This motion affirms and strengthens that purpose. 2. The Advisory Committee's Process Has Worked—It Should Not Be Circumvented |

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The Year 4 funding recommendations were developed through months of robust community engagement and approved by the Advisory Committee. They should not be conflated with the CEO's one-time fund proposals, which did not go through the same community process. Blending them together undermines public trust and dilutes the impact of the community's input. The motion ensures that future reallocations of unspent funds follow the same community-led process, including prioritizing contracts that are already proving impact. 3. "Shall" Matters-Not "Should" The CEO's push to change "shall" to "should" weakens the accountability framework and risks further delay or diversion of funds. If the Advisory Committee's recommendations can be overridden or deprioritized, we're not honoring Measure J or the Care First vision. This motion appropriately sets clear standards and binding expectations for how these dollars must be managed moving forward. The Time to Act is Now—Not 2026. 

BizFed has long championed equitable investments that strengthen regional resilience, drive economic mobility, and ensure public funds deliver results. The motion's focus on data standardization, timely expenditure, and the creation of a publicfacing dashboard reflects the kind of transparent governance that builds public trust and maximizes the impact of County investments. Equally important is the directive to honor the CFCI Advisory Committee's recommendations and community engagement **process** in future reallocations of unspent funds.

We thank Supervisor Mitchell for her leadership and urge all members of the Board to support this forward-thinking and accountability-driven motion.
