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Introducing Supervisor Lindsey P. Horvath County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors



Supervisor Lindsey P. Horvath was elected to the County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors (Board) on November 8, 2022, and assumed office on December 5, 2022, after serving as a City Council member and longest consecutively serving Mayor for the City of West Hollywood (City).

Supervisor Horvath's career has been defined by tackling the hardest problems, building diverse coalitions, and delivering results for her community. Her commitment to serving others was shaped by her family and faith, which instilled in her a strong work ethic and made her a tireless advocate in addressing the complex problems facing Angelenos throughout Los Angeles County (County). Supervisor Horvath has a long history of civic and social justice advocacy. She has spearheaded policies to make West Hollywood an

"Age-Friendly Community" to better serve residents of all ages. She also led the City to become the first in the nation to impose financial sanctions on Arizona for its discriminatory and anti-immigration SB 1070 law.

Supervisor Horvath made history as the youngest woman to ever be elected to the Board. She is the first millennial, and currently the only renter to serve on the Board, bringing a much-needed perspective to County leadership. Supervisor Horvath created the first-ever West Hollywood Community Response Team for Domestic Violence. She has worked on a broad range of transportation and mobility issues, from her service as a Transportation Commissioner to championing Metro Rail projects in the District. She initiated the West Hollywood Bicycle Task Force, and through her leadership, West Hollywood was named "The Most Walkable" city in the entire state.

Supervisor Horvath is widely known for her leadership on women's issues and served as a Global Coordinator for One Billion Rising, a global campaign of the V-Day movement to end violence against women and girls. She was the founding President of the Hollywood Chapter of the National Organization for Women (NOW) and previously served as President of the National Women's Political Caucus (NWPC) – LA Westside. She is also a champion for LGBTQ+ rights, having served as a Board member of the Victory Fund and a founding Board member of the NOH8 Campaign. In 2009, she represented the City of West Hollywood in the National Equality March in Washington, D.C. She has also advocated for LGBTQ+ older adults through her work on the Board of Services & Advocacy for LGBT+ Elders (SAGE).

Department of Youth Development

David J. Carroll, Director



The Los Angeles County Department of Youth Development (DYD) is excited to welcome its new director, David J. Carroll. Following a comprehensive search, David was appointed to the post by the Board of Supervisors on January 10, 2023, and began working with the team in late January.



David is honored by the appointment and appreciates the Board of Supervisors for selecting him among so many qualified candidates. He looks forward to connecting with the community, program partners, and the youth served by the department. He hopes to build on the efforts already underway in DYD, by further building networks for youth development in communities across Los Angeles County, equitably reducing the number of youth impacted by the criminal legal system, and creating opportunities for the youth already affected by the system.

David brings 15 years of experience in youth development through his work with community-based organizations in Los Angeles and across the country. Recently, he served as the Vice President of Public Policy and Government Relations for Southern California Grantmakers.

David holds a deep personal commitment to youth development and has dedicated his career to creating opportunities for youth to thrive. At an early age, he was part of the foster care and adoption systems, and he was later impacted by the criminal legal system. As a young black man growing up in a single-parent home in St. Louis, David, and young people like him were considered more likely to drop out of school, become incarcerated, or become a victim of violent crime than to graduate from college. With the help of caring teachers, committed mentors, and countless youth development programs and opportunities along the way, David graduated from college with honors and embarked upon a corporate career. Years later, following his experience with a violent crime committed by teenagers, he made the decision to leave the corporate sector and serve youth.

David has remained steadfast in his mission to provide high-quality developmental and learning opportunities for youth. He has served thousands of children and families through the creation of award-winning non-profit programs and has worked tirelessly to improve resource access for nonprofits, particularly small, Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) serving organizations. He has served in executive roles at organizations such as Brotherhood Crusade, Crystal Stairs, and Unleashing Potential, with responsibility for management, programming, advocacy, and fiscal oversight.

David is a member of the prestigious White-Riley-Peterson Fellowship on Public Policy, a two-time winner of the Washington University Social Entrepreneurship and Innovation Competition. Additionally, he was named a Distinguished Alumnus by Harris-Stowe State University. He holds a Master of Arts in Nonprofit Management from Washington University in St. Louis and a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration/Accounting from Harris-Stowe State University. David is a Volunteer Board Member and Officer for his fraternity, Kappa Alpha Psi, and coaches youth basketball and flag football. David lives in South Los Angeles with his wife, children, and two dogs.

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Supervisor Horvath served on the West Hollywood City Council for nine years, was appointed in 2009, elected in 2015, and re-elected in 2019. In addition to her work as a Councilwoman and Mayor, Supervisor Horvath previously served in a number of roles, including President of the California Contract Cities Association (CCCA); Board Member for CalCities (formerly the League of California Cities); Board Member for the National League of Cities (NLC); President of Women in Municipal Government (WIMG) for the National League of Cities; Chair of the Contract Cities Liability Trust Fund Claims Board & Oversight Committee; and Executive Committee Member and Legislative & Regulatory Chair for Clean Power Alliance of Southern California. Supervisor Horvath received her Bachelor of Arts from the University of Notre Dame and a Certificate in Nonprofit Management & Fundraising from UCLA Extension. She resides in West Hollywood with her dog, Winston.

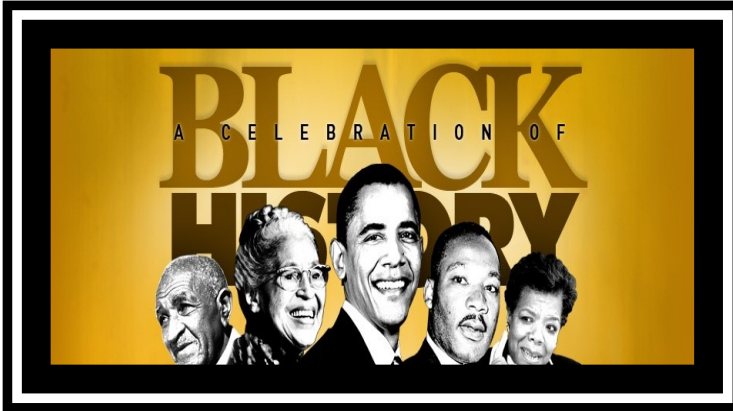

February was a Celebration of Black History



African American and Black History Month is celebrated in February each year. It is a time to recognize, celebrate, and honor the rich and diverse history, important contributions, and achievements of Black and African Americans. African American and Black History Month continues to be supported by the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH), its founding organization, who also designates its annual theme.

The 2023 Black History Month theme was Black Resistance, which the ASALH describes as “a call to everyone, inside and outside the academy, to study the history of Black Americans.”

In 1915, Dr. Carter G. Woodson—historian, teacher, and author—founded ASALH. In February 1926, Dr. Woodson proposed the establishment of “Negro History Week” to honor the history of African Americans and their contributions to American life.

Dr. Woodson, known as the Father of Black History, chose the second week of February because it commemorates the birthdays of two men who greatly affected the African American community: President Abraham Lincoln (February 12) and Frederick Douglass (February 14).

“Negro History Week” became “Black History Week” in the early 1970s. In 1976, the week-long observance was expanded to a month in honor of the nation’s bicentennial and has remained a month-long commemoration ever since.

César Chávez Day in Los Angeles County

In 2004, the State of California established an official holiday for César Chávez, and President Barack Obama later declared César Chávez Day a federal commemorative holiday in 2014. In 2017, Los Angeles County joined the federal government in establishing a holiday to commemorate César Chávez’s birthday and legacy of civil rights.

Los Angeles County Supervisor Hilda L. Solis released the following statement after the Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to pass her motion on proclaiming Monday, March 20, 2023, as César Chávez Day in Los Angeles County.

“I’m mindful of the extra weight that the word ‘service’ carries today as we proclaim César Chávez Day. More than anyone, César Chávez understood what it meant to be in service of one another. He fought, organized, and empowered – all to bring a recognition of the dignity that farmworkers do every day on the fields. It is that spirit that has guided my career in public service. So, I ask Angelenos to remain in service to one another and participate in volunteering efforts to commemorate the legacy of César Chávez. May the slogan, “Sí, se puede,” which means “Yes, we can,” continue to inspire us to drive change.”



Los Angeles County Leads the Nation for Gender Equity Efforts

On November 15, 2022, the County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors approved the Gender Impact Assessment Implementation (GIA) **Board Motion** – a groundbreaking initiative to advance gender equity for the County’s workforce and 9.8 million residents.

Gender Impact Assessments (GIAs) help the County of Los Angeles (County) improve its understanding of people’s different needs, experiences, and opportunities – which vary based on gender, race/ethnicity, age, and other important social-demographic variables. GIAs teach us to question the assumption that County policies, programs, and services effect or benefit people in the same way and can help us avoid unintended consequences.

“Gender Impact Assessments are a tool to assist us in designing inclusive policies and ensure County services address systematic gender gaps. This is an opportunity to build on the work County departments have started, and continue to improve our systems so everyone benefits,” said Chanel Smith, Executive Director, Women & Girls Initiative (WGI).

The GIA Board Motion is the foundation for the **implementation phase** of the **Women & Girls Initiative**, directing all departments to apply a gender lens to four areas:

- External Services
- Workforce
- Leadership
- Family-Friendly Department Practices

In 2022, thirteen County departments created the County’s first Gender Impact Assessment Teams who completed the **GIA Training** and developed departmental gender equity goals and strategies.

The benefits of gender equity are well-documented and all-inclusive. Some examples include: couples who divide household duties equally tend to be **healthier and happier**, diverse organizations are more **innovative**, make better decisions, and experience higher employee retention, and economies **grow** when all genders participate in the workforce at equal rates.

Los Angeles County Training Opportunity!

Everyone has a SOGIE! SOGIE is a social identity framework comprising one's Sexual Orientation, Gender Intity, and gender Expression. Thanks to a grant awarded by the Quality and Productivity Commission (QPC), the Department of Human Resources (DHR) is proud to present two, new, live webinar workshops dedicated to SOGIE.

In *SOGIE 101: A Workshop*, participants will be introduced to SOGIE concepts, understand the needs of SOGIE-diverse clients, and learn and review best practices to enhance interpersonal and professional relationships with clients and peers who identify as LGBTQ+ or have diverse or expansive SOGIE.

Additionally, the second workshop opportunity focuses on the importance of capturing SOGI data: *The Ins and Outs of SOGI Data Collection* workshop is designed specifically for County professionals who are tasked with capturing SOGI and other demographic data. Asking SOGI data questions can feel like a tall order. Is it necessary? Is it invasive? Is it my place? Why do we need this information anyway? This workshop seeks to answer these questions and so much more.

Come and join us in learning about why SOGI and other demographic data collection is so vital to community health and well-being, including how collecting this data allows for better understanding of every Angeleno's needs and how it helps the County meet its goal of providing superior services. Participants will learn how to gather these crucial data points comfortably and effectively— from following best practices to building rapport— through real life scenarios and portrayals. This workshop can assist in meeting State regulations regarding the collection of SOGI demographic data within our Health and Human Services departments. Both the *SOGIE 101: A Workshop*, and *The Ins and Outs of SOGI Data Collection* are being provided at no cost and are open to all County employees.

Career Development Intern Program Hiring Fair

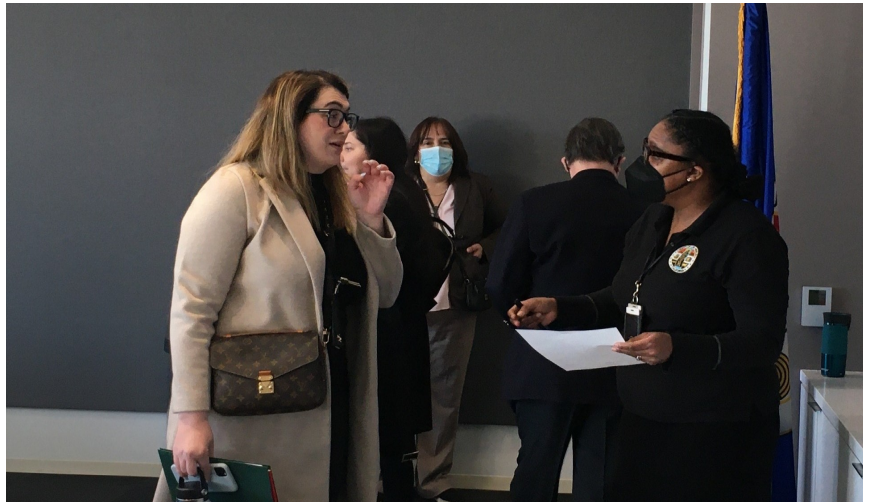
The County of Los Angeles (County) Department of Human Resources (DHR) hosted a Career Development Intern (CDI) Program hiring fair on January 25, 2023. Twenty eligible candidates were invited to attend the fair and departments interviewed and hired candidates on-the-spot. Those that offered jobs were able to expedite the hiring process by submitting a Live Scan on the same day.



“...I’ve been through a lot... I never thought I would have an opportunity to work for the County,” said Diamond B., a prospective CDI candidate.

Departments that participated in the hiring fair were energized and ready to interview potential interns.

“We were so happy to be a part of it. We are thrilled that we found a candidate, offered her the position, and had her live scanned – all in the same day,” said Michelle D., with the Auditor-Controller. Other departments which participated at the job fair were: Animal Care and Control, Assessor, Board of Supervisors, Chief Executive Office, Children and Family Services, Consumer and Business Affairs, Fire, Health Services, Internal Services, Public Works, Regional Planning, and Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk.



Several staff from the DHR/Talent Solutions Division, the Impact Team, and CDI ambassadors assisted with this hiring event. Five candidates were offered a job the same day and three were scheduled for a second interview. *“Pay it forward, allow people to reach their [goals],”* said Dwayne M., a former CDI with the Department of Internal Services. The CDI Program provides at-risk youth, foster youth, individuals with disabilities, and homeless individuals with opportunities within the County, and assists them in gaining the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary to compete for full-time permanent positions. 35th Annual Productivity and Quality Awards

The Board of Supervisors, Chief Executive Office, and Quality and Productivity Commission hosted the 35th Annual Productivity and Quality Awards (PQA) ceremony on October 12, 2022. The Master of Ceremonies was Ms. Lolita Lopez, an Emmy Award-winning investigative reporter from NBC4. The awards program included appearances by Supervisor Holly J. Mitchell (Second District), Supervisor Hilda L. Solis (First District), and Fesia A. Davenport (Chief Executive Officer), who delivered the opening and congratulatory remarks.

Since 1987, the PQA program has honored thousands of achievements in service delivery and innovation, which deserve our recognition. This year's theme was, "Adapt, Create, Achieve."

The Commission received 80 applications from 32 County departments for projects that focus on equity, child protection, justice reform, immigration, literacy, digital divide, and public health. These projects truly showcase the theme of, "Adapt, Create, Achieve" through empowerment, innovation, and quality services to the most vulnerable and underserved populations and communities. Cumulatively, these 80 winning projects are estimated to generate over \$1.4 billion in financial benefits to the County.



In alignment with this year's theme, four top submissions took home the prestigious Gold, Silver, and Bronze Eagle Awards at the 35th Annual PQA ceremony held in-person at the Music Center's, Dorothy Chandler Pavilion. These top winners included County programs that focused on providing call centers to more than two million residents during the COVID-19 pandemic; provided justice-involved individuals with career path employment; housed unaccompanied children from the southwest border; and addressed the issue of child trafficking.
