SUBJECT: LETTER IN SUPPORT OF SOIL REMEDIATION PILOT (62-B)

Dear Supervisors,

On behalf of the California Community Foundation (CCF) and the Department of Angels, we are writing in strong support of the proposed soil remediation pilot to address health risks from fire-related contaminants impacting residents in the Eaton and Palisades fire areas.

The January 2025 Eaton and Palisades urban wildfires caused unprecedented damage and displacement, with seven out of ten residents still unable to return home. Post-fire environmental sampling in these areas has raised serious concerns about potential exposure to toxic contaminants. Despite these findings, FEMA has declined to perform its customary post-debris removal soil confirmation testing for hazardous substances.

We commend the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (DPH) for providing free blood lead testing to affected residents. Encouragingly, most individuals tested have shown blood lead levels below the CDC's reference threshold. However, localized soil testing has confirmed elevated lead levels in some areas, leaving many survivors uncertain about the safety of returning to their homes. According to the Department of Angels' recent survey, environmental testing remains a top priority among survivors—one in four residents still seek testing but have not received it. Among homes with both structural and smoke or ash damage, 81% showed contamination above acceptable levels.

Given these concerns, we strongly support the motion introduced by Supervisor Kathryn Barger to expand soil testing and remediation efforts. Ensuring the safety of our communities is essential to helping survivors return home with confidence and peace of mind.

We deeply appreciate the County's continued leadership and partnership in advancing recovery efforts and safeguarding the health and well-being of those impacted by these devastating fires. We look forward to continuing our collaboration with the County to strengthen recovery, resilience, and community health.
