#### ADOPT RESOLUTIONS TO ISSUE MULTIFAMILY HOUSING REVENUE NOTES TO FINANCE THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE LAKELAND APARTMENTS PROJECT (DISTRICT 4) (3 VOTE)

#### **SUBJECT**

This letter requests that your Board approve resolutions authorizing and actions facilitating the issuance, sale, and delivery of tax-exempt Multifamily Housing Mortgage Revenue Bonds or Notes to finance the site acquisition, construction, rehabilitation, or development of Lakeland Apartments, a 102 unit supportive housing development located in the City of Santa Fe Springs.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

- 1. Find that adoption of the Resolutions is not subject to the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because the action will not have the potential of causing a significant effect on the environment.
- 2. Adopt and instruct the Chair to sign the attached Resolution approving the issuance of tax-exempt Multifamily Housing Mortgage Revenue Bonds or

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> Notes (Bonds) by the Los Angeles County Development Authority (LACDA), in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$32,591,772 to assist Richman Santa Fe Springs Apartments, LP (Borrower), or an LACDAapproved designee, to finance the site acquisition, construction, rehabilitation, or development of Lakeland Apartments (Project), a 102 unit intergenerational housing development to be located at 13231 Lakeland Road in the City of Santa Fe Springs.

# IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY:

- 1. Find that adoption of the Resolutions is not subject to the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because the action will not have the potential of causing a significant effect on the environment.
- Adopt and instruct the Chair to sign the attached Resolution authorizing the issuance, sale and delivery of tax-exempt Multifamily Housing Revenue Bonds or Notes (Bonds) in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$32,591,772 to finance the site acquisition, construction, rehabilitation, or development of the Project.
- 3. Authorize the Executive Director of the LACDA, or his designee, to negotiate, execute, and if necessary, amend or terminate all related documents and take all necessary actions for the issuance, sale, and delivery of the Bonds.

## PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of this action is to authorize the issuance, sale, and delivery of Bonds in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$32,591,772 to finance the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation, or development of the Project. The developer for the Project is The Richman Group of CA Development Company, and the Borrower is a limited partnership which includes the developer as a partner.

The Project will be located at 13231 Lakeland Road in the City of Santa Fe Springs. The Project will be constructed in multiple wood-framed three-story structures. The Project will be comprised of 102 units of intergenerational housing that will consist 47 one-bedroom units, 26 two-bedroom units, 28 three-bedroom units, and one two-bed unit reserved for the property manager. Each unit will include a full-size kitchen, dining area, and bathroom. The Project will serve general low-income seniors and families with incomes ranging from 30% to 70% of the Area Median Income (AMI) or those experiencing chronic homelessness. The affordable unit mix will consist of 56 units reserved for families earning 30% AMI, 24 units reserved for families earning 60% AMI, and 21 units reserved for families earning 70% AMI.

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Residents of the Project will benefit from a community building that will house the leasing office, a multi-purpose room, service provider space, computer center, fitness room, and other amenities. The community center will include a lounge area, kitchen, dining, and entertainment area. The community space will provide residents a place for residential and community gatherings and facilitating meetings. The Project will include 149 on-site parking stalls designed to wrap around the site for easy accessibility.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There is no impact on the County General Fund. The Bonds will be repaid solely through rent revenues collected by the Borrower. The Borrower will pay all fees and related costs.

## FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

On July 26, 2022, the Board of Commissioners adopted an inducement resolution declaring the intent of the LACDA to undertake the financing of a Multifamily Housing Mortgage Revenue Bond project in accordance with U.S. Treasury Department regulations. This action established a base date after which costs incurred by the Borrower for the Project could be included in the acquisition and permanent financing obtained pursuant to the issuance of tax-exempt Bonds.

In addition, on that date the Executive Director of the LACDA was authorized to execute an interlocal cooperation agreement (Agreement) with the City of Santa Fe Springs on the County's behalf as required by California Health and Safety Code Section 52086. The Agreement authorizes issuance of the Bonds by the LACDA in the City of Santa Fe Springs.

The LACDA is authorized to issue multifamily revenue bonds or notes to assist in financing for nonprofit public benefit organizations or for-profit corporations with a public benefit project, including the Borrower. In order for the LACDA to issue such Bonds, the LACDA and the County must execute the following actions: (1) The LACDA must conduct a public hearing to satisfy the public approval requirement of Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code; and (2) the County must approve a resolution approving the plan of financing and authorizing the LACDA to issue the Bonds. Although the LACDA will be issuing the Bonds at the request of the Borrower, the financing cannot proceed without the approval of the applicable elected legislative body.

On April 11, 2023, the LACDA conducted a telephonic hearing regarding the issuance of the tax-exempt Bonds to finance the Project at its office located at 700 West Main Street in Alhambra. No comments were received at the hearing concerning the issuance of the tax-exempt Bonds or the nature and location of the Project.

The attached Resolutions were prepared by Hawkins Delafield & Wood LLP, LACDA Bond Counsel, and approved as to form by County Counsel.

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Pursuant to California Government Code Section 5852.1, a required public disclosure document for this Bond issuance is also attached. All other related documents, in substantially final form, are on file with the Executive Office. They will be approved as to form by County Counsel prior to execution by the authorized parties.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed actions are not a project pursuant to CEQA because they are activities that are excluded from the definition of a project by Section 15378 (b) of the State CEQA guidelines. The proposed actions are administrative activities of government which will not result in direct or indirect physical change to the environment.

## **IMPACT ON CURRENT PROJECT**

The requested actions will increase the supply of Special Needs and affordable housing units in the County of Los Angeles with long-term affordability.

#### RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF MULTIFAMILY HOUSING MORTGAGE REVENUE NOTES AND RELATED ACTIONS

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles County Development Authority (the "LACDA") intends to adopt a plan of financing to sell and issue, from time to time, one or more multifamily housing mortgage revenue notes in one or more series, and at no time to exceed \$32,591,772.00 in outstanding aggregate principal amount (the "Notes"), in order to assist in financing (including reimbursement of the expenditures of the Borrower (herein defined)) the acquisition, construction and development of a multifamily rental housing development consisting of 102 units located at 13231 Lakeland Road in the incorporated City of Santa Fe Springs, in the County of Los Angeles, California (the "Project"), to be owned by Richman Santa Fe Springs Apartments, LP, a Delaware limited partnership (or an affiliate, assign or designee) (the "Borrower"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code"), the Notes are required to be approved prior to their issuance by the applicable elected representative of the governmental unit on whose behalf the Notes are expected to be issued and by each governmental unit having jurisdiction over the area in which any facility financed by such Notes is to be located, after a public hearing held following reasonable public notice; and

WHEREAS, the interest on the Notes may qualify for exclusion from gross income under Section 103 of the Code, only if the Notes are approved in accordance with Section 147(f) of the Code; and

WHEREAS, the Project is located wholly within the County of Los Angeles, California (the "County") and is within the City of Santa Fe Springs; and

WHEREAS, the City of Santa Fe Springs has approved the issuance by the LACDA of the Notes for the Project within the City of Santa Fe Springs; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors is the elected legislative body of the County and is the applicable elected representative of the LACDA within the meaning of Section 147(f) of the Code; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Code, the LACDA has, following notice duly given, held a public hearing regarding the plan of financing and the issuance of such Notes on April 11, 2023, and now desires that the Board of Supervisors approve the issuance of such Notes within the County; and

WHEREAS, this Board hereby finds and declares that this Resolution is being adopted pursuant to the powers granted by law.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The above recitals, and each of them, are true and correct.

2. This Board of Supervisors hereby approves the plan of financing and the issuance of the Notes by the LACDA to further finance costs of the Project in the County. It is the purpose and intent of this Board of Supervisors that this Resolution constitute approval of the plan of financing and the Notes by the applicable elected representative of the issuer of the Notes and the applicable elected representative of the governmental unit having jurisdiction over the area in which the Project is located, in accordance with Section 147(f) of the Code.

3. The proper officers of the LACDA are hereby authorized and directed to take whatever further action relating to the aforesaid financial assistance may be deemed reasonable and desirable, provided that the terms and conditions under which the Notes are to be issued and sold shall be approved by the Board of Commissioners of the LACDA in the manner provided by law prior to the sale thereof.

4. The Chief Executive Officer-Clerk of the Board of Supervisors or a deputy thereof is directed to certify and deliver a copy of this Resolution to the LACDA.

5. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE, SALE AND DELIVERY OF A TAX-EXEMPT MULTIFAMILY HOUSING MORTGAGE REVENUE NOTE IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$32,591,772.00 FOR THE PURPOSE OF MAKING A LOAN TO PROVIDE FINANCING FOR A MULTIFAMILY RENTAL HOUSING PROJECT KNOWN AS LAKELAND APARTMENTS, DETERMINING AND PRESCRIBING CERTAIN MATTERS RELATING THERETO, AND APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF RELATED DOCUMENTS, AGREEMENTS AND ACTIONS.

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles County Development Authority (the "LACDA") is authorized and empowered by the provisions of Section 34312.3 of the Health and Safety Code of the State of California (the "Act") to issue and sell revenue notes for the purpose of making loans or otherwise providing funds to finance the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation and development of multifamily residential rental housing projects, including units for households meeting the income limits set forth in the Act; and

WHEREAS, there has been prepared and presented to this Board of Commissioners (this "Board") for consideration at this meeting the documentation required for the issuance of one or more series of notes for the financing of the acquisition, development and construction of a multifamily rental housing development consisting of 102 units located at 13231 Lakeland Road, Santa Fe Springs, California 90670, in the incorporated City of Santa Fe Springs, in the County of Los Angeles (the "Project"), to be known as Lakeland Apartments and to be owned by Richman Santa Fe Springs Apartments, LP, a Delaware, a California limited partnership, or an affiliate, assign or designee thereof (the "Borrower"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 5852.1 of the California Government Code, this Board has received the following information as a good faith estimate of the cost of the Project financing and the LACDA has disclosed such information in accordance with Section 5852.1 of the California Government Code: (a) the true interest cost of the Note (as hereafter defined); (b) the finance charge of the Note, including all third party expenses; (c) the amount of proceeds received by the LACDA for the sale of the Note less the finance charge of the Note and any reserves or capitalized interest paid or funded with proceeds of the Note; and (d) the total payment amount; and

WHEREAS, it appears that each of the documents and instruments above referred to which are now before this meeting is in appropriate form and is an appropriate instrument to be executed and delivered for the purposes intended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners of the Los Angeles County Development Authority, as follows:

1. It is hereby found and determined that it is necessary and desirable for the LACDA to provide financing for the Project through the issuance, sale and delivery of the Note in order to assist in the acquisition, construction and development of the type of dwelling units provided by the Project.

For the purpose of raising moneys with which to effectuate financing for 2. the Project, the LACDA hereby determines to issue its Multifamily Housing Mortgage Revenue Note (Lakeland Apartments), 2023 Series D (or such other name or series designation as may be designated by officers or agents of the LACDA), in one or more series or subseries, each with an appropriate series designation (the "Note"), in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$32,591,772.00. The Note shall bear interest at the interest rate set forth in or determined in accordance that certain Funding Loan Agreement (the "Funding Loan Agreement") by and among the LACDA, Citibank, N.A., as funding lender (the "Funding Lender"), and U.S. Bank National Association, as fiscal agent thereunder (the "Fiscal Agent"), maturing as provided in the Funding Loan Agreement, but not later than 40 years from the date of issue. The Note shall be in substantially the form set forth in the Funding Loan Agreement, with such appropriate variations, omissions, insertions and provisions as are permitted or required by the Funding Loan Agreement, which shall be appropriately completed when the Note is prepared. The Note shall be limited obligations of the LACDA, payable solely from the income, revenues, receipts and other amounts pledged therefor under the Funding Loan Agreement and that certain Borrower Loan Agreement (the "Borrower Loan Agreement") by and between the LACDA and the Borrower. The Note shall be executed, either manually or by facsimile, by the Chair of the Board of Commissioners or the Executive Director of the LACDA.

3. The proposed form of Funding Loan Agreement, in the form presented to this meeting, is hereby approved. The Executive Director of the LACDA and his designee is each hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the LACDA, to execute and deliver the Funding Loan Agreement, in substantially said form, with such additions thereto or changes therein as such officer may approve or recommend upon consultation with counsel to the LACDA and Note Counsel to the LACDA (provided that such additions or changes shall not authorize an aggregate principal amount of Note in excess of the amount stated above or result in an initial interest rate on the Note in excess of 12%), the approval of such additions or changes to be evidenced conclusively by the execution and delivery of the Funding Loan Agreement. The proposed form of the Note, as set forth in the Funding Loan Agreement, is hereby approved, and the Chair of this Board and her designee is each hereby authorized and directed to execute, by manual or facsimile signatures of such officers, and the Fiscal Agent is hereby authorized and directed to authenticate, by manual signature of an authorized officer of the Fiscal Agent, the Note in substantially such form, and the LACDA and the Fiscal Agent are each hereby authorized and directed to deliver the Note to the purchaser, which shall be Citibank, N.A., or an affiliate thereof in accordance with the Funding Loan Agreement. The Note may, if so provided in the Funding Loan Agreement, be issued as "draw down" Note to be funded over time as provided in the Funding Loan Agreement. The date, maturity date, interest rate or rates, interest payment dates, denominations, form, registration privileges, manner of execution, place of payment, terms of redemption and other terms of the Note shall be as provided in the Funding Loan Agreement as finally executed.

4. The proposed form of Borrower Loan Agreement, in the form presented to this meeting, is hereby approved. The Executive Director of the LACDA and his designee is each hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the LACDA, to execute and deliver the Borrower Loan Agreement, with such additions or changes in

said document as such officer may recommend or approve upon consultation with counsel to the LACDA and Note Counsel to the LACDA, the approval of such additions or changes to be evidenced conclusively by the execution and delivery of the Borrower Loan Agreement.

5. The proposed form of Regulatory Agreement and Declaration of Restrictive Covenants (the "Regulatory Agreement"), in the form presented to this meeting, is hereby approved. The Executive Director of the LACDA and his designee is each hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the LACDA, to execute and deliver the Regulatory Agreement, with such additions or, changes in said document as such officer may recommend or approve upon consultation with counsel to the LACDA and Note Counsel to the LACDA, the approval of such additions or changes to be evidenced conclusively by the execution and delivery of the Regulatory Agreement.

6. This Board hereby appoints the Executive Director of the LACDA or his designee as administrator/manager with respect to the Project and other matters arising in connection with the Note (the "Administrator").

7. This Board hereby authorizes the execution and delivery of all agreements, documents, certificates and instruments referred to herein with electronic signatures as may be permitted under the California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act and digital signatures as may be permitted under Section 16.5 of the California Government Code, including through use of applications such as DocuSign.

8. All consents, approvals, notices, orders, requests and other actions permitted or required by any of the documents authorized by this resolution, whether before or after the issuance of the Note, including without limitation any of the foregoing which may be necessary or desirable in connection with any default under or amendment of such documents, any transfer or other disposition of the Project or any redemption of the Note, may be given or taken by the Administrator without further authorization by this Board, and the Administrator is hereby authorized and directed to give any such consent, approval, notice, order or request and to take any such action which such officer may deem necessary or desirable to further the purposes of this resolution.

9. All actions heretofore taken by the officers and agents of the LACDA with respect to the sale, issuance and delivery of the Note are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified, and the proper officers of the LACDA are hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the LACDA to do any and all things and take any and all actions and execute and deliver any and all certificates, agreements and other documents, including but not limited to those described in the Bank Loan Agreement and the other documents herein approved, which they, or any of them, may deem necessary or advisable in order to consummate the lawful issuance and delivery of the Note and to effectuate the purposes thereof and of the documents herein approved in accordance with this resolution and resolutions heretofore adopted by the LACDA.

10. This Resolution shall take effect upon its adoption.

#### FRANK G. BONELLI REGIONAL PARK FISHING PIER II REPLACEMENT PROJECT ESTABLISH AND APPROVE CAPITAL PROJECT, BUDGET, AND APPROPRIATION ADJUSTMENT CAPITAL PROJECT NUMBER 87951 (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 5) (FY2022-23, 4-VOTES)

## **SUBJECT**

Approval of the recommended actions will find the proposed Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park Fishing Pier II Replacement Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act; establish and approve the capital project; approve the proposed Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park Fishing Pier II Replacement Project budget and appropriation adjustment; and authorize the Director of Parks and Recreation, or their designee, to proceed with the proposed Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park Fishing Pier II Replacement Project Utilizing a Board-approved Job Order Contract.

## IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park Fishing Pier II Replacement Project is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board Letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Establish and approve the proposed Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park Fishing Pier II Replacement Project, Capital Project No. 87951, with a total project budget of \$1,114,000.

- 3. Approve the appropriation adjustment in the amount of \$1,114,000 fully offset with grant revenue from the following: \$864,000 from the California Wildlife Conservation Board and \$250,000 from Regional Park and Open Space Proposition A Excess Funds, available to the Fifth Supervisorial District pursuant to the Los Angeles County Safe Neighborhood Parks Proposition of 1996, to fully fund the proposed project.
- 4. Authorize the Director of Parks and Recreation, or their designee, to deliver the proposed Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park Fishing Pier II Replacement Project through a Board-approved Job Order Contract.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The proposed Fishing Pier II Replacement Project is located at Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park (Park) in the City of San Dimas. The Park serves the greater San Gabriel Valley and averages over one million visitors each year, offering recreational activities that include fishing, sports, horseback riding, camping, boating, kayaking, water skiing, swimming, jet skiing, hiking, biking, and picnicking.

The 1,875-acre regional park includes a recreational lake, Puddingstone Reservoir, with approximately 5 miles of shoreline. The Park's three fishing piers have been a popular fishing destination since opening in 1977. The 2022 Los Angeles Countywide Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment Plus (PNA+) adopted by the Board in December 2022 highlights the Park's regional importance as one of the few San Gabriel Valley destinations for fishing and other water-based recreation. The thirty-five-year-old fixed wood fishing piers have outlived their useful life and require replacement. Currently, all three fishing piers are closed to the public due to their condition.

To fully serve the public demand for this regional park all three piers need replacement. On September 10, 2019, the Board approved Capital Project Number 87201 to replace Pier I. The project is underway and scheduled for completion by Fall 2023. The Department of Parks and Recreation (Department) has secured funding through the Wildlife Conservation Board and Regional Park and Open Space District to remove and replace Pier II with a prefabricated floating dock. Pier III will remain closed until the Department can secure additional funds for demolition.

The proposed Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park Fishing Pier II Replacement Project (Project) will include removal of fishing pier II, installation of a prefabricated floating dock, signage, restroom, and site-related improvements.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions further the Board-approved County Strategic Plan Goal to Support the Wellness of Our Communities (Strategy II.2) by expanding access to recreational and outdoor activities (Goal II.2.2) to benefit County residents.

#### Implementation of County Sustainability Goals

The OurCounty Sustainability Plan, adopted in 2019, establishes goals to address the environmental impacts of climate change and the subsequent social challenges. The proposed Project will support Goal 6, Strategy 6A, by improving access to parks and recreational waters so that all visitors may enjoy their benefits. The Park provides recreational opportunities for over one million yearly visitors from local and surrounding communities across Los Angeles County. Further, the proposed Project is in an area prioritized by the LA County Climate Vulnerability Assessment as it serves residents experiencing social vulnerability and extreme heat.

#### Implementation of County Anti-Racism, Diversity, and Inclusion Initiative

The proposed Project is aligned with the County's Anti-Racism, Diversity, and Inclusion Initiative and guided by the Countywide Equity Guiding Principles (Principles) adopted by the Board on September 15, 2021, including the reduction of racial disparities in life outcomes as well as disparities in public investment to shape those outcomes. Consistent with these Principles, the proposed Project will directly address disadvantage and inequity by serving census tracts throughout the San Gabriel Valley highlighted as High Need by the County of Los Angeles Equity Explorer.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING**

The total proposed Project cost estimate of \$1,114,000 includes as-needed consultant services, jurisdictional review, construction, change order/contingency, Civic Art, and County services. The proposed Project's Schedule and Budget Summary are included in Attachment I.

Approval of the appropriation adjustment (Attachment II) in the amount of \$1,114,000 will appropriate \$864,000 from the California Wildlife Conservation Board and \$250,000 from Regional Park and Open Space Proposition A Excess Funds for Capital Project No. 87951 to fully fund the proposed Project.

#### **Operating Budget Impact**

Based on the proposed Project description, the Department does not anticipate any onetime startup or ongoing costs for the proposed Project.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Approval of the recommended actions will authorize the Department to deliver the proposed Project utilizing a Board-approved Job Order Contract (JOC), as the work involves repair, remodeling, and refurbishing of County facilities. The standard Board-directed clauses that provide for contract termination, renegotiation, and hiring qualified displaced County employees will be included in the JOC.

The JOC contractor who is awarded this contract will be required to fully comply with Los Angeles County Code Chapter 2.200 (Child Support Compliance Program), Chapter 2.203 (Contractor Employee Jury Service Program), and Chapter 2.201 (Living Wage Program). The proposed Project will proceed in accordance with the Board's consolidated Local and Targeted Worker Hire Policy (LTWHP) adopted on September 6, 2016, and last amended on June 11, 2019.

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy, adopted on December 7, 2004, and last amended on August 4, 2020, the proposed Project budget for Frank G. Bonelli Regional Park Fishing Pier II Replacement Project, Capital Project No. 87951 includes 1 percent (1%) of the design and construction costs, in the amount of \$11,000, to be allocated to Civic Art.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed Project is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The proposed Project, which includes removal of the existing pier, installation of a prefabricated floating dock, restroom, and site related improvements including signage, is within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that it meets the criteria set forth in sections 15301(d), 15302 (c), 15304(a) and 15311(a) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Classes 1(c), 2(e), 4(a) and 11(d) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. The proposed Project provides for restoration or rehabilitation of deteriorated or damaged structures, facilities, or mechanical equipment to meet current standards of public health and safety; replacement or reconstruction of existing structures and facilities involving negligible or no expansion of capacity; minor alterations to land which will not involve the removal of healthy, mature and scenic trees; and, construction of minor structures accessory to existing facilities.

Based on the proposed Project records, it will comply with all applicable regulations and is not located in a sensitive environment. There are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste sites compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, the Department will file a Notice of Exemption with the County Clerk in accordance with section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code.

#### CONTRACTING PROCESS

The Department will use a Board-approved as-needed consultant to provide plans and specifications for the proposed improvements.

Implementation of the improvements will be completed using a combination of a Boardapproved JOC and County Purchase Order (PO). The PO is authorized for and will provide a prefabricated floating dock. A Board-approved JOC will remove the existing pier, refurbish one existing restroom building, and perform site work. The combination of the two delivery methods will allow for the most expedient and cost-effective implementation of the proposed Project. Where used, the Department has made the determination that JOC is the most appropriate procurement method for delivery of the construction scope.

#### IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

The recommended actions will have limited impacts to County services at the facility. The Department will minimize and mitigate disruption by coordinating work and providing sufficient notification to the facility and the public, particularly in the case of temporary trail closures.

#### **CONCLUSION**

### SERVICES CONTRACT TRANSPORTATION CORE SERVICE AREA EL SOL SHUTTLE SERVICES IN THE UNINCORPORATED COUNTY COMMUNITY OF EAST LOS ANGELES (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 1) (3 VOTES)

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to award a services contract to Southland Transit, Inc., to provide the El Sol shuttle services in the unincorporated County community of East Los Angeles.

## IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the contract work is statutorily exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Find that these services can be more economically performed by an independent contractor than by County employees.
- 3. Award direct the Chair to and execute the contract with Southland Transit, Inc., for El Sol shuttle services. The contract is for a period of 1-year with four 1-year renewal options and а

month-to-month extension up to 6 months for a maximum potential contract term of 66 months and a maximum potential contract sum of \$19,582,020.

- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to renew this contract for each additional renewal option and extension period if, in the opinion of the Director of Public Works or his designee, Southland Transit, Inc., has successfully performed during the previous contract period, and the services are still required; to approve and execute amendments to incorporate necessary changes within the scope of work; and to suspend work if, it is in the best interest of the County to do so.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to annually increase the contract amount up to an additional 10 percent of the annual contract sum, which is included in the maximum potential contract sum for unforeseen additional work within the scope of the contract, if required.

## PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended action will award a contract to Southland Transit, Inc., for El Sol shuttle services in the unincorporated County community of East Los Angeles. These services will provide residents in the community with transportation to health care facilities, shopping centers, recreation, senior centers, and other destinations within the defined service area at a low-cost fare of \$0.25 and is free for seniors, persons with disabilities, children under age 5, and Metro pass holders, as shown in Enclosure A.

The contract also includes the cost for major vehicle repairs; graphics; and automated transit vehicle system devices, including vehicle locators and video camera equipment for County-provided service vehicles in accordance with the contract.

The current contract has been extended for a maximum of 6 months with a final expiration date of June 30, 2023; however, it will expire upon award and execution of this contract. The award of this contract will continue the current services by the recommended contractor, which is the current contractor providing these services.

## Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of Our Communities, Objective II.2.2, Expand Access to Recreational and Cultural Opportunities, and Objective II.2.4, Promote Active and Healthy Lifestyles, by contracting with the contractor that has the specialized expertise to provide these services accurately, efficiently, timely, and in a responsive manner.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The contract amounts below are based on Public Works' estimated annual utilization of the contractor's service at the prices quoted by the contractor. The terms and sums for each term and the maximum contract period if all optional renewal periods are exercised are as follows:

The sum for the initial term is \$3,088,758. The sum for the first option term is \$3,149,627. The sum for the second option term is \$3,199,434. The sum for the third option term is \$3,268,567. The sum for the fourth and final option term is \$3,363,633. The sum for the month-to-month option to extend up to 6 months is \$1,731,817.

The maximum potential contract sum is \$19,582,020 with a maximum contract period of 66 months. The total maximum potential contract amount includes major vehicle repair; graphics; and automated transit vehicle system devices, including vehicle locators, Transit Assistance Program card validators, video camera equipment, and automated passenger counters to County-provided service vehicles in accordance with the contract; and 10 percent of the annual contract sum for unforeseen additional work within the scope of the contract.

Funding for these services is included in the First Supervisorial District's Proposition A Local Return Transit Operations Fund (CP6 - Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget. Funds to finance the contract's option years and 10 percent additional funding for contingencies will be requested through the annual budget process.

## FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The recommended contractor, Southland Transit, Inc., is located in El Monte, California. This contract will commence upon the Board's approval for a period of 1-year. With the Board's delegated authority, Public Works may renew the contract for four 1-year renewal options and a month-to-month extension up to 6 months for a maximum potential total contract term of 66 months.

County Counsel has approved the recommended contract, which has been executed by Southland Transit, Inc. (Enclosure B). The recommended contract was solicited on an open-competitive basis and is in accordance with applicable Federal, State, and County requirements.

A standard services contract has been used that contains terms and conditions in compliance with the Board's ordinances, policies, and programs. Enclosure C reflects the proposer's utilization participation and Community Business Enterprise program information. Data regarding the proposer's minority participation is on file with Public Works. The contractor was selected upon final analysis and consideration without regard to race, creed, gender, or color.

This work is being contracted in accordance with procedures authorized under County Charter, Section 44.7, Part 3, and Chapter 2.121 (Contracting with Private Business) of the Los Angeles County Code. The mandatory requirements for contracting set forth in the Los Angeles County Code, Section 2.121.380, have been met.

Southland Transit, Inc., has agreed to pay its employees the current Living Wage Rate approved by the Board on December 1, 2015, and to comply with the County's Living Wage reporting requirements. The County's Proposition A and Living Wage Ordinance provisions apply to this proposed contract, as County employees can perform these contracted services. The contract complies with all of the requirements of the County Code, Section 2.201.

Using methodology approved by the Auditor-Controller, the Proposition A cost analysis indicates that the recommended contracted services can be performed more economically by the private sector. The Auditor-Controller has reviewed these calculations and concurs.

This Proposition A contract does not allow cost-of-living adjustments for the optional renewal periods.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

These services are statutorily exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act, pursuant to Section 21080(b)(10) of the Public Resources Code. This exemption provides for the implementation of passenger or commuter transit services.

#### CONTRACTING PROCESS

A notice of the Request for Statement of Qualifications (RFSQ) was released in 2016, and 2019, and it is currently open continuous. RFSQ was placed on the County's "Doing Business with Los Angeles County" website (Enclosure D), Public Works' "Do Business with Public Works" website, Twitter, and advertisement was placed in the *Los Angeles Times*. Also, Public Works informed 1,198 Local Small Business Enterprises; and 106 independent contractors, various business development centers, and municipalities about this business opportunity.

A total of ten Statement of Qualifications (SOQs) were received in response to the RFSQ. The SOQs were first reviewed to ensure they met the mandatory requirements outlined in the RFSQ. Ten SOQs were then evaluated by an evaluation committee consisting of Public Works staff, utilizing the informed averaging methodology for applicable criteria. The committee's evaluation was based on criteria described in the RFSQ, including experience. work plan, financial resources. performance history/references, and demonstrated controls over labor/payroll recordkeeping. Based on this evaluation, one of the ten SOQs did not receive a score equal to or above the evaluation's minimum passing score and was ineligible to be placed on the Qualified Contractors List. The remaining nine Statements of Qualifications received a passing score and were placed on the Qualified Contractors List.

On July 11, 2022, Public Works issued an Invitation for Bids soliciting bids from the apparent responsive and responsible vendors on the Qualified Contractors List. On August 8, 2022, one bid was received. The bid was evaluated based on the price category. Based on this evaluation, it is recommended that a contract be awarded to the apparent responsive and responsible contractor, Southland Transit, Inc., located in El Monte, California. Public Works believes the contractor's price to be reasonable for the work requested.

Public Works has accessed available resources to review and assess the proposed contractor's past performance, history of Labor Law violations, and prior performance on County contract.

## **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The award of this contract will continue the services without disruption to the public and will not result in the displacement of any County employees as these services are presently contracted with the private sector.

#### SERVICES CONTRACT ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES CORE SERVICE AREA AWARD OF SERVICES CONTRACT FOR ON-CALL SMART GARDENING PROGRAM (ALL SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS) (3 VOTES)

## **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to award a services contract to Go2Zero Strategies, LLC, a Local Small Business Enterprise, to provide education, outreach, and maintenance of County Smart Gardening Centers throughout Los Angeles County.

# IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the contract work is not a project pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Award the contract for the on-call Smart Gardening program to Go2Zero Strategies, LLC, a Local Small Business Enterprise. These services contract will be for a term of 2 years with two 1-year renewal options and a month-to-month extension up to 6 months for a maximum potential contract term of 54 months and a maximum potential contract sum of \$4,695,546.
- 3. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute the contract; to renew the contract for each additional renewal option and extension period if, in the opinion of the Director of

Public Works or his designee, Go2Zero Strategies, LLC, has successfully performed during the previous contract period, and the services are still required; to approve and execute amendments to incorporate necessary changes within the scope of work; and to suspend work if it is in the best interest of the County to do so.

4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to annually increase the contract amount up to an additional 10 percent of the annual contract sum, which is included in the maximum potential contract sum for unforeseen additional work within the scope of the contract if required.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended action will award a services contract to Go2Zero Strategies, LLC, to provide on-call and intermittent education, outreach, and maintenance of County Smart Gardening Centers. The work to be performed will consist of educating residents on smart gardening practices, conducting workshops/webinars, creating and issuing advertisements for the workshops/webinars, maintaining the County's garden demonstration facilities, and providing supplies for building school gardens. The recommended contractor has the specialized expertise to provide these services.

The current contract will expire on June 30, 2023; however, it will expire upon award and execution of this contract. The award of this contract will continue the current services by the recommended contractor, which is the current contractor providing these services.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality, Objective II.3.1, Improve Water Quality, Reduce Water Consumption, and Increase Water Supplies, and Objective II.3.4, Reduce Waste Generation and Recycle and Reuse Waste Resources, by contracting with specialized expertise to accurately and efficiently provide the services.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The initial 2-year term for this contract is \$2,086,909, which includes a 10 percent contingency for additional work within the scope of the contract.

The contract's annual amount for the two 1-year renewal options is \$1,043,454.50, which includes 10 percent contingency for unforeseen additional work within the scope of the contract and a month-to-month extension up to 6 months at a total amount of \$521,727.25 for a maximum potential contract term of 54 months with an estimated maximum potential contract sum of \$4,695,546. This amount is based on the annual unit prices quoted by the contractor and our estimated annual utilization of the contractor's services.

Funding for the first year is included in the Solid Waste Management Fund (GD1, Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget. Funds to finance the contract's optional years and 10 percent additional funding for contingencies will be requested through the annual budget process.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The recommended contractor, Go2Zero Strategies, LLC, a Local Small Business Enterprise, is located in Irwindale, California. This contract's initial term will be for a period of 2 years commencing upon the Board's approval and execution between both parties, whichever occurs last. With the Board's delegated authority, Public Works may renew the contract for two 1-year renewal options and a month-to-month extension up to 6 months for a maximum potential total contract term of 54 months.

County Counsel will review the contract as to form (Enclosure A) prior to approval. The recommended contract with Go2Zero Strategies, LLC, was solicited on an open-competitive basis and is in accordance with applicable Federal, State, and County requirements.

A standard services contract has been used that contains terms and conditions in compliance with the Board's ordinances, policies, and programs. Enclosure B reflects the proposers' utilization participation and community business enterprise program information. Data regarding the proposers' minority participation is on file with Public Works. The contractor was selected upon final analysis and consideration without regard to race, creed, sex, or color.

Public Works has evaluated and determined that the contracted service is required on an on-call and intermittent basis; therefore, Proposition A (County Code Chapter 2.121) and the Living Wage Program (County Code Chapter 2.201) do not apply to this

contract. In addition, the contractor understands and agrees that this contract work involves public works as defined by Section 1720 of the California Labor Code. The contractor represents and warrants that the contract is in full compliance with the applicable provisions of the Labor Code relating to payment of prevailing wages for all prevailing wage work.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

Approval of the recommended action to provide smart gardening educational services and related activities is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because it involves activities that are excluded from the definition of a project by Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code and Section 15378(b) of the State CEQA Guidelines. The proposed action is an administrative activity of government that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment. In addition, maintenance of existing smart gardening facilities is exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 15301 of the CEQA Guidelines and Class 1 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. Based on the proposed project records, the work will comply with all applicable regulations, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

#### CONTRACTING PROCESS

On July 28, 2022, a notice of the Request for Proposals was placed on the County's "Doing Business with Los Angeles County" website (Enclosure C), "Do Business with Public Works" website, and Twitter. In addition, advertisements were placed in the Los Angeles Daily Journal, Los Angeles Sentinel, La Opinión, The Daily Breeze, The Signal (Santa Clarita), World Journal, Watts Times, Malibu Times, Press Telegram, and Pasadena Star News. Also, Public Works informed 1,373 Local Small Business Enterprises; 158 Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises; 163 Social Enterprises; 833 Community Business Enterprises; and 364 independent contractors, various business development centers, and municipalities about this business opportunity via e-mail and hardcopy mailouts.

On September 6, 2022, two proposals were received. Both proposals were evaluated by an evaluation committee consisting of Public Works staff. The evaluation was based on criteria described in the Request for Proposals, which included the price, experience, work plan, and references, utilizing the informed averaging methodology for applicable criteria. Based on this evaluation, it is recommended that this contract be awarded to the highest rated, apparent responsive and responsible, and lowest cost proposer, Go2Zero Strategies, LLC, located in Irwindale, California.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The award of this contract will continue the services to the public and will not result in the displacement of any County employees.

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#### AGREEMENT FOR ON-CALL SMART GARDENING PROGRAM (BRC0000317)

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 2023, by and between the COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, a subdivision of the State of California, a body corporate and politic (hereinafter referred to as COUNTY) and GO2ZERO STRATEGIES, LLC, a California Limited Liability Company, located at 6625 North Calle Eva Miranda, Suite A, Irwindale, CA 91702 (hereinafter referred to as CONTRACTOR). COUNTY and CONTRACTOR are each a Party and collectively referred to as the Parties.

#### <u>WITNESSETH</u>

<u>FIRST</u>: The CONTRACTOR, for the consideration hereinafter set forth and the acceptance by the Board of Supervisors (Board) of said COUNTY of the CONTRACTOR'S Proposal filed with the COUNTY on September 6, 2022, hereby agrees to provide services as described in this Contract for Smart Gardening Program (BRC0000317).

<u>SECOND</u>: This AGREEMENT, together with Exhibit A, Scope of Work; Exhibit B, Service Contract General Requirements; Exhibit C, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015; Exhibit D, Safely Surrendered Baby Law Posters; Exhibit E, Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program; Exhibit F, Performance Requirements Summary, and Exhibit G, Landscaping and Graffiti Removal; the CONTRACTOR'S Proposal, all attached hereto; the Request for Proposals; and Addenda to the Request for Proposals, all of which are incorporated herein by reference, are agreed by the COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR to constitute the Contract.

<u>THIRD</u>: The COUNTY agrees, in consideration of satisfactory performance of the foregoing services in strict accordance with the Contract specifications to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Works, to pay the CONTRACTOR pursuant to the Schedule of Prices set forth in the Proposal and attached hereto as Form PW-2, an amount not to exceed \$4,268,677.50 for the entire potential contract term, including optional renewal periods under this Contract if exercised by the County, or such greater amount as the Board may approve (Maximum Contract Sum). The total contract amount for the initial 2-year Contract term is \$1,897,190; the sum for each annual renewal, if exercised is \$948,595; and the sum for the month-to-month optional extensions is \$474,297.50 monthly if exercised.

<u>FOURTH</u>: This Contract's initial term shall be for a period of two years commencing on July 1, 2023, or upon the Board's approval and execution of this Agreement by both Parties, whichever occurs last. The COUNTY shall have the sole option to renew this Contract term for up to two additional 1-year periods and a six month-to-month extension, for a maximum total Contract term of four years and six months. Each such option shall be exercised at the sole discretion of the COUNTY. The COUNTY, acting through the Director, may give a written notice of intent to renew this Contract at least ten days prior to the end of each term. At the sole discretion of the COUNTY, in lieu of renewing the Contract for the full one year, this Contract may be renewed on a month-to-month basis, upon written notice to the CONTRACTOR at least ten days prior to the end of a term. The Director will provide a written notice of nonrenewal at least ten days before the last day of any term, in which case this Contract shall expire as of midnight on the last day of that term. Where all option years have been exercised, the Director will not provide a written notice of nonrenewal.

<u>FIFTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR shall bill monthly, in arrears, for the work performed during the preceding month. Work performed shall be billed at the unit prices quoted in Form PW-2, Schedule of Prices.

<u>SIXTH</u>: Public Works will make payment to the CONTRACTOR within 30 days of receipt and approval of a properly completed and undisputed invoice. However, should the CONTRACTOR be certified by the COUNTY as a Local Small Business Enterprise, payment will be made in accordance with Board of Supervisors Policy No. 3.035, Small Business Liaison and Prompt Payment Program. Each invoice shall be in triplicate (original and two copies) and shall itemize the work completed. The invoices shall be submitted to:

<u>SEVENTH</u>: In no event shall the aggregate total amount of compensation paid to the CONTRACTOR exceed the amount of compensation authorized by the Board. Such aggregate total amount is the Maximum Contract Sum.

<u>EIGHTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that only the designated Public Works Contract Manager is authorized to request or order work under this Contract. The CONTRACTOR acknowledges that the designated Contract Manager is not authorized to request or order any work that would result in the CONTRACTOR earning an aggregate compensation in excess of this Contract's Maximum Contract Sum.

<u>NINTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR shall not perform or accept work requests from the Contract Manager or any other person that will cause the Maximum Contract Sum of this Contract to be exceeded. The CONTRACTOR shall monitor the balance of this Contract's Maximum Contract Sum. When the total of the CONTRACTOR'S paid invoices, invoices pending payment, invoices yet to be submitted, and ordered services reaches 75 percent of the Maximum Contract Sum, the CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify the Contract Manager in writing. The CONTRACTOR shall send written notification to the Contract Manager when this Contract is within six months from expiration of the term as provided for hereinabove.

<u>TENTH</u>: No cost-of-living adjustment shall be granted for the optional renewal periods.

<u>ELEVENTH</u>: In the event that terms and conditions, which may be listed in the CONTRACTOR'S Proposal, conflict with the COUNTY'S specifications, requirements, and terms and conditions as reflected in this AGREEMENT including, but not limited to, Exhibits A through G, inclusive, the COUNTY'S provisions shall control and be binding.

<u>TWELFTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR agrees in strict accordance with the Contract specifications and conditions to meet the COUNTY'S requirements.

THIRTEENTH: This Contract constitutes the entire agreement between the COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR with respect to the subject matter of this Contract and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings. This CONTRACT may be signed by the parties hereto in separate counterparts, including both counterparts that are executed on paper and counterparts that are in the form of electronic signatures. Electronic signatures include facsimile or e-mail electronic signatures. Each executed counterpart shall be deemed an original. All counterparts, taken together, constitute the executed Agreement.

The parties hereby acknowledge and agree that electronic records and electronic signatures, as well as facsimile signatures, used in connection with the execution of this Agreement and electronic signatures, facsimile signatures or signatures transmitted by electronic mail in so-called pdf format shall be legal and binding and shall have the same full force and effect as if a paper original of this Agreement had been delivered and had been signed using a handwritten signature. Contractor and County (i) agree that an electronic signature, whether digital or encrypted, of a party to this Agreement is intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as a manual signature, (ii) intend to be bound by the signatures (whether original, faxed or electronic) on any document sent or delivered by facsimile or, electronic mail, or other electronic means, (iii) are aware that the other party will rely on such signatures, and (iv) hereby waive any defenses to the enforcement of the terms of this Agreement based on the foregoing forms of signature. If this Agreement has been executed by electronic signature, all parties executing this document are expressly consenting under the United States Federal Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act of 2000 (E-SIGN) and California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (UETA)(Cal. Civ. #### CONSTRUCTION-RELATED CONTRACT PUBLIC CONTRACTING AND ASSET MANAGEMENT CORE SERVICE AREA ON-CALL GEOTECHNICAL AND RELATED SERVICES AWARD CONSULTANT SERVICES AGREEMENTS (ALL SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS) (3 VOTES)

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to execute nine consultant services agreements to augment Public Works' ability to provide on-call geotechnical and related services on behalf of the County of Los Angeles.

## IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed actions are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.
- 2. Award and delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute consultant services agreements with the following nine business firms: four small-sized business firms (Geopentech, Inc.; Geotechnical Professionals, Inc.; Hushmand Associates, Inc., and Geo-Advantec, Inc.); one medium-sized business firm (Petra Geosciences, Inc.), and four large-sized business firms (Kleinfelder, Inc.; AECOM Technical Services, Inc.; Leighton Consulting, Inc.; and Tetra Tech, Inc.) for a total not-to-exceed aggregate program amount of \$20 million for the entire 3-year term plus two 1-year extension options, if exercised. These consultant services agreements will be subject to the

- additional extension provisions. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to authorize additional services and extend the agreement expiration date as necessary to complete those additional services when those additional services are: (1) previously unforeseen, (2) related to a previously assigned scope of work on a given project, and (3) are necessary for the completion of that given project.
- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to supplement the initial not-to-exceed program amount of \$20 million by 25 percent of the original amount based on workload requirements for a total aggregate program amount of \$25 million.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to administer the agreements, and at the discretion of the Director of Public Works or his designee, to exercise the options extending these agreements for the two 1-year extension options based upon project demands and the level of satisfaction with the services provided with no change to initial not-to-exceed agreement amount for each category.

## PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The recommended consultant services agreements will augment staff and expertise in Los Angeles County Public Works to provide on-call geotechnical and related services throughout the County. The volume of requests for these services and their turnaround time varies throughout the year. Frequent surges in workload and requests for specialized expertise create the need for the on-call geotechnical and related services.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality, and Objective II.3.2, Foster a Cleaner, More Efficient, and More Resilient Energy System; Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets, by contracting the contractors that have the specialized expertise to provide these services accurately, efficiently, timely, and in a responsive manner. The recommended actions improve the environmental, economic, and social well-being of our communities while maximizing and leveraging resources.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total cost of the on-call consultant services shall not exceed an aggregate total program amount of \$20 million plus a 25 percent supplement (totaling \$5 million) for a maximum aggregate program amount of \$25 million for all nine consulting business firms over a 3-year period with two optional 1-year extensions for a maximum duration of 5 years, subject to the additional extension provisions specified below. It is expected the initial 3-year term of the agreements will start in Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23 and conclude in FY 2024-25. The two 1-year extension options, if exercised, would be operative through FY 2025-26 and FY 2026-27. When the 25 percent supplement is exercised by Public Works a notification will be made to the Board on as-needed basis.

Sufficient funding to finance work orders for these agreements will be financed through the appropriate capital, refurbishment, infrastructure, or various operating and special fund(s). For capital projects and refurbishments, no work will be assigned to these consultants without prior review and funding verification from the Chief Executive Office. For Public Works' infrastructure and maintenance projects, no work will be assigned to these consultants without the appropriate funding authorization.

Expenditures for the subject services incurred by Public Works' Internal Service Fund-Capital Project Management Program (B04) will be reimbursed through approved individual project budgets.

# FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

A standard consultant services agreement, in the form previously approved by County Counsel, will be used. The consultant services agreements contain terms and conditions in compliance with the Chief Executive Officer's and the Board's requirements. The consultant services agreements also include a provision requiring the consultant business firms track subcontractors' utilization of Local Small Business Enterprise (LSBE), Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise, and Social Enterprise businesses.

The term of each consultant services agreement shall commence on the date of the full execution of the agreement and shall extend for a period of 3 years from such commencement date, plus two 1-year extension options for each firm, for a maximum agreement duration of 5 years. The expiration of each of the consultant services agreements is subject to the following condition: where services for a given project have been authorized in writing by the County but are not completed by the consultant prior to the stated expiration date, the expiration date will be automatically extended solely to allow for the completion of such services.

Enclosure A reflects each consultant's minority participation and the Community Business Enterprises (CBEs) participation data.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed action is not a project pursuant to California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because it is an activity that is excluded from the definition of a project by Section 21065 of the California Public Resources Code and Section 15378(b) of the CEQA Guidelines. The proposed action to award on-call geotechnical and related services is an administrative activity of the government, which will not result in direct or indirect changes to the environment. We will return to the Board as necessary for consideration of appropriate environmental documentation prior to the approval of any activities that constitute a project under CEQA.

#### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

On May 18, 2022, a notice of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was placed on the County's "Doing Business with Los Angeles County" website (Enclosure B) and Public Works' "Do Business with Public Works" website, and advertisements were placed in the *Daily Breeze, La Opinión, Long Beach Press-Telegram, Los Angeles Daily Journal, Los Angeles Sentinel, Pasadena Star News, San Gabriel Valley Tribune, Santa Monica Daily Press, The Signal, and World Journal.* Also, Public Works informed 1,305 Local Small Business Enterprises, 168 Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises, and 171 Social Enterprises about this business opportunity and 39 registered on Public Works website for this RFP.

The RFP allowed business firms to compete as primes in one of three categories: small-, medium-, or large-sized business firms. Each firm was requested to certify its own size based on number of personnel for competition with other business firms in the same size category. The RFP stated that a total of up to 9 business firms would be awarded contracts as follows: 4 small-sized business firms (with 25 or fewer personnel), 3 medium-sized business firms (with 26 to 75 personnel), and 2 large-sized business firms (with over 75 personnel).

On June 29, 2022, a total of 20 proposals were received: 5 small-sized business firm proposals, 3 medium-sized business firm proposals, and 12 large-sized firm proposals. The RFP also stated that prior to the award, the County reserves the right to increase or decrease the number of selected business firms in any size category or the total number of contracts. Due to only 3 business firms submitting proposals in the medium-sized category and only 1 of the 3 business firms in the medium-sized category passing the

evaluation process, Public Works has opted to increase the number of large-sized contracts by 2, for a total of 4.

Evaluation committees, each consisting of Public Works' staff, evaluated the proposals based on criteria described in the RFP, including technical expertise, experience, personnel, qualifications, and understanding of the work requirements. Based on the evaluation of the proposals, the following business firms were selected without regard to race, creed, color, or gender: four small-sized business firms (Geopentech, Inc. [SBE]; Geotechnical Professionals, Inc.; Hushmand Associates, Inc. [SBE]; and Geo-Advantec, Inc. [LSBE]); one medium-sized firm (Petra Geosciences, Inc.), and four large-sized business firms (Kleinfelder, Inc.; AECOM Technical Services, Inc.; Leighton Consulting, Inc.; and Tetra Tech, Inc.),

The business firms selected represent the best-qualified business firms to provide the required services. Public Works has determined that the business firms' proposed rates for performing the services are reasonable. Three-year contracting history for the selected business firms is on file with Public Works. Public Works notified the union on this solicitation.

Public Works has evaluated and determined that the Los Angeles County Code Chapter 2.201 (Living Wage Program) does not apply to the recommended agreements. These agreements are exempt from the requirements of Proposition A because the services are required on a part-time and intermittent basis.

The consultant services agreements include a cost-of-living adjustment provision in accordance with the Board Policy No. 5.070 – Multi-Year Services Contract Cost-of-Living Adjustments.

## IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

There will be no impact on current County services or projects as a result of authorizing the recommended consultant services agreements. These consultant services agreements will provide necessary on-call geotechnical and related services to assist various County projects in an efficient manner, enhancing the delivery of Public Works and County projects.



- 3. Approve the final map for Tract 61105-38.
- 4. Accept grants and dedications as indicated on the final map for Tract 61105-38.

## PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to approve the final map for Tract 61105-38 (enclosed). The proposed final map consists of 67.11 acres and will create one mixed-use/commercial lot, one water-quality facility lot, one private and future street lot, and 13 open-space lots.

The Planning Director approved a substantial conformance review for this subdivision on March 28, 2019. The subdivider has complied with all requirements imposed as a condition of the approval of the tentative map, and the final map is in substantial conformance of this subdivision with the approved tentative map.

Pursuant to the State Subdivision Map Act, a local agency must approve a final map if the subdivider has complied with all applicable requirements of State and local law and the legislative body finds that the final map is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map.

The grants and dedications, as indicated on the final map, are necessary for construction and maintenance of public infrastructure required by the County for this development.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended action allows the County to record the final map, which will maximize property tax revenue.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no adverse impact to the County General Fund. The one mixed-use/commercial lot created by the recordation of this final map will generate additional property tax revenue that is shared by all taxing entities.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The approval of the final map is subject to provisions of the State Subdivision Map Act [Government Code, sections 66410, et seq.; 66458, subsection (a); 66473; 66474.1; 66436, subsection (a)(3)(A)(i); and 66427.1, subsection (A)], which states that a legislative body shall not deny approval of a final map if it has previously approved a tentative map for the proposed subdivision and finds that the final map is in substantial conformance with the previously approved tentative map.

The final map has been reviewed by Public Works for mathematical accuracy, survey analysis, title information, and for compliance with local ordinances and the State Subdivision Map Act. Public Works' review indicates that the subdivision is substantially the same as it appears on the approved tentative map, that all State and local provisions and legal requirements have been met on this final map, and that the final map is technically correct.

All agreements and improvement securities, which were required as a condition of the approval of the final map, have been accepted on behalf of the County by the appropriate official.

## ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

On May 19, 2011, the Board approved and certified the Final Environmental Impact Report for Vesting Tentative Tract Map 61105, which was completed in compliance with the CEQA and the State and County CEQA guidelines. The Board certified the 2017 Final Recirculated Analysis on July 18, 2017, and the Planning Director approved an addendum to the Final Environmental Impact Report on March 28, 2019, and found no substantial evidence that the project will have a significant effect on the environment.

The recommended actions are not subject to CEQA because the approval of a final subdivision map is ministerial pursuant to Section 15268, subsection (b)(3), of the State CEQA Guidelines and Section 21080, subsection (b)(1), of the California Public Resources Code.

There will be no negative impact on current County services or projects as a result of approving the final map for Tract 61105-38.



#### TRANSPORTATION CORE SERVICE AREA DELEGATE AUTHORITY TO THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT FOR THE MARINA DEL REY SHUTTLE SERVICE (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 2) (3 VOTES)

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to negotiate and execute an agreement with Playa Vista Parks and Landscape Corporation for operation of the Marina del Rey Shuttle Service.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that this service is statutorily exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act.
- 2. Find that the use of a sole source agreement with Playa Vista Parks and Landscape Corporation, the only operator of a community shuttle service expressing an interest to partner with the Marina del Rey Shuttle Service, is in the best interest of the Los Angeles County.
- 3. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to negotiate and execute an agreement with Playa Vista Parks and Landscape Corporation for the operation of the Marina del Rey Shuttle Service in the annual amount of \$93,000. This agreement will be for a term of 1 year commencing upon approval by the Board and execution of the agreement by both parties, with three 1-year renewal options and month-to-month extensions up to 6 months

for a maximum potential total contract term of 54 months and with a potential contract sum of \$418,500.

- 4. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to annually increase the contract sum up to an additional 10 percent for any additional work and any negotiated rate increases that are within the scope of the agreement, if required, for a potential maximum contract sum of \$460,350.
- 5.

Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to renew the agreement for each renewal option if, in the opinion of the Director of Public Works or his designee, Playa Vista Parks and Landscape Corporation has successfully performed during the previous agreement period and the services are still required; negotiate with the Playa Vista Parks and Landscape Corporation on any and all matters related to this agreement, including negotiating and signing any change notices, and any amendments which are subject to the stated limitations; and to suspend service, if in the opinion of the Director of Public Works or his designee, it is in the best interest of the Los Angeles County to do so.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions is to continue the Marina del Rey Shuttle Service as a summer/weekend service. The community shuttle will provide Friday and weekend fixed-route transit service to the residents, tourists, and visitors of Marina del Rey. The County has contracted for this service since 2006.

The contract also includes the cost for vehicle graphics in accordance with the contract.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability Our Daily Reality; Objective II.3.5, Support a clean, flexible, and integrated multimodal transportation system that improves mobility; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability; Objective III.3.1, Maximize Revenue.

This transit service improves the mobility options and quality of life for County residents and visitors to the Marina del Rey area. By continuing to jointly fund this service with the Playa Vista Parks and Landscape Corporation (PVPAL) transit services are provided to the public in a cost-effective, timely, and responsive manner.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The agreement includes the cost of operation and vehicle graphics for an annual amount of \$93,000 plus an additional 10 percent, if required, for any additional work and any negotiated rate and cost increases that are within the scope of work of the agreement.

Funds for the first contract year for the Marina del Rey Shuttle Service are available in the Second Supervisorial District's Proposition A Local Return Transit Program in the Transit Operations Fund (CP6, Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget. Funds to finance the operating costs for future fiscal years will be requested through the annual budget process.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Public Works developed the Marina del Rey Shuttle Service by expanding on an existing weekend shuttle service provided by the Playa Capital Company, LLC, for the Playa Vista master planned community. The County first entered into an agreement in July 2006 with the Playa Capital Company, LLC (the developer of the Playa Vista master planned community), to expand their limited stop Playa Vista, Marina del Rey, and Venice Beach Pier Summer Shuttle into a larger Marina del Rey Summer Shuttle Pilot project for the 2006 and 2007 summer seasons. Since May of 2008 the County has provided this service in collaboration with PVPAL, Playa Vista Homeowners Association, and its successor, the Playa Capital Company, LLC.

From October 2016 to March 2020, prior to the Corona Virus pandemic, the service was expanded to a year-round service with additional financial contribution from the Los Angeles Department of Beaches and Harbors. This agreement with PVPAL will operate as a seasonal summer service during the months of May through September. The contract will commence upon the Board's approval and execution of the agreement by both parties for a period of 1 year and may be renewed for three 1-year renewal options plus a month-to-month extension up to 6 months for a maximum potential contract term of 54 months.

Prior to the Director executing this agreement, it will be approved as to form by County Counsel. The recommended sole source agreement with PVPAL is in accordance with applicable Federal, State, and County requirements. The contractor is in compliance

with the requirements of the Chief Executive Officer and the Board. The justification for sole source contracts checklist is enclosed.

Public Works has determined that the Living Wage Program (Los Angeles County Code Chapter 2.201) does not apply to this recommended agreement. This service is required on a part-time or intermittent basis and is not a Proposition A Contract (Los Angeles County Code Chapter 2.121).

The terms and conditions for County service contracts supporting the Board's ordinances, policies, and programs were reviewed for applicability to this agreement. PVPAL has agreed to incorporate them as a part of this agreement and these include. but are not limited to, County's Greater Avenues for Independence and General Relief Opportunities for Work Programs, Board Policy No. 5.050; Contract Language to Assist in Placement of Displaced County Workers, Board Policy No. 5.110; Reporting of Improper Solicitations, Board Policy No. 5.060; Notice to Contract Employees of Newborn Abandonment Law (Safely Surrendered Baby Law), Board Policy No. 5.135; Contractor Employee Jury Service Program, Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.203; Notice to Employees Regarding the Federal Earned Income Credit (Federal Income Tax Law, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015); Contractor Responsibility and Debarment, Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.202; the Los Angeles County's Child Support Compliance Program, Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.200; and Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program Ordinance, Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.206; and the standard Board directed clauses that provide for contract termination or renegotiation.

Proof of the required Comprehensive General and Automobile Liability insurance policies, naming the County as an additional insured, and evidence of Workers Compensation insurance will be obtained from the contractor before any work commences under this contract.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed service is statutorily exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 21080 (b)(10) of the Public Resources Code. This exemption provides for the implementation of passenger or commuter transit services.

#### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

In 2006 the Board approved the operation of this service as a sole source agreement with the Playa Capital Company, LLC, and its successor PVPAL. The Board has provided for annual renewal of the service since its inception. The current agreement was approved by the Board in April 2017 for a period of 5 years through April 30, 2022, and in accordance with prior Board approval, on May 1, 2022, this contract was extended on a month-to-month basis for a maximum period of 6 months.

Public Works has continued to meet with several public transit agencies that provide fixed-route public transit service in or near the Marina del Rey area, including Metro, Culver City Transit, Santa Monica Big Blue Bus, and the City of Los Angeles Department of Transportation in addition to PVPAL to determine if they could expand their routes to better serve Marina del Rey and if any were able and willing to provide a shuttle service within the marina. PVPAL is the only operator of a community shuttle service that has continued to express an interest in providing the service. Public Works determined that by continuing to partner with PVPAL's existing weekend summer shuttle the County would be able to provide a nonduplicate service at approximately one-half of the operating costs. We recommend that Marina del Rey Shuttle Service be awarded as a sole source contract to PVPAL.

PVPAL periodically conducts a competitive bidding process for this service and has annually negotiated a service rate with their lowest cost bidder. The current service provider was first subcontracted in May 2013. The hourly service rate that PVPAL will be paying their subcontractor this upcoming summer is anticipated to be within the same range as bids received by Public Works for other community fixed-route transit services.

# **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

This action provides for the continuation of the current service. The service enhances traveler options by providing transfer opportunities with Metro, Santa Monica Big Blue Bus, and Culver City bus lines and provides service to evening concerts at Chace Park and transporting residents and visitors to key destinations throughout Marina del Rey.



#### CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT TRANSPORTATION CORE SERVICE AREA ADOPT, ADVERTISE, AND AWARD WILLOWBROOK 2 PROJECT AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES PROJECT ID NO. RDC0016424 IN THE UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITY OF WILLOWBROOK (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 2) (3 VOTES)

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to procure a construction contract for the Willowbrook 2 Project Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities project in the unincorporated community of Willowbrook.

# IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Find that the recommended actions are within the scope of the County of Los Angeles 2012 Bicycle Master Program Environmental Impact Report previously certified by the Board or are otherwise exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.

- Approve the project and adopt the plans and specifications that are on file in Project Management Division III for the Willowbrook 2 Project Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities project at an estimated construction contract cost between \$3,100,000 and \$4,600,000.
- 3. Instruct the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors to advertise for bids in accordance with the Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisement and that are to be received before 11 a.m. on May 30, 2023, in accordance with the Notice Inviting Bids.
- 4. Find pursuant to State Public Contract Code, Section 3400 (c) (2) that it is necessary to specify the designated items by specific brand name in order to match other products in use on a particular public improvement either completed or in the course of completion.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to determine whether the bid of the apparent responsible contractor with the lowest apparent responsive bid is, in fact, responsive and, if not responsive, to determine which apparent responsible contractor submitted the lowest responsive bid.
- 6. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to award and execute a construction contract for the Willowbrook 2 Project Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities project with the responsible contractor with the lowest responsive bid within or less than the estimated cost range of \$3,100,000 and \$4,600,000, or that exceeds the estimated cost range by no more than 15 percent, if additional and appropriate funds have been identified.
- 7. Delegate to the Director of Public Works or his designee the following authority in connection with this contract: (1) extend the date and time for the receipt of bids consistent with the requirements of State Public Contract Code, Section 4104.5; (2) allow substitution of subcontractors and relief of bidders upon demonstration of the grounds set forth in State Public Contract Code, Sections 4100 et seq., and 5100 et seq., respectively; (3) approve and execute change orders within the same monetary limits delegated to the Director of Public Works or his designee under Section 2.18.050 of the Los Angeles County Code; (4) accept the project upon its final completion; and (5) release retention money withheld consistent with the requirements of State Public Contract Code, Sections 7107 and 9203.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and allow Public Works to construct roadway improvements to expand pedestrian and bicycle facilities in the unincorporated community of Willowbrook (see Enclosure A).

The project includes installation of bike lanes and bike routes; upgrades to traffic signals to include new pedestrian features; construction of curb ramps, curb extensions with landscaping, decorative crosswalks, and sidewalk enhancements; installation of site furnishings, wayfinding signs, and irrigation systems; and planting drought tolerant trees.

The project will improve access for pedestrians and transit users to the Metro Blue Line Rosa Park Station.

It is anticipated the work will start in October 2023 and be completed in April 2025.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities, Objective II.2.2, Expand Access to Recreational and Cultural Opportunities, and Objective II.2.4, Promote Active and Healthy Lifestyles. In addition, these recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets by supporting ongoing efforts to encourage the use of alternate modes of transportation and manage and improve public infrastructure assets.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The estimated construction contract cost to complete this project is in the range of \$3,100,000 and \$4,600,000 with a maximum construction contract cost to be 15 percent above this range. The total project cost is estimated to be \$6,600,000. In addition to the construction contract cost, the total project cost includes the preparation of plans and specifications, consultant services, survey, utility clearances, inspection, contract administration, change order contingency, and other County services.

The Sustainable Transportation Infrastructure and Transportation Related Amenities portion of the project will be administered utilizing grant funds in the amount of \$3,205,700 under the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program. The remaining project cost for the Sustainable Transportation Infrastructure and Transportation Related Amenities work in the amount of \$3,094,300, is funded with the Second Supervisorial District's Transportation Improvement Program Measure R Local Return funds. The work to upgrade traffic signal and pedestrian pushbuttons in the amount of \$300,000, is funded with the State of California Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account funds allocated to the County under the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 (Senate Bill 1).

Funding for the project is included in the Road Fund (B03 – Capital Assets-Infrastructure and Services and Supplies) and the Second Supervisorial District's Transportation Improvement Program in the Measure R Local Return Fund (CN5 – Capital Assets-Infrastructure and Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budgets.

# FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

This project will be advertised in accordance with Section 20392 of the State Public Contract Code.

State Public Contract Code Section 3400 allows a product to be designated by specific brand name for several purposes, one of which is to match other products in use on a particular public improvement either completed or in the course of completion, if the awarding authority makes a finding and language is included in the Notice Inviting Bids. The Notice Inviting Bids includes language describing this finding.

A list of specific brand names and qualified purposes in accordance with the State Public Contract Code is provided in Enclosure B.

The contract award will comply with applicable Federal and State requirements and Board policies and mandates. The contract documents will require the contractor to comply with these same requirements, policies, and mandates. The construction contract will be in the form previously reviewed and approved as to form by County Counsel.

As required by Board Policy No. 5.140, information such as defaulted contracts with the County, complaints filed with the Contractors State License Board, labor violations, and debarment actions will be considered before a contract is awarded.

Documents related to award of this contract will be available at Los Angeles County Public Works, Project Management Division III, 900 South Fremont Avenue, 8th Floor, Alhambra, CA 91803.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

On February 28, 2012, (Agenda Item 7), the Board certified that the Final Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) for the County 2012 Bicycle Master Program (BMP) is in compliance with CEQA and that it reviewed and considered the information presented within the Final PEIR before it approved the County 2012 BMP; found that the Final PEIR reflected the independent judgment and analysis of the County; determined that the significant adverse effect of the projects included in the County 2012 BMP have been reduced to an acceptable level as outlined in the Findings of Fact; adopted the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program; and made a finding pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21081.6, that the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program is adequately designed to ensure compliance with the mitigation measures during the BMP implementation. Subsequently, on March 13, 2012, the Board adopted the County 2012 BMP to replace the 1975 Master Plan of Bikeways.

The recommended actions are within the previously certified PEIR, where the Class II bicycle route on 120th Street from 200 feet east of Central Avenue to Compton Avenue and Class III bicycle route on 124th Street from Slater Avenue to Compton Avenue was considered in the Final PEIR for the County 2012 BMP. Furthermore, additional related project activities are exempt from CEQA. The project activities, including construction of bulbouts, sidewalk reconstruction, installation of wayfinding signs, and parkway tree planting, are within a class of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and which meet the criteria set forth in Sections 15301 (c) and 15311 (a) of the State CEQA Guidelines; and Class 1 (x) Subsections 4, 9, 13, 14, 18, 19, and 22, and Class 11 (d) of the County's Environmental Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. In addition, based on the proposed project records, it will comply with all applicable regulations, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists complied pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

There are no changes to the project or to the circumstances under which the project is undertaken that require further review under CEQA.

Upon the Board's approval of the project, Public Works will file a Notice of Determination with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152 (a) of the California Public Resources Code.

The previously certified PEIR is available online and can be viewed at <u>https://pw.lacounty.gov/tpp/bike/masterplan.cfm</u>, it can also be viewed in-person. The location and custodian of such documents and other materials is Edward Dingman, Senior Civil Engineer, Transportation Planning and Programs, 900 South Fremont Avenue, Alhambra, CA 91803, 11th Floor, Los Angeles County Public Works.

#### CONTRACTING PROCESS

Contract provisions require the contractor to comply with the Board-adopted Local and Targeted Worker Hire Policy.

In accordance with the Board's consolidated Local and Targeted Worker Hire Policy, the contract documents for the project will require that at least 30 percent of the total California craft worker hours for construction of the project be performed by Local Residents and at least 10 percent be performed by Targeted Workers facing employment barriers.

To increase contractor awareness of Public Works' program to contract work out to the private sector, this project will be listed on both the County's "Doing Business with Los Angeles County" and "Do Business with Public Works" websites for open bids:

Also, the contract solicitation will be advertised through web-based and social media platforms, including Twitter.

In addition, to increase opportunities for small businesses, Public Works will coordinate with the Office of Small Business at the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs to maximize outreach, as well as offer preferences to Local Small Business Enterprises, Social Enterprises, and Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises, in compliance with Los Angeles County Code; Chapters 2.204, 2.205, and 2.211.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

When the project is completed, it will have a positive impact by reducing pedestrian exposure to vehicles, improve driver compliance with crossings, provide better control of vehicle speeds, improve safety for people walking and bicycling to the Metro Blue Line Rosa Park Station thereby increasing transit ridership.



#### SERVICES CONTRACT WATER RESOURCES CORE SERVICE AREA AWARD OF SERVICES CONTRACTS FOR ON-CALL CHANNEL RIGHT OF WAY CLEARING SERVICES - SAN GABRIEL RIVER AND WEST AREA (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS 1, 3, AND 5) (3 VOTES)

#### <u>SUBJECT</u>

Public Works is seeking Board approval to award two on-call services contracts for channel right of way clearing services: one contract for San Gabriel River to J. Orozco Enterprises, Inc., dba Orozco Landscape and Tree Company, a Local Small Business Enterprise; and one contract for West Area to International Environmental Corporation, a Local Small Business Enterprise.

# IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed contract work is categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Award the contract for on-call channel right of way clearing services -San Gabriel River to J. Orozco Enterprises, Inc., dba Orozco Landscape and Tree Company, a Local Small Business Enterprise. This services

contract will be for a term of 1 year with three 1-year renewal options and a month-to-month extension up to 6 months for a maximum potential contract term of 54 months and a maximum potential contract sum of \$4,908,357.08.

- 3. Award the contract for on-call channel right of way clearing services West Area to International Environmental Corporation, a Local Small Business Enterprise. This services contract will be for a term of 1 year with three 1-year renewal options and a month-to-month extension up to 6 months for a maximum potential contract term of 54 months and a maximum potential contract sum of \$16,328,847.46.
- 4 Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute these contracts; to renew these contracts for each additional renewal option and extension period if, in the opinion of the Director of Public Works or his designee, J. Orozco Enterprises, Inc., dba Orozco Landscape and Tree Company, and International Environmental Corporation, have successfully performed the contract work during the previous contract period(s), and the services are still required; to approve and execute amendments to incorporate necessary changes within the scope of work; and to suspend work if it is in the best interest of the County to do so.
- 5 Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to annually increase the contracts amounts up to an additional 10 percent of the annual contract sum, which is included in the maximum potential contract sum for unforeseen additional work within the scope of the contracts if required, and to adjust the annual contract sums for each option year over the term of the contracts to allow for an annual cost-of-living adjustment in accordance with County policy and the terms of the contracts.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended action will award services contracts to: J. Orozco Enterprises, Inc., dba Orozco Landscape and Tree Company, to provide on-call and intermittent channel right of way clearing services to maintain various flood control channel facilities within the San Gabriel River area, which includes approximately 6 miles of flood control channel, and International Environmental Corporation to provide on-call and intermittent channel right of way clearing services to maintain various flood control channel facilities within western portions of Los Angeles County, which includes approximately 145 miles of flood control channels. The work to be performed is to clear vegetation, trash, debris, and brush growing within various flood control channel operational rights of way, and vegetation growing out of channel lining weep holes,

expansion joints, cold joints, construction joints, and cracks at the channel reaches. The anticipated workload exceeds the capacity of presently available County staff, so augmentation with the recommended on-call contractors is necessary to ensure timely delivery of these services. Public Works has contracted for these services since 2000.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.1, Drive Economic and Workforce Development in the County, Objective II.1.2, Support Small Businesses and Social Enterprises; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets, by supporting ongoing efforts to maintain public infrastructure assets.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The contract amounts are based on Public Works' estimated annual utilization of the contractors' service at the unit prices and the hourly rates quoted by the contractors.

The maximum potential contract sum for channel right of way clearing services at the San Gabriel River is \$4,908,357.08 for the maximum contract period of 54 months, which includes disposal fee reimbursement plus an additional 10 percent of the contract sum for unforeseen, additional work within the scope of the contract. The maximum potential contract sum for channel right of way clearing services at the West Area is \$16,328,847.46 for the maximum contract period of 54 months, which includes disposal fee reimbursement plus an additional 10 percent of the contract sum for unforeseen, additional work within the scope of the contract sum for unforeseen, additional work within the scope of the contract. Adjustments will be made to the annual contracts sums for each option year over the term of the contracts to allow for an annual cost-of-living adjustment in accordance with County policy and the terms of the contracts. Any unused authorized amounts up to 25 percent from the previous contract terms will roll over into subsequent renewal terms. Total annual expenditures for these services, however, will not exceed the maximum potential contract sum for each contract approved by the Board.

Funding for the first year of these services is included in the Internal Service Fund (B04 - Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget, which will be reimbursed by the Flood Control District Fund (B07 - Services and Supplies). Funds to finance the contracts' optional years and 10 percent additional funding for contingencies will be requested through the annual budget process.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The recommended contractors are J. Orozco Enterprises, Inc., dba Orozco Landscape and Tree Company, located in Irwindale, California, and International Environmental Corporation, located in Canyon Country, California. Both contractors are certified by the County of Los Angeles as Local Small Business Enterprises. These contracts' initial terms will be for a period of 1 year commencing upon the Board's approval and execution between both parties, whichever occurs last. With the Board's delegated authority, Public Works may renew these contracts for three 1-year renewal options and a month-to-month extension up to 6 months for a maximum potential total contract term of 54 months.

County Counsel will review and approve the contracts as to form (Enclosure A.1 and Enclosure A.2) prior to executing. The recommended contracts with J. Orozco Enterprises, Inc., and International Environmental Corporation, were solicited on an open-competitive basis and are in accordance with applicable Federal, State, and County requirements.

Standard services contracts have been used that contain terms and conditions in compliance with the Board's ordinances, policies, and programs. Enclosure B.1 and Enclosure B.2 reflect the proposers' utilization participation and community business enterprise program information. Data regarding the proposers' minority participation is on file with Public Works. The contractors were selected upon final analysis and consideration without regard to race, creed, gender, or color.

Public Works has evaluated and determined that the contracted services are required on an on-call and intermittent basis; therefore, Proposition A (County Code Chapter 2.121) and the Living Wage Program (County Code Chapter 2.201) do not apply to these contracts. In addition, the contractors understand and agree that the contracted work involves public works as defined by Section 1720 of the California Labor Code. The contractors represent and warrant that they will perform the contracted work in full compliance with the applicable provisions of the Labor Code relating to payment of prevailing wages.

These contracts include a cost-of-living adjustment provision, which is in accordance with Board Policy 5.070, Multi-Year Services Contract Cost-of-Living Adjustments.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

These services are categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act. These services are within a class of projects that have been determined not to have the potential to cause a significant effect on the environment in that they meet the criteria set forth in Section 15301(c) of the State California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines and Class 1, subsection (e) of the County's

Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. In addition, the contract work involves clearing of existing channels and rights of way, is not in a sensitive environment, and the work will comply with all applicable regulations. Based on the project records, there will be no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste sites compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable. Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code and will post the notice to its website pursuant to Section 21092.2.

#### CONTRACTING PROCESS

The Request for Statement of Qualifications (RFSQ) has been open continuous since 2015. Advertisement and outreach activities were conducted during the RFSQ process, which were placed on the "Doing Business with Los Angeles County" website (Enclosure C), "Do Business with Public Works" website, and Twitter. Also. Public Works informed over 1,200 Local Business Enterprises Small and 298 independent contractors, various business development centers, and municipalities about this business opportunity. A total of four Statement of Qualifications (SOQs) have been received in response to the RFSQ. The SOQs were first reviewed to ensure they met the mandatory requirements outlined in the RFSQ. All four SOQs met these mandatory requirements. These four SOQs were then evaluated by an evaluation committee consisting of Public Works staff. The committee's evaluation was based on criteria described in the RFSQ, including experience, work plan, and references, utilizing the informed averaging methodology for applicable criteria. Based on this evaluation, Public Works selected four apparent, responsive, and responsible vendors that were placed on the Qualified Contractors List.

On June 16, 2022, a notice of the Invitation for Bids was e-mailed to the four vendors on the Qualified Contractors List for on-call channel clearing services.

On July 14, 2022, three bids were received for San Gabriel River and on August 24, 2022, three bids were received for the West Area. All bids were evaluated based on the price category. Based on this evaluation, it is recommended that these contracts be awarded to the apparent low bid, responsive, and responsible bidders, J. Orozco Enterprises, Inc., dba Orozco Landscape and Tree Company, for San Gabriel River, and International Environmental Corporation, for the West Area.

# **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The award of these contracts will not result in the displacement of any County employees as these services are presently contracted with the private sector.

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 2023, by and between the COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, a subdivision of the State of California, a body corporate and politic (hereinafter referred to as COUNTY) and J. OROZCO ENTERPRISES, INC. dba OROZCO LANDSCAPE AND TREE COMPANY, a California corporation, located at 1419 South Eastend Avenue, Pomona, CA 91766, (hereinafter referred to as CONTRACTOR). COUNTY and CONTRACTOR are each a Party and collectively referred to as the Parties.

#### <u>WITNESSETH</u>

<u>FIRST</u>: The CONTRACTOR, for the consideration hereinafter set forth and the acceptance by the Board of Supervisors of said COUNTY of the CONTRACTOR'S Bid filed with the COUNTY on July 14, 2022, hereby agrees to provide services as described in this Contract for On-Call Channel Right-of-Way Clearing Services - San Gabriel River.

SECOND: This AGREEMENT, together with Exhibit A.1, (Supplemental) Scope of Work: Exhibit B, Service Contract General Requirements; Exhibit C, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015; Exhibit D, Safely Surrendered Baby Law Posters; Exhibit E, Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program; Exhibit F.1, (Supplemental) Performance Requirements Summary; Exhibit G.1, San Gabriel River - Santa Fe Dam to I-10 Freeway; Exhibit H.1, San Gabriel River – I-10 Freeway to Thienes Avenue; Exhibit I.1, Phase I - Typical Cross Section Initial and 2nd Contract Terms; Exhibit J.1, San Gabriel River – Santa Fe Dam to the Thienes Avenue Drop Structure; Exhibit K.1, Phase I - Typical Cross Section 1st and 3rd Contract Terms; Exhibit L, Phase II - Typical Cross Section; Exhibit M, Sample Vehicle Washing Station; Exhibit N, San Gabriel River Clearing Report; Exhibit O, San Gabriel River Clearing Services - Trash Disposal and Green Waste Recycling Report; and Exhibit P, Los Angeles County Flood Control District Boundary; the CONTRACTOR'S Statement of Qualifications and Bid Submissions, all attached hereto; the Request for Statement of Qualifications (RFSQ); Addenda to the RFSQ and the Invitation for Bids (IFB) and Addenda thereto, all of which are incorporated herein by reference, are agreed by the COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR to constitute the Contract.

<u>THIRD</u>: The COUNTY agrees, in consideration of satisfactory performance of the foregoing services in strict accordance with the Contract specifications to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Works, to pay the CONTRACTOR pursuant to the Schedule of Prices attached hereto as Form PW-2.1 (Initial Term), an amount not to exceed \$983,906.24, which includes \$196,781.25 for disposal fee reimbursement, for the Initial Term, and pursuant to the Schedule of Prices attached hereto as Form PW-2.2 (Option Years 1-3), an amount not to exceed \$993,781.88, which includes \$198,756.38 for disposal fee reimbursement, for the subsequent option years, plus up to 25 percent of any remaining amount unused from the previous Contract term(s), or such greater amount as the Board may approve (Maximum Contract Sum).

<u>FOURTH</u>: This Contract's Initial Term shall be for a period of 1 year commencing upon Board approval and execution between both parties, whichever occurs last.

The COUNTY shall have the sole option to renew this Contract term for up to three additional 1-year periods and six month-to-month extensions, for a maximum total Contract term of 54 months. Each such option shall be exercised at the sole discretion of the COUNTY. The COUNTY, acting through the Director, may give a written notice of intent to renew this Contract at least 10 days prior to the end of each term. At the sole discretion of the COUNTY, in lieu of renewing the Contract for the full 1 year, this Contract may be renewed on a month-to-month basis, upon written notice to the CONTRACTOR at least 10 days prior to the end of a term. The Director will provide a written notice of nonrenewal at least 10 days before the last day of any term, in which case this Contract shall expire as of midnight on the last day of that term. Where all option years have been exercised, the Director will not provide a written notice of nonrenewal.

<u>FIFTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR shall bill monthly, in arrears, for the work performed during the preceding month. Work performed shall be billed at the hourly rates and/or unit prices quoted in Form PW-2.1 (Initial Term) and PW-2.2 (Option Years 1-3), Schedule of Prices.

<u>SIXTH</u>: Public Works will make payment to the CONTRACTOR within 30 days of receipt and approval of a properly completed and undisputed invoice. However, should the CONTRACTOR be certified by the COUNTY as a Local Small Business Enterprise, payment will be made in accordance with Board of Supervisors Policy No. 3.035, Small Business Liaison and Prompt Payment Program. Each invoice shall be in triplicate (original and two copies) and shall itemize the work completed. The invoices shall be submitted to:

<u>SEVENTH</u>: In no event shall the aggregate total amount of compensation paid to the CONTRACTOR exceed the amount of compensation authorized by the Board. Such aggregate total amount is the Maximum Contract Sum.

<u>EIGHTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that only the designated Public Works Contract Manager is authorized to request or order work under this Contract. The CONTRACTOR acknowledges that the designated Contract Manager is not authorized to request or order any work that would result in the CONTRACTOR earning an aggregate compensation in excess of this Contract's Maximum Contract Sum.

<u>NINTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR shall not perform or accept work requests from the Contract Manager or any other person that will cause the Maximum Contract Sum of this Contract to be exceeded. The CONTRACTOR shall monitor the balance of this Contract's Maximum Contract Sum. When the total of the CONTRACTOR'S paid invoices, invoices pending payment, invoices yet to be submitted, and ordered services reaches 75 percent of the Maximum Contract Sum, the CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify the Contract Manager in writing. The CONTRACTOR shall send written notification to the Contract Manager when this Contract is within 6 months from expiration of the term as provided for hereinabove.

<u>TENTH</u>: If requested by the Contractor, the contract (hourly, daily, monthly, etc.) amount may, at the sole discretion of the County, be increased at the time of contract renewal, if exercised by the County, based on the most recently published percentage change in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics' Consumer Price Index for the Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County Area for the 12-month period preceding the renewal date, which shall be the effective date for any cost-of-living adjustment (COLA). However, any increase shall not exceed the general salary movement granted to County employees as determined by the Chief Executive Officer as of each July 1 for the prior 12-month period. Furthermore, should fiscal circumstances ultimately prevent the Board from approving any increase in County employee salaries, no COLA will be granted. Upon approval of COLA, a notification will be sent to the Contractor.

<u>ELEVENTH</u>: In the event that terms and conditions, which may be listed in the CONTRACTOR'S Bid, conflict with the COUNTY'S specifications, requirements, and terms and conditions as reflected in this AGREEMENT including, but not limited to, Exhibits A.1 through P, inclusive, the COUNTY'S provisions shall control and be binding.

<u>TWELFTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR agrees in strict accordance with the Contract specifications and conditions to meet the COUNTY'S requirements.

<u>THIRTEENTH</u>: This Contract constitutes the entire agreement between the COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR with respect to the subject matter of this Contract and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings. This CONTRACT may be signed by the parties hereto in separate counterparts, including both counterparts that are executed on paper and counterparts that are in the form of electronic signatures. Electronic signatures include facsimile or e-mail electronic signatures. Each executed counterpart shall be deemed an original. All counterparts, taken together, constitute the executed Agreement.

The parties hereby acknowledge and agree that electronic records and electronic signatures, as well as facsimile signatures, used in connection with the execution of this Agreement and electronic signatures, facsimile signatures or signatures transmitted by electronic mail in so-called pdf format shall be legal and binding and shall have the same full force and effect as if a paper original of this Agreement had been delivered and had been signed using a handwritten signature. Contractor and County (i) agree that an electronic signature, whether digital or encrypted, of a party to this Agreement is intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as a manual signature, (ii) intend to be bound by the signatures (whether original, faxed or electronic) on any document sent or delivered by facsimile, or electronic mail, or other electronic means, (iii) are aware that the other party will reply on such signatures, and (iv) hereby waive any defenses to the enforcement of the terms of this Agreement based on the foregoing forms of signature. If this Agreement has been executed by electronic signature, all parties executing this document are expressly consenting under the United States Federal Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act of 2000 (E-SIGN) and California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (UETA)(Cal. Civ. Code § 1633.1, et seq.), that a signature by fax, e-mail or other electronic means shall constitute an Electronic Signature to an Electronic Record under both E-SIGN and UETA with respect to this specific transaction

SECOND: This AGREEMENT, together with Exhibit A.1, (Supplemental) Scope of Work; Exhibit B, Service Contract General Requirements; Exhibit C, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015; Exhibit D, Safely Surrendered Baby Law Posters; Exhibit E, Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program; Exhibit F.1, (Supplemental) Performance Requirements Summary; Exhibit G.1, Typical Channel Drawing; Exhibit H.1, Vehicle and Walk Access Drawing; Exhibit I.1, Channel Right-Of-Way Clearing Report; Exhibit J.1, Channel Right-of-Way Clearing – Trash Disposal & Green Waste Recycling Report; Exhibit K.1, Bid Submission Instructions; Exhibit L.1, Intentionally Omitted; Exhibit M.1, Intentionally Omitted; Exhibit N, Vehicle and Walk Access With Backslope Drawing; Exhibit O, Los Angeles County Stormwater Maintenance Division - West Area; and Exhibit P, Maps of Channel Right-of-Way Clearing – West Area; the CONTRACTOR'S Statement of Qualifications (RFSQ); Addenda to the RFSQ and the Invitation for Bids (IFB) and Addenda thereto, all of which are incorporated herein by reference, are agreed by the COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR to constitute the Contract.

<u>THIRD</u>: The COUNTY agrees, in consideration of satisfactory performance of the foregoing services in strict accordance with the Contract specifications to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Works, to pay the CONTRACTOR pursuant to the applicable Schedule of Prices, attached hereto as Form PW-2.1.1 (Discounted Rates) which applies in the event the COUNTY requests Type A services three times in a contract year, or Form PW-2.1.2 (Non-Discounted Rates) in the event the COUNTY requests Type A services less than three times in a contract year. The annual contract amount shall not exceed \$3,298,757.06, which includes \$659,751.41 for disposal fee reimbursement, plus up to 25 percent of any remaining amount unused from the previous Contract term(s), or such greater amount as the Board may approve (Maximum Contract Sum).

<u>FOURTH</u>: This Contract's initial term shall be for a period of 1 year commencing upon Board approval and execution between both parties, whichever occurs last.

The COUNTY shall have the sole option to renew this Contract term for up to three additional 1-year periods and six month-to-month extensions, for a maximum total Contract term of 54 months. Each such option shall be exercised at the sole discretion of the COUNTY. The COUNTY, acting through the Director, may give a written notice of intent to renew this Contract at least 10 days prior to the end of each term. At the sole discretion of the COUNTY, in lieu of renewing the Contract for the full 1 year, this Contract may be renewed on a month-to-month basis, upon written notice to the CONTRACTOR at least 10 days prior to the end of a term. The Director will provide a written notice of nonrenewal at least 10 days before the last day of any term, in which case this Contract shall expire as of midnight on the last day of that term. Where all option years have been exercised, the Director will not provide a written notice of nonrenewal.

<u>FIFTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR shall bill monthly, in arrears, for the work performed during the preceding month. Work performed shall be billed at the hourly rates and/or unit prices quoted in Form PW-2.1.1, Schedule of Prices (Discounted Rates) that reflects the Discounted Rates applied to all three instances of Type A Work performed. In the event Type A Work is not requested by the COUNTY three times in a contract year, work performed shall be billed at the hourly rate and/or unit prices quoted in Form PW-2.1.2, Schedule of Prices (Non-Discounted Rates) and the CONTRACTOR may bill for the difference in price between prices quoted in Form PW-2.1.2, Schedule of Prices (Non-Discounted Rates) and PW-2.1.1, Schedule of Prices (Discounted Rates) for work that was previously done for any particular Contract year.

<u>SIXTH</u>: Public Works will make payment to the CONTRACTOR within 30 days of receipt and approval of a properly completed and undisputed invoice. However, should the CONTRACTOR be certified by the COUNTY as a Local Small Business Enterprise, payment will be made in accordance with Board of Supervisors Policy No. 3.035, Small Business Liaison and Prompt Payment Program. Each invoice shall be in triplicate (original and two copies) and shall itemize the work completed. The invoices shall be submitted to:

<u>SEVENTH</u>: In no event shall the aggregate total amount of compensation paid to the CONTRACTOR exceed the amount of compensation authorized by the Board. Such aggregate total amount is the Maximum Contract Sum.

<u>EIGHTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that only the designated Public Works Contract Manager is authorized to request or order work under this Contract. The CONTRACTOR acknowledges that the designated Contract Manager is not authorized to request or order any work that would result in the CONTRACTOR earning an aggregate compensation in excess of this Contract's Maximum Contract Sum.

<u>NINTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR shall not perform or accept work requests from the Contract Manager or any other person that will cause the Maximum Contract Sum of this Contract to be exceeded. The CONTRACTOR shall monitor the balance of this Contract's

Maximum Contract Sum. When the total of the CONTRACTOR'S paid invoices, invoices pending payment, invoices yet to be submitted, and ordered services reaches 75 percent of the Maximum Contract Sum, the CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify the Contract Manager in writing. The CONTRACTOR shall send written notification to the Contract Manager when this Contract is within 6 months from expiration of the term as provided for hereinabove.

<u>TENTH</u>: If requested by the Contractor, the contract (hourly, daily, monthly, etc.) amount may, at the sole discretion of the County, be increased at the time of contract renewal, if exercised by the County, based on the most recently published percentage change in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics' Consumer Price Index for the Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County Area for the 12-month period preceding the renewal date, which shall be the effective date for any cost-of-living adjustment (COLA). However, any increase shall not exceed the general salary movement granted to County employees as determined by the Chief Executive Officer as of each July 1 for the prior 12-month period. Furthermore, should fiscal circumstances ultimately prevent the Board from approving any increase in County employee salaries, no COLA will be granted. Upon approval of COLA, a notification will be sent to the Contractor.

<u>ELEVENTH</u>: In the event that terms and conditions, which may be listed in the CONTRACTOR'S Bid, conflict with the COUNTY'S specifications, requirements, and terms and conditions as reflected in this AGREEMENT including, but not limited to, Exhibits A.1 through P, inclusive, the COUNTY'S provisions shall control and be binding.

<u>TWELFTH</u>: The CONTRACTOR agrees in strict accordance with the Contract specifications and conditions to meet the COUNTY'S requirements.

<u>THIRTEENTH</u>: This Contract constitutes the entire agreement between the COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR with respect to the subject matter of this Contract and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings. This CONTRACT may be signed by the parties hereto in separate counterparts, including both counterparts that are executed on paper and counterparts that are in the form of electronic signatures. Electronic signatures include facsimile or e-mail electronic signatures. Each executed counterpart shall be deemed an original. All counterparts, taken together, constitute the executed Agreement.

The parties hereby acknowledge and agree that electronic records and electronic signatures, as well as facsimile signatures, used in connection with the execution of this Agreement and electronic signatures, facsimile signatures or signatures transmitted by electronic mail in so-called pdf format shall be legal and binding and shall have the same full force and effect as if a paper original of this Agreement had been delivered and had been signed using a handwritten signature. Contractor and County (i) agree that an electronic signature, whether digital or encrypted, of a party to this Agreement is intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as a manual signature, (ii) intend to be bound by the signatures (whether original, faxed or electronic) on any document sent or delivered by facsimile, or electronic mail, or other electronic means, (iii) are aware that the other party will reply on such signatures, and (iv) hereby waive any defenses to the enforcement of the terms of this Agreement based on the foregoing forms

of signature. If this Agreement has been executed by electronic signature, all parties executing this document are expressly consenting under the United States Federal Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act of 2000 (E-SIGN) and California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (UETA)(Cal. Civ. Code § 1633.1, et seq.), that a signature by fax, e-mail or other electronic means shall constitute an Electronic Signature to an Electronic Record under both E-SIGN and UETA with respect to this specific transaction.

# TRANSPORTATION CORE SERVICE AREA IMPLEMENTATION AGREEMENT FOR THE TELEGRAPH ROAD MAJOR CORRIDOR STUDY LOS ANGELES COUNTY – GATEWAY CITIES COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES OF EAST LOS ANGELES, LA MIRADA, AND MONTEBELLO (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS 1 AND 4) (3 VOTES)

# **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to adopt the implementation agreement between the County and Gateway Cities Council of Governments to finance a major corridor study for the Telegraph Road corridor. The study will be administered by the Gateway Cities Council of Governments.

# IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that conducting a corridor study of Telegraph Road in the unincorporated Los Angeles County areas is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Approve and instruct the Chair to sign the implementation agreement with the Gateway Cities Council of Governments which provides for the Los Angeles County to fund its proportional share of the cost of the Telegraph Road corridor study in the amount of \$7,311.97. The total study cost for Telegraph Road is estimated to be \$180,150.

3. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute amendments and modifications of a nonmaterial nature to the implementation agreements to incorporate necessary nonmaterial, programmatic, and administrative changes.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the study is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and authorize Public Works to enter into an agreement with Gateway Cities Council of Governments (GCCOG) to conduct a comprehensive corridor study of Telegraph Road to seek ways to improve travel conditions.

In accordance with Section 21 of its Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement, GCCOG executed separate agreements for each study with each member city with jurisdiction along the corridor to confirm each jurisdictional share. The stakeholders and involved member cities desire establishing a complete street model on north/south and east/west arterial corridors to relieve traffic congestion, adequately address all the interrelated issues of transportation and economic redevelopment within the region, and to enhance active transportation opportunities in the neighboring communities.

The study limit for the Telegraph Road corridor is approximately 12.1 miles and it starts from the west GCCOG boundary to the east GCCOG boundary. Telegraph Road is a major east/west arterial corridor through the Gateway Cities from South Marianna Avenue in the City of Commerce and unincorporated County area to Imperial Highway in the City of La Mirada on the east. This masterplan will maximize multimodal opportunities on this east/west arterial corridor within the Gateway Cities, as well as maximizing the ability to obtain grants for design and construction. This corridor carries a significant amount of traffic, particularly in relieving heavy traffic along Interstates 710, 605, and 5 freeways that cross at varying points.

The GCCOG coordinated with Metro and secured a grant in the total amount of \$135,000 for the Telegraph Road Corridor Study. The remaining cost for the study will be proportionally shared with the member cities that have jurisdictional frontage along the corridor. The enclosed implementation agreement provides for the County to fund its proportional share of the Telegraph Road Corridor study in the amount of \$7,311.97. GCCOG is financing the remaining cost of the study in excess of the cities and County's contributions. The total study cost is estimated to be \$180,150 and the study is tentatively scheduled to start in spring 2023 and be completed in spring 2024.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended actions allow the County to study ways to enhance travel conditions along two major corridors while maximizing and leveraging County resources.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The total cost of the study is estimated to be \$180,150. The County's jurisdictional share of the study is \$7,311.97 while the cities' jurisdictional share of the study is \$37,838.03.

GCCOG obtained a \$135,000 grant from Metro for the Telegraph Road corridor study and the 25 percent match is distributed amongst the member cities. GCCOG executed separate agreements with member cities with jurisdiction along this corridor. Costs were distributed according to the number of linear miles of corridor in each jurisdiction.

Funding for the County's share of the study is included in the Fourth Supervisorial District's Transportation Improvement Programs in the Measure M Local Return Fund (CN2 – Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget.

# FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The implementation agreement is approved as to form by County Counsel and executed by the GCCOG on November 16, 2022.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The recommended actions are exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 15262 of the State CEQA Guidelines and Section 21102 of the California Public Resources Code. They relate to planning and feasibility studies for possible future actions that the Board has not adopted, approved, or funded.

By conducting this feasibility study for future proposed projects, the County does not commit to or otherwise endorse, authorize, or approve any specific project. sole discretion to approve, deny, or modify a proposed project and to consider factors that would accompany CEQA review.

Public Works will return to the Board for consideration of appropriate environmental documents once a project is defined.

# **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

There is no impact to current services. The proposed study is of general interest to the County and GCCOG. It may ultimately result in a project that will improve travel conditions, increase safety, and enhance the mobility of vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic in the area.

# TELEGRAPH ROAD COMPLETE STREET STUDY

#### **IMPLEMENTATION AGREEMENT**

#### BY AND BETWEEN

#### GATEWAY CITIES COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS

#### AND

#### COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES

THIS TELEGRAPH ROAD COMPLETE STREET STUDY IMPLEMENTATION AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered as of the day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2023, by and between the Gateway Cities Council of Governments ("Gateway") and the County of Los Angeles, a municipal corporation ("County"), individually a "party" and collectively, the "parties".

### WITNESSETH:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Section 1. <u>Recitals</u>. This Agreement is made and entered into with respect to the following facts:

- (a) Telegraph Road is a major east/west arterial corridor through the Gateway Cities from La Mirada (at Imperial Highway West) to S. Marianna Avenue in the City of Commerce and Unincorporated Los Angeles; and
- (b) Telegraph Road carries a significant amount of traffic, particularly in relieving heavy traffic volumes along the I-710, I-605, and I-5 freeways, which it crosses at varying points; and
- (c) The cities along the Telegraph Road Corridor ("Corridor") and the County are desirous of establishing a "Complete Streets" model on this major east/west arterial corridor; to relieve traffic congestion and to enhance active transportation opportunities in the neighboring communities ("Telegraph Road Complete Street Study" or the "Study"); and
- (d) The development of a subregional arterial corridor plan would position the participating agencies to apply for, and receive, federal, state, and regional funding for improvement of the Corridor; and

- (e) The parties hereto are each a governmental entity established by law with full powers of government in legislative, administrative, financial, and other related fields; and
- (f) Section 21 of that certain Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement of the Gateway Cities Council of Governments (the "JPA"), to which the County is a signatory, provides that when authorized by the Board of Directors, affected Members may execute an Implementation Agreement for the purpose of authorizing Gateway to implement, manage and administer area-wide and regional programs in the interest of the local public welfare; and
- (g) The costs incurred by Gateway for the Study, including indirect costs, shall be assessed only to those Members who are parties to an Implementation Agreement; and
- (h) County, by and through its legislative body, has determined that this Agreement is desired to authorize Gateway Cities Council of Governments to implement and initiate the Telegraph Road Complete Street Study and is in furtherance of the public interest, necessity and conveyance.

# Section 2. <u>Committees</u>.

(a) <u>Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Committee</u>. There is hereby established a committee to be known as the Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Committee. The Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Committee shall consist of an elected member of the legislative body of each agency that has entered into a Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Implementation Agreement with Gateway, designated by the respective legislative bodies. The Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Committee will work in coordination with the Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Technical Advisory Committee to provide policy assistance, guidance and direction to Gateway as administrator of this Agreement.

(b) <u>Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Technical Advisory</u> <u>Committee</u>. There is hereby established a committee to be known as the Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Technical Advisory Committee. The Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Technical Advisory Committee shall consist of a staff representative of each agency that has entered into a Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Implementation Agreement with Gateway, designated by the City Manager or, for the County of Los Angeles, the appropriate designating authority. Such designated representative shall be the Public Works Director or the equivalent for each agency. The Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Technical Advisory Committee shall report to and receive direction from the Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Committee. Section 3. <u>Implementation of Telegraph Road Complete Street Study</u>. To the fullest extent of its authority, the County authorizes Gateway to implement and initiate a Corridor Study for the length of Telegraph Road Complete Street Study through the Gateway Cities subregion, including initial feasibility studies (as approved by the Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Committee) required to coordinate with other regional transportation studies. Further, the County authorizes Gateway to request funding and partnering with other public transportation agencies for the Telegraph Road Complete Street Study (Caltrans, SCAG and Metro).

Section 5. <u>Scope of Work.</u> The Scope of Work to be performed under this Agreement is described in Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated by this reference.

Section 4. <u>Assessment for Proportional Costs of Study</u>. The County agrees to pay to Gateway upon execution of this Agreement an assessment as described in Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, for County's proportional share of the projected costs of the Study.

Section 5. <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. Either party may terminate this Agreement for any reason, in whole or in part, by giving the other party thirty (30) days written notice thereof.

Section 6. <u>Meetings</u>. All regular, adjourned and special meetings of the committees established by this Agreement shall be called and conducted in accordance with the Ralph M. Brown Act, Government Code Section 54950 et seq., as amended from time to time.

Section 7. <u>Miscellaneous</u>.

(a) <u>Compensation and Expense Reimbursement</u>. All members of the Telegraph Road Complete Street Study Committee shall receive a stipend of one hundred dollars (\$100) for attendance at each meeting. Each member shall be reimbursed for reasonable and necessary expenses actually incurred by such member in the conduct of business related to the purposes of this Agreement, pursuant to an expense reimbursement policy established by the Gateway Cities COG prior to such expenses being incurred.

(b) <u>Amendments</u>. This Agreement may be amended by written agreement of the parties hereto.

(c) <u>Hold Harmless and Indemnification</u>. To the fullest extent permitted by law, County and Gateway agree to save, indemnify, defend and hold harmless <u>each</u> <u>other</u> from any and all liability, claims, suits, actions, arbitration proceedings, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, losses, expenses, or any injury or damage of any kind whatsoever, whether actual, alleged or threatened, actual attorney fees, court costs, interest, defense costs and expenses associated therewith including the use of experts, and any other costs of any nature without restriction incurred in relation to, as a consequence of, or arising out of, the performance of this Agreement, and attributable to the fault of the indemnifying party. Following a determination of the percentage of fault and or liability by agreement between the parties or a court of competent jurisdiction, the party responsible for liability to the other will indemnify the other party to this Agreement for the percentage of liability determined as set forth in this section.

(d) <u>Party Action</u>. Unless otherwise provided in this Agreement, any action of a party required or authorized in this Agreement shall be by appropriate legislative action of the governing body of such party.

(e) <u>Notice</u>. Any notice required to be given or delivered by any provision of this Agreement shall be deposited in any United States Post Office, registered or certified, postage prepaid, addressed as set forth below, and shall be deemed to have been received by the party to whom the same is addressed at the expiration of seventy-two (72) hours thereafter. Written notice shall be sent in the aforesaid manner:

Box 1460 Alhambra, CA 91803-1460 (f) <u>Waiver.</u> Waiver by a party to this Agreement of any term, condition, or covenant of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of any other term, condition, or covenant. Waiver by any party of any breach of the provisions of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of any other provision, or a waiver of any subsequent breach or violation of any provision of this Agreement.

(g) <u>Law to Govern; Venue</u>. This Agreement shall be interpreted, construed and governed according to the laws of the State of California. In the event of litigation between the parties, venue in state trial courts shall lie exclusively in the County of Los Angeles.

(h) <u>No Presumption in Drafting</u>. The parties to this Agreement agree that the general rule that an Agreement is to be interpreted against the party drafting it or causing it to be prepared shall not apply.

(i) <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous agreements, whether written or oral, with respect thereto.

(j) <u>Severability</u>. If any term, provision, condition or covenant of this Agreement is declared or determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby and the Agreement shall be read and construed without the invalid, void or unenforceable provision(s).

(k) <u>Successors</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of any successor of a party.

(I) <u>Assignment and Delegation</u>. Neither party shall assign any rights nor delegate any duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party.

(m) <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in one (1) or more counterparts, all of which together shall constitute a single agreement, and each of which shall be an original for all purposes.

(n) <u>Execution</u>. The legislative bodies of the parties hereto each have authorized execution of this Agreement, as evidenced by the respective signatures attested below.

**Project Limits:** The project is located at Imperial Highway in La Mirada west to S. Marianna Avenue in the City of Commerce and Unincorporated Los Angeles, for a total of 12.01 miles.

Which traverses through the jurisdictions of <u>La Mirada, Unincorporated LA</u> <u>County, Santa Fe Springs, Downey, Pico Rivera, Commerce and Montebello,</u>

# **Project Description:**

Develop a subregional Complete Street master plan for Telegraph Road, which is a high priority high quality transit arterial within the Gateway Cities. This high priority corridor is based on the Gateway Cities COG Board approved prioritization process. The limits extend from COG boundary to COG boundary for a total of approximately 12.01 miles (total). This masterplan will maximize multimodal opportunities on this E/W arterial corridor within the Gateway Cities, as well as maximize our ability to obtain grants for design and construction.

### SCOPE:

#### I. Task 1: Project Management and Administration

a. Project Initiation

The GCCOG will hold a kick-off meeting with the Cities and Metro to discuss the project scope of work, goals and objectives. A meeting agenda, minutes and action items listing will be produced.

b. Project Administration

The GCCOG will submit complete invoice packages to Metro based on existing/status quo protocol. The progress report will contain the following components:

- 1. Executive summary
- 2. Description of the tasks or deliverables completed
- 3. Management issues, including status, resolution and action items
- 4. Project task schedule describing percentages of completeness of each task
- 5. Schedule and schedule tracking narrative
- 6. List of deliverable items
- 7. Dollar amount for which payment is requested.
- c. Project Management

The GCCOG will complete the project including the technical tasks included in this scope as well as the Project Management of the overall project.

#### b. Task 2: Review Existing Documentations

The GCCOG will gather all relevant document and literature for review and summarize useful information and findings relating to the Corridor, including the STP, relevant transit plans, relevant agency land use plans, and relevant as-builts.

Deliverable: Technical memo/ summary report listing documents reviewed.

#### c. Task 3: Corridor Evaluation Documentations

- a. Existing Conditions Corridor Evaluation and Analysis
  - The GCCOG will conduct thorough existing conditions analysis by identifying opportunities and constraints for the multimodal Corridor. This is partially obtained via a 1-on-1 meeting with each agency, which will be documented in the report. Evaluation analysis could include the current traffic conditions and Levels of Service, truck volumes/impacts, pavement needs, pedestrian and bicycle traffic, transit connections, parking and other commercial and residential linkages, and City entryways, or gateways, and potential safe routes to school options.
- b. Future Conditions Corridor Evaluation and Analysis

The GCCOG will use data and information from recent studies on future conditions along the project Corridor and conduct thorough future conditions analysis for the multimodal Corridor. Evaluation analysis would include the 2035 traffic conditions and Levels of Service, truck volumes/impacts, pavement needs, pedestrian and bicycle traffic, transit connections, parking and other commercial and residential linkages, and City entryways, or gateways, and potential safe routes to school options.

Deliverable: Technical memo/ summary report regarding the existing conditions, constraints, opportunities.

#### d. Task 4: Conduct Complete Streets Needs Analysis

The GCCOG will conduct a detailed needs analysis for complete streets and multimodal Corridor development, along with identifying constraints/opportunities.

Deliverable: Technical memo/ summary report regarding the needs and along with providing recommendations for consideration based on the constraints and opportunities.

#### e. Task 5: Community and Stakeholder Outreach

a. Stakeholder and Community Outreach

The GCCOG will coordinate meetings to discuss project with various stakeholder agencies. The GCCOG will also conduct stakeholder outreach after developing the concept alternatives and after the development of the draft Master Plan.

The GCCOG will develop a workshop to introduce the project to the public, define project parameters, inform community of project opportunities and constraints, and solicit opinions from the community. The GCCOG will also conduct community outreach after developing the concept alternatives and after the development of the draft Master Plan.

Deliverable: Coordinate and attend Meetings and a coordinate and conduct a Workshop.

#### f. Task 6: Complete Streets Implementation Alternatives

a. Develop Alternatives

Based on the existing and future conditions evaluation and the stakeholder/community input, the GCCOG will develop alternative concepts for complete street implementation, and will include plans, sketches, and photos.

Two primary alternatives considered include 1) the Florence Avenue Corridor as a "Complete Street" in an "unconstrained" condition to quantify the high level engineering and feasibility, and 2) as a multi-modal Corridor evaluated for consistency across the sub-region, including a potentially phased approach to a Complete Street, along with any major challenges as well as project benefits so that potential funding partners could understand the holistic context of the improvements.

Deliverable: Develop concepts and exhibits, via alternatives, to support the needs identified.

#### g. Task 7: Prepare Conceptual Complete Streets Plan

Based on the preferred design alternative chosen in the stakeholder and community outreach efforts and discussions with the Cities, the GCCOG will develop a draft Concept Master Plan.

Deliverable: Develop concept plan to incorporate into the Draft Report. This is the first step in creating the Draft Report.

### h. Task 8: Develop Conceptual Design Alternatives for Complete Streets Plan with Cost Estimates

The GCCOG will develop conceptual design alternatives with cost estimates. Illustrations will be made in plan view, as street cross sections, and as sketches.






#### ATTACHMENT A PROPOSED TRAFFIC REGULATIONS BASSETT SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 1


# ATTACHMENT B PROPOSED TRAFFIC REGULATION EAST LOS ANGELES SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 1





## **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to implement traffic regulations to support traffic safety and enhance traffic flow near a school and a natural area in the unincorporated communities of Agua Dulce, Covina, Desert View Highlands, La Crescenta-Montrose, and Lake Los Angeles.

## IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that adopting traffic regulation orders and posting the corresponding regulatory and advisory signage are categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act.
- 2. Adopt a traffic regulation order prohibiting parking at any time on the north side of Escondido Canyon Road between Agua Dulce Canyon Road and Eldrow Road in the unincorporated community of Agua Dulce.
- 3. Adopt a traffic regulation order prohibiting parking at any time on the south side of Escondido Canyon Road between Agua Dulce Canyon Road and

approximately 180 feet west of Sierra Pelona Road in the unincorporated community of Agua Dulce.

- 4. Adopt a traffic regulation order prohibiting parking at any time on the south side of Escondido Canyon Road between Tyndall Road and Deitz Drive/Montana Lane in the unincorporated community of Agua Dulce.
- 5. Adopt a traffic regulation order prohibiting parking at any time on the north side of Cienega Avenue between Nearglen Avenue and the City of Covina boundary located 135 feet east of Nearglen Avenue in the unincorporated community of Covina.
- 6. Adopt a traffic regulation order prohibiting eastbound and westbound traffic on Willowvale Road between Palm Tree Way and Whiteash Drive from making U-turns from 6 a.m. to 8 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m., school days only in the unincorporated community of Desert View Highlands.
- 7. Adopt a traffic regulation order establishing stop control for eastbound traffic on Pontiac Street at its intersection with Cloud Avenue in the unincorporated community of La Crescenta-Montrose.
- 8. Adopt a traffic regulation order requiring eastbound and westbound traffic on Avenue O to stop at its intersection with 180th Street East, establishing all-way stop control in the unincorporated community of Lake Los Angeles.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended actions is to support traffic safety and enhance traffic flow near a school and a natural area. Requests for these traffic regulations were generated by residents or community groups. The affected areas are indicated on the enclosed maps (Attachment A, B, C, D, and E).

## Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality. The recommended actions support a clean, flexible, and integrated multi-modal transportation system that improves mobility and traffic safety.

# FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund. Sufficient funds are included in the Road Fund (B03 – Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget to cover the minor costs of removing and installing the necessary signs and markings.

# FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The California Vehicle Code authorizes the Board to implement these traffic regulations which are required prior to enforcement by the California Highway Patrol and the Sheriff's Department.

## ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The establishment of these regulations, including the installation of related traffic control devices required to notify the motoring public is categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 15301(c) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines and Class I(x) 7 of the Environmental Reporting Procedures and Guidelines approved by the Board on November 17, 1987.

#### IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Implementation of these traffic controls will have a positive impact by enhancing traffic flow and safety. Upon the Board's approval of this traffic regulation, the corresponding signs and markings will be installed within 12 weeks.






# ATTACHMENT A PROPOSED TRAFFIC REGULATIONS AGUA DULCE SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 5





## **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to continue the street lighting assessment rates in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for the unincorporated area and 13 cities for Fiscal Year 2023-24 at the same rate as Fiscal Year 2022-23.

# IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed project is statutorily exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for reasons stated in this letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Approve and file the Engineer's Report for the proposed annual levying of assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for street lighting purposes for Fiscal Year 2023-24.
- 3. Adopt the Resolution of Intention to order the levying of assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for Fiscal Year 2023-24.
- 4. Set the public hearing for May 23, 2023, on the proposed continuation of the Fiscal Year 2022-23 levying of annual assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for Fiscal Year 2023-24 in all zones identified in the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Engineer's Report.

5. Instruct the Executive Officer of the Board to give notice of public hearing by causing the resolution of intention to be published once in both English and Spanish language newspapers at least 10 days prior to the date of hearing scheduled for May 23, 2023, pursuant to Section 22626(a) of the California Streets and Highways Code.

# AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING, IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Authorize changes, if needed, in any of the matters provided in the Engineer's Report, including changes in the improvements, any zones within County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, the diagram that shows the district's boundaries, and the proposed assessment as described in the Engineer's Report.
- 2. Determine and levy assessments in any amount not to exceed the recommended amounts listed in the Engineer's Report for each assessment zone.
- 3. Adopt a Resolution Confirming the Diagram and Assessment and Ordering of Assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for Fiscal Year 2023-24, either as originally proposed or as changed by the Board. The adoption of the resolution shall constitute the levying of annual assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for Fiscal Year 2023-24.
- 4. Find that the property tax and assessment revenues collected from benefited properties will meet operating expenses and financial reserve needs and requirements; purchase supplies, equipment, or materials; provide funds for capital improvement projects, including construction of additional streetlights and the repair and replacement of obsolete equipment with new modern equipment necessary for the proper operation of lighting facilities in accordance with the provisions of the Improvement Act of 1911 and the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972; and in the amount shown for each maintenance district and assessment zone listed in Appendix E of Fiscal Year 2023-24 Engineer's Report.
- 5. Determine that it is just and equitable and in the public's interest that the additional cost for the expenses of the installation and maintenance of additional lights be made a charge upon the existing districts as a whole in Fiscal Year 2023-24, pursuant to Section 5843.5 of the California Streets and Highways Code.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and establish the Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24 street lighting assessment rates in County Lighting District (CLD) Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 (LLA-1) for all zones established for the unincorporated area and 13 cities shown in Appendix F of the enclosed Engineer's Report (Enclosure A) where the County administers streetlights. Since the existing street lighting assessments expire annually, the Board must renew the annual street lighting assessments to provide supplemental funding for the operation and maintenance of streetlights within CLD LLA-1.

Through this proposed action the street lighting assessment rates in CLD LLA-1 for FY 2023-24 will remain the same rates as FY 2022-23.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended actions to renew the levy of annual assessments will provide the funding necessary to ensure the continuation of street lighting service for the convenience and safety of the motoring public, as well as for the safety and security of people and property, which will improve the quality of life in the County.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The annual street lighting assessments for all zones identified in FY 2022-23 Engineer's Report will expire on June 30, 2023, unless the Board approves the annual street lighting assessments for FY 2023-24 for the operation and maintenance of the streetlights. Financing for the installation, operation, and maintenance of streetlights in FY 2023-24 will be derived from the assessment revenue collected from benefited property owners within CLD LLA-1 and by a portion of the property taxes that is allocated to County Lighting Maintenance Districts (CLMDs) for street lighting purposes.

Funding for this work is included in the FY 2023-24 County Lighting Maintenance Districts' budget.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

On December 6, 2022, the Board adopted a resolution ordering the Director or his designee to prepare and file an Engineer's Report for FY 2023-24 for the levying of annual assessments in CLD LLA-1, pursuant to provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 and Article XIII D of the California Constitution.

CLD LLA-1 was formed on July 24, 1979, to provide supplemental funding for the continued operation of the street lighting systems in the existing CLMDs. It was formed to have essentially the same boundaries as the CLMDs listed in Appendix A of the Engineer's Report. Each subsequent year, the Board has renewed the annual street lighting assessments and a similar action is required to keep streetlights in the various CLMDs fully operational during FY 2023-24.

The Landscaping and Lighting Act and the California Constitution (Article XIIID) set forth procedures that must be followed for any fiscal year during which an assessment is to be levied. The Landscaping and Lighting Act requires the legislative body to approve and file an annual Engineer's Report and to adopt a resolution of intention declaring the Board's intent to levy and collect assessments in CLD LLA-1 for FY 2023-24. During the course or upon conclusion of the public hearing, the Board may order changes in any of the matters provided in the Engineer's Report, including changes in the improvements, the boundaries of any zones within the assessment district, and the proposed diagram or proposed assessment. The Board can also close the hearing to testimony and delay the determination regarding the assessments until a later date or continue the public hearing to receive further testimony and make the determination regarding the assessment at the close of the public hearing continuance. However, according to Section 22629 of the California Streets and Highways Code, the hearing may not be continued beyond August 10, 2023, without prior consent of the Auditor-Controller.

The Landscaping and Lighting Act provides for the assessment of street lighting costs against the benefited properties within CLD LLA-1 by any formula or method that fairly distributes the costs among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each from the improvements. A method of distributing the street lighting costs on the basis of land use was approved by the Board on May 22, 1979, and amended on July 22, 1997, to include government-owned or -leased parcels. The report showing the approved method and the assessment units to be assessed on the various types of lots or parcels is on file in the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors and is made a part hereof by reference. This same method is used to compute the FY 2023-24 assessments.

The California Streets and Highways Code Section 22623 provides that the Board may approve the Engineer's Report as filed or modify the Engineer's Report and approve it as modified.

The enclosed Resolution of Intention (Enclosure B) and Resolution Confirming the Diagram (Enclosure C) have been approved as to form by County Counsel.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed project is statutorily exempt from CEQA. Adoption of the proposed resolutions to determine and levy the annual street lighting assessments for FY 2023-24 is for the purpose of meeting operating expenses and, therefore is exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 15273(a) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Section 21080(b)(8) of the California Public Resources Code.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The levying of the annual assessments is required to finance the operation and maintenance expenses incurred for the proper operation of street lighting facilities.



# PURSUANT TO PROVISIONS OF THE LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ACT OF 1972 CALIFORNIA STREETS AND HIGHWAYS CODE

Prepared by Los Angeles County Public Works for the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles May 2023

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#### INTRODUCTION

On December 6, 2022, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles designated the Director of Public Works or his designee as the Engineer and adopted a resolution ordering the preparation and filing of an Engineer's Report for Fiscal Year 2023-24, in accordance with Section 22566 of the California Streets and Highways Code and Section 4(b) of Article XIII D of the California Constitution (Proposition 218), for the levying of annual assessments in all zones within the County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 (CLD LLA-1), an assessment district, for street lighting purposes.

The annual levying of assessments is necessary to provide supplemental funding for the continued operation of the existing County Lighting Maintenance and Assessment Districts (County Lighting Districts). This Engineer's Report (Report) is prepared in response to the above directive to address all zones within the CLD LLA-1.

#### COUNTY LIGHTING MAINTENANCE AND ASSESSMENT DISTRICTS

The County Lighting Maintenance Districts (CLMDs) are established street lighting maintenance districts. Prior to the enactment of State Constitutional Amendment XIII-A (Proposition 13) in 1978, which placed a limit on the maximum amount of ad valorem tax increases on real property, the operation and maintenance of streetlights within the CLMDs were fully funded by ad valorem property taxes. The ad valorem property taxes received under the guidelines established by the State Legislature subsequent to the passing of this amendment were not sufficient to pay the cost of street lighting services within the CLMDs.

The assessment district, or CLD LLA-1, was formed on July 24, 1979, to provide supplemental funding for the existing CLMDs. It was formed to be essentially coextensive with the CLMDs listed in Appendix A. Its boundaries include unincorporated territory plus areas within the Cities of Agoura Hills, Bell Gardens, Calabasas, Carson, Diamond Bar, La Cañada Flintridge, La Mirada, Lawndale, Lomita, Malibu, Paramount, Rolling Hills Estates, and Walnut. The CLD LLA-1 has a separate zone for the unincorporated territory and for each city encompassing only the city territory currently within a CLMD. The designation for each city zone is the name of the city within which it lies.

County Lighting Districts' maps that show a diagram of each existing zone within the CLD LLA-1 and indicate the general nature, location, extent of improvements, the exterior boundaries of each zone, and lines and dimensions of each lot or parcel located therein, are on file with the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors at the Kenneth Hahn Hall of Administration and are made a part of this report by reference. Maps of developments annexed to the County Lighting Districts pursuant to Section 22608.2 of the California Streets and Highways Code, subsequent to the formation of the CLD LLA-1, are on file with the Assessor at the Kenneth Hahn Hall of Administration.

# STREETLIGHT ACQUISITION AND LED CONVERSION PROJECT

In December of 2022, the County of Los Angeles completed the purchase and acquisition of approximately 29,000 streetlights from Southern California Edison (SCE) in CLMD 1687 serving the unincorporated County communities at an estimated cost of \$23.6 million. The County is in the process of converting the purchased streetlights to light emitting diodes (LED) technology at an estimated cost of \$8.8 million. An additional \$1.8 million will be expended to upgrade the streetlights to install safety fuse and pole tags required for County ownership and maintenance. Public Works utilized CLMD 1687's capital improvement designations/reserves to finance the total project cost. Public Works has also received approximately \$2.7 million in LED incentives from Southern California Edison. LED conversion work is scheduled to be completed in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24.

# STREETLIGHT POLE UPGRADE PROGRAM

The Streetlight Pole Upgrade Program is financed with annual revenue surplus set aside for upgrade of existing streetlights to standard streetlights on concrete pole with underground wiring as well as conversion to LED lighting. Revenues designated for streetlight upgrades and/or capital improvement projects in the unincorporated and city zones are included in Appendix G.

Streetlights owned by SCE in the CLMDs will be converted to LED lighting by SCE under their Option E Program once an Option E agreement is executed. For the CLMDs serving cities, concurrence from the city is required for the County to proceed with execution of an Option E agreement with SCE. The Cities of Agoura Hills, Lomita, Calabasas, Diamond Bar, Malibu, and Rolling Hills Estates are currently not enrolled in LED conversion via the Option E Program.

The Option E Program allows for the LED conversion of SCE-owned, LS-1 streetlights with no upfront cost; rather, costs will be recovered through a 20-year premium charge on monthly SCE invoices. Analyses provided by SCE reveal that the energy savings from the LED conversion will exceed the premium charge imposed by SCE, resulting in a net annual savings to the affected CLMD. SCE also provides the option to pay off the LED conversion cost balance prior to the 20-year payback period. When sufficient surplus revenues are accumulated under the Streetlight Pole Upgrade Program during the 20-year payback period, Public Works will issue a lump sum payment to SCE.

# NEW COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH COUNTY OWNERSHIP OF STREETLIGHTS

When the financial analysis for the Streetlight Acquisition and LED Conversion project was completed in 2019, Public Works anticipated that cost savings realized from streetlight ownership and LED conversion will be offset by the additional cost of operating and maintaining the newly purchased streetlights. However, subsequent streetlight tariff rate increases have significantly impacted net surplus revenues resulting from the project.

Currently, streetlight maintenance of the purchased streetlights is provided by a contractor at an estimated cost of \$1.6 million annually. In addition, there will be costs associated with funding construction of additional streetlights and the repair and replacement of obsolete equipment with new modern equipment necessary for the proper operation of lighting facilities, processing accident claims, and providing emergency response and recovery in case of natural disasters.

# FISCAL YEAR 2022-23 IMPROVEMENTS

Fifteen new subdivision and single-lot developments processed for annexation to the County Lighting Districts or constructed within the existing boundaries of the County Lighting Districts, whose streetlight operational costs were transferred from a developer's account to a lighting district account in FY 2022-23, are listed in Appendix B. The County Lighting Districts assumed funding responsibilities for a total of 126 streetlights. The number and size of streetlights installed and the estimated annual operating costs for each new subdivision or single-lot development, together with the zone in which the development is located, is also listed in Appendix B. Maps of the annexation and the type and location of the improvements installed by the developers are shown on maps on file with Public Works at 900 South Fremont Avenue in Alhambra.

Information on an additional 45 streetlights authorized for installation within the boundaries of the County Lighting Districts during FY 2022-23, in response to specific requests and in compliance with procedures set forth in the California Streets and Highways Code Section 22565 et seq. is shown in Appendix C. Maps showing the type and location of the improvements are on file with Public Works.

Annexations of territories by petition of the property owners, together with the number and sizes of streetlights approved by the Board of Supervisors during FY 2022-23, are shown in Appendix D. A total of 40 streetlights were authorized for installation or installed. Maps of the annexation and the type and location of the improvements are shown on maps on file with Public Works.

During FY 2022-23, the County Lighting Districts did not accept any transfer of highway safety lights at signalized intersections along with their annual energy and maintenance costs (Appendix E).

# PROPERTY TAX AND ASSESSMENTS REVENUES

All benefited parcels of real property located within the County Lighting Districts are identified by the FY 2022-23 Tax Rate Area Report and Assessor Parcel Numbers listed in Appendix F. The diagram of each CLMD and CLD LLA-1 Zone, along with the lines and dimensions of each lot or parcel of land located therein, are described in maps prepared in accordance with Section 327 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code, which are on file in the Office of the Assessor and are made a part of this Report by reference.

Funds collected pursuant to the California Streets and Highways Code, the Improvement Act of 1911 and the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, may be used for certain streetlight upgrades or capital improvements. Revenues designated for streetlight upgrades and/or capital improvement projects in the unincorporated and city zones are included in Appendix G. Signed into law by Governor on July 9, 2018, Senate Bill 1323 expanded the authority of County-administered CLMDs formed pursuant to the Improvement Act of 1911 and allowed them to use funds collected to perform maintenance and make improvements including streetlight acquisition pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972.

Section 22573 of the California Streets and Highways Code provides for assessment of street lighting costs upon the benefited properties within the CLD LLA-1. The Section states, "The net amount to be assessed upon lands within an assessment district may be apportioned by any formula or method, which fairly distributes the net amount among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each such lot or parcel from the improvements." A method of distributing the street lighting costs on the basis of land use and land-use data compiled by the Assessor was approved by the Board on May 22, 1979, and amended by the Board on July 22, 1997, to distribute costs among governmental-owned or -leased parcels in accordance with the provisions of Article XIII D of the California Constitution. The Report showing the approved method and the number of usage units assigned to the various land use categories on the basis of benefits received is on file with the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors.

The July 22, 1997, amendment provides for as-needed, automatic future assessment increases to governmental-owned or -leased parcels within the Calabasas, Carson, Lomita, and Paramount Zones. In future years, the amount of the base rate assessment for Calabasas and Lomita Zones may be automatically increased based on streetlight tariff rates charged by Southern California Edison as approved by the California Public Utilities Commission. For the Carson and Paramount Zones, the amount of the base rate assessment may be automatically adjusted annually for cost of living based on a factor calculated by using the Consumer Price Index for the Los Angeles Riverside-Orange County areas for all Urban Consumers.

# RECOMMENDED FISCAL YEAR 2023-24 ASSESSMENTS

Appendix H lists the proposed assessment rate per unit for FY 2023-24 and the amount of estimated assessment revenue to be collected for the unincorporated and 13 city zones located within CLD LLA-1. If the proposed assessments for FY 2023-24, which are at the same rates as in FY 2022-23, are not approved by the Board of Supervisors, it will be necessary to reduce street lighting services to stay within the operating revenues from ad valorem property taxes. The estimated costs of operating CLD LLA-1 during FY 2023-24 are shown in Appendix H. The estimated costs were evaluated and determined to be reasonable and appropriate.

#### BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO ORDER THE LEVYING OF ASSESSMENTS IN COUNTY LIGHTING DISTRICT LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ACT-1 FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-24 PURSUANT TO PROVISIONS OF LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ACT OF 1972 TO PROVIDE SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDS FOR OPERATION OF EXISTING STREETLIGHTS

WHEREAS, on July 24, 1979, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles approved the formation of County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, and a separate zone therein, for each of the County Lighting Maintenance Districts serving the unincorporated territory and the Cities of Agoura Hills, Bell Gardens, Calabasas, Carson, Diamond Bar, La Cañada-Flintridge, La Mirada, Lawndale, Lomita, Malibu, Paramount, Rolling Hills Estates, and Walnut to provide supplemental funds for the operation of streetlights; and

WHEREAS, on December 6, 2022, the Board of Supervisors adopted a Resolution Ordering Engineer's Report for Fiscal Year 2023-24 for the levying of assessments for street lighting purposes for each zone in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, as required by law; and

WHEREAS, on \_\_\_\_\_\_, the Board of Supervisors has approved and filed the Engineer's Report for the aforementioned zones in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 showing estimated operating costs and recommended assessments for each zone in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 as required by law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, that:

SECTION 1. The public interest and convenience require, that it is the intention of said Board of Supervisors to order the expense necessary for the operation, maintenance, repairs, replacement, electric current, care, supervision, and all other items necessary for proper operation and maintenance of streetlights located within County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, shall be assessed upon each lot or parcel of land lying within County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting received from the existing street lighting improvements, and which should be assessed to pay the expense of the operation and maintenance of said improvements. The Engineer's Report on file with the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors describes the boundaries of County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, and the zones located therein, including the locations of improvements and proposed assessments on each lot or parcel of land included therein.

SECTION 2. The proposed assessments for Fiscal Year 2023-24, in all of the aforementioned Zones, are proposed to remain at the same level as the Fiscal Year 2022-23 assessment amounts. Property owners are referred to their last property tax bill for their individual existing annual street lighting assessment amount. A table showing the designated usage units on the basis of benefits received for each type of property use can also be obtained by writing to or calling the Los Angeles County Public Works (see Sections 8 and 9 for address and telephone number).

SECTION 3. The amounts to be assessed for the expense of such operation and maintenance of the work or improvements described above shall be levied and collected in the same manner and by the same officers as taxes expended for operation, maintenance, and service in all street lighting zones in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, as described in the Engineer's Report and Section 1 of this Resolution.

SECTION 4. The proceedings for the levying of assessments shall be taken under and in accordance with an act of the Legislature of the State of California, known and designated as the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (California Streets and Highways Code Section 22500 et seq.).

SECTION 5. On \_\_\_\_\_\_, at the hour of \_\_\_\_\_\_ a.m. of said day, is the day and hour at the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, Room 381B, Kenneth Hahn Hall of Administration, 500 West Temple Street (corner of Temple Street at Grand Avenue), Los Angeles, California 90012, the place fixed by the said Board of Supervisors when and where any and all interested persons may hear and be heard regarding proposed street lighting assessments in all street lighting zones in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1.

SECTION 6. The Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors shall give notice of the public hearing for all of the aforementioned Zones of County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 pursuant to Section 22626(a) of the California Streets and Highways Code, in the form and manner specified in Sections 22552 and 22553 of the California Streets and Highways Code to be published in the newspaper(s), published and circulated in the County of Los Angeles, which is hereby designated for this purpose, not less than 10 days prior to the date of said hearing, as stated above in this resolution.

#### PUBLIC HEARING WATER RESOURCES CORE SERVICE AREA AMENDMENT TO THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY WATERWORKS DISTRICTS AND THE MARINA DEL REY WATER SYSTEM'S WATER SHORTAGE CONTINGENCY PLAN (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS 2, 3, AND 5) (3 VOTES)

#### **SUBJECT**

This action is to conduct a public hearing to amend the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts and the Marina del Rey Water System's Water Shortage Contingency Plan to include Los Angeles County Waterworks District Nos. 21, 36, and 37, each serving fewer than 3,000 accounts, in compliance with Senate Bill 552. Hereinafter, all references in this Board letter to the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts shall be deemed to include Los Angeles County Waterworks District Nos. 21, 36, and 37.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD, AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING, ACTING AS THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY WATERWORKS DISTRICTS AND THE MARINA DEL REY WATER SYSTEM:

- 1. Find that the California Environmental Quality Act does not apply to the proposed action for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record.
- 2. Adopt a resolution amending the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts and the Marina del Rey Water System's Water Shortage Contingency Plan to include Los Angeles County Waterworks District Nos. 21, 36, and 37, each serving fewer than 3,000 accounts, in compliance with Senate Bill 552.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to approve an amendment to the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts and the Marina del Rey Water System's (Districts) Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP) by adopting the enclosed resolution (Enclosure A) to comply with Senate Bill 552 (SB 552), which requires incorporation of all smaller water systems serving fewer than 3,000 accounts. #### **IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIC PLAN GOALS**

This recommendation supports the County Strategic Plan: Objective II.3.1, Improve Water Quality, Reduce Water Consumption, and Increase Water Supplies and Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets by supporting ongoing efforts to manage and improve public infrastructure assets.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING**

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Droughts are predicted to become more frequent, longer, and more severe as climate change progresses, putting drinking water supplies at risk of running dry or becoming contaminated. On September 23, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom passed and signed SB 552 for State and local governments to share the responsibility of preparing and acting in case of a water shortage event. These new requirements are expected to improve the ability of Californians to implement more proactive drought planning that would benefit the communities most at risk and by doing so help prevent catastrophic impacts on drinking water for the communities most vulnerable to the impacts of climate change. Adoption of the resolution (Enclosure A) will amend the WSCP to comply with SB 552, which imposes water shortage contingency planning requirements on smaller water systems serving fewer than 3,000 accounts.

The resolution has been approved as to form by County Counsel.

A notice of the time, date, and place of the public hearing was advertised according to the Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisements (Enclosure B). Upon the Board's approval of implementation, a notice will be advertised according to the instructions in Enclosure C.

On October 19, 2021, the Board adopted the Districts' 2020 Urban Water Management Plans and 2020 WSCP, which were prepared in accordance with the requirements of California Water Code Sections 10610 through 10657. On August 30, 2022, the Board approved additional administrative amendments to the WSCP. The WSCP serves as a guide for managing the Districts' water supplies, mitigating water shortages, improving preparedness for droughts and other impacts to water supplies, and ultimately enabling the Districts to efficiently manage future response actions due to water shortages. #### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) does not apply to the proposed action pursuant to the California Water Code Section 10652 because CEQA does not apply to the preparation and adoption of a WSCP or to the implementation of the actions taken pursuant to such plans.

Thus, it is recommended the Board adopt the proposed action. Upon the Board's approval of the recommended action, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with California Public Resources Code Section 21152 and will post the Notice of Exemption to the Districts' website pursuant to California Public Resources Code Section 21092.2.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

There will be no impact to current services or projects.

WHEREAS, on October 19, 2021, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles adopted the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts and Marina del Rey Water System's Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP); and

WHEREAS, on August 30, 2022, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles adopted a resolution adopting and amending the WSCP; and

WHEREAS, the WSCP complies with California Water Code Section 10632; and

WHEREAS, the amendment to the WSCP provides for compliance with SB 552 Drought Planning: Small Water Suppliers: Nontransient Noncommunity Water Systems (SB 552) to include all smaller Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts, including: District No. 21, Kagel Canyon; District No. 36, Val Verde; and District No. 37, Acton; and

WHEREAS, the amended WSCP has been prepared in accordance with the Water Code, and in accordance with applicable legal requirements, including certain coordination, notice, public involvement, public comment, and other procedures in relation to the amended WSCP; and

WHEREAS, Section 10652 of the California Water Code provides that the California Environmental Quality Act (Division 13 (commencing with Section 21000) of the Public Resources Code) (CEQA) does not apply to the preparation and adoption of a WSCP or to the implementation of the actions taken pursuant to such plans.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, as the governing body of the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts and the Marina del Rey Water System:

1. Hereby finds and determines that this resolution is not subject to CEQA pursuant to Water Code Section 10652 because CEQA does not apply to the preparation and adoption of a WSCP or to the implementation of the actions taken pursuant to such plans. Because this resolution comprises the adoption by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles of the amended Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts and Marina del Rey Water System Water Shortage Contingency Plan and involves its implementation, no CEQA review is required. Thus, staff recommends that the Board adopt the proposed action and direct staff to file a CEQA Notice of Exemption; and

2. Hereby adopts the amended Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts and the Marina del Rey Water System's Water Shortage Contingency Plan, attached hereto as Exhibit A.



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# Introduction

This Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP) details how the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts (Districts) respond in the event of a declared water emergency or water shortage conditions.

The provisions of this Plan shall apply to all persons, customers, and property utilizing water provided by the following Districts:

- Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 21, Kagel Canyon (District 21).
- Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29, Malibu and the Marina del Rey Water System–(District 29).
- Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 36, Val Verde (District 36).
- Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 37, Acton (District 37).
- Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley (District 40).

The terms "person" and "customer" as used in the Plan may include individuals, corporations, partnerships, associations, and all other legal entities.

This WSCP complies with California Water Code (CWC) Section 10632, which requires every urban water supplier to prepare and adopt a WSCP as part of its Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP). The California Urban Water Management Planning Act of 1983 requires urban water suppliers providing water for municipal purposes to more than 3,000 customers or supplying more than 3,000 acre-feet of water annually to adopt and submit a UWMP. Section 10632.2 states, "An urban water supplier shall follow, where feasible and appropriate, the prescribed procedures and implement determined shortage response actions in its water shortage contingency plan, as identified in subdivision (a) of Section 10632, or reasonable alternative actions, provided that descriptions of the alternative actions are submitted with the annual water shortage assessment report pursuant to Section 10632.1." However, the CWC does not prohibit an urban water supplier from taking actions that are not specified in its WSCP, if needed, without having to formally amend its UWMP or WSCP.

Per CWC Section 10632.3, the State defers to the locally adopted WSCPs to the extent practicable upon the Governor's proclamation of a state of emergency under the California Emergency Services Act based on drought conditions. The Districts' WSCP provides guidance for managing water supplies, mitigating water shortages, improving preparedness for droughts, and other impacts to water supplies and ultimately enables the Districts to efficiently manage future response actions due to water shortages. This WSCP includes an analysis of the Districts' water supply reliability, an annual assessment of supply and demand, and a detailed breakdown of the standard water shortage levels for the Districts. Furthermore, it outlines the Districts' water shortage response actions, communication protocols, compliance and enforcement guidelines, legal authorities, financial consequences, monitoring and reporting procedures, and discusses future reevaluations of the WSCP.

Additionally, this WSCP incorporates portions of the Districts' existing Phased Water Conservation Plan (PWCP), which is Part 5 of the Rules and Regulations of the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts and the Marina del Rey Water System (Rules and Regulations). A copy of the PWCP is provided in Appendix A of the WSCP. The Districts' PWCP was adopted in May 1991 and amended in June 2015. Lastly, the Districts' WSCP is included as Appendix D in its 2020 UWMP for the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29, Malibu, and the Marina del Rey Water System (District No. 29); and Appendix F for the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley (District No. 40).

## Section 1: Water Supply Reliability Analysis

Water supply reliability is a measure of a water system's expected success in managing water shortages. Reliability planning requires information about the following: (1) expected frequency and severity of shortages; (2) how additional water management is likely to affect the frequency and severity of shortages; and (3) how available contingency measures can reduce the impact of shortages when they occur. Section 10635 of the CWC requires that, "Every urban water supplier shall include, as part of its urban water management plan, an assessment of the reliability of its water supply and demand assessment shall compare the total water supply sources available to the water supplier with the long-term total projected water use over the next 20 years, in five-year increments, for a normal water year, a single dry water year, and a drought lasting five consecutive water years."

# 1.1 Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29, Malibu, and the Marina del Rey Water System

District No. 29 purchases its entire water supply from the West Basin Municipal Water District (West Basin). Therefore, a reliable water supply is completely dependent on the availability of water from the District No. 29's wholesaler. The reliability of West Basin's supply can potentially be impacted by legal, environmental, water quality, and climatic factors. West Basin's contingency planning includes a comprehensive plan to provide reliable water supplies under average, single-dry, and multiple-dry year hydrology for current and projected supplies. Under single-dry and multiple-dry year conditions West Basin plans to meet its annual increases in demand by purchasing imported water supplies. West Basin does not anticipate any shortages and will be able to provide reliable water supplies under both single-dry year and multiple-dry year conditions. Any shortfall in supplies will be met through imported water from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, which manages its supply and demand balance through both their Water Surplus and Drought Management Plan and Water Supply Allocation Plan.

Additionally, West Basin anticipates 100 percent reliability by continuing to move forward with its Water Reliability 2020 (WR2020) Program. In 2009, West Basin developed and launched its WR2020 Program to communicate to the public West Basin's goal of increasing local water reliability by doubling recycled water production, doubling its water conservation efforts, expanding its water use efficiency programs, and introducing ocean-water desalination to its water portfolio. All West Basin's supply development programs fall under the umbrella of the WR2020 Program. West Basin is continuing to plan and invest in its WR2020 Program to reduce its dependence on imported water to mitigate future water shortages and allocation impacts on West Basin's customers. The expanded use of recycled water and introduction of ocean water desalination supplies coupled with additional conserved supplies through water use efficiency programs in West Basin's service area will continue to reduce the demand on imported water.

West Basin does not anticipate any shortages as it is actively diversifying its water supply portfolio, maintaining imported water reliability, and developing local resources, as well as furthering existing water conservation efforts. West Basin has available supply to meet the expected demand for the District.

## 1.2 Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley

District No. 40's supply portfolio consists of approximately 60 to 70 percent of imported water from the Antelope Valley–East Kern Water Agency (AVEK), and 30 to 40 percent of groundwater produced from the District No. 40's wells. As the third largest California State Water Project (SWP) Contractor and wholesaler, AVEK is a regional water agency that supplements Antelope Valley groundwater supplies with surface water supplies and delivers water to municipalities, ranchers, and agricultural water users. District No. 40 is AVEK's largest municipal customer and purchases its entire imported water supply from AVEK.

AVEK is entitled to receive Table A water from the Department of Water Resources (DWR), which refers to the maximum amount of water a contractor can receive annually and is used by DWR for allocating SWP supplies and costs among the contractors. Although AVEK has a set maximum annual allocation of SWP Table A water at 144,844 acre-fee per year (AFY), they typically receive an average of 58 percent of this allocation, or 84,000 AFY of which District 40 typically receives 70 percent. SWP water supplies have been a historically variable source of imported water for AVEK due to constant fluctuations in climate and precipitation, limited reliability of its conveyance system (primarily restrictions with the Bay Delta system), regulatory/legislative restrictions, and operational conditions and is particularly unreliable during dry years. To maximize and ensure reliability in the region, AVEK has the Westside and Eastside Water Banks within its service area and has participated in various exchange programs with other SWP contractors. The Westside Water Bank allows for an estimated total storage of up to 150,000 acre-feet (AF). The Eastside Water bank allows for a total storage of 5,700 AF. Any unused Table A water made available by AVEK to District No. 40 can potentially be stored during normal years and purchased from AVEK during dry years when SWP Table A supplies and groundwater will not meet demands. During years where AVEK is allocated at least half of their maximum SWP allocation, AVEK may store any excess supplies not used by District No. 40 and any other AVEK customers.

Groundwater continues to be an important resource within the Antelope Valley Region. With a future of anticipated continued urban growth, increased agricultural demand, and limits on the fluctuating supply of imported water, the demand for water will only continue to increase. District No. 40's ability to produce groundwater is subject to the Antelope Valley Groundwater Cases Judgment, which includes District No. 40's annual groundwater rights. If District No. 40 pumps more than its entitlement under the Judgment in an emergency situation, there could be financial and operational consequences. These rights include 6,789 AFY of the native safe yield, 55 percent of the unused Federal reserve right, and imported water return flows, which consists of 39 percent of the previous 5-year average of imported water used by District No. 40. Additionally, under a separate lease agreement with AVEK, District No. 40 can lease a percentage of groundwater rights allocated to AVEK, up to 2,600 AFY.

District No. 40 currently owns and operates 56 wells. Some locations within District No. 40 face groundwater quality issues, where they contain high amounts of arsenic and nitrates resulting in those wells being inoperable or operated on blending plans with imported water to meet water quality requirements. According to District No. 40's 2020 UWMP, the overall groundwater quality in the basin is good and considered to be generally suitable for domestic, agricultural, and industrial uses. District No. 40 plans to continue to utilize groundwater to supply approximately 30 to 40 percent of its demands.

To improve resiliency, District No. 40 is planning to construct additional wells to be able to recover carryover water. District No. 40 is planning to secure sites for new groundwater wells and collaborate with other agencies in the Antelope Valley to improve water supply resiliency for the region. The new sites of these wells are planned to be in locations within District No. 40 containing the lowest amounts of arsenic and nitrates. The projected water supply from AVEK and District No. 40 wells matches the expected demand.

## Section 2: Annual Water Supply and Assessment Procedures

The annual water supply and demand assessment (Annual Assessment) is conducted by the Districts staff annually on or before July 1 of each year beginning with the first annual water supply and demand assessment due by July 1, 2022. The Annual Assessment Report is submitted to DWR with information for anticipated shortage, triggered shortage response actions, compliance and enforcement actions, and communication actions consistent with this WSCP. Per the CWC Sections 10632(2)(A) and 10632(2)(B), the Districts must prepare a WSCP that includes "the written-process that [they] will use each year to determine [their] water supply" and "the key data inputs and assessment methodology used to evaluate [their] water supply reliability for the current year and one dry year."

To meet these requirements, the Districts will conduct an annual water supply and demand assessment as follows.

## 2.1 Decision-Making Process

The Districts will assess its water supply reliability by examining the Districts available water supplies and expected demands. Steps for the decision-making process are outlined below.

### 2.2 Data and Methodologies

The Districts collect key data inputs for the Annual Assessment including water supplies and unconstrained customer demands as described below.

### 2.2.1 Evaluation Criteria

The Districts will evaluate current year available supply and one dry year available supply, which will consider hydrological and regulatory conditions. The methodology for determining the available supply from each water source is as follows:

- Imported Water: The type of water year for West Basin and AVEK is determined before May 1 of each year. West Basin and AVEK can then determine water allocations for District Nos. 29 and 40, respectively. District No. 40 will determine available supply based on AVEK's allocation.
- Groundwater: District No. 40 will analyze historical production, groundwater rights, and carry over water.

### 2.2.2 Quantify Supplies Needed

- Water Supply: The available water supply by source is estimated for the current year and one subsequent dry year.
- Quantify each source of water supply and provide descriptive text of each source.
- Quantify current year available supply by source, considering hydrological and regulatory conditions in the current year.
- Quantify available supply by source for one subsequent dry year.

- Considerations for water supply availability estimates by source:
  - The existing infrastructure capabilities and plausible constraints as they impact the Districts' ability to deliver supplies to meet expected customer water use needs in the coming year should be considered.
  - Hydrological and regulatory conditions in the current year.
  - Specific locally applicable factors that can influence or disrupt each supply source.

### 2.2.3 Estimate Unconstrained Customer Demands

- Current year unconstrained demand is estimated, considering weather, growth, and other influencing factors such as policies to manage current supplies to meet demand objectives in future years, as applicable.
- Unconstrained customer demand does not include demand reductions that may occur as a result of the Districts implementing any special shortage response actions that may be necessary.

### 2.2.4 Supply Evaluation Criteria and Infrastructure Considerations

Evaluation criteria is determined by the supply source conditions and factors that impact the condition of the supply source. The Annual Assessment is based on evaluating the key data inputs to determine the water supply reliability. Although an actual shortage may occur at any time during the year, shortage conditions can usually be forecasted by West Basin and AVEK on or about May 1 each year.

Supply source evaluations are based on applying the following criteria:

- Imported Water:
  - Infrastructure issues (repairs, construction, environmental mitigation, new projects, etc.)
  - System distribution capabilities
  - Water quality
  - SWP availability
- Groundwater:
  - Capacity of active wells on-line
  - Groundwater levels
  - Groundwater quality

## Section 3: Six Standard Water Shortage Levels

The Districts' PWCP defines ten water supply condition phases. In compliance with Section 10632(a)(3)(B) of the CWC, a crosswalk analysis was performed on the PWCP to determine 6 standard shortage levels that correspond to the new requirements by DWR. A summary is provided in Table 3-1 below. The 6th standard shortage level is new to the WSCP and represents a shortage of supplies greater than 50 percent. The Districts will implement the appropriate water shortage level based on the Districts' current water supply conditions as listed in the 6 levels defined in Table 3-2 in accordance to Section 10632(a)(3)(A). The County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors, as the governing body for the Districts, may determine the appropriate level and implement rate changes and conservation surcharges. Regardless of the water supply availability or service conditions within the Districts, the Board of Supervisors may set water conservation goals and modify level declarations as necessary to align with regional or State water conservation policies, agreements or declarations, or legal requirements.

## Section 4: Shortage Response Actions

## 4.1 Demand Reduction

The Districts' Water Waste Ordinance include mandatory prohibitions on water uses.

Demand reduction by the Districts is accomplished through various actions in response to shortage levels. Demand reduction measures are actions taken by the Districts and its customers to reduce water demand within the service area. DWR categorizes the various types of demand reduction actions. Categories include public information campaigns, landscape and Commercial, Industrial, Institutional (CII) restrictions, and others. Table 4-1 summarizes the Districts demand reduction actions in accordance with Section 10632(a) (4) (B) and (a)(4)(E). Any Restrictions placed on the Districts by the State of California take precedent over water use restrictions outlined in Table 4-1.

#### PWCP

The Districts' PWCP outlines a moratorium for demand increase on new connections and the Districts' conservation rate surcharge when necessary.

### Water Waste Ordinance

The Water Waste Ordinance found in Title 11 of the Code of Ordinances for Los Angeles County, Part 4 – Water Conservation Requirements for the Unincorporated Los Angeles County Area (11.38) outlines water prohibitions, irrigation prohibitions, leak prohibitions, prohibitions for car wash facilities and public eateries, and decorative fountains (County of Los Angeles 2015 Los Angeles County-Code of Ordinances. "Water Waste Ordinance").

Landscape irrigation prohibitions are enforced in all levels and become progressively restrictive in terms of allowable watering times, then days, then types of plants allowed. Runoff and water waste are always prohibited under the Water Waste Ordinance.

CII water use prohibitions are enforced with the Water Waste Ordinance. Eating establishments may serve drinking water only at customer request. Lodging establishments should wash linens daily only, upon customer request.

Use of water in ornamental fountains, ponds, lakes, or other similar-aesthetic features shall be prohibited unless the water is recirculated. This is outlined in the Water Waste Ordinance.

### Expand Public Information Campaign

Outreach campaigns and public education play a crucial role in demand reduction. The Districts' Public Information Program includes several different methods to engage with customers, such as web-based publications, bill inserts, and public outreach events. The Districts also work closely with their wholesalers, West Basin and AVEK, to expand their public information and water conservation efforts.

### Provide Rebates

The Districts provide rebates on plumbing fixtures and devices for items, such as highefficiency clothes washers, weather-based sprinkler controllers, and rotary sprinkler nozzles. Rebates for landscape irrigation efficiency that includes removing grass and replacing it with drought-tolerant landscaping are also available to customers of the Districts through its Cash for Grass Program.

### Decrease line flushing

At Level 1, the Districts will decrease line flushing activities and reduce fire-flow testing to an as-needed basis. These operations will temporarily be suspended until it is determined that the severity of the water supply condition may be reduced.

## 4.2 Supply Augmentation

Supply augmentation methods and other actions describe the Districts' method of acquiring additional water supply at corresponding shortage levels. Table 4-2 summarizes the Districts' supply increase actions by identifying the water shortage level that triggers the augmentation method in accordance to Section 10632(a)(4)(A).

Supply Augmentation that require increase in pumping volumes is dependent upon available capacities at that time.

Not all actions may be implemented/required at each shortage level. It is at the discretion of the District Engineer to decide which actions to implement depending on the shortage level.

The selection of the supply augmentation method will be determined on a real-time basis depending on the supply and demand assessment at the discretion of the Districts.

## 4.3 Operational Changes

In order to address water shortage response actions in this WSCP, the following operational changes can be implemented in response to water shortage levels. The Districts' operational changes include the following at all water shortage levels:

- Costumer notifications Convey water shortage messaging through the Districts' website, door hangers, monthly bill inserts, e-mail blasts, and text messaging alerts.
- Customer Information System Increase monitoring, analysis, and tracking of customer water usage and rates. Business Operations staff will increase their reporting on customers in certain tiers and water usage will be monitored more closely.

More details and information on programs can be found in Section 8 of the Districts UWMP.

## 4.4 Additional Mandatory Restrictions

Additional mandatory restrictions, such as limitations on irrigation water use, car washing, and water feature restrictions, have been included in Table 8-2 in accordance to Section 10632(a)(4)(D).

More information can be found in the specific ordinances. The Water Conservation Regulation is found in Part 5 of the Rules and Regulations. The Water Waste Ordinance is found in Part 4 of Chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances for Los Angeles County.

## 4.5 Emergency Response Plan

In the event of a catastrophe (earthquake, regional power outage, or any other emergency that results in a water supply interruption), the District will take the following measures to prevent water shortages: (1) use the emergency interconnections (District No. 29: Las Virgenes Municipal Water District/Los Angeles Department of Water and Power; District No. 40: Quartz Hill Water District/Palmdale Water District); (2) implement the WSCP; and (3) enforce the Water Waste Ordinance. In addition, the Districts also have an Emergency Response Plan (ERP), which was updated in 2021. The Districts maintains this ERP to address responding to catastrophic supply interruptions as well as other emergencies. The Districts also have back-up power available in the form of portable diesel, natural gas, and propane generator units for water supply facilities in order to continue supplying water to customers, communicating with the power company, activating emergency connections, continuing water quality monitoring, and issuing boil water advisories if necessary. In the event of an emergency, the Districts will implement its ERP.

The Districts' ERP also addresses scheduled and planned disruptions to supply. Such disruptions in supply will occur when demand is lowest (time of year) and when alternate supply is available.

The Districts utilizes an emergency organizational structure and chain of command in response to all emergencies within or affecting its service area. The ERP defines the emergency management positions.

The Districts have also implemented a feature to contact customers of critical notifications via text messaging and e-mail, which allows all Districts customers to be reached within 90 minutes.

In an emergency event, response actions for all levels of the WSCP will be in place in addition to the Districts' ERP procedures. The ERP is not included in this document due to security reasons.

## 4.6 Seismic Risk Assessment and Mitigation Plan

The Districts have completed its own seismic risk assessment as part of the America's Water Infrastructure Act of 2018 (CWC Section 10632.5) through the Risk and Resilience Assessment (RRA). The RRA was completed by the Districts in 2020 and it includes a seismic risk assessment component for the Districts water supply facilities, such as wells, pump stations, and storage tanks. The RRA assesses the vulnerability of these facilities and provides a mitigation plan to address these vulnerabilities. Detailed information is found in the Districts' 2020 RRA, but it is not included as an Appendix because it is a privileged and confidential document.

The District has also considered seismic mitigation for its water supply from the SWP. The following discusses how DWR would mitigate seismic interruption to the SWP's water supply (District No. 40 2015 UWMP).

## 4.7 Shortage Response Action Effectiveness

To monitor the reduction in water usage during the implementation of this WSCP at any water shortage level, supply and demand data would be collected and analyzed more frequently by the Districts' Business Operations Unit. The Districts billing system and water meter readings are collected and billed on a bimonthly basis. The Districts are currently in the process of converting all water meters to an Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) system. Once fully complete, this technology can allow the Districts to monitor near real-time water usage data and could track water usage more precisely. AMI data can be used to assist in quantifying water use reductions associated with the various response actions at different water shortage levels. Because the District has yet to complete the meter replacements and infrastructure needs for the AMI conversion, water savings cannot be directly quantified at this time.

For each shortage response action, estimates by what amount the gap was reduced in a quantitively value were provided in Table 4-2. Values correspond with the water shortage level percent reduction in supply.

## Section 5: Communication Protocols

The Districts' communication plan will provide customers information regarding the WSCP, its implementation, and water shortage allocations/actions. The Districts will also coordinate with the Board of Supervisors and other key audiences (outlined below) to ensure efficient water management during water supply shortage levels. The communication plan strives to:

- Educate customers regarding
  - Water supplies and sources
  - Water shortage conditions
  - Local and State regulations
- Explain proposed actions and how those actions are to be implemented
- Motivate customers to increase conservation by:
  - Participating in water-saving programs/rebates
  - Following specific water-conservation guidelines
- Maintain open communication with key audiences and customers.

Customer specific information will include, but not be limited to:

- Current or predicted shortages
- Restrictions on water use
- Water-saving tips
- Water Conservation Surcharges
- Compliance and enforcement information
- Shortage response actions

In addition, as outlined in Section N of the PWCP, "each customer will be notified on his or her bill as to what the target quantity and the base quantity will be for the applicable billing period."

Collaboration with key audiences is an essential part of the success of the communication plan specifically during water shortage periods. The frequency and extent of the collaboration, <u>and</u> outreach, <u>and notification</u> will increase with each increasing shortage level. The Districts' water conservation and water resources management staff regularly interact and coordinate with key audiences, including constituents and governing agencies to ensure outreach <u>and notification</u> efforts are consistent with the varying levels of drought periods.

## Section 6: Compliance and Enforcement

## 6.1 Relief from Compliance/Violations/Hearings

The information required by CWC Section 10632 is included in Sections M, O, and P of the Districts' PWCP.

## Section 7: Legal Authorities

The description of the legal authority that empowers the Districts to implement and enforce the PWCP is described in Section C of the PWCP.

# Section 8: Financial Consequences of the Water Shortage Contingency Plan

The implementation of the WSCP could result in a significant short-term reduction in the Districts revenue. The Districts sources of funding are structured into four categories: Service Charge, Facility Surcharge, Water Quantity Charge, and Standby Charge. The Service Charge is a fixed connection charge based on the size of the meter. The Facility Surcharge and Water Quantity Charge are based on the actual quantity of water used. The Standby Charge is assessed on all properties and is included on the property owner's tax bill. A reduction in water sales will affect only the revenues from the Water Quantity Charge are intended to provide adequate revenue for the Districts to ensure continuous operations and maintenance functions regardless of reductions in water sales. However, if water sales do affect the operation and maintenance revenues, the Districts have the following measures to reduce such an impact:

- Extra revenues contributed by the conservation surcharge from customers who do not comply with the conservation targets.
  - Implementing conservation surcharges can be an effective way to mitigate falling revenues due to reduction in water use. In addition, conservation surcharges have been shown to reduce water demand. Implementation of surcharges are described in detail in the Districts' PWCP.
  - The conservation target is a percentage of the quantity used during a "base" billing period set by the Board of Supervisors. Water use up to the target quantities shall be billed at the established quantity charge or normal charge. Water use exceeding target quantities shall be subject to conservation surcharges in addition to the established quantity charge or normal charge.
- Delayed capital improvement projects if necessary, the Board of Supervisors can authorize the transfer of funds for capital improvement projects from the Districts' Accumulative Capital Outlay Fund to the Districts' General Fund.
- Increased water rates. In the event the first two options are not sufficient, the Board
  of Supervisors would have to consider increases to water rates to meet operational
  needs. Any such increase would have to be approved by the Board of Supervisors
  pursuant to the Proposition 218 and Public Hearing process.

## Section 9: Monitoring and Reporting

The Districts intends to monitor the effectiveness of each shortage response action in the future by collecting data from customer meters. Data from the Districts' water supply and demand is collected and analyzed on a bimonthly basis and readings are compiled into annual summaries. The base quantity of a customer with a meter size of one and one-half (1-1/2) inches or larger shall be determined by the amount of water used on the customer's premises during the corresponding billing period of a base period to be defined by the Board of Supervisor. For meter sizes of one (1) inch or less, a base quantity shall be the average of the water usage for all similar sized meters during the corresponding billing period of a base period to be defined by the Board of Supervisors. Excessive water use is reported on the customer's bimonthly bills and is compared to target conservation goals as well as compared to normal year conditions. If water conservation goals are not met, the Districts may implement additional shortage response actions.

## Section 10: Water Shortage Contingency Plan Refinement Procedures

The WSCP will be revaluated and refined every 5 years in accordance with the UWMP, or at the discretion of the Districts. The evaluation will include assessing the effectiveness of the water shortage response actions for each demand level. The evaluation will compare the expected percent demand reduction against actual reductions, as well as assessing the communication and outreach protocols and refining the WSCP accordingly.

## Section 11: Special Water Distinction Feature

Per Section 10632(b) of the CWC, the Districts are required to "analyze and define water features that are artificially supplied with water, including ponds, lakes, waterfalls, and fountains, separately from swimming pools and spas." It is the Districts' policy that recycled water be used for nonpotable uses wherever its use is financially and technically feasible and consistent with legal requirements. As such, nonpool and nonspa water features may use or be able to use recycled water when it is available, whereas pools and spas must use potable water for health and safety reasons.

Response, enforcement, and monitoring actions for pools and spas are consistent with the other potable water end uses discussed in this WSCP. As for nonpool and nonspa water features, such as ornamental fountains, ponds, lakes, or other similar-aesthetic features, the use of water is prohibited unless the water is recirculated as outlined in this WSCP and Chapter 11.38 of the Code of Ordinances of the Los Angeles County.

To satisfy the requirements set forth in Section 10632(b) of the CWC, the following water features have been analyzed and defined:

Artificial Lake: A human-made lake, pond, lagoon, or other body of water that is used wholly or partly for landscape, scenic, or noncontact recreational purposes. (Chapter 6 of the Rules and Regulations).

Ornamental Fountains: An ornamental structure in a pool or lake from which one or more jets of water are pumped into the air. (General Definition).

# 11.1 Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29, Malibu, and the Marina del Rey Water System

The use of recycled water within District No. 29 is currently limited to landscape irrigation at Pepperdine University. However, District No. 29 is committed to working with the City of Malibu to identify creative solutions for using recycled water when it becomes available in the area consistent with existing regulations and subject to available funding.

## **11.2 Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley**

The use of recycled water within District No. 40 is currently limited to landscape irrigation at institutional locations, refilling lakes at Apollo Park, and commercial uses. However, District No. 40 does not produce or treat recycled water, nor does it operate the recycled water distribution system. The Los Angeles County Sanitation District Nos. 14 and 20 produce and treat the recycled water while the Cities of Lancaster and Palmdale operate the recycled water distribution system. District No. 40 currently does not plan on using recycled water in the future.

## Section 12: Plan Adoption, Submittal, and Availability

Since the early 1980s, Section 10632 of the CWC has required urban water suppliers to prepare and adopt a WSCP as part of its UWMP. The goal of developing a WSCP is to prepare in advance a response for various water shortage conditions that could be caused by dry years, natural forces, system interruptions or failure, chronic maintenance deferral, dropping groundwater levels, or regulatory action.

Prior to adoption of an UWMP and subsequent WSCP, Section 10642 of the CWC requires that the water supplier make the plans available for public inspection and hold a public hearing. Notice of the time and place of the hearing must be published pursuant to Government Code 6066, which states that the publication of the notice shall be once a week for 2 successive weeks with at least 5 intervening days. The notice must also be provided to any city within which the supplier provides water supplies.

The public hearing was held pursuant to Section 10642 of the CWC. Notice of the time and place of the hearing were published pursuant to Government Code 6066 and were provided to the City of Malibu, as well as the Cities of Lancaster and Palmdale. Following review and approval from the County of Los Angeles County Counsel, the Board of Supervisors adopted the resolution approving the 2020 UWMP and WSCP for District Nos. 29 and 40 and the WSCP. The Notices of Public Hearing were as to form.

Following adoption from the Board of Supervisors, the 2020 UWMP and WSCP for District Nos. 29 and 40 and the WSCP were submitted to DWR for review and approval. Upon approval, DWR will submit reports to the State Legislature summarizing the status of the plans. This WSCP can be periodically amended independently of the UWMP on an asneeded basis. If an amendment is needed to the WSCP, the same process of review, public hearings, approval, and adoption will be followed.

Lastly, the submitted and approved plans will be available to the public and the Cities of Malibu, Lancaster, and Palmdale on the Districts' website pursuant to Section 10635(c) of the CWC no later than 30 days after they have been submitted to DWR.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Approval of the recommended actions will comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and adopt the enclosed Los Angeles County Revised Countywide Siting Element resolution (Enclosure A), approving the enclosed Siting Element (Enclosure B) prior to submittal to the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle).

The California Integrated Waste Management Act, Assembly Bill (AB) 939 requires each county to prepare a countywide siting element that describes how the county, and the cities within the county, plan to manage the disposal of their solid waste for a 15-year planning period. The Siting Element does not identify any proposed new or expansion of existing landfills and has removed Blind and Elsmere Canyon Landfills from the Siting Element's list of future landfill sites. The Siting Element analyzes future disposal needs, describes capacities available at both in- and out-of-County disposal facilities (such as landfills and waste-to-energy facilities), and identifies potential conversion technology sites. To provide a framework for managing solid waste in the region, the Siting Element also establishes various goals and policies on issues such as source reduction and recycling, alternative-to-landfill technologies, and conserving and securing landfill capacities.

### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Goal II, Foster Vibrant and Resilient Communities; Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality; and Objective II.3.4, Reduce Waste Generation and Recycle and Reuse Waste Resources. The recommended actions will support the County's effort to reduce solid waste generation and divert solid waste from landfills, thereby reducing emissions of greenhouse gases and other harmful climate pollutants.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

Adoption of the above recommendations will have no impact on the County General Fund. However, CalRecycle has statutory requirements under Section 41813 of the California Public Resources Code to enforce the provisions of AB 939, which states that failure to submit an approved countywide siting element to the State could result in a fine of up to \$10,000 per day.

Funding for the preparation, maintenance, and administration of the documents will be included in the Solid Waste Management Fund (GD1) through the annual budget process.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In 1989, the State adopted AB 939 that requires each county to prepare a countywide siting element that describes how the county, and the cities within the county, plan to manage the disposal of their solid waste for a 15-year planning period. The document also addresses the disposal capacity need for each planning year on a countywide basis. State law defines disposal capacity as the capacity provided by landfills and/or transformation facilities.

The Siting Element also provides a description of the areas and strategies that may be used to address the State mandates for adequate disposal capacity during the planning period and discusses how those areas and strategies may help the County meet the disposal capacity requirements under various scenarios. The areas/strategies considered include the use of existing permitted disposal capacity, increase in diversion rates, utilization of out-of-County disposal facilities, and fostering the development of technologies that provide alternatives to landfill disposal. Additionally, the Siting Element of needed solid waste transformation and land disposal facilities. However, there are no proposed new or expansion of existing landfill and transformation facilities in the County identified in the Siting Element.

The Siting Element serves as a policy manual rather than a specific development program. As specific sites and projects are developed, they must demonstrate that they are in conformance with the Siting Element and its siting criteria fully comply with all requirements of CEQA, and comply with all Federal, State, and local rules and regulations including consistency with the local jurisdiction General Plan.

Pursuant to Sections 41721 and 41760 of the California Public Resources Code, the Siting Element shall be approved by the County and by a majority of the cities within the County, which contain a majority of the population of the incorporated areas of the County. In addition, cities are required to approve or reject the Siting Element, independently, within 90 days of receiving it from the County. State law provides that if a city does not take action within that time period the city will have been deemed to have approved the document.

As directed by the Board, the Siting Element and their associated environmental documents were distributed to the 88 cities in Los Angeles County for the statutory 90-day approval period which ended on December 12, 2022. As of that date, 87 cities approved the Siting Element either by resolution or tacit approval as provided by Section 41760 of the Public Resources Code. The enclosed Table 1 (Enclosure C) summarizes the actions by the cities.

As shown in Table 1, the combined population of the cities that granted approval, either by resolution or tacit approval, to the Siting Element is 8,828,441, which constitutes 98.9 percent of the total number of cities and 99.7 percent of the total incorporated population in Los Angeles County. This satisfies the statutory requirement for the approval of the Siting Element by more than 50 percent of the cities containing more than 50 percent of the County's incorporated population.

The Siting Element must now be approved by the Board, as required by Sections 41760 and 41721 of the California Public Resources Code. Prior to action, the Board must conduct a public hearing, a notice of which must be published 30 days in advance (Code of Regulations Section, Title 14, Section 18782). Subject to adoption by the Board, the Siting Element will then be submitted to CalRecycle for approval. Any amendments to the document can only be considered in a subsequent revision and full approval process.

Pursuant to Section 41721.5 of the California Public Resources Code, any amendment to the countywide siting element shall be approved by a majority of the cities containing a majority of the incorporated population in the county, the County Board of Supervisors, and CalRecycle.

## ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

On August 2, 2022, the Board certified the Final Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the Siting Element in compliance with CEQA and adopted the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program, Environmental Finding of Fact, and Statement of Overriding Considerations. The recommended actions are within the scope of the project in the previously certified EIR where the EIR specifically contemplated that the Siting Element would be adopted and implemented following the requisite public hearing.

There have been no changes to the project or to the circumstances under which it is undertaken that require further review under CEQA.

Upon the Board's approval of the project, the department will file a Notice of Determination with the County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152(a) of the California Public Resources Code and post the Notice of Determination to its website in accordance with Section 21092.2.

  - a. Adopt the annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2023-24.

- b. Upon its adoption, instruct the Director of Public Works to file with the Auditor-Controller before August 10, 2023, a copy of the Annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2023-24.
- c. Instruct the Auditor-Controller, upon receipt of the adopted Annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2023-24 from the Director of Public Works, to enter the amounts of the charges against the respective lots or parcels of land as they appear on the current assessment roll.
- 4. If a majority written protest against the proposed Annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2023-24 exists, refer the item back to Public Works. If the Annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2023-24 is not adopted, the solid waste generation service charge shall be collected separately from the annual property taxes and shall not constitute a lien against any parcel or parcels of land.

## PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adoption of the enclosed Annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report will provide for the continued collection of the current service charge of \$3.51 in the County unincorporated areas for Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24 on the property tax roll. The service charge is applied to each parcel of real property and is collected through the property tax roll. The collection of the annual service charge on the property tax roll remains the most cost-effective mechanism to bill and account for these charges.

The revenues generated from the service charge are used to fund the preparation, adoption, and administration of the Los Angeles County Household Hazardous Waste Element; the preparation, adoption, and implementation of Los Angeles County's Source Reduction and Recycling Element, including State reporting; and implementation of residential recycling, business recycling, and public education outreach. These State-mandated activities for waste reduction are required by the California Public Resources Code, Section 40000 et seq.

## Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality and Objective II.3.4, Reduce Waste Generation and Recycle and Reuse Waste Resources. The recommended action will provide funding necessary for the continued administration, planning, and implementation

of waste reduction and recycling activities and programs in the County unincorporated areas.

## FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund. Adoption of the report will provide for the continued collection of the existing annual service charge on the property tax roll in Fiscal Year 2023-24. The projected revenue amount to be collected is \$1,233,000 and is included in the Solid Waste Management Fund (GD1) FY 2023-24 Budget.

## FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In September 1991, the Board adopted an ordinance establishing the annual service charge as authorized by California Public Resources Code Sections 41901 and 41902.

An annual service charge is imposed upon each parcel of real property within the County unincorporated areas based on the number of Solid Waste Generation units assigned to that parcel. The number of units is a function of the current land use of the parcel and varies from zero for a vacant parcel to fifty for auditoriums and amusement facilities. The annual Service Charge per Solid Waste Generation unit is currently \$3.51 and will remain unchanged for FY 2023-24. Based on this formula, the annual service charge for a single-family residence is \$3.51. Revenues generated are used to implement required activities and programs to achieve State waste reduction mandates.

Pursuant to Section 5473 of the California Health and Safety Code, the Annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, FY 2023-24 has been prepared and filed with the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors. Section 5473 also provides that any adopted ordinance authorizing the collection of service charges on the property tax roll shall remain in effect until repealed or until changes have been made in the rates. The report contains a description of each parcel receiving such services and the amount of the charge for each parcel for the year, computed in conformity with the charges prescribed by ordinance.

Section 5473.1 of the California Health and Safety Code requires that notice of the filing of this report and of a time and place of hearing thereon be published once a week for two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation pursuant to Section 6066 of the Government Code.

Section 5473.2 of the California Health and Safety Code also requires the Board to hear and consider all protests to the report. If the Board finds that protests to the report are

made by the owners of a majority of parcels described in the report, the report shall not be adopted; and the matter shall be returned to Public Works.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

Adoption of the Annual Service Charge Report, FY 2023-24 to provide for the collection of the annual service charge on the property tax roll is for the purpose of meeting operating expenses and therefore, is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 21080(b)(8) of the California Public Resources Code.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The collection of the annual service charge on the property tax roll will provide funds necessary for the County to comply with the State waste reduction mandates.

## LOS ANGELES COUNTY PUBLIC WORKS ANNUAL SOLID WASTE GENERATION SERVICE CHARGE REPORT FISCAL YEAR 2023-24

### **INTRODUCTION**

The California Health and Safety Code, Section 5470, et seq., requires that if existing Solid Waste Generation Service Charges are to be continued and collected on the tax roll, a report shall be prepared each year and filed with the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors.

The Executive Officer shall file a copy of the report with the Auditor-Controller on or before August 10 of each year, with a statement that the report has been adopted by the Board of Supervisors, and the Auditor-Controller shall enter the amounts of the charges against the respective parcels of land as they appear on the current assessment roll. This report has been prepared to fulfill these requirements.

In 1989 the State of California passed the California Integrated Waste Management Act, Assembly Bill (AB) 939. AB 939, as amended, mandates all jurisdictions, Statewide, prepare a series of documents detailing their waste management strategies to achieve 50 percent landfill diversion. AB 939 also allows the State to assess penalties up to \$10,000 per day on jurisdictions that do not comply with AB 939's mandates.

## SOLID WASTE GENERATION SERVICE CHARGE

In 1991 as a result of the enactment of AB 939, the Board of Supervisors adopted Los Angeles County Ordinance No. 91-0119 implementing the service charge. This service charge funds the preparation, adoption, and administration of the Los Angeles County Household Hazardous Waste Element and the preparation, adoption, and implementation of the County's Source Reduction and Recycling Element of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan, including State reporting and implementation of the County's Source Reduction and Recycling Element programs such as residential recycling, business recycling, and public education outreach.

The Service Charge Ordinance is codified in the Los Angeles County Code, Title 20, Division 4, Chapter 20.89 (Exhibit A). The annual charge levied on each parcel of real property in the unincorporated County area is computed by multiplying the amount of the Service Charge (currently \$3.51) by the number of Solid Waste Generation units for the current land use as shown in Table A, Section 20.89.070, of the County Code.

The current annual charge of \$3.51 per Solid Waste Generation unit will remain the same for Fiscal Year 2023-24 and is projected to be \$1,233,000 based on Public Works' Budget/Fund Management Division's forecast.

### **IDENTIFICATION OF PARCELS TO BE CHARGED**

All improved parcels of real property in the unincorporated areas of the County of Los Angeles are subject to this service charge. The Fiscal Year 2023-24 Tax Rate Areas for the affected parcels are listed in Exhibit B.

#### Chapter 20.89

#### SOLID WASTE GENERATION SERVICE CHARGE

**20.89.010 Purpose of provisions.** The purpose of this chapter is to establish and collect the Service Charge authorized by Sections 41901 and 41902 of the Public Resources Code in order to fund the reasonable and necessary costs incurred by the County of Los Angeles in the preparation, adoption, and administration of the Los Angeles County Household Hazardous Waste Element, and the preparation, adoption, and implementation of the Los Angeles County Source Reduction and Recycling Element of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan prepared pursuant to Public Resources Code, Section 40000 et seq. The Service Charge will be levied upon each parcel of real property in the unincorporated area of the County of Los Angeles and will be collected directly by the County on the tax roll. The Service Charge will not be imposed upon or collected by any solid waste haulers providing solid waste collection for the County of Los Angeles. (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

#### 20.89.020 Definitions.

A. "Parcel of real property" means a parcel of real property as shown on the latest secured tax rolls of the County of Los Angeles.

B. Solid waste means all putrescible and non-putrescible solid and semisolid wastes, including garbage, trash, refuse, paper, rubbish, ashes, industrial wastes, demolition and construction wastes, abandoned vehicles and parts thereof, discarded home and industrial appliances, manure, vegetable or animal solid and semisolid wastes, and other discarded solid and semisolid wastes. (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

#### 20.89.030 Levy of annual service charge.

A. An annual Service Charge is levied upon each parcel of real property in the unincorporated territory of the County of Los Angeles for the services and facilities furnished by the County in connection with the preparation, adoption, and administration of the Los Angeles County Household Hazardous Waste Element, and the preparation, adoption, and implementation of the Los Angeles County Source Reduction and Recycling Element of the County Integrated Waste Management Plan.

B. The amount of the Service Charge for each parcel shall be computed by multiplying the solid waste generation unit charge by the number of solid waste generation units for current land use of the parcel as shown in Table A, set out at Section 20.89.070. The solid waste generation unit charge is \$3.51 per unit. (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

**20.89.040 Collection of charges.** The Service Charge shall be collected for each fiscal year on the tax roll in the same manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as, together with and separately from, the general taxes of the County of Los Angeles. (Ord. 91 0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

**20.89.050 Deposit of collected moneys.** The moneys collected under Section 20.89.040 shall be deposited in a separate special revenue fund entitled "Solid Waste Management Fund." (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

**20.89.060 Refunds.** In the event any Service Charge shall have been erroneously paid or overpaid pursuant to this chapter, it may be refunded. (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

## Solid Waste Generation Service Charge (SWGSC) Tax Rate Areas

The Tax Rate Areas (TRAs) for Solid Waste Generation Service Charge in the following pages are a list of areas in the County unincorporated Area developed by the Los Angeles County Assessor's office where taxes are assessed. Generally, the TRAs are provided to the Department of Auditor-Controller to determine the assessment to charge parcels for various services on the County's property tax roll. Within each TRA, there maybe a few hundred to a few thousand parcels that will be assessed the Solid Waste Generation Service Charge through direct assessment. The number of solid waste generation units charged is determined by the type of Land Use on the parcel. Each year, the Assessor's office generates the TRAs list and typically there are changes within each TRA, such as new parcels added or removed due to various circumstances that occurred within each parcel. Additionally, the number of solid waste generation units may change as a result of the Land Use on the parcel.

# <u>SUBJECT</u>

The recommended actions are to certify the Gateway Planning Area Rezoning Program Addendum (Addendum) to the previously certified Housing Element Update Final Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) and approve the Gateway Planning Area Rezoning Program (Project), which amends the County of Los Angeles (County) General Plan and Title 22 (Planning and Zoning) of the Los Angeles County Code. The Project will facilitate the availability of residential sites at adequate densities and with appropriate development standards to help accommodate the unincorporated County's fair share of the regional housing need, also known as the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA). A project summary is included as Attachment 1. The proposed Land Use Policy Change Maps are included as Attachment 3, and the proposed Title 22 amendments are included as Attachment 4. The Addendum to the previously certified Housing Element Update Final PEIR is included as Attachment 5.

# IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING:

1. Certify that the Addendum to the previously certified Housing Element Update Final PEIR (Environmental Assessment No. RPPL2022002014) (Attachment 5) for the Project has been completed in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and reflects the independent judgment and analysis of the County; find



> that the Board of Supervisors (Board) has reviewed and considered the information contained in the Addendum with the Housing Element Update Final PEIR prior to approving the Project, and approve the Addendum;

- Indicate its intent to approve the Project (General Plan Amendment No. RPPL2022002013, Zone Change No. RPPL2022002015, and Advance Planning Project No. RPPL2022012287), as recommended by the Regional Planning Commission (RPC); and
- 3. Instruct County Counsel to prepare the necessary final documents for the Project and bring them back to the Board for their consideration.

## PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will approve an Addendum to the previously certified Housing Element Update Final PEIR and assist the County in meeting its RHNA allocation in the unincorporated communities of South Whittier-Sunshine Acres and West Whittier-Los Nietos of the Gateway Planning Area, as well as complying with state housing law requirements.

The State of California (State) requires that every local jurisdiction periodically prepare and update their housing elements. State law requires that a housing element include an inventory of sites that are zoned and available within the planning period to meet the local jurisdiction's RHNA. If the local jurisdiction cannot demonstrate that there are enough sites to address its RHNA, a Rezoning Program is required.

The County has been assigned a RHNA of 90,052 units for the 2021-2029 planning period, which is divided by level of affordability. The Revised Housing Element, which was adopted by the Board on May 17, 2022, and certified by the State Department of Housing and Community Development on May 27, 2022, outlines the County's strategies to accommodate its RHNA. The Sites Inventory is comprised of vacant and underutilized sites within unincorporated Los Angeles County that are zoned at appropriate densities and with appropriate development standards to facilitate housing development. Other strategies used to accommodate the County's RHNA include projected growth of accessory dwelling units, specific plan capacity, selected entitled projects, and capacity or planned development on County-owned sites within cities. Together, these strategies account for approximately 38 percent of the RHNA. The remaining 62 percent of the RHNA is accommodated by sites to be rezoned for higher density housing development. The County will implement the rezoning through various community-based planning efforts, including the Project.

On February 22, 2023, the RPC held a public hearing and voted unanimously to recommend approval of the Project. A summary of RPC proceedings is included as Attachment 6. The RPC's resolution is included as Attachment 7.

## Key Components

The Project includes the following major elements and key components:

## Land Use Policy Changes Along Commercial Corridors

The proposed amendment to the General Plan Land Use Policy Map redesignates a total of 58 parcels from General Commercial (GC) to Mixed Use (MU) to allow for higher density residential and mixed-use developments. Parcels proposed to be redesignated in South Whittier-Sunshine Acres are located along Telegraph Road and Leffingwell Road. Parcels proposed to be redesignated in West Whittier-Los Nietos are generally located along Whittier Boulevard.

The proposed MU land use designation allows for pedestrian-friendly and community-serving commercial uses that encourage walking, bicycling, and transit use, residential and commercial mixed uses, and multifamily residences. The MU land use designation allows a residential density of 50 to 150 dwelling units per net acre and a maximum floor area ratio (FAR) of 3.0 for non-residential and mixed-use development.

## **Zoning Consistency**

Zone changes are proposed on 1,315 parcels in the unincorporated communities of South Whittier-Sunshine Acres and West Whittier-Los Nietos to ensure consistency with the General Plan Land Use Policy Map. Zone MXD (Mixed Use Development) is proposed on the 58 parcels that are redesignated MU. Additionally, multi-family residential zones (Zones R-2, R-3, and R-4) are proposed on parcels in certain residential areas where the existing zones (Zones A-1, R-1, and R-A) are inconsistent with the existing General Plan land use designations (H18, H30, and H50).

## State-Mandated Inclusionary Zoning

Per State Housing Element Law (Government Code sections 65580 – 65589.11), housing developments on certain parcels identified in a Housing Element Sites Inventory or Rezoning Program must provide a 20 percent affordable housing set-aside for very low and/or lower-income households. The proposed Title 22 amendments ensure compliance with the Housing Element Law.

## **Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals**

The Project supports the County's *Strategic Plan Goal I: Make Investments That Transform Lives; Objective I.1.5: Increase Affordable Housing Throughout L.A. County* by allowing higher density housing development in certain areas where appropriate and increasing housing options.

## **FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING**

Approval of the Project will not result in any significant new costs to the Department of Regional Planning or other County departments and agencies.

## FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The proposed Project supports Goals HE 1, HE 3, LU 4, and LU 5 as well as Policies HE 1.1, HE 3.1, LU 4.1, LU 4.2, LU 5.1, and LU 5.3 of the General Plan in that it will improve housing choice and affordability for residents of various incomes, promote infill development, and support a mix of land uses that promote bicycling and walking.

In addition to the public hearing conducted by the RPC on February 22, 2023, a public hearing before the Board is required pursuant to County Code section 22.232.040.B.1. Required notice (Attachment 8) has been given pursuant to the procedures and requirements set forth in County Code section 22.222.180. Additionally, courtesy public hearing notices were mailed to more than 1,300 property owners and emailed to 48 stakeholders. The notification lists are included as Attachments 9 and 10.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The Board certified the Housing Element Update Final PEIR on November 30, 2021 (State Clearinghouse No. 2021010016). The certified Housing Element Update Final PEIR is available at <a href="https://planning.lacounty.gov/housing/eir">https://planning.lacounty.gov/housing/eir</a>.

An Addendum to the Housing Element Update Final PEIR was prepared for the Project in compliance with CEQA and the County environmental guidelines. Based on the Addendum, the previously certified Housing Element Update Final PEIR, and other materials in record, the County determines that the Project falls within the Housing Element Update Final PEIR because the Project has no new significant environmental impacts; no substantial increase in severity of previously identified significant effects; no mitigation measures or alternatives previously found to be infeasible but are now determined to be feasible; and no mitigation measures or alternatives that are different from those in the Housing Element Update Final PEIR. Thus, neither a subsequent nor supplemental environmental impact report is required. (Pub. Resources Code, § 21166; Guidelines §§ 15162, 15163). However, some changes or additions are necessary to the Housing Element Update Final PEIR in order to implement the Project, making the Addendum the appropriate CEQA document for the Project. (Pub. Resources Code, §21166; Guidelines, §§ 15162–15164).

Upon your Board's approval of the Project, the County will file a Notice of Determination with the County Clerk in accordance with Public Resources Code section 21152.

A copy of the Addendum, along with the certified Housing Element Update Final PEIR, was available for public review from January 19, 2023 to February 21, 2023 at the La Puente Field Office and South Whittier Building and Safety Office.

## **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

Approval of the Project will not significantly impact County services.
