

# Behavioral Health Transformation: Monthly Update on Proposition 1 Action and Impact July 2024

We are pleased to issue the first "Mental Health for All" newsletter. Every month, California agencies and departments will provide updates on their efforts to implement <u>Proposition 1</u> to deliver mental health for all. Proposition 1 will modernize California's behavioral health system and support up to \$6.4 billion in bonds to build behavioral health housing, residential care, and outpatient service settings across the state.

## California is coming together to:

- 1. Urgently deliver treatment and housing to the most seriously ill and vulnerable Californians, with innovations like Full Service Partnerships, the Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Act, and conservatorship reform.
- 2. Build new treatment sites and supportive housing, with new sites opening every month and new funds from Proposition 1 releasing this summer and winter.
- 3. Plan for a transformed, unified behavioral health service system launching July 1, 2026.

#### WHAT IS PROPOSITION 1?

Proposition 1 was passed by California voters in March 2024. The two-bill package proposed statewide efforts to reform and expand California's behavioral health system and was put on the ballot by Governor Gavin Newsom and the Legislature. It is composed of two parts: the Behavioral Health Services Act, an expansion of the Mental Health Services Act to include substance use disorder, and the Behavioral Health Bond, which authorized \$6.4 billion in bonds to finance

behavioral health treatment beds, supportive housing, community sites, and funding for housing veterans with behavioral health needs.

Implementation of Proposition 1, referred to as <u>Behavioral Health Transformation</u> by DHCS, is being carried out by DHCS and the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), Department of Health Care Access and Information (HCAI), California Health & Human Services Agency (CalHHS), California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), California Business, Consumer Services, and Housing Agency (BCSHA), and California Department of Veterans Affairs (CalVet).

### **Bond Funding Accelerated**

Governor Newsom announced the acceleration of the <u>first round of Behavioral Health Continuum Infrastructure Program (BHCIP) bond funding</u> grants for behavioral health treatment facilities, made available by Proposition 1. This round will account for \$3.3 billion in "Launch Ready" projects, or 75 percent of the total \$4.4 billion for BHCIP projects. The Request for Application will be posted this summer and awarded by early 2025.

#### **UPCOMING EVENTS**

» On July 30, 2024, from 1-2 p.m., DHCS will host a <u>public listening session</u> on substance use disorder services under the Behavioral Health Services Act. During the session, which is open to the public, participants may comment on the guidance DHCS is developing. <u>Advance</u> registration is required.

These community treatment sites are under construction with support from BHCIP funding. More sites will be funded and built, thanks to approved Proposition 1 bonds.
