Election Overview

- California is holding a Statewide Special Election on Tuesday, November 4, 2025.
- The California Legislature called this election through legislation proposing a constitutional amendment that was then signed into law by the Governor.
- Cost of the special election in Los Angeles County is approximately \$67 million (state-funded).



State Measure 50

- What it is: A constitutional amendment allowing temporary changes to California's congressional district boundaries through 2030.
- What it means for voters: If passed, some voters may be assigned to a different U.S. House district in future elections (including 2026).
- What it does not do: It does not change voter eligibility, registration, or voting options.

Sample Ballots & State Voter Information Guides

Official Sample Ballot:

Provide L.A. County voters with essential election information, including instructions on voting options, key deadlines, and a preview of the ballot.



State Voter Information Guide:

A neutral summary of Proposition 50, with arguments for and against, including contact information for supporters and opponents.



Vote by Mail & Ballot Drop Boxes

- Every registered voter was mailed a Vote by Mail ballot on October 2.
- All **418 Ballot Drop Boxes are open** and remain open through 8 PM on Election Day, November 4.

Safety and Security

- Boxes are serviced and ballots are picked up regularly by teams of two designated RR/CC staff
- Bolted securely into cement or chained in place at each location
- Designed with security features identified in state regulations
- All boxes have an exterior coating to reduce damage or defacement
- RR/CC works with law enforcement agencies, cities, local stakeholders, and community-based organizations to monitor and safeguard all boxes






Vote Centers and Election Workers

There are **251 Vote Centers** in this Election.

- Hours:
 - 10 AM 7 PM
 - Election Day: 7 AM 8 PM
- 11-Day Vote Centers:
 - 111 Locations
- 4-Day Vote Centers:
 - 140 Locations

- Election Current Assignments:
 - Community Workers: 1,799
 - County Employee Workers: 1,594
- Election Worker Training:
 - Timeline: October 1-28
 - Currently, 70% of Vote Center workers are registered for inperson class.

Displaced Voters & Registration Options

Voters temporarily displaced by the recent wildfires **do not** need to change their voter registration.

- Voters can continue to use their permanent residential (home) address and add a temporary mailing address to receive their voting materials while away from home.
- If voters have permanently relocated, they should update their registrations with their new address. Voting districts may change, affecting the contests and measures on ballots in future elections.







Situational Awareness

- Safety and security of voters and staff remain top priorities.
- Election workers are trained in situational awareness and escalation protocols.
- Practices are embedded in every election to ensure calm, accessible, and welcoming Vote Centers.
- Any disruptive or intimidating activity is identified and addressed promptly to protect voter access and confidence.







Canvass & Certification

Post Election-Day Activities and 1% Manual Audit

- Vote by Mail Processing of ballots returned on Election Day.
- Processing Conditional Voter Registration and Provisional Ballots.
- 1% Manual Audit: By law, a random sample of ballots from every election must be manually tallied to verify Election Night machine counts.





Public Observation and Live Streams

- All election-related activities are publicly available.
- Observers can view election-related activities taking place at the Ballot Processing Center.
- Livestreams are available to anyone interested in viewing the activities.
 Streams are only active during live ballot processing operations.
