APPROVAL OF CONTRACT WITH LAZ PARKING CALIFORNIA, LLC. FOR PARKING LOT MANAGEMENT SERVICES AT COUNTY-OWNED, CONTROLLED OR MANAGED BEACHES AND IN MARINA DEL REY (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS 2 AND 3) (3 VOTES)

### **SUBJECT**

This action is to award a contract to LAZ Parking California, LLC. for parking lot management services at County-owned, controlled or managed beaches and parking lots in Marina del Rey.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT YOUR BOARD:

- 1. Find that 14 Marina del Rey parking lots and 19 beach parking lots can be managed more economically by an outside parking operator than by County employees.
- 2. Approve award of and instruct the Chair to sign a three-year contract with two one-year renewal options and additional six month-to-month extensions with LAZ Parking California, LLC, commencing on June 1, 2022 through May 30, 2025, at an annual contract sum of \$3,473,033, plus a possible annual incentive bonus of up to \$25,000, excluding the six month-to-month extension period, should the contractor meet ongoing measurable performance standards, for a total maximum amount of \$21,136,850 over the potential total term of five years and six months, which is inclusive of an additional 10% annually for unforeseen services, but excludes any Cost of Living Adjustments.
- 3. Delegate authority to the Director of Beaches and Harbors to prepare and execute contract amendments to extend the contract for two additional one-year optional

renewals and additional six month-to-month extensions if, in the opinion of the Director or his designee, LAZ Parking California, LLC has effectively performed the services during the previous contract period and the services are still needed and required.

- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Beaches and Harbors to increase the contract amount by up to an additional 10% in any year of the contract (including any renewal option period) for any additional or unforeseen services within the scope of this contract and any applicable Cost of Living Adjustments.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director of Beaches and Harbors to approve and execute change orders and amendments to i) incorporate necessary changes within the scope of work; ii) execute amendments should the contracting entity merge, be acquired or otherwise change entities; iii) suspend or terminate the contract if, in the opinion of the Director or his designee, it is in the best interest of the County of Los Angeles to do so; iv) terminate the contract during the six month extension period upon a 30-day written notice to the contractor; and, v) in the event the contractor resigns or is terminated for any reason, to award service to the next highest-ranking proposer, provided that any reassignment does not exceed available funding and the Director of Beaches and Harbors, or his designee, notifies the Board prior to execution of any such reassignment.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the contract (Attachment I) with LAZ Parking California, LLC. (LAZ) will enable the Department of Beaches and Harbors (Department) to continue to provide parking lot management services at County-operated beach and Marina parking lots using the services of a private contractor. Approval of the recommended actions will enable the Department to continue to staff and manage parking lots under its control economically and with high levels of public service and revenue control.

The recommended contractor will staff the parking lots to collect revenue and to provide traffic direction and ambassador services to assist customers. It will also deposit parking revenue daily into a bank account established by the Department, reserve film company parking, and sell annual parking passes for select parking lots, as well as provide vehicle message signs to direct customers.

Parking lot management services have been contracted for more than 25 years.

### **Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals**

Approval of the contract will promote and further Board-approved Strategic Plan Goal II, Foster Vibrant and Resilient Communities, Strategy II.2.2, Expand Access to Recreational and Cultural Opportunities, by providing accessible, affordable and controlled parking to beachgoers in proximity to their destination.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The annual compensation for parking lot management services is \$3,473,033 in each full contract year and \$1,736,516.50 during the six month-to-month extension period. In addition, Contractor is also eligible to receive an annual incentive bonus, up to \$25,000, for meeting ongoing measurable performance standards. The annual incentive bonus will not be available during the six month-to-month extension options, if exercised. Furthermore, the Director may increase the annual compensation by up to 10% for any additional or unforeseen services within the scope of this contract.

The contract is also subject to a possible annual Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) at the contractor's request. Any COLA granted shall be limited to the most recent published percentage change in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics' Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the Los Angeles-Long Beach-Anaheim area for the twelve-month period preceding the contract anniversary date.

Due to budget curtailments, funding for the parking lot management services was reduced to \$1,902,651 in the Department's Fiscal Year 2020-21 Final Changes Budget. To the extent that the budgeted amount is exceeded in Fiscal Year 2021-22, the Department will allocate funding within its existing budget to fund the increased costs of these services. However, ongoing appropriation of \$1,504,000 will be requested in the Department's FY2022-23 Supplemental Budget to fully fund the cost of these services.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The Department is requesting award of the contract to LAZ, which was determined to be the most responsive and responsible proposer. The recommended contract term is three years, with two one-year extension options and, if needed, an additional maximum of six month-to-month extensions that may be exercised at the discretion of the Director. The contract services will commence on June 1, 2022.

LAZ is party to a bona fide Collective Bargaining Agreement with Teamsters Local Union No. 911 and has applied for and received an exemption under County Code Chapter 2.201, the Living Wage Program.

The contract provides standard annual staffing of 69,381 attendant hours, 21,970 supervisor hours and 2,080 hours each for the contractor's designated contractor representative, assistant contractor representative, film coordinator, office clerk and money counter. These totals are derived from prescribed monthly staffing, which varies depending on seasonal staffing requirements. The contractor's hourly charges to the County for providing these standard staffing levels determine the contractor's monthly compensation.

The contract has the flexibility to vary the contractor's monthly compensation should the County authorize any modification in staffing levels. Any such changes will be based on LAZ's hourly rates for parking attendants and supervisors.

The contract will provide an annual incentive bonus, up to \$25,000, for meeting ongoing measurable performance standards related to employee appearance, integrity, customer service and compliance with contract requirements, as determined through a Mystery Parker Program. There will be six mystery parks each month at various parking lots, for a total of 72 parks annually. The incentive bonus will be distributed based on the contractor's average rating from all 72 mystery parks over the course of the year.

No layoffs or reductions in County workforce or other adverse impacts on employee relations will result from contract award as the work is presently contracted out.

In addition, the contract award fully complies with the mandatory Proposition A requirements contained in County Code section 2.121.380 for the following reasons:

- The Auditor-Controller has reviewed and approved the Department's cost analysis, which indicates that the contract is cost-effective. Contracting for these services continues to be performed more economically by an independent contractor than by County employees.
- Award of the contract will not impair the County's ability to respond to emergencies.
- Award of the contract will not result in the unauthorized disclosure of confidential information.
- Alternative services are available in the event of a default by the contractor; therefore, services will not be interrupted.
- Award of the contract will not infringe upon the proper role of the County in its relationship to its citizens.

The contract contains, and the contractor has agreed to, the County's standard provisions, including consideration of hiring Gain/Grow participants, the Jury Service Program, the Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program, Safely Surrendered Baby Law, Zero Tolerance Policy on Human Trafficking, County's Policy of Equity and COVID-19 Vaccinations of County Contractor Personnel.

The CEO's Risk Management Office has approved the insurance coverage, indemnification and liability provisions included in the contract. The contract has been approved as to form by County Counsel.

Prior to seeking your Board's recommendation, the Department's usual practice is to obtain the endorsement of the Beach Commission; however, due to the Beach

Commission's recent reconstitution by your Board, there was no scheduled meeting held prior to this Board action. The Department will make an informational presentation on the new parking lot management contract to the Beach Commission at a later date.

On July 16, 2019, the Board adopted a motion to reduce the County's reliance on Proposition A contracts. The July 16, 2019 motion instructed the CEO to report back on the following:

- Survey departments to develop a prioritized listing of potential classifications that could be contracted in;
- · Develop a five-year phase-in plan for bringing those positions in-house; and
- Develop a multi-year funding strategy to address any incremental cost increases associated with bringing in previously-contracted-out positions.

The Department will continue to receive parking lot management services while the CEO's study is being conducted.

### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

On November 9, 2021, the Department issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) seeking qualified vendors to provide parking lot management services. The RFP was advertised in seven local community newspapers, with a notice also posted on the County's "Doing Business with L.A. County" internet site and the Department's internet site, where the full document was available for download.

Twelve vendors attended the virtual Mandatory Proposers' Conference held on November 22, 2021. Four proposers submitted proposals in response to the RFP. Two met the RFP's minimum requirements and were evaluated, while two proposals were disqualified. A three-person Evaluation Committee (Committee) comprised of individuals from parking and administrative operations from various non-County governmental agencies was assembled. The Committee evaluated the two proposals on a weighted evaluation of: (1) price, 30%; (2) approach to contract requirements, 30%; (3) experience and organizational resources, 30%; and (4) Living Wage compliance, 10%.

Using the informed averaging methodology, the Committee determined that LAZ was the most responsive and responsible proposer, ranking its proposal the highest of the two proposals evaluated. Pursuant to Living Wage Ordinance requirements, a request for information regarding labor violations was sent to the State of California Division of Labor Standards Enforcement (DLSE) to review and assess any history of labor law violations. The County Labor Law Assessment Team reviewed the information provided by DLSE and recommended no point deduction in the evaluation of LAZ.

The other qualified proposer, Parking Concepts, Inc. (PCI), did not request a debriefing.

Throughout the solicitation process, no protests were received.

Neither proposer requested consideration from any of the County's Preference Programs.

On final analysis and consideration of this contract award, LAZ was selected without regard to gender, race, creed or color.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The award of this contract will not result in the displacement of any County employees, as these services are currently contracted out. There will be no impact on other County services or projects.

### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the resolution certifying a change in the mileage of roads and alleys maintained by Los Angeles County.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

Adopt and instruct the Executive Officer of the Board to sign the resolution and submit to Caltrans to inform them that the total mileage of maintained roads and alleys in the unincorporated territory of Los Angeles County has decreased by 0.51 miles and that the revised mileage as of December 31, 2021, is 3,289.24 miles.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to obtain Board approval for the change in the mileage of maintained roads and alleys in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. A portion of the gas tax funding allocation from the State is based on the number of road and alley miles the County maintains. Any increase or decrease in the number

of miles adjusts the funding. Section 2121 of the California Streets and Highways Code requires that the County annually submit to Caltrans any additions to or exclusions from its mileage of maintained roads and alleys in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. The new length of maintained roads and alleys is 3,289.24 miles. During the year ending December 31, 2021, the net decrease in maintained road and alley mileage was 0.51 miles. These corrections came about as the result of annexations, vacations, jurisdictional percentage modifications, and more accurate data from as-built plans and field measurements. The list of all changes are included in Enclosure A listing the descriptions of all road and alley segments that were added, excluded, or had their length modified during the past year.

### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability and Objective III.3.1, Maximize Revenue. Certifying the decreased number of road and alley miles maintained will result in a proportional decrease in the amount of Gas Tax Funds allocated to the County.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

Any funding from the State as it relates to the miles that the County maintains will be deposited in the Road Fund. If the maintained mileage is not reported to Caltrans annually, funding provided by the Gas Tax may be interrupted.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The enclosed resolution (Enclosure B) has been approved as to form by County Counsel.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

In accordance with Section 15378(b)(4) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines, approval of the recommended action does not constitute a project and, therefore is not subject to California Environmental Quality Act requirements.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

There will be no impact on current County services or projects.



### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to vacate a portion of Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road, Parcel 1-1VAC, designated for public road and highway purposes and sell a portion of County of Los Angeles surplus real property known as Pyramid Lake Road, Parcel 1-1EX, in the unincorporated community of Gorman, to the adjacent property owner, Petroleum Distributor, Inc.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Find that the proposed project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- Find that the portion of Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road, Parcel 1-1VAC, in the unincorporated community of Gorman, is unnecessary for present or prospective public use and is not useful as a nonmotorized transportation facility.

- 3. Adopt the Resolution of Summary Vacation of a Portion of Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road pursuant to Section 8335 of the California Streets and Highways Code.
- 4. Find that the fee interest in the surplus real property in a portion of Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road, Parcel 1-1EX, in the unincorporated community of Gorman, is no longer required for the purposes of the County of Los Angeles.
- 5. Find that Parcel 1-1EX related to Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road is exempt surplus land under the provisions of the Surplus Land Act.
- 6. Approve the project, which is the vacation and sale of a portion of Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road, from the County of Los Angeles to Petroleum Distributor, Inc.
- 7. Upon approval, authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to record the certified original resolution with the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk of the County of Los Angeles, execute the Quitclaim Deed document, and authorize delivery to Petroleum Distributor, Inc.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), Pyramid Lake Road (Parcel 1-1EX) is exempt surplus land under the provisions of the Surplus Land Act, and allow the County of Los Angeles to vacate the portion of Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road (Parcel 1-1VAC) designated for road and highway purposes and sell a portion of its surplus real property known as Pyramid Lake Road (Parcel 1-1EX), in the unincorporated community of Gorman, as shown on the enclosed map (Enclosure A), to the adjacent property owner, Petroleum Distributor, Inc. (PDI), for \$375,000. PDI requested the vacation to release the encumbrance on the property and to have the property available for purchase.

PDI requested to purchase Parcel 1-1EX to develop their property. Parcel 1-1VAC is unnecessary for present or prospective public use and not required for public access or transportation.

### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, by allowing the County to vacate Parcel 1-1VAC and sell Parcel 1-1EX, which will provide additional revenue to the County while promoting fiscal responsibility and will reduce the County's exposure to potential liability.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

PDI deposited \$375,000 for the purchase of Parcel 1-1EX, which represents the fair market value. This amount was deposited into the Road Fund (B03, Revenue Source Code 9908-Sale of Fixed Asset-Land).

### **FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS**

1-1VAC and 1-1EX contain approximately 2.77 acres.

The County acquired fee title to Pyramid Lake Road by relinquishment from the State of California to the County of Los Angeles per Deed recorded on December 1, 1982, as Document No. 82-1199256, of Official Records, in the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk for public road and highway purposes.

Parcel 1-1VAC has been determined to be unnecessary for present or prospective public use as highways and is not required for public access or transportation.

The proposed vacation was reviewed by the County Sanitation Districts, Fire Department, Department of Parks and Recreation, Department of Regional Planning, and Public Works. Parcel 1-1VAC was determined to be not useful as nonmotorized transportation facilities and is consistent with the County's General Plan.

The procedure for the vacation of a County highway is set forth in Chapter 3, Part 3, Division 9, of the California Streets and Highways Code, commencing with Section 8320. The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 8334(a), provides that the legislative body of a local agency may summarily vacate any excess right of way of a street or highway not required for street or highway purposes.

The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 8335, provides that upon making the required finding, the legislative body of the local agency may effectuate the summary vacation of a street highway, or public service easement by adopting a resolution of summary vacation.

The enclosed "Resolution of Summary Vacation of a Portion of Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road" (Enclosure B) has been approved by County Counsel as to form and it will be recorded. Adoption and subsequent recordation of the enclosed Resolution will terminate the County's rights and interest in Parcel 1-1VAC and will result in the property being unencumbered. The buyer is aware that Parcel 1-1VAC is encumbered by an easement for ingress and egress purposes reserved by the State of California and that it will remain in place after the sale.

The proposed sale is authorized by the California Streets and Highways Code, Section 960. This section provides as follows: "Whenever the board of supervisors determines that any real property, or interest therein, acquired by the county for highway purposes is no longer necessary for those purposes, the county may sell or exchange the real property, or interest therein, in the manner and upon the terms and conditions approved by the board of supervisors."

Parcel 1-1EX related to Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road is exempt surplus land as defined in the California Government Code, Section 54221. The parcel is exempt from the provisions of the Surplus Land Act because it is a former street and is conveyed to the owner of the adjacent property.

The Quitclaim Deed document does not transfer rights to any oil, gas, petroleum, or other hydrocarbons and minerals and will be approved by County Counsel as to form prior to execution and it will be recorded.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed project is exempt from CEQA. The project, which is the vacation and sale of surplus real property of a portion of Pyramid Lake Road north of Smokey Bear Road, is within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that it meets the criteria set forth in Sections 15305 and 15312 of the CEQA Guidelines and Classes 5 and 12 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G, relating to minor alterations in land use and surplus government property sales. The project will not involve the removal of healthy, mature, or scenic trees. In addition, based on the proposed

project records, it will comply with all applicable regulations; it is not a sensitive environment; there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, or listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code, Section 65962.5; or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The vacation and sale will allow for additional property taxes, eliminate the need to maintain the property, and reduce the County's expenses and potential liabilities.

ON 120TH STREET AT CHARLES DREW UNIVERSITY
IN THE UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITY OF WILLOWBROOK
(SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 2)
(3 VOTES)

### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to set aside a portion of County-owned property for public road and highway purposes on 120th Street at Charles Drew University in the unincorporated community of Willowbrook and to accept the set-aside area into the County Road System.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Find that acceptance into the County Road System of a portion of County-owned property proposed to be set aside for public road and highway purposes on 120th Street at Charles Drew University, in the unincorporated community of Willowbrook, is necessary for public convenience pursuant to Section 941 of the California Streets and Highways Code.

- 3. Adopt the Resolution to Accept into the County Road System a Portion of County-owned Property to be Set Aside for Public Road and Highway Purposes on 120th Street at Charles Drew University pursuant to Section 941 of the California Streets and Highways Code.
- 4. Upon approval, authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to record the certified original resolution with the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk of the County of Los Angeles.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and allow the County of Los Angeles to set aside a portion of County-owned property for public road and highway purposes on 120th Street at Charles Drew University, in the unincorporated community of Willowbrook, and accept it into the County Road System.

The set-aside will become part of the public road right of way to be known as 120th Street. The recommended actions will ensure the portion of the property can be used for designated highway purposes.

The area set aside for public road and highway purposes contains approximately 797± square feet as shown on the enclosed map (Enclosure A).

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, by allowing the County to provide for improved infrastructure for the community of Willowbrook, thereby improving the quality of life for the residents of the area.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

Michael Anderson, of Anderson Barker Inc, paid \$10,000, which is the cost of processing the request.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The County's interest in the set-aside was acquired through various documents listed as follows:

- a) By a Deed recorded on September 8, 1970, as Document No. 1163, in Book D4825, page 428 of Official Records, in the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk.
- b) By a Deed recorded on December 15, 1970, as Document No. 1527, in Book D4917, page 164 of said Official Records, in the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk.

The area proposed to be set aside was reviewed by the County Sanitation Districts, Fire Department, Department of Parks and Recreations, Department of Regional Planning, and Public Works.

Public Works is requesting the Board of Supervisors to set aside for public road and highway purposes the portion of said property identified in the enclosed "Resolution to Accept into the County Road System a Portion of County-Owned Property to be Set Aside for Public Road and Highway Purposes on 120th Street at Charles Drew University" (Enclosure B). This action will allow the widening of the road.

The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 941, provides that no public or private road shall become a County highway until and unless the Board of Supervisors, by appropriate resolution, has caused the road to be accepted into the County Road System.

The enclosed Resolution has been approved by County Counsel as to form and it will be recorded. Adoption and subsequent recordation of the Resolution will set aside a portion of the County-owned property for public road and highway purposes and accept the set-aside into the County Road System.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed project is exempt from CEQA. The project, which the set aside of a portion of County-owned property for public road and highway purposes, is within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that it meets the criteria set forth in Sections 15305 and 15321 of the State CEQA Guidelines and Classes 5 and 21 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G, relating to minor alterations in land use and regulatory actions to enforce use entitlement. The project will not involve the removal of

healthy, mature, or scenic trees. In addition, based on the proposed project records, it will comply with all applicable regulations; it is not in a sensitive environment; there are no cumulative impacts; unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, or listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code, Section 65962.5; or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

This action will allow the widening of the road on 120th Street at Charles Drew University.



THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES HEREBY FINDS, DETERMINES, AND RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That the County of Los Angeles will set aside for public use a portion of County-owned property for public road and highway purposes in, over, and across the real property as legally described in Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B, both attached hereto. The set-aside on 120th Street at Charles Drew University is located in the unincorporated community of Willowbrook, in the County of Los Angeles, State of California.
- 2. That it is necessary for public convenience that the referenced set-aside be accepted into the County Road System for improved infrastructure on 120th Street at Charles Drew University pursuant to Section 941 of the California Streets and Highways Code.
- 3. That the above-referenced County-owned property is hereby set aside for public road and highway purposes (to be known as 120th Street) pursuant to Section 941 of the California Streets and Highways Code, as recommended by the Director of Public Works.
- 4. That the Director of Public Works or his designee is authorized to record the certified original resolution with the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk of the County of Los Angeles, at which time the set-aside area shall become an easement for public road and highway purposes.










LEGEND:

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to abandon an offer of dedication for public road and highway purposes east of 50th Street West and north of Avenue M-12 in the unincorporated community of Quartz Hill, which is no longer needed for future public use.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Find that the proposed project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Find that the offer of dedication for public road and highway purposes east of 50th Street West and North of Avenue M-12, in the unincorporated community of Quartz Hill, has not been accepted and used for the purpose for which it was dedicated or acquired for 5 consecutive years immediately preceding the proposed vacation and can be vacated pursuant to Section 8333(a) of the California Streets and Highways Code.

- 3. Find that the offer of dedication for public road and highway purposes east of 50th Street West and north of Avenue M-12, in the unincorporated community of Quartz Hill, is unnecessary for present or prospective public use and is not useful as nonmotorized transportation facility, as required by Section 892 of the California Streets and Highways Code, and is excess, not required for street or highway purposes, and can be vacated pursuant to Section 8334(a) of the California Streets and highways Code.
- 4. Terminate the offer of dedication for public road and highway purposes and abandon the County of Los Angeles' right to accept and open the street pursuant to Section 66477.2(c) of the California Government Code.
- 5. Adopt the Resolution of Summary Vacation of an Offer to Dedicate east of 50th Street West and north of Avenue M-12 pursuant to Section 8335 of the California Streets and Highways Code.
- 6. Upon approval, authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to record the certified original resolution with the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk of the County of Los Angeles.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended action will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and allow the County of Los Angeles to abandon an Offer to Dedicate for public road and highway purposes east of 50th Street West and north of Avenue M-12, in the unincorporated community of Quartz Hill, which is no longer needed for public use since it no longer serves the purpose for which it was dedicated and is not required for public access and transportation. The recommended action will allow for the removal of the encumbrance from the property.

The proposed abandonment of the offer of dedication was requested by Mr. Alan Heftner, on behalf of the property owners, to release the encumbrance on the property and allow for property improvements.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, by allowing the County to abandon the Offer, which will promote fiscal sustainability and reduce the County's exposure to potential liability.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no adverse impact to the County General Fund.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The area of the Offer to be abandoned contains approximately 10,440 square feet as shown on the enclosed map (Enclosure A).

The County's interest in the Offer was acquired as an Offer to Dedicate recorded on July 3, 1973, as Document No. 3962, of Official Records, in the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk.

The Offer proposed to be abandoned has been determined to be unnecessary for present or prospective public use as a highway and is not required for public access or transportation.

The Offer proposed to be abandoned was reviewed by the Department of Regional Planning and Public Works. The Offer proposed to be abandoned was determined to be not useful as a nonmotorized transportation facility and is consistent with the County's General Plan.

The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 8333(a), provides that the legislative body of a local agency may summarily vacate a public service easement if the easement has not been used for the purpose for which it was dedicated or acquired for 5 consecutive years immediately preceding the proposed vacation.

The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 8334(a), provides that the legislative body of a local agency may summarily vacate any excess right of way of a street or highway not required for street or highway purposes.

The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 8335, provides that upon making the required finding, the legislative body of the local agency may effectuate the summary vacation of a street, highway, or public service easement by adopting a resolution of summary vacation.

The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 892(a), provides that rights of way established for other purposes by cities, counties, and local agencies shall not be abandoned unless the governing body determines that the rights of way or parts thereof are not useful as a nonmotorized transportation facility. A nonmotorized transportation facility is defined in Section 887 of the California Streets and Highways Code as a facility designed primarily for the use of pedestrians, bicyclists, or equestrians.

The enclosed "Resolution of Summary Vacation of an Offer to Dedicate east of 50th Street West and north of Avenue M-12" (Enclosure B) has been approved by County Counsel as to form and it will be recorded. Adoption and subsequent recordation of the enclosed Resolution will terminate the County's rights and interest in the Offer and will result in the property being unencumbered by the Offer.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed project is exempt from CEQA. The project, which is the abandonment of the Offer, is within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that it meets the criteria set forth in Sections 15305 and 15321 of the CEQA Guidelines and Classes 5 and 21 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G, relating to minor alterations in land use and regulatory actions to enforce use entitlement. The project will not involve the removal of healthy, mature, or scenic trees. In addition, based on the proposed project records, it will comply with all applicable regulations; it is not in a sensitive environment; there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, or listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code, Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

This action will allow for additional collection of taxes after the abandonment of the Offer.







#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the proposed project list for the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account, which will allow Public Works to receive funds for the projects.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed action is not a project pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this letter and the record.
- Approve the list of proposed road improvement projects to be financed in-part or solely with State of California Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 funds for submission to the California Transportation Commission in Fiscal Year 2022-23 under the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that they are not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and allow Public Works to obtain the Board's approval

of the list of proposed projects to be constructed in each Supervisorial District using the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA) funds. This action is required by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) and will enable Public Works to receive the funds and proceed with implementation of the proposed road improvement projects.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities; Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability Our Daily Reality; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended actions support the Strategic Plan by enhancing roadway conditions and safety in our communities, incorporating environmentally sustainable pavement treatments, such as recycled asphalt, and maximizing revenue for transportation projects.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The funds appropriated from the RMRA are made available to the State Controller for allocation to the County on a monthly basis. The estimated allocation of \$137.3 million to be received in RMRA funds in Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23 will be deposited in the Road Fund (B03). Funding from the RMRA is included in the Road Fund FY 2022-23 Budget. As construction contracts for projects identified on the enclosed project list are planned for award in future years, the designated funds will be appropriated in the annual budget process.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Senate Bill 1 (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 was passed by the California State Legislature and signed by the Governor on April 28, 2017. It created new transportation funding streams to address State and local road maintenance/repair, transit, and transportation infrastructure needs.

Portions of this funding are deposited into the newly created RMRA by the State. A percentage of this new RMRA funding will be apportioned by formula to eligible cities and counties for basic road maintenance, rehabilitation, and critical safety projects on the local streets and roads system.

The County is projected to receive \$137.3 million in RMRA funds in FY 2022-23. This is the sixth year the County will receive SB 1 funds and these funds will enable the County to continue essential road maintenance and rehabilitation projects, safety improvements, repairing and replacing aging bridges, and increasing access and mobility options for the traveling public that would not have otherwise been possible without SB 1. Projects are developed through ongoing assessment of the safety needs of County roadways and through the County's pavement management system, in consultation with each Board office. This ensures revenues are being used on the most high-priority and cost-effective projects which also meet the communities' priorities for transportation investment.

SB 1 includes accountability and transparency provisions that will ensure the residents of the County are aware of the projects proposed for funding in our community and which projects have been completed each fiscal year. The RMRA guidelines require that prior to receiving an apportionment of RMRA funds from the State Controller in a fiscal year, the County must submit to the CTC a list of projects proposed to be funded with these funds pursuant to a resolution adopted or amended by the County's governing body at a regular public meeting.

SB 1 requires that the adopted project list must include the description and location of each proposed project, a proposed schedule for the project's completion, and the estimated useful life of the proposed improvement. This will provide the required accountability over RMRA funds by ensuring that these funds are only for use on eligible transportation projects. The proposed project list includes both newly listed projects and previous proposed and adopted projects which will utilize FY 2022-23 RMRA funds in their delivery, as indicated on the list.

The project list consists of \$529.4 million in proposed projects. While this amount exceeds the estimated \$137.3 million to be received in FY 2022-23, the CTC does not require the local agencies' project list to conform to the estimated annual allocation. The project list represents the menu of projects that Public Works expects to deliver over the next 5 years and is updated annually. Public Works will continue to collaborate with each Supervisorial District to identify the highest priority projects to deliver within each District.

Upon adoption, Public Works will forward the project list along with support documentation to CTC for approval. The CTC will review the information submitted and transmit the list of eligible counties to the State Controller, who will then apportion funds accordingly. Pursuant to SB 1, the Board's adoption of the project list shall not limit the flexibility to add or delete projects based on adjusted needs and priorities so long as the projects meet the eligibility criteria pursuant to Section 2030(b) of the Streets and Highways Code.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The recommended actions are not subject to CEQA because they are activities that are excluded from the definition of a project by Sections 15378(b)(4) and 15378(b)(5) of the CEQA Guidelines. The adoption of the project list and acceptance of RMRA proceeds are administrative activities of government and creation of a government funding mechanism that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment.

The appropriate environmental documentation will be prepared for any projects which are developed from the list.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The funding from SB 1 will help the County maintain and rehabilitate streets. Upon completion of the projects, residents will be provided with safe, smooth, and aesthetically pleasing roadways.

Rescind a traffic regulation order establishing a passenger loading zone from 7 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. and from 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m., school days only, on the north side of 6th Street between a point 400 feet and a point 736 feet west of Woods Avenue in the unincorporated community of East Los Angeles as established on April 30, 2019.
- 6. Adopt a traffic regulation order establishing a passenger loading zone from 7:30 a.m. to 9 a.m. and from 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m., school days only, on the north side of 6th Street between a point 400 feet and a point 736 feet west of Woods Avenue in the unincorporated community of East Los Angeles.
- 7. Rescind a traffic regulation order prohibiting stopping from 6:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. and from 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., school buses excepted, school days only, on the north side of 6th Street between a point 254 feet and a point 351 feet west of Woods Avenue in the unincorporated community of East Los Angeles as established on April 30, 2019.
- 10. Adopt a traffic regulation order prohibiting stopping from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and from 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m., school buses excepted, school days only, on the north side of

6th Street between a point 254 feet and a point 351 feet west of Woods Avenue in the unincorporated community of East Los Angeles.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended actions is to support traffic safety and enhance traffic flow. Requests for these traffic regulations were generated by residents or community groups. The affected areas are indicated on the enclosed map (Attachment A).

## IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Implementation of these traffic controls will have a positive impact by enhancing traffic flow and safety and facilitating street sweeping services. Upon the Board's approval of

these traffic regulations, the corresponding signs and markings will be installed within 12 weeks.




# ATTACHMENT B PROPOSED TRAFFIC REGULATION EL CAMINO VILLAGE SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 2







### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality. The recommended actions support a clean, flexible, and integrated Multi-Modal Transportation System that improves mobility and traffic safety.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund. Sufficient funds are included in the Road Fund Fiscal Year 2021-22 Budget to cover the minor costs of removing and installing the necessary signs and markings.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The California Vehicle Code authorizes the Board to implement these traffic regulations which are required prior to enforcement by the California Highway Patrol and the Sheriff's Department.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The establishment of these regulations, including the installation of related traffic control devices required to notify the motoring public, is categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 15301(c) of the California

Environmental Quality Act Guidelines and Class I(x) 7 of the Environmental Reporting Procedures and Guidelines approved by the Board on November 17, 1987.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

Implementation of these traffic controls will have a positive impact by enhancing traffic flow and safety. Upon the Board's approval of these traffic regulations, the corresponding signs and markings will be installed within 12 weeks.







#### SUBJECT

Public Works is seeking Board approval to establish the Emergency Supplemental Generator for Dorothy Kirby Center Closed-Circuit Television Project, approve the project budget for the installation of a permanent emergency supplemental generator, adopt plans and specifications, direct the advertising for construction bids, and authorize Public Works to award and execute a construction contract for the project located in the City of Commerce.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find the proposed project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Establish and approve the Emergency Supplemental Generator for Dorothy Kirby Center Closed-Circuit Television Project, Capital Project No. 87566, and approve the project budget of \$2,110,000.
- 3. Adopt the plans and specifications that are on file with Public Works for the project and make a finding that the items specified as sole source items in the plans and specifications are the only such items available to match other products in use at

Dorothy Kirby Center and other Probation Department facilities and may be designated by specific brand name in accordance with State Public Contract Code Section 3400.

- 4. Instruct the Executive Officer of the Board to advertise the project for bids to be received and opened on July 21, 2022, in accordance with the Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisements.
- 5. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute a consultant services agreement with the apparent lowest responsive and responsible bidder to prepare a baseline construction schedule for a \$5,000 not-to-exceed amount funded by the project funds.
- 6. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to make the determination that a bid is nonresponsive and to reject a bid on that basis; to award to the next lowest responsive and responsible bidder; to waive inconsequential and nonmaterial deficiencies in bid submitted; and to determine, in accordance with the applicable contract and bid documents, whether the apparent lowest responsive and responsible bidder has satisfied all conditions for contract award. Upon such determination, authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to award and execute the construction contract, in the form previously approved by County Counsel, to the apparent lowest responsive and responsible bidder if the contract can be awarded within the approved total project budget. Establish the effective date of the contract upon receipt of acceptable performance bonds, payment bonds, and required contractor insurance by Public Works, and to take all other actions necessary and appropriate to deliver the project.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find the proposed Emergency Supplemental Generator for Dorothy Kirby Center Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act; establish Capital Project No. 87566; approve the project budget; adopt plans and specifications; find the project has properly designated certain products by specific brand name; direct the advertising for construction bids; and authorize Public Works to award and execute a construction contract for the project.

Project Description and Background

The proposed Generator Project is located at the Dorothy Kirby Center, a Probation Department facility located at 1500 South McDonnell Avenue, Commerce, California 90040, in Los Angeles County. The delivery of this project will supplement

existing electrical infrastructure and provide a dedicated electrical system required to support the proposed Dorothy Kirby Center CCTV Project currently in development, which is being delivered by the Internal Services Department (ISD).

The scope of work for the Generator Project encompasses installation of a dedicated electrical network infrastructure, back-up power to support the proposed future CCTV Project, and associated cooling systems. The Generator Project includes installation of a 250 kVA dedicated supplemental standby generator, a 72-hour fuel tank, automatic transfer switch, annunciator, and new electrical sub-panels at each identified intermediate distribution frame location within the entire facility.

Public Works has completed the design, project estimating services, and obtained jurisdictional approvals to proceed with construction. The proposed generator will be installed in the service yard adjacent to the existing standby generator. The Generator Project will be delivered via design-bid-build contracting. The Dorothy Kirby Center will remain operational during construction.

### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support the County Strategic Plan: Goal III. Realize Tomorrow's Government Today, Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets. These recommendations contribute to this goal by investing in public infrastructure that will maximize the effectiveness of the process, structure, and operations to support timely delivery of public service.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total cost for delivery of the proposed Generator Project, including plans and specifications, jurisdictional approval, construction, change orders, consultant services, miscellaneous expenditures, and County services, is estimated at \$2,110,000 (see Enclosure A).

The proposed Generator Project is funded with \$2,110,000 in prior year net County cost. Sufficient appropriation is available in Capital Project No. 87566, Dorothy Kirby Center CCTV Project, to fully fund the proposed Generator Project.

The proposed Dorothy Kirby Center CCTV Project will be delivered by ISD. An ISD Board letter is forthcoming for the Board's consideration.

### Operating Budget Impact

The scope of work consists of installing a dedicated electrical network infrastructure and back-up power to support the future CCTV Project. Public Works does not anticipate any one-time, start-up costs; however, Probation Department anticipates a marginal increase in ongoing maintenance and operational cost due to the project. Probation Department and ISD will work with the Chief Executive Office to confirm the appropriate level of funding to accommodate this increased cost.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The proposed Generator Project will be advertised in accordance with Section 20125 of the State Public Contract Code.

A standard construction contract, in a form previously approved by County Counsel, will be used that contains terms and conditions supporting the Board's ordinances, policies, and programs including, but not limited to: County's Greater Avenues for Independence and General Relief Opportunities for Work Programs, Contract Language to Assist in Placement of Displaced County Workers, and Notice to Employees Regarding the Federal Earned Income Credit (Federal Income Tax Law, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015).

To ensure the contract is awarded to a responsible contractor with a satisfactory history of performance, bidders are required to report violations of the False Claims Act, criminal convictions, civil litigation, defaulted contracts with the County, complaints filed with the Contractor's State License Board, labor law/payroll violations, and debarment actions. As provided for in Board Policy No. 5.140, the information reported by the contractor will be considered before making an award.

The plans and specifications include the contractual provisions and material requirements necessary for the project and are on file with Public Works' Business Relations and Contract Division.

The State Public Contract Code Section 3400 allows a product to be designated by specific brand name for any of the following purposes: to determine the products suitability for future use, to match other products in use on a completed public improvement, to obtain a necessary item that is only available from one source, or to respond to an emergency declared by the state or local agency. See Enclosure B for items designated by specific brand names referenced in the proposed Generator Project plans and specifications, as well as purposes in compliance with Section 3400 of the State Public Contract Code. The Notice of Inviting Bids includes language describing this finding.

In accordance with the Board's consolidated Local and Targeted Worker Hire Policy adopted on September 6, 2016, the proposed Generator Project will have a best-efforts goal of 30 percent of the total California craft worker hours of the project be performed by Local Residents and at least 10 percent be performed by Targeted Workers facing employment barriers.

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy, adopted on December 7, 2004, and last amended on August 4, 2020, the proposed Generator Project budget includes one percent of the eligible design and construction in the amount of \$10,000 to be allocated toward the Civic Art Fund.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The project is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act. The project includes the following components: a generator and required electrical appurtenances to supplement existing electrical infrastructure. Therefore, the scope is within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that it meets criteria set forth in Sections 15301 (a), (b), and (f), 15303 (d), 15304 (f) and (i), 15311 and 15329 (b) (2) and (3) of the State California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines; and Classes 1 (d) and (e), 3 (i), 4 (k), 6 (a) and (c), 11, and 29 (b) (2) and (3) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G because it includes maintenance and minor alterations to existing facilities, installation of mechanical equipment at existing facilities, minor alteration to land, accessory structures, and cogeneration projects at existing facilities.

The proposed activities involve negligible or no expansion of an existing use of existing facilities. The proposed Generator Project does not include tree removal. In addition, based on the records of the Generator Project, it will comply with all applicable regulations and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historic resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

Upon the Board's approval of the project, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with California Public Resources Code 21152 and will post the Notice of Determination to the County's website pursuant to Section 21092.2.

### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

Advertising for construction bids will be in accordance with the County's standard Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisements (see Enclosure C).

To increase contractor awareness of Public Works' program to contract work out to the private sector, this project will be listed on the County's "Doing Business with Us" and "Do Business with Public Works" websites for open bids.

In addition, to increase opportunities for small businesses, Public Works will be coordinating with the Office of Small Business at the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs to maximize outreach, as well as offering preferences to Local Small Business Enterprises in compliance with Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.204.

Participation by Community Business Enterprises in the project is encouraged through Public Works' Community Business Enterprises Outreach Program and by monitoring the good faith efforts of bidders to utilize Community Business Enterprises.

An award by Public Works will be made upon review of the bids. The contract will be awarded to a responsible contractor who submits the lowest responsive bid meeting the criteria established by the Board and the State Public Contract Code.

### <u>IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)</u>

During implementation of the proposed improvements, Public Works will work with Probation Department to minimize impacts to the existing operations to ensure minimal disruption to services. Furthermore, Public Works will continue to coordinate with ISD to ensure the proper infrastructure is developed to support the proposed future CCTV installation.

Approval of the recommended actions will have no significant impact on current County services or projects.

### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the LAC+USC Medical Center Ward 2E Remodel, LAC+USC Medical Center Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Projects, and authorization to deliver the proposed projects using Board-approved Job Order Contracts.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Find that the proposed LAC+USC Medical Center Ward 2E Remodel and LAC+USC Medical Center Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Projects are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the proposed projects.

- Establish and approve the LAC+USC Medical Center Ward 2E Remodel Project, Capital Project No. 87863, with a total project budget of \$6,475,000, and the LAC+USC Medical Center Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Project, Capital Project No. 87864, with a total project budget of \$22,406,000.
- 3. Approve the Fiscal Year 2021-22 Appropriation Adjustment to reallocate \$442,000 and \$2,308,000 from the Department of Health Services' Enterprise Fund-Committed for the Department of Health Services to fund the estimated Fiscal Year 2021-22 expenditure for the proposed LAC+USC Medical Center Ward 2E Remodel Project, Capital Project No. 87863, and LAC+USC Medical Center Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Projects, Capital Project No. 87864, respectively.
- 4. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to deliver the LAC+USC Medical Center Ward 2E Remodel and LAC+USC Medical Center Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Projects using Board-approved Job Order Contracts.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find the two proposed LAC+USC Medical Center (MC) Ward 2E Remodel and LAC+USC MC Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Projects are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); approve the projects, projects' budgets, and related appropriation adjustments; and authorize delivery of the projects using Board-approved Job Order Contracts (JOCs).

### Background

The LAC+USC MC currently does not contain adolescent psychiatric inpatient beds and lacks permanent adult psychiatric inpatient beds. Adult psychiatric patients are currently held in Ward 2E, which was originally designed as a postsurgical recovery unit. The proposed projects will provide 10 new adolescent psychiatric beds and 48 permanent adult psychiatric beds.

#### Proposed Scope of Work

Ward 2E Remodel Project is located on the Second Floor of the LAC+USC MC Inpatient Tower. It is approximately 19,000 square feet, and currently houses adults that are suffering from behavioral issues with medical and/or postsurgical conditions. The project will remodel Ward 2E into an acute Inpatient Psychiatric Nursing Unit to include 24 adult psychiatric inpatient beds.

Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Project is located on the Third and Seventh Floors of the LAC+USC MC Inpatient Tower. Ward 7A is approximately 11,900 square feet and houses the medical surgical nursing unit, and Ward 3D is approximately 8,700 square feet and houses administrative offices and a medical library. The proposed project will remodel Ward 7A to accommodate 24 adult psychiatric inpatient beds, and Ward 3D to accommodate 10 adolescent acute psychiatric inpatient beds, which will be relocated from the August F. Hawkins Mental Health Building at the Martin Luther King Jr., Medical Center campus.

The scope of work will include new antiligature and tamper resistant door hardware, restrooms fixtures, light fixtures, and sprinkler and replacing suspended ceiling tiles with hard lid ceilings in the patient areas and adding Armstrong universal hold down clips to be added to the existing acoustical ceiling tiles to prevent accessing above the ceiling. For Ward 3D, the remodeling includes the installation of staff bathrooms/toilet rooms, a nurse's station, and a nurse call system. The remodeling will comply with the California Department of Health Care Access and Information (HCAI) requirements and with the Americans with Disabilities Act standards. LAC+USC MC Administration has identified swing space within the campus to temporarily house the displaced beds in Wards 2E and 7A during construction.

### Use of Job Order Contracting

Public Works has evaluated the scope of work for the proposed projects and recommends it be carried out by Board-approved JOCs. Since Wards 2E, 7A, and 3D are each located on different floors and in separate locations within the LAC+USC MC Inpatient Tower, the work within each of the three wards is segregated into separate and distinct categories of projects, including a demolition phase and a remodeling phase for each ward. Each such demolition and remodeling phase will be carried out using a separate Board-approved JOC in order to expedite construction. Demolition of Wards 2E, 7A, and 3D will be carried out first, while construction documents are being reviewed by HCAI. The demolition within each ward is proposed to be carried out by a separate Board-approved JOC. Once demolition is completed and permits are received from HCAI, each ward will be remodeled using separate Board-approved JOCs. The value of each demolition and construction phase will not exceed the maximum JOC contract value of \$5,200,000.

Public Works completed the design of both projects using a Board-approved on-call architectural/engineering firm. The remodel of Ward 2E is scheduled to begin in July 2022 and be completed in February 2023; the remodel of Wards 7A and 3D is scheduled to begin in August 2022 and be completed in July 2023.

### Green Building/Sustainable Design Program

The proposed LAC+USC MC Ward 2E Remodel and LAC+USC MC Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Projects are less than 10 percent of an existing building. In accordance with the Board's December 20, 2016, policy, the proposed projects will support the Board's policy for Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by minimizing the amount of demolition materials disposed of in landfills and by incorporating energy efficient products during construction.

### **Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals**

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy I.2, Enhance our Delivery of Comprehensive Interventions; Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability by investing in public healthcare infrastructure improvements that will enhance the quality and delivery of healthcare services to the residents of Los Angeles County.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The project budget for the LAC+USC MC Ward 2E Remodel Project is currently anticipated at \$6,475,000, and the project budget for the LAC+USC MC Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Project is \$22,406,000. The project budgets include construction, change order contingency, plans and specifications, permit fees, consultant services, inspection services, and County services. The Department of Health Services (DHS) has previously paid \$617,000 and \$530,000, respectively, for preliminary assessment fees through the DHS operating budget. The project budgets and schedules are included in Enclosure A.

Board approval of the enclosed Fiscal Year 2021-22 Appropriation Adjustment (Enclosure B) in the amount of \$2,750,000 will reallocate \$442,000 and \$2,308,000 respectively, from the DHS' Enterprise Fund-Committed for DHS to fund the projected Fiscal Year 2021-22 expenditures for the LAC+USC MC Ward 2E Remodel Project, Capital Project No. 87863, and LAC+USC MC Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Project, Capital Project No. 87864. DHS will provide funding in the future budget phases, as needed, to fully fund the remaining project budgets.

### **Operating Budget Impact**

Following completion of the projects, DHS will request and fund the associated ongoing annual maintenance and operational costs as needed with departmental resources in future budget phases. There is no net County cost impact associated with the recommendations.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy amended on August 4, 2020, the proposed projects' budget includes 1 percent of the eligible design and construction costs to the Civic Art allocation in the amount of \$41,000 for LAC+USC MC Ward 2E Remodel Project and \$135,000 for LAC+USC MC Wards 7A and 3D Remodel Project.

In accordance with Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring, the projects will require that at least 30 percent of the total California craft worker hours for construction of the project be performed by Local Residents and at least 10 percent be performed by Targeted Workers facing employment barriers.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed projects are categorically exempt from CEQA. They consist of repairs and remodeling work to an existing building housing warehouse, laboratory, and office space. The projects are within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that they meet the criteria set forth in Sections 15301 (a), (d), and (l); and 15302 (c) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Classes 1 (c), (d), (l), and 2 (e) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. The projects provide for repair, refurbishment, replacement, and minor alterations of existing facilities involving negligible or no expansion of an existing use and where replacement features will have the same purpose and capacity.

Additionally, the proposed projects will comply with all applicable regulations, are not located in a sensitive environment, there are no cumulative impacts, no unusual circumstances, no damage to scenic highways, not part of the listing on hazardous waste sites pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, and no indications that the projects may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable based on the records of proposed projects.

Upon the Board's approval of the projects, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption for each project with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152 of the Public Resources Code and will post the notice to its website pursuant to Section 21092.2.

### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

Public Works completed the design using a Board-approved, on-call architect/engineering firm and is recommending the use of Board-approved JOCs to complete construction of the projects. The standard Board-directed clauses, including those that provide for contract termination and hiring qualified displaced County employees, are included in all JOCs.

The JOC contractors who will perform the work are required to fully comply with applicable legal requirements, which among other things, include Chapters 2.200 (Child Support Compliance Program) and 2.203 (Contractor Employee Jury Service Program) of the Los Angeles County Code, and Section 1774 of the California Labor Code pertaining to payment of prevailing wages.

The projects scope include substantial remodeling and alteration work and Public Works has made the determination that the use of JOCs is the most appropriate contracting method to deliver the projects.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

Approval of the recommended actions will have no impact on current County services or projects. The LAC+USC MC Inpatient Tower will remain operational during construction, and the contractor will be required to phase and coordinate construction activities with the County to minimize disruption to facility operations and functions. Hospital Administration has identified temporary locations in various departments within the inpatient tower to relocate the patients for the duration of construction to ensure the hospital functions are not disrupted.
