AUTHORIZATION FOR TRANSER OF LACDA OWNED PROPERTY LOCATED AT 10750 LAUREL AVENUE, WHITTIER, CA 90605 TO COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES (DISTRICT 4) (3 VOTES)

<u>SUBJECT</u>

This letter seeks to transfer ownership of the South Whittier Community Resource Center located at 10750 Laurel Avenue, Whittier, CA 90605 (Property), from the Los Angeles County Development Authority (LACDA) to the County of Los Angeles (County). This letter also requests authorization to transfer reserve funds currently held by LACDA for the South Whittier Resource Center to the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY:

- 1. Find that the proposed actions are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), for the reasons stated in this letter and the record of the projects.
- 2. Find that the Property is not required for LACDA use and find that the Property being transferred to the County is exempt surplus land pursuant to Government Code section 54221(f)(1)(D), and therefore, not subject to the requirements for the disposition of surplus land pursuant to the California Surplus Land Act.

- 3. Authorize the Executive Director or designee to transfer ownership of the South Whittier Community Resource Center at 10750 Laurel Avenue, Whittier, CA 90605 (APN# 8011-009-936) on a gratis basis, via quitclaim deed to the County.
- 4. Authorize the Executive Director or designee to execute an agreement with the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs (DCBA) which will allow for LACDA to provide operational support for the South Whittier Community Resource Center property, for a six-month period, and one six-month extension, if necessary, and to transfer all reserves, less any administrative costs, upon LACDA's cessation of operational support.
- 5. Authorize the Executive Director or designee to transfer the reserve funds for the South Whittier Community Resource Center in the amount of approximately \$1,200,000 to the County and to execute any necessary agreements to effectuate the transfer of Property.
- 6. Authorize the Executive Director or designee to assign the Space Use Agreements between LACDA and various organizations providing services at the South Whittier Community Resource Center, located at 10750 Laurel Avenue, Whittier, CA 90605, to the County.
- Authorize the Executive Director of the LACDA, or his designee, to execute
 any necessary agreements and take all other actions necessary for and
 consistent with the foregoing actions.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

- 1. Find that the proposed actions are exempt from CEQA, for the reasons stated in this letter and the record of the projects.
- Authorize the Director of DCBA or designee to execute an agreement with the LACDA to provide operational support for the South Whittier Community Resource Center for six-month period, and a one six-month extension, if necessary, and to transfer all reserves, less any LACDA administration costs, upon LACDA's cessation of operational support.
- 3. Authorize the Director of the DCBA or designee to accept reserve funds in the amount of approximately \$1,200,000 allocated to the South Whittier Community Resource Center, and to execute any necessary agreements and take all other actions necessary for and consistent with the foregoing actions, including execution of any space use agreements with various organizations providing services at the South Whittier Community Resource Center.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The recommended actions will transfer ownership and maintenance responsibilities of the Property from LACDA to the County, and find they are exempt surplus land pursuant to Government Code section 54221(f)(1)(D) and not subject to the California Surplus Lands Act.

IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIC PLAN GOALS

The proposed transfer supports the Countywide Strategic Plan Goal 2 and Strategy II.2 which call for fostering vibrant and resilient communities and supporting the wellness of communities. The proposed transfer also supports Countywide Strategic Plan Goal 3 and Strategy III.3.2 which call for "Realizing Tomorrow's Government Today" and maximizing use of County assets, guiding strategic investments, and supporting economic development in ways that are fiscally responsible and align with the County's highest priority needs, by allowing the County of Los Angeles to continue to provide public services to the South Whittier community in a commercial space that is appropriate for service delivery.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The recommended actions have no immediate overall fiscal impact. Funding associated with the Property has been or will be transferred to the County. The County provides \$700,000 annually in general funds for the operation of the South Whittier Community Resource Center. The Director of DCBA will seek to meet any such needs through the regular County budget processes.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The South Whittier Community Resource Center opened its doors to the public in 1998, its mission is to improve the quality of life for area residents by providing multiple levels of comprehensive, integrated, and accessible services supporting youth, seniors, and families in the unincorporated communities of the southeast region of Los Angeles County. DCBA will continue to provide existing services and augment services provided to the community.

The transfer of the Property to the County is necessary so that DCBA can continue to use it in support of their current activities. The County's Chief Executive Officer (CEO) has authority to accept the transfer of ownership of the Property from LACDA, pursuant to Los Angeles County Code Section 2.08.168.

The recommended actions will transfer ownership and maintenance responsibilities of the Property from LACDA to the County. The recommended actions are exempt surplus land

pursuant to Government Code section 54221(f)(1)(D) and not subject to the California Surplus Lands Act.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

Pursuant to 24 Code of Federal Regulation, Part 58, section 58.35(a)(5) these actions are categorically excluded from the National Environmental Policy Act, because they involve disposition of properties that will be retained for the same use and will not alter existing environmental conditions.

The proposed actions are exempt from CEQA. The actions, to transfer ownership and maintenance responsibilities of the surplus Property from LACDA to the County with no expansion in use, is within a class of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and which meets the criteria set forth in sections 15301 and 15312 of the State CEQA Guidelines ("Guidelines") and Class 1 and Class 12 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. In addition, based on the proposed project records, it will comply with all applicable regulations, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemptions inapplicable.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will transfer ownership, cash reserves and assignment of leases as outlined herewith.

BACKGROUND (include internal/external issues that may exist including any related motions)	On August 21, 2001, the Board approved a Development Agreement between LACDA and the County, through DMH, to develop Centro Estrella, a one-stop resource center that serves families in the East Los Angeles area, with an emphasis on children and youth with physical and developmental disabilities and mental health needs. LACDA currently leases space to DMH for offices and a clinic. Additionally, the center leases space to ALMA, a non-profit agency, for use as offices, a childcare center, and an aquatic pool. The County's Chief Executive Officer (CEO) has authority to accept the transfer of ownership of the Property from LACDA, pursuant to Los Angeles County Code Section 2.08.168. This letter seeks to transfer ownership of Centro Estrella located at 4701 Cesar Chavez Avenue, Los Angeles, CA 90022 (Property), from the Los Angeles County Development Authority (LACDA) to the County of Los Angeles (County). This letter also requests authorization to transfer reserve funds currently held by LACDA for Centro Estrella to the Department of Mental Health.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY:

1. Find that the proposed actions are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), for the reasons stated in this letter and the record of the projects.

- 2. Find that the Property is not required for LACDA use and find that the Property being transferred to the County is exempt surplus land pursuant to Government Code section 54221(f)(1)(D), and therefore, not subject to the requirements for the disposition of surplus land pursuant to the California Surplus Land Act.
- 3. Authorize the Executive Director of LACDA, or his designee, to transfer ownership of Centro Estrella located at 4701 Cesar Chavez Avenue, Los Angeles, CA 90022 (APN# 5235-020-911), on a gratis basis, via quitclaim deed to the County.
- 4. Authorize the Executive Director or designee to assign the lease between LACDA and Associated League of Mexican Americans Family Services (ALMA) at Centro Estrella, located at 4701 Cesar Chavez Avenue, Los Angeles, CA 90022, to the County and to execute any necessary agreements to facilitate such assignment.
- 5. Authorize the Executive Director or designee to execute an agreement with the Department of Mental Health (DMH) which will allow for LACDA to provide operational support for the Centro Estrella Property for a six-month period, and one six-month extension, if necessary, and to transfer all reserves, less any administrative costs, upon LACDA's cessation of operational support.
- 6. Authorize the Executive Director or designee to transfer the reserve funds for Centro Estrella in the amount of approximately \$600,000 to the County and to execute any necessary agreements to effectuate the transfer of Properties.
- 7. Authorize the Executive Director or designee to execute any necessary agreements and take all other actions necessary for and consistent with the foregoing actions.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

- 1. Find that the proposed actions are exempt from CEQA, for the reasons stated in this letter and the record of the projects.
- 2. Authorize the Director of DMH or designee to accept the assignment of the lease agreement between LACDA and ALMA and to execute any necessary agreements to accept such assignment.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

On October 21, 2008, the County of Los Angeles (County) Board of Supervisors (Board) approved the acquisition and installation of the 137 smart controllers at 14 parks, which were procured through the Job Order Contract (JOC) program. An additional 114 smart controllers were later procured through the JOC program. The selected smart controllers were pre-approved by the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) and qualified for the California Friendly Irrigation Retrofit Program Multi-Family Community Common Areas and Public Parks Rebate Program offered by MWD. To meet the rebate program requirements, the controller system must be equipped with weather data transmission systems and to provide the irrigation system operators with web-based communications to monitor controller operations.

On June 15, 2010, the Board delegated authority to the Director of Parks and Recreation (Director) to execute a sole source Subscription Services Contract (Contract) with HydroPoint Data Systems, Inc. (HydroPoint) to provide a weather-based irrigation controllers system to increase irrigation efficiency to adjust watering times in response to weather conditions. The Contract was for a maximum term of 13 years, including one three-year extension period, and is set to expire on June 30, 2023. The Department of Parks and Recreation (Department) is requesting to add a month-to-month extension period, not to exceed twelve (12) months, to allow time for the Department to complete a solicitation to determine if there is a similar product and service that can replace the current irrigation system and continue to maintain the Department's water management program consistent with the Board's water conservation policy.

From August 1, 2012 to present, as authorized by the Contract, the Department expanded subscription services for an additional 57 smart controllers, which were installed through multiple Change Notices, bringing the current number of smart controllers receiving wireless satellite communication to 308.

Amendment No. Two will expand the subscription services to an additional 15 smart controllers, increasing the total number of smart controllers receiving the wireless satellite communication from 308 to 323.

HydroPoint is the sole proprietor for the smart controller's maintenance and communication systems. With this subscription, the smart controllers operate according to the user programming and provide the full benefits and functionality of the controller by automatically adjusting their watering schedule in response to weather conditions.

Extending the Contract term on a month-to-month basis through June 30, 2024, will allow the Department to continue to have access to proprietary information and enable the Department to continue its water management program consistent with the Board's policy for conservation and irrigation efficiency. HydroPoint is the sole proprietor for the smart controller's maintenance and communications systems. The subscription service is necessary to fully optimize the functionality of the smart irrigation controller and is only available from the contractor. The subscription service for these smart controllers enabled the Department to decrease its annual water usage and increase operational management.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The proposed Amendment No. Two will promote and further the Board-approved Strategic Plan Goal III.3, Realize Tomorrow's Government Today by pursuing operational effectiveness, fiscal responsibility, and accountability. The proposed Amendment No. Two will also promote Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability Our Daily Reality, by utilizing collaborative efforts and partnership to support the Board's Green Building/Sustainable Design policy by using high efficiency irrigation systems.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The annual costs of weather data service for the 323 irrigation controllers, resulting from Amendment No. Two, will increase the annual Contract amounts from \$62,370 to \$73,939, an increase of \$11,569. The increase results from both rate increases and installation of additional irrigation controllers. Upon Board approval, the Department will have the ability to increase the annual contract amount by 10 percent or approximately \$7,400.

OPERATING BUDGET IMPACT

Sufficient funds are appropriated in the Department's Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Operating Budget for the annual cost increase of \$11,569.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Amendment No. Two contains the County's standard provisions, including consideration of hiring Gain/Grow participants, the Jury Service Program, the Defaulted Property Tax Reduction Program, Safely Surrendered Baby Law, Zero Tolerance Policy on Human Trafficking, Fair Chance Employment Practices, the County Policy of Equity, Counterparts and Electronic Signatures and Representations, Direct Deposit or Electronic Funds Transfers, and updated Indemnification and Insurance provisions.

The CEO's Risk Management Office has approved the insurance coverage, indemnification and liability provisions included in the Contract.

County Counsel has approved Amendment No. Two to Contract No. 10320 as to form.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The recommended actions are not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because they are activities that are excluded from the definition of a project by Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code and Section 15378(b)(2) of the State CEQA Guidelines. The proposed action to extend the subscription services for weather-based irrigation controllers on a month-to-month basis, not to exceed 12 months, is an administrative activity of government which will not result in direct or indirect physical changes to the environment.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

On June 15, 2010, the Board delegated authority to the Director to execute a sole source Subscription Services Contract with HydroPoint for the provision of wireless communication via internet for 137 weather based smart irrigation controllers for an initial term of ten years, with one three-year optional renewal period that was exercised by the Director.

On July 17, 2012, the Board delegated authority to the Director to execute Amendment No. 1 to the Contract to increase subscription services for 114 additional smart irrigation controllers and delegated authority to the Director to increase the annual contract amount up to 25 percent of the current amount.

From August 1, 2012, through present, subscription services were increased to add 57 smart irrigation controllers through multiple Change Notices executed by the Director, thus increasing DPR's total inventory of irrigation smart controllers to 308.

The Director sent the Board a Notice of Intention to Negotiate a Sole Source Extension with HydroPoint Systems, Inc., to notify the Board that the Department intends to enter into negotiations for a sole source extension agreement with HydroPoint.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the actions will further enhance the County's goal for efficient irrigation water management at its parks. There are no anticipated impacts to the current public services and/or projects associated with the proposed action.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, on June 15, 2010, the Board of Supervisors (Board) authorized the Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation (Director) to execute a subscription service contract HydroPoint Data Systems, Inc. (Contractor) for an initial term of ten (10) years, plus one three-year extension option; and

WHEREAS, on June 24, 2010, the Director executed Contract Number 10320 (Contract) with Contractor for the provision of weather satellite subscription services at various County facilities; and

WHEREAS, on July 12, 2012, the Board authorized the Director to execute Amendment Number One to the Contract to add additional weather-based irrigation smart controllers increasing the subscription services and contract amount; and

WHEREAS, on August 1, 2012, the Director executed Amendment Number One to the Contract to increase subscription services for additional smart controllers and to increase the contract sum; and

WHEREAS, on June 30, 2020, the Director exercised the three-year extension option, extending the term to expire on June 30, 2023; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 9.0, Change Notices and Amendments to the Contract, of the Contract, an amendment to the Contract shall be prepared and executed by the Director and County to add or change certain terms and conditions of the Contract; and

WHEREAS, the County and Contractor agree to further extend the term of Contract on a month-to-month basis, not to exceed 12 months; and

WHEREAS, the County and Contractor agree to expand the subscription services to include 15 additional smart controllers and revise, the subscription rates, resulting in the increase of the annual Contract amount from \$62,370 to \$73,939; and

WHEREAS, the County reserves the right to amend other terms and conditions in the Contract as they become necessary; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants and conditions set forth herein, the County and Contractor agree that the Contract between them shall be amended, as follows:

1.0 SUBSCRIPTION FEES AND GENERAL INFORMATION

All controllers purchased, installed, and activated at county parks will incrementally add to the cumulative volume of active subscriptions. This Amendment No. 2 will add 15 smart controllers to the current total of 308 smart controllers for a total amount of 323 smart controllers. Once the volume of controllers (or units) exceeds the threshold amount of 250, the subscription rate from that point on through the end of the month-to-month extension shall be 10% less than List Pricing annually per controller or unit. (See below). No discounts shall be given in arrears for months already serviced.

3.0 EXHIBIT A

Exhibit A of the Contract is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the new Exhibit A attached to this Amendment No. 2.

4.0 TERM OF THE CONTRACT

Refer to Section 5.0, Term of the Contract. Add the following subsection:

"5.5 At the option of the County, the Contract term may be further extended on a month-to-month basis, not to exceed 12 months. Said extension may be exercised at the sole discretion of the Director, by providing written notice to HydroPoint prior to the expiration of the option term identified in Section 5.3 above."

4.0 CONTRACT SUM/CONSIDERATION

Refer to Section 6.0, Contract Sum/Consideration. Add the following subsection:

****6.8 Default Method of Payment: Direct Deposit or Electronic Funds Transfer**

- 6.8.1 The County, at its sole discretion, has determined that the most efficient and secure default form of payment for goods and/or services provided under an agreement/ contract with the County shall be Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) or direct deposit, unless an alternative method of payment is deemed appropriate by the Auditor-Controller (A-C).
- 6.8.2 The Contractor shall submit a direct deposit authorization request via the website https://directdeposit.lacounty.gov with banking and vendor information, and any other information that the A-C determines is reasonably necessary to process the payment and comply with all accounting, record keeping, and tax reporting requirements.
- 6.8.3 Any provision of law, grant, or funding agreement requiring a specific form or method of payment other than EFT or direct deposit shall supersede this requirement with respect to those payments.
- 6.8.4 At any time during the duration of the agreement/contract, a Contractor may submit a written request for an exemption to this requirement. Such request must be based on specific legal, business or operational needs and explain why the payment method designated by the A-C is not feasible and an alternative is necessary. The A-C, in consultation with the contracting department(s), shall decide whether to approve exemption requests."

5.0 FACSIMILE REPRESENTATION

Refer to Section 11.5, Facsimile Representation. Delete in its entirety and replace with the following:

"11.5 Counterparts and Electronic Signatures and Representations

This Contract may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original but all of which together shall constitute one and the same Contract. The facsimile, email or electronic signature of the Parties shall be deemed to constitute original signatures, and facsimile or electronic copies hereof shall be deemed to constitute duplicate originals.

The County and the Contractor hereby agree to regard electronic representations of original signatures of authorized officers of each party, when appearing in appropriate places on the Amendments prepared pursuant to Paragraph 8.1 (Amendments and Change Notices) and received via communications facilities (facsimile, email or electronic signature), as legally sufficient evidence that such legally binding signatures have been affixed to Amendments to this Contract."

6.0 INDEMNIFICATION

Refer to Section 11.7 Indemnification. Delete in its entirety and replace with the following:

"11.7 Indemnification

The Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the County, its Special Districts, elected and appointed officers, employees, agents and volunteers ("County Indemnitees") from and against any and all liability, including but not limited to demands, claims, actions, fees, costs, and expenses (including attorney and expert witness fees), arising from and/or relating to this Contract, except for such loss or damage arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the County Indemnitees."

7.0 GENERAL PROVISION FOR ALL INSURANCE COVERAGE

Refer to Section 11.9, Insurance Requirements, General Provisions. Delete in its entirety and replace with the following:

"11.9 General Provisions for all Insurance Coverage

11.9.1 Without limiting Contractor's indemnification of County, and in the performance of this Contract and until all of its obligations pursuant to this Contract have been met, Contractor must provide and maintain at its own expense insurance coverage satisfying the requirements specified in Paragraphs 11.9 and 11.10 of this Contract. These minimum insurance coverage terms, types and limits (the "Required Insurance") also are in addition to and separate from any other contractual obligation imposed upon Contractor pursuant to this Contract. The County in no way warrants that the Required Insurance is sufficient to protect the Contractor for liabilities which may arise from or relate to this Contract.

11.9.2 Evidence of Coverage and Notice to County

11.9.2.1 Certificate(s) of insurance coverage (Certificate) satisfactory to County, and a copy of an Additional Insured endorsement confirming County and its Agents (defined below) has been given Insured status under the Contractor's General Liability policy, must be delivered to County at the address shown below and provided prior to commencing services under this Contract.

- 11.9.2.2 Renewal Certificates must be provided to County not less than ten (10) days prior to contractor's policy expiration dates. The County reserves the right to obtain complete, certified copies of any required contractor and/or subcontractor insurance policies at any time.
- 11.9.2.3 Certificates must identify all Required Insurance coverage types and limits specified herein, reference this Contract by name or number, and be signed by an authorized representative of the insurer(s). The Insured party named on the Certificate must match the name of the contractor identified as the contracting party in this Contract. Certificates must provide the full name of each insurer providing coverage, its NAIC (National Association of Insurance Commissioners) identification number, its financial rating, the amounts of any policy deductibles or self-insured retentions exceeding fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), and list any County required endorsement forms.
- 11.9.2.4 Neither the County's failure to obtain, nor the County's receipt of, or failure to object to a non-complying insurance certificate or endorsement, or any other insurance documentation or information provided by the contractor, its insurance broker(s) and/or insurer(s), will be construed as a waiver of any of the Required Insurance provisions.
- 11.9.2.5 Certificates and copies of any required endorsements must be sent to:

11.9.2.6 Contractor also must promptly report to County any injury or property damage accident or incident, including any injury to a contractor employee occurring on County property, and any loss, disappearance, destruction, misuse, or theft of County property, monies or securities entrusted to contractor. Contractor also must promptly notify County of any third-party claim or suit filed against contractor or any of its subcontractors which arises from or relates to this Contract and could result in the filing of a claim or lawsuit against contractor and/or County.

11.9.3 Additional Insured Status and Scope of Coverage

The County of Los Angeles, it's Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, employees and volunteers (collectively County Indemnitees) must be provided additional insured status under contractor's General Liability policy with respect to liability arising out of contractor's ongoing and completed operations performed on behalf of the County. County and its Agents additional insured status must apply with respect to liability and defense of suits arising out of the contractor's acts or omissions, whether such liability is attributable to the contractor or to the County. The full policy limits and scope of protection also must apply to the County and its Agents as an additional insured, even if they exceed the County's minimum Required Insurance specifications herein. Use of an automatic additional insured endorsement form is acceptable providing it satisfies the Required Insurance provisions herein.

11.9.4 Cancellation of or Changes in Insurance

Contractor must provide County with, or contractor's insurance policies must contain a provision that County will receive, written notice of cancellation or any change in Required Insurance, including insurer, limits of coverage, term of coverage or policy period. The written notice must be provided to County at least ten (10) days in advance of cancellation for non-payment of premium and thirty (30) days in advance for any other cancellation or policy change. Failure to provide written notice of cancellation or any change in Required Insurance may constitute a material breach of the Contract, in the sole discretion of the County, upon which the County may suspend or terminate this Contract.

11.9.5 Failure to Maintain Insurance

Contractor's failure to maintain or to provide acceptable evidence that it maintains the Required Insurance will constitute a material breach of the Contract, upon which County immediately may withhold payments due to contractor, and/or suspend or terminate this Contract. County, at its sole discretion, may obtain damages from contractor resulting from said breach. Alternatively, the County may purchase the Required Insurance, and without further notice to contractor, deduct the premium cost from sums due to contractor or pursue contractor reimbursement.

11.9.6 Insurer Financial Ratings

Coverage must be placed with insurers acceptable to the County with A.M. Best ratings of not less than A:VII unless otherwise approved by County.

11.9.7 Contractor's Insurance Must Be Primary

Contractor's insurance policies, with respect to any claims related to this Contract, must be primary with respect to all other sources of coverage available to contractor. Any County maintained insurance or self-insurance coverage must be in excess of and not contribute to any contractor coverage.

11.9.8 Waivers of Subrogation

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the contractor hereby waives its rights and its insurer(s)' rights of recovery against County under all the Required Insurance for any loss arising from or relating to this Contract. The contractor must require its insurers to execute any waiver of subrogation endorsements which may be necessary to effect such waiver.

11.9.9 Subcontractor Insurance Coverage Requirements

Contractor must include all subcontractors as insureds under contractor's own policies or must provide County with each subcontractor's separate evidence of insurance coverage. Contractor will be responsible for verifying each subcontractor complies with the Required Insurance provisions herein and must require that each subcontractor name the County and contractor as additional insureds on the subcontractor's General Liability policy. Contractor must obtain County's prior review and approval of any subcontractor request for modification of the Required Insurance.

11.9.10 Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions (SIRs)

Contractor's policies will not obligate the County to pay any portion of any contractor deductible or SIR. The County retains the right to require contractor to reduce or eliminate policy deductibles and SIRs as respects the County, or to provide a bond guaranteeing contractor's payment of all deductibles and SIRs, including all related claims investigation, administration and defense expenses. Such bond must be executed by a corporate surety licensed to transact business in the State of California.

11.9.11 Claims Made Coverage

If any part of the Required Insurance is written on a claims made basis, any policy retroactive date will precede the effective date of this Contract. Contractor understands and agrees it will maintain such coverage for a period of not less than three (3) years following Contract expiration, termination or cancellation.

11.9.12 Application of Excess Liability Coverage

Contractors may use a combination of primary, and excess insurance policies which provide coverage as broad as ("follow form" over) the underlying primary policies, to satisfy the Required Insurance provisions.

11.9.13 Separation of Insureds

All liability policies must provide cross-liability coverage as would be afforded by the standard ISO (Insurance Services Office, Inc.) separation of insureds provision with no insured versus insured exclusions or limitations.

11.9.14 Alternative Risk Financing Programs

The County reserves the right to review, and then approve, Contractor use of self-insurance, risk retention groups, risk purchasing groups, pooling

arrangements and captive insurance to satisfy the Required Insurance provisions. The County and its Agents must be designated as an Additional Covered Party under any approved program.

11.9.15 County Review and Approval of Insurance Requirements

The County reserves the right to review and adjust the Required Insurance provisions, conditioned upon County's determination of changes in risk exposures."

8.0 INSURANCE COVERAGE

Refer to Section 11.10, Insurance Coverage Requirements. Delete in its entirety and replace with the following:

"11.10 Insurance Coverage Requirements

11.10.1 Commercial General Liability insurance (providing scope of coverage equivalent to ISO policy form CG 00 01), naming County and its Agents as an additional insured, with limits of not less than:

General Aggregate: \$2 million
Products/Completed Operations Aggregate: \$1 million
Personal and Advertising Injury: \$1 million
Each Occurrence: \$1 million

- **11.10.2 Automobile Liability** insurance (providing scope of coverage equivalent to ISO policy form CA 00 01) with limits of not less than \$1 million for bodily injury and property damage, in combined or equivalent split limits, for each single accident. Insurance must cover liability arising out of contractor's use of autos pursuant to this Contract, including owned, leased, hired, and/or non-owned autos, as each may be applicable.
- 11.10.3 Workers Compensation and Employers' insurance or qualified self- insurance satisfying statutory requirements, which includes Employers' Liability coverage with limits of not less than \$1 million per accident. If Contractor will provide leased employees, or, is an employee leasing or temporary staffing firm or a professional employer organization (PEO), coverage also must include an Alternate Employer Endorsement (providing scope of coverage equivalent to ISO policy form WC 00 03 01 A) naming the County as the Alternate Employer. The written notice must be provided to County at least ten (10) days in advance of cancellation for non-payment of premium and thirty (30) days in advance for any other cancellation or policy change. If applicable to Contractor's operations, coverage also must be arranged to satisfy the requirements of any federal workers or workmen's compensation law or any federal occupational disease law."

9.0 SAFELY SURRENDERED BABY LAW

9.1 Add Section 11.22, Contractor's Acknowledgement of County's Commitment to Safely Surrendered Baby Law.

"11.22 Contractor's Acknowledgement of County's Commitment to Safely Surrendered Baby Law

The Contractor acknowledges that the County places a high priority on the implementation of the Safely Surrendered Baby Law. The Contractor understands that it is the County's policy to encourage all County contractors to voluntarily post the County's "Safely Surrendered Baby Law" poster, in Exhibit F, in a prominent position at the Contractor's place of business. The Contractor will also encourage its subcontractors, if any, to post this poster in a prominent position in the subcontractor's place of business. Information and posters for printing are available at www.babysafela.org."

9.2 Add Section 11.23, Notice to Employees Regarding the Safely Surrendered Baby Law.

"11.23 Notice to Employees Regarding the Safely Surrendered Baby Law

The Contractor shall notify and provide to its employees and shall require each subcontractor to notify and provide to its employees, information regarding the Safely Surrendered Baby Law, its implementation in Los Angeles County, and where and how to safely surrender a baby. The information is set forth in Exhibit F, Safely Surrendered Baby Law of this Contract. Additional information is available at www.babysafela.org."

10.0 CONSIDERATION OF HIRING GAIN/GROW PARTICIPANTS

Add Section 11.24, Consideration of Hiring GAIN/GROW Participants.

"11.24 Consideration of Hiring GAIN/GROW Participants

- 11.24.1 Should the contractor require additional or replacement personnel after the effective date of this Contract, the contractor will give consideration for any such employment openings to participants in the County's Department of Public Social Services Greater Avenues for Independence (GAIN) Program or General Relief Opportunity for Work (GROW) Program who meet the contractor's minimum qualifications for the open position. For this purpose, consideration will mean that the contractor will interview qualified candidates. The County will refer GAIN-GROW participants by job category to the contractor. Contractors must iob openings all with iob requirements GAINGROW@DPSS.LACOUNTY.GOV and BSERVICES@WDACS.LACOUNTY.GOV and DPSS will refer qualified GAIN/GROW job candidates.
- 11.24.2 In the event that both laid-off County employees and GAIN/GROW participants are available for hiring, County employees must be given first priority."

11.0 COUNTY'S ZERO TOLERANCE HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Add Section 11.25, Compliance with County's Zero Tolerance Human Trafficking.

"11.25 Compliance with County's Zero Tolerance Policy on Human Trafficking

The Contractor acknowledges that the County has established a Zero Tolerance Policy on Human Trafficking prohibiting contractors from engaging in human trafficking.

If a Contractor or member of a Contractor's staff is convicted of a human trafficking offense, the County shall require that the Contractor or member of the Contractor's staff be removed immediately from performing services under the Contract. The County will not be under any obligation to disclose confidential information regarding the offenses other than those required by law.

Disqualification of any member of a Contractor's staff pursuant to this paragraph shall not relieve the Contractor of its obligation to complete all work in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract."

12.0 FAIR CHANCE EMPLOYMENT PRACTICES

Add Section 11.26, Compliance with Fair Chance Employment Practices.

"11.26 Compliance with Fair Chance Employment Practices

The Contractor shall comply with fair chance employment hiring practices set forth in California Government Code Section 12952, Employment Discrimination: Conviction History. The Contractor's violation of this paragraph of the Contract may constitute a material breach of the Contract. In the event of such material breach, the County may, in its sole discretion, terminate the Contract."

13.0 COUNTY POLICY OF EQUITY

Add Section 11.27, Compliance with the County Policy of Equity.

"11.27 Compliance with the County Policy of Equity

The Contractor acknowledges that the County takes its commitment to preserving the dignity and professionalism of the workplace very seriously, forth the County Policy of Equity in (CPOE) (https://ceop.lacounty.gov/). The Contractor further acknowledges that the County strives to provide a workplace free from discrimination, harassment, retaliation and inappropriate conduct based on a protected characteristic, and which may violate the CPOE. The Contractor, its employees and subcontractors acknowledge and certify receipt and understanding of the CPOE. Failure of the Contractor, its employees or its subcontractors to uphold the County's expectations of a workplace free from harassment and discrimination, including inappropriate conduct based on a protected characteristic, may subject the Contractor to termination of contractual agreements as well as civil liability."

14.0 CONTRACTOR INDEPENDENCE

Add Section 11.28, <u>Prohibition from Participation in Future Solicitation(s)</u>.

"11.28 Prohibition from Participation in Future Solicitation(s)

Neither the Contractor or its subsidiary or Subcontractor ("Contractor"), is prohibited from submitting a bid or proposal in a County solicitation if the Proposer/Contractor has provided advice or consultation for the solicitation. A Proposer/Contractor is also prohibited from submitting a bid or proposal in a County solicitation if the Proposer/Contractor has developed or prepared any of the solicitation materials on behalf of the County. A violation of this provision shall result in the disqualification of the Contractor/Proposer from participation in the County solicitation or the termination or cancellation of any resultant County contract. This provision shall survive the expiration, or other termination of this Agreement."

15.0 PRIORITY OF AMENDMENTS

In the event of any conflict or inconsistency in the definition or interpretation of Amendment No. 2, such conflict or inconsistency shall be resolved by giving precedence to Amendment No. 2, then to Amendment No. 1, and then the Contract.

16.0 RATIFICATION

All other terms, conditions, covenants and promises of the Contract not affected by this Amendment No. 2 shall remain in full force and effect and are hereby reaffirmed.

17.0 EFFECTIVE DATE

The effective date of this Amendment No. 2 shall be the date, month, and year first written above.

AMENDMENT TO WATER PRODUCTION AGREEMENT TO DISCHARGE TREATED WATER INTO WHITTIER NARROWS RECREATION AREA'S LEGG LAKES (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 1) (3-VOTES)

SUBJECT

Approval of the recommended actions will delegate authority to the Director of the County of Los Angeles' Department of Parks and Recreation, or her designee, to execute an amendment to an agreement with the California Department of Toxic Substances Control and the Main San Gabriel Basin Watermaster, in order to extend the existing agreement for a period not to exceed 12 months and limit the water discharge volume into the Whittier Narrows Recreation Area's Legg Lakes to the amount necessary to maintain water levels appropriate for recreational purposes.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Find that the proposed approval of the agreement is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board Letter and in the record of the agreement.

2. Delegate authority to the Director of the County of Los Angeles' Department of Parks and Recreation, or her designee, to execute an amendment to an agreement with the California Department of Toxic Substances Control and the Main San Gabriel Basin Watermaster, upon approval as to form by County Counsel, for (a) extension for an additional six months and six additional month-to-month options, for a maximum extension period not to exceed 12 months, for the sole purpose of negotiating a new long-term agreement, and (b) changes to terms as necessary to limit the water discharge volume to the amount necessary to maintain water levels appropriate for recreational purposes, which is estimated to be approximately 1,300 acre-feet annually.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Whitter Narrows Recreation Area is located at 750 S. Santa Anita Avenue, South El Monte, CA 91733. The three lakes at this park facility, which are collectively called Legg Lakes, utilize water discharged from the Whittier Narrows Operational Unit (WNOU), in order to maintain the appropriate water level for recreational purposes. The WNOU is a state-of-the-art ground water contamination treatment facility, which extracts and cleans contaminants from ground water. The California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) operates the WNOU for the purposes of treating groundwater.

The County of Los Angeles (County) Department of Parks and Recreation (Department) is part of a three-party agreement with the Main San Gabriel Basin Watermaster (Watermaster) and DTSC for the discharge of treated water into Legg Lakes, which is currently scheduled to expire on June 30, 2023. Legg Lakes requires approximately 1,300 acre feet annually to maintain water levels. The existing agreement allows DTSC to pump treated water in excess of 1,300 acre feet into the Legg Lakes and also exempts the Department from all Watermaster assessments above 1,300 acre feet. DTSC needs to deposit the excess water in Legg Lakes in order to continue operation of the WNOU. However, effective July 1, 2023, the Watermaster assessment exemption will be eliminated, after that time the Department will be financially responsible for the excess water generated by the WNOU. The lapse of the exemption may result in a financial burden to the Department's Operating Budget.

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisor's (Board) approval of the recommended actions will allow the Department to extend the current agreement for water discharge at Legg Lakes to provide sufficient time for the Department to negotiate a new long-term agreement for the continuation of water discharge at Legg Lakes.

The Department will return to the Board for the approval of a new long-term agreement.

IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIC PLAN GOALS

The recommended Amendment will further the County's Strategic Plan of Fostering Vibrant and Resilient Communities (Goal II) by Making Environmental Sustainability Our Daily Reality (Strategy II.3) by Improving Water Quality, Reducing Water Consumption, and Increasing Water Supplies (Objective II.3.1).

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

OPERATING BUDGET IMPACT

Based on the recommended actions, the Department does not anticipate any additional costs in the Department's Operating Budget.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The Board is authorized by the provision of Government Code Section 31000 to contract for special services that are consistent with public park and recreation purposes within Whittier Narrows and pursuant to the provisions of the Department of the Army Corps of Engineers Lease for Park and Recreational Purposes Whittier Narrows Flood Control Basin No. DAC W09-1-86-43 granted to the County by the Secretary of the Army under authority of the Flood Control Act of 1944, Section 4, as amended. The proposed agreement is consistent with said purposes.

On March 10, 2009, the Board approved a long-term agreement with the Watermaster and EPA to continue the discharge of treated water into Legg Lakes. As required by the State of California, the DTSC took full responsibility of the WNOU after a ten-year period. In May 2013, the EPA transferred the operation and function of the WNOU to the DTSC.

On June 18, 2013, the Board approved a ten-year agreement with the Watermaster and DTSC to continue to discharge water into Legg Lakes from the WNOU, which is set to expire on June 30, 2023. The agreement may be extended by mutual agreement by all parties and with the Board's approval. The agreement, inasmuch as it pertains to the production of groundwater from the Main San Gabriel Basin, must be consistent with the Judgment in the Main San Gabriel Basin Groundwater Adjudication and the Main San Gabriel Basin Watermaster Rules and Regulations.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed amendment is for the purchase and utilization of recycled water at Whittier Narrows Recreation Area is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in that the actions do not meet the definition of a project according to Section 15378 (b)(5) of the State CEQA Guidelines, because the actions are administrative activities which by their terms do not involve any commitments to any specific projects which may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

There are no impacts on other current services or projects associated with the proposed action.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD ACTING AS THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY WATERWORKS DISTRICT NO. 29, MALIBU:

- 1. Find that the proposed project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Approve the project and delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to use Public Works forces to perform maintenance and repairs to private roads on Murphy Way (previously DeButts Terrace) and Winding Way at a total cost not to exceed \$635,000 to ensure Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29's, Malibu access to water infrastructure is to an acceptable condition.
- 3. Approve the dedication of an easement for public road and highway purposes to the City of Malibu.
- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute the necessary documents to dedicate an easement for public road and highway purposes to the City of Malibu.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to use Public Works forces to perform maintenance and repairs to private roads on Murphy Way and Winding Way, and dedicate an easement for public road and highway purposes to the City of Malibu over the areas shown in the map (Enclosure A).

Between 1986 and 1988, the County of Los Angeles acquired various easements to construct a water system, paved roadways, and appurtenant drainage structures and retaining walls necessary to provide access to operate and maintain a water system, as well as a public hiking and equestrian trail adjacent to portions of the paved roadway in connection with County Improvement (CI) No. 2503-M project. The easements also included the County's right to dedicate an easement for public road and highway purposes.

On July 3, 1990, Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29, Malibu and the County entered into an agreement (Enclosure B) that (among other things) transferred maintenance and responsibility, from the County to the District for improvements constructed under CI No. 2503-M.

The 1990 Agreement provides that upon conveyance of said right, title, and interest from County to District; the District would assume maintenance responsibility for the described easements and improvements constructed thereon under CI No. 2503-M, except for the public hiking and equestrian trails. The responsibility includes maintaining the involved private roads.

The 1990 Agreement further provides that upon the County's dedication of an easement for public road and highway purposes over any of the parcels delineated within Exhibit A, Table 1 of said Agreement, the District's maintenance responsibility shall be limited to the water system and its appurtenant structures.

Public Works forces, on behalf of the District, will perform maintenance and repairs to private roads on Murphy Way and Winding Way at a total cost not to exceed \$635,000. Proposed maintenance and repair work consists of milling the existing surface and overlaying 2 inches of asphalt on Winding Way from Pacific Coast Highway to the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority Property, West Winding Way from 27856 West Winding Way east to Murphy Way, and Murphy Way to the driveway for the District's tank to ensure the District's access to water infrastructure is to an acceptable condition. Public Works will also dedicate an easement for public road and highway purposes as contemplated by the 1990 Agreement, limiting the District's future maintenance responsibility to just the water system and its appurtenant structures and not the roadway.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3 Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability and Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets by maintaining the District's access to water infrastructure to an acceptable condition and by having jointly held maintenance responsibility for the private roads with other property owners.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The costs and fees for maintenance and repair work, along with dedicating an easement for public road and highway purposes to the City of Malibu, are available in the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29, Malibu, General Fund (N32 – Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2023-24 Budget.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Pursuant to Public Contract Code Section 20606, the Board can authorize an improvement without a contractor, purchase materials and supplies, and employ the labor necessary for the purpose. As of January 2023, the Board finds that any item of work estimated to cost less than \$148,298.66 per installation may be performed by District forces without letting contracts go to the lowest bidder if the District Engineer determines the work can be done more economically by District forces. The Board's approval for the use of Public Works forces on behalf of the District is required as the recommended project is estimated to exceed \$148,298.66.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed project is exempt from CEQA. The project, to perform maintenance and repairs to private roads on Murphy Way and Winding Way and to dedicate an easement for public road and highway purposes to the City of Malibu over the areas shown in the enclosed map, is within a class of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and that meet the criteria set forth in Sections 15301 (c) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Class 1 (x) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. In addition,

based on the proposed project records, it will comply with all applicable regulations, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

There will be no impact on current County services or projects. When the project is completed and dedication processed, it will maintain the District's access to water infrastructure in an acceptable condition and have jointly hold maintenance responsibility for the private roads with other property owners.

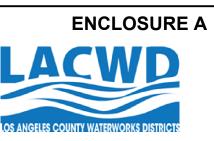

AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between the LOS ANGELES COUNTY WATERWORKS DISTRICT NO. 29, hereinafter referred to as "DISTRICT", and the COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, a political subdivision of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY":

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, COUNTY has heretofore established an assessment district under the Municipal Improvement Act of 1913 (Division 12 of the Streets and Highways Code) for the acquisition of rights of way and the construction of a water system in De Butts Terrace and Winding Way in the Malibu area of Los Angeles County. This project has been designated County Improvement (CI) No. 2503-M;

WHEREAS, the District is a public agency empowered to operate and maintain waterworks improvements in the vicinity of CI 2503-M;

WHEREAS, the improvements constructed included paved roadways and appurtenant drainage structures and retaining walls necessary to provide access to operate and maintain the water system;

WHEREAS, a public hiking and equestrian trail was also constructed adjacent to portions of the paved roadway;

WHEREAS, it is the desire of both COUNTY and DISTRICT to establish by this agreement their respective rights and obligations with regard to the design, title to, maintenance of and liability relating to the easements for water pipelines and appurtenances, public hiking and equestrian trails, paved roadways, drainage structures required in conjunction with said roadway, slopes required in conjunction with said roadway, over those parcels listed within Exhibit "A" on Table 1 attached hereto.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual benefits to be derived by both DISTRICT and COUNTY and of the premises herein contained, it is hereby agreed as follows:

- 1. That all right, title and interest in the parcels listed within Exhibit "A", Table 1, acquired by COUNTY under CI No. 2503-M for water pipelines and appurtenances, ingress and egress, drainage structures required in conjunction with said roadway; and slopes required in conjunction with said roadway; including all improvements constructed on said easements by COUNTY under CI No. 2503-M shall be conveyed to and vest in DISTRICT upon the completion of all improvements authorized under CI No. 2503-M and acceptance of said improvements by COUNTY; provided, however, that the right to dedicate an easement for public road and highway purposes and the easements for the public hiking and equestrian trail shall not be conveyed to DISTRICT by COUNTY.
- 2. That the DISTRICT shall not be responsible for maintenance of the public hiking and equestrian trails constructed under CI No. 2503-M.
- 3. DISTRICT agrees that upon conveyance of said right, title and interest described in paragraph 1 above, it will assume full maintenance responsibility for the above-described easements as delineated within Exhibit "A" on Table 1 and for all improvements constructed on said easements under CI No. 2503-M, except for the public hiking and equestrian trail. Upon dedication of an easement for public road and highway purposes over any of the parcels delineated within Exhibit "A", Table 1, DISTRICT's maintenance responsibility shall be limited to the water system and its appurtenant structures.
- 4. DISTRICT agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless County, its governing board, officers, employees, engineers, contractors and agents against any and all liability, claims and expense (including defense costs and legal fees), of any nature whatsoever, arising from or in any way related to the construction, reconstruction, maintenance and operation of improvements, and the condition of

the property, within the area covered by CI No. 2503-M (DeButts Terrace) including liability and/or expense for Worker's Compensation claims or suits. Without limiting in any way the scope of the above provision, this indemnification, hold harmless agreement and promise to defend shall specifically include: any action or claim for injury to, loss to, or death of any person and any damage to or destruction of real and personal property and improvements within the area covered by CI No. 2503-M, at any time, arising from or related to (whether directly or indirectly, solely or in concert with another) (a) any act, activity or omission of DISTRICT or of anyone holding under or acting pursuant to the authority of DISTRICT, or (b) the ownership, occupancy, possession or use of the improvements constructed, purchased or maintained under CI No. 2503-M, or any part thereof, by or under DISTRICT, or (c) the state or condition of such improvements or any part thereof, and property appurtenant thereto, or (d) the active as well as passive negligence or omission of County, its governing body, officers, employees, engineers, contractors and agents.

DISTRICT agrees to provide primary Commercial General liability insurance during the term of this agreement in an amount of not less than \$5,000,000 per occurrence/aggregate and Work's Compensation insurance in an amount and form to meet all applicable requirements of the Labor Code of the State of California.

5. That the construction of the water system proposed herein was financed by special assessments and DISTRICT further agrees to enter into no main extension refund agreement with any developer affecting any property within the boundaries of CI No. 2503-M, pursuant to Section 10110 of the aforementioned Act.

Table 1 provides a list indicating the rights granted to the County of Los Angeles by the various grantors to allow construction of a water system together with a road and appurtenant structures needed to adequately maintain the water system. The rights granted can be separated into three categories as follows:

Category 1

Easement for water pipelines and appurtenances, public utility purposes, public hiking and equestrian trail, ingress and egress for purposes of constructing, maintaining and operating a public water system, including reservoir, water pipelines and appurtenances, and for the purpose of restoring the private rights of ingress and egress to DeButts Terrace and/or Winding Way, and for the right to dedicate an easement for public road and highway purposes.

Also together with the right to enter upon and to pass and repass over and along said easements and rights of way and to deposit tools, implements and other materials thereon and to construct, operate and maintain such improvements as may be necessary for the enjoyment of said easement rights by the County of Los Angeles, its officers, agents and employees, and assigns, and by any contractor, its agents and employees engaged by said County or assigns, whenever and wherever necessary, for the purposes above set forth, and with any and all appurtenant rights associated with said easements.

Also together with the right to transfer all or part of said real property, including easements and rights, to others; it being the grantor's intention that the easements herein conveyed shall be non-exclusive, and grantee shall have the right to transfer said easements, in whole or in part, to one party or to several, both in gross and as appurtenant to parcels of land then owned by the transferees.

Category 2

Easement for water pipelines and appurtenances, public utility purposes, public hiking and equestrian trail, ingress and egress for purposes of constructing, maintaining and operating a public water system, including reservoir, water pipelines and appurtenances.

Also together with the right to enter upon and to pass and repass over and along said easements and rights of way and to deposit tools, implements and other materials thereon and to construct, operate and maintain such improvements as may be necessary for the enjoyment of said easement rights by the County of Los Angeles, its officers, agents and employees, and assign, and by any contractor, its agents and employees engaged by said County or assigns, whenever and wherever necessary, for the purposes above set forth, and with any and all appurtenant rights associated with said easements.

Also together with the right to transfer all or part of said real property, including easements and rights, to others; it being the grantor's intention that the easements herein conveyed shall be non-exclusive, and grantee shall have the right to transfer said easements, in whole or in part, to one party or to several, both in gross and as appurtenant to parcels of land then owned by the transferees.

Category 3

Deed to real property granted to the County of Los Angeles in fee simple.

In addition, in some cases, additional rights were granted for slope and fills, drainage structures, grading, emergency use in case of overflow, etc.

Public Works is seeking Board approval to authorize and direct the collection of annual assessments for 11 drainage benefit assessment areas in the unincorporated County community of Quartz Hill for Fiscal Year 2023-24. IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find the adoption of the resolutions exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and will provide for the continuation of the annual assessments for Drainage Benefit Assessment Area (DBAA) Nos. 5, 8, 9, 13, 15, 17, 22, 23, 25, 26, and 28 located in the Quartz Hill area to finance drainage and flood control services to be performed in the respective DBAAs during Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24.

The enclosed Engineer's Report dated March 2023 (Appendix A) for each DBAA describes more specifically the respective services proposed to be financed through the revenue derived from the annual assessments. The enclosed resolutions (Appendix B) authorize and direct the collection of the annual assessments for FY 2023-24 for DBAA Nos. 5, 8, 9, 13, 15, 17, 22, 23, 25, 26, and 28 to finance the maintenance and operation of drainage facilities constructed and dedicated to the County in connection with various residential subdivision tracts. The annual assessment for each DBAA has not changed from the prior year and ranges from \$40.58 to \$340.91 per benefit unit depending on the DBAA.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. These actions will provide sufficient funds to continue maintaining the drainage systems in a safe and effective operating condition, thereby improving the quality of life in the County.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The total amount of the annual assessments proposed to be collected to finance the maintenance, operation, and improvement of drainage facilities constructed for the 11 DBAAs is \$86,176.37. Sufficient appropriation is included in each of the DBAA funds (Fund P06, P09, P10, P89, P96, P0B, P0C, P0D, P0F, P0G, and P0J Revenue Source 9110) FY 2023-24 budgets.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The drainage facilities in each DBAA were constructed and dedicated to the County as required by conditions imposed through the land subdivision review and approval process and provide special benefits to the properties within the proposed assessment areas.

DBAA Nos. 5, 8, 9, 13, 15, 17, 22, 23, 25, 26, and 28, located in the unincorporated County community of Quartz Hill, were formed on February 12, 1985; May 12, 1987; May 19, 1986; November 21, 1986; January 28, 1988; March 30, 1989; February 14, 1989; June 22, 1989; February 15, 1990; September 27, 1990; and January 17, 1991, respectively. The annual assessments for these DBAAs were previously determined and levied by the Board pursuant to the Benefit Assessment Act of 1982. The assessment amounts for these DBAAs have not increased since their respective formations.

Pursuant to California Constitution Article 13D, Section 5(a), and Government Code Section 53753.5 the levy of the annual assessments for the upcoming fiscal year is exempt from the requirement of a public hearing and the other procedures of Proposition 218 as no increase in any of the assessments is being proposed.

The resolutions in Appendix B have been approved as to form by County Counsel.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

This proposed project is exempt from the provisions of CEQA. Adoption of the resolutions directing the collection of annual assessments is for the purpose of meeting operating expenses and is statutorily exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 21080(b)(8) of the California Public Resources Code and Section 15273(a) of the State CEQA Guidelines.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

The annual assessments constitute an essential source of revenue for the continued maintenance and operation of drainage facilities required for the protection of area residences and businesses.

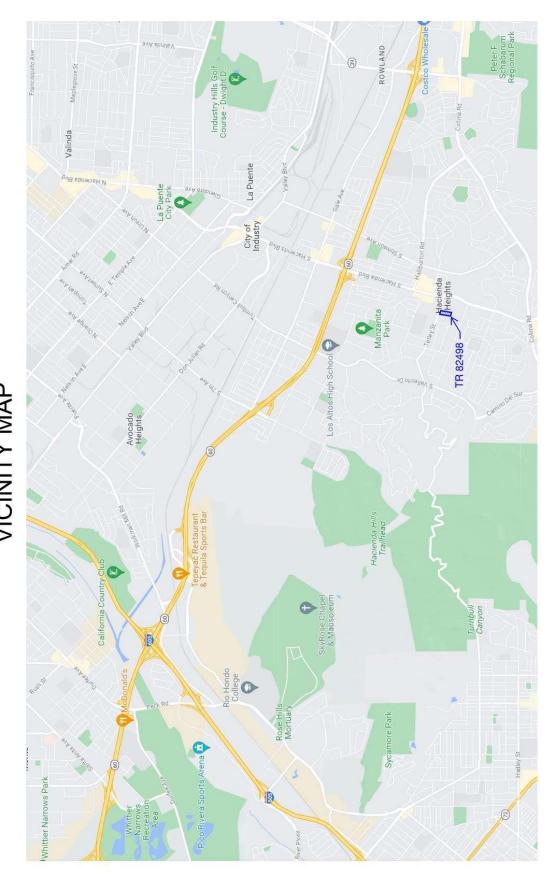

- 3. Approve the final map for Tract 82498.
- 4. Accept grants and dedications as indicated on the final map for Tract 82498.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to approve the final map for Tract 82498 (enclosed). The proposed final map consists of 2.20 acres and will create one multi-family lot with 33 attached residential condominium units in 11 buildings.

The Board approved a vesting tentative tract map for this subdivision on July 12, 2022. The subdivider has complied with all requirements imposed as a condition of the approval of the tentative map, and the final map is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map.

Pursuant to the State Subdivision Map Act, a local agency must approve a final map if the subdivider has complied with all applicable requirements of State and local law and the legislative body finds that the final map is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map.

The grants and dedications, as indicated on the final map, are necessary for construction and maintenance of public infrastructure required by the County for this development.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended action allows the County to record the final map, which will maximize property tax revenue.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no adverse impact to the County General Fund. The 33 residential condominium units created by the recordation of this final map will generate additional property tax revenue that is shared by all taxing entities.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The approval of the final map is subject to provisions of the State Subdivision Map Act [Government Code, Sections 66410, et seq.; 66458(a); 66473; 66474.1; 66436(a)(3)(A)(i); and 66427.1(A)], which states that a legislative body shall not deny approval of a final map if it has previously approved a tentative map for the proposed subdivision and finds that the final map is in substantial conformance with the previously approved tentative map.

The final map has been reviewed by Public Works for mathematical accuracy, survey analysis, title information, and for compliance with local ordinances and the State Subdivision Map Act. Public Works' review indicates that the subdivision is substantially the same as it appears on the approved tentative map, that all State and local provisions and legal requirements have been met on this final map, and that the final map is technically correct.

All agreements and improvement securities, which were required as a condition of the approval of the final map, have been accepted on behalf of the County by the appropriate official.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

On July 12, 2022, the Board certified and adopted the Mitigated Negative Declaration for Vesting Tentative Tract Map 82498, which was completed in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the State and County CEQA guidelines, and found no substantial evidence that the project will have a significant effect on the environment.

The proposed actions to approve the final subdivision map are ministerial actions and are thereby exempt from CEQA by Section 15268(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines and 21080(b)(1) of the Public Resources Code.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

There will be no negative impact on current County services or projects as a result of approving the final map for Tract 82498.

ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES CORE SERVICE AREA ANNEXATION AND LEVYING OF SEWER SERVICE CHARGES TO THE CONSOLIDATED SEWER MAINTENANCE DISTRICT OF FIVE PARCELS WITHIN UNINCORPORATED TERRITORIES OF VAL VERDE AND THE CITIES OF AZUSA AND SANTA CLARITA (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS 1 AND 5) (3 VOTES)

SUBJECT

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the annexation of new territories into the Los Angeles County Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District and levying of sewer service charges on parcels within the annexed territories.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed annexation of five parcels, Parcel Nos. 1-21, 3-20, 3-21, 4-21, and 201-22 into the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District and levying of sewer service charges are to meet operational expenses to maintain service within the proposed annexation areas and are statutorily exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.
- 2. Adopt the Resolution of Intention to set a public hearing regarding the proposed annexation of five parcels into the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District and the levying of sewer service charges within the annexed parcels.
- 3. In accordance with Health and Safety Code, Sections 4898 and 4899, instruct the Director of Public Works or his designee to post notices of the hearing in at least three conspicuous places in the territory proposed to be annexed and in at least three conspicuous places in the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District. The notices shall contain a description of the territory proposed to be annexed:

the date, time, and location of the hearing; and shall be posted not less than 10 days prior to the date set for the hearing.

- 4. In accordance with Health and Safety Code, Section 4899, instruct the Executive Officer of the Board to publish the notices once a week for two consecutive weeks in both English and Spanish newspapers.
- 5. In accordance with Article XIIID, Section 6, of the California Constitution, instruct the Director of Public Works or his designee to notify the owners of record of all identified parcels of real property proposed to be annexed by United States mail of the amount of the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District's sewer service charge to be levied upon each property; the basis for calculating the sewer service charge; the reason for the sewer service charge; and the date, time, and location of the hearing not less than 45 days prior to the date set for public hearing.

AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING, IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Determine whether a majority written protest exists against the proposed imposition of sewer service charges on the properties to be annexed.
- 2. If a majority written protest does not exist:
 - a. Find that the parcels proposed to be annexed will benefit from sewers maintained by Public Works and commencing in Fiscal Year 2024-25, authorize the boundaries of the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District be altered to include such benefited parcels, and order levying of sewer service charges within the annexed parcels.
 - b. Adopt the Property Tax Transfer Resolution approving and accepting negotiations that there will be no exchange of property tax revenues from annexation of the five parcels.
 - c. Instruct the Director of Public Works or his designee to file the statement of boundary change with the State Board of Equalization and the County of Los Angeles Assessor.
- 3. If a majority written protest does exist, make a finding terminating the proposed annexation and levying of sewer service charge proceedings and refer the matter back to Public Works.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to annex parcels benefiting from sewers maintained by Public Works and to levy sewer service charges on parcels within the annexed territories. Most of the individual properties are being included in these proceedings at the property owner's request or due to the sewer being readily available to the property owner. Some of the properties are being annexed as a result of an audit conducted by Public Works that sewer service is already being provided to the property. Owners of the affected parcels will be notified by mail, at least 45 days prior to the hearing date, of the exact amount that will be charged to their individual parcels as required by law. The sewer service charge for a typical single-family home is \$50.50 annually in Fiscal Year 2024-25. Multiple-family residences, commercial, and industrial properties are charged a higher amount.

Enclosed is a complete list of the 890 individual properties within the 5 parcels along with their proposed sewer service charges (Enclosure A).

Approval of the proposed annexations will provide Public Works with revenue to be used to maintain the sewer facilities in compliance with State Water Resources Control Board regulatory requirements and County of Los Angeles Department of Public Health standards.

<u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality; Objective II.3.1, Improve Water Quality, Reduce Water Consumption, and Increase Water Supplies; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended actions allow the annexation of new territories into the District and levying of sewer service charges to the affected parcels to ensure that sufficient funds are raised for the continued maintenance of the sewer system in a cost-effective, safe, and environmentally sound manner and to protect the water resources of our communities.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

Upon approval by the Board, this action will generate an estimated \$49,000 in additional annual revenue to Public Works effective July 1, 2024, to provide for ongoing sewer

maintenance operations. The additional revenue will be included in the Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District (GA9, Revenue Source 9570) Fiscal Year 2024-25 Budget.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

These recommended actions are required to annex parcels that will benefit from Public Works maintenance of local sewer collection systems. The Cities of Azusa and Santa Clarita have adopted the enclosed resolutions granting consent and jurisdiction to the County of Los Angeles for the inclusion of territories within those cities into the District (Enclosure B).

In order to effectuate an annexation, Section 4896 of the Health and Safety Code requires the Board, by resolution, to set a time and place for a public hearing regarding the proposed annexation. Consistent with this requirement, the enclosed Resolution of Intention (Enclosure C) identifies the territories proposed to be annexed. Sewer service charges shall be determined in accordance with Title 20, Divisions 2 and 3 of the Los Angeles County Code.

In accordance with Health and Safety Code Sections 4898 and 4899, Public Works shall post the required notices of the public hearing in at least three conspicuous places in the territory proposed to be annexed and in at least three conspicuous places in the District at least 10 days prior to the date of the hearing.

The areas to be included are located within unincorporated territories of Val Verde and the Cities of Azusa and Santa Clarita. The procedures to annex territory into the District are set forth in California Health and Safety Code Section 4895 et seq. In order to annex territory located within a city, these procedures require consent of the governing body of such city as the owner of the sewers within their city.

As required by Section 4899 of the Health and Safety Code, the Board shall direct the Executive Officer of the Board to publish a notice of the hearing in a newspaper of general circulation once a week for two consecutive weeks.

Section 4900 of the Health and Safety Code provides that the Board, after passing upon the proposed annexation and any objections thereto, may, by order entered upon its minutes, determine that the territory proposed to be annexed or any part will be benefited by annexation and may order that the boundaries of the district be altered to include that territory.

The California Constitution, Article XIII D, Section 6 (a), requires that owners of parcels subject to new or increased sewer service charges be notified by mail no later than 45 days before the public hearing of the amount and reason for the charge; the method of determination; and the date, time, and location of the hearing. In the event a majority of property owners protest the new or increased charge, such new charge may not be imposed. In the absence of a majority protest, the sewer service charge shall be effective starting in Fiscal Year 2024-25.

Pursuant to Section 99 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, there will be no exchange of property tax revenues as a result of this action.

The Director of Public Works or his designee shall file the necessary statement of boundary change with the State Board of Equalization and the County of Los Angeles Assessor as required by Section 54900 of the Government Code and Section 99 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

This proposal was reviewed by the Director of Public Works or his designee, acting as the County Surveyor, and the County of Los Angeles Assessor. The boundaries were approved as to definiteness and certainty and are shown on the legal descriptions on Enclosure C.

The Resolution of Intention (Enclosure C) and Property Tax Resolution (Enclosure D) have been approved as to form by County Counsel.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed annexation and levy of sewer service charges is to fund operating expenses to maintain sewers and is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Public Resources Code Sections 21080(b)(8) and 15273(a) of the CEQA Guidelines.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

This action will result in the annexation of an additional 10.8 miles of sewer lines to the District. The revenue to be generated will be sufficient to fund the increased service area. The recommended action will have no impact on current County services or projects.

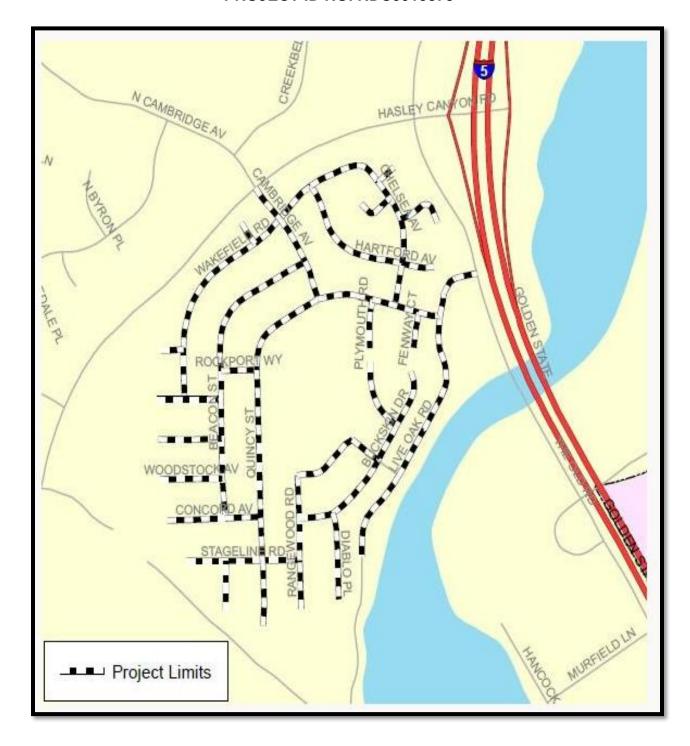

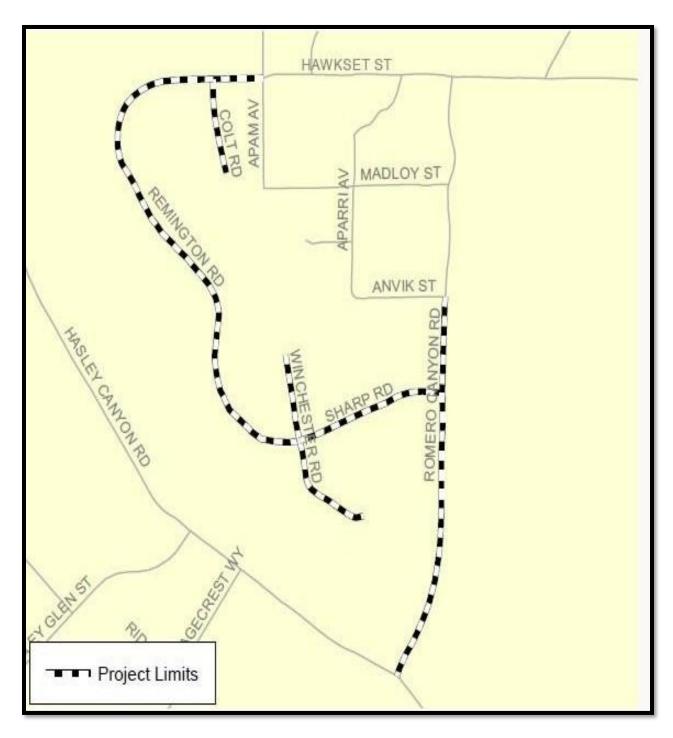

Public Works is seeking Board approval to procure a construction contract for the Castaic – Hasley Hills South Project in the unincorporated community of Castaic.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Find that the proposed project is exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- Approve the project and adopt the plans and specifications that are on file with Project Management Division III of Public Works for the Castaic – Hasley Hills South Project at an estimated construction contract cost between \$5,250,000 and \$7,750,000.

- Instruct the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors to advertise for bids in accordance with the Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisement that are to be received before 11 a.m. on July 25, 2023, in accordance with the Notice Inviting Bids.
- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to determine whether the bid of the apparent responsible contractor with the lowest apparent responsive bid is, in fact, responsive and, if not responsive, to determine which apparent responsible contractor submitted the lowest responsive bid.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to award and execute a construction contract for the Castaic Hasley Hills South Project with the responsible contractor with the lowest responsive bid within or less than the estimated cost range of \$5,250,000 and \$7,750,000, or that exceeds the estimated cost range by no more than 15 percent, if additional and appropriate funds have been identified.
- 6. Delegate to the Director of Public Works or his designee the following authority in connection with this contract: (1) extend the date and time for the receipt of bids consistent with the requirements of State Public Contract Code, Section 4104.5; (2) allow substitution of subcontractors and relief of bidders upon demonstration of the grounds set forth in State Public Contract Code, Sections 4100 et seq. and 5100 et seq., respectively; (3) approve and execute change orders within the same monetary limits delegated to the Director of Public Works or his designee under Section 2.18.050 of the Los Angeles County Code; (4) accept the project upon final completion; and (5) release retention money withheld consistent with the requirements of State Public Contract Code, Sections 7107 and 9203.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and allow Public Works to reconstruct local roadways in the unincorporated community of Castaic (see Enclosure).

The project will reconstruct 5.8 miles of local roads and include other appurtenant work. The project will extend the service life of the roadways, reduce wear and tear on vehicles, and enhance the quality of life in the community.

It is anticipated the work will begin in October 2023 and be completed in November 2024.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets, by supporting ongoing efforts to manage and improve public infrastructure assets.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The estimated construction contract cost to complete this project is in the range of \$5,250,000 to \$7,750,000 with a maximum construction contract cost to be 15 percent above this range. The total project cost is estimated to be \$9,400,000. In addition to the construction contract cost, the total project cost includes the preparation of plans and specifications, survey, environmental clearance, right-of-way and utility clearances, material testing, inspection, contract administration, change order contingency, and other County services.

The project will be funded with the State of California Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account Funds allocated to the County under the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 (Senate Bill 1). Funding for this project is included in the Road Fund (B03 – Capital Assets-Infrastructure and Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget. Funding for the project's future costs will be requested through the annual budget process.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

This project will be advertised in accordance with Section 20392 of the State Public Contract Code.

The contract award will comply with applicable Federal and State requirements and Board policies and mandates. The contract documents will require the contractor to comply with these same requirements, policies, and mandates. The construction contract will be in the form previously reviewed and approved as to form by County Counsel.

As required by Board Policy No. 5.140, information such as defaulted contracts with the County, complaints filed with the Contractors State License Board, labor violations, and debarment actions will be considered before a contract is awarded.

Documents related to award of this contract will be available at Los Angeles County Public Works, Project Management Division III, 900 South Fremont Avenue, 8th Floor, Alhambra, CA 91803.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed project is exempt from CEQA. The project to reconstruct approximately 5.8 miles of road is within a class of projects that has been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and that meets the criteria set forth in Section 15301 (c) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Class 1 (x), Subsections 14 and 22 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. In addition, based on the proposed project records, it will comply with all applicable regulations, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code, Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

In accordance with the Board's consolidated Local and Targeted Worker Hire Policy, the contract documents will require that at least 30 percent of the total California craft worker hours for construction of the project be performed by Local Residents and at least 10 percent be performed by Targeted Workers facing employment barriers.

To increase contractor awareness of Public Works' program to contract work out to the private sector, this project will be listed on both the County's "Doing Business with Los Angeles County" and "Do Business with Public Works" websites for open bids:

When the project is completed, it will have a positive impact by extending the service life of the roadway, reducing wear and tear on vehicles, and enhancing the quality of life in the community.

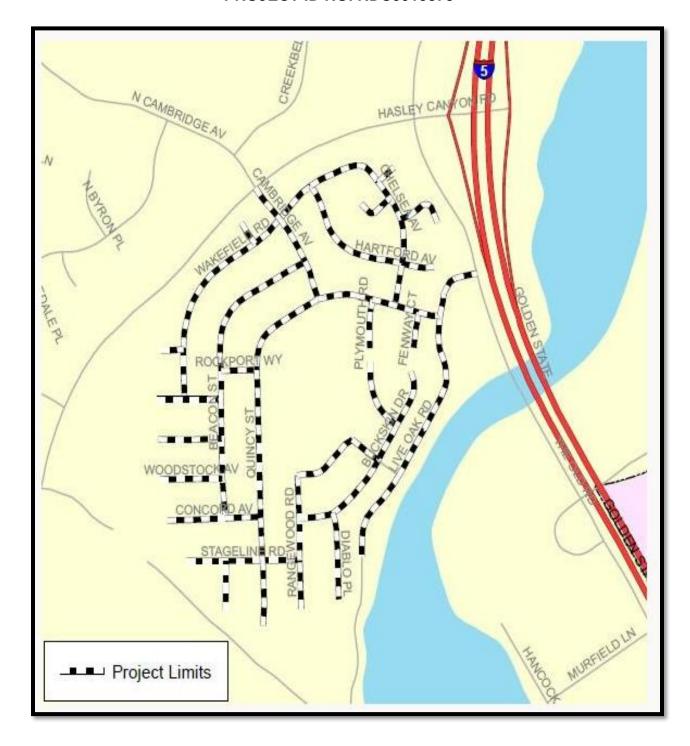

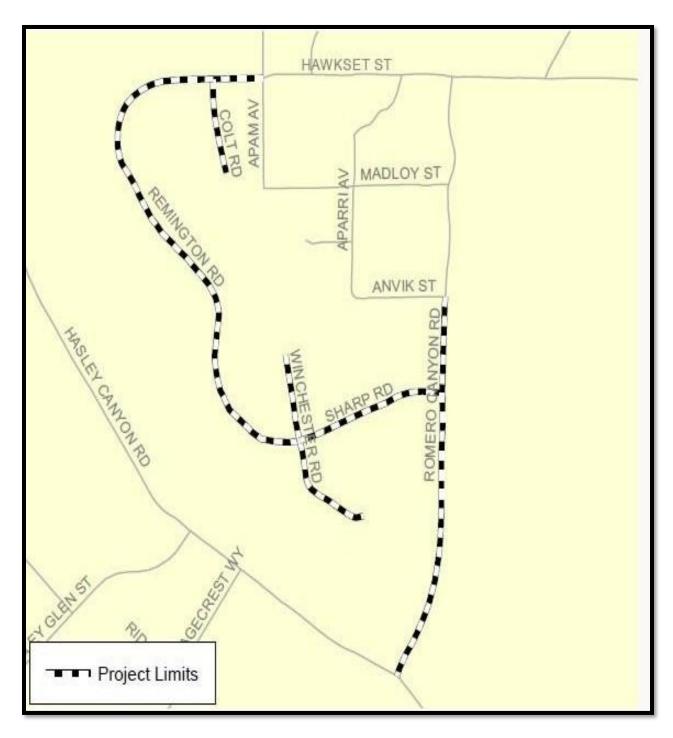

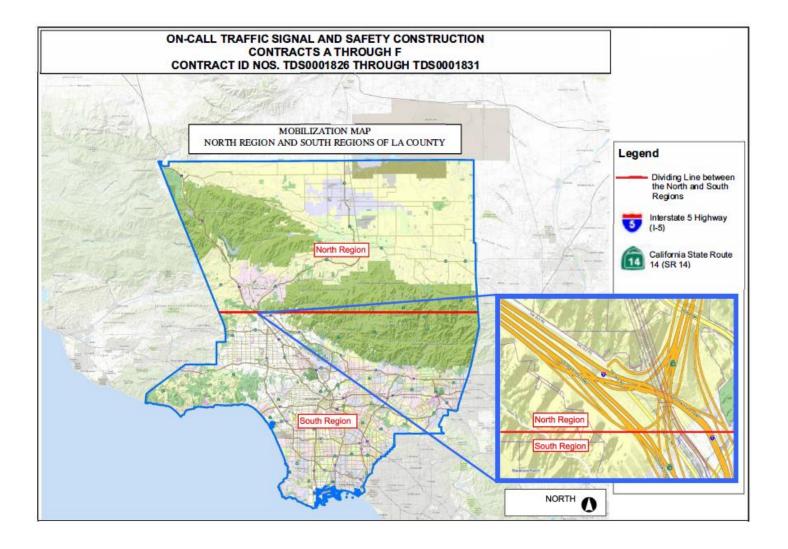

Public Works is seeking Board approval to procure and execute six separate contracts, Contracts A through F, for the proposed On-Call Traffic Signal and Safety Construction Projects, and delegate authority to adopt the plans and specifications when ready for future projects that may be proposed under Contracts A through F, located in the North and South regions of Los Angeles County.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

 Find that the proposed procurement and execution of Contracts A through F and related delegations of authority to the Director of Public Works are not a project under the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the proposed activity.

Approve the On-Call Traffic Signal and Safety Construction Contracts A through F and delegate to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee, the authority to adopt the plans and specifications when they are on file with Public Works Project Management Division III for each contract at an estimated construction cost range between \$4,250,000 and \$5,250,000 each for Contracts A, B, E, and F, and between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000 each for Contracts C and D.
- 3. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee, to request that the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors advertise for bids in accordance with the Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisement with the Notice Inviting Bids.
- 4. Find pursuant to State Public Contract Code, Section 3400 (c), that it is necessary to specify the designated items by specific brand name in order to match other products in use on a particular public improvement either completed or in the course of completion.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee, to determine whether the bid of the apparent responsible contractor with the lowest apparent responsive bid is, in fact, responsive and, if not responsive, to determine which apparent responsible contractor submitted the lowest responsive bid.
- 6. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee, to separately award and execute Contracts A through F for the On-Call Traffic Signal and Safety Construction contracts with the responsible contractors with the lowest responsive bid within or less than the estimated cost range between \$4,250,000 and \$5,250,000, each for Contracts A, B, E, and F; and between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000, each for Contracts C and D, or that exceeds the estimated cost by no more than 15 percent, if additional and appropriate funds have been identified and allow for the adjustment of the funding sources as required for the life of Contracts A through F.
- 7. Delegate to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee, the following authority in connection with these contracts: (1) extend the date and time for the receipt of bids consistent with the requirements of State Public Contract Code, Section 4104.5; (2) allow substitution of subcontractors and relief of bidders upon demonstration of the grounds set forth in State Public Contract Code, Sections 4100 et seq., and 5100 et seq., respectively; (3) issue

work orders to the selected contractors in an aggregate per on-call contract amount not to exceed the maximum amount of each on-call contract for synchronizing traffic signals, installing, modifying, and repairing traffic signals, streetlights, guard rails, striping, signage, and curb ramp modifications for an aggregate total not to exceed \$28,750,000; (4) approve and execute supplemental work orders within the same monetary limits delegated to the Director of Public Works or his designee under Section 2.18.050 of the Los Angeles County Code; (5) accept any project assigned by work order under these contracts upon

the project's final completion; and (6) release retention money withheld consistent with the requirements of State Public Contract Code, Sections 7107 and 9203.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that they are not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and allow Public Works to execute contracts for future proposed projects to synchronize traffic signals, and install, modify, and repair traffic signals, streetlights, and guardrails in addition to performing other traffic safety-related work, such as striping, signage, and curb ramp modifications, on an on-call basis throughout Los Angeles County. While the contracts may be predominantly divided into the North and South regions of Los Angeles County (see Enclosure A), to get better overall contract pricing, urgent or emergency work could be done outside of the assigned region with a pricing surcharge. Also, some work can straddle between the regions. For split jurisdiction intersections, Public Works will gain concurrence and commitment from the city or cities either by formal agreement, requiring Board approval, a County-City cooperative agreement, or City Services Request.

Public Works has utilized on-call contractors in prior years to increase traffic safety and provide efficient construction of traffic signal and street lighting infrastructure.

The number of proposed project locations under each contract has not been finalized and the locations will be identified as needed throughout the duration of the contracts. Construction is anticipated to begin January 2024.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, and Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets. These actions support ongoing efforts to manage and improve public infrastructure assets.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The estimated construction contract cost of Contracts A, B, E, and F are in the range between \$4,250,000 and \$5,250,000. The estimated construction contract cost of Contracts C and D are in the range between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000, each with a maximum construction contract cost to be 15 percent above this range. The aggregate construction contract amounts for Contracts A through F shall not exceed \$28,750,000.

Funding for these projects is included in the Road Fund (B03 - Capital Assets–Infrastructure and Services and Supplies), Proposition C Local Return Fund (CN9 – Capital Assets-Infrastructure and Services and Supplies), and the various County Lighting Maintenance Districts Funds Fiscal Year 2023-24 Budgets.

For split jurisdiction intersections, the city or cities will finance their respective jurisdictional shares of the project cost under a County-City cooperative agreement or City Service Request. Funding to finance future contract years will be requested through the annual budget process. When the need arises for services under these agreements, financing will be made from the appropriate Public Works administered funds. Total expenditures for these construction contracts will not exceed the amount approved by the Board.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

These contracts will be advertised in accordance with Section 20392 of the State Public Contract Code.

Public Contract Code Section 20391 allows the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County to delegate approval of plans and specifications to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, on a project-by-project basis.

Public Works anticipates advertising and executing the contracts over the next 12 months. The six construction contracts will each be for a period of one year.

The State Public Contract Code Section 3400 (c) (2) allows a product to be designated by specific brand name for several purposes, one of which is to match other products in use on a particular public improvement either completed or in the course of completion, if the awarding authority makes a finding and language is included in the Notice Inviting Bids. The Notice Inviting Bids includes language describing this finding.

A list of specific brand names and qualified purposes in accordance with the State Public Contract Code is provided in Enclosure B.

The contract awards will comply with applicable Federal and State requirements and Board policies and mandates. The contract documents will require the contractor to comply with these same requirements, policies, and mandates. The construction contracts will be in the form previously reviewed and approved as to form by County Counsel.

As required by Board Policy No. 5.140, information such as defaulted contracts with the County, complaints filed with the Contractors State License Board, labor violations, and debarment actions will be considered before a contract is awarded.

These on-call contracts are subject to Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring.

Documents related to award of these contracts will be available at Los Angeles County Public Works, Project Management Division III, 900 South Fremont Avenue, 8th Floor, Alhambra, CA 91803.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

Procurement and execution of Contracts A through F, and related delegations of authority to the Director of Public Works, do not constitute a project under CEQA because the activity is excluded from the definition of a project under Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code and Section 15378 (b) (4) and (5) of the State CEQA Guidelines. These activities are administrative actions of government and involve the creation of government funding mechanisms or other government fiscal activities that do not involve any commitment to any specific project that may result in a potentially significant environmental impact or direct or indirect changes to the environment. On-Call Contracts A through F, under which work orders would be issued, would include repair, remodeling, refurbishment, and maintenance of existing structures and facilities, as requested by County departments, are anticipated to meet requirements for categorical exemptions under CEQA. The Board's award of the on-call contracts does not include approval of any work under the contracts. The future implementation of each work order proposed under the on-call contracts will be subject to prior determination and documentation by the Director of Public Works or his designee that the work is exempt from CEQA, if appropriate. In the event that the proposed work is subject to CEQA and is not determined to be exempt, Public Works will ensure that appropriate CEQA findings are recommended to the Board prior to issuance of the work orders.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

Contract provisions require the contractors to comply with the Board-adopted Local and Targeted Worker Hire Policy.

To increase contractor awareness of Public Works' program to contract work out to the private sector, the future projects, which would be issued under Contracts A through F, will be listed on both the County's "Doing Business with Los Angeles County" and "Do Business with Public Works" websites for open bids:

Also, the contract solicitations will be advertised through web-based and social media platforms, including Twitter.

In addition, in order to increase opportunities for small businesses, Public Works will be coordinating with the Office of Small Business at the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs to maximize outreach, as well as offering preferences to Local Small Business Enterprises, Social Enterprises, and Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises in compliance with Los Angeles County Code, Chapters 2.204, 2.205, and 2.211.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

When work under Contracts A through F is completed, it will have a positive impact by improving traffic flow and safety for motorists and pedestrians.

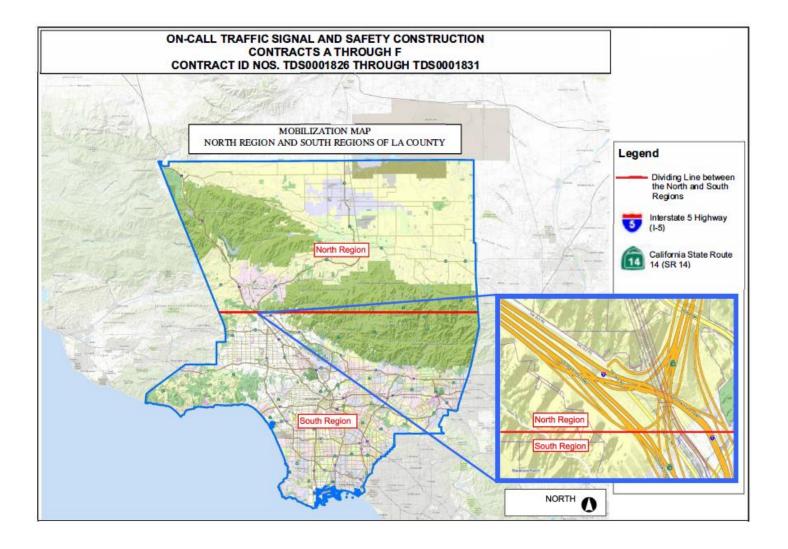

Public Works is seeking Board approval and authorization to: (1) initiate proceedings for the annexation of territory located within the unincorporated area of Hacienda Heights to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687 and County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, Unincorporated Zone, for street lighting purposes; and (2) order the preparation and filing of an Engineer's Report for the petition area.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the action set forth in this Board letter does not constitute a project under the California Environmental Quality Act.
- 2. Approve and file Petition No. 56-1221 to annex territory located within the unincorporated County area to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687 and County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, Unincorporated Zone.

- 3. Adopt the resolution initiating proceedings for the annexation of territory to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687 and County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, Unincorporated Zone.
- 4. Instruct Public Works to prepare and file an Engineer's Report for the petition area

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of these recommendations is to: (1) find that the action set forth in this Board letter does not constitute a project under the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines; (2) initiate proceedings for the annexation of territory to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687 and County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, Unincorporated Zone (collectively, the County Lighting Districts); and (3) order the preparation and filing of an Engineer's Report for the petition area pursuant to Section 22585(d) of the California Streets and Highways Code. The Engineer's Report will include, but will not be limited to, the plan for improvements, the estimated cost of the improvements, a diagram showing the area to be annexed, and the annual assessment that will be applicable.

Annexation of the territory to the County Lighting Districts is required for operation and maintenance of eight existing streetlights. The proposed annexation of the territory is requested by the property owners or authorized representatives who signed the enclosed petition for street lighting. Levying of annual assessments within the annexed territory for street lighting will be based on land use type with an annual base assessment rate for a single-family residence of \$5 within the Unincorporated Zone with proportionately higher rates for other land uses.

The enclosed Petition No. 56-1221 (La Monde Street and Mesa Robles Drive) is located within the unincorporated County area (Attachment A). This petition is in favor of the annexation of territory for the operation and maintenance of existing streetlights and was signed by property owners or authorized representatives representing 100 percent of the area proposed for annexation to the County Lighting Districts.

The petition complied with the 60 percent or more signature requirement in the policy adopted by the Board on March 11, 1980. The petition indicates the approximate assessment for the operation and maintenance of existing streetlights to be paid by the property owners within the territory to be annexed.

These annexation proceedings are governed by the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (Section 22500 et seq. of the California Streets and Highways Code). Public Works will prepare an Engineer's Report for the petition area in accordance with Section 22565 et seq. of the California Streets and Highways Code and Section 4(b) of Article XIII D of the California Constitution.

At a later date, Public Works will submit for the Board's consideration the Engineer's Report for the petition area and resolution to annex territory to the County Lighting Districts and request the Board to set a public hearing to consider the adoption of a resolution or delay until all requirements are resolved.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The County Strategic Plan directs the provisions of Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended actions provide funding for the operation and maintenance of existing streetlights. Maintaining lighting services provides for the convenience and safety of the motoring public, as well as the safety and security of people and property, which improves the quality of life in Los Angeles County.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The fiscal impact to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687 will be evaluated once the Engineer's Report for the petition area is complete. Sufficient funds to finance the cost of the Engineer's Report are included in the County Lighting Maintenance District's Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget. Funds to finance future years' cost will be requested through the annual budget process.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The resolution (Attachment B) has been approved as to form by County Counsel.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed action to initiate proceedings for the annexation of territory to the County Lighting Districts and ordering the preparation and filing of the Engineer's Report does not constitute a project under CEQA because it is an activity that is excluded from the definition of a project by Section 15378(b) of the CEQA Guidelines. The proposed action

is an administrative activity of government that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes to the environment.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Preparing the Engineer's Report for street lighting is consistent with the current services regularly conducted by Public Works.

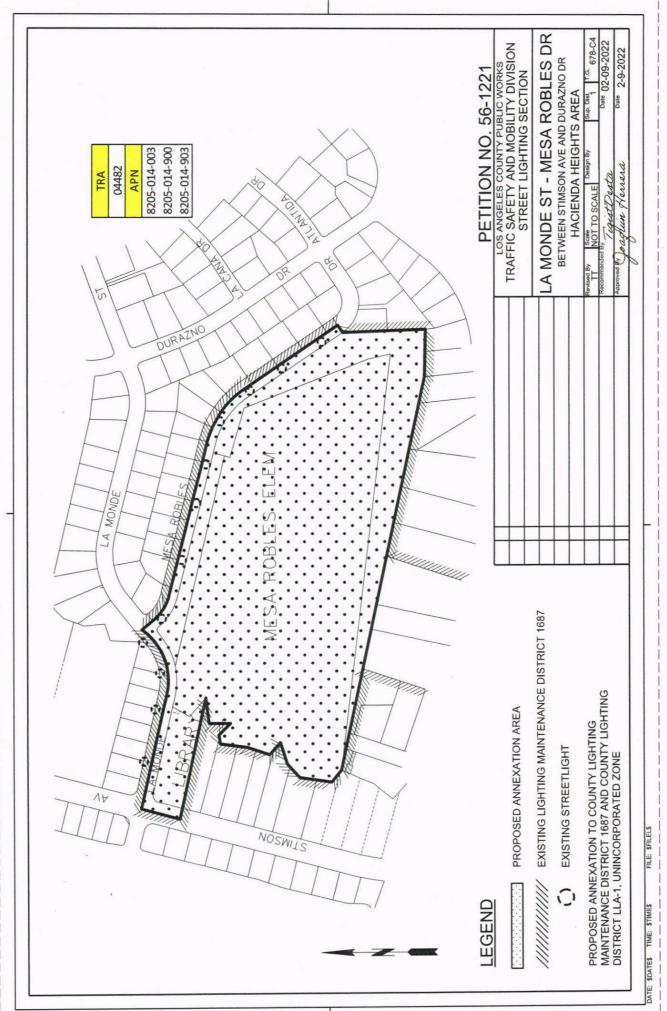

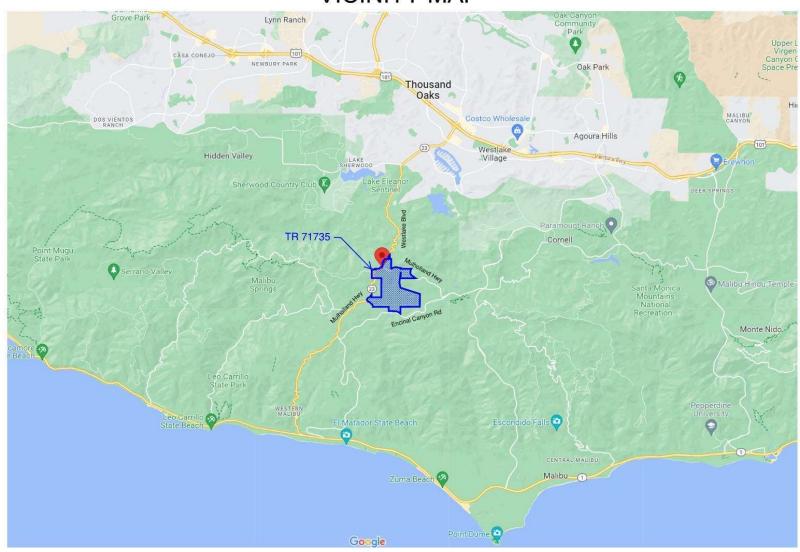

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that they are not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and allow the County Sewer Maintenance District to operate and maintain the sanitary sewer system for Tract 71735. To service the sanitary sewer needs for this subdivision, the subdivider will construct, at its cost and dedicate to the County, a publicly operated treatment works (POTW) and appurtenant facilities. The operation and maintenance of the POTW and appurtenant facilities is proposed to be financed through a yearly sewer service charge imposed through the creation of a County Sewer Maintenance District.

The proposed final map (Enclosure A) consists of 650.51 acres and will create seven lots. One lot will accommodate the remodeled golf course and one lot will accommodate the structures and development associated with the project including the development of a conference center that will consist of educational and meeting facilities. Five lots will consist of open space with more than 450 acres and the existing caretaker's residence.



The Board approved a vesting tentative tract map for this subdivision on August 19, 2014. The subdivider has complied with all requirements imposed as a condition of the approval of the tentative map, and the final map is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map.

Pursuant to the State Subdivision Map Act, a local agency must approve a final map if the subdivider has complied with all applicable requirements of State and local law and the legislative body finds that the final map is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map.

The grants and dedications, as indicated on the final map, are necessary for construction and maintenance of public infrastructure required by the County for this development.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended action allows the County to record the final maps, which will maximize property tax revenue.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no adverse impact to the County General Fund. The two lots for the remodeled golf course and conference center, created by the recordation of this final map, will generate additional property tax revenue that is shared by all taxing entities.

The adoption of the Resolution to Initiate Proceedings (Enclosure B) will secure the method of financing and ensure the continued operation and maintenance of the POTW through a yearly sewer service charge.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Section 4871 of the Health and Safety Code states that the board of supervisors of any county may determine by resolution that any portion of the unincorporated area of the county not already included in a district is in need of sewer maintenance and should be formed into a district.

The approval of the final map is subject to provisions of the State Subdivision Map Act [Government Code, Sections 66410 et seq.; 66458, subdivision (a); 66473; 66474.1; 66436, subdivision (a)(3)(A)(i); and 66427.1, subdivision (A)], which states that a legislative body shall not deny approval of a final map if it has previously approved a tentative map for the proposed subdivision and finds that the final map is in substantial conformance with the previously approved tentative map.



The final map has been reviewed by Public Works for mathematical accuracy, survey analysis, title information, and for compliance with local ordinances and the State Subdivision Map Act. Public Works' review indicates that the subdivision is substantially the same as it appears on the approved tentative map, that all State and local provisions and legal requirements have been met on this final map, and that the final map is technically correct.

All agreements and improvement securities, which were required as a condition of the approval of the final map, have been accepted on behalf of the County by the appropriate official.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The recommended actions are either not subject to the CEQA because they are activities excluded from the definition of a project by Section 21065 of the California Public Resources Code and Section 15378, subdivision (b) of the State CEQA guidelines or, in the alternative, are exempt pursuant to CEQA. The project includes the approval of a final subdivision map, which is ministerial pursuant to Section 15268 of the CEQA guidelines and Section 21080, subdivision (b)(1), of the California Public Resources Code. The project also includes the adoption of the Resolution to Initiate Proceedings, which is exempt from CEQA. This proposed action to set CEQA significance thresholds is an organizational or administrative activity of government, which will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

There will be no negative impact on current County services or projects as a result of approving the final map for Tract 71735.

<u>SUBJECT</u>

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Senate Bill 1953 Compliance and the Central Plant Retrofit Projects, and to authorize the use of Board-approved Job Order Contracts to deliver the projects.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Central Plant Retrofit Project is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act and that the Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Senate Bill 1953 Compliance Project is within the scope of the previous finding of exemption for the project under the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in the board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Approve the Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Senate Bill 1953 Compliance Project, Capital Project No. 87562, with a total project budget of \$13,000,000 for Phase I.

- 3. Establish and approve the Olive View Medical Center Central Plant Retrofit Project, Capital Project No. 87589, with a total project budget of \$21,242,000 for Phase I.
- 4. Approve the Fiscal Year 2022-23 appropriation adjustment to allocate \$3,370,000 from the Department of Health Services' Enterprise Fund-Committed for the Department of Health Services to fund the estimated Fiscal Year 2022-23 expenditures for the Olive View Medical Center Central Plant Retrofit Project, Capital Project No. 87589.
- 5. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to deliver Phase I of the proposed projects using Board-approved Job Order Contracts.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find the proposed Phase I of Olive View-UCLA Medical Center (OV-UCLA MC) Central Plant Retrofit and Senate Bill (SB) 1953 Compliance Projects are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); establish and approve the projects and related appropriation adjustment; and authorize delivery of the projects using Board-approved Job Order Contracts (JOCs).

Background

Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Central Plant Retrofit

There is an urgent need to upgrade the OV-UCLA MC Central Plant due to changes in environmental regulations and plant equipment nearing the end of its useful service life. The central plant houses original heating and cooling equipment, which was placed in operation when the hospital was completed in the 1980s. The central plant also houses the cogeneration power plant that no longer complies with California South Coast Air Quality Management District's emissions standards. In order to avoid incurring fines, the cogeneration plant will need to cease operations by January 2024. Once the cogeneration plant is decommissioned, the heating system will rely on two air duct heaters, one of which will be rebuilt in phase I of the project, then replaced with traditional boilers in phase 2 of the project.

Public Works has completed a feasibility study to replace the heating and cooling equipment. The study recommends a phased approach, over a four-year span, taking into consideration the need to supply heating and cooling to the hospital during the phased construction, and the necessary recapture of the space vacated by the cogeneration plant for new boiler equipment.

Phase I of the OV-UCLA MC Central Plant Retrofit Project consists of design and construction of seven distinct and separate make-ready projects. These projects are proposed to be delivered in the following sequence to avoid impacts to hospital operations: 1) Replacement of the existing medical vacuum pumps, which will begin in July 2023 at a cost of \$1,500,000; 2) Refurbishment and remodel of the hot air duct heater, required for decommissioning of the cogeneration plant, which will begin in September 2023 at a cost of \$1,300,000; 3) Decommissioning and removal of the cogeneration gas turbines, which will begin in January 2024 at a cost of \$1,500,000; 4) Demolition of the existing gas compressors to clear space for the installation of a new electric chiller, which will begin in January 2024 at a cost of \$400,000; 5) Renovation of the electrical switchgear to provide code-required egress, which will begin in March 2024 at a cost of \$1,200,000; 6) Replacement of the existing electrical chiller, which will begin in April 2024 at a cost of \$2,600,000; and 7) Removal of underground fuel storage tanks, which will begin in November 2024 at a cost of \$490,000.

Each sequential component of Phase I will be carried out using Board-approved JOCs to expedite construction. The monetary value of each scope will not exceed the maximum JOC contract value. The anticipated total cost of construction for Phase I work is estimated at \$8,990,000.

Phase II will include the replacement of the cooling tower, installation of traditional boilers to provide for the heating needs for the hospital, the replacement of the absorption centrifugal chillers, and power and control upgrades to improve the efficiency and operations of the Central Plant equipment. Public Works will return to the Board to request approval of the project and budget for Phase II upon completion of design through a Board-approved, on-call Architect/Engineering (A/E) agreement.

Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Senate Bill 1953 Compliance

On June 18, 2019, the Board established the OV-UCLA MC SB 1953 Compliance Project with a preliminary budget of \$9,712,000. Public Works completed a review of critical care components of the hospital and the central plant and identified deficiencies

requiring design and construction for recertification by the California Department of Health Care Access and Information (HCAI).

SB 1953 established a schedule for California hospitals to meet seismic safety goals by classifying hospitals by level of danger of collapse, and instituting deadlines for retrofitting and/or replacement. The project would bring the hospital into compliance with Non-Structural Performance Category NPC3 and NPC4D ratings, which are required by HCAI.

Phase I of the OV-UCLA MC SB 1953 Compliance Project consists of the preparation of a Compliance Plan. Preparation of the plan will require the recertification of NPC3 and NPC4D scope previously completed in 2010, and the preparation and submittal of an NPC4D and NPC5 Compliance Plan to HCAI by January 1, 2024. Public Works has determined that additional design and remodel work is required to achieve NPC3 recertification for equipment located in the hospital's central plant and other critical care locations. Design will be carried out through a Board-approved, on-call A/E agreement and renovation through a Board-approved JOC. The value of this work is estimated at \$2,700,000.

Phase II will include bringing the hospital in compliance with NPC5 requirements, which include having 72 hours of emergency water storage and supply of emergency sewage storage. Public Works will carry out design through a Board-approved, on-call A/E agreement and return to the Board for project approval once design has been completed. The cost of Phase II is estimated at \$20,000,000.

Once completed, the hospital would be able to continue to provide compliant inpatient health care services beyond the year 2030.

Green Building/Sustainable Design Program

All proposed projects will support the Board's Policy for Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by recycling disposable material and by incorporating energy efficient products during construction.

<u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy I.2, Enhance our Delivery of Comprehensive Interventions; Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities; Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality,

Objective II.3.2, Foster a Cleaner, More Efficient, and More Resilient Energy System; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, and Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets.

These actions support the Strategic Plan by investing in public healthcare infrastructure improvements that will enhance quality and delivery of healthcare services to the residents of Los Angeles County, in particular the North County region.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The project budgets for Phase I of the OV-UCLA MC Central Plant Retrofit and SB 1953 Compliance Projects are estimated at \$21,242,000 and \$13,000,000, respectively. The project budgets include construction, change order contingency, plans and specifications, permit fees, consultant services, inspection services, and County services. The project budgets and schedules are included in Enclosure A.

The Department of Health Services (DHS) has previously paid \$47,000 for preliminary assessment fees through the DHS operating budget for the OV-UCLA MC Central Plant Retrofit Project.

Board approval of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023 appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) will allocate \$3,370,000 from the DHS' Enterprise Fund-Committed for DHS to fund the projected FY 2022-23 expenditures for the OV-UCLA MC Central Plant Retrofit Project, Capital Project No. 87589. There is sufficient appropriation in the OV-UCLA MC SB 1953 Compliance Project, Capital Project No. 87562, to fund the projected FY 2022-23 expenditures. DHS will provide funding in the future budget phases, as needed, to fully fund the remaining project budgets for Phase I.

Potential funding of Phase II may include financing by the issuance of short-term notes through the Los Angeles County Capital Asset Leasing Corporation's Lease Revenue Notes Program. Public Works will include funding recommendations when it returns to the Board to request approval of the Phase II project budgets.

Operating Budget Impact

Following completion of the projects, DHS will request and fund the associated ongoing annual maintenance and operational costs, as needed, with departmental resources in future budget phases. There is no net County cost impact associated with the recommendations.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy amended on August 4, 2020, the projects consist of the repair and replacement of building systems and are, therefore, exempt from the policy.

In accordance with Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring, the project will require that at least 30 percent of the California construction labor hours be performed by qualified Local Residents and at least 10 percent be performed by Targeted Workers facing employment barriers. The project will also include a jobs coordinator who will facilitate the implementation of the targeted hiring requirement of the policy.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

On June 18, 2019, the Board found the OV-UCLA MC SB 1953 Compliance (CP 87562) project categorically exempt from CEQA. The approved project remains within the scope of the previous finding of exemption.

The proposed OV-UCLA MC Central Plant Retrofit (CP 87589), is categorically exempt from CEQA. The project is within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that it meets the criteria set forth in Sections 15301 (a), (d), (f), and (o) and Section 15302 (c) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Classes 1 (c), (d), (h), and (i) and 2 (e) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. The additional Phase I scope is also categorically exempt under the following sections:

The projects provide for repair and upgrade of existing facilities replacement of existing systems involving negligible or no expansion of an existing use. Replacement equipment will have the same purpose and capacity as the equipment being replaced.

In addition, based on the records of the project, it will continue to comply with all applicable regulations, the project is not located in a sensitive environment, there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists complied pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5 or indications that the project may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historic resource that would make the exemptions inapplicable.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption for both projects with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code and will be posted to the County's website in accordance with section 21092.2.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

Public Works completed design through a Board-approved on-call A/E agreement and proposes to deliver construction using Board-approved JOCs.

The Scope of Work includes minor remodeling, and Public Works has made the determination that the use of a JOC is the most appropriate contracting method to deliver the work.

The project Scopes of Work include substantial remodeling and alternation work and Public Works has made the determination that the use of JOC is the most appropriate contracting method to deliver the projects.

<u>IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)</u>

The proposed projects will be phased to avoid impacts to patient care at the OV-UCLA MC. Patient care services will remain fully operational during construction. All critical work will be completed in phases and during nonpeak periods to minimize disruptions to patient services.

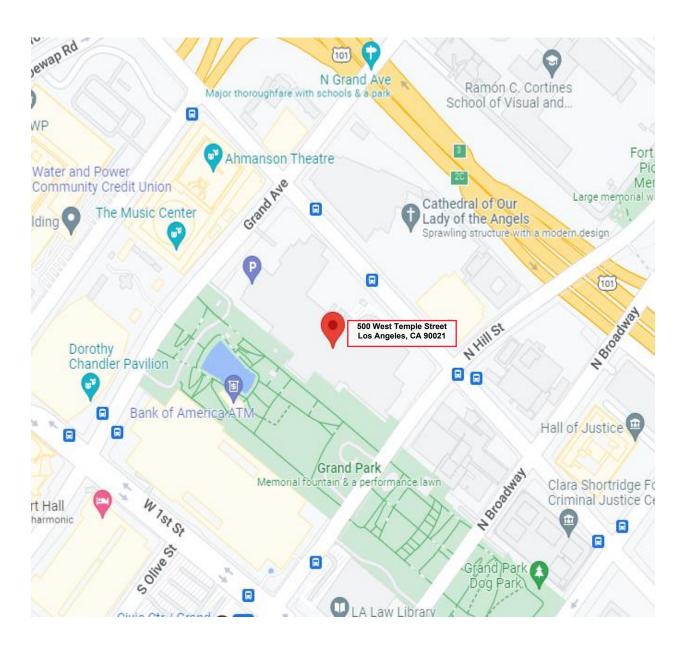

SUBJECT

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the revised budget for the Hall of Administration Room 140 Refurbishment Project.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find the recommended actions are within the scope of the previous finding of exemption from the California Environmental Quality Act for the previously approved Hall of Administration Room 140 Refurbishment Project.
- 2. Approve the revised project budget of \$2,551,000, an increase of \$451,000 from the previously Board-approved amount of \$2,100,000, for the Hall of Administration Room 140 Refurbishment Project, Capital Project No. 87796.
- Approve the appropriation adjustment to transfer \$451,000 from the Various-Refurbishments-General Refurbishments Project, Capital Project No. 86613, to the Hall of Administration Room 140 Refurbishment Project, Capital Project No. 87796, to fully fund the project.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find the previously approved project within the scope of the previous exemption findings under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and approve the revised project budget and associated appropriation adjustment for the Hall of Administration (HOA) Room 140 Refurbishment Project.

On June 28, 2022, the Board approved the project with a budget of \$2,100,000 and authorized Public Works to deliver the project using a Board-approved Job Order Contract (JOC).

The project consists of remodeling the HOA First Floor Conference Room 140 to create a more flexible and accessible meeting space. The refurbished conference room will be used for public overflow during Board of Supervisors meetings and will host public hearings for various County Commissions. The remodeling work includes new architectural finishes, including partitions to allow the room space to be divided into smaller meeting spaces; mechanical system modifications and upgrades; and new information technology and audio-visual equipment and furniture.

After extensive negotiations with the selected JOC contractor, Public Works has determined that the project's budget and schedule are greater than what was presented to the Board on June 28, 2022. The increase in cost is due to inflation, and supply chain issues, which continue to impact the construction industry. The Chief Executive Office has identified additional funds to cover the increased project costs. In an effort to mitigate schedule impacts and with concurrence from the Chief Executive Office, Public Works began construction in March 2023 with the construction budget in the previously Board-approved project budget.

The conference room is anticipated to be available for occupancy and use in July 2023. At that time, the remodeled space will be complete with power and data in place so attendees can utilize mobile televisions or Smartboards. However, some of the audio-visual equipment with extended lead times are not expected to arrive until December 2023. The overall construction substantial completion is anticipated in March 2024 to allow for installation and commissioning of the audio-visual equipment.

Green Building/Sustainable Design Program

The project supports the Board's policy for Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by incorporating energy efficient audio-visual equipment and lighting in the renovated conference room space.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Goal III, Realize Tomorrow's Government Today, Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, and Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets by investing in public infrastructure that will improve the operational effectiveness of an existing County asset.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The revised project budget, including design, plan check, consultant services, Civic Art allowance, construction, change order contingency, and County services, is estimated at \$2,551,000, which is \$451,000 more than the previously Board-approved project budget of \$2,100,000. The project budget and schedule are included in Enclosure A.

During the Fiscal Year 2021-22 Supplemental Budget, the Board approved the project to be funded with \$800,000 in net County cost. On June 28, 2022, the Board approved the transfer of \$900,000 from the Various-Refurbishments-General Refurbishments Project, Capital Project No. 86613, and \$400,000 from the Hall of Records Seventh Floor Renovation Project, Capital Project No. 87365, to the HOA Room 140 Refurbishment Project, Capital Project No. 87796.

Approval of the appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) will transfer \$451,000 from the Various-Refurbishments-General Refurbishments Project, Capital Project No. 86613, to the HOA Room 140 Refurbishment Project, Capital Project No. 87796, to fully fund the project.

Operating Budget Impact

No initial one-time, start-up costs or appreciable increases in ongoing maintenance and operational costs are anticipated due to the project.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy amended on August 4, 2020, the project budget includes one percent of the design and construction costs to be allocated to the Civic Art fund. If approved, the revised project budget will result in an increase in the Civic Art allocation from \$14,000 to \$17,000.

This project is subject to the Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

On June 28, 2022, the Board approved and found the project is exempt from CEQA. Public Works filed a Notice of Exemption for the project with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk on July 7, 2022.

The recommended actions are within the scope of the impacts analyzed in the previous exemption, and there have been no substantial changes to the project that require further review under CEQA.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

Public Works utilized a Board-approved, on-call consultant to complete the design.

On June 28, 2022, the Board authorized Public Works to carry out the construction using a Board-approved JOC.

The new furniture will be procured through the Internal Services Department as the County's Purchasing Agent with a Purchase Order(s).

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will have no impact on current County services or projects. Conference Room 140 will be closed throughout the construction period. All demolition and construction work that may be disruptive to building occupants will be scheduled outside of normal business hours so as not to disrupt County operations.

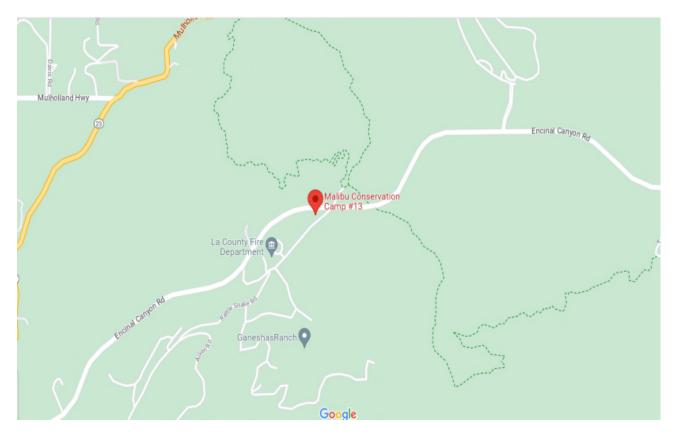

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the proposed Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project, and to adopt plans and specifications, advertise for construction bids, and authorize Public Works to award and execute a construction contract for the project.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD, ACTING AS THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CONSOLIDATED FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT:

- 1. Find that the proposed Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Approve the proposed Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project, Capital Project No. 88721, with project budget of \$2,077,000.
- Approve the appropriation adjustment to transfer \$454,000 from Fire Department Accumulated Capital Outlay Fund Services and Supplies to the Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project, Capital Project No. 88721 to fully fund the project.

- 4. Adopt plans and specifications that are on file with Public Works for construction of the proposed Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project, Capital Project No. 88721.
- 5. Instruct the Executive Officer of the Board to advertise the Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project for bids to be received and opened on July 26, 2023, in accordance with the Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisements.
- 6. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute a consultant services agreement with the apparent lowest responsive and responsible bidder to prepare a baseline construction schedule for a \$3,000 not-to-exceed amount funded by the project funds.
- 7. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to make the determination that a bid is nonresponsive and to reject a bid on that basis; to award to the next lowest responsive and responsible bidder; to waive inconsequential and nonmaterial deficiencies in bids submitted; and to determine, in accordance with the applicable contract and bid documents, whether the apparent lowest responsive and responsible bidder has timely prepared a satisfactory baseline construction schedule and satisfied all conditions for contract award. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to award and execute the construction contract, in the form previously approved by County Counsel, to the apparent lowest responsive and responsible bidder if the low bid can be awarded within the approved total budget; to establish the effective date of the contract upon receipt, by Public Works, of acceptable performance and payment bonds and evidence of required contractor insurance; and to take all other actions necessary and appropriate to deliver the Fire Camp 13 Reconstruction Project.
- 8. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute any easements, permits, and utility connection agreements necessary for the completion of the project, provided that the costs related to these easements, permits, and agreements do not cause the project to exceed the approved project budget.
- 9. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to carry out, manage, and deliver the project on behalf of the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County; award and execute consultant agreements, amendments, and supplements within the same authority and limits delegated to the Director of Public Works or his designee by the Board for County Capital Improvement Projects; accept the project; and release retention upon acceptance.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The recommended actions will find the proposed Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); approve the proposed project and budget and associated appropriation adjustment; adopt plans and specifications; advertise for construction bids; and authorize the Director of Public Works to award and execute a construction contract for the Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project.

Background

Fire Camp 13 is a fire suppression facility located at 1250 Encinal Canyon Road in the City of Malibu. Fire Camp 13 houses low security State inmates and is jointly operated by the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation. Under the supervision of the Fire District, inmates provide various fire prevention services, including the clearing of brush to create a defensible barrier around forest fires. The proposed Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project consists of replacing the California Department of Corrections officers sleeping quarters building and the training area canopy that were destroyed by the 2018 Woolsey fire, with new structures of the same size, and refurbishing the existing classroom building that was damaged by the 2018 Woolsey fire.

Plans, specifications, and jurisdictional approvals have been completed, and it is recommended that the Board adopt and advertise the plans and specifications for construction bids as required under the Public Contract Code.

In order to accelerate the delivery of the project, it is recommended that the Board authorize the Director of Public Works to award and execute a construction contract with the lowest responsive and responsible bidder if the low bid can be awarded within the total project budget approved by the Board.

The proposed consultant services agreement requires the apparent lowest responsive and responsible bidder to prepare a baseline construction schedule that conforms to the County of Los Angeles' schedule specification.

It is anticipated that construction of the project will begin in September 2023 and be substantially completed in December 2023.

Green Building/Sustainable Design Program

The proposed project is less than 10,000 square feet in size and is, therefore, not required to meet the Board's policy for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Gold certification. However, the project will be designed to support the Board's policy for Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by incorporating water and energy conservation features, enhancing indoor environmental quality by using low gas emitting building materials, and providing daylight through much of the building.

<u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, by investing in public infrastructure that will maximize the effectiveness of process, structure, and operations to support timely delivery of customer-oriented and efficient public service.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The budget for the proposed Fire Camp 13 Reconstruction Project is estimated at \$2,077,000, and includes plans and specifications, plan check, consultant services, construction, change order contingency, Civic Arts fee, miscellaneous expenditures, and County services. The project schedule and budget are included in Enclosure A.

The Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project is funded with \$1,616,000 transferred from various completed Fire District's Accumulated Capital Outlay – Fund (J13) Capital Projects. Approval of the proposed appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) will transfer \$454,000 from the Fire District's – Accumulated Capital Outlay Fund Services and Supplies to the Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project, Capital Project No. 88721, to fully fund the project.

Operational Budget Impact

The Fire District will be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the new buildings for the Fire Camp 13 Woolsey Fire Reconstruction Project. It will request ongoing funds to cover these costs as part of its Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget request.

There will be no impact to the current operating budget.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy amended on August 4, 2020, the proposed project budget includes one percent of eligible design and construction costs, in the amount of \$15,000, allocated to Civic Arts.

A standard construction contract will be used that contains terms and conditions supporting the Board's ordinances and policies including, but not limited to, the County's Greater Avenues for Independence and General Relief Opportunities for Work Programs, Contract Language to Assist in Placement of Displaced County Workers and Notice to Employees Regarding the Federal Earned Income Credit (Federal Income Tax Law, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015).

The plans and specifications include the contractual provisions, methods, and material requirements necessary for this project and are on file with Public Works, Business Relations and Contracts Division, 900 South Fremont Avenue, 8th Floor, Alhambra, CA 91803.

This project is subject to the Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed project is exempt from the provisions of CEQA. The project includes the reconstruction of a building and a canopy that were destroyed by fire and the repair and restoration of an existing building that was damaged by fire. The project is, therefore, within classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in accordance with State CEQA Guidelines Sections 15301 (a) and (d). and 15302 (a) and Classes 1 (c) and (d); and Class 2 (a) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G, which apply to repair, restoration and minor alteration of existing public structures with negligible or no expansion of use; and replacement of structures with new structures at the same site and with substantially the same size, purpose, and capacity. In addition, based on the project records, the project will comply with all applicable regulations, is not located in a sensitive environment, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable. Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk for each project in accordance with

Section 21152 of the Public Resources Code and will post the Notice to its website pursuant to Section 21092.2.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

Advertising for construction bids will be in accordance with the County's standard Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisements (Enclosure C).

This contract opportunity will be listed on the "Doing Business with Us" and "Do Business with Public Works" websites. Public Works will also inform the local small business enterprises about this business opportunity for those certified by the County of Los Angeles Department of Consumers and Business Affairs.

Participation by Community Business Enterprises (CBE) in the project is encouraged through Public Works' CBE Outreach Program and by monitoring the good faith efforts of bidders to utilize CBE.

Approval of the recommended actions will have no impact on current County services or projects.

SUBJECT

The proposed Residential Design Standards Ordinance (Ordinance) will amend Los Angeles County Code (County Code) Title 22 (Planning and Zoning) (Title 22) to incorporate development standards applicable to residential projects, including mixed-use projects that include a residential component, throughout the unincorporated County. The development standards are intended to ensure residential projects are designed in a manner that integrates them into existing neighborhood contexts and to foster walkable, livable, and healthy neighborhoods that enhance the comfort of residents and the experience of the public.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD, AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING:

- 1. Find that the adoption of the Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA);
- 2. Indicate its intent to adopt the Ordinance (Advance Planning Project No. RPPL2021010116) as recommended by the Regional Planning Commission (RPC); and



3. Instruct County Counsel to prepare the necessary documents for the Ordinance and submit them to the Board of Supervisors (Board) for its consideration.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

On June 1, 2021, the Board approved a contract with Gruen Associates to assist the Department of Regional Planning (Regional Planning) in preparing Residential Design Standards to promote a built environment that is safe, accessible, and attractive.

The proposed Ordinance is a response to various state laws that direct how local jurisdictions can approve residential projects. One such law, SB 35, required the County to approve residential projects that met certain criteria through a ministerial process. The County's By-Right Housing Ordinance implements the requirements of this law at the County level by allowing many residential projects to be approved through a ministerial process. Another such law, SB 330, further directed how local jurisdictions can approve residential projects. For example, this law requires that local jurisdictions can only subject residential projects to objective design standards.

Taken together, these state laws and the County's implementing ordinances significantly reduced Regional Planning Staff's discretion when reviewing residential projects. Therefore, amending Title 22 to require that residential projects comply with specific, objective development standards, as defined by the state, is the only way to empower Regional Planning Staff to ensure that a residential project is well designed.

The proposed Ordinance applies to new single-family residences (SFRs) and additions to existing SFRs, new multi-family residences with more than one housing unit (MFRs) and additions to existing MFRs, and new mixed-use projects that include a residential component. The proposed Ordinance does not apply to interior remodels that do not add square footage or change the building footprint, rebuilds of existing buildings, non-conforming uses, and mobile and manufactured homes.

The proposed Ordinance's primary aim is to ensure a baseline level of design quality while offering design flexibility and options for property owners, architects, and designers. In many instances, a development standard can be met by implementing one of several identified options. The proposed Ordinance provides clear and easily implementable design standards based on building typology, use, and scale. The standards build upon existing adopted policies to improve residential projects by promoting a high-quality built environment, responding to community and environmental contexts, and equitably supporting all mobility types.

The development standards include flexibility and a range of design options to avoid a "one size fits all" approach and acknowledge the wide variety of environments in the unincorporated County. The development standards are grouped into the following categories: building site and access; front yards and building orientation; ground floor treatments; building articulation;

balconies and patios; building façade details; landscaping, walls, fences, and screening; and vehicle parking facilities.

This proposed Ordinance applies throughout the unincorporated County. However, if a development standard in the Ordinance conflicts with community-specific zoning requirements, such as Community Standards Districts and Specific Plans, the community-specific zoning requirements will prevail. Additionally, future community-specific planning efforts can rely upon the Ordinance's development standards to address design-related development issues.

On April 5, 2023, the RPC held a public hearing and voted unanimously to recommend adoption of the proposed Ordinance by the Board. A summary of the RPC proceedings is included as Attachment 4. The RPC's resolution is included as Attachment 5.

<u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

The proposed Ordinance supports the County's Strategic Plan Goal I: Make Investments that Transform Lives and Goal II: Foster Vibrant and Resilient Communities. The proposed Ordinance will improve the design of residential projects throughout the unincorporated County to ensure they are designed in a manner that integrates them into existing neighborhood contexts and to ensure that residential projects are designed to foster walkable, livable, and healthy neighborhoods that enhance the comfort of all residents and the experience of the public.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

Adoption of the proposed Ordinance will not result in any significant new costs to Regional Planning or other County departments and agencies.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the public hearing conducted by RPC on April 5, 2023, a public hearing before the Board is required pursuant to County Code Section 22.232.040.B.1 and California Government Code Section 65856. Required notice was given pursuant to the procedures and requirements set forth in County Code Section 22.222.180.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The proposed Ordinance is exempt from CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3) and is consistent with the finding by the State Secretary for Natural Resources or by local guidelines that this activity is covered by the common-sense exemption that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment. The proposed Ordinance does not trigger or prompt the construction or alteration of facilities nor does it alter the intended land uses and development intensities planned for at

any location by the General Plan, its component Area, Community, and Specific Plans, or by Title 22. These regulations do not create a change in land use or density for any of the properties located within the unincorporated County. Future development subject to the Ordinance has either already been evaluated under CEQA at the Plan level or will undergo CEQA review as part of a discretionary review process at the project-specific level consistent with CEQA requirements.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Adoption of the proposed Ordinance will not significantly impact County services.
