**SUBJECT**

The County of Los Angeles (County), through the Los Angeles County Department of Arts and Culture, invests in diverse communities through the Community Impact Arts Grant (CIAG). In this tenth year of awards, CIAG provides arts programming grants to advance the organizational missions and values of County social service and social justice nonprofits and municipalities, enabling these organizations to deliver a wide variety of cultural services to County residents that support arts and culture throughout the region. Grants to organizations providing mental health, disability, environmental, homeless, immigrant rights, youth and veteran services broaden the contexts in which arts are accessed for County residents who may not receive arts programming through traditional outlets, offering the opportunity to experience a range of artistic disciplines including, but not limited to, visual and media arts, performance, dance and music.

**IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT YOUR BOARD:**

1. Approve the CIAG program grants to 87 nonprofit organizations at a total cost of \$500,000 for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2026-27.
2. Find that the expenditure of said funds is necessary to meet the social needs of the County and the programs funded thereby will serve a public purpose.
3. Delegate authority to the Department of Arts and Culture Director, or her designee, to prepare, execute, and amend, as necessary, grant agreements, approved as to form by County Counsel, to implement the 2026-27 CIAG program.
4. Delegate authority to the Department of Arts and Culture Director, or her designee, to reallocate forfeited grant awards, not to exceed \$50,000, to existing Board-approved grantee organizations and instruct the Department

of Arts and Culture Director, or her designee, to amend these grant agreements accordingly.

5. Find that the proposed projects are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the records of the projects.

### **PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION**

Approval of the recommended actions will find that these projects are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act and allow the Los Angeles County Department of Arts and Culture (Department of Arts and Culture) to disburse the \$500,000 grant funds allocated by your Board. During the 2026-27 FY cycle, 87 eligible organizations applied for project funding totaling \$1,475,030 in maximum fundable requests (panel score multiplied by total amount requested.) The Department's Grants staff deftly managed the application and panel review selection process. In conclusion, 87 organizations are recommended for awards totaling \$500,000 which is the total funding allocated to the CIAG program for the year. All award amounts recommended as part of this action are for one year.

The Department of Arts and Culture has found that CIAG grants are serving a wide variety of populations and communities underserved by the arts as measured by specific populations, race and ethnicity, and poverty rates. Moreover, the constituencies reached through CIAG and Organizational Grant Program (OGP) are distinct and, combined, both programs serve LA County residents. CIAG grantees serve diverse communities in terms of race and ethnicity and significantly more communities where more than a quarter of the population earns less than the federal poverty level. Foster youth, individuals experiencing homelessness, currently or formerly incarcerated individuals, individuals with disabilities, low-income individuals, immigrants, veterans, and youth in afterschool programs are all being served by CIAG grantees, and many CIAG organizations are located in areas identified by the Portrait of LA County as "struggling" as evidenced by the level of local disparities. The Department's grants support the goals of the Countywide Cultural Policy adopted by your Board.

The Board's ongoing investment in the CIAG program ensures that a wide variety of cultural services reach County residents in ways that are distinct and complementary to the services provided by OGP grantees. Additionally, the program supports the meaningful role of arts and culture in social service and social justice organizations in our most underserved areas. Overall, the findings show that CIAG is achieving a critical goal set out by the Board of Supervisors to expand the ways we serve and invest in arts, and our communities, particularly those that have been historically and systemically marginalized.

### **FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING**

Funding for CIAG is included in the Department of Arts and Culture's FY 2026-27 Adopted budget.

### **IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIC PLAN GOALS**

The recommended actions support Countywide Strategic Plan Goal North Star 2: *Foster vibrant and resilient communities*. Investments in the lives of County residents are sustainable only when grounded in strong communities. LA County, with the support of a network of public/private partners, faith-based organizations, community-based organizations, philanthropic organizations, and local governments, will foster vibrant and resilient communities. By investing in our communities and creating public spaces and programs that are welcoming, accessible, where all residents can easily build relationships, create social

networks, feel connected and can access opportunities. Investments in arts and culture, and the nonprofit community-based organizations of the sector, serve to advance these goals.

### **FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS**

The Department of Arts and Culture utilized peer panels organized by organizational budget size to review and score all applications and to make recommendations to the Arts Commissioners. The Arts Commission reviewed these scores and allocations at their meeting on April 27, 2026 and voted to approve the funding recommendations for submission to your Board for approval.

Grant amounts are awarded utilizing a formula adopted by the Department of Arts and Culture that factors in panel scores. Scores are determined by evaluating the proposed program's artistic merit, services to community, evaluation methodology and fiscal and administrative competence. Applicants were able to request between \$5,000 and \$20,000 for projects. Given available funding, organizations that scored 70 or higher out of a maximum possible score of 100 points will receive an average of approximately \$5,747 which represents approximately 34% of their maximum fundable request amounts. This is less than the 56% of request amount organizations received in the 2024-25 funding cycle, due to a \$250,000 reduction to the CIAG allocation representing a 33% cut to the program, as part of the County's Net County Cost (NCC) budget curtailments departments were instructed to implement and which remains in place.

Upon notification of a forfeited FY 2026-27 CIAG grant award, the Department of Arts and Culture will reallocate the forfeited funds to existing Board-approved grantee organizations. The reallocation will be approved by the Arts Commission.

The County is authorized to contract with any firm or corporation for artistic services for the residents of Los Angeles County pursuant to Government Code sections 25562 and 26227. The contractor (grantee) will be governed by the policy and guideline requirements of the Department of Arts and Culture. Grantees are defined as nonprofit 501(c)(3) organizations, tribal governments, or municipal departments with missions to provide services other than arts programming for the benefit of the public.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The recommended actions are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to sections 15301, 15304(e), 15322, and 15323 of the CEQA Guidelines. The CIAG programs 1) utilize existing facilities making either minor or negligible alterations to the environment; 2) make minor alterations to land having negligible or no permanent effects on the environment; 3) involve educational or training programs with no physical outdoor alterations to the environment; or 4) consist of normal operations of facilities for public gatherings. In addition, based on the proposed projects records, they will comply with all applicable regulations, and they are not in a sensitive environment, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code section 65962.5, or indications that they may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make any of the exemption inapplicable.

### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

The Department of Arts and Culture held an open process for grant applications. Grant applications were reviewed by a community panel of peers and the resulting scores were reviewed by the Arts Commission. Grant awards were determined by a formula utilizing the panel scores. The County will pay the contractor (grantee), in consideration of services to be performed and fulfillment of matching requirements, a specific grant award sum (see BOS Attachment Pg. 1-7).

**IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The Community Impact Arts Grant program expands the County's services to reach diverse constituents and recognizes the value of the arts as a vital tool for cross-sector and civic problem solving across a range of issue areas and supports arts programming taking place at nonprofit social service, social justice, health organizations and municipal departments as part of their larger missions to provide services to individuals and communities. This program ensures that a wide variety of cultural services will continue to reach County residents and positively impact them through increased opportunities for arts activities in various contexts, such as mental health, homelessness, youth and social justice. The proposed grantee organizations are located throughout LA County with programs and services provided in all five supervisorial districts.
