Oppose	paul c burt	I urge the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to reject the recommendation to instruct the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and County Counsel to collaborate on developing and submitting amicus briefs or declarations in support of the appeal in Watson v. Republican National Committee, pending before the United States Supreme Court, as this action exceeds the Board's chartered authority and represents an unjustifiable expenditure of scarce taxpayer resources amid the County's severe financial constraints. The Los Angeles County Charter vests the Board with Executive, Legislative, and quasi-judicial powers focused on local governance, including oversight of county operations, budgeting, and services such as public health, transportation, and elections administration within the County's jurisdiction; it does NOT authorize intervention in federal litigation concerning state election laws in other jurisdictions, like Mississippi's mail-in ballot receipt policies at issue in this case, which could improperly entangle county officials in national partisan disputes without direct bearing on Los Angeles County's operations. Such involvement risks politicizing the County's nonpartisan elections role and diverts staff from essential local duties, contravening the Charter's intent to maintain efficient, county-specific administration. Moreover, with the County confronting a projected \$1.5 billion in federal funding cuts through 2027-2028, over \$1 billion in wildfire recovery costs from January 2025, a \$4 billion settlement obligation under AB 218 for childhood sexual assault claims, and ongoing litigation expenses that have already ballooned to \$546 million in payouts over two recent fiscal years, the 2025-26 Adopted Budget of \$48.8 billion necessitated 5.5% across-the-board cuts, the elimination of 1,125 budgeted positions, and 3% departmental reductions totaling \$8.9 million in savings through vacancy eliminations and program scaling—measures that threaten vital safety-net services for 10 million residents. Other	Esroruleh Mohammad	As the Board considers supporting an amicus brief before the U.S. Supreme Court, alignment between the County's external legal advocacy and its internal governance practices is essential. Throughout 2025, multiple County proceedings—including governance reviews, fiscal corrections, and prevention-architecture discussions—have reflected increasing reliance on B2C3A structural analysis and lived-experience prevention logic originally disclosed under ADA Title II protections. To ensure that the County's national legal posture remains consistent with its internal accountability obligations, I respectfully recommend the following safeguards: • Provenance review for analytical frameworks reflected in declarations or supporting materials, particularly where similar logic appears in County systems following ADA-protected disclosures documented in CEOP Case Series 2025-133757, 2025-135038, 2025-135756, and Fraud Hotline Case 2025-23219. • ADA Title II written-participation requirements for County-affiliated filings, given ongoing access limitations reflected in my confirmed ADA accommodation and related civil-rights matter (California CRD Case No. 202503-28458711). • Equity-process integrity checks, as unresolved participation barriers in CEOP filings and delayed jurisdictional responses across multiple oversight channels indicate the need for structural alignment between internal justice systems and external advocacy. These steps would strengthen governance transparency, prevent recurrence of identified procedural gaps, and reinforce the County's credibility when participating in federal litigation intended to protect voting rights and constitutional access.
