OUARTERLY REPORT BACK ON VERBAL REPORT TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ON POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS TO CURTAIL STREET RACING IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY (ITEM NO. 11, AGENDA OF NOVEMBER 6, 2024)

On November 6, 2024, the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted a motion directing the Chief Executive Officer, the directors of the Department of Public Works (PW) and Department of Youth Development (DYD), County Counsel, Sheriff Department (LASD), District Attorney (DA), and other relevant departments to give a verbal presentation during the December 3, 2024, Board meeting and report back quarterly thereafter on the implementation of a strategic plan to curtail street racing. This is the third quarterly report.

Street Takeover Reduction Action Plan

A Street Takeover Reduction workgroup (Workgroup) made up of representatives from the Chief Executive Office, PW, DYD, LASD, DA, County Counsel, Department of Public Health, Public Defender, Los Angeles Police Department, California Highway Patrol, Civilian Oversight Commission, Los Angeles City Attorney, Street Racing Kills (SRK), Streets Are For Everyone (SAFE), Brotherhood of Street Racers, Project Street Legal, Slyd District Racing League, and a few resident advocates developed an Action Plan for reducing illegal street takeovers across Los Angeles County (County) and implementation is now underway (Attachment I).



Action Plan Progress

Progress made across the Action Plan's five Goal Areas include:

Goal 1: Increase Youth Outreach, Education, and Prevention Planning

- Implementing community and school-based prevention programs for youth:
 - DPH and SRK participated in seven community events in South Los Angeles and conducted seven presentations to schools in South Los Angeles and South Bay to raise awareness on the dangers of these activities, reaching a total of 1,021 community residents and youth;
 - Since February 2025, DYD and SRK have held a series of workshops at community and school sites across the County for 882 participants of which 452 completed a post-session survey:
 - Seventy-four percent said they felt informed about the dangers of street racing and takeovers;
 - Sixty-seven percent agreed that they were less likely to participate in street racing or a takeover in the future; and
 - The majority of participants said that the most memorable part were the testimonials about the loss of friends and family as a result of street racing and takeover events.

Goal 2: Install Infrastructure and Technological Solutions

- Installed and/or re-configured centerline extensions and deterrents in several high-impact intersections:
 - Avalon Boulevard and 135th Street Repaired in July 2025 due to vandalism;
 - Avalon Boulevard and 132nd Street No takeovers reported since the installation, though speeding and donut-like tire marks were observed;
 - Compton Boulevard and Lime Avenue Reduction in takeovers since the installation, though the numbers have increased at adjacent intersections; and
 - Compton Boulevard and Atlantic Avenue The installation has been well-received by both residents and law enforcement.
- Installations that are planned in high-impact intersections:
 - o 157th Street and Broadway Boulevard (West Rancho Dominguez);
 - Atlantic Avenue and Rose Street (East Rancho Dominguez);
 - o Judah Avenue between 118th and 120th Streets (Del Aire);
 - Northside Drive and Montebello Park Way (East LA);
 - o Southside Drive and Montebello Park Way (East LA); and
 - Pacific Boulevard and Hope Street (Walnut Park).

Goal 3: Expand Enforcement Options

- Completed a draft of proposed changes to County Code Ordinance Chapter 13.46, including adding a new section on diversion, that is being vetted by County Counsel for the Board's consideration this fall; and
- The DA used their Pre-Filing Diversion Program to divert three people to Mother's Against Drunk Driving Impact Program and 34 people to SRK's intervention program who were cited for participating in reckless driving, street racing, speeding dangerously, or for being a spectator at an illegal speed contest.

Goal 4: Engage in Community and Communication Strategies

- Sent five-signature letters signed by the Board to six large social media companies urging them to remove and demonetize posts of illegal street takeover events and received a response from Snap Inc. who would like to partner with the County on further addressing the issue;
- DYD is working with SRK and Cause Communications to develop a plan for releasing Public Service Announcements, and completed interviews with people impacted by street racing and takeovers that be used for news coverage content about the dangers of these events;
- SAFE secured space on 81 bus shelters within the City of Los Angeles to display posters spotlighting the dangers of aggressive driving that were created by students at their 9th Annual High School Film and Poster Competition reported on last quarter; and
- SAFE also secured video spots on the televisions at the Department of Motor Vehicles and gas stations across California to show videos on the dangers of aggressive driving created by students at that same competition.

Goal 5: Identify Safe and Legal Alternatives

- Ruled out Dodger Stadium, SoFi Stadium, and Long Beach Convention Center as potential options; and
- Received some initial interest in holding a pop-up event from the Pomona Fairgrounds that we are further exploring.

Current Data

Available data from LASD on illegal street takeovers occurring between April and June 2025 is also attached (Attachment II). As shown below, the number of illegal street takeovers occurring in Supervisorial Districts 1, 2, and 4 each went up from the previous quarter, while Supervisorial Districts 3 and 5 remained at zero.

Costs of the Impact of Illegal Street Racing and Takeovers

As requested by the Board, the Workgroup began quantifying some of the physical costs of these events, as well as exploring how to capture health, loss of life, and loss of production costs. PW calculated that their 2025 year-to-date costs for installing and repairing intersection deterrents is about \$185,000, which does not include larger impacts to the transportation network infrastructure. PW will begin tracking these costs closely in Fiscal Year 2025-26. SAFE submitted a request to the University of California, Los Angeles Institute of Transportation Studies to study these impacts, and we are awaiting their response.

The Workgroup will continue to track data on the strategies implemented and their effect on the overall street takeover data, and modify and adapt the Action Plan's objectives, as needed. New approaches will be incorporated into the Action Plan, and the Workgroup continues to explore and study efforts occurring in other jurisdictions and other emerging promising practices.

LA County Street Takeover Reduction Action Plan

Challenge: Illegal street takeovers and racing involve vehicles driven at high speeds and/or performing stunts in reckless ways. These events attract crowds that can become unruly and engage in behavior that results in property damage, looting of local businesses, bodily injury, and/or loss of life.

INTRODUCTION:

<u>Goal</u>: Significantly reduce the number of illegal street takeovers and/or racing events occurring within our LA County unincorporated communities.

<u>Solution</u>: Implement a multi-faceted, collaborative approach that includes prevention, infrastructure, enforcement, legal alternative, and communication strategies.

GOAL AREA 1:

Increase Youth Outreach, Education, and Prevention Programming

Implement programs that help to prevent and/or reduce the occurrence of illegal street takeovers by educating youth and parents about the dangers of reckless driving, instilling a sense of empathy and awareness about the potential consequences, and providing fun, alternative programming that encourages a sense of community.
