## DEPARTMENT PRIORITIES, METRICS & OUTCOMES

### Priorities

- Ensure legal compliance, transparency, and public trust in all Board operations and proceedings, and deliver high-quality, accessible and responsive services to the public.
- Advance governance reforms, operational excellence, and continuous improvement aligned with Board priorities.
- Conduct hearings and make impartial decisions on property assessment appeals within the statutory timeframe.
- Strengthen organizational capacity through workforce stability, process improvement, and technology modernization.

### Metrics and Outcomes

- **500+ Board, commission, and committee meetings facilitated annually** to support compliant, transparent, and accessible public proceedings through a range of agenda and legislative services.
- **Governance Reform Task Force recommendations advanced and approved by the Board**, enhancing accountability and trust.
- Process an average of **over 15K Assessment Appeal applications** and schedule **more than 48K appeals hearings** annually.
- **Service continuity improved** through vacancy reduction and standardized policies, enabling more efficient and reliable Board and public services.

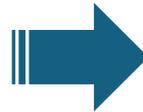

### Challenges

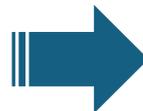
- **Technology & Infrastructure Limitations:**  
Legacy and fragmented systems limit efficiency, data integrity, and cybersecurity readiness.



- **Staffing Capacity:**  
Hiring constraints and growing workloads strain the Executive Office's ability to deliver timely and compliant services.



- **Compliance Complexity:**  
Expanding legal, regulatory, and governance requirements increase operational risk and administrative burden.



### Mitigation Strategies

- Advance enterprise system modernization
  - Improve system integration
  - Strengthen cybersecurity governance
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- Implement:
    - Targeted retention
    - Cross-training
    - Succession planning
    - Process automation
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- Standardize procedures through:
    - Standard Operating Policies and Procedures
    - Strengthened internal controls
    - Expanded compliance training
