

Anna's Story

- Anna is an undocumented, transgender woman who found friends and community in Skid Row
- Hid her identity from family and friends and experienced childhood trauma
- When she left her abusive husband, she had nowhere to go so she went to Skid Row where she developed community
- Obtained interim housing near Skid Row in October 2023
- Permanently housed with FHSP in April 2024





Mike's Story


- Mike Juma is a 65-year-old Marine Corp veteran
- Since 2008, experienced 3 separate episodes of prolonged unsheltered homelessness
- During 11 years of homelessness, became a valued and respected Skid Row community member
- Engaged by the Housing for Health Skid Row Team
- Enrolled in interim housing at the Hilda L. Solis Care First Village in 2023
- Permanently housed in August 2024







Timeline: The Skid Row Action Plan






Decreases in Skid Row Homelessness: 2022 to 2024

22% Reduction in Unsheltered Homelessness in Skid Row between 2022 and 2024






2024 Skid Row Demographics





ERF ROUND 2 Skid Row

Year One Outcomes

From July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024

- 7,935 people experienced unsheltered homelessness in Skid Row and accessed a service through an outreach team, access center, or health clinic
- 1,795 people moved from unsheltered homelessness into interim housing during the year
- 990 people moved into permanent housing during the year
 - 434 into permanent supportive housing
 - 223 into permanent housing using time-limited subsidies
 - 205 into other subsidized housing
 - 128 self-resolved their homelessness
- Of the 990, **only 19 people** returned to homelessness





ERF ROUND 2 Skid Row

Year One Outcomes by Race & Ethnicity

From July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024

Of the 990 people who moved into permanent housing*

- Black/African American 52%
- Latina/e/o/x 28%
- White 31%
- Asian **.02%**
- Native Hawaiian .01%
- Indigenous/American Indian Alaskan Native **.03%**
- Middle Eastern/North African 0%
- Multiracial **.02%**
- Race/Ethnicity Unknown .03%

Of the 19 people who returned to homelessness from permanent housing*

- Black/African American 47%
- Latina/e/o/x 47%
- White 42%

^{*}Percents do not add up to 100% because participants may identify as multiple races/ethnicities





What's Working In Skid Row

The Unique Features of Skid Row Encampment Resolution

- Expansion & availability of interim housing resources
 - Over 300 non-congregate IH beds added
- Expansion of Flexible Housing Subsidy Pool & availability of permanent housing resources
 - 250 FHSP slots & 250 slots of pre-match ICMS added
- Centering community and resident voices
- Skid Row Technical Assistance and Training Team
- Skid Row Air Traffic Control
- Cecil Safe Landing facility
- Robust community and provider support in Skid Row

Health Hub Campus, a permanent home for SRAP recommendations

Expanded access to urgent, primary, and specialty health care


