#### **SUBJECT**

The Department of Animal Care and Control (Department) seeks approval to amend its contracts with Simi Valley Nonprofit Spay and Neuter Clinic (SVNSNC) and Spay4LA for mobile spay and neuter and vaccination services. The amendments will allow the Department to increase the contract sum beyond the \$150,000 cap for each contract whenever additional funding is secured.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Delegate authority to the Director of the Department of Animal Care and Control or her designee to amend the contracts with SVNSNC and Spay4LA for mobile spay and neuter and vaccination services. The current maximum annual contract sum is currently \$150,000 for each contract but the Department will increase that amount when additional funds are identified.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

On April 4, 2023, the Board delegated authority to the Director of Animal Care and Control or her designee to execute a three-year contract, with two one-year extension options, with both SVNSNC and Spay4LA for mobile vaccination and spay and neuter services. The maximum contract sum is currently capped at \$150,000 annually for each contract, which was based on the Department's available funding. However, the Department has secured additional funding that it cannot utilize currently as the maximum contract sum was reached for the current fiscal year.

#### <u>IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIC PLAN GOALS</u>

Approval of the proposed action aligns with County Strategic Plan Goal 2, Strategy II.2, "Supporting the Wellness of our Communities." Endorsement of this action will allow the Department to expand free and low-cost spay and neuter services to pet owners in Los Angeles County communities. Spaying and neutering are crucial for managing unwanted animal populations and offer direct health benefits to animals. With inflation and the rising costs of veterinary services, spaying and neutering may become unattainable for many residents without the accessibility of these services.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There is no fiscal impact on the Department from the implementation of this amendment. Delegated authority will allow the Director or her designee to execute an amendment to either contract as additional funding is secured.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

On April 4, 2023, the Board of Supervisors delegated authority to the Director of Animal Care and Control or her designee to engage in contracts for mobile spay and neuter and vaccination services for the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. The Department awarded a contract to SNVSNC for residents of northern Los Angeles County communities and Spay4LA for those in southern Los Angeles County. Both contracts have an annual cap of \$150,000, which the Department has reached for Fiscal Year 2023-24. Although additional funding has been secured, the Department cannot utilize these funds until the start of the next contract term on July 1, 2024, when the annual contract sums are renewed.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES**

Approval of this board letter will allow the Department to expand services provided by its two contractors when additional funding is identified. It will also enable the Department to enhance essential and convenient spay/neuter services for residents to aid with fostering compliance with the mandatory spay and neuter ordinance. Through the expansion of services outlined in its current contracts, the Department aims to increase accessibility to spay and neuter services for residents in unincorporated Los Angeles County communities and its 45 contract cities. The resulting impact of these services will aid with reducing animal populations and associated costs for both the County and contract cities in addition to providing direct health benefits for pets.

## BLANCHARD AND COGEN LANDFILLS GAS EXTRACTION SYSTEM MAINTENANCE, MONITORING, AND REPORTING SERVICES (FIRST DISTRICT) (3-VOTES)

#### **SUBJECT**

Find that the proposed maintenance, monitoring and reporting services are exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act and award a service contract to Tetra Tech BAS, Inc., for Blanchard and Cogen Landfills Gas Extraction System maintenance, monitoring, and reporting services on behalf of Los Angeles County.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Find that the proposed maintenance, monitoring and reporting services included in the contract with Tetra Tech BAS, Inc., are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the proposed project.
- 2. Award and authorize the Chief Executive Officer, or her designee, to execute a contract with Tetra Tech BAS, Inc., for a not-to-exceed contract amount of \$1,000,000. The contract will commence upon execution by the County with an initial three-year term with two one-year optional extension options for a total maximum contract term of five years.

- 3. Delegate authority to the Chief Executive Officer, or her designee, to supplement the initial not-to-exceed contract amount of \$1,000,000 by up to 25 percent of the original contract amount based on workload requirements.
- 4. Delegate authority to the Chief Executive Officer, or her designee, to extend the contract for up to two one-year extension periods based upon project demands and level of satisfaction with services provided.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Chief Executive Officer, or her designee, to authorize additional services and extend the contract expiration date as necessary to complete those additional services when those additional services are: (1) previously unforeseen, (2) related to a previously assigned scope of work on a given project, and (3) are necessary for the completion of that given project, and to suspend and/or terminate the contract for convenience, if it is in the best interest of the County to do so.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the activities included in the consultant services agreement are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and will allow the Chief Executive Office (CEO) to procure maintenance, monitoring, reporting, and ongoing operations services for the former Blanchard and Cogen Landfills' Gas Extraction Systems, located at the Eastern Avenue Hill Complex.

The former Blanchard Landfill (Blanchard) is located on the Eastern Avenue Hill Complex in Los Angeles and was closed as a refuse disposal facility in 1958. Several County developments are on or adjacent to Blanchard, most notably the Fire Department Headquarters and Sheriff's Biscailuz Training Academy. In order to implement the Post Closure Land Use Plan for the former Blanchard site, in 2013 the County installed a landfill gas control system to extract and clean methane gas, which is a byproduct of the decomposing waste. Since then, the County of Los Angeles (County) has hired consultants to conduct ongoing monitoring and maintenance of the site and reporting to jurisdictional agencies. The current consultant services are being performed by Converse Consultants and the contract for their services expires in June 2024.

The former Cogen Landfill is also located at the Eastern Avenue Hill Complex along Sheriff Road and was closed as a refuse disposal facility in 1959. On July 19, 2021, the County completed installation of a landfill gas control system to extract and clean methane gas created by the decomposing waste located within the Cogen Landfill area. Similar to the Blanchard site, the system requires the same ongoing monitoring and maintenance services to ensure the continued proper operation of the system and conduct reporting requirements of jurisdictional agencies. The current consultant

services are being performed by Biogas Engineering and the contract for their services expires in June 2024.

The contract scope includes, but is not limited to; ongoing maintenance, monitoring and reporting of surface gas emissions, ambient air, Landfill Gas extraction wells, perimeter probe readings to South Coast Air Quality Management District, and condensate sumps industrial waste discharge report to County Sanitation District, for both landfill sites.

#### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

The Countywide Strategic Plan directs the provisions of Fostering Vibrant and Resilient Communities (Goal II) through Prioritizing Environmental Health Oversight and Monitoring (Strategy II.2.3). The contractor who has the specialized expertise to provide these services accurately, efficiently, timely, and in a responsive manner, will support the County in meeting this strategic goal.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total cost of the contract shall not exceed a total of \$1,000,000 plus a 25 percent supplement (totaling \$250,000) for a maximum of \$1,250,000 over a three-year period with two optional one-year extensions for a maximum duration of five years subject to the additional extension provisions specified below. It is expected the initial three-year term of the agreement will start in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24 and conclude in FY 2025-26. The two one-year extension options, if exercised, would be operating through FY 2026-27 and FY 2027-28.

There is sufficient appropriation in the FY 2023-24 Capital Projects/Refurbishments budget, under Eastern Hill Monitoring, Capital Project No. 87348, to award this consultant services agreement.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

A standard consultant services agreement, in the form previously approved by County Counsel will be used. The proposed contract contains terms and conditions in compliance with the CEO and the Board's requirements. The consultant services contract also includes a provision requiring the consultant to track subcontractors' utilization of Local Small Business Enterprise (LSBE), Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise (DVBE), and Social Enterprise (SE) businesses.

The proposed contract includes the new Board policy provisions for compliance with the County Policy of Equity, Default Method of Payment: Direct Deposit or Electronic Funds Transfer and Compliance with Fair Chance Employment Practices.

The term of each consultant services contract shall commence on the date of the full execution of the contract and shall extend for a period of three years from such commencement date, plus two one-year extension options, for a maximum contract duration of five years. The expiration of the services contract is subject to the following condition: where services for a given project have been authorized in writing by the County but are not completed by the contractor prior to the stated expiration date, the expiration date will be automatically extended solely to allow for the completion of such services.

Enclosure A reflects each proposer's minority participation and the Community Business Enterprises (CBEs) participation data.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed activities to be performed under the agreement, to the extent they are a project, including maintenance and monitoring activities, are exempt from CEQA. The monitoring and maintenance activities which do not include expansion or impact to the equipment and surrounding areas being maintained and monitored, is within a class of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and which meets the criteria set forth in section 15301 of the State CEQA Guidelines ("Guidelines") and Class 1 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. In addition, based on the records of the proposed activities, they will comply with all applicable regulations, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that the activities may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, the CEO will file a Notice of Exemption with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and with the State Clearinghouse at the Governor's Office of Planning and Research in accordance with section 21152 of the Public Resources Code and will post the notice to its website pursuant to section 21092.2.

#### IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

There will be no negative impact on current County services or projects during the performance of the recommended contract. The proposed contract will provide Blanchard and Cogen Landfills Gas Extraction System maintenance, monitoring, and reporting services.

#### **CONTRACT PROCESSING**

On January 9, 2023, Public Works issued a Request for Proposal (RFP). The RFP was advertised on the County's "Doing Business with the County" and "Do Business with Public Works" websites (Enclosure B); Twitter; and advertisements were placed in Daily Breeze, Daily Commerce, LA Opinion, Los Angeles Daily Journal, Long Beach Press-Telegram, Los Angeles Sentinel, Pasadena Star News, San Gabriel Valley Tribune, Santa Monica Daily Press, The Signal, and World Journal. Also, Public Works informed over 1,337 LSBEs, 149 DVBEs, and 144 SEs about this business opportunity. The appropriate Union was notified. The Union did not request to be consulted. Nine (9) firms registered on the Public Works website for the RFP. A preproposal meeting was held on January 24, 2023, and proposals were due February 13, 2023. A total of six (6) proposals were received.

An evaluation committee composed of staff from Public Works' Project Management Division I and Environmental Programs Division, and the CEO evaluated the written proposals based on criteria described in the RFP, including technical expertise, experience, personnel, qualifications, and understanding of the work requirements.

The evaluations were completed without regard to race, creed, color, or gender and in accordance with the informed averaging methodology. Based on the evaluation of the proposals, Tetra Tech BAS, Inc., was determined to be the successful proposer and negotiations were conducted. Tetra Tech BAS, Inc., was determined to meet the minimum requirements of the RFP and to be the most qualified proposer to provide the required services. Tetra Tech BAS, Inc.'s, proposed rates were reviewed and determined to be reasonable and representative of industry rates for similar services.

The consultant services agreement includes a cost-of-living adjustment provision in accordance with the Board Policy No. 5.070 – Multi-Year Service Contract Cost of Living Adjustments.

Approval of the recommended actions will delegate authority to the Director of Parks and Recreation, or her designee, to execute sole source Amendment Number One to Agreement Number 77748 between the County of Los Angeles and iTennis, Inc. for the management, operation, and maintenance of Arcadia Tennis Center at Arcadia Community Regional Park.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT YOUR BOARD:

- Find that the proposed approval of the amendment to Agreement Number 77748
  for the management, operation, and maintenance of Arcadia Tennis Center is
  categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons
  stated in this Board Letter and in the record of the agreement amendment.
- 2. Delegate authority to the Director of Parks and Recreation, or her designee, to negotiate and execute a sole source amendment to Agreement Number 77748 with iTennis, Inc., upon approval as to form by County Counsel, to extend the term for an additional period of one year, with an additional month-to-month option term not to exceed 12 months for a maximum extension of 24 months and to add and/or change certain terms and conditions as required by your Board.
- Authorize the Director of Parks and Recreation, or her designee, to execute future amendment(s) approved as to form by County Counsel to exercise the month-tomonth extension option, suspend or terminate the contract, or assign the

Agreement, if deemed necessary, in accordance with the approved terms and condition of the Agreement.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The County of Los Angeles (County) Department of Parks and Recreation (Department) owns Arcadia Park Tennis Center (ATC), located at Arcadia Community Regional Park, which is managed, operated, and maintained by iTennis, Inc. (iTennis) through a Board of Supervisors (Board) approved operating agreement, Agreement Number 77748 (Agreement); which is set to expire on April 30, 2024.

Through this agreement, iTennis manages, operates, and maintains ATC and conducts recreational activities, including but not limited to scheduling the utilization of the tennis courts and pickleball courts; providing tennis and pickleball lessons; coordinating and hosting tennis and pickleball tournaments; conducting community outreach that includes discounted or free programs and/or clinics that are intended to grow the game of tennis and pickleball; and managing and maintaining the pro-shop.

The recommended sole source amendment with iTennis will extend the existing operating agreement for ATC. Your Board's approval will allow additional time for the Department to prepare a Request for Proposal (RFP) to award a single operating agreement for the operation and management of two County-owned tennis centers, namely ATC and La Mirada Tennis Center (LMTC). It will also provide additional time for the completion of the required repairs at LMTC prior to releasing the solicitation.

The Department also owns La Mirada Tennis Center (LMTC), which was managed, operated, and maintained until January 31, 2020 with a private operator. The LMTC has been operated in-house by the Department since February 1, 2020. Historically, LMTC was not successfully operated by the private sector as a standalone facility due to the low use by patrons, minimal revenue collected, high maintenance requirements and major repairs needed, making it unprofitable.

In order to ensure the successful operation of the LMTC by a private operator, the Department will bundle the LMTC with ATC, which has a higher utilization rate and is a more profitable tennis center, to solicit and award the management, operation, and maintenance of both centers under one agreement. However, due to the deferred maintenance, improvements, and other major repairs needed at the facility, the Department anticipates completing all upgrades by the end of 2024.

Approval of the recommended actions will allow the Department to accomplish the necessary upgrades and repairs to the LMTC and complete the solicitation process for a new bundle agreement for the operation of both tennis centers.

#### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

The recommended actions uphold the County's Strategic Plan Goals to Foster Vibrant and Resilient Communities by supporting wellness of our Communities (Goal II.2); Pursuing Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility and Accountability (Goal III.3); and by increasing the Department's public/private partnerships and maximizing the use of County assets (Goal III.3.2).

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

In consideration of the recommended actions iTennis will continue to pay the applicable minimum monthly rent and/or percentage of the total gross receipts, whichever is higher, as established by the Agreement.

#### **OPERATING BUDGET IMPACT**

The recommended actions will have no impact the Department's Operating Budget.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The Board is authorized by the provision of Government Code Section 25907 to lease County parks and recreation real property for the provision of services and property improvements that are consistent with public park and recreation purposes. The proposed amendment is consistent with said purposes. Approval of the recommended actions is consistent with said Government Code.

Pursuant to the Change Notices and Amendments section of the Agreement, the Agreement may be amended only by further written agreement between the parties. Any such modification shall not be effective unless and until executed by iTennis and in the case of County, until approved by the Board. The recommended action will allow the Director, or her designee, to negotiate and execute an amendment to the Agreement upon approval as to form by County Counsel, to extend the Agreement term and add and/or change certain terms and conditions as required by your Board.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed approval of the amendment to Agreement Number 77748 is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The amendment, which will extend the term of the Agreement, are within a class of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that they meet the criteria set forth in Section 15301 of the State CEQA Guidelines and Class 1(r) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. The

Amendment consists of operation and leasing of an existing facility with negligible or no expansion of existing or former use.

In addition, based on the proposed amendment records, they will comply with all applicable regulations. They are not in a sensitive environment, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code section 65962.5, or indications that they may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, the Department will file a Notice of Exemption with the County Clerk in accordance with section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code.

#### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

The County Board of Supervisors is authorized by the provision of Government Code Section 25907 to lease County park and recreation real property for the provision of services and property improvements consistent with public park and recreation purposes. On March 13, 2012, the County entered into Agreement Number 77748 with iTennis, Inc. for the management, operation, and maintenance of the Tennis Center; and pursuant to the Agreement, the term was extended to April 30, 2024.

To comply with Board Policy 5.100, Sole Source Contracts, the Department has prepared the attached Notification of Intent to Negotiate a Sole Source Agreement with iTennis, Inc. to notify the Board that the Department intends to enter into negotiations for a sole source extension agreement with iTennis, Inc.

#### <u>IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)</u>

Approval of this action will ensure continued services to the public by the operator of the ATC.

ACCEPT GRANT AWARDS TOTALING \$1,500,000 FROM THE CALIFORNIA STATE LIBRARY FOR THE NORWOOD LIBRARY REFURBISHMENT PROJECT AND THE YOUNG LEARNERS AND STUDENT SUPPORT PROGRAMS AND DELEGATE AUTHORITY TO THE COUNTY LIBRARIAN TO ACCEPT GRANTS IN SUPPORT OF EARLY LEARNING AND STUDENT SUCCESS PROGRAMS AND SERVICES (SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS 1 AND 4) (3 VOTES)

#### <u>SUBJECT</u>

LA County Library (Library) is recommending that the Board of Supervisors accept two grant awards totaling \$1,500,000 from the California State Library (CSL) for the Norwood Library Refurbishment Project (Project) and the Young Learners and Student Support Programs (Programs) and delegate authority to the County Librarian to accept future grants for programs and services that support early learning and student success.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT YOUR BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed actions are not a project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to the State CEQA Guidelines, Section 15378.
- 2. Accept grant funding of \$1,500,000 from the California State Library for the Library's Norwood Library Refurbishment Project and the Young Learners and Student Support Programs.

- 3. Delegate authority to the County Librarian, or her designee, to execute documents, agreements or amendments associated with the acceptance and use of the grant, County Counsel approved as to form.
- 4. Delegate authority to the County Librarian, or her designee, to accept and execute grants and awards from the California State Library, federal, State, and other public and private agencies in support of Norwood Library Refurbishment Project, subject to review and approval to Board offices, the Chief Executive Office and County Counsel's approval as to form.
- 5. Delegate authority to the County Librarian, or her designee, to accept and execute grants and awards from the California State Library, federal, State, and other public and private agencies in support of early learning and student success programs and services, subject to review and approval to Board offices, the Chief Executive Office and County Counsel's approval as to form.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

On July 10, 2023, Governor Newsom signed Assembly Bill (AB) 102 which amended the Budget Act of 2023, Chapter 38, making appropriations reflecting legislative priorities related to arts and culture. Through the California State Library (CSL), LA County Library was awarded grants of \$1,000,000 and \$500,000, under CSL's Targeted State Grants program. These funds will be used for the Norwood Library Refurbishment Project and the Young Learners and Student Support Programs.

The Norwood Library Refurbishment Project ("Project"), was awarded grants of \$1,000,000, to completely transform the existing facility by implementing a new space layout, making ADA improvements, and updating flooring, ceilings, lighting, furniture, equipment, and finishes. This comprehensive renovation will enhance the functionality and aesthetics of the library, resulting in an improved experience for all users. The Project was initiated in response to the need for modernization whereas the current layout, infrastructure, and amenities no longer adequately serve the evolving needs of library patrons. The Project seeks to address challenges and to create a welcoming and

accessible environment that promotes learning, collaboration, and engagement within the community.

Young Learners and Student Support Programs will consist of mobile outreach, early learning, and Student Success programs at libraries and locations within California's 56th State Assembly district, particularly in communities that have the highest need as identified by the County of Los Angeles' Equity Explorer Mapping Tool. The \$500,000 grant funds will support an eight-week summer tutoring program, the Reading Machine team will visit childcare centers, and the launch of the Library's re-envisioned Smart Start program will update Smart Start Spaces and redesign Smarty Pants Storytime to ensure cultural appropriateness. Funds will be used to purchase program supplies, student support materials, and for program administration and curriculum costs.

#### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

The County Strategic Plan directs the provisions of Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities, Objective II.2.2, Expand Access to Recreational and Cultural Opportunities, and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal responsibility, and Accountability, Objective III.3.2 Manage and Maximize County Assets. The recommended actions support the Strategic Plan by investing in public infrastructure that will enhance recreational and cultural opportunities for County residents and visitors and improve the operational effectiveness of an existing County asset and by providing programs for children and students to increase the likelihood of greater success in school.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The \$1,000,000 and \$500,000 grant awards are funded and administered by the California State Library and there is no match requirement.

The grant period will commence upon acceptance of the grant award and will end on January 31, 2026.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

After applying for the California State Library Targeted State Grants, the Library was selected to receive two grants in the amount of \$1,000,000 and \$5,000,000 for a total of \$1,500,000. The grants are listed in AB 102, Budget Act of 2023, Chapter 38 as:

- "\$1,000,000 to the County of Los Angeles, for the Los Angeles County Norwood Library."
- "\$500,000 to the County of Los Angeles, for the LA County Library's Programming and Services."

County policy requires grants submission to the Board of Supervisors for acceptance. A Grant Management statement is required when the grant amount is \$100,000 or more. (Attachment A).

# **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The recommended actions are not subject to the CEQA requirements because they do not constitute a project according to Section 15378 of CEQA.

# IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

This grant aims to tackle challenges and establish a welcoming, accessible environment that fosters learning, collaboration, and community engagement. It will also ensure that children have access to high-quality early learning programs, enhancing their chances of academic success, and will create a comfortable, safe learning space for library patrons.

The Norwood Library is projected to close in early 2025 and is anticipated to reopen in mid or late 2026.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find the project and associated activities within the previous exemption findings under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The recommended actions will also approve the revised project budget and scope and approve an appropriation adjustment for the LA County Library Headquarters Fire Restoration Project to fully fund the project.

On November 2021, a fire occurred at the LA County Library Headquarters, located at 7400 Imperial Highway, Downey, CA 90242. The fire and resulting water and smoke damage due to fire suppression activities, caused extensive damage throughout the facility. The initial remediation efforts were completed in April 2023, which included the remediation and removal of hazardous materials, damaged building components and property which resulted from the fire and the efforts to extinguish the fire. The value of this scope was \$2,628,390 and was funded from the LA County Library's operating budget.

On September 26, 2023, the Board approved the LA County Library Headquarters Fire Restoration Project which provided necessary repairs and renovations to enable occupancy and use of the LA County Library Headquarters by restoring the fire-damaged building to its pre-loss condition, while also incorporating necessary code-required upgrades. The total project cost was \$15,431,000 and was funded from LA County Library's operating budget.

The proposed increased scope includes tenant improvements, such as the reconfiguration of existing warehouse space, installation of secured storage space, sound baffling, and floor preparation for the installation of library equipment; the purchase of furniture, fixtures, and equipment (FF&E); installation of low voltage and security upgrades, book sorting equipment, specialty finishes, communication systems, signage, and warehouse shelving. This increased scope will enhance operational efficiencies and optimize building utilization with warehousing space on the first-floor, eliminating the need for an off-site leased warehouse; a new book sorter that will improve efficiencies, accuracy, saving space and provide delivery data insights; and other operational improvements to enhance security and energy efficiency.

The estimated project duration is approximately 27 months, which includes construction and project completion.

recreational and cultural opportunities for County residents and visitors and improve the operational effectiveness of an existing County asset.

# Green Building/Sustainable Design Program

The proposed increased scope would support the Board's Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by incorporating design features that will optimize energy efficiency.

The proposed increased scope would be designed and constructed to comply with Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations. Title 24 contains building standards to conserve electricity and natural gas in new and existing buildings within the State. When possible, ISD will document all Title 24 related improvements that qualify for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) building points to apply toward future LEED certification for the County building.

# FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The revised project budget, including design, consultant services, Civic Art allowance, construction, change order contingency, County services and FF&E, is estimated at \$26,425,000, which is \$10,994,000 more than the previously Board-approved project budget of \$15,431,000 (Enclosure A). The estimated JOC construction value for the revised scope of work will be \$1,126,000, and the estimated Master Agreement value will be \$3,250,000.

Approval of the enclosed appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) would transfer \$7,395,000 from the LA County Library's operating budget to the LA County Library Headquarters Fire Restoration Project, Capital Project No. 89160. A total of \$3,599,000 will remain in the LA County Library's Operating budget to be used for the project's FF&E and the procurement of a new book sorter (\$1,599,000 and \$2,000,000, respectively), to fully fund the project.

Funding for the design and consultant services costs related to this additional scope in the amount of \$600,000 was previously funded from the LA County Library's operating budget. In fiscal years 2022-23 and 2023-24, LA County Library received a total of \$4,056,468 from insurance claims which was used to offset these costs, in addition to initial remediation efforts. The County continues to work with the insurers for additional displacement and restoration claim settlement.

# **Operating Budget Impact**

The scope of work consists of repairs and remodeling to an existing space. Therefore, following the completion of the project, LA County Library does not anticipate any one-time start-up or additional ongoing costs as a result of the project.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Local and Targeted Worker Hire Policy, updated on May 17, 2023, the Project has a mandatory hiring requirement of at least thirty percent (30%) Local Workers and 10 percent (10%) Targeted Workers.

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy, adopted on December 7, 2004, and last amended on August 4, 2020, the Project budget includes one percent (1%) of eligible design and construction costs, in the amount of \$47,000, which is an increase of \$10,000 from the previously approved Civic Art Allocation, to be allocated to the Civic Art Fund.

In accordance with the Board's All-Gender Restroom Policy, at least one percent (1%) of the total required toilet fixture count, but no fewer than one (1) toilet fixture, shall be provided in an All-Gender restroom.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

On September 26, 2023, the Board approved and found the project exempt from CEQA. The additional scope of work consists of tenant improvements and installation of equipment at an existing facility. The recommended actions, including the changes to the previously approved project scope, are therefore within the scope of the impacts analyzed in the previous exemptions which included State CEQA Guidelines Sections 15301(a), and (d), 15302, and 15303, and Classes 1(c) and (d), 2, and 3 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G because the work includes repairs and minor alterations to existing public facilities with negligible or no expansion of use, replacement of features with the same purpose and capacity, placement of small equipment and accessory structures, and installation of equipment at existing facilities.

Upon the Board's approval of the proposed project, ISD will file a Notice of Exemption with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and with the State Clearinghouse in the Office of Planning and Research in accordance with section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code and will post the Notice to its website in accordance with section 21092.2.

## **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

On September 26, 2023, the Board authorized the Internal Services Department (ISD) to carry out the construction using Board-approved Job Order Contracts (JOC), Master Agreements, and Purchase Orders. The increased scope will be delivered as part of the ongoing construction with the Board-approved JOCs, and Master Agreements.

# IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommendations will have minimal impact on current County services.

# APPOINT A RECENT PUBLIC WORKS RETIREE AS A 120-DAY TEMPORARY EMPLOYEE AND WAIVE THE 180-DAY WAITING PERIOD (ALL DISTRICTS) (3 VOTES)

# **SUBJECT**

Public Works requests that the Board appoint recent Public Works retiree, Susan Herman, as a 120-day temporary employee without reinstatement from retirement and waive the 180-day waiting period under the California Public Employee's Pension Reform Act of 2013.

## IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Certify that it is necessary for recently retired Public Works employee, Susan Herman, who possesses extensive and unique expertise, to immediately return as a 120-day temporary employee to provide critically needed expertise on the high-profile homelessness initiatives in the County.
- 2. Appoint Susan Herman to serve as a 120-day temporary employee at Public Works without reinstatement from retirement; waive the 180-day waiting period under California Public Employee's Pension Reform Act of 2013; and approve the Director's request that Susan Herman be employed as a Public Works Consultant II at a rate of \$101.46 per hour for up to 960 hours of work in each fiscal year.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to immediately appoint Susan Herman as a 120-day temporary employee without reinstatement from retirement and to waive the 180-day waiting period. Ms. Herman will assist the County to train and transition successor staff and ensure continuity of service for quality of life and homelessness initiatives. Ms. Herman retired from County service on March 29, 2024, as the Senior Manager, CEO of Public Works, and has expertise in the County's response to the homelessness crises as well as the requisite knowledge needed to implement critical services to our communities.

# <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

The recommendation supports the County Strategic Plan: Strategy 111.1, Continually Pursue Development of our Workforce; and Strategy 111.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Sustainability, and Accountability, by maximizing public services through the appointment of a critically needed retiree as a temporary employee without reinstatement from retirement, and the promotion of operational effectiveness, fiscal responsibility, and accountability.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

Ms. Herman will be employed at a rate of \$101.46 per hour for up to 960 hours in Fiscal Years 2023-24 and 2024-25. The cost of the recommended action will be absorbed within Public Works' existing budget and various funds.

## FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Under California Public Employee's Pension Reform Act of 2013, a County retiree must ordinarily wait 180 days from the date of retirement before returning to work as a temporary employee without reinstatement from retirement (Government Code Section 7522.56). The recommended action is consistent with California Public Employee's Pension Reform Act of 2013, which allows a person who retires from the County to serve without reinstatement from retirement or loss or interruption of benefits provided by the retirement system, before a period of 180 days following the date of retirement as long as the Board certifies the position is critically needed and the retired person has the skills needed to perform work of limited duration. The request for such an appointment may not be placed on a consent calendar.

# **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to vacate a portion of the sanitary sewer easements north of Valley Boulevard between Alderton Avenue and Giano Avenue in the unincorporated community of San Jose Hills, which is excess and no longer needed for public use.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Find that the proposed project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and the record of the project.
- Find that the portion of the easements for sanitary sewer purposes north of Valley Boulevard between Alderton Avenue and Giano Avenue, in the unincorporated community of San Jose Hills, is no longer required for public use and can be vacated pursuant to Section 5400 of the California Health and Safety Code.

- 3. Find that the portion of the easements for sanitary sewer purposes north of Valley Boulevard between Alderton Avenue and Giano Avenue is determined to be excess by the easement holder and there are no public facilities located within the easements pursuant to Section 8333(c) of the California Streets and Highways Code.
- 4. Adopt the Resolution of Summary Vacation of a Portion of Sanitary Sewer Easements north of Valley Boulevard between Alderton Avenue and Giano Avenue pursuant to Section 8335 of the California Streets and Highways Code.
- 5. Upon approval, authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to record the certified original resolution with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and will allow the County to vacate a portion of the sanitary sewer easements north of Valley Boulevard between Alderton Avenue and Giano Avenue, in the unincorporated community of San Jose Hills, since it was determined to be excess and is no longer needed for public use. The southerly continuation of the sewer easements will remain on the private property.

The proposed vacation of a portion of the easements was requested by Mr. Rick Whitney of U-Haul Corporation Real Estate, Inc., on behalf of AREC 12, LLC, the underlying property owner. The purpose of the vacation is needed to release the encumbrance on the property and allow for the construction of new structures.

The underlying property owner will benefit from this transaction as the vacation of a portion of the easements will allow for further development of the property.

# **Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals**

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, by allowing the County to vacate the portion of the easements, which will provide fiscal sustainability and reduce the County's exposure to potential liabilities.

# FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no significant impact to the County General Fund.

# FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The total area of the easements to be vacated contains approximately 2,046± square feet as shown on the enclosed map (Enclosure A).

The County's interest in the easements for sanitary purposes were acquired per Instrument No. 2722, recorded on November 2, 1967, and Instrument No. 2723, recorded on November 2, 1967, both filed with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk.

The California Health and Safety Code, Section 5400, provides that the County Board of Supervisors may vacate easements for sewage or drainage purposes whenever it determines the easements are no longer needed for public use.

The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 8333(c), provides that the legislative body of a local agency may summarily vacate a public service easement if the easement has been determined to be excess by the easement holder and there are no other public facilities located within the easement.

The California Streets and Highways Code, Section 8335, provides that upon making the required finding, the legislative body of the local agency may effectuate the summary vacation of a street, highway, or public service easement by adopting a resolution of summary vacation.

The enclosed "Resolution of Summary Vacation of a Portion of Sanitary Sewer Easements north of Valley Boulevard between Alderton Avenue and Giano Avenue" (Enclosure B) has been approved by County Counsel as to form and it will be recorded. Adoption and subsequent recordation of the Resolution will terminate the County's rights and interest in the easements and will result in the property being unencumbered by the easements.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed project is exempt from CEQA. The project, which is the vacation of a portion of the easements, is within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in that it meets the criteria set forth in

Sections 15305 and 15321 of the CEQA Guidelines relating to minor alterations in land use, limitations, and actions to enforce or revoke entitlement for use issued and adopted by the regulatory agency.

# **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The recommended actions will have no significant impact on current County services or projects.





## **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the final map for Tract 52584 in the County unincorporated community of Castaic and acceptance of grants and dedications as indicated on the final map.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the approval of the final map for Tract 52584 is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter.
- Make findings as follows:
  - a. That the proposed subdivision complies with the applicable requirements and conditions imposed pursuant to the State Subdivision Map Act (Government Code, Section 66410, et seq.) and the County of Los Angeles Subdivision Ordinance (Los Angeles County Code, Title 21) and is in substantial conformance with the Revised Vesting Tentative Tract Map 52584-1, previously approved by the Board on October 31, 2017.



- b. That division and development of the property, in the manner set forth on the approved tentative map for this subdivision, will not unreasonably interfere with the free and complete exercise of any rights of way or easements owned by any public entity and/or public utility in accordance with Government Code, Section 66436, subsections (a)(3)(A)(i), of the State Subdivision Map Act.
- 3. Approve the final map for Tract 52584.
- 4. Accept grants and dedications as indicated on the final map for Tract 52584.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to approve the final map for Tract 52584 (enclosed). The proposed final map consists of 97.86 gross acres and will create 306 residential lots, 1 private driveway and fire lane lot, 10 private and future street lots, 1 booster station lot, 2 private recreation lots, and 11 open space lots. The 306 residential lots will benefit the public by allowing for the construction of additional housing to help address the County's housing demands.

The Board approved a Revised Vesting Tentative Tract Map (VTTM) for this subdivision on October 31, 2017. The subdivider has complied with all requirements imposed as a condition of the approval of the tentative map, and the final map is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map.

Pursuant to the State Subdivision Map Act, a local agency must approve a final map if the subdivider has complied with all applicable requirements of State and local law and the legislative body finds that the final map is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map.

The grants and dedications, as indicated on the final map, are necessary for construction and maintenance of public infrastructure required by the County for this development.

# <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended actions allow the County to record the final map, which will maximize property tax revenue.



# FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no adverse impact to the County General Fund. The 306 residential lots created by the recordation of this final map will generate additional property tax revenue that is shared by all taxing entities.

# FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The approval of the final map is subject to provisions of the State Subdivision Map Act [Government Code, Sections 66410, et seq.; 66458, subsection (a); 66473; 66474.1; 66436, subsections (a)(3)(A)(i); and 66427.1, subsection (A)], which states that a legislative body shall not deny approval of a final map if it has previously approved a tentative map for the proposed subdivision and finds that the final map is in substantial conformance with the previously approved tentative map.

The final map has been reviewed by Public Works for mathematical accuracy, survey analysis, title information, and for compliance with local ordinances and the State Subdivision Map Act. Public Works' review indicates that the subdivision is substantially the same as it appears on the approved tentative map, that all State and local provisions and legal requirements have been met on this final map, and that the final map is technically correct.

All agreements and improvement securities, which were required as a condition of the approval of the final map, have been accepted on behalf of the County by the appropriate official.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

On October 31, 2017, the Board certified and adopted the Final Environmental Impact Report for Revised VTTM 52584-1, along with the Findings of Fact and Statement of Overriding Considerations (SOC), and the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program and certified that the Final Environmental Impact Report was completed in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the State and County CEQA guidelines. Furthermore, your Board found that the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program was adequately designed to ensure compliance with the mitigation measures; found that the unavoidable significant effects of the project, after adoption of said mitigation measures are described in the Findings of Fact and SOC; and determined that the remaining, unavoidable environmental effects of the project have been reduced to an acceptable level and are outweighed by specific health and safety, economic, social, and/or environmental benefits of the project as stated in the Findings of Fact and SOC.



Subsequently, a hearing officer approved an amendment to the Revised VTTM on February 5, 2019, and approved an addendum to the Final Environmental Impact Report and certified that it has been completed in compliance with the CEQA and the State and County CEQA guidelines.

The proposed actions to approve the final subdivision map are ministerial actions and are thereby exempt from CEQA by Section 15268, subsections (b)(3), of the State CEQA guidelines and Section 21080, subsections (b)(1), of the California Public Resources Code.

# **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

There will be no negative impact on current County services or projects as a result of approving the final map for Tract 52584.



#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to carry out the accelerated delivery of the East Los Angeles Monument Improvements Project, including delegated authority to adopt the plans and specifications, advertise, and award and execute a construction contract for the proposed project located in the unincorporated community of East Los Angeles.

## IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

 Find that the proposed project is exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.

- Approve the East Los Angeles Monument Improvements Project and delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to adopt the plans and specifications and advertise for bids at an estimated construction contract cost between \$900,000 and \$1,400,000 for the East Los Angeles Monument Improvements Project.
- 3. Delegate Authority to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee to instruct the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors to advertise for bids in accordance with the Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisement with the Notice Inviting Bids when ready to advertise this project.
- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee to open and examine bids received at a public meeting called by the Director of Public Works and determine whether the bid of the apparent responsible contractor with the lowest apparent responsive bid is, in fact, responsive and, if not responsive, to determine which apparent responsible contractor submitted the lowest responsive bid.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee to award and execute a construction contract for the East Los Angeles Monument Improvements Project with the responsible contractor with the lowest responsive bid within or less than the estimated cost range of \$900,000 and \$1,400,000 or that exceeds the estimated cost range by no more than 15 percent if additional funds have been identified.
- 6. Delegate to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee the following authority in connection with this contract: (a) extend the date and time for the receipt of bids consistent with the requirements of California Public Contract Code, Section 4104.5; (b) allow substitution of subcontractors and relief of bidders upon demonstration of the grounds set forth in California Public Contract Code, Sections 4100 et seq., and 5100 et seq., respectively; (c) approve and execute change orders within the same monetary limits delegated to the Director of Public Works or his designee under Section 20395 of the California Public Contract Code; (d) accept the project upon its final completion; and (e) release retention money withheld consistent with the requirements of California Public Contract Code, Sections 7107 and 9203.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The purpose of the recommended actions is to allow Public Works to upgrade and improve the existing monuments in the unincorporated community of East Los Angeles (see Enclosure).

The project will make improvements that will increase the visibility of the Welcome to East Los Angeles monuments. The design will incorporate and celebrate themes found within the community of East Los Angeles.

Delegating authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to adopt the plans and specifications will allow Public Works to deliver the project in an expedited manner as advertising documents are finalized. By doing so, the County will be better able to complete the project in a timely manner.

It is anticipated that the work will start in the third quarter of 2024 and be completed in the fourth quarter of 2024.

#### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of Our Communities, Objective II.2.2, Expand Access to Recreational and Cultural Opportunities, and Objective II.2.4, Promote Active and Healthy Lifestyles; as well as Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets, by supporting ongoing efforts to encourage the use of alternate modes of transportation and manage and improve public infrastructure assets.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The estimated construction contract cost to complete this project is in the range of \$900,000 to \$1,400,000, with a maximum construction contract cost to be 15 percent above this range. The total project cost is estimated to be \$2,000,000. In addition to the construction contract cost, the total project cost includes the preparation of plans and specifications, consultant services, survey, utility clearance, inspection, contract administration, change order contingency, and other County services.

Funding for this project is included in the First Supervisorial District's Transportation Improvement Program in the Measure M Local Return Fund (CN2 – Capital Assets-Infrastructure and Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2023-24 Budget.

The annual cost of graffiti removal is estimated to be \$20,000. Commencing in Fiscal Year 2025-26, funding for the ongoing maintenance cost will be made available in the Road Fund and requested through the annual budget process.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Public Contract Code Section 20391 allows the Board to delegate preparation and approval of plans and specifications to the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee on a project-by-project basis. Once plans are prepared and approved, Public Works will instruct the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors to advertise the project for bids in accordance with Section 20392 of the California Public Contract Code. It is anticipated that the project will advertise for bids within two months from the adoption of the Board letter.

Public Contract Code Section 20393 allows the Board to authorize the Director of Public Works, acting as the Road Commissioner, or his designee to publicly open bids and award the contract to the lowest responsible bidder. Change orders will be approved and executed as permitted by Public Contract Code Section 20395.

The contract award will comply with applicable Federal and State requirements and Board policies and mandates. The contract documents will require the contractor to comply with these same requirements, policies, and mandates. The construction contract will be in the form previously reviewed and approved by County Counsel.

As required by Board Policy No. 5.140, information, such as defaulted contracts with the County, complaints filed with the Contractors State License Board, labor violations, and debarment actions will be considered before a contract is awarded.

Documents related to award of this contract will be available at Los Angeles County Public Works, Project Management Division III, 900 South Fremont Avenue, 8th Floor, Alhambra, CA 91803.

In accordance with Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring, the project will require that at least 30 percent of the California construction labor hours be performed by qualified Local Residents and at least 10 percent be performed by Targeted Workers facing employment barriers. The project will also include a jobs coordinator who will facilitate the implementation of the targeted hiring requirement of the policy.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed project is exempt from CEQA. The project to upgrade and improve existing roadway monuments is within a class of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and which meets the criteria set forth in Section 15301 (c) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Class 1 (e) and (x), Subsections 9, 10, 13, 17, 22; and Class 3 (b) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. In addition, based on the records of the proposed project, it will comply with all applicable regulations, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that it may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemption inapplicable.

#### CONTRACTING PROCESS

To increase contractor awareness of Public Works' program to contract work out to the private sector, this project will be listed on both the County's "Doing Business with Los Angeles County" and "Do Business with Public Works" websites for open bids:

Also, the contract solicitation will be advertised through web-based and social media platforms.

In addition, in order to increase opportunities for small businesses, Public Works will be coordinating with the Office of Small Business at the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs to maximize outreach.

When the project is completed, it will have a positive impact to the unincorporated community of East Los Angeles by expanding access to cultural opportunities and fostering community pride. 

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to accept grant funds from the United States Department of Agriculture's Urban and Community Forestry Program and to delegate authority to the Director of Public Works to execute grant documents for the Early Action Implementation for Los Angeles County Urban Forest Management Plan. This Plan will address the urban tree canopy deficit within disadvantaged communities in the unincorporated County of Los Angeles.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the proposed actions set forth in this Board letter are not a project pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and the record.
- 2. Authorize the Director of Public Works, or his designee, to accept grant funds up to \$8 million from the United States Department of Agriculture's Urban and Community Forestry Program for the Early Action Implementation for Los Angeles County Urban Forest Management Plan; to file and execute any necessary applications, contracts, certifications and assurances, agreements, reports, and amendments including extensions of time to complete the project or program, minor changes in project scope, and alterations in the grant amount, or any other required documents with the United States Department of Agriculture on behalf of the County related to the grant; and to sign and submit requests for payment from the United States Department of Agriculture.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that they are not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and allow Public Works to accept grant funds from the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Urban and Community Forestry (UCF) Program to fund planning efforts to address the urban tree canopy deficit within disadvantaged communities in the unincorporated County of Los Angeles. This action also authorizes the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute all agreements, amendments, reports, and payment requests for grants awarded by the USDA.

In June 2023, Los Angeles County applied for USDA grant funding. On September 14, 2023, the County was notified that it would be awarded a grant of \$8 million for the Early Action Implementation for Los Angeles County Urban Forest Management Plan. The Plan will allow the County assess areas of low canopy coverage, plant diverse tree species, and create workforce development opportunities and engagement for the continued maintenance and monitoring of new and existing trees.

The core deliverables of community engagement, workforce development, and tree planting will be a collaborative effort between the Los Angeles County Department of Economic Opportunity, Department of Parks and Recreation, Public Works, and the Chief Sustainability Office.

Public Works will return to the Board as necessary for applicable project approvals pertaining to the project, including for authorization to advertise and award any additional contracts related to the project.

#### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of Our Communities, and Objective II.2.4, Promote Active and Healthy Lifestyles. These recommendations contribute to this goal by investing in public infrastructure and programs to enhance tree canopy and improve human health.

Additionally, the Countywide Strategic Plan directs the provisions of Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability Our Daily Reality; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. These actions will allow use of grant funds to augment the County's existing financial resources to fund programs and projects that protect the environment and improve the quality of life for its residents. The recommended actions are in line with the OurCounty Sustainability Plan Goal 12: A

commitment to realize OurCounty sustainability goals through creative, equitable, and coordinated funding and partnerships. The recommended actions also support the County's Equity Motion to provide infrastructure improvements and education to disadvantaged communities.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The estimated total project cost is \$8,000,000. UCF funds will be used to reimburse 100 percent of the total project cost up to \$8,000,000. Funding for the County's initial expenditures of \$100,000 is included in the Road Fund (B03 – Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2023-24 Budget. Funding for the future years will be requested through the annual budget process. Public Works will return to the Board for approval to advertise and award the contract for this project.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The Plan will address the urban tree canopy deficit within disadvantaged communities in the unincorporated County of Los Angeles by assessing areas of low canopy coverage, planting diverse tree species, and creating workforce development opportunities for the continued maintenance and monitoring of new and existing trees.

On July 11, 2000, the Board approved guidelines for the acceptance of State and Federal grants of \$100 thousand or more. These guidelines include a requirement that County departments prepare a Grant Management Statement for the Board's review prior to the departments carrying out the activities covered under the grant. Accordingly, the Grant Management Statement for the Early Action Implementation for Los Angeles County Urban Forest Management is enclosed.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The recommended actions are not subject to CEQA because they are activities that are excluded from the definition of a project by Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code and Section 15378 (b) of the State CEQA Guidelines. The proposed action would create a government funding mechanism that does not commit the County to any specific project or course of action that may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment. Public Works will return to your Board for project approval, including any CEQA approval and findings, and for authorization to advertise and award any additional contracts related to these projects.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The Plan will address the urban tree canopy deficit within disadvantaged communities in the unincorporated County of Los Angeles by assessing areas of low canopy coverage, planting diverse tree species, and creating workforce development opportunities for the continued maintenance and monitoring of new and existing trees.

Additionally, this action will result in augmenting the County's existing financial resources and will reimburse the County for a portion of the cost to provide planning efforts.

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval and authorization to annex an approved tentative subdivision project known as Tract 65296 located in the unincorporated area of Hacienda Heights to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687 and County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, Unincorporated Zone; order the levying of assessments for street lighting purposes; and approve the negotiated exchange of property tax revenues among those nonexempt taxing agencies whose service areas are subject to the jurisdictional changes.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Find that the proposed project is categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and record of the action.

- 2. Adopt the Resolution of Intention to Annex Approved Tentative Subdivision Territory to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687 and County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, Unincorporated Zone, and order the levying of assessments within the annexed territory for Fiscal Year 2025-26 whose area and boundary is identified on the diagram included in the resolution.
- 3. Set a date for a public hearing regarding the proposed annexation of territory and levying of annual assessments based on the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Annual Engineer's Report, which establishes assessments based on land use type for all zones within County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for street lighting purposes with an annual base assessment rate of \$5 for single-family residences in the Unincorporated Zone.
- 4. Instruct the Executive Officer of the Board to cause notice of the public hearing by mail at least 45 days prior to the scheduled public hearing date of June 11, 2024, pursuant to Section 53753 of the California Government Code. The mailed notice will include assessment ballots.

#### AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING, IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Find that the annexation and assessments are for the purposes of meeting operating expenses; purchasing supplies, equipment, or materials; meeting financial reserve needs and requirements; and obtaining funds for capital projects, including the operation and maintenance of streetlight(s) necessary to maintain service within the proposed annexation territory.
- 2. Order the tabulation of assessment ballots submitted, and not withdrawn, in support of or in opposition to the proposed assessments.
- 3. Determine whether a majority protest against the proposed annexation or assessment exists.
- 4. Make a finding terminating the annexation, levying of assessments, and property tax transfer proceedings in this tentative subdivision territory where the proposed annexation and levying of assessments has been rejected, if any, as a result of a majority protest and refer the matter back to Public Works.

- 5. If there is no majority protest against the proposed annexation or assessments:
  - a. Adopt the Resolution Ordering Annexation of Approved Tentative Subdivision Territory to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687, and County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, Unincorporated Zone, confirming a Diagram and Assessment and Levying of Assessments within the Annexed Territory for Fiscal Year 2025-26, either as proposed or as modified by the Board. The annexation and the exchange of property tax revenues shall not become effective unless the legal description for the annexed territory is approved as to definiteness and certainty by the Assessor. The adoption of the resolution ordering annexation shall constitute the levying of assessments in Fiscal Year 2025-26.
  - b. Adopt the joint resolutions between the Board and other taxing agencies approving and accepting the negotiated exchange of property tax revenues resulting from the annexation of subdivision territory to Co7unty Lighting Maintenance District 1687, as approved by the nonexempt taxing agencies.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

This action will annex the future housing development into the County Lighting Maintenance District (CLMD), ensuring that the property owners of the future housing development will provide their fair share of the funding for the operation and maintenance of the existing streetlights. This action benefits existing and future residents by ensuring that the CLMD will maintain the streetlights with the funding from those benefiting properties.

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines and allow the Board to: (1) annex specified tentative subdivision territory known as Tract 65296 to CLMD 1687, and County Lighting District (CLD) Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 (LLA-1), Unincorporated Zone (collectively, County Lighting Districts); (2) levy assessments in Fiscal Year 2025-26 on each lot or parcel lying within the proposed annexation territory based on land use categories that designate usage units on the basis of benefits received; and (3) approve the exchange of property tax revenue between CLMD 1687 and other nonexempt taxing entities whose service areas are subject to the jurisdictional changes.

The proposed annexation, levy of assessments, and exchange of property tax revenues are required to provide the necessary funding for the operation and maintenance of the existing streetlights that benefit Tract 65296. The proposed assessment rate for the subdivision development will be an annual assessment of \$5 per single-family residence within the Unincorporated Zone with proportionately higher rates for other land uses.

#### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities and Strategy III.3; Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended actions will allow for the continued operation of existing streetlights in the community and provide funding for their operation and maintenance. Maintaining lighting services provides for the convenience and safety of the motoring public, as well as the safety and security of people and property, which improves the quality of life in the County.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The annuals costs for operation and maintenance of the streetlights within the annexed territory is currently paid by CLMD 1687 (Fund F46). Since Tract 65296 will receive lighting benefit from existing streetlights, it is being annexed to collect revenues for fair share of the street lighting costs. Sufficient funding will be included in the Fund F46 (Services and Supplies) Fiscal Year 2025-26 Budget to cover the operation and maintenance costs of the streetlights.

In subsequent years, the ongoing operation and maintenance costs within the annexed territory will be funded by the CLMD's share of ad valorem property taxes, supplemented by assessments annually approved by the Board from property owners within this annexed territory. Adoption of the Joint Resolutions will result in a minimal property tax growth transfer from the affected taxing entities, including those taxing entities governed by the Board: County General Fund, Los Angeles County Accumulative Capital Outlay Account, County of Los Angeles Public Library, Los Angeles County Road Maintenance District 1, Los Angeles County Flood Control Drainage Improvement Maintenance District, Los Angeles County Flood Control District, and the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The County Code and applicable subdivision, planning, and zoning ordinances require the installation of a street lighting system by a subdivider as a condition of development. The subdivision development must comply with the terms of these ordinances and provide street lighting as a condition of development. The purpose of the recommended action is to annex the territory into the County Lighting Districts to comply with these ordinances and the California Streets and Highways Code Sections 5821.3 and 22608.2.

The Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (California Streets and Highways Code Section 22573) provides for the assessment of street lighting costs against the benefited properties within CLD LLA-1 by any formula or method that fairly distributes the costs among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each lot or parcel. A method of distributing the street lighting costs based on land use was approved by the Board on May 22, 1979, and amended on July 22, 1997, to include government-owned or -leased parcels. The same distribution method was used to compute the Fiscal Year 2023-24 base assessment rates for each zone within CLD LLA-1 as shown in the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Annual Engineer's Report on file with Public Works.

The procedures for levying of assessments previously authorized by the Board under California Government Code Section 53753, including the distribution, receipt, and tabulation of ballots at a public hearing are required and will be followed for the subdivision annexation project. The assessments are subject to the results of ballot tabulation at the conclusion of the public hearing. Failure to annex a territory, levy assessments, and collect property tax revenues will result in the inability to operate and maintain the streetlights as part of the County-administered street lighting districts and will result in the final subdivision map not being allowed to record with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk's office or be issued a Certificate of Occupancy. The assessments will not be levied if the weighted majority of ballots returned are opposed to the assessment.

The enclosed Resolution of Intention to Annex Approved Tentative Subdivision Territory (Enclosure A) must be adopted to set a date for the required public hearing. The Board, at the close of the public hearing, may delay its determination regarding the annexation and levying of assessments until a later date, continue the public hearing to receive further testimony, or make a determination regarding the annexations and/or assessments. The approval of the enclosed Resolution Ordering Annexation of Approved Tentative Subdivision Territory (Enclosure B), the levying of assessments,

and exchange of property tax revenues are required to provide the necessary funding for the operation and maintenance of the streetlights in the annexed territory.

The California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 99 et seq. provides that affected agencies must approve and accept the negotiated exchange of property tax revenues by resolution. The Joint Resolutions approving and accepting the negotiated exchange of property tax revenues have been approved by all other nonexempt taxing agencies and are enclosed for your consideration (Enclosure C).

Following the Board's approval of the resolutions for the annexation, levying of assessments, exchange of property tax revenues, and the developer's recordation of the final subdivision map and/or approval of the legal description by the Assessor, Public Works will file the statement of boundary changes with the State Board of Equalization as required by the California Government Code Section 54900 et seq. The resolutions have been approved as to form by County Counsel.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed project is exempt from CEQA. Adoption of the proposed resolution annexing territory to CLMD 1687 and CLD LLA-1, Unincorporated Zone, will provide the necessary funding for the operation and maintenance of streetlights for the purpose of meeting operating expenses and is exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 21080(b)(8) of the California Public Resources Code and Section 15273(a) of the State CEQA Guidelines based upon the written findings incorporated in the record setting forth the basis of the exemption with specificity.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The annexation of territory to the County Lighting Districts will result in street lighting for this territory and will have no impact on other services or projects.

# COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO ANNEX APPROVED TENTATIVE SUBDIVISION TERRITORY TO COUNTY LIGHTING MAINTENANCE DISTRICT 1687 AND COUNTY LIGHTING DISTRICT LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ACT-1, UNINCORPORATED ZONE, AND ORDER THE LEVYING OF ASSESSMENTS WITHIN THE ANNEXED TERRITORY FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025-26 TRACT 65296

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles (Board of Supervisors) established County Lighting Maintenance District 1687 under the Improvement Act of 1911 (California Streets and Highways Code Section 5000 et seq.), to fund the installation, operation, and maintenance of street lighting systems within its boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors subsequently approved the formation of County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 (LLA-1), under the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (California Streets and Highways Code Section 22500 et seq.) to provide supplemental funds for the operation of streetlights within various County Lighting Maintenance Districts, including County Lighting Maintenance District 1687; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors adopted the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Annual Engineer's Report that shows estimated operating costs and recommended assessments for Unincorporated Zone within County Lighting District LLA-1; and

WHEREAS, the Improvement Act of 1911 (California Streets and Highways Code Section 5821.3) provides that a territory owned by a subdivider may be annexed to an existing lighting district, without notice or hearing, in the event an ordinance requires installation of a street lighting system; and

WHEREAS, the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (California Streets and Highways Code Section 22608.2) provides that in the event an ordinance requires installation of improvements, such as a street lighting system by a subdivider, the territory may be annexed to an existing lighting district without notice and hearing or filing of an Engineer's Report, or both; and

WHEREAS, by the County Code, the subdivision development is required to install a street lighting system, which may be accomplished by annexing to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687, and County Lighting District LLA-1, Unincorporated Zone (collectively, County Lighting Districts); and

WHEREAS, upon annexation to the County Lighting Districts, the annexed territory known as approved tentative subdivision Tract 65296 located in the unincorporated area of Hacienda Heights, will become subject to new assessment; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code Section 53753 provides notice, protest, and hearing requirements applicable to the levying of the new assessments, which supersede any other such statutory requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, that:

SECTION 1. The public interest and convenience require, and it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors to authorize, the annexation of the territory to County Lighting Maintenance District 1687, as applicable, pursuant to California Streets and Highways Code Section 5837.

SECTION 2. The public interest and convenience require, and it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors to authorize the annexation of the territory to County Lighting District LLA-1, Unincorporated Zone, pursuant to California Streets and Highways Code Section 22605.

SECTION 3. The public interest and convenience require, and it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors to authorize, the expense necessary for the operation, maintenance, repairs, replacement, electric current, care, supervision, and all other items necessary for proper operation and maintenance of proposed streetlights within the proposed annexation territory and located within the County Lighting Districts. The needed amounts shall be assessed, levied, and collected in Fiscal Year 2024-25 upon each lot or parcel of land lying within the annexed territory based on land use categories that designate usage units on the basis of benefits received, as defined in the Assessor's report dated May 22, 1979, and amended on July 22, 1997, to include government-owned or -leased parcels, and which should be assessed to pay the expenses of the operation and maintenance of said improvements. The base assessment rates for a single-family residence, along with proportional increases for other land uses, are shown in the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Annual Engineer's Report for each zone within County Lighting District LLA-1. The same annual base assessment rate established for the Unincorporated Zone are proposed for all benefited properties within the proposed annexation territory.

SECTION 4. The boundary of the territory proposed to be annexed is shown on the attached diagram.

SECTION 5. The proposed assessments are subject to approval by the affected property owner(s). A ballot and public hearing notice will be sent to the property owner(s) within the territory proposed for annexation at least 45 days prior to the date of the public hearing. The ballots will be weighted by the amount of assessment to be paid by each property owner. A territory will not be annexed, and the proposed assessment will be

abandoned, if the weighted majority of the ballots returned are opposed to the assessment.


SECTION 6. The amounts to be assessed for the expense of such operation and maintenance of the work or improvements described above shall be levied and collected in the same manner and by the same officers as taxes for County purposes.

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer of the Board caused the notice of public hearing to be mailed to all property owners within the territory subject to the proposed annexation and levying of assessments at least 45 days prior to the date set for public hearing; and

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles County Public Works mailed assessment ballots and notices to all property owners of identified parcels within the territory proposed for annexation, pursuant to California Government Code Section 53753, to indicate support of or opposition to the matter of an assessment; and

WHEREAS, said Board of Supervisors has heard all testimony and evidence with regard to the annexation and levying of assessments, has tabulated the returned assessment ballots concerning the proposed assessments for the subdivision territory shown in Appendix A, and has made a determination on whether a majority protest exists.

## **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to continue the street lighting assessment rates in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for all 14 zones, which include the unincorporated area and 13 cities (Agoura Hills, Bell Gardens, Calabasas, Carson, Diamond Bar, La Cañada-Flintridge, La Mirada, Lawndale, Lomita, Paramount, Malibu, Rolling Hills Estates, and Walnut) for Fiscal Year 2024-25 at the same rate as Fiscal Year 2023-24.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Find that the proposed project is statutorily exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for reasons stated in this letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Approve and file the Engineer's Report for the proposed annual levying of assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for street lighting purposes for Fiscal Year 2024-25.

- 3. Adopt the Resolution of Intention to order the levying of assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for Fiscal Year 2024-25.
- 4. Set the public hearing for May 14, 2024, on the proposed continuation of the Fiscal Year 2023-24 levying of annual assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for Fiscal Year 2024-25 in all zones identified in the Fiscal Year 2024-25 Engineer's Report.
- 5. Instruct the Executive Officer of the Board to give notice of public hearing by causing the Resolution of Intention to be published once in both English and Spanish language newspapers at least 10 days prior to the date of hearing scheduled for May 14, 2024, pursuant to Section 22626(a) of the California Streets and Highways Code.

## AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING, IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Authorize changes, if needed, in any of the matters provided in the Engineer's Report, including changes in the improvements, any zones within County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, the diagram that shows the district's boundaries, and the proposed assessment as described in the Engineer's Report.
- 2. Determine and levy assessments in any amount not to exceed the recommended amounts listed in the Engineer's Report for each assessment zone.
- 3. Adopt a Resolution Confirming the Diagram and Assessment and Ordering of Assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for Fiscal Year 2024-25, either as originally proposed or as changed by the Board. The adoption of the resolution shall constitute the levying of annual assessments in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for Fiscal Year 2024-25.
- 4. Find that the property tax and assessment revenues collected from benefited properties will meet operating expenses and financial reserve needs and requirements; purchase supplies, equipment, or materials; provide funds for capital improvement projects, including construction of additional streetlights and the repair and replacement of obsolete equipment with new modern equipment necessary for the proper operation of lighting facilities in accordance with the provisions of the Improvement Act of 1911 and the Landscaping and

Lighting Act of 1972; and in the amount shown for each maintenance district and assessment zone listed in Appendix E of Fiscal Year 2024-25 Engineer's Report.

5. Determine that it is just and equitable and in the public's interest that the additional cost for the expenses of the installation and maintenance of additional streetlights be made a charge upon the existing districts as a whole in Fiscal Year 2024-25, pursuant to Section 5843.5 of the California Streets and Highways Code.

## PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to renew the annual levy of street lighting assessments in unincorporated County area and 13 cities served by the County Lighting Maintenance Districts (CLMDs) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25. This action will provide the supplemental funding necessary to ensure uninterrupted street lighting services for the motoring public, as well as the safety and security of people and property, benefitting all users of the roadways within the assessment district. The Street lighting assessment rates in CLD LLA-1 for FY 2024-25 will remain the same rates as FY 2023-24.

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and establish the FY 2024-25 street lighting assessment rates in County Lighting District (CLD) Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 (LLA-1) for all zones established for the unincorporated area and 13 cities shown in Appendix F of the Engineer's Report (Enclosure A) where the County administers streetlights. Since the existing street lighting assessments expire annually, the Board must renew the annual street lighting assessments to provide supplemental funding for the operation and maintenance of streetlights within CLD LLA-1.

## Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability.

## FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund.

The annual street lighting assessments for all zones identified in FY 2023-24 Engineer's Report will expire on June 30, 2024, unless the Board approves the annual street lighting assessments for FY 2024-25 for the operation and maintenance of the streetlights. Financing for the installation, operation, and maintenance of streetlights in FY 2024-25 will be derived from the assessment revenue collected from benefited property owners within CLD LLA-1 and by a portion of the property taxes that is allocated to County Lighting Maintenance Districts for street lighting purposes. Funding for this work is included in the FY 2024-25 County Lighting Maintenance Districts' budget.

## FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

On March 19, 2024, the Board adopted a resolution ordering the Director of Public Works or his designee to prepare and file an Engineer's Report for FY 2024-25 for the levying of annual assessments in CLD LLA-1, pursuant to provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 and Article XIII D of the California Constitution.

CLD LLA-1 was formed on July 24, 1979, to provide supplemental funding for the continued operation of the street lighting systems in the existing CLMDs listed in Appendix A of the Engineer's Report. Each year, the Board takes action to renew the annual street lighting assessments to keep streetlights in the various CLMDs fully operational.

The Landscaping and Lighting Act and the California Constitution (Article XIIID) set forth procedures that must be followed for any fiscal year during which an assessment is to be levied. The Landscaping and Lighting Act requires the legislative body to approve and file an annual Engineer's Report and to adopt a resolution of intention declaring the Board's intent to levy and collect assessments in CLD LLA-1 for the upcoming fiscal year. During the course or upon conclusion of the public hearing, the Board may order changes in any of the matters provided in the Engineer's Report, including changes in the improvements, the boundaries of any zones within the assessment district, and the proposed diagram or proposed assessment. The Board can also close the hearing to testimony and delay the determination regarding the assessments until a later date or continue the public hearing to receive further testimony and make the determination regarding the assessment at the close of the public hearing continuance. However, according to Section 22629 of the California Streets and Highways Code, the hearing may not be continued beyond August 10, 2024, without prior consent of the Auditor-Controller.

The Landscaping and Lighting Act provides for the assessment of street lighting costs against the benefited properties within CLD LLA-1 by any formula or method that fairly distributes the costs among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated

benefits to be received by each from the improvements. A method of distributing the street lighting costs on the basis of land use was approved by the Board on May 22, 1979, and amended on July 22, 1997, to include government-owned or -leased parcels. The report showing the approved method and the assessment units to be assessed on the various types of lots or parcels is on file in the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors and is made a part hereof by reference. This same method is used to compute the FY 2024-25 assessments.

The California Streets and Highways Code Section 22623 provides that the Board may approve the Engineer's Report as filed or modify the Engineer's Report and approve it as modified.

The enclosed Resolution of Intention (Enclosure B) and Resolution Confirming the Diagram (Enclosure C) have been approved as to form by County Counsel.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed project is statutorily exempt from CEQA. Adoption of the proposed resolutions to determine and levy the annual street lighting assessments for FY 2024-25 is for the purpose of meeting operating expenses and, therefore, is exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 15273(a) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Section 21080(b)(8) of the California Public Resources Code.

## IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

The levying of the annual assessments is required to fund the operation and maintenance of street lighting facilities.

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## **INTRODUCTION**

On March 19, 2024, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles designated the Director of Public Works or his designee as the Engineer and adopted a resolution ordering the preparation and filing of an Engineer's Report for Fiscal Year 2024-25, in accordance with Section 22566 of the California Streets and Highways Code and Section 4(b) of Article XIII D of the California Constitution (Proposition 218), for the levying of annual assessments in all zones within the County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 (CLD LLA-1), an assessment district, for street lighting purposes.

The annual levying of assessments is necessary to provide supplemental funding for the continued operation of the existing County Lighting Maintenance and Assessment Districts (County Lighting Districts). This Engineer's Report (Report) is prepared in response to the above directive to address all zones within the CLD LLA-1.

## COUNTY LIGHTING MAINTENANCE AND ASSESSMENT DISTRICTS

The County Lighting Maintenance Districts (CLMDs) are established street lighting maintenance districts. Prior to the enactment of State Constitutional Amendment XIII-A (Proposition 13) in 1978, which placed a limit on the maximum amount of ad valorem tax increases on real property, the operation and maintenance of streetlights within the CLMDs were fully funded by ad valorem property taxes. The ad valorem property taxes received under the guidelines established by the State Legislature subsequent to the passing of this amendment were not sufficient to pay the cost of street lighting services within the CLMDs.

The assessment district, or CLD LLA-1, was formed on July 24, 1979, to provide supplemental funding for the existing CLMDs. It was formed to be essentially coextensive with the CLMDs listed in Appendix A. Its boundaries include unincorporated territory plus areas within the Cities of Agoura Hills, Bell Gardens, Calabasas, Carson, Diamond Bar, La Cañada Flintridge, La Mirada, Lawndale, Lomita, Malibu, Paramount, Rolling Hills Estates, and Walnut. The CLD LLA-1 has a separate zone for the unincorporated territory and for each city encompassing only the city territory currently within a CLMD. The designation for each city zone is the name of the city within which it lies.

County Lighting Districts' maps that show a diagram of each existing zone within the CLD LLA-1 and indicate the general nature, location, extent of improvements, the exterior boundaries of each zone, and lines and dimensions of each lot or parcel located therein, are on file with the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors at the Kenneth Hahn Hall of Administration and are made a part of this report by reference. Maps of developments annexed to the County Lighting Districts pursuant to Section 22608.2 of the California Streets and Highways Code, subsequent to the formation of the CLD LLA-1, are on file with the Assessor at the Kenneth Hahn Hall of Administration.

## STREETLIGHT ACQUISITION AND LED CONVERSION PROJECT

In December of 2022, the County of Los Angeles completed the purchase and acquisition of approximately 29,000 streetlights from Southern California Edison (SCE) in CLMD 1687 serving the unincorporated County communities at an estimated cost of \$23.6 million. The County is in the process of converting the purchased streetlights to light emitting diodes (LED) technology at an estimated cost of \$8.8 million. An additional \$1.8 million will be expended to upgrade the streetlights to install safety fuse and pole tags required for County ownership and maintenance. Public Works utilized CLMD 1687's capital improvement designations/reserves to finance the total project cost. Public Works has also received approximately \$2.7 million in LED incentives from Southern California Edison. LED conversion work is scheduled to be completed in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24.

## STREETLIGHT POLE UPGRADE PROGRAM

The Streetlight Pole Upgrade Program is financed with annual revenue surplus set aside for upgrade of existing streetlights to standard streetlights on concrete pole with underground wiring as well as conversion to LED lighting. This includes the upgrading of steel pole streetlights that have been identified as warranting upgrade to the current standard. Revenues designated for streetlight upgrades and/or capital improvement projects in the unincorporated and city zones are included in Appendix G.

Streetlights owned by SCE in the CLMDs will be converted to LED lighting by SCE under their Option E Program. For the CLMDs serving cities, concurrence from the city is required for the County to proceed with execution of an Option E agreement with SCE. The Cities of Agoura Hills, Lomita, Calabasas, Malibu, and Rolling Hills Estates are currently not enrolled in LED conversion via the Option E Program.

The Option E Program allows for the LED conversion of SCE-owned, LS-1 streetlights with no upfront cost; rather, costs will be recovered through a 20-year premium charge on monthly SCE invoices. Analyses provided by SCE reveal that the energy savings from the LED conversion will exceed the premium charge imposed by SCE, resulting in a net annual savings to the affected CLMD. SCE also provides the option to pay off the LED conversion cost balance prior to the 20-year payback period. When sufficient surplus revenues are accumulated under the Streetlight Pole Upgrade Program during the 20-year payback period, Public Works will issue a lump sum payment to SCE.

## STEEL POLE REPLACEMENT

SCE is undergoing a Steel Pole replacement program within its territory to address corrosion issues found in aging and antiquated SCE-owned steel poles. The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) allots certain funding each year for SCE to perform the steel pole replacements and replacements are programmatically targeted by city jurisdiction. CLMD 1687 will be embarking in a similar program to replace approximately

6,000 aging steel pole streetlights at a cost of \$180 million and to be allocated and phased out over several years provided funding is available.

Additional streetlights may be installed on major roadways in commercial or industrial areas as part of the steel pole replacement program for CLMD 1687. Project scoping and environmental review are ongoing.

## NEW COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH COUNTY OWNERSHIP OF STREETLIGHTS

When the financial analysis for the Streetlight Acquisition and LED Conversion project was completed in 2019, Public Works anticipated that cost savings realized from streetlight ownership and LED conversion will be offset by the additional cost of operating and maintaining the newly purchased streetlights. However, subsequent streetlight tariff rate increases have significantly impacted net surplus revenues resulting from the project. Currently, streetlight maintenance of the purchased streetlights in CLMD 1687 is provided by a contractor at an estimated cost of \$1.8 million annually. In addition, there will be costs associated with funding construction of additional streetlights and the repair and replacement of obsolete equipment with new modern equipment necessary for the proper operation of lighting facilities, processing accident claims, and providing emergency response and recovery in case of natural disasters.

### **GENERAL RATE CASES**

Every four years SCE and other investor-owned utilities are required to enter proceedings with the CPUC to justify rate increases to its customers, also known as General Rate cases (GRC). Based on historical data, a rate tariff increase of approximately 5 percent per year is typical, which is included to determine the annual assessment rates to ensure funding availability for the CLMDs to cover rate increases approved by the CPUC.

## **FISCAL YEAR 2023-24 IMPROVEMENTS**

Seven new subdivision and single-lot developments processed for annexation to the County Lighting Districts or constructed within the existing boundaries of the County Lighting Districts, whose streetlight operational costs were transferred from a developer's account to a lighting district account in FY 2023-24, are listed in Appendix B. The County Lighting Districts assumed funding responsibilities for a total of 42 streetlights. The number and size of streetlights installed and the estimated annual operating costs for each new subdivision or single-lot development, together with the zone in which the development is located, is also listed in Appendix B. Maps of the annexation and the type and location of the improvements installed by the developers are shown on maps on file with Public Works at 900 South Fremont Avenue in Alhambra.

Information on an additional 6 streetlights authorized for installation within the boundaries of the County Lighting Districts during FY 2023-24, in response to specific requests and in compliance with procedures set forth in the California Streets and

Highways Code Section 22565 et seq. is shown in Appendix C. Maps showing the type and location of the improvements are on file with Public Works.

Annexations of territories by petition of the property owners, together with the number and sizes of streetlights approved by the Board of Supervisors during FY 2023-24, are shown in Appendix D. A total of 17 streetlights were authorized for installation or installed. Maps of the annexation and the type and location of the improvements are shown on maps on file with Public Works.

Highway Safety Lights at signalized intersections accepted for transfer of billing into a CLMD account along with their annual energy and maintenance costs are shown in Appendix E. No Highway Safety Lights were transferred, however, to a CLMD account in FY 2023-24.

## PROPERTY TAX AND ASSESSMENTS REVENUES

All benefited parcels of real property located within the County Lighting Districts are identified by the FY 2023-24 Tax Rate Area Report and Assessor Parcel Numbers listed in Appendix F. The diagram of each CLMD and CLD LLA-1 Zone, along with the lines and dimensions of each lot or parcel of land located therein, are described in maps prepared in accordance with Section 327 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code, which are on file in the Office of the Assessor and are made a part of this Report by reference.

Funds collected pursuant to the California Streets and Highways Code, the Improvement Act of 1911 and the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, may be used for certain streetlight upgrades or capital improvements. Revenues designated for streetlight upgrades and/or capital improvement projects in the unincorporated and city zones are included in Appendix G. Signed into law by Governor on July 9, 2018, Senate Bill 1323 expanded the authority of County-administered CLMDs formed pursuant to the Improvement Act of 1911 and allowed them to use funds collected to perform maintenance and make improvements including streetlight acquisition pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972.

Section 22573 of the California Streets and Highways Code provides for assessment of street lighting costs upon the benefited properties within the CLD LLA-1. The Section states, "The net amount to be assessed upon lands within an assessment district may be apportioned by any formula or method, which fairly distributes the net amount among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each such lot or parcel from the improvements." A method of distributing the street lighting costs on the basis of land use and land-use data compiled by the Assessor was approved by the Board on May 22, 1979, and amended by the Board on July 22, 1997, to distribute costs among governmental-owned or -leased parcels in accordance with the provisions of Article XIII D of the California Constitution. The Assessor's report showing the approved method and the number of usage units assigned to the various land use categories on the basis of benefits received is on file with the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors.

The July 22, 1997, amendment provides for as-needed, automatic future assessment increases to governmental-owned or -leased parcels within the Calabasas, Carson, Lomita, and Paramount Zones. In future years, the amount of the base rate assessment for Calabasas and Lomita Zones may be automatically increased based on streetlight tariff rates charged by Southern California Edison as approved by the California Public Utilities Commission. For the Carson and Paramount Zones, the amount of the base rate assessment may be automatically adjusted annually for cost of living based on a factor calculated by using the Consumer Price Index for the Los Angeles Riverside-Orange County areas for all Urban Consumers.

## **RECOMMENDED FISCAL YEAR 2024-25 ASSESSMENTS**

Appendix H lists the proposed assessment rate per unit for FY 2024-25 and the amount of estimated assessment revenue to be collected for the unincorporated and 13 city zones located within CLD LLA-1. If the proposed assessments for FY 2024-25, which are at the same rates as in FY 2023-24, are not approved by the Board of Supervisors, it will be necessary to reduce street lighting services to stay within the operating revenues from ad valorem property taxes. The estimated costs of operating CLD LLA-1 during FY 2024-25 are shown in Appendix H. The estimated costs were evaluated and determined to be reasonable and appropriate.

### APPENDIX A – COUNTY LIGHTING MAINTENANCE DISTRICTS

### APPENDIX B - SUBDIVISION AND SINGLE-LOT IMPROVEMENTS

Street lighting improvements are required for subdivision and single-lot developments as a condition of development. Annexation to the County Lighting Districts provides for the collection of revenues from the developments to pay for the operation and maintenance cost of existing and new streetlights.

Shown below are street lighting improvements with utility billings that were transferred from a developer's account to a lighting district account in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24 and are proposed to be included in the FY 2024-25 levy of assessments. The improvements installed by the developers are shown, together with their locations, on maps on file at Public Works.

## APPENDIX D - ANNEXATION OF TERRITORY AND FORMATION OF IMPROVEMENT ZONES

When a new street lighting system is requested by the public, it will be installed via a petition annexation process to annex the territory to the County Lighting Districts to collect revenues from the benefiting parcels for the operation and maintenance costs of new streetlights. In addition, an improvement zone may be formed to levy a second assessment against the properties to reimburse the County Lighting Districts for a loan to finance the costs to process the annexation and install new streetlights. There were no Improvement Zones formed in FY 2023-24.

# BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO ORDER THE LEVYING OF ASSESSMENTS IN COUNTY LIGHTING DISTRICT LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ACT-1 FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024-25 PURSUANT TO PROVISIONS OF LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ACT OF 1972 TO PROVIDE SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDS FOR OPERATION OF EXISTING STREETLIGHTS

WHEREAS, on July 24, 1979, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles approved the formation of County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, and a separate zone therein, for each of the County Lighting Maintenance Districts serving the unincorporated territory and the Cities of Agoura Hills, Bell Gardens, Calabasas, Carson, Diamond Bar, La Cañada-Flintridge, La Mirada, Lawndale, Lomita, Malibu, Paramount, Rolling Hills Estates, and Walnut to provide supplemental funds for the operation of streetlights; and

WHEREAS, on March 19, 2024, the Board of Supervisors adopted a Resolution Ordering Engineer's Report for Fiscal Year 2024-25 for the levying of assessments for street lighting purposes for each zone in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, as required by law; and

WHEREAS, on \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, the Board of Supervisors has approved and filed the Engineer's Report for the aforementioned zones in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 showing estimated operating costs and recommended assessments for each zone in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 as required by law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, that:

SECTION 1. The public interest and convenience require, that it is the intention of said Board of Supervisors to order the expense necessary for the operation, maintenance, repairs, replacement, electric current, care, supervision, and all other items necessary for proper operation and maintenance of streetlights located within County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, shall be assessed upon each lot or parcel of land lying within County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 in proportion to the estimated benefits received from the existing street lighting improvements, and which should be assessed to pay the expense of the operation and maintenance of said improvements. The Engineer's Report on file with the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors describes the boundaries of County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, and the zones located therein, including the locations of improvements and proposed assessments on each lot or parcel of land included therein.

SECTION 2. The proposed assessments for Fiscal Year 2024-25, in all of the aforementioned Zones, are proposed to remain at the same level as the Fiscal Year 2023-24 assessment amounts. Property owners are referred to their last property tax bill for their individual existing annual street lighting assessment amount. A table showing the designated usage units on the basis of benefits received for each type of property use can also be obtained by writing to or calling the Los Angeles County Public Works (see Sections 8 and 9 for address and telephone number).

SECTION 3. The amounts to be assessed for the expense of such operation and maintenance of the work or improvements described above shall be levied and collected in the same manner and by the same officers as taxes expended for operation, maintenance, and service in all street lighting zones in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1, as described in the Engineer's Report and Section 1 of this Resolution.

SECTION 4. The proceedings for the levying of assessments shall be taken under and in accordance with an act of the Legislature of the State of California, known and designated as the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (California Streets and Highways Code Section 22500 et seq.).

SECTION 5. SECTION 6. The Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors shall give notice of the public hearing for all of the aforementioned Zones of County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 pursuant to Section 22626(a) of the California Streets and Highways Code, in the form and manner specified in Sections 22552 and 22553 of the California Streets and Highways Code to be published in the newspaper(s), published and circulated in the County of Los Angeles, which is hereby designated for this purpose, not less than 10 days prior to the date of said hearing, as stated above in this resolution.

SECTION 7. The Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors shall cause notice of said hearing to be posted in the form and manner specified by Section 22554 of the California Streets and Highways Code.

WHEREAS, the Department of Public Works has prepared and filed an Engineer's Report with the Board of Supervisors as required by law; and

WHEREAS, the Board did proceed to give notice in the manner required by law of the time and place for a public hearing on the levying of the proposed assessments; and

WHEREAS, said Board has heard all testimony and evidence and is desirous of proceeding with levying of assessments.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles:

SECTION 1. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles hereby finds the public safety and convenience require the continued operation and maintenance of the street lighting improvements in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1.

SECTION 2. It is just and equitable, and in the public interest for the expenses for the installation and maintenance of additional lights within County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 be paid by the lighting districts as a whole for Fiscal Year 2024-25.

SECTION 3. The lighting districts diagrams and assessments as set forth in said report, or as modified, are hereby approved, confirmed, and adopted by this Board.

SECTION 4. The adoption of this resolution constitutes the continuance of the previous Fiscal Year 2023-24 levy of assessments for all of the aforementioned zones in County Lighting District Landscaping and Lighting Act-1 for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2024, and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 5. The amount to be assessed for the expenses of the operation, maintenance, and service, as described in said Engineer's Report and resolution, shall be levied and collected in the same manner and by the same officers as taxes for County purposes are levied and collected, and shall be disbursed and expended for operation, maintenance, and service of the said lighting districts, all as described in the Engineer's Report and in Section 1 of the Resolution of Intention.

SECTION 6. The Clerk of the Board is hereby ordered and directed to file a certified copy of the lighting districts diagrams and assessments together with a certified copy of this resolution upon its adoption with the County Assessor and Auditor-Controller.




## ENCLOSURE A PROPOSED TRAFFIC REGULATION EAST LA MIRADA SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 4






# ENCLOSURE A PROPOSED TRAFFIC REGULATIONS ALTADENA SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT 5



#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of this Board letter is to adopt a Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution and find that the recommended actions are not a project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) or, in the alternative, to find that they are exempt from CEQA, and to reapportion the ad valorem tax that is shared by the affected

taxing entities as a result of pending Annexation 40-159 (4-215) into the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley (District). The annexation area (Exhibits A and B) is comprised of four vacant lots that include approximately 40 acres located at the intersection of Avenue G and 45th Street West within the City of Lancaster. This annexation will impact Tax Rate Area 09814.

Approval of the recommended actions is necessary to support an application for annexation into the District to supply the domestic and fire suppression water for the proposed annexed area. There are no other practical alternatives for water services in the area. The application for annexation is anticipated to be considered by Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) for the County of Los Angeles at a future date.

Pursuant to Section 99.01 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, in the case of any jurisdictional change that will result in a special district providing one or more services to an area where those services have not previously been provided by any local agency, the special district and each local agency receiving property tax revenue from the area must negotiate an exchange of property tax revenue subject to the jurisdictional change and attributable to those local agencies.

The governing bodies of the respective taxing entities in the affected areas have adopted the enclosed Joint Resolution based on the negotiated exchange of ad valorem property tax revenue related to the proposed annexation to the District.

In order for LAFCO to proceed with the required hearings on the proposed annexation, the Board, as the governing body of the County of Los Angeles and as the governing body of the County of Los Angeles Special Districts, acting on behalf of the Los Angeles County Library, the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County, and the District, must also adopt the enclosed Joint Resolution. The Joint Resolution will transfer a portion of the annual property tax increment attributable to the proposed annexation area from the County of Los Angeles and other taxing entities to the District according to ratios listed in Exhibits C and D. Each of the affected agencies' share of the annual property tax increment will be adjusted accordingly.

#### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended action will respond to public needs by collecting the applicable tax revenue to provide effective and efficient delivery of water to future customers within the annexed area.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The Joint Resolution for Annexation 40-159 (4-215) will transfer to the District a portion of the annual property tax increment from the County General Fund and each of the affected County taxing entities, which include the County of Los Angeles, the Los Angeles County Library, the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County, together with the Antelope Valley Cemetery District, the Antelope Valley Resource Conservation District, City Council of the City of Lancaster, and the Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency. The tax-sharing ratios listed in Exhibits C and D were calculated using a formula approved by the County of Los Angeles Auditor-Controller. In this instance, revenues to the County General Fund from the ad valorem property tax on the affected properties would result in a Property Tax Reduction of 0.20 percent for Tax Rate Area No. 09814.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Section 99.01 of the Revenue and Taxation Code requires that prior to the effective date of any jurisdictional change, the governing bodies of all agencies whose service areas or service responsibilities will be altered by such change must negotiate a reallocation of property tax revenue between the affected agencies and approve and accept such reallocation by resolution.

Adoption of the Joint Resolution by the Board will allow LAFCO to schedule the required public hearing to consider testimony on the proposed annexation. LAFCO will subsequently take action to approve, approve with changes, or disapprove the proposal. The Joint Resolution has also been approved as to form by County Counsel.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The recommended actions, including adoption of the Joint Resolution for Annexation 40-159 (4-215) and the resulting shares of the ad valorem tax, do not constitute approval of a project under Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code and are excluded from the definition of a project pursuant to Section 15378(b)(4) and (5) of the CEQA Guidelines since the activities involve the creation of a government funding mechanism or other government fiscal activity, which does not involve any commitment to any specific project that may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment and are organizational or administrative activities of government that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment. In the alternative, approval of the recommended actions is statutorily exempt pursuant to Sections 21080(b)(8), 15273(a)(1), and 15273(a)(4), which exempt the establishment, modification, structuring, restructuring or approval of rates, tolls, fares or other charges by public agencies, which the public agency finds are for the purpose of meeting operating expenses, including employee wage rates and fringe benefits, and obtaining funds for capital projects

necessary to maintain service within existing service areas. The standby charges and a portion of the property taxes will go toward the District's Accumulated Capital Outlay Fund, which is exclusively dedicated to funding capital improvement projects. Further, the activity is exempt under Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines because it can be seen with certainty that the proposed actions will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment.

Approval of the tax resolution does not approve or authorize any project under CEQA. Prior to proceeding with any activity that would constitute a project, appropriate findings under CEQA and approval of the proposed project activities would be necessary.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152 of the Public Resources Code and with the State Clearinghouse at the State Office of Planning and Research and will post the Notice to the County's website in accordance with Section 21092.2.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

This action will allow the District to provide water service to the annexed area and will not have any negative impact on existing services or other planned projects.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 99.01 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, in the case of any jurisdictional change that will result in a special district providing one or more services to an area where those services have not previously been provided by any local agency, the special district and each local agency that receives an apportionment of property tax revenue from the area may negotiate an exchange of property tax revenue generated in the area subject to the jurisdictional change and attributable to those local agencies; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, acting as the governing body of the County of Los Angeles; the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley; the Los Angeles County Library; and the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County; together with the Board of Directors of the Antelope Valley Cemetery District, the Board of Directors of the Antelope Valley Resource Conservation District, the City Council of the City of Lancaster, and the Board of Directors of the Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency have determined the amount of property tax revenue to be exchanged between their respective agencies as a result of the annexation proposal identified as Annexation 40-159 (4-215) to the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley, is as set forth:

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#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

- 1. The County of Los Angeles; the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley; the Los Angeles County Library; the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County; the Antelope Valley Cemetery District; the Antelope Valley Resource Conservation District; the City of Lancaster and the Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency have determined the amount of property tax revenue to be exchanged between their respective agencies as a result of the annexation proposal identified as Annexation 40-159 (4-215) is approved and accepted.
- 2. For fiscal years commencing on or after July 1, 2024, or the July 1 after the effective date of this jurisdictional change, whichever is later, the property tax revenue increment generated from the area within Annexation 40-159 (4-215) shall be allocated to the affected agencies as indicated in the enclosed worksheets (Exhibits C and D).
- 3. No transfer of property tax revenues other than those specified in paragraph 2 shall be made as a result of Annexation 40-159 (4-215).
- 4. If at any time after the effective date of this Joint Resolution, the calculations used herein to determine initial property tax transfers, or the data used to perform those calculations, are found to be incorrect, thus producing an improper or inaccurate property tax transfer, the property tax transfer shall be recalculated and the corrected transfer shall be implemented for the next fiscal year.

#### <u>SUBJECT</u>

Public Works is seeking Board approval to adopt the Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution associated with annexation of territory into the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD ACTING AS THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY LIBRARY, THE CONSOLIDATED FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY, AND THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY WATERWORKS DISTRICT NO. 40, ANTELOPE VALLEY:

1. Find that the adoption of the Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution for Annexation 40-160 (4-216) and the resulting share of the ad valorem tax do not constitute a project under the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code, Sections 15378(b) and 15061 of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines since the activities do not constitute a project and are administrative in nature or, in the alternative, find that the activities herein are statutorily exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 21080(b)(8) of the Public Resources Code and California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines Section 15273 since they are for the purpose of meeting the operation, maintenance, and capital project expenses of the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley, for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the proposed activities.

- 2. Adopt the Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution approving and accepting the negotiated exchange of property tax revenue resulting from Annexation 40-160 (4-216), Local Agency Formation Commission Designation 2023-09, on behalf of the County of Los Angeles.
- 3. Adopt the Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution approving and accepting the negotiated exchange of property tax revenue resulting from Annexation 40-160 (4-216), Local Agency Formation Commission Designation 2023-09, on behalf of the Los Angeles County Library.
- 4. Adopt the Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution approving and accepting the negotiated exchange of property tax revenue resulting from Annexation 40-160 (4-216), Local Agency Formation Commission Designation 2023-09, on behalf of the Consolidated Fire Protection District.
- 5. Adopt the Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution approving and accepting the negotiated exchange of property tax revenue resulting from Annexation 40-160 (4-216), Local Agency Formation Commission Designation 2023-09, on behalf of the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley.
- 6. Authorize the Director of Public Works, the Director of the Los Angeles County Library, the Chief of the Consolidated Fire Protection District or their designees, on behalf of the County of Los Angeles; the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley; the Los Angeles County Library; and the Consolidated Fire Protection District to take all actions necessary to effectuate the Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to adopt the Negotiated Property Tax Exchange Joint Resolution and find that the recommended actions are not a project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) or, in the alternative, to find that they are exempt from CEQA, and to reapportion the ad valorem tax that is shared by the affected taxing entities as a result of pending Annexation 40-160 (4-216) into the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley (District). The annexation area (Exhibits A and B) is comprised of two vacant lots that include approximately 40 acres located west of State Route (SR-14) freeway, North of Avenue G, and adjacent to 30th Street West within the City of Lancaster. This annexation will impact Tax Rate Area 11528.

Approval of the recommended actions is necessary to support an application for annexation into the District to supply the domestic and fire suppression water for the proposed annexed area. There are no other practical alternatives for water services in the area. The application for annexation is anticipated to be considered by Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) for the County of Los Angeles at a future date.

Pursuant to Section 99.01 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, in the case of any jurisdictional change that will result in a special district providing one or more services to an area where those services have not previously been provided by any local agency, the special district and each local agency receiving property tax revenue from the area must negotiate an exchange of property tax revenue subject to the jurisdictional change and attributable to those local agencies.

The governing bodies of the respective taxing entities in the affected areas have adopted the enclosed Joint Resolution based on the negotiated exchange of ad valorem property tax revenue related to the proposed annexation to the District.

In order for LAFCO to proceed with the required hearings on the proposed annexation, the Board, as the governing body of the County of Los Angeles and as the governing body of the County of Los Angeles Special Districts, acting on behalf of the Los Angeles County Library, the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County, and the District, must also adopt the enclosed Joint Resolution. The Joint Resolution will transfer a portion of the annual property tax increment attributable to the proposed annexation area from the County of Los Angeles and other taxing entities to the District according to ratios listed in Exhibits C and D. Each of the affected agencies' share of the annual property tax increment will be adjusted accordingly.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability. The recommended action will respond to public needs by collecting the applicable tax revenue to provide effective and efficient delivery of water to future customers within the annexed area.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The Joint Resolution for Annexation 40-160 (4-216) will transfer to the District a portion of the annual property tax increment from the County General Fund and each of the affected County taxing entities, which include the County of Los Angeles, the Los Angeles County Library, the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County, together with the Antelope Valley Cemetery District, the Antelope Valley Mosquito and Vector Control District, the Antelope Valley Resource Conservation District, the City of Lancaster, and the Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency. The tax-sharing ratios listed in Exhibits C and D were calculated using a formula approved by the County of Los Angeles Auditor-Controller. In this instance, revenues to the County General Fund from the ad valorem property tax on the affected properties would result in a Property Tax Reduction of 0.28 percent for Tax Rate Area No. 11528.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Section 99.01 of the Revenue and Taxation Code requires that prior to the effective date of any jurisdictional change, the governing bodies of all agencies whose service areas or service responsibilities will be altered by such change must negotiate a reallocation of property tax revenue between the affected agencies and approve and accept such reallocation by resolution.

Adoption of the Joint Resolution by the Board will allow LAFCO to schedule the required public hearing to consider testimony on the proposed annexation. LAFCO will subsequently take action to approve, approve with changes, or disapprove the proposal. The Joint Resolution has also been approved as to form by County Counsel.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The recommended actions, including adoption of the Joint Resolution for Annexation 40-160 (4-216) and the resulting shares of the ad valorem tax, do not constitute approval of a project under Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code and

are excluded from the definition of a project pursuant to Section 15378(b)(4) and (5) of the CEQA Guidelines since the activities involve the creation of a government funding mechanism or other government fiscal activity, which does not involve any commitment to any specific project that may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment and are organizational or administrative activities of government that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment. In the alternative, the recommended actions is statutorily exempt pursuant to Sections 21080(b)(8), 15273(a)(1), and 15273(a)(4), which exempt the establishment, modification, structuring, restructuring or approval of rates, tolls, fares or other charges by public agencies, which the public agency finds are for the purpose of meeting operating expenses, including employee wage rates and fringe benefits, and obtaining funds for capital projects necessary to maintain service within existing service areas. The standby charges and a portion of the property taxes will go toward the District's Accumulated Capital Outlay Fund, which is exclusively dedicated to funding capital improvement Further, the activity is exempt under Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines because it can be seen with certainty that the proposed actions will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment.

Approval of the tax resolution does not approve or authorize any project under CEQA. Prior to proceeding with any activity that would constitute a project, appropriate findings under CEQA and approval of the proposed project activities would be necessary.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152 of the Public Resources Code and also with the State Clearinghouse at the State Office of Planning and Research and will post the Notice to the County's website in accordance with Section 21092.2.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

This action will allow the District to provide water service to the annexed area and will not have any negative impact on existing services or other planned projects.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 99.01 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, in the case of any jurisdictional change that will result in a special district providing one or more services to an area where those services have not previously been provided by any local agency, the special district and each local agency that receives an apportionment of property tax revenue from the area may negotiate an exchange of property tax revenue generated in the area subject to the jurisdictional change and attributable to those local agencies; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, acting as the governing body of the County of Los Angeles; the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley; the Los Angeles County Library; and the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County; together with the Board of Directors of the Antelope Valley Cemetery District, the Board of Trustees of the Antelope Valley Mosquito and Vector Control District, the Board of Directors of the Antelope Valley Resource Conservation District, the City Council of the City of Lancaster, and the Board of Directors of the Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency have determined the amount of property tax revenue to be exchanged between their respective agencies as a result of the annexation proposal identified as Annexation 40-160 (4-216) to the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley, is as set forth:

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#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

- 1. The County of Los Angeles; the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40, Antelope Valley; the Los Angeles County Library; the Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County; the Antelope Valley Cemetery District; the Antelope Valley Mosquito and Vector Control District, the Antelope Valley Resource Conservation District, the City of Lancaster, and the Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency have determined the amount of property tax revenue to be exchanged between their respective agencies as a result of the annexation proposal identified as Annexation 40-160 (4-216) is approved and accepted.
- 2. For fiscal years commencing on or after July 1, 2024, or the July 1 after the effective date of this jurisdictional change, whichever is later, the property tax revenue increment generated from the area within Annexation 40-160 (4-216) shall be allocated to the affected agencies as indicated in the enclosed worksheets (Exhibits C and D).
- 3. No transfer of property tax revenues other than those specified in paragraph 2 shall be made as a result of Annexation 40-160 (4-216).
- 4. If at any time after the effective date of this Joint Resolution, the calculations used herein to determine initial property tax transfers, or the data used to perform those calculations, are found to be incorrect, thus producing an improper or inaccurate property tax transfer, the property tax transfer shall be recalculated and the corrected transfer shall be implemented for the next fiscal year.



### <u>SUBJECT</u>

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the Consumer Affairs Office Refurbishment Project and associated appropriation adjustment, and authorization to deliver the proposed project using a Board-approved Job Order Contract.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Find the proposed Consumer Affairs Office Refurbishment Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this Board letter and in the record of the project.
- 2. Approve the proposed Consumer Affairs Office Refurbishment Project, Capital Project No. 8A010, with a total project budget of \$3,943,000.

- 3. Approve an appropriation adjustment to transfer \$1,997,000 from the completed Consumer Affairs Office Renovations Project, Capital Project No. 87257, and \$100,000 from the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs operating budget to the Consumer Affairs Office Refurbishment Project, Capital Project No. 8A010, to fully fund the proposed project.
- 4. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to deliver the proposed project using a Board-approved Job Order Contract.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended actions is to seek Board approval to find the proposed Consumer Affairs Office Refurbishment Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); approve the capital project, budget, and appropriation adjustment; and authorize Public Works to deliver the proposed project using a Board-approved Job Order Contract (JOC).

Project Description and Background

The Department of Consumer and Business Affairs (DCBA) Headquarters occupies approximately 21,700 square feet of office space on the Ground Floor of the Hall of Records (HOR) located at 320 West Temple Street, Los Angeles, CA 90012, in the Los Angeles Downtown Civic Center. The space includes the suites and offices of the Department Head and his executive team, administrative offices, staff workspaces, conference and meeting rooms, a break room, and a public counter area. Collectively, the DCBA currently occupies Suite B-96 in the Hall of Administration (HOA) and the Ground Floor Suites G10, G43, and G66 in the HOR. The HOR and HOA locations house almost all of DCBA's staff who provide a wide array of services to consumers and our community through education, advocacy, and complaint resolution. Some examples of such services are consumer protection; immigrant services, such as legal services and language access; housing and tenant protections; worker protections; investigations; financial empowerment and education; and cannabis regulations and licensing.

In December 2020, Public Works completed the Consumer Affairs Office Renovations Project, Capital Project No. 87257, that refurbished vacant and underutilized office space in the HOR into the DCBA Headquarters. This allowed for some staff to be relocated from the HOA location to the renovated space in the HOR. The HOA currently houses DCBA's Office of Labor Equity and Consumer Protections bureaus. DCBA's long-term

goal is to transition those bureaus to the HOR, where most of DCBA staff are located, to help meet and optimize their current and future operational and staffing needs. The proposed project will allow DCBA to complete this transition and will make Suite B-96 in the HOA available for use by another County department.

The proposed project will consist of renovating approximately 5,760 square feet of additional vacant and underutilized storage and office space on the Ground Floor in Suite G45 of the HOR with new staff offices and workstations for approximately 60 staff, two conference rooms, and three evidence rooms to relocate the Office of Labor Equity and Consumer Protections bureaus of DCBA from the HOA that review and audit confidential documents. This space is located adjacent to and will be connected with the recently renovated suites now being occupied by DCBA. The proposed renovation work will include interior demolition and hazardous material abatement, and remodeling of the space including interior partition walls; the fire alarm system devices; electrical panels; ceiling; interior lighting; heating, ventilation, and air conditioning system; interior finishes; low voltage; information technology; audio/visual; and telecommunication systems. The public and staff restrooms were renovated to meet current Americans with Disabilities Act requirements as part of the prior project completed in December 2020.

The renovated office space will comply with the County's new Office Space Guidelines by providing an open, contemporary, and improved functional work environment with hoteling workspaces, collaboration areas, and comfortable breakrooms that will promote employee wellness and engagement, and optimize space efficiency. As the County moves to implement more telework strategies, this space would be used to accommodate additional hoteling opportunities for potentially reducing lease space around the downtown Los Angeles area. The renovated office space would project a professional work environment and provide improved customer services to the consumers and business partners served by the DCBA.

Public Works completed the design using a Board-approved on-call consultant and is seeking approval from the Board to complete the construction using a Board-approved JOC. If approved, it is anticipated that construction will begin in May 2024 and be completed in February 2025.

### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability, and Objective III.3.2,

Manage and Maximize County Assets, by investing in public infrastructure that will improve the operational effectiveness of existing County assets.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total project budget is estimated at \$3,943,000, including plans and specifications, plan check, consultant services, construction, change order contingency, Civic Art allowance, miscellaneous expenditures, and County services. The Project Schedule and Budget Summary are included in Enclosure A.

The Pre-Development costs of \$246,000 were funded by the previously completed Consumer Affairs Office Renovations Project, Capital Project No. 87257. The Fiscal Year 2023-24 Capital Projects/Refurbishment Budget includes \$1,600,000 in appropriation under Capital Project No. 8A010 for the proposed project. Approval of the appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) will transfer \$1,997,000 from the completed Consumer Affairs Office Renovations Project, Capital Project No. 87257, and \$100,000 from DCBA's operating budget to fully fund the proposed project. It is funded with \$1,173,000 of net County cost (NCC) and \$2,770,000 of NCC derived from the Departmental prior years savings.

### Operating Budget Impact

The estimated \$445,000 costs for Furniture, Fixture, and Equipment will be requested as part of the Fiscal Year 2024-25 annual budget process to be funded using DCBA's Fiscal Year 2023-24 year-end savings. There is no NCC impact.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy amended on August 4, 2020, the proposed project budget includes one percent of the eligible design and construction costs for the Civic Art Allocation, which is estimated at \$29,000.

This project is subject to Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring.

The project will support the Board's Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by incorporating energy-efficient mechanical and electrical equipment and fixtures as part of the office space renovation.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The proposed project is categorically exempt from CEQA. The project consists of interior renovations to an existing building and is within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment. The project meets the criteria set forth in Sections 15301 (a), (d), and (l); 15302 (b); 15303; and 15331 of the State CEQA Guidelines and Classes 1 (c), (d), and (l); 2; and 3 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. Due to the previous identification of the HOR building as eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places and California Register of Historic Resources, including interior contributing components, Public Works retained a qualified architectural historian, ECORP Consulting, Inc., who reviewed the design documents and prepared a Historical Resources Memo that determined that the proposed project would not result in impacts to a historical resource. The project provides for repair, refurbishment, replacement, and minor alterations of existing facilities involving negligible or no expansion of an existing use and where replacement features will have the same purpose and capacity and repair and restoration of historical resources.

Additionally, the proposed project will comply with all applicable regulations, is not located in a sensitive environment, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste sites compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that the project may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemptions inapplicable based on the record of the proposed project.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and the State Office of Planning and Research in accordance with Section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code and will post the notice to its website in accordance with Section 21092.2.

### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

Public Works utilized a Board-approved, on-call consultant to complete the design and is requesting Board authorization to carry out the work using a Board-approved JOC.

The project scope includes substantial remodeling and alteration work, and Public Works has made the determination that the use of a JOC is the most appropriate contracting method to deliver the project.

The furniture, fixtures, and equipment procurement will be handled by Public Works through Purchase Orders in accordance with the County's purchasing policies and procedures established by the Internal Services Department.

The Internal Services Department managed the design of the upgraded low-voltage, information technology, and telecommunication systems and will carry out the installation through a Telecommunications Equipment and Services Master Agreement.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

Approval of the recommended actions will have no impact on other current County services or projects. The HOR, including the Ground Floor, will remain open and fully operational during construction. The contractor will be required to coordinate construction activities with the County to minimize disruption to the building tenants, and any construction work that may be disruptive to the tenants will be scheduled outside of normal business hours.

### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval to execute five construction change orders with Hensel Phelps Construction Company for the Harbor-UCLA Medical Center Replacement Program.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Find that the scope of work to be carried out by the proposed change orders is within the scope of the environmental impacts analyzed in the previously certified Final Environmental Impact Report and subsequent Addenda Nos. 1, 2, and 3 for the Harbor-UCLA Medical Center Campus Master Plan.
- 2. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,430,000, to provide five Uninterruptible Power Supply units and associated infrastructure at the Imaging and Consolidated Procedure Departments in the Inpatient Tower.

- 3. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$2,200,000, to provide the infrastructure to increase the quantity of Electric Vehicle charging stations from 10 percent to 25 percent of all parking spaces at Parking Structure A.
- 4. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$840,000, to add four spare circuit breakers to the switchgear at the Central Utility Plant.
- 5. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$2,910,000, to add four feeders from the 12-kilovolt Building to Electrical Manholes 11 and 12 and the Central Utility Plant.
- 6. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to finalize negotiations and execute a change order with Hensel Phelps Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$4,700,000, to construct an electrical distribution building at the east side of campus.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find that the scope of work in the proposed change orders is within the scope of the previously certified Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) and subsequent Addenda Nos. 1, 2, and 3; authorize Public Works to execute five change orders, for a combined total not-to-exceed amount of \$12,080,000, within the Board-approved project budget of \$1,695,000,000, with Hensel Phelps Construction Company.

### Background

Senate Bill 1953 mandates that all California General Acute-Care Hospitals meet structural and nonstructural seismic strengthening requirements by January 1, 2030. The Harbor-UCLA Medical Center (H-UCLA MC) Replacement Program will not only bring the hospital in compliance with the mandate, but also consolidate inpatient and outpatient services into new buildings that optimize operational effectiveness, reduce operation and maintenance costs, provide outpatient facilities that accommodate planned patient visits, implement sustainability, and create a campus designed for the well-being of patients and staff. The program includes construction of an Outpatient/Support Building; an Inpatient Tower Building with 346 inpatient beds, including 36 psychiatric beds, new psychiatric emergency department, and permanent rooftop helistop; a 1,500-stall above grade parking structure; a new Central Utility Plant to serve new buildings under the jurisdiction

of the California Department of Health Care Access and Information (HCAI); a new Support Services Building for the campus Information Technology and Facilities staff; a new Regional Laboratory; and related make-ready work, such as new surface lots, 66-kilovolt (kV) electrical substation, 12kV electrical building, and tenant improvements.

On February 8, 2022, the Board approved a total project budget of \$1,695,000,000 for the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program. The project budget included a stipulated sum design-build contract with Hensel Phelps for a maximum not-to-exceed contract sum of \$1,238,179,000; inclusive of a \$1,112,179,000 stipulated sum contract plus a \$30,000,000 Design Completion Allowance; and a \$96,000,000 Medical Equipment Allowance. The Board also delegated authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to approve change orders for a maximum \$750,000 subject to the limits that the aggregate amount of all such delegated authority change orders does not exceed 25 percent of the original contract amount as set forth in Public Contract Code Section 20145.

On March 1, 2022, the Board approved the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$4,300,000, to procure and install the modular buildings for the proposed Department of Mental Health Adult Outpatient Interim Facility Project under the total \$6,500,000 budget, which includes construction, make-ready work, and associated soft costs within the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program designated for Department of Mental Health Outpatient Programs.

On June 14, 2022, the Board approved the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$6,000,000, to demolish buildings within the footprint of Parking Structure A, including the make-ready work of relocation of services within the respective buildings and relocation of utilities to maintain utility services to buildings that remain; the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,200,000, to demolish buildings within the footprint of Inpatient Tower, including demolition of utilities serving the buildings; and the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$4,000,000, to procure and install site offices for Public Works at Parking Lot V, including the make-ready work of abatement and demolition of the existing buildings on the site.

On February 6, 2024, the Board approved the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$3,000,000, to construct irrigation systems along Medical Foundation Drive, South Drive, and Meyler Street; the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$2,000,000, to provide infrastructure to support additional Laboratory equipment; the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,900,000, to design and construct a security booth and security fencing around the Central Utility Plant and Loading Dock; and the execution of a change order to Hensel Phelps, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,700,000, to demolish buildings within the footprint of Inpatient Tower, including

demolition of utilities serving the buildings. The Board also approved and delegated authority to the Chief Executive Officer to execute Buildover Agreements with Los Angeles County Sanitation District and Los Angeles County Flood Control District to construct portions of the Replacement Program over the permanent easements held by both Districts.

Design and construction of the H-UCLA MC Replacement Program is ongoing and on scheduled to be completed by August 2027.

### Proposed Change Orders:

The recommended actions will approve the following five construction change orders with Hensel Phelps within the Board-approved project budget of \$1,695,000,000.

Uninterruptable Power Supply Units: The proposed change order is for a \$1,430,000 not-to-exceed amount, and includes the design, procurement, and installation of five Uninterruptable Power Supply (UPS) units and associated electrical and mechanical infrastructure at the Interventional Radiology, Computed Tomography/Interventional Radiology, two Catheterization Laboratories, and Hybrid Operating Room in the Inpatient Tower. In the event of a power loss, there is a short interruption in power supply to equipment when switching to the generator; the addition of the UPS units will allow the medical staff to continue procedures uninterrupted. This proposed change order is an additional scope that will be funded with the construction contingency.

Electric Vehicle Charging Stations: The proposed change order is for a \$2,200,000 not-to-exceed amount and includes the design and construction of electrical infrastructure to increase the number of Electric Vehicle (EV) charging stations from 10 percent to 25 percent of the total number of parking spaces at Parking Structure A. The electrical infrastructure consists of electrical feeders, panel boards, switchgear, transformers, and electrical closets. This proposed change order is an additional scope required due to Los Angeles County Green Building Code requirement to provide EV charging stations at 25 percent of the total capacity and will be funded with the construction contingency.

Central Utility Plant Circuit Breakers: The proposed change order is for a \$840,000 not-to-exceed amount and includes the design and construction to enlarge the switchgear capacity at the new Central Utility Plant (CUP) by adding four spare breakers and associated electrical ductbank. This will provide the HCAI approved power to the existing HCAI buildings and add spare capacity for near future growth. This proposed change order is an additional scope that will be funded with the construction contingency.

Cable Feeders: The proposed change order is for a \$2,910,000 not-to-exceed amount and includes the design and construction to add two 15kV cable feeders from the 12kV Building to Manholes 11 and 12 and upsize two 15kV cable feeders from the 12kV

Building to the new CUP. The feeders will supply power from the new campus substation to the four added spare circuit breakers at the CUP, which will be used to support the existing buildings east of Central Drive. This proposed change order is an additional scope that will be funded with the construction contingency.

East Campus Electrical Distribution Building: The proposed change order is for a \$4,700,000 not-to-exceed amount and includes the design and construction of an electrical distribution building between Central Drive and the emergency generator building. The scope will be a new building to house transformers, switchgear, and associated underground electrical ductbanks to the CUP and the emergency generator building. The electrical distribution building and the associated infrastructure will distribute normal and emergency power from the new CUP and the generator building to the existing buildings east of Central Drive. This proposed change order is an additional scope that will be funded with the construction contingency.

### Green Building/Sustainable Design Program

On December 20, 2016, the Board adopted a new Leadership in Energy and Environmental Development (LEED) policy requiring all new County buildings greater than 10,000 square feet in size achieve LEED Gold certification. In accordance with this policy, the new buildings will be designed and constructed to achieve LEED Gold Certification with the exception of the Parking Structure because the United States Green Building Council no longer provides LEED certificates for parking structures. Additionally, the program will continue to support the Board's Policy for Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by recycling disposable material; incorporating energy efficient products during construction; and incorporating native, drought-tolerant landscaping.

### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County's Strategic Plan: Strategy II.1, Drive Economic and Workforce Development in the Community, Objective II.1.3, Coordinate Workforce Development; and Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities, by investing in the wellness our communities and enhancing the delivery of comprehensive and seamless healthcare services to the residents of the County seeking healthcare assistance.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

Approval of the recommended actions will allow Public Works to issue change orders to Hensel Phelps for a not-to-exceed amount of \$12,080,000. Public Works has reviewed the change orders and finds their value to be in line with the cost of the work included in the project budget. There is sufficient funding in the \$1,695,000,000 project budget approved by the Board on February 8, 2022, to cover the cost of the proposed change

orders. The Enclosure reflects the reallocation of funding for these change orders within the approved project budget.

There is no net County cost impact associated with the recommended actions.

**Operating Budget Impact** 

Following completion of the project, Department of Health Services will request and fund annual ongoing maintenance and operational costs, as needed, with departmental resources in future budget phases.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy, adopted on December 7, 2002, and last amended on August 4, 2020, the project budget includes a \$2,000,000 Civic Art allocation, which is greater than the \$1,000,000 maximum required by the Board's policy. The \$2,000,000 Civic Art allocation will not be impacted by the proposed change orders.

Section 20137 of the Public Contract Code allows the Board, with a four-fifths vote, to authorize an individual change order to a construction contract that is 10 percent or less of the original contract amount without having to obtain bids for the work. Each of the five proposed change orders are less than 10 percent of the original contract sum and are, therefore, within the statutory threshold.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The recommended actions are within the scope of the impacts analyzed in the FEIR, certified on December 16, 2016, and subsequent Addenda Nos. 1, 2, and 3 approved on November 10, 2020; November 10, 2020; and February 8, 2022, respectively, and there have been no substantial changes to the project or to the circumstances under which it will be undertaken that require further findings under California Environmental Quality Act. These activities, which include the UPS units at Inpatient Tower, electrical infrastructure for EV charging stations at Parking Structure A, spare circuit breakers at the CUP, cable feeders, and electric yard at Information Technology/Facilities Shops Building are within the scope of work approved by the Board on February 8, 2022, and analyzed in the FEIR and certified Addendum No. 3. The Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program, Environmental Findings of Fact, and Statement of Overriding Considerations adopted at the time of FEIR certification will continue to apply.

The location and custodian of the documents and other materials constituting the record of the proceedings upon which the Board's decision is based in this matter is with Public Works, Project Management Division I, 900 South Fremont Avenue, Fifth Floor,

Alhambra, CA 91803. The previously certified FEIR and Addenda are available at the location above and can also be viewed online at <a href="https://pw.lacounty.gov/harbor-ucla-rp/">https://pw.lacounty.gov/harbor-ucla-rp/</a>.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Determination with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and with the State Office of Planning and Research in accordance with Section 21152 (a) of the California Public Resources Code and will post the Notice of Determination to its website pursuant to Section 21092.2.

### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

To date, Public Works has executed 15 allowance relocation contract amendments for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$60,780,428. Additionally, Public Works has executed 61 change orders under delegated change order authority for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$5,631,533. Of the \$24,100,000 approved in the three previous Board letters, \$17,617,355 is still pending execution of change orders.

The proposed five change orders for \$1,430,000; \$2,200,000; \$840,000; \$2,910,000; and \$4,700,000 not-to-exceed amounts represent 0.12, 0.18, 0.07, 0.24, and 0.38 percent, respectively, of the original maximum contract sum of \$1,238,179,000. When executed, the change orders will increase the maximum contract sum to \$1,254,690,533.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The recommended change orders are within the Design Builders limits of work and will not result in any additional impacts to the current services on the H-UCLA MC Campus.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

 Find that the Hubert H. Humphrey and Edward R. Roybal Comprehensive Health Centers Elevator Modernization Projects are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this letter and in the record of the separate proposed projects.

- Establish and approve the Hubert H. Humphrey Comprehensive Health Center Elevator Modernization Project, Capital Project No. 87979, with a total project budget of \$4,000,000.
- 3. Establish and approve the Edward R. Roybal Comprehensive Health Center Elevator Modernization Project, Capital Project No. 87980, with a total project budget of \$3,840,000.
- 4. Approve the Fiscal Year 2023-24 appropriation adjustment to allocate \$1,400,000 and \$1,250,000 from the Department of Health Services' Enterprise Fund-Committed for Health Services to fund the estimated Fiscal Year 2023-24 expenditures for the Hubert H. Humphrey Comprehensive Health Center Elevator Modernization Project, Capital Project No. 87979, and Edward R. Roybal Comprehensive Health Center Elevator Modernization Project, Capital Project No. 87980, respectively.
- 5. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to deliver the proposed projects using Board-approved Job Order Contracts.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to seek Board approval to find the Hubert H. Humphrey and Edward R. Roybal Comprehensive Health Centers (CHCs) Elevator Modernization Projects exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), establish and approve the projects, approve the project budgets and related appropriation adjustment, and authorize delivery of the projects using Board-approved Job Order Contracts (JOCs).

### Background

The existing hydraulic elevators at the Humphrey and Roybal CHCs are approximately 45 years old and require frequent repairs due to the age and high use demand. The elevators experience increased maintenance downtimes because replacement parts are obsolete and not readily available, which impacts facility operations and patient flow.

The projects will remodel and refurbish three hydraulic elevators at each CHC, including replacement of cab interior finishes, grab bars, lighting, elevator control panel, elevator doors, hydraulics, hardware, and necessary fire protection. When completed, both projects will improve the level of safety for patients and staff.

Public Works completed the design for the projects using Board-approved on-call architect/engineer (A/E) agreements and is now seeking approval to complete the remodeling and refurbishment work using Board-approved JOCs. Upon the Board's

approval of the projects, it is anticipated that construction will begin in May 2024 and be substantially completed in May 2026. Construction will be phased to minimize impacts to operations.

### **Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals**

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.1, Drive Economic and Workforce Development in the County; Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities; and Strategy III.3, Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibly, and Accountability, Objective III.3.2, Manage and Maximize County Assets, by supporting the wellness of our communities, enhancing the delivery of comprehensive and seamless healthcare services, and investing in public infrastructure that will improve the operational effectiveness of an existing County asset.

### **FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING**

The project budgets for the proposed Humphrey and Roybal CHCs Elevator Modernization Projects are \$4,000,000 and \$3,840,000, respectively, including construction, change order contingency, plans and specifications, permit fees, consultant services, inspection, and County services. Department of Health Services (DHS) has previously paid \$223,000 and \$238,000, respectively, for assessment fees through the DHS operating budget for the Humphrey and Roybal CHCs Elevator Modernization projects. The Budget and Schedule Summaries for the projects are included in Enclosure A.

Approval of the Fiscal Year 2023-24 appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) will allocate \$1,400,000 and \$1,250,000, respectively, from the DHS' Enterprise Fund Committed for DHS to fund the projected Fiscal Year 2023-24 expenditures of \$2,650,000 for the Humphrey CHC Elevator Modernization Project, Capital Project No. 87979, and Roybal CHC Elevator Modernization Project, Capital Project No. 87980. DHS will provide funding in the future budget phases, as needed, to fully fund the remaining project budgets.

There is no net County cost impact associated with the recommendations.

### Operating Budget Impact

Following completion of the projects, DHS will request and fund the associated ongoing annual maintenance and operational costs, as needed, with departmental resources in future budget phases.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy amended on August 4, 2020, the proposed project budgets include 1 percent of the eligible design and construction costs for the Civic Arts allocations, which are estimated at \$26,000 for the proposed Humphrey CHC Elevator Modernization Project, and \$25,000 for the Roybal CHC Elevator Modernization Project.

The JOCs are subject to the Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring.

The projects will support the Board's Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by utilizing energy efficient equipment and lighting for the remodeled elevators that will comply with California Title 24.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

The Humphrey and Roybal CHCs Elevator Modernization Projects, which consist of refurbishment of systems at existing facilities, are exempt from CEQA. They are within certain classes of projects that have been found not to have a significant effect on the environment in that they meet the criteria set forth in Sections 15301 (a) and (d) and 15302 (c) of the State CEQA Guidelines and Classes 1 (c) and (d) and 2 (e) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G. The projects consist of modernization work, including refurbishment of the elevator systems at existing facilities, which involves negligible or no expansion of an existing use and any replacement components will have the same purpose and capacity.

Additionally, the projects will comply with all applicable regulations, are not located in a sensitive environment, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, damage to scenic highways, listing on hazardous waste site lists compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5, or indications that the projects may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource that would make the exemptions inapplicable based on project records.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file Notice of Exemptions with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and the State Office of Planning and Research in accordance with Section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code and will post the notices to its website in accordance with Section 21092.2.

### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

Public Works completed the designs for the projects using a Board-approved, on-call A/E agreement, and is seeking Board approval to complete the construction for the projects using Board-approved JOCs.

The projects scope includes remodeling and alteration work of existing building systems, and Public Works has made the determination that the use of a JOC is the most appropriate contracting method to deliver the projects.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

Approval of the recommended actions will have no impact on current County services or projects. The CHCs will remain open during construction. In conjunction with DHS, Public Works will take the appropriate measures to phase the construction to minimize impacts on operations during the modernization work.

- Find that The PENTA Building Group, LLC, is the responsive and responsible proposer that submitted the best value Design-Build proposal for the design and construction of the Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Elevators Modernization Project.
- 5. Award and delegate authority to the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute a Design-Build agreement with The PENTA Building Group, LLC, for the Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Elevators Modernization Project for a not-to-exceed maximum contract sum of \$10,410,372, inclusive of the base contract sum of \$10,010,372, and the design completion allowance of \$400,000; and to suspend and/or terminate the contract for convenience, if it is in the best interest of the County to do so.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to seek Board approval to find the Olive View-UCLA Medical Center (OV-UCLA MC) Elevators Modernization Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); approve the capital project, project budget, and appropriation adjustment; award and authorize Public Works to execute a Design-Build (D-B) agreement; and authorize Public Works, with concurrence of the Chief Executive Office, to exercise control over the design completion allowance for design and construction of the project.

#### Background

The OV-UCLA MC is located at 14445 Olive View Drive in the Sylmar area of the City of Los Angeles and provides healthcare services to communities within the San Fernando Valley and North County area. The 6-story hospital facility was constructed more than 30-years ago and has 2 banks of elevators in the core of the facility, including 4 elevators for patients and staff, 3 elevators for visitors, and 1 cart lift elevator, which have reached the end of their useful service life and now require significant modernization upgrades to sustain efficient hospital operations.

The proposed project will modernize all seven elevators and the single cart lift, including replacement of hoist machines, motor drives, governors and safeties, all door operators, guide roller assemblies, and door protective devices; addition of new code required signal fixture and new wall panels; upgrade of the control systems to new nonproprietary systems; and installation of a new dispatching system. Additionally, code compliance measures to address life safety, electrical, lighting, security, mechanical, and structural engineering are also included in the scope of the work.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The recommended D-B agreement is for a not-to-exceed maximum contract sum of \$10,410,372, inclusive of the base contract sum of \$10,010,372, and the design completion allowance of \$400,000. The Department of Health Services (DHS) has previously paid \$584,000 for assessment fees through the DHS operating budget.

The total project budget is estimated at \$15,987,000, including plans and specifications, jurisdictional approvals, construction, design-completion allowance, change order

contingency, Civic Art allowance, consultant services, and County services. The project budget and schedule summaries are included in Enclosure A.

Approval of the Fiscal Year 2023-24 appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) will allocate \$431,000 from DHS' Enterprise Fund Committed for DHS to fund the estimated Fiscal Year 2023-24 expenditures for the OV-UCLA MC Elevators Modernization Project, Capital Project No. 87824. DHS will provide funding in the future budget phases, as needed, to fully fund the remaining project budget.

#### Operating Budget Impact

Following completion of the project, DHS will request and fund the associated ongoing annual maintenance and operational costs, as needed, with departmental resources in future budget phases. There is no net County cost impact associated with the recommendations.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy amended on August 4, 2020, the proposed project budget includes one percent of the eligible design and construction costs for the Civic Art allowance, which is estimated at \$108,000.

In accordance with Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring, the project will require that at least 30 percent of the California construction labor hours be performed by qualified Local Residents and at least 10 percent be performed by Targeted Workers facing employment barriers. The project will also include a jobs coordinator who will facilitate the implementation of the targeted hiring requirement of the policy.

Effective June 7, 2023, the Countywide Community Workforce Agreement (CWA) applies to projects with an estimated construction contract value of \$5,000,000 or greater. Therefore, CWA will apply to this project. Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and with the State Clearinghouse at the Governor's Office of Planning and Research in accordance with Section 21152 of the California Public Resources Code and will post the notice to the County's website in accordance with Section 21092.2.

#### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

The D-B procurement was conducted in accordance with the D-B Policy adopted by the Board on June 4, 2016, and pursuant to the requirements of the Public Contract Code Section 22164.

On February 2, 2023, Public Works issued the Request for Proposals for D-B services for the OV-UCLA MC Elevators Modernization Project. This contract opportunity was listed on the County's "Doing Business with Us" and Public Works "Contract Opportunities" websites and in the Los Angeles Daily Journal, Los Angeles Sentinel, La Opinion, Press Telegram, Santa Monica Daily Press, Daily Breeze, The Signal, Watts Times, Chinese Daily News, and Pasadena Star News newspapers. Public Works

informed 1,277 local small business enterprises; 145 disabled-veteran owned business enterprises; and 147 social enterprises about this business opportunity. A total of one firm submitted a proposal in response to the Request for Proposals.

On March 6, 2023, one prequalification questionnaire was received for evaluation. The prequalification questionnaire was reviewed by an evaluation committee consisting of representatives from DHS and Public Works. Based on the review and evaluation, The PENTA Building Group, LLC, was determined to be prequalified, shortlisted, and invited to submit a technical and cost proposal.

On July 18, 2023, PENTA submitted a technical and cost proposal for evaluation. The technical and cost proposal was evaluated by a panel of representatives from DHS and Public Works based on technical design, construction expertise, proposed delivery plan, price, life cycle costs, skilled labor force availability, acceptable safety record, and D-B team personnel and organization. PENTA was found to have submitted the best value proposal to perform these services in accordance with the evaluation criteria stated in the Request for Proposals. The evaluations were completed without regard to race, creed, color, or gender. PENTA Community Business Enterprises participation data and three-year contracting history with the County are on file with Public Works' Business Relations and Contracts Division, 900 South Fremont Avenue, 8th Floor, Alhambra, CA 91803.

#### IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will have no impact on current services at the campus. Patient care services on campus will remain fully operational during construction.

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval of a revised project budget for the Walnut Park Pocket Park Development Project.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Find the recommended actions related to the previously approved Walnut Park Pocket Park Development Project are not subject to California Environmental Quality Act in that the actions are not a project under Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code and are excluded from the definition of a project according to Section 15378 (b) of the State California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines because the actions are administrative activities of government, which will not result in direct or indirect physical changes to the environment.

- 2. Approve the revised total project budget for the Walnut Park Pocket Park Development Project, Capital Project No. 69877, to \$4,926,437 from the previously approved budget of \$4,622,842.
- 3. Approve an appropriation adjustment to reflect an increase \$303,595 in appropriation, fully offset with revenue from the Los Angeles County Regional Park and Open Space District Safe, Clean Neighborhood Parks, Open Space, Beaches, Rivers Protection, and Water Conservation Measure of 2016 (Measure A), to fully fund the Walnut Park Pocket Park Development Project, Capital Project No. 69877.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended actions will find for the Walnut Park Pocket Park Development Project, Capital Project (CP) No. 69877, are not subject to the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and approve the revised total project budget and the related appropriation adjustment.

Project Descriptions and Backgrounds

The County of Los Angeles Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) operates and maintains 182 parks with amenities such as playground areas, trails, gardens, and sport courts. These facilities also provide numerous recreational, physical, educational, and cultural opportunities to millions of County residents. For many families, these parks are their only outlet to a safe green space.

The unincorporated Walnut Park area was deemed an area of very high park need, according to the Los Angeles Countywide Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment Report dated May 2016. Furthermore, according to the California State Parks Community FactFinder, the Walnut Park area is one of the most park-deficient areas of the County.

The project site is located on previously undeveloped land at 2603 Grand Avenue in the unincorporated community of Walnut Park. The approved project includes the construction of a new 0.5-acre park with a staff office and public restroom building, playground areas, splash pad, an open lawn area, and additional park amenities. The building is designed to provide a base of operations for the Los Angeles County DPR and

Sheriff's Department Parks Bureau personnel to ensure safe and accessible recreation programming to the local community.

On May 17, 2022, the Board approved the Walnut Park Pocket Park Development Project, CP No. 69877, with a total project budget of \$4,622,842. The Board also adopted plans and specifications, advertised for construction bids, and authorized Public Works to award and execute a construction contract for the project.

On June 16, 2023, four construction bids were received but all four bids were over the estimated construction budget. After the first low bidder was found non-responsive due to a discrepancy in reporting requirements, it was determined that the project could still be awarded to the second lowest, responsible bidder with a responsive bid within the approved total budget if DPR was able to provide additional funding to cover future project soft costs. Therefore, Public Works proceeded to award a construction contract to the second lowest responsive and responsible bidder. A Notice to Proceed was issued to the contractor on October 24, 2022.

Parks subsequently received a grant from the Los Angeles County Regional Parks and Open Space District for \$303,595 to bridge the budgetary shortfall for the Walnut Park Pocket Park Development Project to fully fund the project.

#### <u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy I.2, Enhance Our Delivery of Comprehensive Interventions, Objective I.2.4, Support Job Readiness and Increase Employment Opportunities for Youth Served by the County; Strategy II.1, Drive Economic and Workforce Development in the County, Objective II.1.2, Support Small Businesses and Social Enterprises; Strategy II.2, Support the Wellness of our Communities, Objective II.2.2, Expand Access to Recreational and Cultural Opportunities, Objective II.2.3, Prioritize Environmental Health Oversight and Monitoring, and Objective II.2.4, Promote Active and Healthy Lifestyles; and Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability Our Daily Reality, Objective II.3.1, Improve Water Quality, Reduce Water Consumption, and Increase Water Supplies.

The project supports these goals by providing new park facilities that will greatly benefit an underserved population and meet the urgent need for community park and recreation facilities in traditionally park-poor communities. The project provides contracting opportunities that support small businesses and social enterprises that employ local, targeted workers, and local youth.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total project cost is estimated at \$4,926,437, which includes the plans and specifications, jurisdictional approvals, consultant services, Civic Arts, construction, change order contingency, youth employment, and County services. The project schedule and budget are summarized in Enclosure A.

Approval of the appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) will reflect an increase of \$303,595 in appropriation to the Walnut Park Pocket Park Development Project, CP No. 69877, fully offset with revenue from the Los Angeles County Regional Park and Open Space District Safe, Clean Neighborhood Parks, Open Space, Beaches, Rivers Protection, and Water Conservation Measure of 2016 (Measure A) funds to fully fund the project.

The project is also funded with \$4,322,842 from State of California DPR's Proposition 68 Statewide Park Program and \$300,000 of Los Angeles County Regional Park and Open Space Proposition A Excess Funds.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy, adopted on December 7, 2004, and last amended on August 4, 2020, the project budget includes one percent of eligible design and construction costs, in the amount of \$33,000, to be allocated to the Civic Art Fund and restricted for spending on-site.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

On May 26, 2015, the Board, acting as the governing body of the District, certified the Final Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR)(State Clearinghouse No. 2014081106) for the District Enhanced Watershed Management Programs, pursuant to CEQA, as lead agency. The PEIR analyzed the general environmental effects due to the structural and nonstructural best management practices identified in the Enhanced Watershed Management Programs.

The Addendum to the previously certified PEIR was completed for the project in compliance with CEQA and reflects the independent judgment and analysis of the County. The project would be within the assumptions for construction and operation analyzed in the 2015 Final PEIR. The project has been reviewed, in light of Sections 15162, 15163, and 15164 of the State CEQA Guidelines. As the Lead Agency under CEQA, the County has determined that none of the conditions apply that would require

preparation of a subsequent or supplemental Environmental Impact Report and that an Addendum to the certified Final PEIR is the appropriate environmental documentation under CEQA for the projects. The Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program adopted with the 2015 PEIR will continue to apply to the projects to ensure all impacts remain less than significant.

The Addendum was circulated to public agencies and interested parties for a 30-day public review period that began on March 1, 2022, and closed April 1, 2022. This public review period was not required under CEQA but was voluntarily undertaken. No comments were received.

There are no changes to the project or to the circumstances under which the project has undertaken that require further review or findings by the County under CEQA.

Upon the Board's approval, Public Works will file a Notice of Determination for each project with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk in accordance with Section 21152 (a) of the California Public Resources Code and will post the Notice of Determination to the County's website pursuant to Section 21092.2 (d). The required fee, if any, to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife was paid for by the previously certified Environmental Impact Report.

The Addendum, PEIR, and related environmental documents are publicly available online. The location of the documents and other materials constituting the record of the proceedings upon which the Board decision is based in this matter can be viewed online at <a href="https://interdev/wmd/stwq/WalnutPark.aspx">https://interdev/wmd/stwq/WalnutPark.aspx</a> or in person at Public Works Project Management Division II, 900 South Fremont Avenue, 5th Floor, Alhambra, CA 91803. Advertising for construction bids were done in accordance with the County's Standard Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisements.

As requested by the Board on February 3, 1998, this contract opportunity was listed on the County's "Doing Business with Us" and "Do Business with Public Works" websites. Public Works informed local small business enterprise about this business opportunity for those certified by the County of Los Angeles' Department of Consumers and Business Affairs.

#### **SUBJECT**

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25 to provide for the continued collection of the existing Solid Waste Generation Service Charge at the current rate.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING:

- 1. Find that the adoption of the annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25, is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, for the reasons stated in this board letter.
- 2. Consider all objections and protests against the proposed annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25.
- 3. If no majority protest against the annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25 exists:
  - a. Adopt the annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25.

- b. Upon its adoption, instruct the Director of Public Works to file with the Auditor-Controller before August 10, 2024, a copy of the annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25.
- c. Instruct the Auditor-Controller, upon receipt of the adopted annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25 from the Director of Public Works, to enter the amounts of the charges against the respective lots or parcels of land as they appear on the current assessment roll.
- 4. If a majority written protest against the proposed annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25 exists, refer the item back to Public Works. If the annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, Fiscal Year 2024-25 is not adopted, the solid waste generation service charge shall be collected separately from the annual property taxes and shall not constitute a lien against any parcel or parcels of land.

#### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to adopt the enclosed annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report that will provide for the continued collection of the current service charge of \$3.51 in the County unincorporated areas for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25 on the property tax roll. The service charge is applied to each parcel of real property and is collected through the property tax roll. The collection of the annual service charge on the property tax roll remains the most cost-effective mechanism to bill and account for these charges.

The revenues generated from the service charge are used to fund the preparation, adoption, and administration of the Los Angeles County Household Hazardous Waste Element; and the preparation, adoption, and implementation of Los Angeles County's Source Reduction and Recycling Element, including State reporting; and the implementation of residential recycling, business recycling, and public education outreach. These State-mandated activities for waste reduction are required by the California Public Resources Code, Section 40000 et seg.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: Strategy II.3, Make Environmental Sustainability our Daily Reality, and Objective II.3.4, Reduce Waste Generation and Recycle and Reuse Waste Resources. The recommended action

will provide funding necessary for the continued administration, planning, and implementation of waste reduction and recycling activities and programs in the County unincorporated areas.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There will be no impact to the County General Fund. Adoption of the enclosed report will provide for the continued collection of the existing annual Service Charge on the property tax roll in Fiscal Year 2024-25. The projected revenue amount to be collected is \$1,216,000 and is included in the Solid Waste Management Fund (GD1) FY 2024-25 Budget.

#### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In September 1991, the Board adopted an ordinance establishing the annual service charge as authorized by California Public Resources Code Sections 41901 and 41902.

An annual service charge is imposed upon each parcel of real property within the County unincorporated areas based on the number of Solid Waste Generation units assigned to that parcel. The number of units is a function of the current land use of the parcel and varies from zero for a vacant parcel to 50 for auditoriums and amusement facilities. The annual service charge per Solid Waste Generation unit is currently \$3.51 and will remain unchanged for Fiscal Year 2024-25. Based on this formula, the annual service charge for a single-family residence is \$3.51. Revenues generated are used to implement required activities and programs to achieve State waste reduction mandates.

Pursuant to Section 5473 of the California Health and Safety Code, the enclosed Annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, FY 2024-25, has been prepared and filed with the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors. Section 5473 also provides that any adopted ordinance authorizing the collection of service charges on the property tax roll shall remain in effect until repealed or until changes have been made in the rates. The report contains a description of each parcel receiving such services and the amount of the charge for each parcel for the year, computed in conformity with the charges prescribed by ordinance.

Section 5473.1 of the California Health and Safety Code requires that notice of the filing of this report and of a time and place of hearing thereon be published once a week for two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation pursuant to Section 6066 of the Government Code.

Section 5473.2 of the California Health and Safety Code also requires the Board to hear and consider all protests to the report. If the Board finds that protests to the report are made by the owners of a majority of parcels described in the report, the report shall not be adopted; and the matter shall be returned to Public Works.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION**

Adoption of the Annual Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Report, FY 2024-25, to provide for the collection of the annual Service Charge on the property tax roll is for the purpose of meeting operating expenses and, therefore, is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 21080(b)(8) of the California Public Resources Code.

#### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

The collection of the annual Service Charge on the property tax roll will provide funds necessary for the County to comply with the State waste reduction mandates.

# LOS ANGELES COUNTY PUBLIC WORKS ANNUAL SOLID WASTE GENERATION SERVICE CHARGE REPORT FISCAL YEAR 2024-25

#### INTRODUCTION

The California Health and Safety Code, Section 5470, et seq., requires that if existing Solid Waste Generation Service Charges (Service Charge) are to be continued and collected on the tax roll, a report shall be prepared each year and filed with the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors.

The Executive Officer shall file a copy of the report with the Auditor-Controller on or before August 10 of each year, with a statement that the report has been adopted by the Board of Supervisors, and the Auditor-Controller shall enter the amounts of the charges against the respective parcels of land as they appear on the current assessment roll. This report has been prepared to fulfill these requirements.

In 1989, the State of California passed the California Integrated Waste Management Act Assembly Bill (AB) 939. AB 939, as amended, mandates all jurisdictions, Statewide, prepare a series of documents detailing their waste management strategies to achieve 50 percent landfill diversion. AB 939 also allows the State to assess penalties up to \$10,000 per day on jurisdictions that do not comply with AB 939's mandates.

#### SOLID WASTE GENERATION SERVICE CHARGE

In 1991, as a result of the enactment of AB 939, the Board of Supervisors adopted Los Angeles County Ordinance No. 91-0119 implementing the Service Charge. This service charge funds the preparation, adoption, and administration of the Los Angeles County Household Hazardous Waste Element and the preparation, adoption, and implementation of the County's Source Reduction and Recycling Element of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan, including State reporting and implementation of the County's Source Reduction and Recycling Element programs such as residential recycling, business recycling, and public education outreach.

The Service Charge Ordinance is codified in the Los Angeles County Code, Title 20, Division 4, Chapter 20.89 (Exhibit A). The annual charge levied on each parcel of real property in the unincorporated County area is computed by multiplying the amount of the Service Charge (currently \$3.51) by the number of Solid Waste Generation units for the current land use as shown in Table A, Section 20.89.070, of the County Code.

The current annual charge of \$3.51 per Solid Waste Generation unit will remain the same for Fiscal Year 2024-25 and is projected to be \$1,216,000 based on Public Works' Budget/Fund Management Division's forecast.

#### IDENTIFICATION OF PARCELS TO BE CHARGED

All improved parcels of real property in the unincorporated areas of the County of Los Angeles are subject to this Service Charge. The Fiscal Year 2024-25 Tax Rate Areas for the affected parcels are listed in Exhibit B.

#### Chapter 20.89

#### SOLID WASTE GENERATION SERVICE CHARGE

**20.89.010 Purpose of provisions.** The purpose of this chapter is to establish and collect the Service Charge authorized by Sections 41901 and 41902 of the Public Resources Code in order to fund the reasonable and necessary costs incurred by the County of Los Angeles in the preparation, adoption, and administration of the Los Angeles County Household Hazardous Waste Element, and the preparation, adoption, and implementation of the Los Angeles County Source Reduction and Recycling Element of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan prepared pursuant to Public Resources Code, Section 40000 et seq. The Service Charge will be levied upon each parcel of real property in the unincorporated area of the County of Los Angeles and will be collected directly by the County on the tax roll. The Service Charge will not be imposed upon or collected by any solid waste haulers providing solid waste collection for the County of Los Angeles. (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

#### 20.89.020 Definitions.

- A. "Parcel of real property" means a parcel of real property as shown on the latest secured tax rolls of the County of Los Angeles.
- B. Solid waste means all putrescible and non-putrescible solid and semisolid wastes, including garbage, trash, refuse, paper, rubbish, ashes, industrial wastes, demolition and construction wastes, abandoned vehicles and parts thereof, discarded home and industrial appliances, manure, vegetable or animal solid and semisolid wastes, and other discarded solid and semisolid wastes. (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

#### 20.89.030 Levy of annual service charge.

- A. An annual Service Charge is levied upon each parcel of real property in the unincorporated territory of the County of Los Angeles for the services and facilities furnished by the County in connection with the preparation, adoption, and administration of the Los Angeles County Household Hazardous Waste Element, and the preparation, adoption, and implementation of the Los Angeles County Source Reduction and Recycling Element of the County Integrated Waste Management Plan.
- B. The amount of the Service Charge for each parcel shall be computed by multiplying the solid waste generation unit charge by the number of solid waste generation units for current land use of the parcel as shown in Table A, set out at Section 20.89.070. The solid waste generation unit charge is \$3.51 per unit. (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)
- **20.89.040 Collection of charges.** The Service Charge shall be collected for each fiscal year on the tax roll in the same manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as, together with and separately from, the general taxes of the County of Los Angeles. (Ord. 91 0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)
- **20.89.050 Deposit of collected moneys.** The moneys collected under Section 20.89.040 shall be deposited in a separate special revenue fund entitled "Solid Waste Management Fund". (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)
- **20.89.060 Refunds.** In the event any Service Charge shall have been erroneously paid or overpaid pursuant to this chapter, it may be refunded. (Ord. 91-0119 Section 1 (part), 1991.)

## Solid Waste Generation Service Charge Tax Rate Areas

The Tax Rate Areas (TRAs) for Solid Waste Generation Service Charge in the following pages are a list of areas in the County Unincorporated Area developed by the Los County Angeles Assessor's office where taxes are assessed. Generally, the TRAs are provided to the Department of Auditor-Controller to determine the assessment to charge parcels for various services on the County's property tax roll. Within each TRA there maybe a few hundred to a few thousand parcels that will be assessed the Solid Waste Generation Service Charge through direct assessment. The number of Solid Waste Generation units charged is determined by the type of Land Use on the parcel. Each year, the Assessor's office generates the TRAs list and typically there are changes within each TRA, such as new parcels added or removed due to various circumstances that occurred within each parcel. Additionally, the number of solid waste generation units may change as a result of the Land Use on the parcel.
