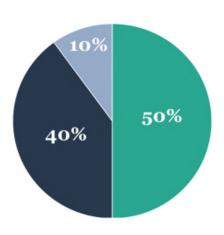

### SCWP Regional Program Overview

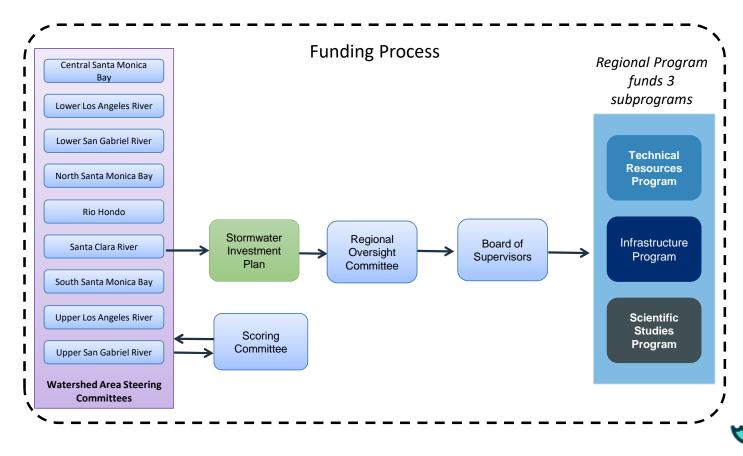




Regional Program – 50% (~\$140M)

### FY2025-26 Stormwater Investment Plans (SIPs)

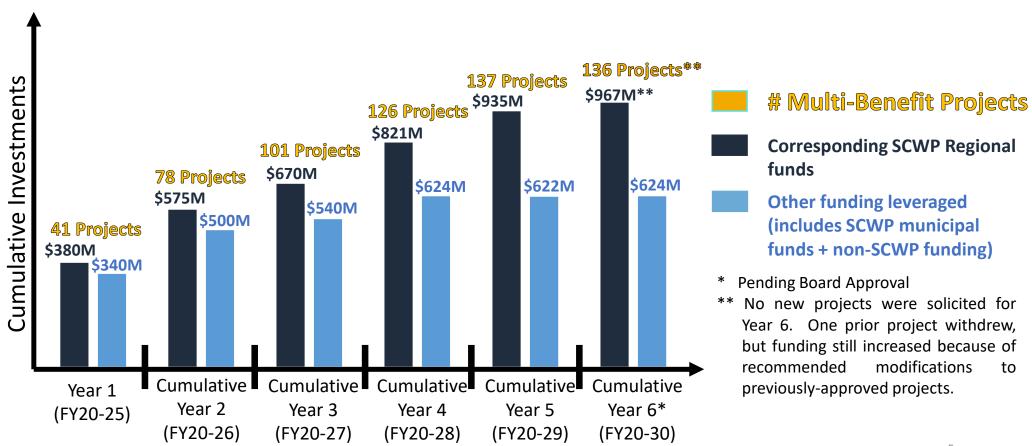
#### The purpose of the recommended actions is to:

- Approve annual SIPs totaling \$134M for each of the nine Watershed Areas (WAs), as recommended by the Regional Oversight Committee (ROC).
  - Each SIP is an annual five (5) year plan developed by each Watershed Area Steering Committee (WASC) that recommends funding allocations for Projects and Programs in the Regional Program's Infrastructure Program, Technical Resources Program, and Scientific Studies Program.
  - The SCWP governance committees held **85 public meetings** to develop the recommended SIPs.
  - Recommended funding allocations would bring the total number of funded activities to 50 concept developments, 12 ongoing Watershed Coordinators, 26 unique Scientific Studies, and 136 infrastructure projects.
- Execute contracts to provide Watershed Coordinators for each WA (mandated by ordinance and included in SIPs)
- Appoint agency members for a new term on the WASCs that annually develop the recommended SIPs.

Recommended actions will enhance water resiliency in alignment with the LA County Water Plan as well as provide numerous multi-benefits to create more sustainable, healthy, and climate-ready communities.
