HUMAN DEVELOPMENT AND CAPABILITIES




Debuted in 1990 at the UN; global gold standard for measuring well-being.

Rooted in Nobel laureate economist Amartya Sen's **capabilities framework**.

Capabilities are our toolkit for living a freely chosen, flourishing life.

Capabilities are expanded or constrained by the things we do ourselves **and** by the conditions and institutions around us.

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BY GEOGRAPHY

- 78 of 88 incorporated cities +28 Censusdesignated places (unincorporated) = 97% of LA County population
- 69 PUMAs
- Within LA City: 15 LA City Council Districts and 35 Community Plan Areas

PORTRAIT OF LA COUNTY 2017: SOME IMPACTS

- The LA County Department of Mental Health—needs assessment & planning
- Informed the creation of the Los Angeles County Anti-Racism, Diversity, and Inclusion Initiative (ARDI)
- LA County workforce development sites relocated based on need using the neighborhood HDI scores as a guide
- Community Development Commission—assessment of impediments to housing access and compliance with the Fair



LA County Healthy Design Workgroup design a placed-based equity pilot in local communities like Florence-Graham.

The Department of Recreation and Parks—development of its new operational strategic plan to expand park access and programming

PORTRAIT OF LA COUNTY 2026

Funded by the **LA County Department of Mental Health** with support from The James Irvine Foundation, The Ralph M. Parsons Foundation, Cedars-Sinai, First 5 LA, and the Conrad N. Hilton Foundation

Provide a well-being snapshot and track change over time for:

- 100+ places (cities, unincorporated areas, City of LA Community Plan Areas)
- Racial and ethnic groups
- Women and men
- US-born and foreign-born Angelenos

New: Incorporate qualitative information and perspectives gleaned from facilitated community conversations and data walks

Spotlight the needs of specific populations, such as Angelenos who are experiencing mental illness, are justice involved, or are unhoused

Produce report that synthesizes these analyses to inform equitable policymaking and resource allocation and meets the needs of our key stakeholders

DATA WALKS

- In-person convenings of local residents in five communities, identified in partnership with First 5: Antelope Valley, Long Beach, East LA, South LA, and the San Fernando Valley
- Virtual gatherings for other countywide communities or groups (youth, LGBTQ Angelenos)
- Facilitated conversation with community members capturing feedback and ideas
- Results will inform our final recommendations, surface important issues, and bring the real voices of community members to the report






HDI BY GENDER, RACE AND ETHNICITY



HDI BY GENDER, RACE AND ETHNICITY, AND NATIVITY 2015–2023




HDI BY GENDER AND RACE/ETHNICTY, 2015–2023





LIFE EXPECTANCY BY GENDER, RACE AND ETHNICITY, AND NATIVITY 2015–2023







BACHELOR'S DEGREE ATTAINMENT BY GENDER, RACE AND ETHNICITY, AND NATIVITY 2015–2023




EDUCATION INDEX BY GENDER, RACE AND ETHNICITY, AND NATIVITY 2015–2023










HDI BY PLACE, 2023




LIFE EXPECTANCY BY PLACE, 2023

MEDIAN PERSONAL EARNINGS BY PLACE, 2023


