BOARD RESOLUTION TO RECOMMEND TO THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH CARE SERVICES APPROVAL OF AN APPLICATION FOR A DRIVING-UNDER-THE-INFLUENCE LICENSE (FIFTH SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT)
(3 VOTES)

SUBJECT

Request approval of a resolution to submit the Rehabilitation Alcohol Program, Inc. application for a Driving-Under-the-Influence program license to the California Department of Health Care Services for approval.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

Approve the attached Board Resolution, Exhibit I, delegating authority to the Director of the Department of Public Health (Public Health), or designee, to submit for approval to the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) an application for a Driving-Under-the-Influence (DUI) program license for Rehabilitation Alcohol Program, Inc. (RAP), as recommended by the Los Angeles County Commission on Alcohol and Other Drugs (Alcohol Commission) and Public Health, in accordance with State regulations for DUI program licenses.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The DUI program is intended to provide participants awareness of the impact, significance, and consequences of a DUI offense and to assist in the rehabilitation of persons convicted of a DUI as a result of consuming intoxicating alcohol or drugs or being under the combined influence of alcohol and drugs. The DUI program is designed to educate first-time and repeat offenders and to assist participants in decreasing or abstaining from alcohol and/or drug usage. The overall objective is to decrease the incidence of DUI offenses. All DUI program service providers must be licensed by DHCS.

On October 5, 2021, your Board delegated authority to Public Health to execute Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) with for-profit organizations at no cost. Under this authority, in May 2025, Public Health executed an MOU with RAP to provide DUI Program Services in the City of La Verne, effective July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2030. RAP is currently licensed to operate Wet Reckless and First Offender programs (3, 6, or 9 months) and is applying to expand its services to include Second and Subsequent Offender Programs (18 months) in La Verne. Public Health will exercise its delegated authority to amend the existing MOU with RAP to reflect this change.

The California Code of Regulations requires that the county alcohol program administrator and the county alcohol advisory board review DUI program license applications and submit their recommendations to the county board of supervisors. The county board of supervisors then selects applications to submit to DHCS for approval.

In accordance with these State regulations, Public Health and the Alcohol Commission have reviewed the DUI program license application for RAP and recommend that your Board select this application for submission to DHCS for approval.

Approval of the recommended action will allow Public Health, in agreement with the Alcohol Commission, to submit RAP's DUI program license application to DHCS for approval, as required by State regulations.

IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIC PLAN GOALS

The recommended action supports Priority 3, Care First, Jails Last; North Star 2, Foster Vibrant and Resilient Communities, Focus Area B, Care First, Jails Last; Strategy iii, Integrated, Equitable, and Culturally-Responsive Services, of the County's Strategic Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There are no net County costs associated with this action.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

DHCS licenses programs, establishes program regulations, and approves participant fees and fee schedules. The County is responsible for ensuring the provision and compliance of DUI program services at the local level.

California Code of Regulations, Title 9, Division 4, Chapter 3, Subchapter 2, Article 2, Section 9810 governs the review and recommendation of DUI program license applications.

RAP is in compliance with State laws and DUI program regulations.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended action will allow Public Health to recommend approval of a DUI program application, which if approved, will allow RAP to provide Second and Subsequent Offender Programs (18 months) in the City of La Verne and surrounding area.

WHEREAS, the Director of the Department of Public Health (Public Health), or designee, in concurrence with the Los Angeles County Commission on Alcohol and Other Drugs (Alcohol Commission), recommends the Board of Supervisors to submit for approval to the California State Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) an application for additional Driving-Underthe-Influence (DUI) program license for Rehabilitation Alcohol Program, Inc. (RAP). The additional license will allow RAP to provide DUI services for Second and Subsequent Offender Programs (18 months) participants in the city of La Verne, in accordance with State regulations.

WHEREAS, RAP demonstrates that it has sufficient resources, technical expertise, and/or experience to provide DUI program services.

WHEREAS, California Code of Regulations, Title 9, Division 4, Chapter 3, Subchapter 2, Article 2, Section 9810 mandates that the county board of supervisors shall review the application and shall select applications to be submitted to DHCS for final approval of licensure.

PURPOSE OF REQUEST	Public Health is requesting approval to execute an amendment to MAWO Number PH-004305-W2 LACADA to increase the maximum obligation from \$1,840,000 to \$2,116,000 for the period of July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026.

BACKGROUND (include internal/external issues that may exist including any related motions)	The Office of Violence Prevention (OVP) within Public Health has been working with Probation Department to strengthen the capacity of Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) that serve youth and families impacted by violence, trauma, and involvement in the justice system. Recognizing that CBOs rooted in their communities face challenges in delivering services effectively, OVP has prioritized Capacity building as an equity issue. Through its partnership with LACADA, OVP provides training, technical assistance, and administrative support to at least 20 CBOs across targeted high-need		

	areas, including Antelope Valley, East Los Angeles, Hawaiian Gardens, Puente Valley, Pomona; and four in South Los Angeles. Increased funding will allow Public Health to expand these efforts more efficiently, broaden the reach of trauma-informed strategies, introduce a pilot program for CBOs not yet ready for technical assistance, and enhance data tracking to better serve communities impacted by violence.

APPROVAL TO EXECUTE AN AMENDMENT TO MASTER AGREEMENT WORK ORDER PH-004305-W2 WITH LOS ANGELES CENTERS FOR ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE FOR THE PROVISION OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND RELATED SERVICES TO SUPPORT CAPACITY BUILDING, TRAINING, AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (ALL SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS) (3 VOTES)

SUBJECT

Request approval to execute an amendment to the Master Agreement Work Order Number PH-004305-W2 with Los Angeles Centers for Alcohol and Drug Abuse to increase the maximum obligation for the period of July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Authorize and instruct the Director of the Department of Public Health (Public Health), or designee, to execute an amendment, substantially similar to Exhibit I, to Master Agreement Work Order (MAWO) Number PH-004305-W2 with Los Angeles Centers for Alcohol and Drug Abuse (LACADA) for the provision of Community Engagement and Related Services to support Capacity Building, Training, and Technical Assistance (CBTTA), to increase the maximum obligation by \$276,000 from \$1,840,000 to \$2,116,000 for the period of July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026, 100 percent funded by the Probation Department Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) funds.
- 2. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute amendments to the MAWO that: a) extend the term through June 30, 2027, at

amounts to be determined by the Director of Public Health, contingent upon the availability of funds and contractor performance; b) allow for a no-cost adjustment to the term through December 31, 2027; c) allow the rollover of unspent MAWO funds, if allowable by the grantor; d) provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 15 percent above or below the annual base maximum obligation, effective upon execution or beginning of applicable MAWO budget period, update the statement of work and/or scope of work, as necessary; and/or e) correct errors in the MAWO's terms and conditions, subject to review and approval by County Counsel, and notification to your Board and the Chief Executive Office.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Public Health's Office of Violence Prevention (OVP) has been in partnership with the Probation Department, and with funding support from JJCPA funds, to enhance the organizational capacity of Community-Based Organizations (CBO) serving youth and families that are involved in the juvenile justice system, at-risk of involvement in the justice system, or impacted by violence and trauma. Recognizing that service delivery is most effective when led by CBOs with established roots in the communities they serve and that these organizations have faced numerous organizational challenges serving communities and community members who have been impacted by complex trauma, inequities, and shared root causes, OVP has identified these circumstances as an equity issue and has designated capacity building as a priority.

LACADA, providing CBTTA, serves as the primary entity responsible for: 1) contract and mini-grant administration; and 2) training on business operation and organizational development, focusing on strengthening the capacity of CBOs to deliver effective services while building on their ability to manage back-office operations. LACADA provides CBTTA to a minimum of 20 CBOs in the following communities: including a minimum of two each in Antelope Valley, East Los Angeles, Hawaiian Gardens, Puente Valley, Pomona; and four in South Los Angeles due to the significantly higher rate of violence in this area.

Approval of Recommendation 1 will allow Public Health to amend MAWO Number PH-004305-W2 with LACADA to provide additional funds. The additional funding will allow Public Health to build the capacity of the contracted agency quickly and efficiently, be responsive to circumstances in order to expand the reach of effective TTA strategies in communities impacted by violence, add a potential pilot program to prep CBO's not yet ready for TTA, and add additional data tracking.

Public Health is returning to your Board to request approval to increase the MAWO as the additional funding indicated exceeds our current delegated authority to increase funding, which was approved by your Board on May 21, 2024.

Approval of Recommendation 2 will allow Public Health to execute amendments to the MAWO to extend and/or adjust the term; rollover unspent funds; and increase or decrease funding up to 15 percent above or below the annual base maximum obligation; update

the statement of work and/or scope of work; and/or correct errors in the contract's terms and conditions, as necessary.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support North Star 2 – Foster vibrant and resilient communities, Goals – Economic Health, of the County's Strategic Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The MAWO's total cost is being augmented by \$276,000 for the period of July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026, fully funded by the JJCPA funds.

Funding for the MAWO is included in Public Health's Final Adopted Budget for fiscal year (FY) 2025-26 and will be included in future FYs, as necessary.

There is no net County cost associated with this action.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

As required under Board Policy 5.120, your Board was notified on July 31, 2025, of Public Health's request to increase or decrease funding up to 15% above or below each contract's annual maximum obligation. This increase will allow Public Health to add deliverable items in the Scope of Work.

County Counsel has reviewed and approved Exhibit I as to form.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

On May 21, 2024, your Board authorized Public Health to execute MAWO Number PH-004305-W2 with LACADA in the total amount of \$1,840,000 effective July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, to provide community engagement and related services of CBTTA.

On June 2,2 025, I notified your Board that I was exercising delegated authority to amend MAWO Number PH-004305-W2 with LACADA to extend the period for 12 months effective July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026, at an annual maximum obligation of \$1,840,000.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will allow Public Health to support additional community engagement and related services.

The purpose of the grant is to fund projects which disrupt cycles of violence and retaliatory actions in order to lower the rates of homicides, shootings, and aggravated assaults in affected communities. The CalVIP grant will fund a variety of evidence-based programs designed to reduce community gun violence, such as hospital-based violence intervention programs, street outreach initiatives, and focused deterrence strategies. OVP's CalVIP proposed project will increase capacity across the TPI communities and across Los Angeles County, and address identified service gaps in the TPI model by piloting new strategies in the aforementioned communities in the Second District and Fifth District.

The funding will allow Public Health to: 1) pilot case management services for high-risk individuals driving violence in two TPI regions (Second District and Fifth District); 2) invest in a new trauma hospital to provide Hospital Violence Intervention Program (HVIP) services; 3) increase investment in the Peer to Peer Learning Academy to train more credible messengers countywide; and 4) build standardized protocols and regional collaboration across County of Los Angeles and City partners implementing community violence intervention strategies.

Approval of Recommendation 2 will allow Public Health to accept future awards and/or amendments that are consistent with the requirements of the BSCC award referenced above to extend the term at amounts determined by BSCC; and/or provide an increase or decrease in funding. This authority is being requested to enhance Public Health's efforts to expeditiously maximize grant revenue, consistent with Board Policy 4.070: Full Utilization of Grant Funds.

Approval of Recommendation 3 will allow Public Health to accept future amendments that are consistent with the requirements of the BSCC awards referenced above that reflect non-material or ministerial revisions to the award's terms and conditions, roll over unspent funds, and/or redirection of funds.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support North Star 1: Make Investments that Transforms Lives, of the County's Strategic Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

Public Health will accept a forthcoming award from BSCC at an estimated amount of \$5,000,000 for the period of January 1, 2026, through June 30, 2029. Final funding will be determined by BSCC.

Funding will be included in Public Health's fiscal year (FY) 2025-2026 Budget and will be included in future FYs, as necessary.

There are no net County costs associated with this action.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

On February 14, 2025, BSCC opened a competitive solicitation titled: California Violence Intervention & Prevention CalVIP Grant Program Cohort 5 to allow eligible applicants, which include counties, cities, and tribes disproportionately impacted by community gun violence and the community-based organizations that serve them, to apply for the CalVIP grant opportunity.

On August 15, 2025, Public Health submitted a proposal in response to the BSCC competitive solicitation and anticipates receiving notification of the estimated funding award by December 15, 2025.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will allow Public Health to accept a forthcoming award and future awards and/or amendments from BSCC for the CalVIP program to

increase TPI capacity and address service gaps in the Second District and Fifth District. BSCC funds will allow for the expansion of current community violence intervention ecosystem, which includes a variety of evidence-based programs that strengthens the County's public safety infrastructure.

<u>SUBJECT</u>

Public Works is seeking Board approval of the project, project budget, and associated appropriation adjustment; and to authorize Public Works to award and execute the Design-Build contract and stipend consultant agreement for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Medical Campus Transitional Age Youth Drop-In Center Project.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

 Find that the proposed Martin Luther King, Jr. Medical Campus Transitional Age Youth Drop-In Center Project is within the scope of the environmental impacts analyzed in the previously certified Final Environmental Impact Report and subsequently approved Addendum No. 6 for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Medical Campus Redevelopment.

- 2. Approve the project and project budget of \$18,100,000, for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Medical Campus Transitional Age Youth Drop-In Center Project, Capital Project No. 8A055, an increase of \$16,030,000 from the previous Board-approved amount of \$2,070,000 for the make ready work.
- 3. Approve the appropriation adjustment to transfer \$7,230,000 to the proposed Martin Luther King, Jr. Medical Campus Transitional Age Youth Drop-In Center Project, Capital Project No. 8A055, from the use of obligated fund balance Committed for American Rescue Plan-Enabled Capital Programs; and \$8,800,000 from the use of obligated fund balance Committed for Capital Facilities and Technological Needs in the Department of Mental Health's, Mental Health Services Act Fund, to the proposed Martin Luther King, Jr. Medical Campus Transitional Age Youth Drop-In Center Project.
- 4. Find that Milender White Construction Company, is the responsive and responsible proposer that submitted the most advantageous and best value proposal for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Medical Campus Transitional Age Youth Drop-In Center Project; and award and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute a Design-Build contract with Milender White Construction Company, for a not-to-exceed contract sum of \$12,276,013, plus a design completion allowance of \$500,000, for a maximum contract sum of \$12,776,013, contingent upon submission of acceptable performance and payment bonds, and evidence of the required insurance filed by Milender White Construction Company.
- 5. Authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee, with concurrence from the Chief Executive Office, to exercise control of the design completion allowance of \$500,000, including the authority to reallocate the allowance into the contract sum, as appropriate, in accordance with the contract requirements.
- 6. Approve and authorize the Director of Public Works or his designee to execute consultant services agreements for the stipend amount of \$50,000 with Bergman KPRS, LLC, the second highest ranked eligible Design-Build proposer, that met the stipend eligibility criteria in the Request for Proposals for preparation of proposal, funded by existing project funds.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended actions is to find that the proposed Martin Luther King, Jr. Medical Campus (MLK) Transitional Age Youth (TAY) Drop-In Center Project, Capital Project No. 8A055, is within the scope of the impacts analyzed in the County's

previously certified Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) and subsequently approved Addendum No. 6 for the MLK Medical Center Redevelopment; approve the project, revised project budget, and associated appropriation adjustment; and award and authorize Public Works to execute the Design-Build (D-B) contract and stipend consultant agreement for the MLK Medical Campus TAY Drop-In Center.

Background

The County is proposing to construct a new TAY Drop-In Center that will provide young people ages 12-25 from the Willowbrook community and surrounding area with clinical services, including mental health, physical health, substance use prevention, as well as supported education and employment, and peer and family support on their own terms. This proposed 9,000-square-foot new building would be two stories and includes intake rooms, offices, conference facilities, open lounge areas, and group chat rooms.

On November 6, 2024, the Board established the MLK Medical Campus TAY Drop-In Center Project, Capital Project No. 8A055, with a budget of \$2,070,000 for completion of the make-ready project scope. The make-ready scope and demolition of the existing 6,000-square-foot single-story Oasis Clinic building was completed in April 2025.

The scoping documents for the proposed MLK Medical Campus TAY Drop-in Center were completed using a Board-approved, on-call architectural/engineering firm.

Construction is anticipated to begin in May 2026 and be completed in August 2027, if approved.

Design-Build Contract Award and Design Completion Allowance

The proposed project would be delivered using the D-B project delivery method. The recommended D-B contract with Milender White Construction Company is for a not-to-exceed contract sum of \$12,276,013 plus a design completion allowance of \$500,000 for a maximum contract sum of \$12,776,013. The design completion allowance will facilitate resolving issues identified during the design phase, including those related to the County's scoping documents, changes required by jurisdictional agencies, and unforeseen conditions discovered during the design effort.

Consultant Services Agreement

Under the D-B process, the County can use all aspects of submitted proposals by paying a stipend to each qualifying proposer that is not selected for contract award. Upon the

Board's approval, the second highest ranked proposer, Bergman KPRS, LLC, would be paid a stipend of \$50,000 pursuant to the consultant services agreement, which affords the County the right to use the information and ideas submitted by the proposer.

<u>Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals</u>

These recommendations support the County Strategic Plan: North Star 1, Make investments that transform lives, Focus Area Goal A, Healthy Individual and Families, Strategy ii, Improve Health Outcomes, by promoting comprehensive and inclusive care through investments in public healthcare infrastructure that enhance the quality and delivery of healthcare services to Los Angeles County residents; and North Star 3, Realize Tomorrow's Government Today, Focus Area Goal F, Flexible and Efficient Infrastructure, Strategy ii, Modernize Infrastructure, by evaluating our current capital projects and identifying the need to replace or modernize obsolete infrastructure.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total project budget is estimated at \$18,100,000, an increase of \$16,030,000 from the previously approved budget of \$2,070,000 for the make-ready work. This includes scoping documents, design, consultant services, plan check, construction, change order contingency, Civic Art Allowance, and County Services. The project is funded by \$9,300,000 from the use of obligated fund balance Committed for American Rescue Plan (ARP)-Enabled Capital Programs and \$8,800,000 from the use of obligated fund balance – Committed for Capital Facilities and Technological Needs in the Department of Mental Health's, Mental Health Services Act Fund. The proposed project schedule and budget summaries are included in Enclosure A.

Approval of the appropriation adjustment (Enclosure B) will transfer \$7,230,000 to the proposed MLK Medical Campus TAY Drop-In Center Project, Capital Project No. 8A055, from the use of obligated fund balance Committed for ARP-Enabled Capital Programs, and \$8,800,000 from the use of obligated fund balance – Committed for Capital Facilities and Technological Needs in the Department of Mental Health's, Mental Health Services Act Fund to the proposed MLK Medical Campus TAY Drop-In Center Project.

There is no net County cost impact associated with the recommended actions.

Operating Budget Impact

Mental Health will request that the acquisition and installation of telephone, data, and low-voltage systems and installation (low-voltage items) be conducted by a Sielox Access

Control Master Agreement vendor. Specifically, all infrastructure systems to support all required furniture, furnishings, and equipment and other furniture, furnishings, and equipment items were noted in the contract documents shall be provided by Mental Health. Prior to the project turnover, Milender White shall provide training and commissioning to the County.

Following completion of the project, Mental Health would request and fund annual ongoing maintenance and operational costs, as needed, with departmental resources in future budget phases.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In accordance with the Board's Civic Art Policy, amended on August 4, 2020, the proposed project budget includes 1 percent of eligible design and construction costs in the amount of \$133,000 to be allocated towards Civic Art.

In accordance with Board Policy 5.270, Countywide Local and Targeted Worker Hiring, the project would require that at least 30 percent of the California construction labor hours be performed by Qualified Local Residents and at least 10 percent be performed by Targeted Workers facing employment barriers. The project would also include a jobs coordinator who will facilitate the implementation of the targeted hiring requirement of the policy.

Effective June 7, 2023, the Countywide Community Workforce Agreement (CWA) applies to projects with an estimated construction contract value of \$5,000,000 or greater. Therefore, CWA will apply to this project. The contractor and all subcontractors must comply with all terms and conditions of the CWA which, among other things, increases work opportunities for those seeking to start a new career in the construction industry and promotes the hiring of underrepresented individuals on the project.

The proposed project would support the Board's Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by incorporating drought-tolerant landscaping, water-efficient irrigation, energy-efficient lighting fixtures, and bioretention devices to reduce the impact to the environment.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

The purpose of Addendum No. 6 to the 2011 MLK Medical Center Redevelopment FEIR (2011 FEIR) was to evaluate the environmental effects associated with the construction and operation of the replacement of the 6,000-square-foot Oasis Clinic with a 9,000-square-foot building to house the TAY Drop-In Center. The Board certified the FEIR on October 11, 2011, and subsequently certified Addendum No. 6 on November 6, 2024. The recommended actions are within the scope of the impacts analyzed in the certified FEIR and Addendum No. 6, and there have been no substantial changes to the project or to the circumstances under which it will be undertaken that require further review or findings under the California Environmental Quality Act. These activities, which include the construction of a 9,000-square-foot building, are within the scope of work analyzed in the FEIR and certified Addendum No. 6. The Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program, Environmental Findings of Fact, and Statement of Overriding Considerations adopted at the time of FEIR certification will continue to apply.

The location of the documents and other materials constituting the record of the proceedings, upon which the Board's decision is based in this matter, including the certified Environmental Impact Report and Addendum, the Findings of Facts and Statement of Overriding Considerations are available, and the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Plan and can be viewed at Public Works, Project Management Division I, 900 South Fremont Avenue, 5th Floor, Alhambra, CA, 91803. The Custodian of the records is the Project Management Division I Project Manager.

Upon the Board's approval of the recommended actions, Public Works will file a Notice of Determination with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk and with the State Clearinghouse at the Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation in accordance with Section 21152 (a) of the California Public Resources Code and will post the notice to its website pursuant to Section 21092.2.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

The D-B procurement was conducted in accordance with the D-B policy adopted by the Board on June 4, 2016, and pursuant to the requirements of California Public Contract Code Section 22164.

On November 7, 2024, Public Works issued the Request for Proposal (RFP) for D-B services. This contract opportunity was advertised on the County's "Doing Business with the County" and Public Works "Do Business with Public Works" websites and advertisements were placed in the *La Opinion, Los Angeles Daily Journal, Los Angeles*

Sentinel, Pasadena Star News, San Gabriel Valley Tribune, Santa Monica Daily Press, The Signal, World Journal, Daily Breeze, and Press Telegrams newspapers. Sixteen firms registered on the Public Works website for this RFP.

The first part of the RFP required prospective D-B firms to submit responses to the standardized prequalification questionnaire. Additionally, the RFP specified that the three highest scoring prequalified proposers would be short-listed and invited to participate in the second part of the RFP for submission of technical and cost proposals. On December 12, 2024, three firms submitted prequalification questionnaires. The questionnaires were reviewed by an evaluation committee consisting of representatives from the Mental Health and Public Works.

The three short-listed firms were Morillo Construction, Inc.; Bergman KPRS, LLC; and Milender White Construction Company.

On May 1, 2025, technical and cost proposals were received from the two of the three short-listed prequalified firms. One firm, Morillo Construction, Inc., declined. The two proposals were evaluated and ranked based on technical design and construction expertise, D-B team personnel and organization, proposed delivery plan and schedule, price, life cycle costs, CWA, and Local and Targeted Worker Hiring Program work plans, and acceptable safety record. The evaluation was completed without regard to race, creed, color, or gender.

Milender White's proposal received the highest score, was determined to be the best value in accordance with the provisions of the RFP.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will have no impact on current services. All services will be fully operational during construction. No specific outreach has been conducted for this project, and it is not anticipated to be controversial.
