**RECOMMENDATION TO TERMINATE THREE PROCLAIMED LOCAL EMERGENCIES AND
CONTINUE NINE PROCLAIMED LOCAL EMERGENCIES
(ALL AFFECTED) (3 VOTES)**

SUBJECT

The Chief Executive Office-Office of Emergency Management (CEO-OEM) is recommending the Board of Supervisors (Board) proclaim the termination of three local emergencies, which were proclaimed, respectively, on January 10, 2023 (Severe Winter Storms), December 10, 2024 (Franklin Fire), and February 19, 2025 (Winter Storm). In addition, the CEO-OEM is recommending the Board continue nine local emergencies, which were proclaimed, respectively, on May 10, 1990 (Fruit-Fly Infestation), January 10, 2023 (Homelessness), February 4, 2024 (Winter Storms), September 10, 2024 (Bridge Fire), December 17, 2024 (Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability), January 7, 2025 (January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events), October 14, 2025 (Federal Immigration Actions), November 21, 2025 (November 2025 Storm), and December 24, 2025 (Late December Winter Storm).

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Terminate Three Local Emergencies, which were proclaimed for the 2023 Severe Winter Storms, the 2024 Franklin Fire, and the 2025 Winter Storm.
2. Direct the CEO-OEM to forward a copy of the Resolution to Terminate Three Local Emergencies to the Director of the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services.
3. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Fruit-Fly Infestation.

4. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for Homelessness.
5. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Winter Storms.
6. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Bridge Fire.
7. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability.
8. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events.
9. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for Federal Immigration Actions.
10. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the November 2025 Storm.
11. Adopt and instruct the Chair of the Board to execute the attached Resolution to Continue the Local Emergency for the Late December Winter Storm.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

After a local emergency has been proclaimed by the Board, State law requires that the Board: (1) review the need for the local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated by the Board; and (2) proclaim the local emergency terminated at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant. CEO-OEM and the involved Los Angeles County (County) departments have reviewed the need for each of the referenced proclaimed local emergencies (as summarized below) and is recommending that three local emergencies be terminated and nine local emergencies be continued. This review included considerations of the extent to which the specified conditions for the proclaimed local emergencies (i.e., the conditions of disaster or extreme peril to the safety of person and property) are still existing; the ongoing need for emergency response and recovery operations; the ongoing need for Federal and/or State financial assistance; and the extent to which departments continue to engage in essential emergency-related activities that are dependent on the local emergency remaining in effect.

Terminating Proclaimed Local Emergencies

Based on a review of the above listed factors, CEO-OEM, in coordination with the involved County departments, is recommending that the Board find that, with respect to the following local emergencies, the conditions thereof warrant that the emergencies be terminated:

- The Severe Winter Storms, affecting the areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on January 10, 2023, and ratified by the Board on January 17, 2023.

- The Franklin Fire, affecting the areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on December 10, 2024, and ratified by the Board on December 10, 2024.
- The Winter Storm, affecting the areas throughout the County, as proclaimed on February 19, 2025, and ratified by the Board on February 25, 2025.

Continuing Proclaimed Local Emergencies

Based on a review of the above listed factors, CEO-OEM, in coordination with the involved County departments, is recommending that the Board find that, with respect to the following local emergencies, the conditions thereof warrant that the emergencies be continued:

- Discovery of an infestation of fruit flies in the County, as proclaimed by the Board on May 10, 1990.

The proclaimed local emergency for the Fruit-Fly Infestation has been in effect since May 10, 1990, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the infestation of fruit flies continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The infestation of fruit flies is an ongoing and persistent local emergency in the County, which continues to present a significant and clear threat to agriculture and the overall economy of the County. In addition to posing a threat to a wide variety of commercial crops, invasive fruit flies threaten loss and damage to the natural environment, including native plant species, private and public property, and food supplies. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the invasive fruit flies.

- Pervasive and pernicious homelessness in the County, as proclaimed by the Board on January 10, 2023.

The proclaimed local emergency for homelessness has been in effect since January 10, 2023, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by pervasive and pernicious homelessness continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

Homelessness is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions include a continuing high number of unsheltered homeless individuals and a critical threat to the physical and mental health and safety of those experiencing homelessness, as well as the public health and well-being of the surrounding community. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's response to mitigate these conditions include an initial focus on resolving encampments, addressing insufficient housing, and furnishing mental health and substance use disorder services. The County's emergency authorities related to the use of accelerated hiring, procurement, contracting, spending, housing, and services are critical to respond to homelessness in the County. Additionally, the combined forces of other jurisdictions are imperatively needed to combat the current conditions of homelessness, including coordinating resources and response efforts to resolve encampments and find housing solutions. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of pervasive and pernicious homelessness.

- Winter Storms as proclaimed on February 4, 2024, and ratified by the Board on February 6, 2024.

The proclaimed local emergency for the Winter Storms has been in effect since February 4, 2024, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the Winter Storms continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The Winter Storms are an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included high winds, substantial precipitation, closure and damage to highways and roads, evacuation warnings in areas impacted by burn scars, potential for significant debris flows, river and urban flooding, land movement incidents, widespread power outages, and other significant damage to property within the County. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the Winter Storms have included extensive debris removal, necessary repairs to damaged highways and roads, and other property. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Winter Storms.

- Bridge Fire as proclaimed on September 10, 2024, and ratified by the Board on September 17, 2024.

The proclaimed local emergency for the Bridge Fire has been in effect since September 10, 2024, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the Bridge Fire continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

Bridge Fire is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included an ongoing response to the fire and post-fire hazards, such as the risk of flooding, debris flows, and mudslides from the burn area. With the scale of the Bridge Fire, flooding could extend far into downstream communities. Within or below the burned area boundaries are facilities of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, which provide critical flood and debris flow mitigation; water supply facilities of the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts; sewer facilities of the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District; County and State roads and appurtenant infrastructure; and numerous homes and businesses. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the Bridge Fire have included necessary repairs to damaged roads, bridges, flood control infrastructure, and other property, as well as other necessary responsive measures. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may utilize emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Bridge Fire.

- Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency as proclaimed by the Board on December 17, 2024.

The proclaimed local emergency for the Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency has been in effect since December 17, 2024, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the Los Padrinos

Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have been caused and/or exacerbated by the efforts of the Board of State and Community Corrections to close Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall (LPJH) and release the youth who are alleged to have committed serious crimes into the public. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's response to mitigate these conditions include, among other things, utilizing Disaster Service Workers (DSW) within LPJH, consistent with the DSW's skills and training; expediting the procurement and contracting processes for materials, equipment, and services necessary to respond rapidly to the local emergency at LPJH; expediting recruitment and hiring for positions necessary to respond to the local emergency at LPJH, including any actions needed to quickly reduce vacancy levels for positions providing supervision, medical and mental health, programming, substance use disorder, religious, and case management services directly to youth housed at LPJH; and expeditiously processing return-to-work matters at LPJH. Additionally, the combined forces of other jurisdictions are imperatively needed to combat the current conditions at LPJH, including the need for mutual aid. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency.

- January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events as proclaimed on January 7, 2025, and ratified by the Board on January 14, 2025.

The proclaimed local emergency for the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events has been in effect since January 7, 2025, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events are an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included an ongoing response to a number of destructive and wind-driven fires, which include, among others, the Palisades Fire, Eaton Fire, Hurst Fire, Creek Fire, Lidia Fire, and the Kenneth Fire, and post-fire hazards, such as the risk of flooding, debris flows, rock falls, and mudslides from the burn area. These catastrophic events have caused loss of life, widespread damage, and destruction to residential structures, businesses, and infrastructure, power outages, downed trees, road closures, rockslides, and significant debris. With the scale of these fires throughout the County, flooding could extend far into downstream communities. Within or below the burned area boundaries are facilities of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, which provide critical flood and debris flow mitigation; water supply facilities of the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts; sewer facilities of the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District; County and State roads and appurtenant infrastructure; and numerous homes and businesses. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events have included necessary repairs to damaged roads, bridges, flood control and water infrastructure, and other property, as well as other necessary responsive measures. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may

utilize emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the January 2025 Windstorm and Critical Fire Events.

- Federal Immigration Actions Emergency as proclaimed by the Board on October 14, 2025.

The proclaimed local emergency for Federal Immigration Actions has been in effect since October 14, 2025, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by federal immigration enforcement actions continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

Federal immigration enforcement actions are an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions include indiscriminate immigration raids by the federal government, which have destabilized entire neighborhoods, leading to long-term harm to workers, families, and businesses. In addition, heightened community fear has led to widespread disruption in daily life and adverse impacts to the County's regional economy due to decreased attendance at workplaces, the temporary or permanent closure of businesses and restaurants, and increased strain on the County's local institutions such as schools, hospitals, and places of worship, disruption of public services, and displacement of families, including minors and other vulnerable populations. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's response to mitigate these impacts includes providing individual financial support and access to resources, as well as other responsive actions. By continuing the local emergency, the County may utilize emergency measures to mitigate the impacts of the federal immigration enforcement actions.

- November 2025 Storm as proclaimed on November 21, 2025, and ratified by the Board on November 25, 2025.

The proclaimed local emergency for the November 2025 Storm has been in effect since November 21, 2025, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the November 2025 Storm continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The November 2025 Storm is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included high winds, substantial precipitation, and thunderstorm activity, closure and damage to highways and roads, evacuation orders and warnings in areas impacted by burn scars, significant debris flows, river and urban flooding, land movement incidents, widespread power outages, and other significant damage to property within the County. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the November 2025 Storm have included extensive debris removal, necessary repairs to damaged highways and roads, and other property. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the November 2025 Storm.

- Late December Winter Storm as proclaimed on December 24, 2025, and ratified by the Board on December 31, 2025.

The proclaimed local emergency for the Late December Winter Storm has been in effect since December 24, 2025, and continued by the Board thereafter. At this time, conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by the Late December Winter Storm

continue to exist; this warrants the local emergency being continued by the Board.

The Late December Winter Storm is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included high winds, substantial precipitation, potential tornado and thunderstorm activity, closure and damage to highways and roads, evacuation orders and warnings in areas impacted by burn scars, debris flows, river and urban flooding, land movement incidents, widespread power outages, and other significant damage to property within the County. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the Late December Winter Storm have included extensive debris removal, necessary repairs to damaged highways and roads, and other property. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Late December Winter Storm.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: North Star 2 – Foster Vibrant and Resilient Communities, Focus Area A – Public Health, Strategy i - Population Based Health.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There is no fiscal impact related to the continuance of these local emergencies, but the proclamations of local emergencies could allow the County to seek recovery of eligible costs from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and State of California. The County will incur costs associated with the response to and recovery from the local emergencies.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Government Code Section 8630(c) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to review the need for a proclaimed local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated by the Board. Government Code Section 8630(d) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to terminate a proclaimed local emergency at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

This action is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because it is excluded from the definition of project under section 15378(b)(5) of the State CEQA Guidelines.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

None.

**RESOLUTION BY THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO PROCLAIM THE TERMINATION
OF THREE LOCAL EMERGENCIES -
JANUARY 10, 2023, SEVERE WINTER STORMS;
DECEMBER 10, 2024, FRANKLIN FIRE; AND FEBRUARY 19, 2025, WINTER STORM**

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code, the existence of a local emergency was proclaimed on January 10, 2023 and ratified by the Board of Supervisors (Board) on January 17, 2023 due to conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the Severe Winter Storms, affecting areas throughout the County of Los Angeles (County); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code, the existence of a local emergency was proclaimed on December 10, 2024 and ratified by the Board on December 10, 2024 due to conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the Franklin Fire, affecting areas throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code, the existence of a local emergency was proclaimed on February 19, 2025 and ratified by the Board on February 25, 2025 due to conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the Winter Storm, affecting areas throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code and Government Code Section 8630(d) provide that the Board terminate a proclaimed local emergency at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant; and

WHEREAS, with respect to the above local emergencies initially proclaimed on January 10, 2023, December 10, 2024, and February 19, 2025, respectively, and thereafter continued, the Board has reviewed the need to continue the three aforementioned emergencies and determined conditions relating thereto are such that it is warranted that such local emergencies be terminated; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles that the above local emergencies are proclaimed terminated.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that any and all emergency orders or regulations relating to the above local emergencies, which may have been issued pursuant to Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code and Government Code Section 8634, are no longer in effect.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Director of California Governor's Office of Emergency Services.

RESOLUTION BY THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO CONTINUE THE LOCAL EMERGENCY FOR THE INFESTATION OF THE FRUIT FLIES

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code, the existence of a local emergency was proclaimed on May 10, 1990 by the Board of Supervisors (Board), and continued thereafter, due to conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the discovery of an infestation of fruit flies in the County of Los Angeles (County); and

WHEREAS, the infestation of fruit flies is an ongoing and persistent local emergency in the County, which continues to present a significant and clear threat to agriculture and the overall economy of the County. In addition to posing a threat to a wide variety of commercial crops, invasive fruit flies threaten loss and damage to the natural environment, including native plant species, private and public property, and food supplies. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. By continuing the local emergency, the County may utilize emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the invasive fruit flies; and

WHEREAS, there continues to exist conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property on the basis of the infestation of the fruit flies in the County, which are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 8630(c) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to review the need for a proclaimed local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated by the Board; and

WHEREAS, the Board has reviewed the need to continue the local emergency for the infestation of the fruit flies, which was initially proclaimed on May 10, 1990, and continued thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the Board determines there continues to exist conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the local emergency for the infestation of the fruit flies such that continuation of this local emergency is warranted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles that the local emergency due to the discovery of an infestation of fruit flies in the County continues to exist and is hereby extended for sixty (60) additional days, unless sooner terminated by the Board.

The foregoing resolution was on the *19th* day of *May* 2026, adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles and ex officio the governing body of all other special assessment and taxing districts, agencies and authorities for which said Board so acts.

WHEREAS, homelessness is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions include a continuing high number of unsheltered homeless individuals and a critical threat to the physical and mental health and safety of those experiencing homelessness, as well as the public health and well-being of the surrounding community. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's response to mitigate these conditions includes an initial focus on resolving encampments, addressing insufficient housing, and furnishing mental health and substance use disorder services. The County's emergency authorities related to the use of accelerated hiring, procurement, contracting, spending, housing and services are critical to respond to homelessness in the County. WHEREAS, there continues to exist conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property on the basis of pervasive and pernicious homelessness in the County, which are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 8630(c) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to review the need for a proclaimed local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated by the Board; and

WHEREAS, the Board has reviewed the need to continue the local emergency for homelessness, which was initially proclaimed on January 10, 2023, and continued thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the Board determines there continues to exist conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the local emergency for homelessness such that continuation of this local emergency is warranted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles that the local emergency due to pervasive and pernicious homelessness in the County continues to exist and is hereby extended for sixty (60) additional days, unless sooner terminated by the Board.

WHEREAS, there continues to be conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the winter storms in the County, which are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code, the existence of a local emergency was proclaimed on September 10, 2024, and ratified by the Board of Supervisors (Board) on September 17, 2024, due to conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the Bridge Fire, beginning on September 8, 2024, affecting areas throughout the County of Los Angeles (County); and

WHEREAS, the Bridge Fire, beginning on September 8, 2024, is an ongoing local emergency in the County, whose conditions have included an ongoing response to the fire and post-fire hazards, such as the risk of flooding, debris flows, and mudslides from the burn area. These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. The County's efforts to respond to and mitigate the impacts of the Bridge Fire have included necessary repairs to damaged roads, bridges, flood control infrastructure, and other property, as well as other necessary responsive measures. The local emergency provides the County with the ability to continue its efforts to assess costs and damages and perform significant repairs to damaged property within the County. By continuing the local emergency, the County may utilize emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Bridge Fire; and

WHEREAS, there continues to be conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the Bridge Fire in the County, which are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat; and



WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code, the existence of a local emergency was proclaimed by the Board of Supervisors (Board) on December 17, 2024, due to conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency, beginning on December 12, 2024, affecting areas throughout the County of Los Angeles (County); and

The County's response to mitigate these conditions include, among other things, utilizing Disaster Service Workers (DSW) within LPJH, consistent with the DSW's skills and training; expediting the procurement and contracting processes for materials, equipment, and services necessary to respond rapidly to the local emergency at LPJH; expediting recruitment and hiring for positions necessary to respond to the local emergency at LPJH, including any actions needed to quickly reduce vacancy levels for positions providing supervision, medical and mental health, programming, substance use disorder, religious, and case management services directly to youth housed at LPJH; and expeditiously processing return-to-work matters at LPJH. Additionally, the combined forces of other jurisdictions are imperatively needed to combat the current conditions at LPJH, including the need for mutual aid. By continuing the local emergency, the County may use emergency measures and resources to mitigate the impacts of the Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency; and

WHEREAS, there continues to be conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property arising from the Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall Suitability Emergency in the County, which are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 8630(c) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to review the need for a proclaimed local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated by the Board; and

These conditions are or are likely to be beyond the control of the resources of the County and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat. WHEREAS, since October 14, 2025, there continues to exist conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property as a result of the federal government immigration actions in the County, which are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the County, and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat; and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 8630(c) and Chapter 2.68 of the Los Angeles County Code require the Board to review the need for a proclaimed local emergency to remain in effect at least once every 60 days, until it is terminated; and
