

What is Vision Zero?




Vision Zero is a traffic safety strategy to eliminate traffic fatalities.




Why Vision Zero?

Over 60 actions to help achieve 0 traffic deaths





SOCIALLY CONSCIOUS ANIMAL SHELTERING

- Ensure every unwanted or homeless pet has a safe place to go for shelter and care
- Place every healthy and safe animal in a forever home
- Assess the medical and behavioral needs of homeless animals and ensure these needs are thoughtfully addressed
- Align policies with the needs of the community
- Alleviate suffering and make appropriate euthanasia decisions
- Consider the health and wellness of each animal and the community when transferring animals between communities.
- Implement inclusive policies and practices
- Foster a culture of transparency, ethical decision-making, mutual respect, continual learning and collaboration




CAPACITY FOR CARE



DOG PLAYGROUPS

- DACC has a behavior and enrichment team (BET) that conducts dog play groups for dogs to safely socialize and exercise in play yards with other dogs.
- Dog play groups gives dogs muchneeded opportunities for exercise, socialization, and de-stressing.

BEHAVIOR ASSESSMENT

Each animal's behavior is assessed and observed from intake and throughout it's stay at the ACCs

The Behavior and Enrichment Team makes individual assessment of each dog through play groups.

Playgroups provide an excellent way to discover each dog's unique personality for successful placement.







EXERCISE & SOCIALIZATION

• Staff and Volunteers exercise and socialize with all species of behaviorally sound animals in DACC's care. This may include walking, grooming, or just sitting quietly with a shy animal who wants companionship.





TOP NOTCH SHELTER MEDICINE PROGRAM

- 13 Veterinarians and 28 Registered Veterinary Technicians.
- Upon intake, each animal receives a medical exam, core vaccines, and flea/tick treatment.
- Veterinarians conduct daily rounds and provide treatments as needed.
- Dogs and cats are spayed or neutered prior to adoption unless underlying medical conditions preclude the surgery.





AFTER-HOURS VETERINARY CARE

- DACC partners with private veterinary hospitals to provide emergency and after-hours emergency medical treatments for animals in its care.
- Non-medical staff are trained on Compassionate Euthanasia to be able to promptly perform the task as needed for irremediably suffering animals brought in after hours.

"DREAMS COME TRUE" PROGRAM

- Higher level medical care that can save animals with injury or illness that that are beyond the resources of DACC to treat is accessed through the Dreams Come True program.
- DCT finances treatment at private
 veterinary hospitals upon the
 recommendation of DACC veterinarians.
- This program is fully funded by donations to the LA County Animal Care Foundation.

GROOMING GIVES HOPE


- The Grooming Gives Hope program
 provides grooming services by private
 groomers to groom excessively matted
 dogs.
- Often this grooming is medically necessary and reveals underlying wounds. It also greatly improves the dogs' chances for adoption, turning dull and depressed dogs into exuberant adoption candidates.
- This program is also funded by the LA County Animal Care Foundation.




EAGLE LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

- Training on battle-tested leadership strategies and tactics by successful military officers who have gone on to leadership success post-retirement.
- Color Strengths analysis of each employee to have shared understanding on how to lead and how to be led.
- This training was paid for by SEIU for represented employees and ACF for the secondary and tertiary cohorts.
