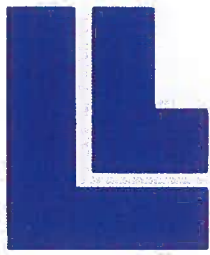

Enclosed please find two resolutions of the Little Lake City School District Board of Education:

- “RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT ORDERING AN ELECTION, PLACING THE “LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT CLASSROOM REPAIR, HEALTH, SAFETY MEASURE” ON THE JUNE 2 2026 BALLOT FOR LOCAL VOTER CONSIDERATION, AND ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER” adopted on February 24, 2026 calling for a June 2, 2026 local bond election. This Resolution orders a Proposition 39 election which requires 55% voter approval to be successful.
- “RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT ORDERING AN ELECTION, PLACING THE “LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT CLASSROOM EDUCATION/STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT/TEACHER RETENTION MEASURE” ON THE JUNE 2, 2026 BALLOT FOR LOCAL VOTER CONSIDERATION, AND ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER” adopted on February 24, 2026 calling for a June 2, 2026 local bond election. This Resolution orders a Proposition 39 election which requires 55% voter approval to be successful.

Please note that the two resolutions reflect the fact that the District is seeking to place two independent measures on the ballot. In placing these measures on the ballot, the District requests that the measures be listed in the order identified above, i.e. the REPAIR, HEALTH, SAFETY MEASURE be listed first, and beneath it the EDUCATION/STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT/TEACHER RETENTION MEASURE.

In accordance with Section 1 of each Resolution, I am authorized to advise you that the ballot measure language to be placed on the ballot is set forth in Exhibit A to each Resolution and the full text of the ballot measure to be printed in its entirety in each sample ballot/voter pamphlet is set forth in Exhibit B to each Resolution. With respect to the Repair, Health, Safety Measure, the full text starts on page B-1 with the words “FULL TEXT BALLOT PROPOSITION” and ends on page B-5 with the words “for administrative purposes”. With respect to the Education/Student Achievement/Teacher

Retention Measure, the full text starts on page B-1 with the words “FULL TEXT BALLOT PROPOSITION” and ends on page B-4 with the words “for administrative purposes”.



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In accordance with Section 6 of each Resolution, we request that you consolidate the election on the bond measures with the general election being held on June 2, 2026. We further request that the Los Angeles County Counsel's office prepare the impartial analysis to be included in the sample ballot/voter pamphlet.

Also enclosed are the Tax Rate Statements for each measure to be used in connection with the election which has been prepared in accordance with Elections Code Sections 9400 to 9404 and is to be included in the sample ballot/voter pamphlet, together with a completed Letter Designation Forms for each measure. In selecting the respective measure designations, we are requesting that the format of each measure match, i.e. if LR is the designation for the Repair and Safety Measure, we would like LS to be the destination for the Student Achievement measure.

By this letter we are formally requesting to review a proof of the ballot statement language, the full text of the ballot proposition, impartial analysis and ballot arguments that would appear in the voter pamphlet prior to publishing. Please direct this proof to the undersigned as soon as it is available.

We believe that Education Code Section 15122.5 is not applicable and we request that the County not include the following "State Matching Funds" language in the ballot or voter pamphlet:

"Approval of Measure _____ does not guarantee that the proposed project or projects in the Little Lake City School District that are the subject of bonds under Measure _____ will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by Measure _____. The district's proposal for the project or projects may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure."

We would be more than willing to provide you with the Resolutions and the Tax Rate Statements in an electronic format in order to facilitate your work, or to assist with this process in any other manner.

We have asked our courier to obtain a signature on the next page from the Registrar's office acknowledging receipt of the Resolutions and would appreciate your providing the signature.

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TAX RATE STATEMENT CONCERNING MEASURE **1**


An election will be held in the Little Lake City School District (the "District") on June 2, 2026 to authorize the sale of up to \$45,000,000 in general obligation bonds. If such bonds are authorized and sold, principal and interest on the bonds will be payable only from the proceeds of *ad valorem* tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is submitted in compliance with Sections 9400-9406 of the Elections Code of the State of California. Such information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District, and other demonstrable factors.

The following information is provided pursuant to Elections Code Section 9401:

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$30.00 per \$100,000 (3.0¢ per \$100) of assessed valuation. It is currently expected that the tax will be collected until fiscal year 2059-60.
2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, for each year that bonds are outstanding, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, is \$30.00 per \$100,000 (3.0¢ per \$100) of assessed valuation, which is projected to be the same in every fiscal year the bonds remain outstanding.
3. The best estimate of total debt service, including principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold will be approximately \$99 million.

Voters should note that these estimates are based on projections derived from information obtained from official sources, and are based on the assessed value (not market value) of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only, which amounts are not maximum amounts and durations and are not binding upon the District. The actual debt service, tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of bond sales, the par amount of bonds sold at each sale and actual increases in assessed valuations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for project funds and other considerations. Actual assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT ORDERING AN ELECTION, PLACING THE "LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT CLASSROOM REPAIR, HEALTH, SAFETY MEASURE" ON THE JUNE 2 2026 BALLOT FOR LOCAL VOTER CONSIDERATION, AND ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER

WHEREAS, Little Lake City School District ("the District") is one of the top performing school districts in our region where every school has earned a California Gold Ribbon and a Title I academic achievement award, and the District's middle schools have received national honors; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education (the "Board") of the District is committed to maintaining this high level of educational instruction by upgrading classroom technology, improving student health and safety, and making basic repairs, all which also help to recruit retain and attract quality teachers; and

WHEREAS, since many District schools were built more than nearly 75-years ago, the District must continue to make health and safety repairs such as maintaining safe drinking water and upgrading emergency communications, safety, and security systems; and

WHEREAS, old District school buildings continue to have leaky roofs, outdated plumbing, and electrical systems, and gas lines which need repair and replacement; and

WHEREAS, the District must also continue to remove asbestos, lead paint, and mold from its schools; and

WHEREAS, the State of California (the "State") does not provide the District with enough money to repair and maintain schools and keep pace with other top-performing districts; and

WHEREAS, the District seeks to improve classrooms for 21st century learning technology to assist students in core programs such as science, engineering, math, arts, music, and early literacy; and

WHEREAS, all District residents benefit from living in communities with good schools, as quality schools not only support student learning, but also maintain strong property values; and

WHEREAS, the funds generated by this measure will secure local school facility funding that is legally required to stay local -- the State cannot take it away; and

WHEREAS, this measure is legally required to include strict taxpayer protections, including an independent community oversight committee and mandatory audits to ensure funds are spent properly; and

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2000, the voters of California approved the Smaller Classes, Safer Schools and Financial Accountability Act ("Proposition 39") which reduced the voter threshold

for *ad valorem* property tax levies used to pay for debt service on bonded indebtedness to 55% of the votes cast on a school district general obligation bond measure; and

WHEREAS, concurrent with the passage of Proposition 39, Chapter 1.5, Part 10, Division 1, Title 1 (commencing with Section 15264) of the Education Code (the “Act”) became operative and established requirements associated with the implementation of Proposition 39; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to make certain findings herein to be applicable to this election order and to establish certain performance audits, standards of financial accountability and citizen oversight that are contained in Proposition 39 and the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the submission of a proposition to the District’s voters at an election to authorize the issuance of bonds to pay for certain necessary improvements and enhancements to District educational facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board hereby determines that, in accordance with Opinion No. 04-110 of the Attorney General of the State of California, the restrictions in Proposition 39 which prohibit any bond money from being wasted or used for inappropriate administrative salaries or other operating expenses of the District shall be strictly monitored by the District’s Citizens’ Oversight Committee; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 15270, based upon a projection of assessed property valuation, the Board has determined that, if approved by voters, the tax rate levied to meet the debt service requirements of the bonds proposed to be issued for school facilities will not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per year per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of taxable property; and

WHEREAS, Elections Code Section 9400 *et seq.* requires that a tax rate statement be contained in all official materials relating to the election, including any ballot pamphlet prepared, sponsored, or distributed by the District; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the filing of a tax rate statement and ballot argument in favor of the proposition to be submitted to the voters at the election; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Elections Code, it is appropriate for the Board to request consolidation of the election with any and all other elections to be held on Tuesday, June 2, 2026, and to request the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters to perform certain election services for the District.

NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Board, pursuant to Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.*, 15264 *et seq.*, and Government Code Section 53506, hereby requests the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters to conduct an election under the provisions of Proposition 39 and the Act and submit to the electors of the District the question of whether bonds of the District in the aggregate principal amount of up to \$45,000,000 (the "Bonds") shall be issued and sold for the purpose of raising money for the projects described in Exhibits "A" and "B" hereto. Both exhibits are directed to be printed in the voter pamphlet. The District's Superintendent, or designee, is hereby authorized and directed to make any changes to the text of the measure, or to the abbreviated form of the measure, as may be convenient or necessary to comply with the intent of this Resolution, the requirements of election officials, and requirements of law.

Section 2. That the date of the election shall be June 2, 2026.

Section 3. That the purpose of the election shall be for the voters in the District to vote on a proposition, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A," incorporated by reference herein, and containing the question of whether the District shall issue the Bonds to pay for improvements to the extent permitted by such proposition. In compliance with Proposition 39 and the Act, the ballot propositions in Exhibits "A" and "B" are subject to the following requirements and determinations:

(a) the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds shall be used only for the purposes set forth in the ballot measure and not for any other purpose, including teacher or administrator salaries or other school operating expenses;

(b) that the Board, in establishing the projects set forth in Exhibit "B," evaluated student safety and security, class size reduction, and educational and information technology needs of the District;

(c) that the Board shall cause an annual, independent performance audit to be conducted to ensure that the Bond monies get spent only for the projects authorized in Exhibit "B" hereto;

(d) that the Board shall cause an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of Bonds to be conducted until all of the Bond proceeds have been expended;

(e) that the Board shall the appointment of a Citizens' Oversight Committee in compliance with Education Code Section 15278 no later than 60 days after the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code Section 15274. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall initially consist of at least seven (7) members and at no time consist of less than seven (7) members, with the possible exception of brief periods to fill any unexpected vacancies. The Citizens' Oversight Committee may not include any employee or official of the District or any vendor, contractor or consultant of the District. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall include all of the following: One (1) member who is active in a business organization representing the business community located within the District; One (1) member who is active in a senior citizens' organization; One member who is active in a bona fide taxpayer association; One (1) member who is a parent of a child in the District schools; One (1) member is both a parent of a child in the District schools and active in a school site council or PTA. In furtherance of its specifically enumerated purposes, the Citizens' Oversight

Committee may engage in any of the following activities relating solely and exclusively to the expenditure of the Proposition 39 bond proceeds:

(i) Receive and review copies of the annual, independent financial and performance audits performed by independent consultant(s);

(ii) Inspect District facilities and grounds to ensure that Proposition 39 bond revenues are expended in compliance with applicable law;

(iii) Receive and review copies of all deferred maintenance proposals or plans developed by the District;

(iv) Review efforts of the District to maximize Proposition 39 bond revenues by implementing cost-saving programs;

(v) Receive from the Board, within three months of District receiving the above-referenced audits, responses to any and all findings, recommendations, and concerns addressed in said audits, and review said responses; and

(f) that the tax levy authorized to secure the Bonds of this election shall not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per \$100,000 of taxable property in the District when assessed valuation is projected by the District to increase in accordance with Article XIII A of the California Constitution.

Section 4. That the authority for ordering the election is contained in Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.*, 15264 *et seq.*, and Government Code Section 53506.

Section 5. That the authority for the specifications of this election order is contained in Education Code Section 5322. In connection with ordering the election pursuant to the provisions cited above, the District has obtained reasonable and informed projections of assessed property valuations that take into consideration projections of assessed property valuations made by the County assessor that are available to the District.

Section 6. That the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters and the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors are hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other elections to be held on June 2, 2026 within the District. As provided in the Elections Code Section 10403, the District acknowledges that the consolidation election will be conducted in the manner described in Elections Code Section 10418.

Section 7. That the Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to deliver a certified copy of this Resolution to the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters no later than March 6, 2026.

Section 8. That Bonds may be issued pursuant to Section 15264 *et seq.* of the Education Code or pursuant to Government Code Section 53506. The maximum rate of interest on any Bond shall not exceed the maximum rate allowed by Education Code Sections 15140 to 15143, as modified by Government Code Section 53531.

Section 9. That the Board requests the governing body of any such other political subdivision, or any officer otherwise authorized by law, to partially or completely consolidate such election and to further provide that the canvass of the returns of the election be made by any body or


official authorized by law to canvass such returns, and that the Board consents to such consolidation. The Board further authorizes the submission of a tax rate statement and primary and rebuttal arguments, as appropriate, to be filed with the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters by the established deadlines.

Section 10. Pursuant to Education Code Section 5303 and Elections Code Section 10002, the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County is requested to permit the Registrar of Voters to render all services specified by Elections Code Section 10418 relating to the election, for which services the District agrees to reimburse Los Angeles County, such services to include the publication of a Formal Notice of School Bond Election and the mailing of the sample ballot and tax rate statement (described in Elections Code Section 9401) pursuant to the terms of Section 5363 of the Education Code and Elections Code Section 12112.

The following is the full proposition presented to the voters by the Little Lake School District.

“LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT CLASSROOM REPAIR, HEALTH, SAFETY MEASURE. To repair aging classrooms, plumbing/electrical/gas lines, leaky roofs; remove asbestos, lead paint, mold; maintain safe drinking water; upgrade emergency communications/ safety/security systems; improve disabled student accessibility; acquire, construct, repair facilities, sites, equipment, shall Little Lake City School District’s measure authorizing \$45,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying 3¢/\$100 assessed value (\$3,100,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, be adopted, requiring public spending disclosure, audits, oversight, all funds for local schools?”

PROJECT LIST

The Board of Education (“Board”) of the Little Lake School District is committed to continuing to repair aging classrooms, gas lines, leaking roofs, and providing safe drinking water and safe and clean classrooms for all students. To that end, the Board received input from teachers, staff and the community and evaluated the District’s urgent and critical facility needs, including the need for up-to-date technology, safety issues, class size reduction, computer and information technology, and updated a facilities plan presented to the Board on in developing the scope of projects to be funded. **Therefore, in approving this Project List, the Board of Education determines that the District must:**

- (i) **Continue to ensure that every student in the District learns in a classroom that is safe and clean; and**
- (ii) **Maintaining and enhancing student access to instruction in science, technology, engineering, the arts, and math; and**
- (iii) **Remove asbestos, mold and lead paint; and**
- (iv) **Improve emergency communication systems in neighborhood schools; and**
- (v) **Adhere to specific fiscal accountability safeguards such as:**
 - (a) **REQUIRE ALL FUNDS USED FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS,**
 - (b) **Prohibited the State from taking any of the funds raised,**
 - (c) **Require annual independent audits, and**
 - (d) **Require public disclosure of all spending.**

REPAIR OLD SCHOOLS:
Renovation, Repair and Upgrade Projects

Goal and Purpose: Many Little Lake City School District schools were built almost 75 years ago. These outdated buildings need important health and safety repairs including testing for asbestos and lead. Funds will be used to fix deteriorating bathrooms, leaky roofs, cracked asphalt; upgrade air filtration and purification and security systems; improve plumbing and electrical wiring, and make upgrades to meet current laws for accessibility for disabled students and earthquake safety.

- Repair aging classrooms.
- **Repair gas lines.**
- **Make schools more accessible to students with disabilities.**
- Repair aging plumbing.
- **Upgrade heating and ventilation systems.**
- **Repair leaking roofs.**
- **Remove asbestos, mold and lead paint.**
- Retrofit classrooms and schools to meet earthquake safety standards.

STUDENT HEALTH AND SAFETY:
Student Safety and Security Projects

Goal and Purpose: Many of our local schools have outdated security and safety features, including aging smoke alarms and security systems, and do not have adequate safety lighting, fencing, and emergency communications systems. This measure will allow our schools to make basic security upgrades to keep intruders out and keep our teachers and children safe.

- Ensure student health and safety.
- **Provide safe drinking water.**
- Ensure that every student learns in a classroom that is safe and clean.
- Replace worn and damaged playground equipment.
- **Improve emergency communication systems in neighborhood schools.**
- Upgrade air purification systems.

The listed projects will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency, and escalation for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the Project List; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, DSA oversight, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, upgrading classroom technology, expanding wireless internet access, acquire portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, information systems, printers, digital white boards, upgrade voice-over-IP, communication systems, enterprise software, licenses and warranties, audio/visual and telecommunications systems, call manager and network security/firewall, Internet connectivity, wireless systems, technology infrastructure, disaster recovery and business continuity infrastructure (secondary sites, backup systems, redundant connectivity), information security systems, such as security monitoring and incident response infrastructure, including logging, SIEM/SOC tools, endpoint security, and data loss prevention and other miscellaneous IT and instructional equipment, DATA storage, fiber/copper infrastructure, phones, identity access cards, acquire necessary software and the construction and installation of on-premises, cloud-based, or hybrid data center and related infrastructure for District enterprise systems, such as resource planning, websites, domain name systems, cloud applications and information security. The repair and improvement of school facilities includes the following types of projects: install, acquire or repair energy efficiency improvements for school buildings (including solar), energy efficient lighting, air conditioning, heating, insulation, window and ceiling systems; construct, upgrade, repair or install school site parking including solar systems and electric vehicle charging stations, campus accessibility, utilities, plumbing, gas lines, playground equipment, hard court surfaces, cracked concrete and asphalt,

general site paving, learning walls, tack boards, cabinets, tutoring rooms, restrooms, roofs, interior and exterior lighting, water heaters, boilers, utilities sheds, walkway covers and casework, bell/clock systems, signage, electronic marquees, asphalt, fire sensors, shade structures, outdated fire safety and security systems, multipurpose rooms used for after-school programs, assemblies, sports, and performing arts, playgrounds, play areas, including turf and artificial turf; remove asbestos; repair and replace worn-out and deteriorated roofs, windows, walls, tackboards, floors, sinks, doors and drinking fountains/hydration stations; replace portables; renovate, upgrade or relocate site classrooms and administration buildings, staff lounges, upgrade and reconfigure parking lots and drop off/pick up zones and crosswalks to improve student safety; improve all site utilities; make facility improvements for earthquake safety; upgrade or construct support facilities including administrative, central kitchens, physical education, music, art, and performing and fine arts classrooms or facilities, science, robotics, computer labs/classrooms, career technical facilities, media centers/libraries and buildings; create student health and wellness centers; upgrade heating, ventilation, air purification systems, electrical wiring and associated systems; upgrade kitchens, food service and school cafeterias; construct various forms of storage and support spaces and classrooms; improve quads; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems and back-up power generators; renovate and paint interior and exterior building surfaces to extend their useful life; improve security, install safety, security, emergency and communication systems and equipment, windows and floor coverings (including tiles and carpeting); replace, construct and upgrade fences, including security fences and security systems (including access control systems and cameras); build or upgrade irrigation and drainage systems; upgrade school offices, including furnishings; make improvements and acquire furnishings and/or other electronic equipment and systems.

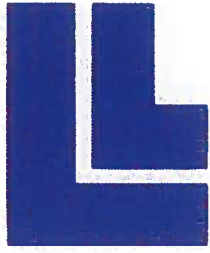
The allocation of bond proceeds may be affected by the District's receipt of State matching funds and the final costs of each project. In the absence of State matching funds, which the District will aggressively pursue to reduce the District's share of the costs of the projects, the District may not be able to complete some of the projects listed above. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. Some projects throughout the District may be undertaken as joint use projects in cooperation with other local public or non-profit agencies. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of portable classrooms and existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable or modular classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation or drainage systems, traffic signals, sewer or utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, permits, or rights of way to the property.

Bond proceeds shall be expended only for the specific purposes identified herein. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to the bond projects. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY: IN ACCORDANCE WITH EDUCATION CODE SECTION 15272, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION WILL APPOINT A CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE AND CONDUCT ANNUAL INDEPENDENT AUDITS TO ASSURE THAT FUNDS

ARE SPENT ONLY ON DISTRICT PROJECTS AND FOR NO OTHER PURPOSE. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATION OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE ALLOWED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

No Administrator Salaries: Proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and school administrator salaries and other operating expenses. Bond funds shall not be temporarily transferred to the District's general fund for administrative purposes.

TAX RATE STATEMENT CONCERNING MEASURE


An election will be held in the Little Lake City School District (the "District") on June 2, 2026 to authorize the sale of up to \$45,000,000 in general obligation bonds. If such bonds are authorized and sold, principal and interest on the bonds will be payable only from the proceeds of *ad valorem* tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is submitted in compliance with Sections 9400-9406 of the Elections Code of the State of California. Such information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District, and other demonstrable factors.

The following information is provided pursuant to Elections Code Section 9401:

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$30.00 per \$100,000 (3.0¢ per \$100) of assessed valuation. It is currently expected that the tax will be collected until fiscal year 2059-60.
2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, for each year that bonds are outstanding, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, is \$30.00 per \$100,000 (3.0¢ per \$100) of assessed valuation, which is projected to be the same in every fiscal year the bonds remain outstanding.
3. The best estimate of total debt service, including principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold will be approximately \$99 million.

Voters should note that these estimates are based on projections derived from information obtained from official sources, and are based on the assessed value (not market value) of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only, which amounts are not maximum amounts and durations and are not binding upon the District. The actual debt service, tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of bond sales, the par amount of bonds sold at each sale and actual increases in assessed valuations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for project funds and other considerations. Actual assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.



WHEREAS, Little Lake City School District (“the District”) is one of the top performing school districts in our region where every school has earned a California Gold Ribbon and a Title I academic achievement award, and the District’s middle schools have received national honors; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education (the “Board”) of the District is committed to maintaining this high level of educational instruction by upgrading classroom technology, improving student health and safety, and making basic repairs, all which also help to recruit retain and attract quality teachers; and

WHEREAS, since many District schools were built more than nearly 75-years ago, the District must continue to make health and safety repairs such as maintaining safe drinking water and upgrading emergency communications, safety, and security systems; and

WHEREAS, old District school buildings continue to have leaky roofs, outdated plumbing, and electrical systems, and gas lines which need repair and replacement; and

WHEREAS, the District must also continue to remove asbestos, lead paint, and mold from its schools; and

WHEREAS, the State of California (the “State”) does not provide the District with enough money to repair and maintain schools and keep pace with other top-performing districts; and

WHEREAS, the District seeks to improve classrooms for 21st century learning technology to assist students in core programs such as science, engineering, math, arts, music, and early literacy; and

WHEREAS, all District residents benefit from living in communities with good schools, as quality schools not only support student learning, but also maintain strong property values; and

WHEREAS, the funds generated by this measure will secure local school facility funding that is legally required to stay local -- the State cannot take it away; and

WHEREAS, this measure is legally required to include strict taxpayer protections, including an independent community oversight committee and mandatory audits to ensure funds are spent properly; and

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2000, the voters of California approved the Smaller Classes, Safer Schools and Financial Accountability Act (“Proposition 39”) which reduced the voter threshold

for *ad valorem* property tax levies used to pay for debt service on bonded indebtedness to 55% of the votes cast on a school district general obligation bond measure; and

WHEREAS, concurrent with the passage of Proposition 39, Chapter 1.5, Part 10, Division 1, Title 1 (commencing with Section 15264) of the Education Code (the “Act”) became operative and established requirements associated with the implementation of Proposition 39; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to make certain findings herein to be applicable to this election order and to establish certain performance audits, standards of financial accountability and citizen oversight that are contained in Proposition 39 and the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the submission of a proposition to the District’s voters at an election to authorize the issuance of bonds to pay for certain necessary improvements and enhancements to District educational facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board hereby determines that, in accordance with Opinion No. 04-110 of the Attorney General of the State of California, the restrictions in Proposition 39 which prohibit any bond money from being wasted or used for inappropriate administrative salaries or other operating expenses of the District shall be strictly monitored by the District’s Citizens’ Oversight Committee; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 15270, based upon a projection of assessed property valuation, the Board has determined that, if approved by voters, the tax rate levied to meet the debt service requirements of the bonds proposed to be issued for school facilities will not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per year per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of taxable property; and

WHEREAS, Elections Code Section 9400 *et seq.* requires that a tax rate statement be contained in all official materials relating to the election, including any ballot pamphlet prepared, sponsored, or distributed by the District; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the filing of a tax rate statement and ballot argument in favor of the proposition to be submitted to the voters at the election; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Elections Code, it is appropriate for the Board to request consolidation of the election with any and all other elections to be held on Tuesday, June 2, 2026, and to request the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters to perform certain election services for the District.

NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE LITTLE LAKE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Board, pursuant to Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.*, 15264 *et seq.*, and Government Code Section 53506, hereby requests the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters to conduct an election under the provisions of Proposition 39 and the Act and submit to the electors of the District the question of whether bonds of the District in the aggregate principal amount of up to \$45,000,000 (the "Bonds") shall be issued and sold for the purpose of raising money for the projects described in Exhibits "A" and "B" hereto. Both exhibits are directed to be printed in the voter pamphlet. The District's Superintendent, or designee, is hereby authorized and directed to make any changes to the text of the measure, or to the abbreviated form of the measure, as may be convenient or necessary to comply with the intent of this Resolution, the requirements of election officials, and requirements of law.

Section 2. That the date of the election shall be June 2, 2026.

Section 3. That the purpose of the election shall be for the voters in the District to vote on a proposition, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A," incorporated by reference herein, and containing the question of whether the District shall issue the Bonds to pay for improvements to the extent permitted by such proposition. In compliance with Proposition 39 and the Act, the ballot propositions in Exhibits "A" and "B" are subject to the following requirements and determinations:

(a) the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds shall be used only for the purposes set forth in the ballot measure and not for any other purpose, including teacher or administrator salaries or other school operating expenses;

(b) that the Board, in establishing the projects set forth in Exhibit "B," evaluated student safety and security, class size reduction, and educational and information technology needs of the District;

(c) that the Board shall cause an annual, independent performance audit to be conducted to ensure that the Bond monies get spent only for the projects authorized in Exhibit "B" hereto;

(d) that the Board shall cause an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of Bonds to be conducted until all of the Bond proceeds have been expended;

(e) that the Board shall the appointment of a Citizens' Oversight Committee in compliance with Education Code Section 15278 no later than 60 days after the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code Section 15274. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall initially consist of at least seven (7) members and at no time consist of less than seven (7) members, with the possible exception of brief periods to fill any unexpected vacancies. The Citizens' Oversight Committee may not include any employee or official of the District or any vendor, contractor or consultant of the District. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall include all of the following: One (1) member who is active in a business organization representing the business community located within the District; One (1) member who is active in a senior citizens' organization; One member who is active in a bona fide taxpayer association; One (1) member who is a parent of a child in the District schools; One (1) member is both a parent of a child in the District schools and active in a school site council or PTA. In furtherance of its specifically enumerated purposes, the Citizens' Oversight

Committee may engage in any of the following activities relating solely and exclusively to the expenditure of the Proposition 39 bond proceeds:

(i) Receive and review copies of the annual, independent financial and performance audits performed by independent consultant(s);

(ii) Inspect District facilities and grounds to ensure that Proposition 39 bond revenues are expended in compliance with applicable law;

(iii) Receive and review copies of all deferred maintenance proposals or plans developed by the District;

(iv) Review efforts of the District to maximize Proposition 39 bond revenues by implementing cost-saving programs;

(v) Receive from the Board, within three months of District receiving the above-referenced audits, responses to any and all findings, recommendations, and concerns addressed in said audits, and review said responses; and

(f) that the tax levy authorized to secure the Bonds of this election shall not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per \$100,000 of taxable property in the District when assessed valuation is projected by the District to increase in accordance with Article XIII A of the California Constitution.

Section 4. That the authority for ordering the election is contained in Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.*, 15264 *et seq.*, and Government Code Section 53506.

Section 5. That the authority for the specifications of this election order is contained in Education Code Section 5322. In connection with ordering the election pursuant to the provisions cited above, the District has obtained reasonable and informed projections of assessed property valuations that take into consideration projections of assessed property valuations made by the County assessor that are available to the District.

Section 6. That the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters and the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors are hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other elections to be held on June 2, 2026 within the District. As provided in the Elections Code Section 10403, the District acknowledges that the consolidation election will be conducted in the manner described in Elections Code Section 10418.

Section 7. That the Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to deliver a certified copy of this Resolution to the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters no later than March 6, 2026.

Section 8. That Bonds may be issued pursuant to Section 15264 *et seq.* of the Education Code or pursuant to Government Code Section 53506. The maximum rate of interest on any Bond shall not exceed the maximum rate allowed by Education Code Sections 15140 to 15143, as modified by Government Code Section 53531.

Section 9. That the Board requests the governing body of any such other political subdivision, or any officer otherwise authorized by law, to partially or completely consolidate such election and to further provide that the canvass of the returns of the election be made by any body or


official authorized by law to canvass such returns, and that the Board consents to such consolidation. The Board further authorizes the submission of a tax rate statement and primary and rebuttal arguments, as appropriate, to be filed with the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters by the established deadlines.

Section 10. Pursuant to Education Code Section 5303 and Elections Code Section 10002, the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County is requested to permit the Registrar of Voters to render all services specified by Elections Code Section 10418 relating to the election, for which services the District agrees to reimburse Los Angeles County, such services to include the publication of a Formal Notice of School Bond Election and the mailing of the sample ballot and tax rate statement (described in Elections Code Section 9401) pursuant to the terms of Section 5363 of the Education Code and Elections Code Section 12112.

The Board of Education (“Board”) of the Little Lake School District is committed to continuing to repair aging classrooms, gas lines, leaking roofs, and providing safe drinking water and safe and clean classrooms for all students. To that end, the Board received input from teachers, staff and the community and evaluated the District’s urgent and critical facility needs, including the need for up-to-date technology, safety issues, class size reduction, computer and information technology, and updated a facilities plan presented to the Board on in developing the scope of projects to be funded. **Therefore, in approving this Project List, the Board of Education determines that the District must:**

- (i) **Continue to ensure that every student in the District learns in a classroom that is safe and clean; and**
- (ii) **Maintaining and enhancing student access to instruction in science, technology, engineering, the arts, and math; and**
- (iii) **Remove asbestos, mold and lead paint; and**
- (iv) **Improve emergency communication systems in neighborhood schools; and**
- (v) **Adhere to specific fiscal accountability safeguards such as:**
 - (a) **REQUIRE ALL FUNDS USED FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS,**
 - (b) **Prohibited the State from taking any of the funds raised,**
 - (c) **Require annual independent audits, and**
 - (d) **Require public disclosure of all spending.**

UPGRADE TECHNOLOGY:
District-Wide Technology Projects
To Provide a Competitive 21st Century Education

Goal and Purpose: This measure will ensure that all students continue to have access to computers and instructional technology in the classroom. It will provide funding for student learning tablets and computers, fix outdated electrical wiring, improve science, engineering, and computer instruction, and enhance Internet access. These investments will help the school district provide competitive twenty-first century learning at each school.

- Upgrade classroom technology.
- Repair aging electrical systems.
- **Improve student access to instruction in science, technology, engineering, the arts, and math.**

UPGRADE CLASSROOMS
District-Wide Projects to Upgrade Teaching & Learning Spaces
To Maintain Academic Excellence and a High Quality Education

Goal and Purpose: This measure will ensure that District students continue to receive education that has been recognized nationally for educational excellence.

- **Improve student access to instruction in science, technology, engineering, the arts, and math.**
- Upgrade teaching spaces to help retain and attract quality teachers.

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The listed projects will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency, and escalation for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the Project List; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, DSA oversight, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, upgrading classroom technology, expanding wireless internet access, acquire portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, information systems, printers, digital white boards, upgrade voice-over-IP, communication systems, enterprise software, licenses and warranties, audio/visual and telecommunications systems, call manager and network security/firewall, Internet connectivity, wireless systems, technology infrastructure, disaster recovery and business continuity infrastructure (secondary sites, backup systems, redundant connectivity), information security systems, such as security monitoring and incident response infrastructure, including logging, SIEM/SOC tools, endpoint security, and data loss prevention and other miscellaneous IT and instructional equipment, DATA storage, fiber/copper infrastructure, phones, identity access cards, acquire necessary software and the construction and installation of on-premises, cloud-based, or hybrid data center and related infrastructure for District enterprise systems, such as resource planning, websites, domain name systems, cloud applications and information security. The repair and improvement of school facilities includes the following types of projects: install, acquire or repair energy efficiency improvements for school buildings (including solar), energy efficient lighting, air conditioning, heating, insulation, window and ceiling systems; construct, upgrade, repair or install school site parking including solar systems and electric vehicle charging stations, campus accessibility, utilities, plumbing, gas lines, playground equipment, hard court surfaces, cracked concrete and asphalt, general site paving, learning walls, tack boards, cabinets, tutoring rooms, restrooms, roofs, interior and exterior lighting, water heaters, boilers, utilities sheds, walkway covers and casework, bell/clock systems, signage, electronic marquees, asphalt, fire sensors, shade structures, outdated fire safety and security systems, multipurpose rooms used for after-school programs, assemblies, sports, and performing arts, playgrounds, play areas, including turf and artificial turf; remove asbestos; repair and replace worn-out and deteriorated roofs, windows, walls, tackboards, floors, sinks, doors and drinking fountains/hydration stations; replace portables; renovate, upgrade or relocate site classrooms and administration buildings, staff lounges, upgrade and reconfigure parking lots and drop off/pick up zones and crosswalks to improve student safety; improve all site utilities; make facility improvements for earthquake safety; upgrade or construct support facilities including administrative, central kitchens, physical education, music, art, and performing and fine arts classrooms or facilities, science, robotics, computer labs/classrooms, career technical facilities, media centers/libraries and buildings; create student health and wellness centers; upgrade heating, ventilation, air purification systems, electrical wiring and associated systems; upgrade kitchens, food service and school cafeterias; construct various forms of storage and support spaces and classrooms; improve quads; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems and back-up power generators; renovate and paint interior and exterior building surfaces to extend their useful life; improve security, install safety, security, emergency and communication systems and equipment, windows and floor coverings (including tiles and carpeting); replace, construct and upgrade fences, including security fences and security systems (including access

control systems and cameras); build or upgrade irrigation and drainage systems; upgrade school offices, including furnishings; make improvements and acquire furnishings and/or other electronic equipment and systems.

The allocation of bond proceeds may be affected by the District's receipt of State matching funds and the final costs of each project. In the absence of State matching funds, which the District will aggressively pursue to reduce the District's share of the costs of the projects, the District may not be able to complete some of the projects listed above. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. Some projects throughout the District may be undertaken as joint use projects in cooperation with other local public or non-profit agencies. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of portable classrooms and existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable or modular classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation or drainage systems, traffic signals, sewer or utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, permits, or rights of way to the property.

Bond proceeds shall be expended only for the specific purposes identified herein. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to the bond projects. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY: IN ACCORDANCE WITH EDUCATION CODE SECTION 15272, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION WILL APPOINT A CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE AND CONDUCT ANNUAL INDEPENDENT AUDITS TO ASSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT ONLY ON DISTRICT PROJECTS AND FOR NO OTHER PURPOSE. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATION OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE ALLOWED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

No Administrator Salaries: Proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and school administrator salaries and other operating expenses. Bond funds shall not be temporarily transferred to the District's general fund for administrative purposes.
