Re: Inglewood Unified School District November 3, 2026 Bond Measure Election

Dear Mr. Logan and Mr. Yen,

Enclosed please a resolution of the County Administrator of the Inglewood Unified School District: "RESOLUTION OF THE COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR OF THE INGLEWOOD UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ORDERING AN ELECTION, AND ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER" adopted on July 23, 2026 calling for a November 3, 2026 local bond election. This Resolution orders a Proposition 39 election which requires 55% voter approval to be successful.

In accordance with Section 1 of the Resolution, I am authorized to advise you that the ballot measure language to be placed on the ballot is set forth in Exhibit A to the Resolution and the full text of the ballot measure to be printed in its entirety in the sample ballot/voter pamphlet is set forth in Exhibit B to the Resolution. In accordance with Section 6 of the Resolution, we request that you consolidate the election on the bond measures with the general election being held on November 3, 2026. We further request that the Los Angeles County Counsel's office prepare the impartial analysis to be included in the sample ballot/voter pamphlet.

Also enclosed is the Tax Rate Statement for the measure to be used in connection with the election which has been prepared in accordance with Elections Code Sections 9400 to 9404 and is to be included in the sample ballot/voter pamphlet, together with a completed Letter Designation Form for the measure.

By this letter we are formally requesting to review a proof of the ballot statement language, the full text of the ballot proposition, impartial analysis and ballot arguments that would appear in the voter pamphlet prior to publishing. Please direct this proof to the undersigned as soon as it is available.

We believe that Education Code Section 15122.5 is applicable and we request that the County be included the following "State Matching Funds" language in the ballot or voter pamphlet:

"Approval of Measure _____ does not guarantee that the proposed project or projects in the Inglewood Unified School District that are the subject of bonds under Measure _____ will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by Measure _____. The district's proposal for the project or projects may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure."

We would be more than willing to provide you with the Resolution and the Tax Rate Statement in an electronic format in order to facilitate your work, or to assist with this process in any other manner.

We have further request a signature on the next page from the Registrar's office acknowledging receipt of the Resolution.

RESOLUTION OF THE COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR OF
THE INGLEWOOD UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the County Administrator (the "County Administrator") and the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Inglewood Unified School District (the "District") are committed to maintaining the quality of education in local public schools; and

WHEREAS, many of our local schools were built in the 1920s and 30s and are in urgent need of basic health and safety repairs, and a local bond measure would provide funding to remove asbestos, lead paint and mold, provide safe drinking water and repair broken or deteriorating plumbing, gas lines, roofs, and heating, ventilation and air-conditioning systems;

WHEREAS, a local measure would allow the District to expand and upgrade vocational education and job training programs in high-need fields such as nursing and other medical careers, skilled trades, robotics and engineering so that students, including those whose paths do not lead to college, can learning the skills necessary to get good paying jobs and have more economic opportunities; and

WHEREAS, such measure will ensure our classrooms and technology are up-to-date to attract and retain high-qualify teachers and staff; and

WHEREAS, investing in local schools benefits everyone by strengthening the community and improving property values, even for residents who do not have school-age children; and

WHEREAS, the State of California (the "State") has been unable to provide the District with enough money for the District to adequately repair schools and upgrade classrooms to provide an optimal learning environment for all students; and

WHEREAS, schools in the District have less funding that schools in some other nearby community and, with federal budget cuts threatening many of the students served by the District, having dedicated local funding to provide cleaner, safer and more up-to-date schools is more important than ever; and

WHEREAS, the District has identified the most pressing needs in each of the District's schools to provide safe and modern classroom environments for all students; and

WHEREAS, the County Administrator and the Board have received information regarding the possibility of a local bond measure and its bonding capacity; and

WHEREAS, many of our schools have outdated security and safety features, and a local measure would allow many of our local schools make basic security upgrades to aging smoke alarms and fire safety systems, and inadequate lighting, fencing and emergency communications systems; and

WHEREAS, such measure shall provide for a complete public disclosure of all spending, independent annual financial and performance audits, and the formation of a committee of

local citizens and business owners to review all spending to ensure funds are spent as promised, and no funds are spent on impermissible administrator salaries; and

WHEREAS, such measure shall provide that funds can only be spent on local schools and cannot be taken by Sacramento, the County or the federal government; and

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2000, the voters of California approved the Smaller Classes, Safer Schools and Financial Accountability Act ("Proposition 39") which reduced the voter threshold for *ad valorem* property tax levies used to pay for debt service on bonded indebtedness to 55% of the votes cast on a school district general obligation bond measure; and

WHEREAS, concurrent with the passage of Proposition 39, Chapter 1.5, Part 10, Division 1, Title 1 (commencing with Section 15264) of the Education Code (the "Act") became operative and established requirements associated with the implementation of Proposition 39; and

WHEREAS, the County Administrator desires to make certain findings herein to be applicable to this election order and to establish certain performance audits, standards of financial accountability and citizen oversight that are contained in Proposition 39 and the Act; and

WHEREAS, the District has conducted a comprehensive assessment of school facilities needs and identified the most urgent and high-priority facilities needs impacting academic instruction and student safety; and

WHEREAS, the County Administrator desires to authorize the submission of a proposition to the District's voters at an election to authorize the issuance of bonds to pay for certain necessary improvements and enhancements to District educational facilities which will improve the safety, health, and quality of education for students in the District; and

WHEREAS, the County Administrator hereby determines that, in accordance with Opinion No. 04-110 of the Attorney General of the State of California, the restrictions in Proposition 39 which prohibit any bond money from being wasted or used for inappropriate administrative salaries or other operating expenses of the District shall be strictly monitored by the District's Citizens' Oversight Committee; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 15270, based upon a projection of assessed property valuation, the County Administrator has determined that, if approved by voters, the tax rate levied to meet the debt service requirements of the bonds proposed to be issued for school facility improvements will not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per year per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of taxable property; and

WHEREAS, Elections Code Section 9400 *et seq.* requires that a tax rate statement be contained in all official materials relating to the election, including any ballot pamphlet prepared, sponsored, or distributed by the District; and

WHEREAS, the County Administrator desires to authorize the filing of a tax rate statement and a ballot argument in favor of the proposition to be submitted to the voters at the election; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Elections Code, it is appropriate for the County Administrator to request consolidation of the election with any and all other elections to be held on Tuesday,

November 3, 2026, and to request the Registrar of Voters of Los Angeles County to perform certain election services for the District; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Senate Bill (SB) 533, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction (the “State Superintendent”) previously assumed the exercise of all legal rights, duties and powers of the Board; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to SB 533, the State Superintendent delegated the exercise of such rights, duties and powers to the County Administrator; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Assembly Bill (AB) 1840, the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools (the “County Superintendent”) has assumed all legal rights, duties and powers of the Board, and the County Administrator now reports directly to the County Superintendent; and

WHEREAS, the County Administrator continues to validly exercise all rights, duties and powers of the Board, including such rights, duties and powers as are relevant and necessary to carry out the actions contemplated hereby.

NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR OF THE INGLEWOOD UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the County Administrator, pursuant to Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.*, 15264 *et seq.*, and Government Code Section 53506, hereby requests the Registrar of Voters of Los Angeles County (the “County”) to conduct an election under the provisions of Proposition 39 and the Act and submit to the electors of the District the question of whether bonds of the District in the aggregate principal amount of \$396,000,000 (the “Bonds”) shall be issued and sold for the purpose of raising money for the projects described in Exhibits “A” and “B” hereto. Both exhibits are directed to be printed in the voter pamphlet. The County Administrator, or designee thereof, is hereby authorized and directed to make any changes to the text of the measure, or to the abbreviated form of the measure, as may be convenient or necessary to comply with the intent of this Resolution, the requirements of election officials, and requirements of law.

Section 2. That the date of the election shall be November 3, 2026.

Section 3. That the purpose of the election shall be for the voters in the District to vote on a proposition, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit “A,” incorporated by reference herein, and containing the question of whether the District shall issue the Bonds to pay for improvements to the extent permitted by such proposition. In compliance with Proposition 39 and the Act, the ballot propositions in Exhibits “A” and “B” are subject to the following requirements and determinations:

(a) that the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds shall be used only for the purposes set forth in the ballot measure and not for any other purpose, including teacher or administrator salaries or other school operating expenses;

(b) that the County Administrator, in establishing the projects set forth in Exhibit “B,” evaluated the safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs of the District;

(c) that the District shall cause an annual, independent performance audit to be conducted to ensure that the Bond monies get spent only for the projects identified in Exhibit "B" hereto;

(d) that the District shall cause an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of Bonds to be conducted until all of the Bond proceeds, and interest earnings thereon, have been fully expended;

(e) that the County Administrator shall authorize the appointment of a Citizens' Oversight Committee in compliance with Education Code Section 15278 no later than 60 days after the County Administrator enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code Section 15274. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall initially consist of at least seven (7) members and at no time consist of less than seven (7) members, with the possible exception of periods to fill any vacancies. The Citizens' Oversight Committee may not include any employee or official of the District or any vendor, contractor or consultant of the District. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall include all of the following: One (1) member who is active in a business organization representing the business community located within the District; One (1) member who is active in a senior citizens' organization; One member who is active in a bona fide taxpayer association; One (1) member who is a parent of a child in the District schools; One (1) member is both a parent of a child in the District schools and active in a school site council or PTA. In furtherance of its specifically enumerated purposes, the Citizens' Oversight Committee may engage in any of the following activities relating solely and exclusively to the expenditure of the Proposition 39 bond proceeds:

(i) Receive and review copies of the annual, independent financial and performance audits performed by independent consultant(s);

(ii) Inspect District facilities and grounds to ensure that Proposition 39 bond revenues are expended in compliance with applicable law;

(iii) Receive and review copies of all deferred maintenance proposals or plans developed by the District;

(iv) Review efforts of the District to maximize Proposition 39 bond revenues by implementing cost-saving programs;

(v) Receive from the District, within three months of receiving the above-referenced audits, responses to any and all findings, recommendations, and concerns addressed in said audits, and review said responses; and

(f) that the tax levy authorized to secure the Bonds of this election shall not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per \$100,000 of taxable property in the District when assessed valuation is projected by the District to increase in accordance with Article XIII A of the California Constitution.

Section 4. That the authority for ordering the election is contained in Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.*, 15264 *et seq.*, and Government Code Section 53506.

Section 5. That the authority for the specifications of this election order is contained in Education Code Section 5322. In connection with ordering the election pursuant to the provisions

FULL TEXT BALLOT PROPOSITION OF THE INGLEWOOD UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND MEASURE ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 2026

The following is the full proposition presented to the voters by the Inglewood Unified School District.

Inglewood Unified School District Safety, Repair, Upgrade Measure.

To repair/upgrade classrooms/labs including science, engineering, career/skilled trades to help recruit/retain teachers; repair deteriorating gas lines; remove asbestos, lead paint, mold; provide safe drinking water; construct, repair equip sites, facilities; shall Inglewood Unified School District's measure authorizing \$396,000,000 in bonds, at legal rates, levying \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (\$26,000,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, be adopted, requiring oversight, audits, spending disclosure, all funds for local schools?

PROJECT LIST

The Board of Education and County Administrator of the Inglewood Unified School District have determined that the District's public schools, many of which were built in the 1920s and 30s, are in **urgent need of basic health and safety repairs**. To that end, the Board evaluated the District's critical facility needs, including safety issues, class size reduction, computer and information technology in developing the types of projects to be funded by this measure as described below.

In approving this Project List, the **Board of Education and the County Administrator determine that the District must:**

- (i) **Provide safe drinking water; and**
- (ii) **Improve and modernize school facilities to recruit and retain quality teachers; and**
- (iii) **Keep schools safe and clean; and**
- (iv) **Adhere to specific fiscal accountability safeguards such as:**
 - (a) **Complete public disclosure of all spending shall be required;**
 - (b) **Prohibit Sacramento, the State or the federal government from taking any of the funds;**
 - (c) **Require annual independent financial and performance audits; and**
 - (d) **Every dollar must be used to upgrade local schools and cannot be used for inappropriate administrator salaries, pensions or benefits.**

The Project List includes the following types of upgrades and improvements at District schools, facilities and sites:

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION AND SKILLED TRADES
Local Funding to Provide a 21st Century Education

Goals and Purpose: This measure will create our own local source of funding and community investment to help train our students for careers in health, emergency medical response, skilled trades, robotics and engineering and other in-demand careers. This helps students, including those whose paths do not lead to college, to learn the skills necessary to get good-paying jobs and have more economic opportunity. Schools in the District have less funding than schools in some other nearby communities, and the federal government continues to threaten cuts to education funding. Local funding helps protect against unpredictable federal decisions, provides cleaner, safer and more up-to-date schools and helps retain and attract quality teachers to provide 21st century education to our young people.

- **Improve vocational and college and career preparation classrooms and facilities**
- **Ensure accessibility for disabled students**
- **Repair and upgrade computer, engineering and science classrooms and labs**
- **Improve instructional and classroom technology for 21st century learning**
- **Improve security camera systems and equipment**
- **Upgrade early childhood educational classrooms and facilities**

LOCALLY CONTROLLED FUNDING FOR BASIC IMPROVEMENTS
School Repair, Safety and Upgrade Projects

Goals and Purpose: Many of our local public schools were built in the 1920s and 30s and are in urgent need of basic health and safety repairs. This measure will provide funding to remove asbestos, lead paint and mold, provide safe drinking water and repair broken plumbing, bathrooms, gas lines, leaky roofs and heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems. In addition, many of our local schools have outdated security and safety features, including smoke alarms and fire safety and communications systems, and inadequate lighting and fencing. This measure will allow our schools to make basic security upgrades that treat our young people with respect and keep students and teachers safe.

- **Repair deteriorating gas lines and heating, ventilation and cooling systems**
- **Remove asbestos, lead paint and mold**
- **Repair and upgrade deteriorating roofs**
- **Improve classrooms for children with special needs**

- Improve fire safety systems
- **Repair and upgrade deteriorating plumbing and restrooms**
- Repair outdated and deteriorating electrical systems and wiring

In addition to the projects listed above, the repair and renovation of each of the existing school and District support facilities may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: add or renovate student and staff restrooms; repair, replace and upgrade electrical systems and technology infrastructure; construct or contribute to teacher and staff housing; upgrade of facilities for energy efficiencies, electrical generation and financial savings, including photovoltaic/solar installations and battery energy storage; repair, upgrade, and replace worn-out and deteriorated roofs, gutters, windows, walls, tackboards, floors, sinks, doors and drinking fountains/hydration stations; construct or renovate offices and facilities for multipurpose and indoor/outdoor learning spaces, more efficient areas for professional development and administration and for the safety of students on campuses; retrofitting of classrooms for earthquake safety; install wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices; upgrade, replace or construct support facilities including central plants, boilers, administrative, college and career counseling, central kitchens, physical education, music, art, and performing and fine arts classrooms or facilities, wood and metal shops, science, robotics, STEM/STEAM labs/classrooms, computer labs/classrooms, career technical classrooms and facilities, makerspaces, culinary arts facilities, playgrounds, media centers/libraries and buildings, covered eating areas, shade and rain shelter, covered walkways, transportation and maintenance facilities and yards; acquire modular/portable classrooms; repair, upgrade and replace fire and intrusion alarms, emergency communications, public address, speaker, and security systems; including security protections on windows, improve facilities to satisfy seismic requirements; as needed, removal of hazardous materials like asbestos, mold, and lead paint from older schools, as needed; improve/resurface or replace asphalt, broken concrete, irrigation, and downspout drainage systems and campus landscaping; install and improve signage, wayfinding, solar electric systems and fencing; upgrade or expand parking and improve pick-up and drop-off areas and crosswalks; improve all site utilities; upgrade or construct new school buildings and sites; upgrade or replace interior and exterior painting, floor covering, including carpets, and school facades; demolition; upgrade kitchens, food service and school cafeterias; construct various forms of storage and support spaces and classrooms; improve quads; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems and back-up power generators; improve, construct, or replace athletic fields/stadiums, fieldhouse, concessions, bleachers, lockers/locker rooms, weight rooms, field lighting, gymnasiums, and other facilities to support student health, fitness and safety; construct or upgrade aquatic facilities, pools, including pool filtration systems, plaster and decking; repair, install and replace outdated fences, including security fences and security systems (including access control systems, electronic locks, and cameras), provide lunch shelters, indoor space for assemblies or for rainy day lunch; upgrade and construct music labs, multi-purpose rooms, theatres, learning centers and media centers; and add electric vehicle charging stations. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the Project List; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, DSA oversight, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects.

The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, network rewiring, cabling, computers, portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, laser printers, scanners and copiers, digital white boards and smart boards, document projectors, upgrade voice-over-IP, clock/telephone/ intercom systems, call manager and network security/firewall, wireless technology systems, refresh classroom technology, miscellaneous IT and instructional equipment, data storage, archiving and preservation, phones, identity cards and the construction and installation of a data center in the cloud for the District's enterprise systems, such as resource planning, websites, domain name systems, cloud applications and information security.

The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. Some projects throughout the District may be undertaken as joint use projects in cooperation with other local public or non-profit agencies. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of portable classrooms and existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable or modular classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation or drainage systems, traffic signals, sewer or utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, road widening, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, permits, or rights of way to the property. The listed projects will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, legal fees and similar planning costs, connection fees, program and project management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District bond audits and staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to bond projects. Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the types of projects and purposes identified herein. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY

This Measure requires a clear system of accountability, including a citizen's oversight committee to ensure all funds are spent properly. By law, every penny of this Measure must be spent on our local schools and no funds can be taken by Sacramento, the County or the federal government and spent elsewhere.

In accordance with Education Code Section 15272, the Board of Education will appoint a **citizens' oversight committee** and **conduct annual independent audits** to ensure that funds are spent only on District projects and for no other purpose. The expenditure of bond money on these projects is subject to stringent financial accountability requirements. By law, performance and financial audits will be performed annually, and all bond expenditures will be monitored by an independent citizens' oversight committee to ensure that funds are spent as promised and specified. The citizens' oversight committee must include, among others, representation of a bona fide taxpayers association, a business organization and a senior citizens organization. No District employees or vendors are allowed to serve on the citizens' oversight committee.

No Administrator Salaries: Proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including inappropriate teacher and school administrator salaries and other operating expenses.

cited above, the District has obtained reasonable and informed projections of assessed property valuations that take into consideration projections of assessed property valuations made by the Assessor-Controller of the County that are available to the District.

Section 6. That the Registrar of Voters and the Board of Supervisors of the County are hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other elections to be held on November 3, 2026 within the District. As provided in Elections Code Section 10403, the District acknowledges that the consolidation election will be conducted in the manner described in Elections Code Section 10418.

Section 7. That the Secretary to or Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to deliver a certified copy of this Resolution to the Registrar of Voters of the County no later than August 7, 2026.

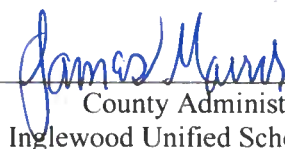
Section 8. That Bonds may be issued pursuant to Education Code Section 15264 *et seq.* or Government Code Section 53506. The maximum rate of interest on any Bond shall not exceed the maximum rate allowed by Education Code Sections 15140 to 15143, as modified by Government Code Section 53531.

Section 9. That the County Administrator requests the governing body of any such other political subdivision, or any officer otherwise authorized by law, to partially or completely consolidate such election and to further provide that the canvass of the returns of the election be made by any body or official authorized by law to canvass such returns, and that the County Administrator consents to such consolidation. The County Administrator further authorizes the submission of a tax rate statement and primary and rebuttal arguments, as appropriate, to be filed with the Registrar of Voters of the County by the established deadlines.

Section 10. Pursuant to Education Code Section 5303 and Elections Code Section 10002, the Board of Supervisors of the County is requested to permit their Registrar of Voters to render all services specified by Elections Code Section 10418 relating to the election, for which services the District agrees to reimburse the County, such services to include the publication of a Formal Notice of School Bond Election and the mailing of the sample ballot and tax rate statement (described in Elections Code Section 9401) pursuant to the terms of Education Code Section 5363 and Elections Code Section 12112.

TAX RATE STATEMENT

INGLEWOOD UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS MEASURE __

An election will be held in Inglewood Unified School District (the "District") on November 3, 2026 for the purpose of submitting to the electors of the District the question of incurring bonded indebtedness of the District in the principal amount of \$396,000,000. If such bonds are authorized and sold, the principal thereof and interest thereon will be payable from the proceeds of taxes levied on the taxable property in the District. The following information regarding tax rates is given in compliance with Section 9401 of the California Elections Code. This information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the assessed valuations of taxable property in the District, and assuming the entire debt service on the bonds will be paid through property taxation:

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction or other demonstrable factors is \$60.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed. It is estimated that the final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is fiscal year 2057-2058.

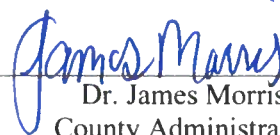
2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue, and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction or other demonstrable factors, is \$60.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed for fiscal years 2027-2028 through and including 2057-2058.

3. The best estimate of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$813,005,302.

Attention of voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only. The actual timing of sales of the bonds and the amount to be sold at any time will be governed by the needs of the District and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold, which will not exceed the maximum permitted by law, will depend upon the bond market at the time of sale. The actual assessed valuations in future years will depend upon the value of property within the District as determined in the assessment and the equalization process. Assessed valuation is not the same as market price of real property. Therefore, the actual tax rates and the years in which those tax rates will be applicable may vary from those presently estimated and stated above.

Voters should note that estimated tax rates are based on the *ASSESSED VALUE* of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls, *not* on the property's market value. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.
