SUBJECT:

STREET RACING TAKEOVER - BEST PRACTICES

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Notice is to prepare Department personnel to effectively and safely respond to illegal street racing takeover events and explain enforcement and/or disruption tactics. These events are inherently dangerous. Emphasis shall be placed on public and officer safety.

BACKGROUND

Social media has fueled street racing takeovers and the Department has noticed a significant increase in street takeover activity since the COVID-19 pandemic. Participants favor high-profile locations using dangerous acts. Groups frequently takeover entire intersections using vehicles and spectators to block off all four quadrants of an intersection. Organizers encourage participants to remain in intersections to prevent police from disrupting the activity or taking enforcement action. Police vehicles that have over-penetrated groups have been vandalized and spectators have attempted to remove officers from the police vehicles. On occasions, participants have used laser pointers to impair responding officers' vision.

OPERATIONAL RESPONSE

The Incident Commander (IC) should gather intelligence, establish objectives, assemble resources, isolate the area, and implement a coordinated response. The IC should designate a route of egress for participants to ensure vehicle traffic leaves the impacted intersection in a single direction.

Planning / Intelligence

Intelligence may be gathered from a variety of sources of information.

- Intelligence may be obtained via various opensource social media accounts.
- Traffic Division, Street Racing Task Force personnel may assist with gathering intelligence for pre-planned events.
- Community members can be a valuable source of information concerning spontaneous or pre-planned events.
- Street racing groups often favor specific locations on a repetitive basis.

- Major events tend to adhere to historical patterns. For instance, large events may recur on a monthly or annual basis.
- During spontaneous events, the IC should request that a Department Airship respond to provide an aerial assessment of crowd size, crowd demeanor, crowd location, number of vehicles, and number of participants. The airship may help to identify the best route for participant egress.

Operational Structure

The IC should be promptly identified. It is recommended that the IC establish three branch directors for Traffic Control, Vehicle Interception, and Crowd Management. The IC may designate additional branch directors, such as an outside agency liaison, force protection, or reserve squads, as needed.

Objectives

The IC should establish objectives. Objectives may include, but are not limited, to the following:

- Traffic Control
 - o Isolate Area.
 - o Prevent participants from reassembling upon egress.
- Vehicle Interception
 - Should be staged along designated route of egress.
 - o May be utilized to detain or arrest specific violators as they exit the area.
 - o May be utilized to prevent the group from re-assembling at another location.
- Crowd Management
 - Establish contact with event organizer if possible attempt to gain voluntary compliance.
 - o If warranted, declare unlawful assembly and issue dispersal order.
 - o Transition to Crowd Control Tactics, consistent with existing policy, to disperse crowd and arrest violators.

Resources

The IC should ensure that requested resources assemble at a designated staging area prior to responding to the incident. At the request of the IC, the following personnel may be requested to facilitate response:

- Air Support Division Airship
 - o May be used for pre-planning.
 - o May be used to aid in the identification of vehicles which are subject to enforcement stops, based on unlawful activity, after a takeover is disrupted.
- Mobile Field Force (MFF)
- Motor Strike Team
 - o May be utilized for enforcement stops along route of egress.

- May be utilized to dissuade groups from assembling through high visibility patrols in advance or following street racing takeovers.
- o Should not be utilized for crowd control.
- Outside Agency Support
 - o California Highway Patrol.
 - o Adjacent Law Enforcement Agencies who may be impacted by the event.
- Official Police Garage (OPG)
 - o Consider staging OPG towing resources in a safe location to support multiple requests for vehicle impounds.

Operational Tactics

It is critical that an IC be identified and immediately assume command. The IC should consider implementing the following strategies and tactics:

- Assess scene request Department Airship to gather intelligence.
- Assemble resources at Code-Alpha or Staging Area.
 - When responding to street takeovers, it is important for lone units not to enter the intersection where the activity is taking place.
- Ensure personnel are properly equipped.
 - o Responding personnel should be equipped with MFF equipment.
 - Responding personnel should be equipped with Department issued laser protective eye glasses.
- Communications Plan Request tactical frequency.
- Isolate Impacted Area Traffic Control Branch.
- Establish Route of Egress for Participants.
- Stage Vehicle Interception Resources along route of egress.
- Stage OPG tow trucks to facilitate multiple vehicle impounds.
- Deploy crowd management resources.
 - o Attempt to gain voluntary compliance.
 - o If warranted issue crowd dispersal order.
 - o Transition to crowd control tactics if group fails to disperse.
- Communication and liaison with allied agencies.
- Assigned personnel are discouraged from pursuing reckless drivers despite Department
 policy allowing it. Officers are advised to make a reasonable attempt to obtain a license
 plate and to seek a judicial seizure warrant. This has proven to be an effective strategy to
 deter participants.

CONCLUSION

Illegal street racing and illegal street takeovers require a coordinated law enforcement response. A cohesive, well planned response, with sufficient resources, allows the Department to restore order and provide for public safety.
