Briefly provide a description of the incident/event:	Tracy Evanson, et al. v. County of Los Angeles Summary Corrective Action Plan 2020-19
	On April 14, 2017, patrol deputies assigned to Pico Rivera Sheriff Station arrested a male suspect for driving a vehicle without owner's consent. During the investigation, an inventory search of the stolen vehicle was conducted and a cellular telephone (cell phone) was recovered from the cabin of the vehicle. The suspect denied ownership of the cell phone when questioned after his arrest. The registered owner of the vehicle also denied ownership of the cell phone.
	<b>Note:</b> The suspect was a known gang member of the" Pico Viejo" with the moniker" Terko." The suspect had a tattoo of the letters" PV" on the right forearm. The tattoo is known to be a tattoo of criminal street gang" Pico Viejo."
	Based on the suspect's gang affiliation the first detective assigned to investigate the stolen vehicle criminal case was from the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department's, Operation Safe Street (OSS), Detective Bureau.
	On April 18, 2017, the first detective examined the cell phone found in the stolen vehicle. The first detective turned the power on, he immediately recognized the man photographed on the screen. The man on the cell phone screen was a member of the "Pico Viejo" gang and was murdered on January 11, 2017. The screen on the cell phone depicted the photograph, the letters "R.I.P." and the male's name." The first detective formed the opinion that the cell phone likely belonged to the suspect.
	On April 25, 2017, the first detective obtained a search warrant to search the contents of the cell phone for evidence to establish that the cell phone was owned by the suspect. The evidence from the cell phone would link the suspect to the commission of the crime (i.e., vehicle theft), such as photographs and global positioning system (GPS) data. After the warrant was obtained, data was extracted from the cell phone.
	<b>Note:</b> On May 5, 2017, the suspect was released from custody on bail.
	On May 31, 2017, the first detective received all the information retrieved from the suspect's cell phone (CD ROM) and began reviewing the ce phone data. Over the course of approximately two weeks, the first detective reviewed thousands of text messages, images, emails, and device locations, which indicated the cell phone was in fact owned by the suspect. The first detective also discovered photographs of the suspect holding a firearm. As a convicted felon, the suspect was prohibited from

i i	bossessing firearms. Using GPS data which is imbedded in the bohotographs taken on the suspect's cell phone, the first detective dentified two residences (8625 Haney Street, Pico Rivera, Los Angeles, CA 90660 and 935 Bradford Street, Pomona, CA 91767) associated to the suspect.
	On June 14, 2017, the first detective authored a search warrant for both residences to locate the firearms, which was reviewed and endorsed by a magistrate.
	<ul> <li>The search warrant described the two locations as follow:</li> <li>8625 Haney Street, Pico Rivera, Los Angeles County, California 90660, further described as a single-family residence located on a parcel of land at the above address.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>935 Bradford Street, Pomona, Los Angeles County, California 91767, further described as a single-family residence located on a parcel of land at the above address. The structure is comprised of tan wood exterior, brown trim, and a brown composite roof.</li> </ul>
	The east facing front door is made of brown wood with a window in the center. The numbers "935" are affixed to the east face of the house in black numbers. There is a large porch at the front of the location with surveillance camera on the trim. The driveway is located on the west side of the property. The garage is on the same parcel as this location and is converted to an unpermitted illegal residence. It appears that the garage was made to appear as its own address located at 185 East Kingsley, Pomona, Los Angeles County, California 91767. The structure is comprised of tan brick exterior with a stucco face, white trim, and a gray composite roof. The front door faces west with a white security screen covering the door.
	The numbers "185" are affixed to a wood support beam to the left of the front door and there are two windows on each side of the front door. The driveway is located on the north side of the property. There is one small lemon tree located in the side yard of the property.
	<b>Note:</b> The Building and Safety Department has cited the homeowner for the converted condition of the garage.
	The Los Angeles County Assessor does not recognize this to be a legitimate address. The legal address is 935 Bradford Street, Pomona, Los Angeles County, California 91767. <b>Note:</b> 935 Bradford Street and 185 East Kingsley are both located on the same parcel of land, which is owned by the plaintiff. The plaintiff resides at 935 Bradford Street and is the landlord to the tenants who reside at 185 East Kingsley.
	On June 20, 2017, Los Angeles Sheriff's Department Operation Safe Street (OSS) Bureau detectives held a tactical plan operational pre- briefing at the Pico Rivera Station in preparation for the service of the search warrant.

wa str Str en	n June 22, 2017, at 5:00 am, the OSS detectives executed the search arrant at "Location 2" (plaintiff's property). Noting that there were two ructures on the property with two different addresses (935 Bradford treet and 185 East Kingsley), the OSS detective search team decided to inter the 935 Bradford Street structure first, given that it was the largest and posed the biggest threat.
ap De re: de se Br re	the first detective knocked loudly on the plaintiff's front door oproximately six times and yelled, "935 Bradford Street, Sheriff's epartment, Search Warrant, Demand Entry", which resulted in no asponse from the plaintiff or residents inside the location. The first etective knocked loudly again on the plaintiff's front door approximately even more times and yelled," Sheriff's Department, Demand Entry, 935 radford Street." The first detective heard footsteps running inside the esidence, which led him to believe the occupants may be trying to quickly estroy evidence or flee the location.
ba th oc th	he OSS detective search team entered the residence using a pick and attering ram with their duty weapons drawn and asked all occupants in he home to "come out" into the living room area with their hands up. The ccupants in the home began screaming and crying. All the occupants of he residence (the plaintiff and a family friend visiting from out of town) ere then detained and escorted outside.
se	he plaintiff was handcuffed for safety purposes. The OSS detective earch team then proceeded to clear the house, ensuring there was obody else inside who could have posed a danger to the search team.
ur re fa	he second structure on the property (185 East Kingsley), which was noccupied and under construction appeared as if it was being emodeled. After both structures were cleared, the plaintiff and their amily friend were brought back inside of the 935 Bradford Street esidence.
nd de m cc T lo p	the first detective immediately recognized the persons they detained did ot appear to be involved in any criminal activity. The plaintiff told the first etective the suspect he was looking for was evicted approximately a nonth prior. Based upon those facts, the decision was made not to onduct a search of the location. The first detective left his contact information with the plaintiff and left the pocation. No arrests were made and no evidence was seized from the laintiff's residence. The plaintiff alleges she and her family were traumatized" as a result of the incident.
A	On December 27, 2017, the plaintiff lodged a formal complaint with Los Angeles Sheriff's Department against the first detective regarding the incident.

1. Briefly describe the **root cause(s)** of the claim/lawsuit:

A **Department** root cause in this incident was the service of a lawful search warrant at the plaintiff's residence, based on GPS data and text messages retrieved from the suspect's cell phone linking the suspect to the Pomona address.

A **Department** root cause in this incident was the detention of the plaintiff and her family during the execution of the search warrant.

A **non-Department** root cause was the Los Angeles County Assessor's office only recognized one residence on the same property, and the converted garage was an unpermitted residence.

2. Briefly describe recommended corrective actions: (Include each corrective action, due date, responsible party, and any disciplinary actions if appropriate)

The plaintiff alleged the first detective illegally detained her and her family and unlawfully searched her residence on June 22, 2017, the judicial search warrant was obtained by means of judicial deception. Each allegation was investigated and addressed as follows:

Investigation into the Plaintiff's Allegations of unlawfully searching her residence The incident was reviewed by executives from Operation Safe Streets Bureau and Detective Division to assess if any administrative misconduct occurred before, during, and/or after the incident.

Executive review of this incident did not reveal any employee misconduct. The actions taken by the first detective and other involved sheriff's personnel were found to be within the guidelines of what is expected from employees assigned to the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department when investigating a criminal case.

A review of the Department's actions in this matter was found to be justified and proper.

Investigation into Plaintiff's Allegations of a search warrant obtained by judicial deception A thorough investigation was conducted into the plaintiff's allegations regarding obtaining a search warrant by judicial deception.

The warrant obtained by the first detective states that 185 East Kingsley, Pomona, CA 91767 structure is a garage on the property that is an unpermitted illegal residence. According to the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office, they do not recognize this to be a legitimate address. The legal address is 935 Bradford Street, Pomona, CA 91767.

In 2013, Documents obtained from the City of Pomona show the owner of 935 Bradford Street was cited for the unpermitted conversion of the garage into a separate residence.

In 2014, the garage conversion was completely inspected, permitted, and approved by the City of Pomona and the unit was given its own address of 185 East Kingsley.

As of September 2, 2020, records from the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office listed the properties at the location as one single address of 935 Bradford, Pomona, CA 91767, and there was no record of 185 East Kingsley Avenue, Pomona, CA 91767.

It is clear the first detective was given wrong information from the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office.

In an effort to improve the proper address check of a location prior to authoring a search warrant department member will verify the address through the cities to ensure the Los Angeles County Accessors Office records are current and up to date.

A review of the Department's actions in this matter was found to be justified and proper.

#### **DECEMBER 7, 2020**

#### 1. Call to Order.

#### a. <u>Patricia Felix-Nevins v. County of Los Angeles, et al.</u> Los Angeles Superior Court Case No. 18STCV04185

This dangerous condition lawsuit alleges Plaintiff suffered injuries sustained from a trip and fall on a sidewalk in an unincorporated area of Los Angeles; settlement is recommended in the amount of \$24,500.

#### Action Taken:

The Claims Board approved the settlement of this matter in the amount of \$24,500.

#### b. <u>Michael Brown v. County of Los Angeles, et al.</u> Los Angeles Superior Court Case No. MC 027757

This dangerous condition lawsuit arises from alleged injuries sustained when a tree branch fell on Plaintiff at a Department of Public Health facility; settlement is recommended in the amount of \$125,000.

#### Action Taken:

The Claims Board recommended to the Board of Supervisors the settlement of this matter in the amount of \$125,000.

#### c. <u>Courtney Weis v. County of Los Angeles, et al.</u> Los Angeles Superior Court Case No. BC 724216

This lawsuit arises from alleged injuries sustained in an automobile accident involving an employee of the Sheriff's Department; settlement is recommended in the amount of \$45,000.

#### Action Taken:

The Claims Board approved the settlement of this matter in the amount of \$45,000.

#### d. <u>Claim of Desiree Monique Villalobos</u>

This claim alleges Plaintiff was sexually assaulted by a Sheriff's Deputy at the Century Regional Detention Facility; settlement is recommended in the amount of \$50,000.

Action Taken:

The Claims Board approved the settlement of this matter in the amount of \$50,000.

#### e. <u>Evangelina P., et al. v. County of Los Angeles, et al.</u> Los Angeles Superior Court Case No. 19STCV03826

This wrongful death lawsuit concerns allegations of excessive force by Sheriff Deputies arising out of the shooting of Plaintiffs' father; settlement is recommended in the amount of \$600,000.

#### Action Taken:

The Claims Board recommended to the Board of Supervisors the settlement of this matter in the amount of \$600,000.

Vote: Ayes: 3 – Steve Robles, Arlene Barrera, and Adrienne Byers

#### f. Claim of Brian Anderson

This lawsuit concerns allegations that an employee of the Probation Department was subjected to disability discrimination, failure to accommodate, and failure to engage in the interactive process; settlement is recommended in the amount of \$99,999.

#### Action Taken:

The Claims Board approved the settlement of this matter in the amount of \$99,999.

#### g. <u>Marie Russell v. County of Los Angeles</u> Los Angeles Superior Court Case No. BC 642848

This lawsuit concerns allegations that an employee of the Department of Health Services was subjected to age and disability discrimination, retaliation, and failure to accommodate; settlement is recommended in the amount of \$300,000.

#### Action Taken:

The Claims Board recommended to the Board of Supervisors the settlement of this matter in the amount of \$300,000.
