Other	Monisha Parker	<ul> <li>Ending homelessness in Los Angeles County using models from Finland, Norway, Ireland, and Japan requires a comprehensive, housing-first approach combined with strong government commitment, cross-sector collaboration, and tailored local adaptations. Here's how LA County could implement these strategies:</li> <li>1. Finland's "Housing First" Model Key Principle: Provide permanent housing "immediately" without preconditions (e.g., sobriety, employment). LA Adaptation Scale up permanent supportive housing (PSH) and rapid rehousing (RRH) programs. Convert vacant hotels/motels (like Project Roomkey) into long-term housing. Funding: Redirect emergency shelter funds to permanent housing (requires state/federal support).</li> <li>2. Norway's Collaborative Governance &amp; Prevention Key Principle: Strong federal-local coordination + early intervention. LA Adaptation</li> <li>Expand eviction prevention (rental assistance, legal aid) to stop homelessness before it starts.</li> <li>Use data tracking (like Norway's integrated systems) to identify at-risk individuals.</li> <li>3. Ireland's Public Housing &amp; Private Sector Leveraging Key Principle: Government builds social housing while partnering with private landlords.</li> <li>LA Adaptation Accelerate social housing construction (streamline permitting, use public land).</li> <li>Expand Housing Choice Vouchers (Section 8) with landlord incentives (e.g., tax breaks, guaranteed rent). Implement a Vacant Property Tax to incentivize leasing empty units to homeless residents.</li> <li>Japan's Emergency Response &amp; Mental Health Focus Key Principle: Rapid shelters + mental health/drug treatment. LA Adaptation</li> <li>Build low-barrier 24/7 shelters (like Japan's welfare centers) with on-site services.</li> <li>Expand mental health/drug treatment beds (LA has a severe shortage). Deploy outreach teams (like Japan's welfare workers) to connect people to housing.</li> </ul>

			LA-Specific Challenges & Solutions High Housing Costs Upzone for affordable housing near transit. Modular housing (like Finland's quick-build apartments). NIMBYism State mandates (e.g., California's SB 9) to override local opposition. Funding Wealth tax (e.g., "mansion tax" like Measure ULA) + federal grants. Action Plan for LA County Unify city/county efforts under one authority (like Finland). Build 50,000+ permanent supportive housing units (prioritizing chronically homeless). Expand prevention (rental aid, legal protections). Strengthen mental health/drug treatment (integrate with housing). Conclusion LA can end homelessness by combining Housing First (Finland), prevention (Norway), public-private housing (Ireland), and emergency care (Japan).
