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Date of incident/event:	May 20, 2020, at approximately 3:30 p.m.
Briefly provide a description of the incident/event:	Summary Corrective Action Plan 2023-112 Details provided in this document summarize the incident. The information provided is a culmination of various sources to provide an abstract of the incident.
	Various investigative reports indicated, on May 20, 2020, at approximately 3:30 p.m., an on-duty Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Sergeant, assigned to Industry Station, was driving Code-3 in a marked Sheriff's patrol vehicle south on Hacienda Boulevard. As he approached the four-way intersection of Colima Road in Hacienda Heights, he was involved in a traffic collision.
	Sergeant One was driving southbound on Hacienda Boulevard with his vehicle's lights and sirens on, as he responded to an assistance call for service. As he approached the intersection, there was a vehicle stopped at the intersection, he sounded his [airhorn] and the vehicle turned right onto westbound Colima Road. The Sergeant cleared lane-by-lane and began and proceeded to drive through the intersection from the right turn lane.
	The Plaintiff was the passenger in her daughter's (Driver Two) vehicle, who was driving eastbound on Colima Road, in the number one lane.
	The Plaintiff's daughter's vehicle struck the passenger side of the Sergeant's marked patrol vehicle, causing his vehicle to spin and collide with another vehicle (Driver Three), which was waiting in the northbound turn lane on Hacienda Boulevard (Driver Three is not part of this lawsuit)
	The Los Angeles County Fire Department responded to the collision. The Plaintiff was treated for her injuries sustained in the traffic collision and subsequently transported to the hospital for additional treatment.
	At the time of the collision, the Sergeant was wearing his seatbelt and complained of pain to his right side, elbow, and left hand as a result of th collision.
	The patrol vehicle and the Plaintiff's daughter's vehicle sustained major damage; both vehicles were towed from the scene.
	A Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department sergeant from Industry Station was notified of the traffic collision and responded to the location.
	The Sergeant authored a Supervisor's Report of Incident and Damage to County Vehicle investigation.

California Highway Patrol Officers responded and completed a traffic collision investigation. Their investigation concluded the involved Sergeant was the primary cause of the collision by failing to yield the right-of-way to approaching traffic.
The involved Sergeant's statement is based on the Supervisor's Report of incident or Damage to County Vehicle:
The Sergeant stated he was driving Code-3 (lights and sirens) on Hacienda Boulevard when he entered the intersection at Colima Road. The Sergeant stated he cleared both the left turning lane and the number one lane. As the Sergeant [attempted] to clear the number two lane, Driver Two collided with his patrol vehicle. The force of the collision caused the Sergeant's vehicle to collide with Driver Three.

1. Briefly describe the **root cause(s)** of the claim/lawsuit:

The sergeant failed to yield the right-of-way to approaching traffic.

2. Briefly describe recommended corrective actions: (Include each corrective action, due date, responsible party, and any disciplinary actions if appropriate)

Traffic Collision Investigation

The incident was investigated by the California Highway Patrol.

The collision investigation concluded the Sergeant was the primary cause of the collision by failing to yield the right-of-way to approaching traffic, in violation of California Vehicle Code section – 21800. **(Exhibit A)**

Supervisor's Report of Incident or Damage to County Vehicle

The incident was investigated by representatives of Industry Station to determine if any administrative misconduct occurred because of the traffic collision. The results of the investigation were presented for Department executive adjudication.

Executive evaluation found the collision was preventable and appropriate administrative action was taken.

The sergeant involved in this incident received additional training pertaining to the circumstances surrounding this incident.

Training Collision Assessment and Review

Industry Station conducted a review and assessment of all traffic collisions for calendar year 2018 through the end of 2022. The audit revealed there were 134 total collisions for this five-year period, 87 of which were classified as preventable and 47 classified as non-preventable.

During the audit, it was discovered there was a spike in 2019, with a reduction in the following years. Personnel who have been involved in more than one traffic collision are directed to attend Department training, such as the Sheriffs Traffic Accident Reduction Driving Program, Emergency Vehicle Operations, and the Alternatives to Discipline Driving Course.

	On Sunday, May 9, 2021, at approximately 2:51 a.m., an on-duty Los Angeles County Sheriff's deputy, assigned to Norwalk Station, was driving Code-3 as he traveled east on Imperial Highway. As he entered the intersection of Imperial Highway and Shoemaker Avenue, his vehicle collided with the Plaintiff's (sole occupant) vehicle, which was traveling south on Shoemaker Avenue. The Plaintiff struck the Deputy Sheriff's vehicle on the driver's side door of the patrol vehicle. The impact of the collision caused the Deputy Sheriff's vehicle to strike a metal light pole located on the southeast side of the intersection before coming to rest.			
	The Los Angeles County Fire Department was requested to respond to the traffic collision location. Upon the arrival of Los Angeles County Fire Department personnel, they confirmed neither party was injured from the traffic collision.			
	The field sergeant responded to the location and authored a Supervisor's Report of Incident or Damage to County Vehicle report. Additionally, a traffic deputy sheriff responded to the scene and authored a traffic investigation report.			
	Whittier Police Department responded to the scene and completed a traffic collision investigation. The investigation concluded the Deputy Sheriff was the primary cause of the collision. The Deputy Sheriff was in violation of California Penal Code Section 21056 – Failing to drive an emergency vehicle in Code-3 with due regard for the safety of others on a highway.			

1. Briefly describe the root cause(s) of the claim/lawsuit:

The **Department** root cause of this incident is the Deputy Sheriff failed to drive an emergency vehicle in Code-3 capacity with due regard for the safety of others on a highway.

The Department root cause of this incident is the Deputy Sheriff did not have on his seatbelt.

2. Briefly describe recommended corrective actions: (Include each corrective action, due date, responsible party, and any disciplinary actions if appropriate)

Traffic Collision Investigation

This incident was thoroughly investigated by a representative from the Whittier Police Department.

The collision investigation concluded the Deputy Sheriff caused the collision as he failed to drive an emergency vehicle in Code-3 capacity with due regard for the safety of others on a highway, in violation of California Penal Code section – 21056.

Administrative Investigation

This incident was investigated by a representative at Norwalk Station to determine if any administrative misconduct occurred before, during, or after this incident. The results of the investigation were presented for Department executive adjudication. Appropriate administrative action was taken. The Deputy Sheriff involved in this incident received additional training pertaining to the circumstances surrounding this incident.

Traffic Collision Assessment and Review

As a result of this collision, an assessment of employees involved traffic collisions from January 1, 2017, to December 31, 2021, was conducted a traffic collision audit. The audit revealed the following:

98 preventable collisions occurred during the past five years.

27% of preventable collisions involved fixed objects or parked vehicles during low-speed parking or starting maneuvers.

The most common causal factor was unsafe starting or backing.

Based on the results of the audit, a comprehensive Traffic Collision Reduction Plan was developed and implemented at Norwalk Station in early 2016. Since the implementation of the Traffic Collision Reduction Plan there has been a noticeable reduction of on-duty preventable traffic collisions each year.

To improve employee safety and reduce the Department's liability exposure, Norwalk Station continually schedules personnel to attend the Department's Sheriff Traffic Accident Reduction (STAR) driving program. This program focuses on low-speed parking and starting maneuvers, hosted at the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's Emergency Vehicle Operations Center. Since this incident, several station employees have successfully completed the STAR driving program.
