



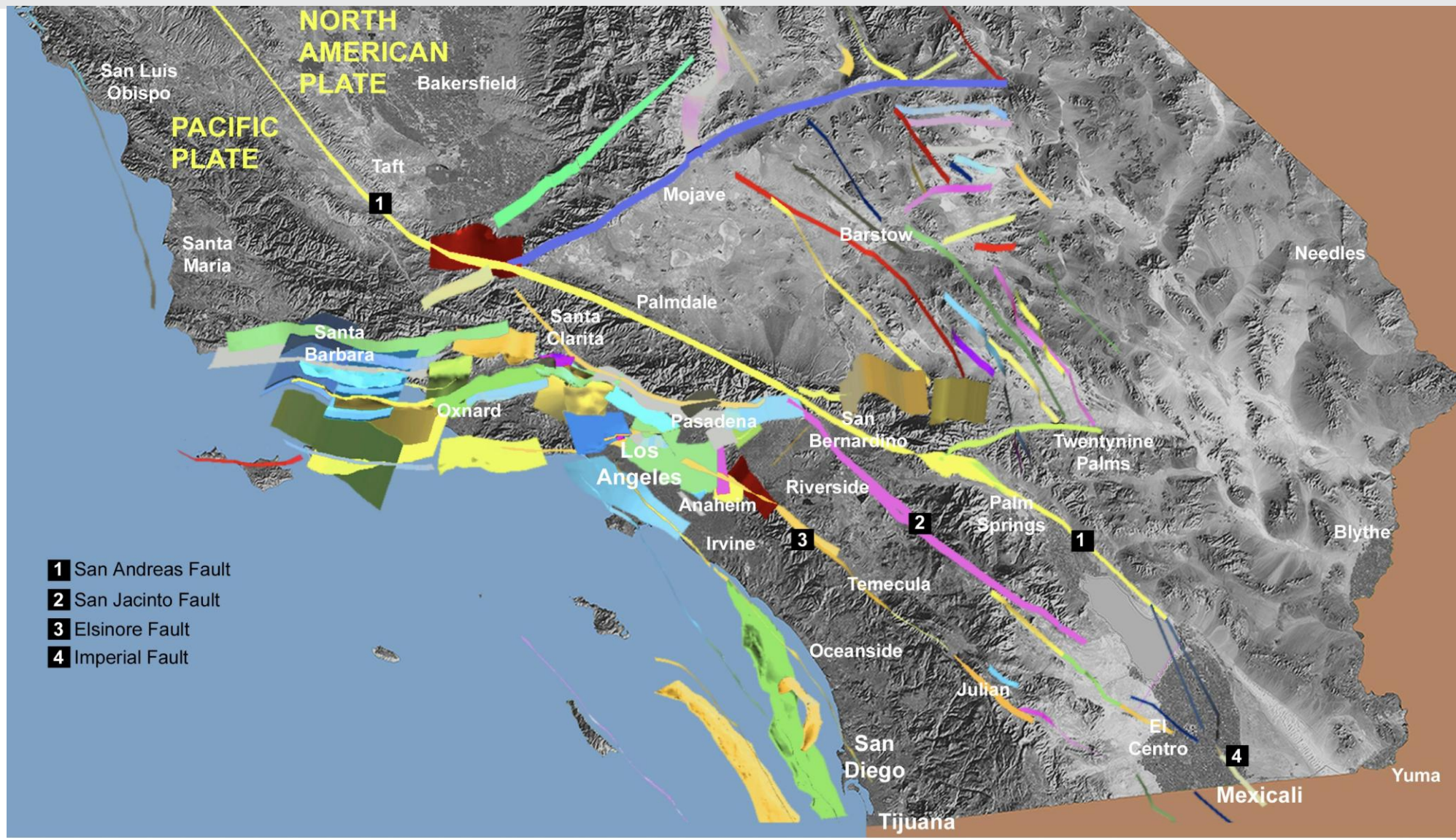

Maricopa, AZ 99.87

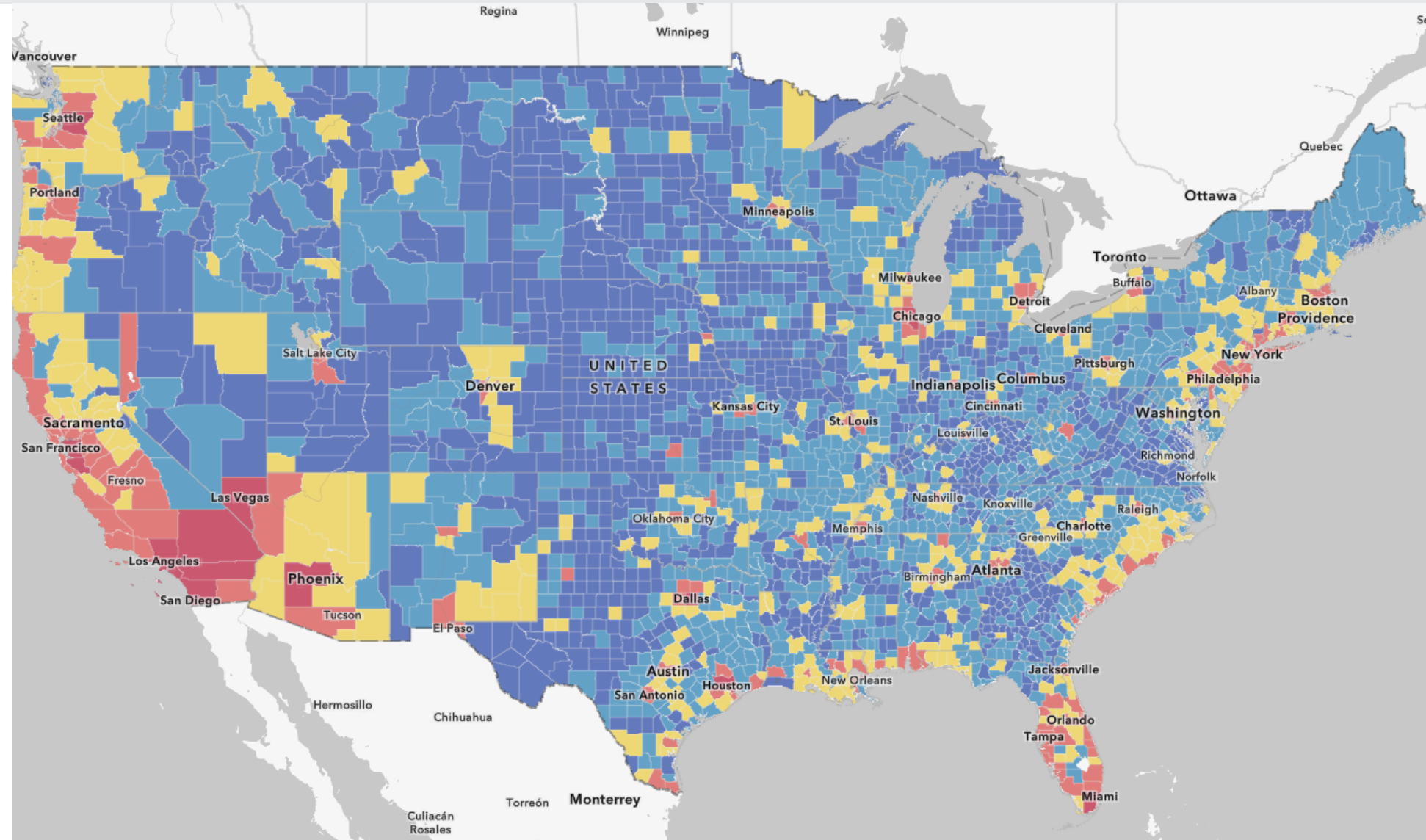
San Bernardino: 99.84

All southern California counties are given a very low resilience score

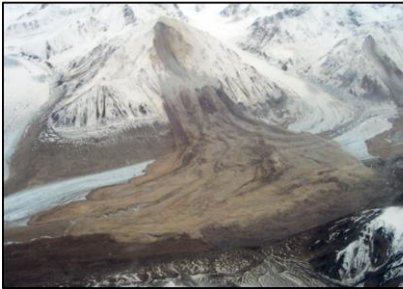




Earthquake Hazard – Dr. Jones

$$\text{Risk} = \text{Hazard} \times \text{Exposure} \times \text{Fragility} \div \text{Response} \div \text{Recovery}$$

Hazard = what the
earth does to us:
faulting, volcanoes...



Exposure: Extent &

environment



Fragility: Structural
weaknesses

OEM Preparedness Efforts

Earthquake readiness is a countywide operational priority

01

Science-Based Planning

Integrating current seismic science and expert input from USGS, CGS, County Public Works, Academia and the Seismic Safety Commission to establish planning needs and assumptions. This includes base planning and hazard specific operational planning.

02

Operational Readiness

Establishing and sustaining critical capabilities and capacity for response and recovery operations, such as responder systems, EOC and DOC operations, resource management, communication systems and logistics.

03

Infrastructure Resilience

Establishing critical facilities resilience and coordinating with partner organizations that must ensure critical lifelines, such as utilities, and key transportation arteries are hardened.

04

Public Preparedness

Establishing a “know your risk” portal, deploying and sustaining of multilingual outreach with critical preparedness information, deploying community-based training programs and partnerships with NGO, CBO and Faithbased groups.

05

Current Gaps

Addressing challenges at scale, including planning assumptions, community-based readiness, local government readiness, interface and support with State and federal partners and efforts to support life sustaining operations at the neighborhood and community level.

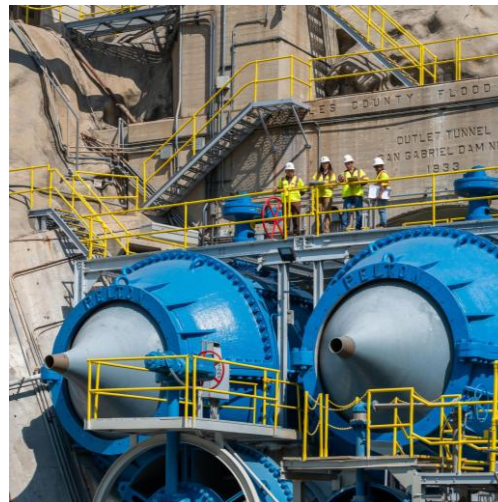
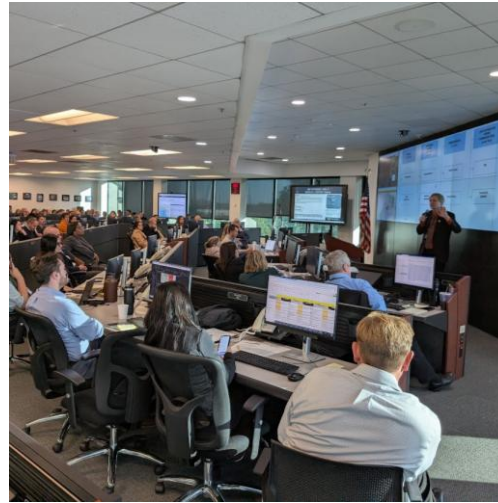

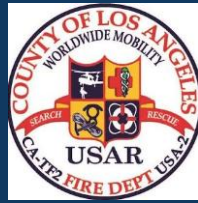

PREPARATION AND RESPONSE

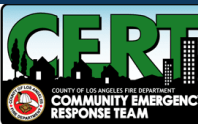
- Year-Round Response Training

 - Site and Personnel Status
 - Jurisdictional Survey (SARCOP)
 - Alternative Dispatch and Command Modes
 - Incident Response



CONTINUITY OF SERVICE

- 3-day Self-Sufficiency Supplies at all Fire Department Stations
- Unified Command with OEM, Sheriff, DPW, and Other Agencies
- Coordination with the EOC / JIC with Unified Messaging
- Request and Utilize Regional, State, and Federal Resources

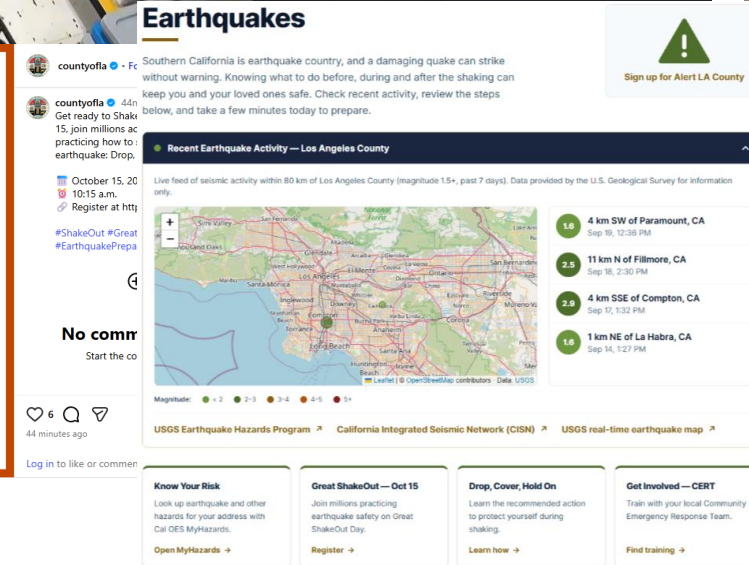
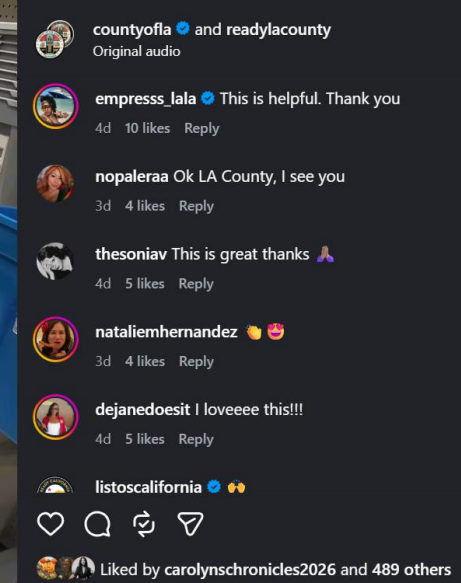


Sheriff Earthquake Preparedness Efforts

- Training, Exercises, and Incident Management Readiness
- Regional Mutual Aid and Interagency Coordination
- Public Information and Community Preparedness
