REQUEST TO ACCEPT COMPROMISE OFFER OF SETTLEMENT FOR PATIENT SEEN UNDER THE TRAUMA CENTER SERVICE AGREEMENT (ALL SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS) (3 VOTES)

SUBJECT

To request the Los Angeles County (LA County) Board of Supervisors (Board) approval for the Director of Health Services (Director), or designee, to accept a compromise offer of settlement for a patient who received medical care at either a LA County facility and/or at a non-County operated facility under the Trauma Center Service Agreement. The compromise offer of settlement referenced below is not within the Director's authority to accept.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

Authorize the Director, or designee, to accept the attached compromise offer of settlement, pursuant to Section 1473 of the Health and Safety Code, for the patients who received medical care at Los Angeles Harbor UCLA Medical Center:

Account Number 1035283941 in the amount of \$17,500.00 (Attachment I).

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The compromise offer of settlement for this patient account is recommended because the patient is unable to pay the full amount of charges and the compromise offer represents the maximum amount the Department of Health Services (DHS) was able to negotiate or was offered.

It is in the best interest of LA County to approve the acceptance of the compromise offer, as it will enable the DHS to maximize net revenue on this account.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended action will support Strategy III.3 "Pursue for Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability" of LA County's Strategic Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The approval will recover revenue totaling \$17,500.00 in charges.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Under LA County Code Chapter Section 2.76.046, the Director, or designee, has the authority to reduce patient account liabilities by the greater of i) \$15,000, or ii) \$75,000 or 50 percent of the account balance, whichever is less. Any reduction exceeding the Director's, or designee's, authority requires Board approval.

On January 15, 2002, the Board adopted an ordinance granting the Director, or designee, authority to compromise or reduce patient account liabilities when it is in the best interest of LA County to do so.

On November 1, 2005, the Board approved a revised ordinance granting the Director, or designee, authority to reduce, on an account specific basis, the amount of any liability owed to LA County which relates to medical care provided by third parties for which LA County is contractually obligated to pay and related to which LA County has subrogation or reimbursement rights. The revised ordinance was adopted by the Board on December 8, 2005.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Maximizing net revenues on patients who received medical care at LA County facilities will help DHS meet its budgeted revenue amounts.

SUBJECT

Request approval to execute amendments to two Master Agreement Work Orders to increase funding for additional media services effective various terms.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Approve and instruct the Director of the Department of Public Health (Public Heath), or designee, to execute Amendment Number 13, to Master Agreement Work Order (MAWO) Number PH-003516-W1, with Entercom California, LLC (Entercom) for the provision of HIV and STD Social Marketing Media Services, substantially similar to Exhibit I, to increase the annual maximum obligation by \$301,145 from \$700,000 to \$1,001,145, for the period effective July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024, 100 percent funded by Tobacco Settlement Funds (TSF), and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Integrated HIV Programs for Health Departments to Support Ending the HIV Epidemic (EHE) in the United States funds.
- 2. Approve and instruct the Director of the Public Heath, or designee, to execute Amendment Number 2 to MAWO Number PH-003527-W2, with Rescue Agency Public Benefit, LLC (Rescue) for the provision of EHE Media Campaign Services, substantially similar to Exhibit I, to increase the total maximum obligation by

\$3,300,000, from \$2,516,667 to \$5,816,667, for the period effective March 1, 2023 through July 31, 2025, 100 percent funded by Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), EHE: A Plan for America - Ryan White Program (RWP) funds and TSF.

- 3. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute future amendments to the MAWOs referenced in Recommendations 1 and 2, that extend the term through June 30, 2025, for MAWO Number PH-003527-W2 and July 31, 2027, for MAWO Number PH-003516-W1, at amounts to be determined by the Director of Public Health, contingent upon the availability of funds and contractor performance; provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 10 percent above or below each period's revised annual base maximum obligation, effective upon amendment execution or at the beginning of the applicable contract period; update the statement of work and/or scope of work, as necessary, and/or corrections of errors in the contract's terms and conditions, subject to review and approval by County Counsel, and notification to your Board and the Chief Executive Office.
- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to immediately suspend or terminate any contract upon issuing a written notice to contractors who fail to perform and/or fully comply with Contract requirements; and to terminate contracts for convenience by providing a 30-calendar day advance written notice to Contractors.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of Recommendation 1 will allow Public Health to increase funding to MAWO Number PH-003516-W1 with Entercom to support the launch of a PrEP campaign targeting African-Americans across wider geographic areas and to create a promotional campaign for the LA Condom website, purchase additional condoms to be distributed to partners throughout Los Angeles County (LAC), and partner with social media influencers related to condom availability and distribution.

Approval of Recommendation 2 will allow Public Health to increase funding to MAWO Number PH-003527-W2 with Rescue to support the expansion of the RWP informational and promotional campaigns intended to promote services for RWP eligible clients in targeted geographic areas with high HIV morbidity, develop and expand the geographic reach of syphilis campaigns, launch an educational campaign related to Doxy-PEP, a medication used to prevent the transmission of syphilis, gonorrhea, and chlamydia; and to update Public Health's GetProtectedLA and I'M+LA websites to be more interactive and user friendly.

Approval of Recommendation 3 will allow Public Health to execute amendments to MAWO PH-003516-W1 and MAWO PH-003527-W2, to extend the term; increase or decrease funding up to 10 percent above or below each period's annual base maximum obligation; update the statement of work and/or scope of work; and/or correct errors in the contract's terms and conditions, as necessary.

Approval of Recommendation 4 will allow Public Health to immediately suspend or terminate contracts with contractors who fail to perform and/or fully comply with program requirements, and to terminate contracts for convenience by providing a 30-calendar days' advance written notice to contractors.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support Strategy 1.2, Enhance Our Delivery of Comprehensive Interventions, of the County's Strategic Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total cost to amend the two MAWOs is \$3,601,145, 100 percent funded by HRSA EHE, CDC EHE and TSF.

The increase in funding to MAWO Number PH-003516-W1 with Entercom, consists of \$301,145, increasing the maximum obligation from \$700,000 to \$1,001,145, for the period of July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024.

The increase in funding to MAWO Number PH-003527-W2 with Rescue is a total of \$3,300,000, increasing the total maximum obligation from \$2,516,667 to \$5,816,667 for the periods of March 1, 2023, through July 31, 2025.

There is no net County cost associated with this action.

Funding is included in Public Health's Adopted Budget for fiscal year (FY) 2023-24 and will be included in future FYs as necessary.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

County Counsel has reviewed and approved Exhibit I as to form.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

Entercom

On June 5, 2019, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority for Public Health to enter into a new MAWO PH-003516-W1 with Entercom for the provision of HIV and STD Social Marketing services, as a result of a MAWO solicitation, in the amount of \$2,400,000 for the period effective July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2022.

On June 16, 2020, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority to amend MAWO PH-003516-W1 with Entercom to increase the annual funding by \$100,000, increasing the annual maximum obligation from \$1,000,000 to \$1,100,000 for

the period of July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2020, for a bulk purchase supply of condoms to be distributed to DHSP-funded community providers to promote positive sexual health choices.

On June 29, 2022, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority to amend MAWO PH-003516-W1 with Entercom, to extend the period for 12 months effective July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023, at an annual maximum obligation of \$700,000.

On April 19, 2023, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority to amend MAWO PH-003516-W1 with Entercom to increase the annual funding by \$70,000, increasing the annual maximum obligation from \$700,000 to \$770,000, for the term effective July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023, to support operating costs, outreach materials, advertising, and marketing costs to support the Don't Think Know campaign, and for creative design adjustments across the various campaigns.

On June 27, 2023, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority to amend MAWO PH-003516-W1 with Entercom, to extend the term for an additional 12 months effective July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024, at an annual maximum obligation of \$700,000.

Rescue

On February 6, 2023, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority for Public Health to enter into a new MAWO Number PH-003527-W2, with Rescue, as a result of a MAWO solicitation for the provision of Ending the HIV Epidemic Media Campaign Services in the amount of \$2,416,667, effective May 16, 2023, through July 31, 2025.

On November 14, 2023, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority to amend MAWO PH-003527-W2, with Rescue to increase the annual funding by \$100,000, increasing the annual maximum obligation from \$1,000,000 to \$1,100,000, for the term effective March 1, 2023, through February 29, 2024, to purchase additional ad space for social marketing campaigns as part of the continued implementation of EHE activities for RWP eligible clients in targeted areas of LAC.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will allow Public Health to support additional HIV and STD media campaigns as part of the continued implementation of RWP and EHE activities in LAC.

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2019, the County and Contractor entered into Master Agreement Work Order (MAWO) Number PH-003516-W1 to provide HIV and STD Social Marketing Services; and

WHEREAS, on July 3, 2018, the Board of Supervisors delegated authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute amendments to MAWO Number PH-003516-W1; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the parties hereto to amend the MAWO to increase the budget in the amount of \$301,145 for the period of July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024, to support operating costs for Syphilis outreach materials, advertising and marketing costs for the Pre-Exposure Prophylactic (PrEP) campaign and *Don't Think, Know* campaign, and creative design adjustments across the two campaigns, and make certain other modifications to the MAWO; and

WHEREAS, Master Agreement provides that changes in accordance to Paragraph 8.1, Amendments, may be made in the form of an amendment which is formally approved and executed by the parties; and

WHEREAS, Contractor warrants that it continues to possess the competence, expertise,

and personnel necessary to provide services consistent with the requirements of the MAWO.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. This amendment is effective upon execution for the period of July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024.
- 2. Attachment B5, Scope of Work, is deleted in its entirety and replaced with Attachment B5-REVISED, Scope of Work, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, is added to the MAWO.
 - 3. Schedule C5, Line-Item Budget, is deleted in its entirety and replaced

with Schedule C5-REVISED, Line-Item Budget, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. All references in the MAWO to "Schedule C5, Line-Item Budget" are deemed amended to state "Schedule C5-REVISED, Line-Item Budget".

4. Paragraph 6.0, FUNDING SOURCE, is deleted in its entirety and replaced as follows:

5. Paragraph 7.0, MAXIMUM TOTAL COST AND PAYMENT, Subparagraph,7.1 is deleted in its entirety and replaced as follows:

"7.0 MAXIMUM TOTAL COST AND PAYMENT:

7.1 Effective July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2024, the Maximum Total Cost that County will pay Contractor for all services provided under this MAWO for media services will not exceed \$4,271,145 comprised of: 1) \$1,100,000 funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Integrated HIV Surveillance and Prevention Programs (CDC IHSPP) funds and STD net County cost for the period of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020; 2) \$700,000 funded by CDC IHSPP funds for the period of July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021; 3) \$700,000 funded by CDC IHSPP funds for the period of July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022, 4) \$770,000 funded by CDC IHSPP and HRSA EHE funds for the period of July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023; and 5) \$1,001,145 funded by CDC IHSPP, CDC EHE, Tobacco Settlement funds, and HRSA EHE funds for the period of July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024, as set forth in Attachments C (Schedule C1, Schedule C1.1-REVISED, Schedule C2, Schedule C3, Schedule C4, Schedule C4-REVISED, Schedule C5 and

Schedule C5-REVISED), Budgets, attached hereto and incorporated herein. Federal Award Information for this MAWO is detailed in Attachment L.1-REVISED, Notice of Federal Subaward Information, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference."

<u>SUBJECT</u>

Public Works is seeking Board approval to execute four construction change orders with Hensel Phelps Construction Company and execute agreements with the Los Angeles County Sanitation and Flood Control Districts for the Harbor-UCLA Medical Center Replacement Program.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the scope of work to be carried out by the proposed change orders is within the scope of the environmental impacts analyzed in the previously certified Final Environmental Impact Report and subsequent Addenda Nos. 1, 2, and 3 for the Harbor-UCLA Medical Center Campus Master Plan.
- 2. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$3,000,000, to construct irrigation systems along Medical Foundation Drive, South Drive, and Meyler Street.
- Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$2,000,000, for infrastructure to support additional Laboratory equipment.

- 4. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,900,000, for the design and construction of a security booth and security fencing around the Central Plant and Loading Dock.
- 5. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,700,000, to demolish buildings within the footprint of Inpatient Tower, including demolition of utilities serving the buildings.
- 6. Approve and delegate authority to the Chief Executive Officer or her designee to execute Buildover Agreements with the Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts to allow Public Works to construct portions of the Replacement Program over the permanent easement held by the Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts.
- 7. Approve and delegate authority to the Chief Executive Officer or her designee to execute Buildover Agreements with the Los Angeles County Flood Control District to allow Public Works to construct portions of the Replacement Program over the permanent easement held by the Los Angeles County Flood Control District.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the scope of work in the proposed change orders is within the scope of the previously certified Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) and subsequent Addenda Nos. 1, 2, and 3; authorize Public Works to execute four change orders, for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$8,600,000 within the Board approved project budget of \$1,695,000,000, with Hensel Phelps Construction Company; and approve and authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute agreements with the LA County Sanitation and Flood Control Districts to construct buildings that will encroach onto their permanent easements for the Harbor-UCLA Medical Center (H-UCLA MC) Replacement Program.

Background

Senate Bill 1953 mandates that all California General Acute-Care Hospitals meet structural and nonstructural seismic strengthening requirements by January 1, 2030. The H-UCLA MC Replacement Program will not only bring the hospital in compliance with the mandate but also consolidate inpatient and outpatient services into new buildings that optimize operational effectiveness, reduce operation and maintenance costs, provide outpatient facilities that accommodate planned patient visits, implement sustainability, and create a campus designed for the well-being of patients and staff. The program

includes construction of an Outpatient/Support Building; an Inpatient Tower Building with 346 inpatient beds, including 36 psychiatric beds, new psychiatric emergency department, and permanent rooftop helistop; a 1,500-stall above-grade parking structure; a new Central Utility Plant to serve new buildings under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Health Care Access and Information; a new Support Services Building for the campus Information Technology and Facilities staff; a new Regional Laboratory; and related make-ready work, such as new surface lots, 66-kilovolt electrical substation, 12-kilovolt electrical building, and tenant improvements.

On February 8, 2022, the Board approved a total project budget of \$1,695,000,000 for the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program. The project budget included a stipulated sum design-build contract with Hensel Phelps for a maximum not-to-exceed contract sum of \$1,238,179,000; inclusive of a \$1,112,179,000 stipulated sum contract plus a \$30,000,000 Design Completion Allowance and a \$96,000,000 Medical Equipment Allowance. The Board letter also delegated authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to approve change orders for a maximum \$750,000 subject to the limits that the aggregate amount of all such delegated authority change orders does not exceed 25 percent of the original contract amount as set forth in Public Contract Code Section 20145.

On March 1, 2022, the Board approved the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$4,300,000, to procure and install the modular buildings for the proposed Department of Mental Health (DMH) Adult Outpatient Interim Facility Project under the total \$6,500,000 budget, which includes construction, make-ready work, and associated soft costs within the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program designated for DMH Outpatient Programs.

On June 14, 2022, the Board approved the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$6,000,000, to demolish buildings within the footprint of Parking Structure A, including the make-ready work of relocation of services within the respective buildings and relocation of utilities to maintain utility services to buildings that remain; the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,200,000, to demolish buildings within the footprint of Inpatient Tower, including demolition of utilities serving the buildings; and the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$4,000,000, to procure and install site offices for Public Works at Parking Lot V, including the make-ready work of abatement and demolition of the existing buildings on the site.

Design and construction of the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program is ongoing and on scheduled to be completed by August 2027.

Proposed Change Orders: The recommended actions will approve four construction change orders with Hensel Phelps within the Board-approved project budget of \$1,695,000,000 (see Enclosure A). Two of the four proposed change orders will transfer scope, which was previously planned as make-ready work to be carried out through low-bid or Job Order Contracts (JOC), to the Hensel Phelps' scope of work. One proposed change order completes the Laboratory Equipment programming and design, which had not been previously completed due to time restraints prior to the Request for Proposal being issued, and one proposed change order will incorporate user requests for added fencing that were made during the design development.

New Irrigation Systems: The proposed change order is for a \$3,000,000 not-to-exceed fee, and includes the installation of the irrigation main and branch piping along Medical Foundation Drive and South Drive/Meyler Street. This proposed change order will transfer scope, which was previously planned as make-ready work, to Hensel Phelps' scope of work. This will allow Hensel Phelps to install the irrigation systems during the course of their work in these areas. It will also avoid Hensel Phelps from having to protect the system in place if installed by the make ready contractor.

Laboratory Equipment: The proposed change order is for a \$2,000,000 not-to-exceed fee, and includes the design and construction of infrastructure, electrical, low voltage, medical gases, plumbing, mechanical, and seismic bracing, to support additional laboratory equipment that was not identified in the Criteria Documents. At the time of Criteria Document finalization, the Department of Health Services' (DHS) laboratory consultant had completed partial scoping of the services to be provided by the new laboratory building. The design completed by Hensel Phelps in conjunction with DHS identified additional testing and laboratory equipment required for full functionality of the laboratory. This proposed change order is an additional scope that will be funded via construction contingency.

Security Fencing Around Central Plant and Loading Dock: The proposed change order is for a \$1,900,000 not-to-exceed fee and includes the design and installation of a fence and gates around the Central Plant parking lot and adjacent Loading Dock, which will secure the Central Plant, Loading Dock, and associated parking lots allowing only staff and approved vendor access and increasing pedestrian safety. The entrance to the secure area will include a security booth with electrical, mechanical, and security camera and monitors. This proposed change order is an additional scope that will be funded via construction contingency.

Inpatient Tower Enabling Work: On June 14, 2022, the Board-approved a proposed change order for a \$1,200,000 not-to-exceed fee for design and construction services to demolish, abate, and clear the current site of Buildings D-4.5, D-5, D-5.5, D-6, and D-9 and associated utilities. Due to additional scope required, including unforeseen utility rerouting, the proposed change order will add to a \$1,700,000 not-to-exceed fee. This

proposed change order will transfer scope, which was previously planned as make-ready work to be carried out through JOC, to Hensel Phelps' scope of work. This will facilitate the expedited demolition of existing buildings and utilities and avoid impacts to the program's schedule.

Sanitation and Flood Control Agreements

Some of the new buildings on the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program will encroach in or cross over the permanent easements for sanitary sewer lines and storm drain culverts, held by LA County Sanitation District and LA County Flood Control District, respectively, that serve the campus. Approval to execute the Buildover Agreements with LA County Sanitation District (sample included in Enclosure B) and LA County Flood Control District (sample included in Enclosure C) will allow Public Works to construct buildings over these permanent easements.

DMH Adult Outpatient Interim Facility Project

The construction of the DMH Adult Outpatient Interim Facility Project, which includes procurement and installation of modular buildings (approximately 13,500 square feet), new utility connections, and associated site work is approximately 95 percent complete. Due to unforeseen conditions; such as deteriorated existing electrical infrastructure requiring replacement, inclement weather requiring wet soil remediation, and grades not aligning with existing survey information requiring redesign of sidewalks and driveways; and agency having jurisdiction comments, including the requirement to add a new fire hydrant; the project will exceed the \$6,500,000 funding amount by approximately \$637,000. DMH will fund the budget shortfall outside of the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program.

Green Building/Sustainable Design Program

On December 20, 2016, the Board adopted a new Leadership in Energy and Environmental Development (LEED) policy requiring all new County buildings greater than 10,000 square feet in size, to achieve LEED Gold Certification except for the parking structure because the United States Green Building Council no longer provides LEED certificates for parking structures. Additionally, the program will continue to support the Board's Policy for Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by recycling disposable material; incorporating energy efficient products during construction; and incorporating native, drought-tolerant landscaping.

<u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County's Strategic Plan: Strategy II.1, Drive Economic Development in the Community; Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our

Communities; and Strategy II.1.3, Coordinate Workforce Development by investing in the wellness our communities and enhancing the delivery of comprehensive and seamless healthcare services to the residents of the County seeking healthcare assistance.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

Approval of the recommended actions will allow Public Works to issue change orders to Hensel Phelps for a not-to-exceed amount of \$8,600,000. Public Works has reviewed the change orders and finds their value to be in line with the cost of the work included in the project budget. There is sufficient funding in the \$1,695,000,000 project budget approved by the Board on February 8, 2022, to cover the cost of the proposed change orders. Enclosure A reflects the reallocation of funding for these change orders for the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program.

DMH has allocated additional funding funded by the 2011 Realignment Mental Health fund which is currently budgeted in Capital Project Number 87995, Adult Outpatient Interim Facilities – DMH, to cover the budget shortfall of the \$637,000, for the Adult Outpatient Interim Facility Project outside of the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program.

There is no net County cost impact associated with the recommended actions.

Operating Budget Impact

Following completion of the project, DHS will request and fund annual ongoing maintenance and operational costs, as needed, with departmental resources in future budget phases.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy, adopted on December 7, 2002, and last amended on August 4, 2020, the project budget for the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program includes \$2,000,000 Civic Art allocation, which is greater than the \$1,000,000 maximum required by the Board's policy. The \$2,000,000 Civic Art allocation will not be impacted by the proposed change orders.

Section 20137 of the Public Contract Code allows the Board, with a four-fifths vote, to authorize an individual change order to a construction contract that is 10 percent or less of the original contract amount without having to obtain bids for the work. Each of the five proposed change orders are less than 10 percent of the original contract sum and are, therefore, within the statutory threshold.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The recommended actions are within the scope of the impacts analyzed in the FEIR, certified on December 16, 2016, and subsequent Addenda Nos. 1, 2, and 3, approved on November 10, 2020; November 10, 2020; and February 8, 2022, respectively, and there have been no substantial changes to the project or to the circumstances under which it will be undertaken that require further findings under California Environmental Quality Act. These activities, which include demolition, utility work, construction of fencing, installation of infrastructure for laboratory equipment, and execution of Buildover Agreements, are within the scope of work approved by the Board on February 8, 2022, and analyzed in the FEIR and Addendum No. 3. The Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program, Environmental Findings of Fact, and Statement of Overriding Considerations adopted at the time of FEIR certification will continue to apply.

The location and custodian of the documents and other materials constituting the record of the proceedings upon which the Board's decision is based in this matter is with Public Works, Project Management Division I, 900 South Fremont Avenue, Fifth Floor, Alhambra, California 91803. The previously certified FEIR and Addenda are available at the location above and can also be viewed online at https://pw.lacounty.gov/harbor-ucla-rp/.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Determination with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and with the State Office of Planning and Research in accordance with Section 21152 (a) of the California Public Resources Code and will post the Notice of Determination to its website pursuant to Section 21092.2.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

To date, Public Works has executed 13 allowance relocation contract amendments for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$59,968,505. Additionally, Public Works has executed 49 contract amendments under delegated change order authority for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$4,542,301. Of the \$11,200,000 approved in the previous Board letter, \$9,017,355 is still pending execution of contract amendments.

The proposed four change orders for \$3,000,000; \$2,000,000; \$1,900,000; and \$1,700,000 not-to-exceed amounts represent 0.24, 0.16, 0.15, and 0.18 percent, respectively, of the original maximum contract sum of \$1,238,179,000. When executed, the change orders will increase the maximum contract sum to \$1,252,721,301.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

The recommended change orders are within the Design Builders limits of work and will not result in any additional impacts to the current services located on the H-UCLA MC Campus.

BUILDOVER AGREEMENT NO. 329

This Buildover Agreement ("Agreement") is dated _______, 2023, ("Effective Date") and is between County of Los Angeles (the "Owner") and County Sanitation District No. 5 of Los Angeles County (the "District"). The Owner and the District are collectively referred to in this Agreement as the "Parties."

The Owner is vested with fee title to the following described real property located at 1000 W Carson St, City of Torrance, County of Los Angeles, State of California:

A tract of land over a portion of Tract 3239 as recorded in Book 37, pages 27 and 28 of Maps in the office of the Recorder of County of Los Angeles County (the "Property").

The District is a county sanitation district organized and existing under the provisions of the County Sanitation District Act, California Health and Safety Code Section 4700 *et seq.* and is the holder of permanent easements (the "Easement Area") for sanitary sewer purposes in and under the Property (the "Easements"), located as shown on Exhibit A. The Easements were recorded March 14, 1968, in Book D3940, Page 61 of Official Records in the office of the County Recorder of Los Angeles County; and October 27, 2016 as document number 20161326878 of Official Records in the office of the County Recorder of Los Angeles County.

The Owner desires to construct facility shops and a parking structure, which includes excavation and compaction, grade changes, buried utilities, curb and paving, and landscaping on the Property (the "Improvements") that will encroach on the Easements in the area shown on Exhibit A as the "Buildover Area."

Construction of the Improvements has the potential to impair the operation of, injure, or damage the District's sewer and other facilities that are located in the Easement Area unless construction is carried out in strict conformance with the provisions of this Agreement.

The District is willing to permit construction of the Improvements in the Easement Area upon the Owner's execution of this Agreement.

The Parties therefore agree as follows:

1. The Owner shall prepare and submit detailed plans of the Improvements to the District's Chief Engineer and General Manager ("Chief Engineer") for review and approval. The Improvements shall not impede the District's access to any sewer manholes located within

the Easement Area. Upon the Chief Engineer's approval of the plans, the Owner may construct the Improvements in the Buildover Area in strict conformance with the approved plans. Upon the Owner's completion of the construction of the Improvements in strict conformance with the approved plans, the Owner may operate and maintain the Improvements in the Buildover Area in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

- 2. The District makes no representation to the Owner concerning the nature, type, condition or degree of compaction of the backfill located within the Buildover Area. If the backfill within the Buildover Area settles, or is unstable or unusable for the Owner's proposed use, or if the Owner for any reason removes or treats the backfill, then the Owner shall be solely responsible for the related cost and expense with no right of reimbursement from the District.
- 3. The Owner shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the District, its officers, agents, and employees, from and against any claims, actions, cost, liabilities, losses, damages or expenditures sustained or incurred by the District arising from or relating to the construction, operation, or maintenance of the Improvements.
- 4. The Owner shall not make or prosecute any claims, demands, or actions against the District, or any of its officers, employees, or agents for any injury to or death of any person or damage to property that arises out of the construction of the Improvements or the exercise of the rights provided by this Agreement, including but not limited to damages to or destruction of the Improvements except to the extent that such claims arise from the gross negligence or willful misconduct of the District, its employees, agents and contractors.
- 5. The Owner (or its contractor performing the work) shall by proper endorsement delivered to the District prior to the commencement of any work, name the District as an additional insured on the general liability insurance policy furnished in conjunction with the construction of the Improvements.
- 6. The Owner, for itself and its successors and assigns, hereby grants to the District, its agents, representatives, officers and employees all rights of ingress and egress over the Property to the Easement Area including those in the Buildover Area, for any purpose.
- 7. The Owner shall not perform, or allow to be performed, any grading, soil removal, soil fill, or other construction activities within the Easement Area without on-site oversight, inspection, and approval of the proposed activities by a District inspector. The Owner shall contact the District's Wastewater Collection Systems Manager, at (310) 638-1161, a minimum of two (2) weeks prior to the start of any construction to arrange for inspection. The Owner acknowledges that gravity sewers are not necessarily identified in the statemandated underground excavation notification system.
- 8. The Owner shall support and protect the sewer in place during construction of the Improvements, and shall exercise extreme caution during excavation in the vicinity of the District's facilities. The Owner shall hand excavate within two feet vertically or horizontally of any District facility. Methods for supporting and/or protecting the sewer shall be provided for review prior to the start of the work. The Owner shall accept all liability and will be responsible for all costs and expenses for any repairs of the District's

facilities resulting from the Owner's non-compliance with the conditions of this paragraph. The determination of the existence of any damage and the proper method of repair will be at the sole discretion of the Chief Engineer.

9. The benefits and the burdens created by this Agreement touch and concern the land described in the Easements. This Agreement constitutes a covenant running with the land and is binding upon the Owner's heirs, executors, administrators, successors in interest and assigns. The District shall record this Agreement.

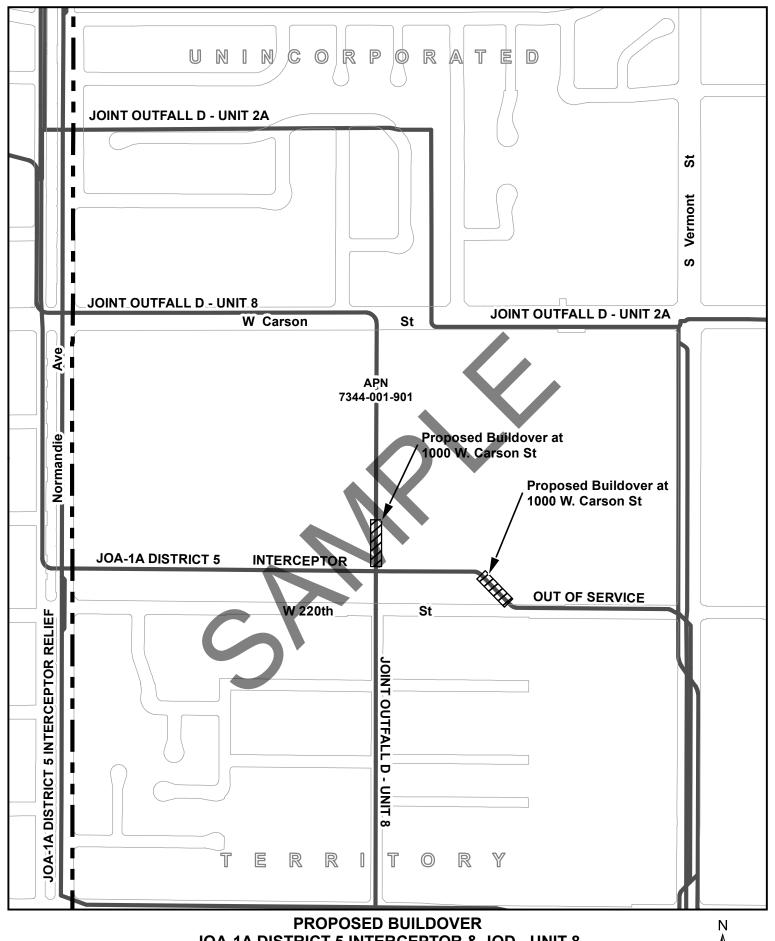

COVENANT AND AGREEMENT REGARDING STORM DRAIN/CHANNEL OVER-BUILD: [208th Street Drain]

County of Los Angeles (hereinafter referred to as Owner) is the owner of the real property (hereinafter referred to as the Subject Property) identified by Assessor Identification No. 734-4001-901, located in the County of Los Angeles, State of California, and legally described in Exhibit 1, attached hereto.

The Los Angeles County Flood Control District (LACFCD) holds an easement for flood control and ingress/egress purposes (hereinafter referred to as Easement) over a portion of Subject Property, recorded with the Office of the County Registrar-Recorder on December 19, 1985 and September 15, 2011 as Document No. OR 85-1498464 and OR 20111256483, respectively, and has constructed, operates, and maintains a flood control facility within Easement (208th Street Drain).

Owner proposes to construct certain improvements (hereinafter referred to as the Owner's Improvements) for the benefit of Subject Property, within Easement, as described in and authorized by Flood Control Permit No. FCDP2022000529 (Permit) issued by the LACFCD.

As a condition of the LACFCD's issuance of the Permit, for the construction of Owner's Improvements within the Easement, Owner does hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Maintenance of Owner's Improvements

- Owner shall maintain Owner's Improvements so as not to interfere with the LACFCD's use of Easement, at any time, or cause any damage to any facilities of the LACFCD.
- In the event the LACFCD determines that Owner's Improvements are interfering with the LACFCD's use of Easement, the LACFCD will provide written notice thereof to Owner and Owner shall apply for and obtain a Flood Control Permit from the LACFCD to repair, modify, or remove Owner's Improvements to eliminate the interference and shall complete said repair, modification, or removal at no cost to the LACFCD, within of the time period specified in the

- written notice or such other time period as may be agreed to, in writing, by the LACFCD.
- 3. If Owner fails to complete repair, modification, or removal, under Section No. 2, above, in a timely manner, the LACFCD may, in its sole discretion, perform said repair, modification, or removal and provide an invoice to Owner for the actual costs incurred by the LACFCD in performing said repair, modification, or removal. Owner shall reimburse the LACFCD for the costs identified in the invoice within 30 days of the date of the invoice or such other date as may be agreed to, in writing, by the LACFCD.
- 4. In the event that Owner or Owner's Improvements cause damage to any facility of the LACFCD, Owner shall reimburse the LACFCD for the actual costs incurred by the LACFCD in repairing such damage. Such costs shall be identified in an invoice provided by the LACFCD to Owner, and Owner shall pay said invoice within 30 days of the date of the invoice or such other date as may be agreed to, in writing, by the LACFCD.

Maintenance, Repair, Replacement, or Alteration of the LACECD's Facility

- 5. Owner shall make reasonable efforts to cooperate with the LACFCD in the LACFCD's maintenance and repair activities related to 208th Street Drain, including providing reasonable access to the Easement area for LACFCD personnel.
- In the event that the LACFCD determines to repair, replace, or alter its facility located within Easement and that Owner's Improvements will interfere or be incompatible with the repair, replacement, or alteration, the LACFCD will provide written notice thereof to Owner and Owner shall apply for and obtain a Flood Control Permit from the LACFCD to remove, modify, or relocate Owner's Improvements, at no cost to the LACFCD, as the LACFCD determines is necessary to enable the LACFCD to perform said repair or replacement work or alteration of the facility. Owner shall complete said removal, modification, or relocation within of the time period specified in the written notice from the LACFCD or such other time period as may be agreed to, in writing, by the LACFCD.
- 7. If Owner fails to complete said removal, modification, or relocation in a timely manner, the LACFCD may, in its sole discretion, remove, modify, or relocate Owner's Improvements as necessary to enable the LACFCD to repair, replace or alter its facilities, and provide an invoice to Owner for the actual costs incurred by the LACFCD in performing said removal, modification or alteration. Owner shall reimburse the LACFCD for the costs identified in the invoice within 30 days of the date of the invoice or such other date as may be agreed to, in writing, by the LACFCD.

<u>Lien for Unpaid Invoices</u>

- 8. In the event Owner fails to pay any invoice described in above, the unpaid amount of the invoice shall constitute a lien on Subject Property and the LACFCD may record a notice of the lien against Subject Property.
- 9. If a notice of lien has been recorded by the LACFCD against Subject Property and the lien amount is subsequently paid to the LACFCD, the LACFCD shall promptly record a notice of satisfaction and release of the lien.

Release and Indemnification

- 10. Owner shall indemnify, defend, and hold the LACFCD and its officers, employees, and agents, harmless from and against any claims, demands, liability, damages, or costs arising from or caused by the breach of any of the Owner's obligations under this Covenant and Agreement or by Owner's Improvements, provided, however, that Owner's obligation to indemnify shall not apply to any claim, demand, liability, damage, or cost to the extent that such claim, demand, liability, damage, or cost is caused by the active negligence or intentional misconduct of the LACFCD, or any of its officers, employees, or agents.
- 11. Owner shall fully release and discharge the LACFCD, and their officers, employees and agents, from any claims and/or actions involving any damage to Owner's Improvements arising from or in connection with: (1) the operation or maintenance of the LACFCD's facilities located within or adjacent to Subject Property; or (2) the modification or removal of Owner's Improvements, or any of them, pursuant to Section Nos. 2 and 3, above; or (3) the removal, modification, or relocation of Owner's Improvements, or any of them, pursuant to Section Nos. 5 and 6, above.

Owner makes this Covenant and Agreement for the benefit of the LACFCD and the LACFCD's present and future facilities located within Easement. This Covenant and Agreement shall run with Subject Property and shall be binding upon Owner and Owner's successors, heirs, or assignees, and shall continue in effect until the release of this Covenant and Agreement by the LACFCD, in its sole discretion.

Public Health receives HRSA funding passed through the CDPH for the provision of MIECHV program services. The State-identified Service Planning Area (SPA) 1 and LAUSD as a school-based setting for pregnant teen and teen mothers in various schools as at-risk communities. The SPA and home visiting model used for these services were determined by CDPH based on requirements set forth by HRSA. APPROVAL FOR DELEGATED AUTHORITY TO PROVIDE AN INCREASE OR DECREASE IN FUNDING UP TO SEVENTY-FIVE PERCENT FOR TWO CALIFORNIA HOME VISITING PROGRAM SERVICES CONTRACTS (ALL SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS) (3 VOTES)

SUBJECT

Request approval for the delegated authority to provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 75% above or below the term's annual base maximum obligation for two California Home Visiting Program (CHVP) contracts for the continued provision of Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) program services contracts.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

Delegate authority to the Director of the Department of Public Health (Public Health) or designee, to execute amendments to Contract Number PH-003967 with Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD), and Contract Number PH-004807 with Children's Bureau of Southern California (CBS) that provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 75% above or below the term's annual base maximum obligation, effective upon amendment execution, or at the beginning of the applicable contract term and make any corresponding service adjustments, as necessary, subject to review and approval by County Counsel, and notification to your Board and Chief Executive Office (CEO).

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Home visiting programs play a crucial role in the national effort to build quality, comprehensive, Statewide early childhood systems for pregnant women, parents and caregivers, and children from birth to eight years of age to improve health and development outcomes. CHVP provides

comprehensive, coordinated in-home services to support positive parenting and improve outcomes for families residing in identified at-risk communities in Los Angeles County (LAC).

Public Health receives Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) funding passed through the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) for the provision of MIECHV program services. The State identified Service Planning Area (SPA) 1 and LAUSD as a school-based setting for pregnant teen and teen mothers in various schools as at-risk communities. The SPA and home visiting model used for these services were determined by CDPH based on requirements set forth by HRSA.

Since 2011, Public Health has received funding from CDPH to support MIECHV program services. On September 12, 2023, your Board authorized Public Health to accept and implement a forthcoming award from CDPH to support the provision of MIECHV program services at an estimated annual amount of \$1,910,893 for the period of July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024. This amount reflects a 25 percent increase in the base grant funding allocation from previous years as a result of the 2022 federal MIECHV program reauthorization. The reauthorization provides increased funding to stabilize and support local MIECHV programs following years of level or decreased funding. CDPH also anticipates MIECHV funding to increase over the next five years, resulting in an undetermined amount of additional federal and State MIECHV funding allocations to local health jurisdictions.

In addition to the MIECHV base grant funding, on August 2, 2022, your Board was notified that Public Health was exercising delegated authority to accept and sign American Recovery Plan (ARP) Grant Agreement Number 21-10741 issued by CDPH CHVP, effective upon approval of the grant through September 30, 2023, to support home visiting program services provided in LAC SPA 1. The grant supports parents, children and families enrolled in CHVP MIECHV funding home visiting programs. Funds are used to address the immediate and ongoing needs related to the COVID-19 public health emergency and response and promote health equity by allocating ARP funds to serving high need communities disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. Public Health anticipates receiving additional ARP funding issued by CDPH CHVP to support home visiting program services.

On January 20, 2023, CDPH issued a Notice of Revised Intent to award Public Health with MIECHV Round 2 of ARP funding in the amount of \$151,895 for SPA 1, and \$239,011 for LAUSD MIECHV contracts. On February 16, 2023, CDPH released the Agreement Funding Application (AFA) for the Round 2 ARP funding. Funds are contingent upon approval of the AFA and will be available between the date of grant agreement execution through September 30, 2024.

Based on the Notices of Intent to award from CDPH, the maximum amount of funding that could be awarded for the CBS and LAUSD MIECHV contracts is 50% to 75% higher than the previously approved base obligations. Approval of the Recommendation will allow Public Health to execute amendments to the two CHVP MIECHV program services contracts to provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 75% above or below each contract's term's annual base maximum obligation, which exceeds our current delegated authority approved by your Board, effective upon amendment execution, or at the beginning of the applicable contract term and make any corresponding service adjustments, as necessary.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support Strategy I.1 – Increase Our Focus on Prevention Initiative; Objective I.1.6 Increase Home Visitation Capacity, of the County's Strategic Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The estimated total cost of the recommended amendments is \$2,301,799, funded by HRSA passed through CDPH, Assistance Listing Number 93.870.

There is no net County cost associated with this action.

Funding is included in Public Health FY 2023-24 Adopted Budget, and will be included in future FYs, as necessary.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

As required under Board Policy 5.120, your Board was notified on September 1, 2023, of Public Health's request to increase or decrease in funding up to 75 percent above or below the annual maximum obligation. The ability to increase or decrease funding up to 75 percent will allow Public Health to make necessary funding adjustments in the event of unforeseen changes to the CDPH award amount for MIECHV program services.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

On January 25, 2022, Public Health released an Invitation for Bids (IFB) to solicit bids from qualified organizations to implement a MIECHV Program in LAC SPA 1. As a result of the IFB, CBS was recommended for a contract. On June 14, 2022, your Board approved the execution of a contract with CBS to implement MIECHV program services in LAC SPA 1, for the term effective July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2024. Subsequently on September 22, 2022, and May 24, 2023, Public Health notified your Board that it was exercising delegated authority to increase the total maximum obligation and make corresponding service adjustments for the additional provision of the CHVP MIECHV Special Support Project.

On April 10, 2012, your Board approved execution of a sole-source contract with LAUSD to provide MIECHV Program services, effective date of execution through June 30, 2013, with provisions to extend through June 30, 2017. Subsequently, on May 9, 2017, May 14, 2019, and April 4, 2023, your Board approved extending the term through June 30, 2019; through September 30, 2023; and through June 30, 2026, respectively, for the continued provision of MIECHV Program services.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES

Approval of these actions will allow Public Health to provide additional CHVP MIECHV program services to children and families in at-risk communities within LAUSD and in LAC SPA 1.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Delegate authority to the Director of the Department of Public Health (Public Health), or designee, to execute contract amendments to 56 sole source Core HIV Care Services contracts, to extend the term effective March 1, 2024 through February 28, 2025, with the providers identified in Attachments A through D, for a total maximum obligation of \$34,848,336, 100 percent offset by Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Ryan White Program (RWP) Part A funds.
- 2. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute amendments to the contracts that extend the term through February 28, 2026, at amounts to be determined by the Director of Public Health, contingent upon the availability of funds and contractor performance; allow the rollover of unspent contract funds, if allowable by the grantor; provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 25 percent above or below the annual base maximum obligation, effective upon amendment execution, or at the beginning of the applicable contract

period; correct errors in the contract's terms and conditions, and/or update the statement of work and/or scope of work, as necessary; and allow a no cost extension through August 31, 2026, subject to review and approval by County Counsel, and notification to your Board and the Chief Executive Office (CEO).

- 3. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute change notices to the contracts that authorize modifications to the budget with corresponding modifications to the statement of work and/or scope of work, that are within the same scope of services, as necessary; and changes to hours of operation and/or service locations.
- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to immediately suspend or terminate the contracts upon issuing a written notice to contractors who fail to perform and/or fully comply with program requirements, and terminate the contracts for convenience by providing a 30-calendar day advance written notice to contractors.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of Recommendation 1 will allow for the continuation of Core HIV Care Services, that includes, 18 Ambulatory Outpatient Medical (AOM) contracts, 18 Medical Care Coordination (MCC) contracts, seven Mental Health (MH) contracts, 12 Oral Healthcare (OHC) contracts and one Legal services contract, in alignment with Commission on HIV (COH) priorities and current service utilization patterns.

HIV care and treatment services for people with HIV (PWH) are vital to optimize patient health and help reduce the transmission and spread of HIV. Public Health must ensure there are no gaps in services.

The immediate and necessary justifications to extend the contracts for Core HIV Care Services are as follows: (1) AOM services help delay the progression of HIV disease; prevent and treat opportunistic infections; promote optimal health and quality of life; and reduce further HIV transmission by providing clients with education and support to implement risk reduction strategies; (2) MCC services deliver patient-centered activities that focus on addressing health status and co-morbid conditions; engagement and retention in care; adherence to antiretroviral medications; and HIV risk reduction; (3) OHC services significantly improve oral health and quality of life for PWH and provides an entry point into the health care system where eligible PWH can enter and be directed to primary medical care if they have fallen out of care; (4) coordinated and integrated HIV MH services improve clients' mental health outcomes and retention in primary and HIV health care services, resulting in viral suppression and decreased risk of HIV transmission; and (5) Legal services provide legal support to PWH and training and technical assistance to community-based organizations serving PWH with matters involving denial of public benefits, tenant rights issues, immigration status concerns, and debtor-creditor conflicts that impact social determinants of health and health outcomes.

Approval of Recommendation 2 will allow Public Health to execute amendments to the contracts to extend the term through February 28, 2026; rollover unspent funds; increase or decrease funding up to 25 percent above or below the annual base maximum obligation; correct errors in the contracts' terms and conditions; update the statement of work and/or scope of work; and allow a no-cost extension through August 31, 2026.

Approval of Recommendation 3 will allow Public Health to execute change notices to the contracts that authorize modifications to the budget with corresponding modifications to the statement of work and/or scope of work, that are within the same scope of services, as necessary, and changes to hours of operation and/or service locations.

Approval of Recommendation 4 will allow Public Health to immediately suspend or terminate contracts with contractors who fail to perform and/or fully comply with program requirements, and to terminate contracts for convenience by providing 30-calendar days' advance written notice to contractors.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support Strategy I.2, Enhance Our Delivery of Comprehensive Interventions, of the County's Strategic Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total County maximum obligation for the amendments as detailed in Attachments A through D, is \$34,848,336, consisting of \$8,111,801 for AOM services, \$13,150,940 for MCC services, \$9,987,299 for OHC services, \$2,160,668 for MH services and \$1,437,628, for Legal services for the term effective March 1, 2024, through February 28, 2025, 100 percent funded by HRSA RWP Part A funds.

There is no net County cost associated with this action.

Funding for these extensions is included in Public Health's Final Adopted Budget for fiscal year (FY) 2023-24 and will be included in future FYs, as necessary.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Public Health's allocations for each of the service categories are aligned with the COH recommended allocations. As required by Board Policy 5.100, your Board was notified on December 22, 2023, of Public Health's intent to extend the term of 56 Core HIV Care Services contracts as sole source, and as required by Board Policy 5.120, your Board was notified on December 22, 2023, of Public Health's intent to increase or decrease Board-approved contracts up to 25 percent.

Attachment E is the set of five sole source checklists for each Core HIV Care Service signed by the CEO.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

Since the original award and execution of the 56 referenced contracts, the contracts have undergone multiple amendments including term extensions, adjustments to funding allocations, and revisions to the statements of work.

The Division of HIV and STD Programs (DHSP), oversees approximately 26 service categories, which make up approximately 200 hundred service contracts. Given the volume of this large service portfolio, DHSP, in coordination with Public Health Contracts and Grants, has developed a timeline for the solicitation for services, which must be staggered. Additionally, resource constraints amidst the COVID-19 pandemic and workload associated with the pandemic greatly affected the schedule of solicitations between 2020 and 2021. The pandemic also affected staff and the ability of our community partners to respond. Public Health resumed the release of solicitations starting in 2022, that included solicitation timeline for the next three years, including, but not limited to: AOM, MCC, MH, OHC and Legal services. Prior to any solicitation, Public Health must consider potential adjustments in COH priorities and pending revised federal award notices, which can affect the timing or funding available for contracted services, therefore shifts in solicitation schedules may be necessary. Until this process is finalized, Public Health is seeking to extend these core HIV care services.

AOM and MCC

On February 26, 2019, your Board approved 38 new contracts, consisting of 19 AOM and 19 MCC contracts as a result of a solicitation for the term effective March 1, 2019, through February 28, 2022, and delegated authority to extend the term through February 29, 2024. On February 25, 2022, Public Health exercised that delegated authority to extend 18 AOM contracts through February 29, 2024, and 18 MCC contracts through February 28, 2023. In addition, Public Health notified your Board that two contracts with Saban Community Clinic, one for AOM and one for MCC, that were part of the original 2019 Board approval action were not being extended as those contracts were relinquished by the agency.

On February 24, 2023, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority to extend the term of 18 MCC contracts for the term effective March 1, 2023, through February 29, 2024.

Mental Health

On August 8, 2017, your Board approved eight new MH contracts as a result of a solicitation effective for the term August 8, 2017, through February 29, 2020, and an automatic option to extend, which was exercised through the term ending February 28, 2022.

On February 15, 2022, your Board approved the execution of amendments to eight MH contracts to extend the term effective March 1, 2022, through February 28, 2023, with an automatic option to extend, which was exercised through the term ending February 29, 2024.

On June 1, 2022, Venice Family Clinic notified Public Health that due to the expansion of Medi-Cal, there were significantly fewer RWP-eligible clients, and therefore, the agency would relinquish its MH contract effective June 30, 2022.

Oral Health

On June 11, 2019, your Board approved 12 new OHC contracts as a result of a solicitation effective for the term of July 1, 2019, through February 28, 2022, and delegated authority to extend the term, which was exercised on February 23, 2022, through the term ending February 29, 2024.

Legal

On December 15, 2020, your Board delegated authority to the Chief Executive Office to approve the delegation and assignment of services under Contract Number PH-003553 with Public Counsel to the InnerCity Law Center, effective December 15, 2020, through February 28, 2022, and delegated authority to extend the term, which was exercised on February 23, 2022, through the term ending February 29, 2024.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will allow Public Health to continue to provide uninterrupted delivery of critical core HIV care services to Los Angeles County residents.
