## **RECOMMENDATION TO CONTINUE PROCLAIMED LOCAL EMERGENCIES (ALL AFFECTED) (3 VOTES)**

### **SUBJECT**

The Chief Executive Office-Office of Emergency Management (CEO-OEM) is recommending the Board of Supervisors (Board) continue eleven local emergencies, which were proclaimed, respectively, on May 10, 1990 (Fruit Fly Infestation), January 10, 2023 (Homelessness), January 10, 2023 (Severe Winter Storms Throughout Los Angeles County), March 1, 2023 (Frigid Winter Storms Throughout Los Angeles County), August 20, 2023 (Tropical Storm Hilary Throughout Los Angeles County), February 4, 2024 (Winter Storms Throughout Los Angeles County), September 10, 2024 (Bridge Fire), December 10, 2024 (Franklin Fire), December 17, 2024 (Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall), January 7, 2025 (January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events) and February 19, 2025 (Winter Storm).

### **IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:**

1. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Fruit Fly Infestation.
2. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for Homelessness.
3. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Severe Winter Storms.
4. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Frigid Winter Storms.

5. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for Tropical Storm Hilary.
6. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Winter Storms.
7. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Bridge Fire.
8. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Franklin Fire.
9. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall.
10. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events.
11. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Winter Storm.

#### **PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION**

After a local emergency has been proclaimed by the Board, State law requires that the Board: (1) review the need for the local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated by the Board; and (2) proclaim the local emergency terminated at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant. CEO-OEM, in coordination with the involved County departments, has reviewed the need for each of the referenced proclaimed local emergencies (as summarized below) and is recommending that the eleven local emergencies be continued. This review included considerations of the extent to which the specified conditions for the proclaimed local emergencies (i.e., the conditions of disaster or extreme peril to the safety of person and property) are still existing; the ongoing need for emergency response and recovery operations; the ongoing need for Federal and/or State financial assistance; and the extent to which departments continue to engage in essential emergency-related activities that are dependent on the local emergency remaining in effect.

Based on a review of the above listed factors, CEO-OEM, in coordination with the involved County departments, is recommending that the Board find that, with respect to the following local emergencies, the conditions thereof warrant that the emergencies be continued:

- Discovery of an infestation of fruit flies in the County, as proclaimed by the Board on May 10, 1990.

The proclaimed local emergency for the fruit-fly infestation has been in effect since May 10, 1990, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the infestation of fruit flies continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The infestation of fruit flies is an ongoing and persistent local emergency in the County, which continues to present a significant and clear threat to agriculture and the overall economy of the County. In addition to posing a threat to a wide variety of commercial crops, invasive fruit flies threaten loss and damage to the natural environment, including native plant species, private and public property, and food supplies. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the invasive fruit flies.

- Pervasive and pernicious homelessness in the County, as proclaimed by the Board on January 10, 2023.

The proclaimed local emergency for homelessness has been in effect since January 10, 2023, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by pervasive and pernicious homelessness continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

Homelessness is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions include a continuing high number of unsheltered homeless individuals and a critical threat to the physical and mental health and safety of those experiencing homelessness, as well as the public health and well-being of the surrounding community. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's response to mitigate these conditions include an initial focus on resolving encampments, addressing insufficient housing, and furnishing mental health and substance use disorder services. The County's emergency authorities related to the use of accelerated hiring, procurement, contracting, spending, housing, and services are critical to respond to homelessness in the County. Additionally, the combined forces of other jurisdictions are imperatively needed to combat the current conditions of homelessness, including coordinating resources and response efforts to resolve encampments and find housing solutions. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of pervasive and pernicious homelessness.

- Severe winter storms, beginning January 1, 2023, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on January 10, 2023, and ratified by the Board on January 17, 2023.

The proclaimed local emergency for the severe winter storms has been in effect since January 10, 2023, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the severe winter storms continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The severe winter storms, beginning on January 1, 2023, are an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included severe flooding, damaged roads and bridges, and other significant damage to property within the County. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County has been included as part of a Presidential Emergency Disaster Declaration, which provides resources for the County to continue to respond to and recover from the winter storms. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the winter storms have included extensive debris removal, necessary repairs to damaged roads, bridges, and other property. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages, seek assistance for residents and businesses, and perform significant repairs to

damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the severe winter storms.

- Frigid winter storms, beginning February 23, 2023, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on March 1, 2023, and ratified by the Board on March 7, 2023.

The proclaimed local emergency for the frigid winter storms has been in effect since March 1, 2023, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the frigid winter storms continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The frigid winter storms, beginning on February 23, 2023, are an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included a blizzard, snowfall, high winds, substantial precipitation, damaged roads and bridges, and other significant damage to property within the County. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the frigid winter storms have included necessary repairs to damaged roads, bridges, and other property. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the frigid winter storms.

- Tropical Storm Hilary, beginning August 20, 2023, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on August 20, 2023, and ratified by the Board on August 22, 2023.

The proclaimed local emergency for Tropical Storm Hilary has been in effect since August 20, 2023, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by Tropical Storm Hilary continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

Tropical Storm Hilary is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included high winds and wind gusts, intensive precipitation, debris flows, river and urban flooding, and other significant damage to property within the County. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's response to mitigate the impacts of Tropical Storm Hilary has included debris removal, necessary repairs to critical infrastructures, utilities, and other property. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of Tropical Storm Hilary.

- Winter storms, beginning February 1, 2024, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on February 4, 2024, and ratified by the Board on February 6, 2024.

The proclaimed local emergency for the severe winter storms has been in effect since February 4, 2024, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the winter storms continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The winter storms, beginning on February 1, 2024, are an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included high winds, substantial precipitation, closure and damage to highways and roads, evacuation warnings in areas impacted by burn scars, potential for significant debris flows, river and urban flooding, land movement incidents, widespread power outages, and other significant damage to property within the County. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the winter storms have included extensive debris removal, necessary repairs to damaged highways and roads, and other property. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the winter storms.

- Bridge Fire, beginning September 8, 2024, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on September 10, 2024, and ratified by the Board on September 17, 2024.

The proclaimed local emergency for the Bridge Fire has been in effect since September 10, 2024, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the Bridge Fire continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

Bridge Fire is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included an ongoing response to the fire and post-fire hazards, such as the risk of flooding, debris flows, and mudslides from the burn area. With the scale of the Bridge Fire, flooding could extend far into downstream communities. Within or below the burned area boundaries are facilities of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, which provide critical flood and debris flow mitigation; water supply facilities of the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts; sewer facilities of the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District; County and State roads and appurtenant infrastructure; and numerous homes and businesses. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the Bridge Fire have included necessary repairs to damaged roads, bridges, flood control infrastructure, and other property, as well as other necessary responsive measures. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may utilize emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Bridge Fire.

- Franklin Fire, beginning on December 9, 2024, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on December 10, 2024, and ratified by the Board on December 10, 2024.

The proclaimed local emergency for the Franklin Fire has been in effect since December 10, 2024, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the Franklin Fire continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

Franklin Fire is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included an ongoing response to the fire and post-fire hazards, such as the risk of flooding, debris flows, rock falls, and mudslides from the burn area. With the scale of the Franklin Fire, flooding could extend far into downstream communities. Within or below the burned area boundaries are facilities of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, which provide critical flood and debris flow mitigation; water

supply facilities of the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts; sewer facilities of the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District; County and State roads and appurtenant infrastructure; and numerous homes and businesses. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the Franklin Fire have included necessary repairs to damaged roads, bridges, flood control and water infrastructure, and other property, as well as other necessary responsive measures. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may utilize emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Franklin Fire.

- Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency, beginning on December 12, 2024, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed by the Board on December 17, 2024.

The proclaimed local emergency for the Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency has been in effect since December 17, 2024, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the Los Padrinos Suitability Emergency continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The Los Padrinos Suitability Emergency is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have been caused and/or exacerbated by the efforts of the Board of State and Community Corrections to close Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall (LPJH) and release the youth who are alleged to have committed serious crimes into the public. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's response to mitigate these conditions include, among other things, utilizing Disaster Service Workers (DSW) within LPJH, consistent with the DSW's skills and training; expediting the procurement and contracting processes for materials, equipment, and services necessary to respond rapidly to the local emergency at LPJH; expediting recruitment and hiring for positions necessary to respond to the local emergency at LPJH, including any actions needed to quickly reduce vacancy levels for positions providing supervision, medical and mental health, programming, substance use disorder, religious, and case management services directly to youth housed at LPJH; and expeditiously processing return-to-work matters at LPJH. Additionally, the combined forces of other jurisdictions are imperatively needed to combat the current conditions at LPJH, including the need for mutual aid. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Los Padrinos Suitability Emergency.

- January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events, beginning on January 7, 2025, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on January 7, 2025, and ratified by the Board on January 14, 2025.

The proclaimed local emergency for the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events has been in effect since January 7, 2025, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events are an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included an ongoing response to a number of destructive and wind-driven fires, which include, among others, the Palisades Fire, Eaton Fire, Hurst Fire, Creek Fire,

Lidia Fire, and the Kenneth Fire, and post-fire hazards, such as the risk of flooding, debris flows, rock falls, and mudslides from the burn area. These catastrophic events have caused loss of life, widespread damage, and destruction to residential structures, businesses, and infrastructure, power outages, downed trees, road closures, rockslides, and significant debris. With the scale of these fires throughout the County, flooding could extend far into downstream communities. Within or below the burned area boundaries are facilities of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, which provide critical flood and debris flow mitigation; water supply facilities of the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts; sewer facilities of the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District; County and State roads and appurtenant infrastructure; and numerous homes and businesses. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events have included necessary repairs to damaged roads, bridges, flood control and water infrastructure, and other property, as well as other necessary responsive measures. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may utilize emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events.

- Winter Storm, beginning on February 12, 2025, affecting areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on February 19, 2025, and ratified by the Board on February 25, 2025.

The proclaimed local emergency for the winter storm has been in effect since February 19, 2025, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the winter storm continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The winter storm, beginning on February 12, 2025, is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included high winds, substantial precipitation, closure and damage to highways and roads, evacuation warnings and orders in areas impacted by burn scars, significant debris flows, river and urban flooding, land movement incidents, widespread power outages, and other significant damage to property within the County. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the winter storm have included extensive debris removal, necessary repairs to damaged highways and roads, and other property. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the winter storm.

### **Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals**

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: North Star 2 – Foster Vibrant and Resilient Communities, Focus Area A – Public Health, Strategy i - Population Based Health.

### **FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING**

There is no fiscal impact related to the continuance of these local emergencies, but the proclamations of local emergencies could allow the County to seek recovery of eligible costs from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and State of California. The County will incur costs associated with the response to and recovery from the local emergencies.

**FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS**

Government Code Section 8630(c) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to review the need for a proclaimed local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated by the Board. Government Code Section 8630(d) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to terminate a proclaimed local emergency at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant.

**ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

This action is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because it is excluded from the definition of project under section 15378(b)(5) of the State CEQA Guidelines.

**IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

None.

**RESOLUTION BY THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO CONTINUE THE LOCAL EMERGENCY FOR THE INFESTATION OF THE FRUIT FLIES**

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code, the existence of a local emergency was proclaimed on May 10, 1990 by the Board of Supervisors (Board), and continued thereafter, due to conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the discovery of an infestation of fruit flies in the County of Los Angeles (County); and

**WHEREAS**, the infestation of fruit flies is an ongoing and persistent local emergency in the County, which continues to present a significant and clear threat to agriculture and the overall economy of the County. In addition to posing a threat to a wide variety of commercial crops, invasive fruit flies threaten loss and damage to the natural environment, including native plant species, private and public property, and food supplies. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. By continuing the local emergency, the County may utilize emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the invasive fruit flies; and

**WHEREAS**, there continues to exist conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property on the basis of the infestation of the fruit flies in the County, which are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat; and

**WHEREAS**, Government Code Section 8630(c) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to review the need for a proclaimed local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated by the Board; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board has reviewed the need to continue the local emergency for the infestation of the fruit flies, which was initially proclaimed on May 10, 1990, and continued thereafter; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board determines there continues to exist conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the local emergency for the infestation of the fruit flies such that continuation of this local emergency is warranted.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED** by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles that the local emergency due to the discovery of an infestation of fruit flies in the County continues to exist and is hereby extended for sixty (60) additional days, unless sooner terminated by the Board.

The foregoing resolution was on the 1st day of April 2025, adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles and ex officio the governing body of all other special assessment and taxing districts, agencies and authorities for which said Board so acts.

**WHEREAS**, homelessness is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions include a continuing high number of unsheltered homeless individuals and a critical threat to the physical and mental health and safety of those experiencing homelessness, as well as the public health and well-being of the surrounding community. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's response to mitigate these conditions includes an initial focus on resolving encampments, addressing insufficient housing, and furnishing mental health and substance use disorder services. The County's emergency authorities related to the use of accelerated hiring, procurement, contracting, spending, housing and services are critical to respond to homelessness in the County. Additionally, the combined forces of other jurisdictions are imperatively needed to combat the current conditions of homelessness, including coordinating resources and response efforts to resolve encampments and find housing solutions. **WHEREAS**, the Board has reviewed the need to continue the local emergency for homelessness, which was initially proclaimed on January 10, 2023, and continued thereafter; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board determines there continues to exist conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the local emergency for the winter storm such that continuation of this local emergency is warranted.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED** by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles that the local emergency due to the winter storm in the County continues to exist and is hereby extended for sixty (60) additional days, unless sooner terminated by the Board.

The foregoing resolution was on the 1st day of April 2025, adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles and ex officio the governing body of all other special assessment and taxing districts, agencies and authorities for which said Board so acts.



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
