The last Integrated Leadership Team (ILT) report to the Board was provided on October 6, 2021. The current ILT report will cover the following updates:

- 1) Law Enforcement First Responder Protocol (FRP)
- 2) Safe Youth Zone (SYZ)
- 3) Advocacy Services and Engagement Activities
- 4) Housing for Children and Youth Impacted by Commercial Sexual Exploitation

I. LAW ENFORCEMENT FIRST RESPONDER PROTOCOL

The (FRP) continues to serve as a tool to guide law enforcement, county agencies, and community-based advocates on appropriate steps to take within the first 72 hours of interfacing with an identified or suspected Commercially Sexually Exploited Child (CSEC), utilizing a victim-centered, multi-agency response model.

Since implementation of the protocol on August 14, 2014 through December 8, 2021, there have been a total of 1,076 CSEC recoveries, 29 of which were recovered since the last ILT report in October 2021. Of the 29 youth recovered, 18 (62.1%) were CSEC with an open case with the Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS), four (4) (13.8%) were from outside of Los Angeles County (LAC), four (4) (13.8%) had prior DCFS history, two (2) (6.9%) were newly identified, and one (1) (3.4%) was Probation-only youth.

II. SAFE YOUTH ZONE

On June 9, 2020, Supervisor Hahn and former Supervisor Ridley-Thomas made a joint motion, passed by your Board, that directed the LAC CSEC ILT to engage with the Department of Public Social Services (DPSS), Department of Mental Health (DMH), Department of Public Health (DPH), Department of Health Services (DHS), DCFS, Probation, Sheriff's Department (LASD), and Los Angeles County Fire Department (LACFD), to work on the following:

- Implementation plan that includes strategies to expand the SYZ to all existing FRP locations (LASD, Los Angeles Police Department, and Pomona Police Department, LACFD, County Medical operations and clinics), and other applicable county departments;
- 2. Strategy to engage and partner with agencies outside of LAC, including law enforcement, hospitals and clinics, fire departments, and schools;
- 3. Training strategy to educate agency participants on the SYZ protocol; and
- 4. Any other necessary resources for the LAC SYZ Program expansion.

Since the passage of the motion a SYZ workgroup has been meeting on a monthly basis. The workgroup consists of representatives from the Probation Department, DCFS, LASD, DHS, DMH, and the DPH, with technical assistance from the National Center for Youth Law.

The workgroup has developed a two-phase implementation plan. Phase 1 of implementation will include rollout of SYZ to all participating workgroup agencies as outlined above. Phase 2 will consist of outreach to all FRP participating law enforcement agencies, LACFD and Los Angeles City Fire Departments, other LAC Departments such as DPSS, schools, and the larger medical and public health community.

With these directives in mind, the workgroup has taken the following actions to advance the goals and implementation of SYZ: 1) creation of SYZ metal placards to be affixed

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outside of participating agency buildings to ensure that youth can easily identify SYZ locations; 2) creation of a poster (in both English and Spanish) that describes sex and labor trafficking as a form of child abuse and includes the SYZ logo to be posted in agency lobbies; 3) development of a one-page quick reference guide for agency participants outlining the steps to be taken if someone comes into the agency asking for help or who is suspected of being a victim of trafficking; 4) production of a 20-minute training video for participating agencies to educate their personnel on the issue of exploitation, mandated reporting, and the SYZ protocol, which includes stories and experiences from survivor leaders; 5) development of a notification and training strategy for agency participants to educate them on the SYZ protocol, including each agency's responsibilities; and 6) creation of a toolkit of resources and materials provided to each agency partner to support implementation of SYZ.

Now that the supporting materials, toolkit, and training video have been completed, most Phase 1 agencies are ready for implementation of the SYZ within their respective agencies. DCFS, LASD, and the DMH are ready for implementation. The Probation Department, DHS and DPH are waiting for approval of the SYZ quick reference guide and agency directive. Once approved, these agencies will be ready to implement. The ILT will report back in June 2022 as to our progress with Phase 1 implementation and Phase 2 outreach.

III. ADVOCACY SERVICES

On September 24, 2019, DCFS, through a Request for Proposal (RFP), awarded advocacy contracts to Saving Innocence and ZOE International in order to increase capacity and expand services to those who are not only victims of CSEC, but also to those who are at-risk of Commercial Sexual Exploitation (CSE) under DCFS and Probation jurisdiction. In addition, the contract was expanded to provide services to Non-Minor Dependent Youth (18 to 21-years-old) who are either at-risk or victims of CSE. Since the start of the new contract, there have been 520 CSEC Advocacy Services referrals made, with an average of 21 referrals completed each month from October 1, 2019 through November 2021. There are 168 active cases as of December 8, 2021 and a total of 17 Advocates, four (4) Survivor Advocates (Lived Experience Experts), and two (2) Parent Advocates that are providing direct services to youth, parents, and caregivers.

Since the implementation of the new CSEC Advocacy Services contracts, there have been a total of 427 youth that have exited the Advocacy Services program from January 2020 through October 2021. The following table shows the reason for exiting:

The Advocacy Agencies continue to work as critical team members of the multidisciplinary approach to supporting youth. The Advocates continue to utilize a relationship-based model to engage and build trust with youth over time. The results of the Youth Satisfaction Surveys continue to show positive reviews by the youth who commented that they enjoy their relationship with their Advocates, such as how the Advocates help them achieve their goals and are always there when they need them.

Throughout the month of October 2021, County Partners, along with Advocacy Agencies, Coalition to Abolish Slavery and Trafficking (CAST) and Survivor Leaders hosted Youth Empowerment Month. This year's Youth Empowerment Month included two virtual events and three in-person events. Youth were inspired by keynote speaker Leila Ali, who kicked-off Empowerment Month with words of inspiration based on themes of building resiliency, overcoming adversity, developing a growth mindset, and connecting with others who are positive to help youth realize their goals and dreams. The youth were provided with a "swag bag" that included an autograph by Ms. Ali, a copy of her book, along with self-care items and gifts for youth who participated in Empowerment Month.

Youth also had the opportunity to participate in three in-person events during Empowerment Month: 1) An all day trip to Catalina Island, where youth enjoyed their first time parasailing over the ocean, taking an ocean adventure in a submarine that exposed them to various marine life, and off-roading in Humvee jeeps throughout the hills of Catalina to enjoy a fun ride through nature; 2) A "Just Breathe" day at the beach where youth enjoyed yoga on the beach, volleyball, and building sand castles; and 3) A Fall Festival in the park where youth had fun doing "Amazing Race" games, painting pumpkins, getting henna tattoos, and learning the art of hip hop dancing.

The Empowerment Planning Committee will continue to plan additional in-person events and activities for Calendar Year 2022 to ensure youth have the opportunity to connect

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with their adult allies and supporters that provide them with a sense of community, belonging, and support.

CSEC Advocacy Services: Prevention Services Pilot

On September 24, 2021, the CSEC Prevention Services Pilot was launched. Prevention Services allows the Advocacy Services contracted providers, Saving Innocence and ZOE International, to provide services to children who are referred to the Child Protection Hotline and assessed to be at-risk of CSE, but do not rise to the level of requiring an open DCFS or Probation case. Prevention Services includes a strengths and needs assessment, implementation of an Advocacy Plan to address the priority needs of the child and family, CSEC prevention and intervention workshops for youth and their parents, parent advocacy, survivor advocacy as needed, access to restoration funding to support the achievement of goals, youth empowerment activities, and linkage to community based services and supports that strengthen protective factors and build resiliency with both youth and their families. A Prevention Summit with the Advocacy Agencies was held on September 24, 2021, during which prevention strategies and primary prevention resources were shared and discussed, including the services and supports that are available through the DCFS Prevention and After-care and Partnership for Families (PFF) contracts. Since the launch of Prevention Services on September 24, 2021, there have been four youth referred for prevention services as of December 8, 2021.

In order to assess the impact of these Services, the following data will be collected and analyzed: 1) Number and percent of prevention youth who received and did not receive a substantiated allegation of exploitation within six (6) months, 12 months, and 18 months of the referral date; 2) Average length of time of services provided to referred youth; 3) Reason for termination of services; and 4) Number and percent of referred families that achieved some or all of their Advocacy Plan goals.

IV. HOUSING FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH IMPACTED BY CSE

There are three main strategies underway to expand housing options for youth impacted by CSE: 1) Two new homes have become available for youth impacted by CSE. However, both homes are currently on hold since they are not currently accredited per the Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA); 2) DCFS is preparing to release a Request for Statement of Qualifications (RFSQ) for both Foster Family Agency Emergency Shelter Care Beds and Short-Term Residential Treatment Program (STRTPs) for youth impacted by CSE; and 3) the Office of Child Protection (OCP) is planning to release a RFSQ for Intensive Services Foster care for CSEC. The three developments are outlined in greater detail below:

Contracted STRTP Homes for CSEC:

Currently, there are three STRTP facilities that care specifically for youth impacted by CSE and have contracts with DCFS to provide care for both DCFS and Probation youth:

ZOE Home for Youth (six beds), Virtuous Woman (six beds), and Destiny Home of Hope (six beds). However, a hold on these facilities was placed on November 3, 2021, since they have not met the new accreditation requirements of the FFPSA. The California Department of Social Services (CDSS) advised that they have requested expedited approval from the Administration of Children and Families (ACF) for California to implement the FFPSA CSEC exception for residential placements. If the exception is granted, the CSEC specialized STRTPs will qualify for Federal Financial Participation funding, regardless of accreditation, as long as they are working towards meeting the license requirement of obtaining accreditation within two years of licensure. In the meantime, DCFS is exploring other funding options to fund the placement costs until either the exception is granted or until the facilities are accredited. Both facilities report that they will be able to obtain accreditation within two years of their licensure date.

RFSQ Re-opening for Specialized Populations:

DCFS is working towards releasing a RFSQ to new and existing contracted providers to establish new contracts for Foster Family Agency Emergency Shelter Care beds and STRTPs focused on providing programming for CSEC. Below is the RFSQ Re-opening for Specialized Populations schedule:

Intensive Services Foster Care for Commercially Sexually Exploited Children (ISFC-CSEC):

On September 15, 2020, Supervisors Kathryn Barger and Sheila Kuehl moved that the OCP, in collaboration with DCFS and Probation, conduct an expedited solicitation to vendors with known CSEC expertise to increase the number of home-based placement options available for exploited children and youth.

DCFS, DMH, and Probation have been working with the OCP to prepare and release a RFP to establish a contract(s) for an Intensive Services Foster Care Program - Commercially Sexually Exploited Children (ISFC-CSEC) specifically designed for children and youth impacted by CSE. The release date of the RFSQ for ISFC-CSEC was pushed to mid-December of 2021. The OCP plans to submit the contract to DCFS for contract management and monitoring by March 31, 2022. Below is the current schedule for the major milestones towards establishing new contracts for ISFC-CSEC:
