Background

Counties are required to Program and Expenditure update them (called Updates). Angeles County's MHSA 3 Year Plan 2018-19 2019-20, provides an estimated budget and overview of programs for the next 3 Fiscal Years as well as an overview of services for 16). As part of this 3 year plan, the Department is planning to consolidate 24 work plans into 6.

What is a work plan?

A work plan corresponds to a program within the Department's CSS Plan. An example of a work plan is Field Capable Clinical Services for adults. Each work plan has a corresponding budget allocation.

Community Services & Supports Work Plan Consolidation



The original Community Services & Supports plan was organized according to age group and over the course of the last 10 years has grown to 6 work plans for adults, 5 for children, 5 for Transition Age Youth (TAY), 5 for older adults and 3 cross-age group plans. Each of those 24 work plans represents a financial category for purposes of budgeting and claiming. The Department's consolidation of these 24 work plans into 6 represents an administrative simplification of the CSS Plan as well as creating greater service continuity without modifying program expectations, intentions or service capacity (see table below).

Why?

With each new work plan that has been added to the General Systems Development (GSD) part of the Community Services and Supports Plan, specific funding categories have been added which have created fiscal and programmatic challenges for our provider network.

What is the purpose of the consolidation?

- Administrative efficiency for both the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health and contracted providers.
- Supports a more seamless system of care for clients and their families.
- Capacity within Full Service Partnership programs will increase significantly via the expansion of its criteria.

What are the key elements?

- Expansion of FSP eligibility criteria (see Attachment I): Clients at risk of certain conditions, such as homelessness, will be eligible for enrollment into an FSP program.
- The creation of an array of services outside of FSP called Recovery, Resiliency and Reintegration (RRR) Services which include services such as field based, clinicbased, wellness & client-run, medication support and employment support.

What data will be collected to measure success?

- Outcome data requirements will be identified for RRR services.
- Existing FSP outcomes will continue to be collected for FSP enrollees.
- FCCS outcomes will no longer be collected as of June 1, 2017.
