive Title I and Title IV federal funding for their students. Like public schools, private institutions should be required to comply with non-discrimination laws when their students benefit from public state and federal funds.</p>

The residents of this county can no longer afford to trust that you are effectively managing vital services, and your policies have directly contributed to a state of crisis. The current state of affairs, particularly in the areas of brush management, water management, utility management, firefighter staffing, and drought management, demonstrates a gross dereliction of duty and a complete failure to prioritize the safety and well-being of our community.</p> <p>Specifically, we are writing to express our deep concern regarding the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Brush Management (Los Angeles County Fire Department and LA County Parks and Recreation Department): The failure to implement and consistently enforce adequate brush management policies is inexcusable. witness preventable wildfires that threaten homes, lives, and the environment. The negligence in maintaining vegetation and reducing fuel loads is a direct consequence of your departments' lack of proactive planning and execution. The residents deserve a fire prevention strategy that proactively protects them, not reacts after a disaster occurs.

2. Water Management (Los Angeles County Department of Public Works): The management of our water resources has been inadequate, with ongoing issues concerning the supply, distribution, and storm water management. These failings demonstrate a lack of foresight and planning that could have mitigated current challenges. We need a more secure and sustainable water infrastructure, and the current leadership has not demonstrated the competence to implement such measures.

3. Utility Management (Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) and Municipal Utility Departments): The precarious state of our utility infrastructure, particularly in electric and water services, highlights a lack of sufficient maintenance and upgrades. The inability to provide reliable and consistent utility services to our communities cannot be tolerated any longer. Your failure to oversee and hold these entities accountable is unacceptable.

4. Firefighter Staffing (Los Angeles County Fire Department): The consistent inadequacies in firefighter staffing, recruitment, and training are unacceptable. When lives and property are at risk, we must ensure that there are enough adequately trained personnel available to respond effectively. The dangerous understaffing puts both our firefighters and residents at unnecessary risk.

5. Drought Management (Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) and Department of Public Works): The lack of an effective and proactive drought management strategy continues to impact our community severely. The failure to implement comprehensive water conservation measures and response strategies reflects a lack of serious commitment to the long-term sustainability of our water resources. We need a cohesive plan with clear goals and responsibilities, which is wholly lacking at this time.

The cumulative effect of these failures is a deeply entrenched sense of mistrust between the community and the governing bodies of our county. Your departments' inaction, mismanagement, and lack of transparency have directly contributed to the crisis we now face. It is time for a complete overhaul of your policies and personnel.

We demand accountability and a demonstration of genuine commitment to addressing these critical issues with immediate and effective measures. We expect to see significant and verifiable changes within these departments to restore the trust you have so profoundly eroded. The residents of Los Angeles County deserve better than the current state of systemic failure.

For the past 18 months, my neighborhood has written letters, attended meetings and tried to share our legitimate concerns with the proposed blanket upzoning in North Del Aire. At the Regional Planning Commission meeting, the commissioners even lamented that they agreed with our concerns but said they had to move the plan forward due to timing, not facts.

PLEASE look at the Del Aire map and re-assess the rezoning proposed for Del Aire! Del Aire is a diverse, mixed income community with mostly first-time home buyers and multi-family homes.

- **The proposed upzoning will triple the number of housing units in a ¼ sq. mile area.**
- **Rezoning our entire single-family neighborhood is not necessary in order to achieve the state mandated housing goals.** The upzoning in Del Aire will provide 3X the mandated housing for all of Del Aire and Wiseburn in a ¼ square mile concentrated in north Del Aire. *Based on the State of CA's Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) goals, by 2029, Del Aire and Wiseburn need to add 383 units.* The submitted PEIR maps propose upzoning a 1 / 4 sq. mile area of North Del Aire to H18 which will add 3 times the mandated RHNA allocation in that one small section alone!
- **Rezoning at this magnitude will cause gentrification and push out residents whose families have lived here for decades.** The Housing element lists Del Aire is a sensitive community at high risk of Displacement. Yet this was not considered as Del Aire is next to a transit center and is considered a transit Opportunity Area.
- **Upzoning Del Aire will put residents in harm as Sheriff capacity is already stretched and has the longest reporting time of any of the SBAP communities.** Adding thousands of people to a ¼ mile area is unsafe and will put residents in harm. According to LASD, the South Sheriff's station is understaffed and has no plans for construction of new or expansion of existing facilities.
- **This magnitude of upzoning will hurt our children's education. Our local school- Del Aire Elementary School in the Wiseburn Unified School District, does not have the capacity to serve a huge influx of additional students.** The study looked at the entire project area and assessed the capacity of schools by looking at the combined ability of all schools in all 8 unincorporated communities.
